*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council of the ancient Borough of Boston, in Common-Hall assembled, beg Leave at this important Juncture, to offer to your Majesty our most humble and earnest Assurance of continued and cordial Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government.

We contemplate without Dismay, and we are ready to oppose with all the Means in our Power, the meditated Invasion and Violence of a haughty Foe, who dreams of reducing Englishmen under his Tyranny, because he has been permitted thus to deal with Frenchmen. But, different as is our Character, so (we trust) will be our Fate.

We trust, that his Fury will be in vain directed against us, that, by the Blessing of Almighty God, upon your Majesty's wise and vigorous Councils, upon the Valour (hitherto irrefragable) of your Fleets and Armies, and upon the universally concerted Efforts of your faithful Subjects, the Dangers

Impressed with a just Sense of the Blessings which we and our Fathers have long enjoyed under the mild and equal Sovereignty of your Majesty's luminous Family; grateful to the Father of Mercies for our distinguished Privileges civil and sacred; and devoutly trusting in the Divine Providence for the Continuance of these National Blessings, we give in that Unity of Sentiment, and that Ardour of Zeal, which pervade all Ranks of your Majesty's Subjects for supporting and defending, with their Fortunes and their Blood, the Independence, the Laws, and the Honor of the British Empire.

While we breathe, with the Indignation congenial to Freedom, the Miseries inflicted on the Nations of the Continent by the Arms and Principles of the furious Tyranny exerted in France; and while we observe the desperate Efforts of that malignant Hostility, against this Empire, which situates the greatest Ruin of that Country, we contemplate with

It shall be our unwearied Endeavour to make the People, entrusted to our pastoral Care, fully sensible of the Necessity of bearing with Patience the Burdens unavoidably imposed for our Defence.

That our glorious and envied Constitution in Church and State may remain unimpaired; that your Majesty may be long preserved as the Guardian of our Liberties and Laws; that the Lord of Hosts may go forth with your Majesty's Fleets and Armies, to shield them in Dangers, and crown them with Victory; and that a speedy and honorable Peace may be restored, is the fervent Prayer of us, May it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most faithful, most obedient, and most loyal Subjects, the Synod of Orkney.

To infuse the Principles of true Christian Religion into those committed to our Care; to fire their honest Hearts with a Glow of Loyalty and Patriotism in a Moment of Alarm and Danger; and to awaken and call forth all our own and their Energies in a Cause the most just and animating we have ever known: These, Sir, are Duties which we owe to your Majesty, to our Country, and to ourselves. And it is by a zealous Discharge of these Duties that we shall best approve ourselves faithful Subjects and good Churchmen.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Bishop, the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church, the Archdeacons, and the Clergy of the Diocese of Bath and Wells.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

IN the present awful and alarming Situation of the Country, when the Invasion of your Majesty's Dominions, the Destruction of your Government, and the total Subversion of our invaluable Constitution, are avowedly intended and openly proclaimed to the World; when the Expiration of the Laws, the Liberty, and the Religion of your faithful Subjects, with whatever else is most dear to them as Men, as Englishmen, and as Christians, is audaciously threatened by an insolent and ferocious Enemy, who has waded to an Empire through Blood; who has already subdued the greater Part of Europe to his Yoke, and terrified the Rest into a tame Acquiescence in his unjust Aggressions, which do not immediately affect themselves; in this Time of Danger, we, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Bishop, the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church, the Archdeacons, and the Clergy of the Diocese of Bath and Wells, humbly beg Leave to present ourselves before your Majesty to renew the Expression of our inviolable Attachment and Affection to your Majesty's Person and Government, and to assure your Majesty of our firm Resolution to support and carry into Effect, to the utmost of our Power, the Measures adopted by the Wisdom of your Majesty's Councils for the Defence of the Kingdom in this arduous and perilous Conflict.

As Ministers of the Gospel of Peace we must ever lament and deprecate the Miseries and the Calamities of War; but in so righteous and good a Cause, we may, and we are bound to pray for the Success of your Majesty's Arms, and, at the same Time, by our Discourses to exhort and animate our Hearers to exert themselves in their several Stations; and if their personal Service has been accepted, or is required, manfully to fight under the

Banners of their Sovereign against the unprincipled and savage Invaders of their Country.

In Compliance with the Recommendation of your Majesty's Lieutenant-General commanding the Western District, we have already engaged to remain in our respective Parishes, "ready to contribute to the due Execution of such Military Arrangements as shall appear to him proper for our general Preservation;" and from the Zeal and Unanimity which pervade the great Body of your Majesty's Subjects to rise up in the general Defence, we are not apprehensive that any other Duty than this will be expected or required of the Clergy. But should the Necessity of the Times call for it we do not hesitate to declare ourselves to be equally ready to hazard our Lives in the common Cause, and to go forth with the Hosts to Battle; for we know no Precept of the Gospel which forbids the Use of Arms to Christians of any Description, when there is no other Mode of defending themselves against the implacable Enemies of their King and of their God.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Bishop of Lichfield and Coventry, the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Lichfield, the Archdeacons and Clergy of the Diocese of Lichfield and Coventry, beg Leave to approach your Majesty at this awful Period, and to join with the Rest of your People in expressing those Sentiments of Affection and Duty to your Majesty, and of Attachment to our excellent Constitution in Church and State, which are now so universally and happily apparent throughout the whole Nation. We are fully sensible of the Danger to which we are exposed from the daring and enterprising Spirit of our Enemy, rendered more formidable to us by the Subjugation of so many free and independent States, and their consequent Subserviency to the Purposes of the French Empire. We are sensible too that the Preservation of our Religion, our Laws and Liberties, depends at this Time upon our best and immediate Exertions, under the Protection of that Almighty Providence which has heretofore delivered us from haughty and deter-

mined Foes, and, we trust, will yet deliver us. But such Exertions would be of little Avail were they not to be directed by an entire Union of zealous Sentiment among your People, and this Union of Sentiment is at present produced from the worthiest Considerations,—Veneration for your Majesty's exalted Character and Government, and an ardent Desire to transmit all our Blessings to our Posterity. Those, therefore, who are destitute of Property, and depend only for their Subsistence upon repeated Gains, from repeated daily Employment, feel themselves as much interested in this Contest as the richest of your Majesty's Subjects. They truly and wisely consider that there are other Advantages to be annihilated by the Subversion of the existing Government as well as Property; Advantages which interest all, and which ought to be dearer to us than Property, or even than Life itself; that Religion and Morality, under this Reflection, display themselves in the foremost Rank, as materially countenanced and materially supported by it; and that they have always in their Train Order and Decency, and whatsoever is contributive to social Happiness. May British Subjects ever confess and testify the Connection which subsists between civil and political Duties, and those of Religion and Morality; and also declare, as they do at present, with one Mind, one Heart, and one Voice, that the Establishment of regal Authority is a first and essential Principle in the Formation of all wise and stable Systems of Government.

## A PROCLAMATION,

For a General FAST.

GEORGE R.

WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God that He will graciously bless our Arms both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a public Day of Fasting and Humiliation be observed throughout those Parts of Our United Kingdom called England and Ireland, on Wednesday the Nineteenth Day of October next, that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins, and in the most devout and solemn Manner send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgments which Our manifold Provocations have most justly deserved; and for imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms for the Restoration of Peace and Prosperity to Us and Our Dominions: And We do strictly charge and command, that the said public Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England and Ireland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty

God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty: And, for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England and Ireland, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of public Worship, and to take Care that the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God that He will graciously bless Our Arms, both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a public Day of Fasting and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, on Thursday the Twentieth Day of October next, that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins, and in the most devout and solemn Manner, send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgments which Our manifold Provocations have most justly deserved; and for imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, for the Restoration of Peace, and Prosperity to Us and Our Dominions: And We do strictly charge and command, That the said Public Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn, and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. Our Will is, therefore, and We charge, that this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance: And Our Will and Pleasure is, that Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their

Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published; and We appoint them to send Copies hereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the same may be published, and read from the Pulpits, immediately after Divine Service.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Fourteenth Day of September One thousand eight hundred and three, in the Forty-third Year of Our Reign.

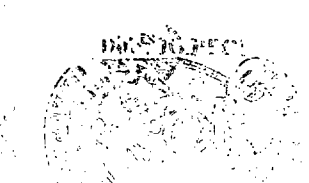

*Copy of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Sir John Thomas Duckworth, K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Jamaica, to Sir Evan Nepean, Bart. dated at Port Royal, the 14th of July 1803.*

SIR,

SINCE my Letters, with the various Details of Service, by the Queen Charlotte Packet, His Majesty's Ship Cumberland arrived from cruising off St. Domingo with the French Frigate Creole, taken by the Squadron under Captain Bayntun, for the Particulars of which Transaction I shall refer the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to his Letter, as also to Captain Brisbane's, for the Capture of La Mignonne, mentioned in my Letter of the 3d, since when the Squadron has sent in the National Brig L'Aiguille, of Eight Guns, Cutter built, and very old; also the Vigilant Brig, of Eighteen Guns, new, and a fine Vessel; there are likewise Two Schooners, La Supérieure and Le Poisson Volant; both coppered, and very fine Vessels.

*His Majesty's Ship Cumberland, between Jean Rabel and Cape Nichola Mole,*

SIR, 30th June 1803.

HAVING parted with the Convoy, as I had the Honor of informing you in my Letter of Yesterday, I stretched in with the Squadron, during the Night, for St. Domingo; soon after Daylight a large Sail was seen near the Fortugas steering down Cape Nichola Mole, and from the Cut of Sails I judged her to be a French Ship of War; the Cumberland, with the Vanguard, were soon close up to her, the latter on the Starboard Side, and the former on the Larboard Bow; in this Position she received a few Shot from the Vanguard, and, having fired one, struck to His Majesty's Squadron, and was immediately taken Possession of. She proved to be the Creole, a remarkably fine National French Frigate of Forty-four Guns, carrying Eighteen Pounders, and commanded by Citizen Le Baitard, from Cape François bound to Port au Prince, at Sea one Day, having General Morgan (the Second in Command at St. Domingo) and Staff, with Five Hundred and Thirty Troops, on board, the Crew of the Frigate consisting only of One Hundred and Fifty Men, Two of whom were badly wounded. While we were taking Possession of the Prize, a small National Schooner, commanded by a Lieutenant, came into the Squadron, and was taken: She came from Cape François, and bound to Port au Prince, having on board One Hundred Blood-Hounds from Cuba, intended to accompany the Army serving against the Blacks.

SIR,

IN consequence of your Permission to chase, I stood in Shore to cut off the Two Ships seen this Morning, and was fortunate enough to carry up the Breeze to the Sternmost, which had got becalmed close under Cape St. Nicholas; she hauled



her Colours down after returning a few Shot, and proved to be La Mignonne, a remarkable fast sailing Ship Corvette, of Sixteen long Eighteen-Pounders, (Six of which she had landed,) commanded by Monsieur J. P. Bargeaud, Capitaine de Fregate, Two Days from Les Cayes, bound to the Cape in her Way to France. She has only Eighty Men.

P. S. Last Night a small Schooner was observed standing into the Convoy, which appearing suspicious, I sent a Boat manned and armed, and found her to be a Frenchman, from St. Jago de Cuba to Port au Prince, with a Cargo of Sugar, and Three Thousand Four Hundred and Seventy six Dollars in Cash. She has Three Guns and some Swivels mounted.

*Extract of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Sir John Thomas Duckworth, K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Jamaica, to Sir Evan Nepean, Bart. dated the 17th July 1803.*

CAPTAIN BISSELL, of the Racoon Sloop, gallantly went into the Port of Leogane, and, after an Action of Forty Minutes with the French National Brig Lodi, brought her out. The Particulars of which the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty will know from that Officer's Statement, transmitted herewith.

*Racoon, off the East End of Jamaica,  
16th July 1803.*

SIR,

I BEG Leave to acquaint you, that, at Half-past Eleven on Monday Morning the 11th Instant, while working between the Island of Guanaba and St. Domingo, I observed a French National Brig lying at Anchor in Leogane Roads, and I immediately bore up for her. On approaching I found them preparing to receive us with Springs on their Cables, &c. At a Quarter before Three (P. M.) I anchored with Springs within Thirty Yards of him, and immediately commenced an Action, which was continued on both Sides for Thirty Minutes, when she cut her Cables and began to make off. I instantly cut and followed her; and, after about Ten Minutes more of well-directed Fire, we so completely unrigged her that she struck her Colours, and called out they had surrendered. We were obliged to anchor again immediately to prevent driving on Shore. She proves to be Le Lodi, pierced for Twenty Guns, but had only Ten mounted, commanded by M. Pierre Isaac Taupier, Capitaine de Fregate. Our Sails and Rigging are a good deal cut, but I am happy to say I had not a Man killed; and the only Person wounded is Mr. Thomas Gill, Master's-Mate, whose Left Arm was carried off by a Shot; a very worthy promising young Man, who has served his Time in the Navy, and will, if he survives, do Credit to your Patronage. The Loss of the Enemy is One killed and Thirteen or Fourteen wounded, by their Account.

The Conduct of Mr. James Alexander Gordon, the First Lieutenant, on this as well as many other recent Occasions, has been highly Exemplary and Praiseworthy; and I have much Pleasure in inform-

ing you, that the Whole of the Officers and Ship's Company behaved fully to my Satisfaction.

SIR,

I HAVE the Honor to inform you, that His Majesty's Ship under my Command last Night captured the French Privateer La Chiffonette, of Fourteen Guns and Eighty Men. She has been Twenty six Days from Bourdeaux, and has captured a Brig belonging to Jersey, from Santa Cruz bound to Hamburgh, which has been since recaptured by His Majesty's Ship Endymion: She sails remarkably fast, has been chased by several Frigates, and once by this Ship.

When the Chiffonette was first discovered, she was in the act of boarding an English Brig, but quitted her on our Approach.
