Then, by His Majesty's Command, Lieutenant-General the Honorable Charles Stuart was introduced into the Presence between Lord Bridport and the Right Honorable Sir William Fawcett, the Two Junior Knights Companions present, preceded by the Gentleman Usher of the Order, with Reverences as before.

The Sword of State was delivered to the Sovereign by the second Knight in Semority, and Lieutenant-General the Honorable Charles Stuart kneeling, was knighted therewith. Then His Royal Highness the Duke of York, the Senior Knight, presented the Ribbon and Badge to the Sovereign, and His Majesty put them over the new Knight's Right Shoulder, who being thus invested, had the Honor to kis His Majesty's Hand.

In like Manner, Vice-Admirals Henry Harvey and Andrew Mitchell were feverally introduced into the Presence, knighted and invested with the Ribbon and Badge of the Order, and having likewise kissed His Majesty's Hand, the Procession returned to the Privy Chamber in the Order abovementioned.

The Ceremony was performed in His Majesty's Closet; several Great Officers of the Court being present.

Extract of a Letter from Mr. Robert Hosier, Commander of the Private Schooner of War the Revenge, to Evan Nepean, Efq; dated Viana, the 16th December 1799.

Have the Honor to acquaint you, for the Information of their Lordships, that on the 4th Instant, at Five A. M. in Vigo-Bay, I was attacked by Four Spanish Privateers, Two Schooners, a Brig, and a Lugger, mounting from Four to Fourteen Guns. The Wind being Southerly, I kept up a running Fight till I got clear of the Islands to the Northward, which lasted about Fisteen Minutes, when one of the Schooners having loft her Mainmast, gave up the Chace, and the other Three immediately hauled their Wind; having fuffered very much in our Rigging and Sails, it was not in my Power to chace them to Windward, therefore made fail to the N. W. At Two P. M. faw a Schooner to the Westward, gave Chace; at Three got close alongfide, faw she had Spanish Colours flying, defired them to strike; on making no Answer gave them our Broadfide, which they returned, and a fmart Fire was kept up on both Sides about an Hour, when the blew up close alongfide. Our Boat being very much shattered, it was some Time before I could get her ready to hoift out, and I am forry to fay I was enabled to fave but Eight of the Crew, who informed me she was the new Privateer Brillaint, Ramo de Castillo, Master, of Eight Guns, Six and Twleve-Pounders; had, when she began the Action, Sixty-three Men; had failed from Pontevedra that Morning on a Cruise off Oporto, which I am happy in having prevented, as there are at this Time Fifty Sail of Vessels off that Bar, who cannot get in, owing to the Badness of the Weather.

Copy of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Lord Keith, K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated Queen Charlotte, at Gibraltar, December 22, SIR,

N justice to the intrepid Behaviour of Lieutenant Bainbridge, I cannot refift reporting, for their Lordships: Information, that last Evening an English Cutter (the Lady Nelson,) was seen off Cabreta Point, furrounded by French Privateers and Gun-

Vessels all firing; I ordered the Boats from the Queen Charlotte and Emerald to row towards the Enemy, in Hopes it might encourage the Cutter to refift until she could get under our Guns, but she was boarded and taken in Tow by Two of the French Privateers, in which Situation Lieutenant Bainbridge in the Queen Charlotte's Barge, with Sixteen Men, run alongside the Cutter, and after a sharp Conslict, carried her, taking Seven French Officers and Twenty-seven Men Prisoners; Six or Seven more were killed or knocked overboard in the Scuffle: the Privateers cut the Tow-Ropes, and made off close under the Guns of Algaziras, purfued and attacked by Lord Cochrane in the Queen Charlotte's Cutter, which had by this Time got up. Had not the Darkness of the Night prevented the Boats acting in Concert, all the Privateers would have been taken. Lieutenant Bainbridge is feverely woulded on the Head by a Stroke from a Sabre, and flighty in other Places, but I trust he is not in Danger.
