WHEREAS, by virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to authorize His Majesty from Time to Time to prohibit the Exportation of Provisions or Food," His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 10th of this instant December, to order, and it was thereby ordered, That from and after the Date of the said Order, and until the First Day of October One thousand eight hundred and one, no Person or Persons whatsoever should export, or should load or lay on board any Ship or other Vessel with the Intent to export, from any Port or Place in this Kingdom (except as excepted in the said Order) the several Articles specified in the said Order: And whereas it has been represented to His Majesty, that it may be expedient to prevent the Exportation from this Kingdom of White Herrings and Red Herrings (except to Ireland), His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Prohibition contained in the said above recited Order bearing Date the Tenth Instant, against the Exportation of the several Articles of Provision or Victual specified in the said Order, be extended to the Articles of White Herrings and Red Herrings; and that the same be not allowed to be exported from any Port or Place in this Kingdom, except to Ireland, and except as excepted in the said Order bearing Date the Tenth of this instant December: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly. *Steph. Cottrell.*

WHEREAS, by virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to authorize His Majesty from Time to Time to prohibit the Exportation of Provisions or Food," His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the Tenth of this instant December, to order, and it was thereby ordered, That from and after the Date of the said Order, and until the First Day of October One thousand eight hundred and one, no Person or Persons whatsoever should export, or should load or lay on board any Ship or other Vessel with the Intent to export, from any Port or Place in this Kingdom (except as excepted in the said Order) the several Articles specified in the said Order: And whereas, by the Sixth Article of the Articles of Union between Great Britain and Ireland, it is provided, That from and after the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and one, all Prohibitions and Bounties on the export of Articles, the Growth, Produce; or Manufacture of either Country, to the other, shall cease and determine, His Majesty is hereby pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That from and after the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and one, nothing contained in the above recited Order shall extend or be construed to extend to prohibit the Exportation to Ireland of any of the Articles enumerated in the said Order.

And whereas it has been represented to His Majesty, That it will be necessary from Time to Time to send Supplies of Provisions to the Garrisons belonging to the Honorable United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies,

stationed at St. Helena, Bombay, and Bencoolen, and for the Use of the Ships belonging to the said Company; and also to the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, for the Use of the Inhabitants thereof; His Majesty is thereupon pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, That nothing contained in His Majesty's said above recited Order of the Tenth of this instant December, shall extend or be construed to extend to prohibit the East India Company, or any Agent employed by their Authority and in their Behalf, from exporting such of the Articles of Provision or Victual specified in the said Order, as may be absolutely necessary for the Supply of their Garrisons at St. Helena, Bombay, and Bencoolen, or for the Use of the Ships belonging to the said Company, in such Quantities as shall be judged necessary by the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, upon Application to be made from Time to Time, and under Licences to be granted by their Lordships for that Purpose; nor to prevent the Exportation of any of the said Articles to the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, for the Supply of the Inhabitants of the said Islands, in such Quantities as may be deemed necessary by the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, and under Licences from their Lordships as aforesaid: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly. *Steph. A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

Declaring His Majesty's Pleasure concerning the Royal Style and Titles appertaining to the Imperial Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and its Dependencies, and also the Ensigns, Armorial Flags, and Banners thereof.

G E O R G E R.

WHEREAS by the First Article of the Articles of Union of Great Britain and Ireland, ratified and confirmed by Two Acts of Parliament, the one passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, and the other in the Parliament of Ireland, and respectively intituled, "An Act for the Union of Great Britain and Ireland," it was declared, That the said Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland should, upon this Day, being the First Day of January in the Year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and one, for ever after be united into one Kingdom, by the Name of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland; and that the Royal Style and Titles appertaining to the Imperial Crown of the said United Kingdom and its Dependencies, and also the Ensigns, Armorial Flags, and Banners thereof, should be such as We, by Our Royal Proclamation under the Great Seal of the said United Kingdom, should appoint; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to appoint and declare that Our Royal Style and Titles shall henceforth be accepted, taken, and used as the same are set forth in Manner and Form following; that is to say, the same shall be expressed in the Latin Tongue by these Words:

"GEORGIUS TERTIUS Dei Gratia Britanniarum Rex, Fidei Defensor:"

And in the English Tongue, by these Words:

"GEORGE the THIRD by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland King, Defender of the Faith."

And that the Arms or Ensigns Armorial of the said United Kingdom shall be Quarterly; First and Fourth, England; Second, Scotland; Third, Ireland; and it is Our Will and Pleasure that there shall be borne therewith on an Escutcheon of Pretence the Arms of Our Dominions in Germany, ensigned with the Electoral Bonnet; and it is Our Will and Pleasure that the Standard of the said United Kingdom shall be the same Quarterings as are hereinbefore declared to be the Arms or En-

signs Armorial of the said United Kingdom, with the Escoccheon of Pretence thereon hereinbefore described: And that the Union Flag shall be Azure, the Crosses Saltires of St. Andrew and St. Patrick Quarterly per Saltire, counterchanged Argent and Gules; the latter fimbriated of the Second, surmounted by the Cross of St. George of the Third, fimbriated as the Saltire: And Our Will and Pleasure further is, that the Style and Titles aforesaid, and also the Arms or Ensigns Armorial aforesaid, shall be used henceforth, as far as conveniently may be, on all Occasions wherein Our Royal Style and Titles, and Arms or Ensigns Armorial ought to be used. But nevertheless it is Our Will and Pleasure, that all such Gold, Silver, and Copper Monies as, on the Day before this First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and one, were current and lawful Monies of Great Britain, and all such Gold, Silver, and Copper Monies as shall, on or after this Day, be coined by our Authority with the like Impressions, until Our Will and Pleasure shall be otherwise declared, shall be deemed and taken to be current and lawful Monies of the said United Kingdom in Great Britain; and that all such Gold, Silver, and Copper Monies as, on the Day before this First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and one, were current and lawful Monies of Ireland, and all such Gold, and Silver, and Copper Monies as shall, on or after this Day, be coined by Our Authority, with the like Impressions, until Our Will and Pleasure shall be otherwise declared, shall be deemed and taken to be current and lawful Monies of the said United Kingdom in Ireland; and all such Monies as shall have been coined for and issued in any of the Dominions of the said United Kingdom, and declared by Our Proclamation to be current and lawful Money of such Dominions, respectively bearing Our Style, or Titles, or Arms, or Ensigns Armorial, or any Part or Parts thereof, and all Monies which shall hereafter be coined and issued according to such Proclamations, shall continue to be lawful and current Money of such Dominions respectively, notwithstanding such Change in Our Style, Titles, and Arms, or Armorial Bearings respectively as aforesaid, until Our Pleasure shall be further declared thereupon. And all and every such Monies as aforesaid shall be received and taken in Payment in Great Britain and Ireland respectively, and in the Dominions thereunto belonging, after the Date of this Our Proclamation, in such Manner and as of the like Value and Denomination as the same were received and taken before the Date hereof. And it is also Our Will and Pleasure that the several Dies and Marks which have been used to denote the Stamp Duties, and all other Stamps and Marks and Instruments which before the issuing of this Our Proclamation shall have been in actual Use for any public Purpose, and in which Our Royal Style and

Titles, or Our Arms or Ensigns Armorial, or any Parts or Part thereof respectively, may be expressed, shall not, by reason of this Our Proclamation or any Thing therein contained, be changed or altered until the same may be conveniently so changed or altered, or until Our Pleasure shall be further declared thereupon; but that all such Dies, Stamps, Marks, and Instruments respectively bearing Our Royal Style and Titles, or Arms or Ensigns Armorial used before this First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and one, or any Parts or Part of such Style, Titles, or of such Arms or Ensigns Armorial, shall have the like Force and Effect as the same had before the said First Day of January instant.

A PROCLAMATION,

Declaring His Majesty's Pleasure for holding the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and appointing the Time and Place of Meeting thereof.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS, in pursuance of the Fourth Article of the Articles of Union between Great Britain and Ireland, as the same have been ratified and confirmed by Two Acts of Parliament, the one passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, and the other in the Parliament of Ireland, and both intituled, "An Act for the Union of Great Britain and Ireland," We have thought fit to declare, by Our Royal Proclamation, issued under Our Great Seal of Great Britain, on the Fifth Day of November last, that it was expedient that the Lords and Commons of the then Parliament of Great Britain should be Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland on the Part of Great Britain: And we did, by the same Proclamation, notify Our Intention to appoint Thursday the Twenty-second Day of January instant for the assembling of such First Parliament of the said United Kingdom, by Proclamation, under the Great Seal of Our said United Kingdom: And whereas, by force and in pursuance of an Act, passed in the Parliament of Ireland, and recited in and made Part of the said Two Acts for the Union of Great Britain and Ireland, and intituled, "An Act to regulate the Mode by which the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons, to serve in the Parliament of the United Kingdom on the Part of Ireland, shall be summoned and returned to the said Parliament:" And, in consequence of Our having by Our said Proclamation, under Our Great Seal of Great Bri-

tain, of the Fifth Day of November last, declared that it was expedient that the Lords and Commons of the then Parliament of Great Britain should be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom on the Part of Great Britain, Four Lords Spiritual, and Twenty-eight Lords Temporal, and One Hundred Commoners, have been appointed, chosen, and declared (according to the Circumstances of the several Cases) to be the Members of the respective Houses of the said First Parliament of the said United Kingdom, on the Part of Ireland: We do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, declare and publish Our Will and Pleasure to be, and do hereby appoint, that Our First Parliament of the said United Kingdom shall meet and be holden at Our City of Westminster on the said Twenty second Day of January One thousand eight hundred and one; whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of our said First Parliament of the said United Kingdom, and all others whom it may concern, are hereby to take Notice: And We do hereby direct and command, in pursuance of the said Fourth Article of the said Articles of Union, that the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, who are to serve in the said Parliament on the Part of Ireland, be returned in such Manner as by the said Act, passed in the Parliament of Ireland to regulate the Mode by which the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons, to serve in the Parliament of the United Kingdom on the Part of Ireland, shall be summoned and returned to the said Parliament, such Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, are directed to be returned, according to the Circumstances of each particular Case of the several Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, so appointed, chosen, and declared to be the Members of the respective Houses of the said United Kingdom on the Part of Ireland: And We do hereby further (with the Advice aforesaid) declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that Our said Parliament of Our said United Kingdom shall on the said Twenty-second Day of January One thousand eight hundred and one, be holden and sit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs: And the said Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the said Knights, Citizens, and Burgeses, and the said Commissioners for Shires and Burghs, are hereby required and commanded to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said Twenty-second Day of January instant.

A PROCLAMATION,
For a General FAST.

GEORGE R.

WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the heavy Judgments with which Almighty God is pleased to visit the Iniquities of this Land, by a grievous Scarcity and Dearth of divers Articles of Sustenance and Necessaries of Life; moreover taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, for the Maintenance of the Independence of Our Crown, for the Defence of the Commerce, and of the Rights and Liberties, Civil and Religious, of Our Subjects; and trusting in the Mercy of Almighty God, that notwithstanding the fore Punishment which He hath laid upon Us and upon Our People, He will, if We turn to Him in due Contrition and Penitence of Heart, not only withdraw His afflicting Hand, but moreover graciously bless Our Arms, both by Sea and Land, have therefore resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a Public Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout those Parts of our United Kingdom called England and Ireland, on Friday the Thirteenth Day of February next; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins; and may, in the most devout and solemn Manner, send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for the Removal of those heavy Judgments which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved, and under which We at this present Time labour; and for imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety, and Prosperity, to Us and Our Dominions: And We do strictly charge and command, That the said Public Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England and Ireland, as they tender the Favor of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. And for the better and more orderly solemnizing of the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England and Ireland, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Public Worship; and to take care the same be timely dispersed through their respective Dioceses.

For a General FAST.

GEORGE R.

WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the heavy Judgments with which Almighty God is pleased to visit the Iniquities of this Land, by a grievous Scarcity and Dearth of divers Articles of Sustenance and Necessaries of Life; moreover taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, for the Maintenance of the Independence of Our Crown, for the Defence of the Commerce, and of the Rights and Liberties, Civil and Religious, of Our Subjects; and trusting in the Mercy of Almighty God, that, notwithstanding the sore Punishment which He hath laid upon Us and upon Our People, He will, if We turn to Him in due Contrition and Penitence of Heart, not only withdraw His afflicting Hand, but moreover graciously bless Our Arms, both by Sea and Land, have therefore resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a Public Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of our Kingdom called Scotland, on Thursday the Twelfth Day of February next; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins; and may, in the most devout and solemn Manner, send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for the Removal of those heavy Judgments which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved, and under which We at this present Time labour; and for imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety, and Prosperity, to Us and Our Dominions: And We do strictly charge and command, That the said Public Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Favor of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. Our Will is therefore, and We charge, That this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance: And Our Will and Pleasure is, That Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published; and We appoint them to send Copies hereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's

Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the same may be published, and read from the Pulpits, immediately after Divine Service.

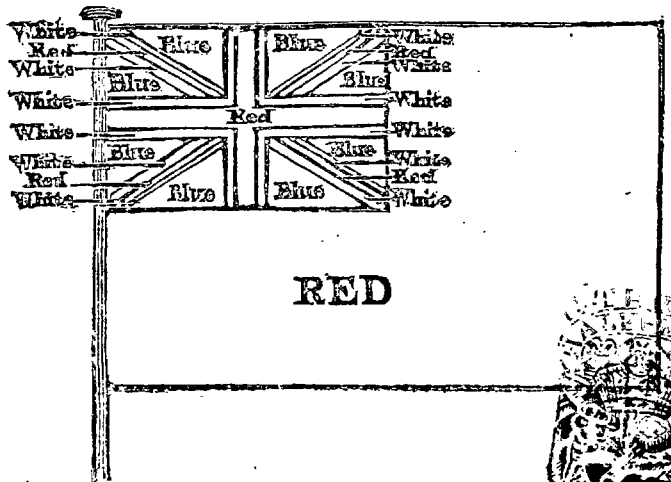

A PROCLAMATION,

Declaring what Ensign or Colours shall be borne at Sea, in Merchant Ships or Vessels belonging to any of His Majesty's Subjects of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the Dominions thereunto belonging.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS, by the First Article of the Articles of Union of the Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, as the same have been ratified and confirmed by Two Acts of Parliament, the one made in Our Parliament of Great Britain, and the other in Our Parliament of Ireland, it was provided that the Ensigns Armorial, Flags, and Banners of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland should be such as We should appoint by Our Royal Proclamation under the Great Seal of Our said United Kingdom: And whereas We have, by Our Royal Proclamation dated this Day, appointed and declared that the Arms, or Ensigns Armorial of the said United Kingdom, should be as therein-expressed: And whereas, according to ancient Usage, the Ensigns, Flags, Jacks, and Pendants worn by Our Ships, and appointed as a Distinction for the same, ought not to be worn on board any Ship or Vessel belonging to any of Our Subjects, so that Our Ships, and those of Our Subjects, may be easily distinguished and known, We have, therefore, thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to order and appoint the Ensign described on the Side or Margin



hereof to be worn on board all Ships or Vessels belonging to any of Our Subjects whatsoever, and to issue this Our Royal Proclamation to notify the same to all Our loving Subjects, hereby strictly charging and commanding the Masters of all Merchant Ships and Vessels belonging to any of Our Subjects, whether employed in Our Service or otherwise, and all other Persons whom it may concern, to wear the said Ensign on board their Ships or Vessels: And to the End that none of Our Subjects may presume, on board their Ships, to wear Our Flags, Jacks, and Pendants, which, according to ancient Usage, have been appointed as a Distinction to Our Ships, or any Flags, Jacks, or Pendants in Shape and Mixture of Colours so far resembling Ours as not to be easily distinguished therefrom, We do, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby strictly charge and command all Our Subjects whatsoever, that they do not presume to wear in any of their Ships or Vessels, Our Jack, commonly called the Union Jack, nor any Pendants, nor any such Colours as are usually borne by Our Ships, without particular Warrant for their so doing from Us, or Our High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral for the Time being: And We do hereby also further command all Our loving Subjects, that without such Warrant as aforesaid, they presume not to wear on board their Ships or Vessels any Flags, Jacks, Pendants, or Colours, made in Imitation of, or resembling Ours, or any Kind of Pendant whatsoever, or any other Ensign than the Ensign described on the Side or Margin hereof, which shall be worn instead of the Ensign before this Time usually worn in Merchant Ships; saving that for the better Distinction of such Ships as shall have Commissions of Letters of Mart or Reprisals against the Enemy, and any other Ships or Vessels which may be employed by the principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, the principal Officers of Our Ordnance, the Commissioners for Victualling Our Navy, the Commissioners for Our Customs and Excise, and the Commissioners for Transportation for Our Service relating particularly to those Offices, Our Royal Will and Pleasure is, that all such Ships as have Commissions of Letters of Mart or Reprisals shall, besides the Colours or Ensign hereby appointed to be worn by Merchant Ships, wear a Red Jack with a Union Jack described in a Canton at the upper Corner thereof, next the Staff; and that such Ships and Vessels as shall be employed for Our Service by the principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, the principal Officers of Our Ordnance, the Commissioners for Victualling Our Navy, the Commissioners for Our Customs and Excise, and the Commissioners for Transportation for Our Service relating particularly to those Offices, shall wear a Red Jack with a Union Jack in a Canton at the upper Corner thereof, next the Staff as afore-

said, and in the other Part of the said Jack shall be described the Seal used in such of the respective Offices aforesaid by which the said Ships and Vessels shall be employed: And We do strictly charge and command that none of Our loving Subjects do presume to wear any of the said Distinction-Jacks, unless they shall have Commissions of Letters of Mart or Reprisals, or be employed in Our Service by any of the before-mentioned Officers: And We hereby require Our High Admiral and Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral, the Governors of Our Forts and Castles, the Officers of Our Customs, and the Commanders or Officers of any of Our Ships, for the Time being, upon their meeting with, or otherwise observing any Ships or Vessels belonging to any of Our Subjects, neglecting to wear the Ensign hereby appointed to be borne as aforesaid, or wearing any Flag, Pendant, Jack, or Ensign contrary hereunto, whether at Sea or in Port, not only to seize, or cause to be forthwith seized, such Flag, Pendant, Jack, or Ensign, worn contrary to Our Royal Will and Pleasure herein expressed, but also to return the Names of such Ships and Vessels neglecting to wear the Ensign hereby appointed, or wearing any Flag, Pendant, Jack, or Ensign, contrary hereunto, together with the Names of their respective Masters or Commanders unto Our High Admiral or Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral, or the Judge of Our High Court of Admiralty, for the Time being, to the End that all Persons offending may be duly punished for the same. And We do hereby command and enjoin the Judge and Judges of Our High Court of Admiralty for the Time being, that they make strict Inquiry concerning all such Offenders, and cause them to be duly punished; and all Vice-Admirals and Judges of the Vice-Admiralties, are hereby also required to proceed in the like Manner, within the several Ports and Places belonging to their respective Precincts. And Our further Pleasure is, that this Proclamation shall take Place according to the Times hereafter mentioned; videlicet, For all Ships in the Channel or British Seas, and in the North Seas, after Twelve Days from the Date of these Presents; and from the Mouth of the Channel unto Cape St. Vincent, after Six Weeks from the Date of these Presents; and beyond the Cape, and on this Side the Equinoctial Line, as well in the Ocean and Mediterranean as elsewhere, after Ten Weeks from the Date of these Presents; and beyond the Line after the Space of Eight Months from the Date of these Presents.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and one, in the Forty-first Year of Our Reign.

GOD save the KING.

Westminster, December 31, 1800.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for raising a certain Sum of Money by Loans or Exchequer-Bills for the Service of the Year One thousand eight hundred and one, and for appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament.

An Act to remove Doubts arising upon the Construction of an Act of this Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for granting Bounties on the Importation of Wheat, Barley, Rye, Oats, Pease, Beans, and Indian Corn, and of Barley, Rye, Oat, and Indian Meal, and Wheaten Flour, and Rice.

An Act to prevent, until the Sixth Day of November One thousand eight hundred and one, and from thence to the End of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament, the manufacturing of any fine Flour from Wheat or other Grain, and the making of any Bread solely from the fine Flour of Wheat; and to repeal an Act, passed in the Thirty-sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for permitting Bakers to make and sell certain Sorts of Bread, and to make more effectual Provision for the same.

An Act to prohibit, until the First Day of October One thousand eight hundred and one, and from thence to the End of Six Weeks next after the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament, any Person or Persons from selling any Bread which shall not have been baked Twenty-four Hours.

An Act to permit, until the First Day of October One thousand eight hundred and one, the Importation of Swedish Herrings into Great Britain.

An Act for allowing, until the Fifteenth Day of October One thousand eight hundred and one, the Use of Salt Duty free in the preserving of Fish in Bulk or in Barrels; for protecting Persons engaged in such Fisheries from being impressed into His Majesty's Service; for discontinuing the Bounty payable on White Herrings exported; and for allowing a Bounty on Pilchards now cured, whether exported or sold for Home Consumption.

An Act for further continuing, until Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament, several Acts, made in the Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth Years of His present Majesty's Reign, and in the last Session of Parliament, for empowering His Majesty to secure and detain such Persons as His Majesty shall suspect are conspiring against His Person and Government.

An Act for further continuing, until the First Day of August One thousand eight hundred and seven, an Act, made in the Thirty-seventh Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the better Prevention and Punishment of Attempts to seduce Persons serving in His Majesty's Forces by Sea or Land from their Duty and Allegiance to His Majesty, or to incite them to Mutiny or Disobedience.

An Act for continuing, until Six Months after the Conclusion of a General Peace, Three Acts, made in the Thirty-third and Thirty-eighth Years of His present Majesty's Reign, for establishing Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein, in certain Cases.

An Act for taking an Account of the Population of Great Britain, and of the Increase or Diminution thereof.

An Act to explain, amend, and render more effectual the several Acts made in the Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, and in the last Session of Parliament, for the Redemption and Purchase of the Land Tax.

An Act for extending the Time for the Payment of certain Sums of Money advanced by Way of Loan to several Persons connected with and trading to the Islands of Grenada and St. Vincent.

An Act to indemnify such Persons as have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments, and to indemnify Justices of the Peace or others who have omitted to register or deliver in their Qualifications within the Time directed by Law, and for extending the Time limited for those Purposes until the Twenty-fifth Day of December One thousand eight hundred and one; to indemnify Members and Officers in Cities, Corporations, and Borough Towns, whose Admissions have been omitted to be stamped according to Law, or having been stamped, have been lost or mislaid, and for allowing them, until the Twenty-fifth Day of December One thousand eight hundred and one, to provide Admissions duly stamped; to permit such Persons as have omitted to make and file Affidavits of the Execution of Indentures of Clerks to Attornies and Solicitors to make and file the same on or before the First Day of Michaelmas Term One thousand eight hundred and one; and for indemnifying Deputy-Lieutenants and Officers of the Militia who have neglected to transmit Descriptions of their Qualifications to the Clerks of the Peace within the Time directed by Law, and for extending the Time limited for that Purpose until the First Day of September One thousand eight hundred and one.

An Act for explaining and amending an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for erecting a Lazaret on Chetney Hill, in the County of Kent, and for reducing into One Act the Laws relating to Quarantine, and for making further Provision therein," as far as regards the Payment of the Tonnage Duty in the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man.

An Act to revive and continue, until the Expiration of Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament, and amend so much of an Act of the last Session of Parliament as relates to the reducing and better collecting the Duties payable on the Importation of Starch; and to continue, for the same Time, several Laws relating to the enabling His Majesty to permit Goods to be imported into this Kingdom in Neutral Ships; to the authorising His Majesty to make Regulations respecting the Trade to the Cape of Good Hope; and to the preventing Offences in obstructing, destroying, or damaging Ships, and in obstructing Seamen and others from pursuing their lawful Occupations.

An Act for allowing the Importation of undressed Hemp from any of the Countries that lie within the Limits of the exclusive Trade of the East India Company free of Duty.

An Act to authorize His Majesty to appoint Commissioners for the more effectual Examination of Accounts of Public Expenditure for His Majesty's Forces in the West Indies during the present War.

An Act for making the Port of Amsterdam in the Island of Curaçao, a free Port.

An Act for continuing, until the First Day of June One thousand eight hundred and one, the several Acts for regulating the Turnpike Roads in Great Britain which expire at the End of the present Session of Parliament.

An Act for obviating a Doubt arising on the Power of Sale and Exchange contained in a Settlement of the Estates of the Right Honorable Henry Earl Bathurst.

And Three Private Acts.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I Cannot suffer this Session to close without returning you My particular Acknowledgments for the distinguished Industry and Zeal with which you have applied yourselves to the interesting Object which, at the Commencement of the Session, I most especially recommended to your Attention.

It has been My earnest Wish that nothing should be omitted which could tend to relieve the Pressure occasioned by the present Dearth of Provisions, and to insure a sufficient Supply till the Produce of the next Harvest can be brought into Use.

The Diligence with which your Inquiries have been conducted has afforded you the best Means of ascertaining the true Circumstances of Our present Situation; and the extensive Measures which you have wisely adopted in consequence, for diminishing the Consumption of Grain, and procuring an increased Supply, will, I doubt not, be found productive of the most salutary Effect.

Much, however, must depend on the Disposition which will, I am confident, be manifested by all those who have the Means of carrying into Execution My solemn Recommendation and Injunction, issued at your Desire, for the Adoption of all practicable Economy in the Use of those Articles which are necessary to the Subsistence of the poorer Classes of My Subjects.

The Time fixed for the Commencement of the Union of Great Britain and Ireland will necessarily terminate your Proceedings on this important Subject; but I am persuaded that the Consideration of it will be resumed with the same Zeal and Temper on the First Meeting of the Parliament of the United Kingdom.

The early Period which I have appointed for that Meeting will afford a speedy Opportunity of completing whatever you may have necessarily left unfinished, and of considering what Measures may tend further to alleviate the Pressure on My People, or to prevent the Danger of its recurring.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I thank you for the Readiness with which you have granted the Supplies necessary, under the present Circumstances, for the Publick Service.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The Detention of the Property of My Subjects in the Ports of Russia, contrary to the most solemn Treaties, and the Imprisonment of British Sailors in that Country, have excited in Me Sentiments in which you and all My Subjects will, I am sure, participate. I have already taken such Steps as this Occasion indispensably required; and it will afford Me great Satisfaction if they prove effectual: But if it shall become necessary to maintain, against any Combination, the Honor and Independence of the British Empire, and those Maritime Rights and Interests on which both Our Prosperity and Our Security must always essentially depend, I entertain no Doubt either of the Success of those Means which, in such an Event, I shall be enabled to exert, or of the Determination of My Parliament and My People to afford Me a Support proportioned to the Importance of the Interests which We have to maintain.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesty's Command, said;

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

It is His Majesty's Command, That the Proclamation declaring His Majesty's most gracious Intention that the Members of Parliament composing this Parliament should be the Members of the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the Part of Great Britain, and that the said Parliament should be assembled on the 22d Day of January next, be delivered in full Parliament, and now read, which closes the present Session.
