**A**T the Court at *St. James's*, the 22d of *June* 1803,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of May last, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Thirtieth Day of June then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Seventh Day of March last, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen, who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next: And whereas the Time limited for Payment of the said Reward was, by Order in Council, prolonged and extended from the said Thirtieth Day of April to the Thirtieth Day of this instant June; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said

Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the said Thirtieth Day of this instant June to the Thirty-first Day of December next inclusive; whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice and govern themselves accordingly. *W. Pawkener.*

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to continue, until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four, several Laws relating to the prohibiting the Exportation and permitting the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty; to the Relief of Captors of Prizes, with respect to the bringing and landing certain Prize Goods in this Kingdom; and to the regulating the Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta;" It is among other Things, enacted, That certain Acts therein mentioned relating to the Exportation and Importation of Corn, and other Articles of Provision should be, and the same were thereby continued until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers given by the said Acts, is hereby pleased to order, That, from the Thirtieth Day of this instant June, until the Thirtieth Day of September next, inclusive, no Person or Persons whatsoever shall export, or shall load or lay on board any Vessel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place of Great Britain any of the following Articles, viz. Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, or Lamb, whether salted or otherwise, or any Bacon, or Butter, unless Proof shall first be given to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs that the Articles so to be exported as aforesaid are not of British Growth, Produce, or Manufacture; But it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that nothing contained in this His Majesty's Order shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation or carrying

out of such and so much of any of the said Articles as shall be necessary to be carried in any Ship or Vessel, on its Voyage out and Home, for the Sustainance, Diet, and Support of the Commander, Master, Mariners, Passengers, and others on board such Ship or Vessel, or for the necessary victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or other Ships and Vessels in His Majesty's Service; or for the necessary victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Forts, Castles, or Garrisons; nor to prohibit, at any Time, the Exportation of such and so much of any of the said Articles as may be necessary for the Supply of the British Forts, Castles, or Factories in Africa, or of British Ships trading upon that Coast, which have usually been supplied with the same from Great Britain; nor to prohibit the Exportation by the East India Company, or any Agent employed by them, of any of the said Articles for the necessary Supply of their Garrisons at St. Helena, Bombay, and Bencoolen, or for the necessary Use of the Ships belonging to the said Company; nor to prohibit the Exportation of any of the said Articles to the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man; or to any of His Majesty's Colonies, Islands, or Plantations in America or the West Indies; or to the Town or Port of Gibraltar, for the necessary Use of the Inhabitants of the same respectively: Provided that the Merchant Exporter, in each Case, shall first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they were entered Outwards before the Entry of the same shall be made, and should give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, in treble the Value of the said Articles, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they were so entered out, and for the Purposes specified and none other; such Bond not to be cancelled or delivered up until Proof shall be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were so entered Outwards:

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, with the Advice aforesaid, That it shall be lawful for and during the said Term beforementioned, to import into any Port or Place of Great Britain any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether salted or otherwise; Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Sago, Sago-Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that shall be so imported, with the proper Officer of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures in the said Acts mentioned.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of the Honorable House in the House of Peers to bear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for granting to His Majesty during the present War, and until the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, additional Duties on the Importation and Exportation of certain Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and on the Tonnage of Ships and Vessels in Great Britain.

An Act for granting to His Majesty the Sum of Twenty Thousand Pounds, to be issued and applied towards making Roads and building Bridges in the Highlands of Scotland; and for enabling the Proprietors of Land in Scotland to charge their Estates with a Proportion of the Expence of making and keeping in Repair Roads and Bridges in the Highlands of Scotland.

An Act to repeal the Duties of Excise payable in Great Britain, and to grant other Duties in lieu thereof.

An Act to amend an Act, passed in the Forty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled An Act to repeal an Act, passed in the Twenty-fifth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for charging Stamp Duties on certain Medicines, and for granting other Duties in lieu thereof; and for making effectual Provision for the better Collection of the said Duties.

An Act for making Allowances in certain Cases to Subaltern Officers of the Militia in Great Britain while disembodied.

An Act for augmenting the Number of Field-Officers and other Officers of Militia within Great Britain.

An Act for further regulating the Administration of the Oath or Affirmation required to be taken by Electors of Members to serve in Parliament, by an Act passed in the Second Year of King George the Second, intituled An Act for the more effectual preventing Bribery and Corruption in the Election of Members to serve in Parliament.

An Act for making more effectual Provision within Ireland for the Punishment of Offences in wilfully casting away, sinking, burning, or destroy-

ing Ships and Vessels, and for the more convenient Trial of Accessories in Felonies.

An Act for continuing, until the First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and four, an Act, passed in the Forty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for regulating, until the Fifteenth Day of February One thousand eight hundred and three, the Prices at which Grain, Meal, and Flour may be exported from Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to Great Britain; and also an Act, made in the present Session of Parliament, for continuing the said Act; and for permitting the Exportation of Seed Corn from Great Britain to Ireland, and the Importation of Malt into Great Britain from Ireland.

An Act for transferring to the Royal Navy such Seamen as are now serving in the Militia of Ireland.

An Act to indemnify Persons who have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices or Employments in Ireland according to Law.

An Act to authorize the Sale or Mortgage of the Estates of Persons found Lunatic, by Inquisition in England or Ireland respectively, and the granting of Leases of the same.

An Act to extend the Provisions of Two Acts, passed in the Thirty-ninth and Fortieth, and in the Forty-first Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, relating to the Use of Horse Hides in making Boots and Shoes, and preventing the damaging of Raw Hides and Skins in the slaying thereof to; and to alter and amend the same as to the Cities of London and Westminster, and Borough of Southwark, and Liberties thereof, and all Places within Fifteen Miles of the Royal Exchange of the said City of London.

An Act for raising and securing a Fund for making Provision for the Widows of the Writers to His Majesty's Signet in Scotland.

An Act for enabling the Company of Proprietors of the Dorset and Somerset Canal Navigation to raise a further Sum of Money towards completing the said Canal; and for altering and amending an Act, passed in the Thirty-sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for making and maintaining the said Navigation.

An Act to continue the Term, and alter and enlarge the Powers of Two Acts passed for amending and widening the Road leading from the High Post-Road near the Town of Faversham, to the Town and Port of Hythe, and from Bacon's Water to Holy-Lane, in Wincheap, near the City of Canterbury, in the County of Kent.

An Act for continuing the Term, and consolidating into One Act, several Acts relating to the Road from Glasgow to Redburn-Bridge, and for making and repairing the Road therein-mentioned.

An Act for more effectually amending, widening, improving, and keeping in Repair the Road leading from the Town of Kingston-upon-Thames, in the County of Surrey, to a Place called Sheetbridge, near Petersfield, in the County of Southampton.

## PROCLAMATION FOR PARDONING DESERTERS FROM THE MILITIA.

War Office, June 4, 1803.

WHEREAS it has been represented to THE KING that there are at this Time many

Men, who, having been sworn and enrolled in HIS MAJESTY'S MILITIA FORCES, have made Default, by not appearing and joining their respective Regiments, Battalions, Corps, or Independent Companies when ordered to be embodied, or by deserting or absenting themselves therefrom, and who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of HIS MAJESTY'S GRACIOUS PARDON, and that such an Instance of His Royal Clemency would have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour; HIS MAJESTY has accordingly been graciously pleased to grant HIS FREE PARDON to all MILITIA-MEN having so made Default by not appearing, or by Desertion, or Absence from Duty, who shall return to and join their respective Regiments, Battalions, Corps, or Independent Companies, on or before the 14th Day of July next, or who shall deliver themselves up at the Head-Quarters of any other Regiment, Battalion, Corps, or Independent Company of Militia, or to any Detachment of HIS MAJESTY'S other Forces, or to any Military-Post, on or before the said 14th Day of July next, and be from thence marched to their proper Regiments, Battalions, Corps, or Independent Companies.

Any Soldier who may desert from the Militia after these HIS MAJESTY'S gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but shall be proceeded against with the utmost Severity; as shall also all the said Defaulters, Deserters, and Absentees who shall not have joined their proper Regiments, Battalions, Corps, or Independent Companies of Militia, or delivered themselves up to some other Regiment, Battalion, Corps, or Independent Company of Militia, or to some Detachment of His Majesty's other Forces, or to some Military Post, by the said 14th Day of July next.

And all Justices of the Peace, Magistrates, Constables, and Peace-Officers, and all other Persons whatsoever, are hereby enjoined and required, in pursuance of the Act just passed, "for more speedily completing the Militia of Great Britain;" to apprehend, seize, take, and detain such Defaulters, Deserters, and Absentees, for the Purpose of delivering them into safe Custody at any Military Head-Quarters, or into Gaol near to the Place where they shall be apprehended, in order that they may be dealt with according to Law: and all such of the said Defaulters, Deserters, or Absentees, as were enrolled as Substitutes or Volunteers in the Militia, shall, upon being identified before any General, Regimental, or Detachment Court Martial, be forthwith sent to serve in HIS MAJESTY'S Regular Forces stationed Abroad, until duly discharged therefrom; and the Person or Persons who shall apprehend and detain any such Defaulter, Deserter, or Absentee from the Militia, and deliver him into safe Custody as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Twenty Shillings over and above the Reward of Twenty Shillings to which such Person or Persons will also be entitled under the Mutiny Act, and shall be paid the same in like Manner as is directed in Respect to the Reward last-mentioned.

SIR,

I TRANSMIT, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter from Captain Maitland, of His Majesty's Ship Loire, giving an Account of the Success which has attended an Enterprize he sent the Boats of that Ship on, under the Orders of Lieutenants Temple and Bowen. The good Conduct and Intrepidity of the Officers and Men employed on that Service make it unnecessary for me to add any Comment, persuaded that it cannot be lost Sight of by their Lordships.

SIR, Loire, off L'Isle de Bas, June 28, 1803.

I HAVE the Pleasure of informing you, that, last Night, Three of the Boats of His Majesty's Ship Loire, commanded by Lieutenants Temple and Bowen, in a most gallant Manner boarded, and, after a very severe Conflict of nearly Ten Minutes on her Deck, carried the National Brig Venteux, bearing Four long Eighteen-Pounders, and Six Thirty-six-Pound Brass Carronades, commanded by Mons. Montfort, Lieutenant de Vaisseau, lying close under the Batteries of the Isle of Bas.

When it is considered that the Venteux, perfectly prepared, manned with Eighty-two Men, all of whom were upon Deck, and covered with two heavy Batteries, was opposed to the Crews of Two of our Boats, (as the Third, from rowing heavy; did not get up till the Brig was completely gained Possession of,) I feel confident that you will view it in the Light that I do, as one of those brilliant Exploits which add Lustre to the British Arms, of which, though so many Instances occurred during the late War, no one has before been happy enough to have thrown in his Way during the present.

The Success of Mr. Temple's daring Attempt speaks sufficiently for his Conduct, and that of every one under his Command, to render it superfluous for me to enter into any Eulogium on the present Occasion.

Mr. Bridges has served his Time and passed for Lieutenant nearly a Year; of whose Conduct Mr. Temple speaks in the highest Terms, together with that of every Officer and Man under his Command.

I am very sorry to add that the Loss on our Side is rather heavy, as Mr. McGwire, the Boatswain, is so severely wounded as to render him incapable of doing his Duty for a considerable Time. Four Seamen and a Marine are also badly wounded, Two of the Seamen, I fear, past Recovery.

The Venteux had her Second Captain and Two Seamen killed: The Captain, with Four Officers, all she had, and Eight Seamen, wounded. She was stationed at the Isle of Bas to guard the Coast, and regulate the Convoys of Stores, &c. bound to Brest: is a Vessel of large Dimensions, being Seventy-four Feet long and Twenty-four wide, and perfectly in a Condition immediately to be employed.
