A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS divers marines, now serving in His Majesty's Royal marine forces, did, at the time of their respective enlistments, engage to serve His Majesty for the limited period of seven years, provided His Majesty should so long require their service; and also for such further term, not exceeding six months, as should be directed by the Commanding Officer on any foreign station, and not exceeding three years, as should be directed by any Proclamation of His Majesty; provided always that, in the latter case, the additional period should determine whenever six months of continued peace, to be reckoned from the ratification of any definitive treaty, should have elapsed subsequent to the expiration of the said seven years. And whereas the continuation of the existing hostilities renders it expedient to exercise the power vested in His Majesty of enlarging such limited period of service; We have, therefore, thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to issue this Proclamation; and We do hereby, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, direct, that all marines now serving in His Majesty's Royal marine forces, who have been enlisted as aforesaid, shall continue to serve therein for the term of three years after the expiration of such limited period of seven years; provided always, that the said ad-

ditional period shall determine whenever six months of continued peace, to be reckoned from the ratification of any definitive treaty, shall have elapsed subsequent to the expiration of such limited period of service.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, in the fifty-fourth year of His Majesty's reign.

PRINCE OF WALES'S COUNCIL.

AT a Council of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, held at Carlton-House on the 3d day of February 1814, Rose Price, of Katherie, in the county of Cornwall, Esq. was appointed Sheriff of the said county of Cornwall for the year 1814, by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales in Council.

AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 21st of January 1814,

PRESENT.

His Royal Highness the **PRINCE REGENT** in Council.

WHEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the fifteenth day of July last, for prohibiting the exportation out of this kingdom, or carrying coastwise, gunpowder or salt petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, will expire on the eighth day of February next; and whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's service, and the safety of this kingdom, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth therefore hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months, to commence from the said eighth day of February next, presume to transport into any parts out of this kingdom, or carry coastwise, any gunpowder or salt petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any parts beyond the seas, or carrying the same coastwise, without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by

an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt petre, and to enforce the law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt petre, gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition:" But it is His Royal Highness's pleasure, that nothing in this Order contained shall prevent the exportation of any of the articles, specified in the Order in Council of the 20th May last to the coast of Africa; under the conditions contained in the said Order. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

AT the Court at *Carlton-House*; the 21st of *January* 1814,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the fifteenth day of July last, prohibiting, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, the transporting into any parts out of this kingdom of any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sheet copper, or other naval stores, will expire upon the eighth day of February next; and whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's service, and the safety of this kingdom, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth therefore hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whosoever do, at any time for the space of six months from the said eighth day of February next, presume to transport into any parts out of this kingdom any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sheet copper, sail-cloth or canvas, or other naval stores; or do ship or lade any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sheet copper, sail-cloth or canvas, or other naval stores; on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any parts beyond the seas, without leave or permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council; upon pain of incurring the forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval

stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is nevertheless His Royal Highness's pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend; to any of His Majesty's ships of war, or any other ships or vessels or boats in the service of His Majesty; or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance; or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any ship or vessel from taking or having on board such quantities of naval stores as may be necessary for the use of such ship or vessel during the course of her intended voyage; or by licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the time being; nor to the exportation of the said several articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's yards or garrisons, or to His Majesty's colonies and plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of Saint Helena, or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the exportation of any of the said articles for the purposes of trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's yards and garrisons; or to His Majesty's colonies and plantations in America or the West Indies; or to the island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of Saint Helena; or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies, the exporters of such articles do first make oath of the true destination of the same to the places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the entry of the same shall be made; and do give full and sufficient security by bond (except as hereinafter excepted), to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said articles to the places for which they are so entered outwards, and for the purposes specified, and none other; and such bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until proof be made to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the production, within a time to be fixed by the said Commissioners and specified in the bond, of a certificate or certificates, in such form and manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said articles have been all duly landed at the places for which they were entered outwards. But it is His Royal Highness's pleasure, nevertheless, that the following articles, viz. bar iron, white and tarred rope, tallow or mill grease, tarpaulins for waggon covers, pitch, tar, and turpentine, shall be permitted to be exported, upon payment of the proper duties, without bond being entered into by the merchant exporter; to any of the British plantations in the West Indies, or to any of His Majesty's settlements in South America; provided the merchant exporter shall first verify, upon oath, that the articles so exported are intended for the use of a particular plantation or settlement, to be named in the entry outwards, and not for sale, and that the said plantation or settlement has not before been furnished with any supply of the said articles during the same season; and provided also that the exportation of the said

articles shall in no case exceed the value of fifty pounds sterling for any given plantation or settlement, whether by one or more shipments, within the same season: and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

AT the Court at *Carlton-House*, the 14th of *January 1814*,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS, in consequence of the successes which have attended His Majesty's arms, divers ports and places in France have been, and may be, placed in the military occupation, or under the protection, of His Majesty; and it is expedient that the same be open to the trade of all Nations, not being at war with His Majesty or any of the Allied Powers; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent is pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that all such ports and places as aforesaid, after the same shall have been declared by the Commander of His Majesty's forces in those parts to be so far under the protection of His Majesty, as that British subjects may safely trade thereat, shall be forthwith released from the restrictions of blockade heretofore imposed thereon as parts of France; and that it shall be lawful for His Majesty's subjects, and other persons as aforesaid, to trade thereat, subject to such regulations as shall be imposed thereon by His Majesty, or by the Commander of His Majesty's forces in those parts.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and the Judges of the Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to take the necessary measures herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Shephard, of His Majesty's Ship *Fylla*, addressed to Rear-Admiral Hargood, Commander in Chief at Guernsey, and transmitted by the latter to John Wilson Croker, Esq.

His Majesty's Ship Fylla, at Sea,
January 30, 1814.

SIR,
I HAVE the honour to acquaint you, that this morning at ten, the island of Guernsey bearing S. E. eight leagues, I saw a sail in the S. S. W. and after a chase of four hours captured the French lugger privateer *L'Inconnu*, of St. Maloes, of one hundred and eighty tons, pierced for twenty

guns, mounting fifteen, commanded by Gilles Jean Geoffroy; with a complement of one hundred and twenty four men; and having one hundred and nine on board; attempting resistance; she had her 2d captain and four men killed, and four wounded; Lieutenant W. H. Pierson, first of this ship, and William Read, corporal of marines, are slightly wounded; the lugger is quite new, a very fine vessel, sails well, and is the largest of that class out of St. Maloes, sailed from the Isle Bason on the 27th instant.

Post Captain in the Royal Navy, and Commander of His Majesty's ship the Shannon (particularly displayed by him in his recent brilliant engagement with the United States frigate *Chesapeake*, of superior force, off Boston, on the 1st day of June last, when, after a most severe, arduous, and decisive conflict, the enemy were compelled in the short space of fifteen minutes to surrender to His Majesty's ship), been pleased to advance the said Philip Bowes Vere Broke to the dignity of a Baronet of the United Kingdom, by letters patent under the great seal, bearing date the 2d day of November last; and His Royal Highness being desirous of conferring upon the said Sir Philip Bowes Vere Broke such a further mark of His Majesty's royal favour, as may, in an especial manner, evince the sense which he entertains of his able conduct and signal intrepidity, in personally boarding the enemy's ship at the head of his men (on which occasion he was severely wounded), hath given and granted to him His Majesty's royal licence and authority, that he and his descendants may, as a memorial of his highly distinguished conduct and gallantry, bear the crest of honourable augmentation following; that is to say, *issuant from a naval crown, a dexter arm embowed, encircled by a wreath of laurel, the hand grasping a trident erect*, together with the motto "*Sævumque tridentem servamus*;" provided the same be first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office:

And also to order, that the said royal concession and especial mark of His Majesty's favour, be registered in His College of Arms.
