To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Natives of the Swiss Cantons and other States annexed to the Helvetic Body, Inhabitants in or about this Metropolis, firmly attached to that Liberty, our dearest Birthright in our Native Country, which we enjoy in this Kingdom under its wife and happy Constitution, most humbly presume to approach the Throne in order to express our unshaken and faithful Attachment to your Majesty's most sacred Person and Government, our Resolution to assist your Majesty with our Lives and Fortunes in repelling the Enemies of this Kingdom in case of an Invasion, and our Wish that, according to what was done in former similar Circumstances, we may be allowed to concur by ourselves to that glorious Purpose, and to shew the Readiness of a free and loyal People for the Defence of a Kingdom, which, from the Protection we have met in it, we justly consider as our adopted Country.

That your Majesty may reign long over a free, happy and victorious Nation, is the most ardent Prayer of our Hearts.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Magistrates, Town Council and other Inhabitants of the Town of Thurso, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Magistrates, Town Council and other Inhabitants of the Town of Thurso, beg Leave to

approach the Throne with Assurances of our distinguished Regard for your Majesty's sacred Person and Family, and of our inviolable Attachment to the British Constitution.

With a Magnanimity becoming the Sovereign of a free and a generous People, your Majesty beheld the distracted State of a Nation, ever ready to avail herself of the Misfortunes of this Country, without attempting to interfere in the internal Affairs of France, or to seize the Advantages which her Situation presented, and the Reflection of past Events would have fully justified.

In Return for this generous and disinterested Conduct, we have seen, with Indignation, the pretended Government of France endeavour to sap the Foundation of our happy Constitution, by exciting and encouraging a Spirit of Insurrection and Sedition in this Country, which, if allowed to spread, might be productive of the most direful Consequences. We must therefore applaud the Wisdom of your Majesty, and your Ministers, in taking proper Measures to check the growing Evil, and for counteracting the insidious and treacherous Attempts of the French Nation, whose Language and Conduct were early directed to the total Subversion of every Government; who, by embruing their Hands in the Blood of an amiable Sovereign, have testified their Disregard of every Law, divine and human; and of whose hostile Designs against this Country in particular, if any Doubt could remain, they have given irrefragable Proof by their late unprovoked Declaration of War.

Impressed with these Sentiments, we feel ourselves called upon to declare our entire Approbation of the Measures which your Majesty is pursuing for carrying on the present War with Vigour and Effect; and to assure your Majesty of our fixed Resolution to support Government, to the utmost of our Power, in whatever is necessary for maintaining the Safety, Glory and Dignity of the British Empire.

That your Majesty's Reign may be long and prosperous; and that the Crown of these Realms may continue in your illustrious House in uninterrupted Succession and with undiminished Lustre to the latest Posterity, is the earnest Prayer of,
