Brussels, May 22.

A Messenger has just brought an Account that General Baron de Beaulieu, having marched into the Duchy of Bouillon on the 18th Instant, defeated a considerable Body of French who covered that Canton; and having killed Twelve Hundred, taken between Two and Three Hundred Prisoners, Six Pieces of Cannon, and several *Caissons*, he took Possession of the Town of Bouillon, and summoned the Citadel to surrender, which was refused.

The Inhabitants having fired upon the Austrians, the Town was given up to be pillaged.

HIS late Majesty having been graciously pleased, by His Warrant under His Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th Day of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy; These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules
