and Hereditaments in the County of Kent, in-the former Proprietors thereof, and for other Purpofes' therein mentioned.

An Act to embank and drain the open and unembanked Lands and Grounds lying between the Dales-Head, Dyke and the River Witham, in the feveral Townships or Hamlets, and the Parishes of Walcot, Timberland Thorpe, Timberland Martin, Linwood and Blankney, all in the County of Lincoln.

An Act for charging the Fen Lands and Low Grounds, within the fecond, third, fourth and fifth Diftricts, in the Bounds and Precincts of Whittlefey, in the Isle of Ely and County of Cambridge, with further Taxes for dicharging the Debts incurred by the Commissioners for the faid Districts respectively, under certain Acts passed in the Twenty-fecond Year of King George the Second and the Twelfth Year of His prefent Majefty, and for better improving, supporting and preferving the Drainage of the faid Lands and Grounds.

An Act-for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of Two Acts, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majefty King George the Second and in the Seven-teenth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, for repairing and widening certain Roads leading to and from the City of Lincoln, and for repairing and widening the Roads from the Termination of the. prefent Turnpike Road at the Foot of Bracebridge Bridge, over the faid Bridge Westward, to the Extremity of the County of Lincoln, near a Place called Potter Hill, and from the Termination of the prefent Turnpike Road, at the Foot of Canwick Hill Southward, to a Windmill at the Top of the faid Hill.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of an Act, pafied in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His late Ma-jefty King George the Second, for repairing and widening the Road from Balingfloke, through Wortin, Overton, Whitchurch, Hulborn, Pryers, Andover and Middle Wallop, in the County of South-ampton, to a Place called Lobcomb Corner, in the Parifh of Winterflow in the County of Wilts; and of another Act made in the Fourteenth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majetty, for enlarging the Term and Powers of the faid Act, for int cluding the Road from Spittle House over Weyhill to Mullen's Pond, as directed by an Act made in the Twenty-ninth Year of His faid Majefty King George the Second, and for amending the Reads from Andover, through Charlton, towards Tangley, and from Charlton to Clanfield Bottom, and from Weyhill to Sarfon-Street; and also the Road through the faid Town of Basingstoke; and also for amending, widening and keeping in Repair cer-tain other Roads in the County of Southampton.

. An ASt for more effectually repairing, improving and keeping in Repair the Road leading from the Guide Poft, in the Village of Adderbury in the County of Oxford, through Kidlington, to the End of the Mileway in the City of Oxford.

An Act for making and repairing the Road from. Kinrofs, in the County of Kinrofs, to Alloa in the County of Clackmanan.

And to Twenty-two Private Bills.
