XTRACT of a Duplicate of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Sir Edward Hughes, Kuight of the Bath, and Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the East Indies, to Mr. Stephens, received on Friday 🚁 Captain Erasmus Gower, of Majesty's Ship Meder; the Original of which is on board the Pondicherry Armed Transport, not yet arrived.

Superb, in Madrass Road, July 25, 1783.

Y last Address to you, for their Lordships Information, was dated the 19th of March, of this Year, from Bombay. By it I fignified my Intention to proceed to Sea with the Ships of His Majesty's Squadron under my Command, and I sailed

accordingly on the Day following.

On the 8th of April, off the Baffas, I was joined by Captain Troubridge, in His Majesty's Ship Active, who had been cruizing for a Month off the Friar's Hood by my Orders, and had feen nothing of the Enemy's Squadron during that Time.

In the Night of the 10th, a Grab Ship of the Enemy's, that had been taken from the English, fell into the Squadron and was captured. By the Officers, Prisoners, taken in this Ship, I learned the Whole of the Enemy's Squadron, under the Command of Monf. Suffrein, was in Trincamalé Harbour, except Two of their best sailing Line of Battle Ships, and Two Frigates, which were cruizing off Madras to block up that Port, and intercept all Supplies bound to it: I therefore immediately the Squadron for that Place, and an fleered with the Squadron for that Place, and an-chored in the Road on the 13th of April, but saw nothing of the French Cruizers; however, as they had been in Sight of the Place only the Day before, I directed the Ships named in the Margin,\* under the Orders of Captain Mitchell, of the Sultan, to proceed to Sea, and use all possible Diligence to intercept them; and, on the Day following, Captain Graves, of His Majelly's Ship Sceptre, whose Signal had been made to chase a strange Sail on the 11th, joined me with the Naiade, a French Frigate of 30 Guns, and 160 Men, which he had come up with in the Night and captured.

On the 16th of April, Captain Burney, of His Majesty's Ship Bristol, with his Convoy from England, arrived in this Road, escorted by the Ships under the Orders of Captain Mitchell, of the Sultan, who had feen nothing of the Enemy's Cruizers, but fell in with the Bristol and her Convoy at Sea.

On the 19th of April, the Company's Ship Duke of Athol made the Signal of Diftress, and the Boats of the Squadron being ordered by Signal to her Affistance, she unfortunately blew up, by which

unhappy Accident the Squadron lost +Six Commif-fioned and Four Warrant Offices, and 127 of our best Seamen.

From the Day of the Squadron's Arrival in this Road, all possible Diligence have been used to compleat the Ships Water, in doing which great Delays and frequent Disappointments arose from the Want of a sufficient Number of Shore Boats, and the high Surf on the Beach. However I put to Sea on the 2d of May with His Majesty's Ships to seek the Enemy's Squadron, and, if possible, intercept their expected Reinforcements, although the Water of many of the Ships was by no Means compleat, having left in the Road His Majesty's Three Storeships Pondicherry, Harriott, and Minerva, to lade Military Stores and Provisions for the Service of the Army then about to march for the Attack of Cuddalore, where the Marquis de Busty, with the greater Part of the French Land Forces, was posted: and to cover and protect these Storeships, as well as some other Ships and Vessels employed for the same Purpose, from the Enemy's Cruizers, I left in the Road, at the Request of the Select Committee of this Presidency, His Majesty's Ships and Vessels as per Margin, t under the Command of Captain Haliday, of His Majesty's Ship Isis.

On the 15th of May, when off Cuddalore, I spoke Two Portuguese Ships from Trincamale, who informed me Mons. Suffrein with his whole Force was there, fitting for Sea with all possible Expedition, to come to the Relief of Cuddalore: From that Time I continued working to Windward with the Squadron along Shore, left the Enemy's Squadron should pass in Shore of me, and fall on the Storeships and their covering Party, then ar Anchor near to Cuddalore.

On the 25th of May I came off Trincamalé, and reconnoitred the Polition of the Enemy's Squadron, which I did not think by any Means eligible to attack at Anchor, under Cover of their Gun and Mortar Batteries, and therefore flood to the South-ward to intercept any Reinforcement or Supplies that might be coming to them, at the same Time watching their Motions by the Frigates of the Squadron, and keeping within a proper Distance of the Place, lest they should put to Sea in the Night, and fall down on the covering Ships and Storeships off Cuddalore.

On the 1st of June Two English Seamen in a Boat escaped from the French Squadron, and brought certain Intelligence, that the Fendant, of 74 Guns, with Two Frigates and Two Storeships, had slipped out of Trincamalé Bay; the Storeships I concluded carried Stores for the French Garrison of Cuddalore, and the Fendant and Two Frigates deffined to cover and protect them; and being apprehensive they might attack our covering Ships and Storeships off Caddalore, I bore away on the 2d of June. for the Coast, and on the 3d had Sight of the Fendant and Two Frigates, whom I chaced till Night, when I lost Sight of them.

continued cruizing with the Squadron to the Southward of Cuddalore till the 9th of June, when I anchored in Porto Novo Road, about Seven Leagues to the Southward of that Place, partly to cover our own Ships in Cuddalore Road, and engage the Enemy's Squadron before they could anchor there, and partly to endeavour to get a Supply of Water, of which many Ships began to be in Want; but, after exerting ourselves to the utmost, no Water could be obtained either at Porto Novo or Tranquebar; at the first Place the Enemy's Troops were in Possession of both Banks of the River, at the other the Wells were dried up.

On the 13th of June the Enemy's Squadron, under the Command of Monf. Suffrein, came in Sight to the Southward, confishing of Fisteen Ships of the Line, Three Frigates and a Fireship; and the same Day I weighed with His Majesty's Squadron, and dropped down to about Five Miles Distance off Cuddalore, and there anchored: The French Squadron anchored off the Coleroon River, about Seven or

Eight Leagues to the Southward of our's.

On the 17th the French Squadron being under Sail and bearing down; I made the Signal, and weighed with His Majesty's Squadron, and formed the Line of Battle a-head to receive the Enemy: In the Evening they hauled the Wind, and flood to the Southward, and I followed them with His Majesty's Squadron: From this Time to the 20th I was continually employed in endeavouring to get the Wind of the Enemy, which, however, I was never able to effect, from the extraordinary Variableness of the Winds, that often brought Part of the two Squadrons within a random Shot of each other. On the 20th, the Enemy still having the Wind, thewed a Dispo-fition to engage, when I immediately formed the Line of Battle a-head, and brought to to receive them: At Four Minutes past Four, P. M. the Van Ship of the Enemy, having first tried her Distance by a lingle Shot, when scarce within Point blank Shot Distance, the Encmy's Squadron began their Fire on His Majesty's, which, at Twenty Minutes after was returned, and a heavy Cannonade ensued on both Sides, the Enemy still keeping up their first Distance; the Cannonade continued till Seven, P. M. when the Enemy hauled off: At Day-light I made the Signal and wore with the Squadron, and brought-to to repair the Damages, with the Ships Heads towards the Land; feveral of the Ships much difabled in their Hulls, Masts and Rigging, the Gibraltar and Isis in particular; the Enemy's Squadron not in Sight,

In the Morning of the 22d I saw the French Squadron at Anchor in Pondicherry Road, bearing S. S. W. directly to Windward of His Majesty's Squadron, and some of them getting under Weigh; and I made what Sail I could towards them, and anchored the same Night off the Ruins of Alem-

parvo, the more effectually to stop Shot Holes, and

repair the Damages sustained.

I beg you will be pleased to inform their Lordships, that so early as the 8th of June, the Scurvy began to make a rapid Progress among the Crews of all the Ships of the Squadron, but particularly on board the Ships last arrived from England, under the Orders of Commodore Sir Richard Bickerton, Bart.

The Number of Sick on board the Line of Battle Ships amounted on that Day to 1121 Men, 605 of whom being in the last Stage of the Scurvy, I was under the Necessity of sending on the Day following to the Naval Hospital at this Place, in

His Majesty's Ships Bristol and San Carlos.
From that Time to the 22d, the Disease increafed the Numbers of the Sick daily, so as most of the Ships of the Line had from 70 to 90 Men, and the Ships last from England double that Number, very many in the last Stage of the Disease, and unable to come to Quarters, dying daily. Under these Circumstances, and the Water of most of the Ships being expended, except a few Casks in their Ground Tiers, and none to be obtained to the Southward, I determined to return to this Road, there to land the Sick and Wounded, and compleat the Water of the Squadron for further Service; and on the 23d of June I weighed with the Squadron, and arrived in this Road of the

Afternoon of the 25th.

On my Arrival there, I received authentic (although not official) Intelligence, that the Preliminary Articles of Peace between Great Britain, France, Spain, and America, had been figned and ratified, as well as a Cessation from Hostilities agreed on between Great Britain and the States General of the United Provinces, of which Information the Select Committee of this Prefidency were also in Possession; and being summoned the same Day to a Consultation with the Select Committee, to take into Confideration these Circumstances, I concurred with the other Members of the Committee, that it would be proper and was necessary to communicate to the Commanders in Chief of the Sea and Land Forces of the French King at Cuddalore, the Information we had received, together with the Grounds on which we believed it to be true and authentic; and on the 27th of June I dispatched His Majesty's Ship Medea, as a Flag of Truce, with Letters to Mons. Suffrein and the Marquis de Bussy.

On the 4th of July the Medea returned to this Road, with Answers from Monf. Suffrein and the Marquis De Bussy to my Letters of the 27th of June, by which they concurred in a Cessation of Hostilities by Sea and Land, as well as an immediate Release and Return of Prisoners on both Sides: In Consequence, I have received all the Prisoners belonging to the Squadron in Mons. Sustrein's Power, amounting to about 200, and have returned all those made Prisoners in French Ships, amounting to about 350. Monf. Suffrein informs me by Letter, he has also sent to the Mauritius for fuch English Prisoners as have been sent

thither, and will return them.

I have judged it necessary to fend, for their Lordship's Information, the Line of Battle of His Majesty's Squadron under my Command, on the 20th of last Month, and a List of the French Ships opposed to me under the Command of Monf. Suffrein.

## By the KING, PROCLAMATION,

Requiring Passes, formerly granted to Ships and Vessels trading in the Way of the Cruizers belonging to the Governmen's on the Coast of Barbary, to be returned into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, and other Passes of different Forms to be issued.

WHEREAS by Our Royal Proclamation, WV bearing Date the Twenty-eighth Day of August, in the Sixteenth Year of Our Reign, Wc did charge and command all Our loving Subjects who then were, or should be, possessed of any Passes for Ships and Vessels belonging to Our Subjects trading to Portugal, the Canaries, Guinea, the Indies, into the Mediterranean, or elsewhere, in the Way of the Cruizers belonging to the Governments on the Coast of Barbary, (except such Passes as had been granted to Ships gone or going to the East Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they could not be timely furnished with New Passes) that they should, before the Thirty-first Day of August, One thousand seven hundred and feventy feven, return the same, and furnish them-felves with Passes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of the Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their several Ships and Vessels, in such Manner as by the said recited Proclamation was directed: And whereas it hath been humbly represented unto Us, that there is the greatest Reason to believe, that many of Our Passes may, either by Accident, or undue Means, have fallen into the Hands of Foreigners, who, by Colour of fuch Passes, may carry on their Trade; We, taking the Premises into Our Royal Consideration, and judging it necessary to put a speedy Stop to all such indirect Practices, which do not only tend to the Prejudice of Our Trading Subjects, but may occasion a Missunderstanding between Us and the Governments on the Coast of Barbary, for preventing thereof, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby de-clare, That all such Passes of the present Form, now in being, shall not continue in Force longer than till the Thirty-first Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-four, sexcept fuch Passes as have been granted to Ships gone or going to the East Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they cannot be timely furnished with New Passes; and that in such Case, the Passes of the present Form do continue in Force for Two Years, from and after the faid Thirty first Day of Decem ber, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-four). And We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our loving Subjects, who are or shall be pos-fessed of any such Passes, that they do, before the Thirty-first Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-four, return the same (except fuch as are before excepted) into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, or to the respective Collectors of Our Customs at the Out-Ports of Great Britain and Ireland, or to the Governors of

order to their being cancelled; and that they do furnish themselves with Passes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu therof, for their several Ships and Vessels, according to the Treaty subsisted ing between Us and the faid Governments on the Coast of Barbary, and the Regulations made by Our Royal Predecessor King George the First, by Order in His Privy Council on the Fourteenth Day of June, in the Year One thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, fo far as the same remain unaltered by the Regulations made by Us in Our Council on the Twenty-eighth Day of August, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-six, and according to the further Regulations then there made, and Our Instructions given to Out said Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, touching the same: And whereas many Ships and Vessels belonging to Our loving Subjects, continue several Years trading from Port to Port in the Mediterranean, without returning Home, whereby they cannot so conveniently pro-cure their Passes to be exchanged; We do hereby, for the Ease of Our trading Subjects, publish and declare Our Pleasure, That upon the Application of any Owner of any Ship or Vessel, or other substantial Merchant, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, and Oath made by him of the Property of such Ship or Vessel, and that Three Fourths of the Company are Our Subjects, according to an Act made in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of Our Royal Predecessor King Charles the Second, (intituled, "An Act for encouraging and encreasing of "Shipping and Navigation,") or such other Proportion as may be authorized by Act of Parliament, and upon entering into a Bond for the Return of fuch Pass at the End of Three Years, or of the Voyage, if that shall sooner determine, it shall and may be lawful for Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, for the Time being, and they are respectively empowered to make out a New País for fuch Ship or Vessel, and send the same to such of Our Confuls in the Mediterranean as the faid Owner or Mer-chant shall desire, with Direction to such Consul, that, upon Application to him from the Master of the Ship, for which the Pass is made out, and surrendering up his Old Pass, and entering into a like Bond for the Return of such New Pass, he shall deliver out the faid New Pass to such Master, and transmit the Old One, with the Bond, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain: And in order more effectually to hinder, for the future, any Abuses that may be attempted by Foreigners relating to the New Passes to be issued as aforesaid; We do hereby further declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That all such New Passes, to be hereaster issued for any Ships or Vessels whatsoever, belonging to any of Our Subjects, inhabiting the Town and Garrison of Gibraltar, shall be made out in a peculiar Form, different from the Form of the New Passes, to be issued for Ships and Vessels belonging to any other Part of Our Dominions; and that fuch New Paffes shall be lodged with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Commander in Chief for the Time being, of the faid Town and Garrison of Gibraltar, and issued out only by him, according to the Regulations made by Our faid Royal Predecessor King George the First, and Ourself in Coun-Some of Our Foreign Plantations or Dominions, in cil as aforesid. And the faid Governor, Lieute-

nant Governor and Commander in Chief, is hereby ! charged and required, not to iffue or deliver out any such Passes to any Persons whatsoever, other than such as are really Our Subjects; inhabiting in the said Town and Garrison of Gibraltar, and firicily to conform themselves to the Regulations and instructions made and given as aforelaid : But in regard it fometimes happens, that Ships belonging to Our subjects of other Parts of Our Dominions, call in at Gibraltar without Passes, and have Occasion to be furnished therewith; We do. for the further Conveniency of Trade, hereby publish and declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That it shall and may be lawful for Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland for the Time being, and they are respectively hereby impowered, to lodge Mediterranean Pailes, of the same Form with the New Passes, for Ships and Vessels belonging to any other Part of Our Dominions, in the Hands of Our Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Commander in Chief of the Town and Garrison of Gibraltar, with Directions to him to iffue and deliver out such Paffes to any of Our Subjects, not being Inhabitants of the faid Town and Garrison of Gibraltar; provided the Person or Persons applying for the fame, do comply with and conform to the feveral Rules and Regulations now in Use, and required to be observed by such Our other Subjects. And We do hereby order, That the Commissioners of Our Customs in Great Britain, and the Commission oners of Our Revenue in Ireland, do cause to be carried into Execution such Parts of the said Order of Courcil of the Fourteenth Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and twenty two, concerning Passes, as relate to themselves, and the proper Officers under them, so far as the same remains now in Force, and of Our Order ascressid, made in Council, on the Twenty eighth of August, One thousand seven hundred and seventy six; and that they do direct their Officers in the several Ports of Our Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, to demand of the Masters of all Merchant Ships, so soon as they shall return into Fore from a Foreign Voyage, all Passes granted as aforesaid, which shall be in their Possession, to be produced to the said re pective Officers of Our Customs; and that if the same shall appear to be of an older Date than Twelve Months, for Ships and Vessels trading on this Side the Streights Mouth, or for Ships and Vessels trading to a greater Distance, in case the Voyages of such last mentioned Ships and Vessels shall be determined, then such Passes shall be delivered up to the said respective Officers of Our Cuftoms, and be by them returned to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain: And in case the Master of any such Ship or Vessel shall refuse to produce or deliver up fuch Passes, according to the true Intent of Our said Order, then the said Officer shall certify the Name of every such Master, and of the Ship or Vessel, to Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ire and, or to Our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland for the Time being, to the End that Directions may be given for putting the Bond, entered into on the granting any such Pass, in Suit: And all Our Governors, Lieutenant Governors, and Commanders in Chief of any of Our Islands, Colonies or Plantations, Confuls refiding in Foreign Parts, and all other Our Officers and Ministers whatsoever, and all other Our loving Subjects whom it may concern, are hereby expresly required

and commanded to yield due Obedience unto, and firitly to observe all the Orders, Influctions, Regulations, and Directions before mentioned, on Pain of Our High Displeasure.
