Constantinople, August 8.

The Plague, which had encreased to an alarming
 Degree about a Fortnight ago, is at present greatly
 diminished. This favourable Change is probably
 owing to the warm Weather which has prevailed here
 since Eight or Ten Days. The last Letters from
 Smirna advise the total Cessation of the Plague in
 that City, and it's Neighbourhood, which continued
 free from every Appearance of Disorder.

Naples, August 24.

On Thursday Night last his Sicilian Majesty set
 out from Naples for Barletta. The Queen, in Com-
 pany with the newly married Princesses, left this
 City the next Evening, and arrived at Barletta in
 Twenty-one Hours, not having stopped on the Road.
 Immediately after the Queen's Arrival his Sicilian
 Majesty embarked on Board of one of his Frigates,
 and the Queen and Princesses on Board of another,
 and set Sail with a favorable Wind for Fiume.

Stockholm, August 31.

The King of Sweden arrived at his Country-
 Seat of Haga, in the Neighbourhood of this City,
 the 26th Instant; and Yesterday made his publick
 Entry into Stockholm, on Horseback, amidst the
 Acclamations of a great Concourse of People, who
 had assembled in the Streets through which he was
 to pass. His Majesty was accompanied by such of
 the Officers who have distinguished themselves during
 the late Campaign, as were already arrived from
 Finland, and was escorted by the City Guards, who
 have performed the Military Service of the Capital
 since the Commencement of Hostilities against
 Russia.

His Majesty first went to the Cathedral Church;
 and, after having performed his Devotions there,
 repaired to the Town-Hall, where he, in a very
 gracious Speech, thanked the Burgesses assembled
 for the Marks of Loyalty and Attachment he has
 received from them during the War. In the Even-
 ing there was a Drawing-Room, where the Foreign
 Ministers had an Opportunity of paying their
 Court to his Majesty.

To-day Peace was proclaimed with the usual So-
 lemnities in the different Quarters of the City.
 The Royal Family, the Nobility, and other Persons
 of Distinction, assisted at the Te Deum, which was
 sung with great Pomp at the Cathedral; after which
 there was a Court and Publick Dinner at the Palace;
 and the Evening is to close with Illuminations and
 other Demonstrations of Joy.

Vienna, September 1.

News has been just now received of the safe Arri-
 val of their Sicilian Majesties at Fiume on the 28th
 of August.
