To His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriff, and Common Council of Newcastle-upon-Tyne.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriff, and Common Council of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with our congratulations on the conclusion of a definitive treaty of peace and friendship between our revered Sovereign and His Most Christian Majesty, a peace which, among other great benefits it confers, gives us the happiness of rejoicing in the restoration of legitimate government to many nations who have long been the victims of usurpation and atrocious tyranny.

In reviewing the awful succession of events, during a period of upwards of twenty years, we admire alike the temperate counsels and the dignified firmness of His Majesty's government, ever ready to terminate the calamities of war upon the basis of reciprocal justice, but disdaining to acquire even that blessing by concessions which were inconsistent with the honour of the British crown, or subversive of the general independence of the Continent. To this liberal and enlightened policy must be mainly ascribed the late happy change in the affairs of Europe, whose most powerful Monarchs,

awakened to a true sense of their own situation by the example of Great Britain, were thus induced to enter into that august confederation, which, after many glorious achievements by the arms of His Majesty and His illustrious Allies, has established the general tranquillity upon an honourable, and, we trust, safe, and permanent foundation.

We are however aware that this long and arduous contest has not been supported on our part without a very severe pressure upon the finances of the country, but we beg leave to assure your Royal Highness, that we confidently rely on the wisdom and integrity of your Royal Highness's government for every alleviation of this burthen, which existing circumstances will allow, by a strict economy in the public expenditure, and by affording on all occasions due encouragement and protection to the various important objects which, under the auspices of returning peace, may engage the attention of British industry, and multiply the sources of national revenue.

The humble Address of the Inhabitants of the Borough of Devizes, in the county of Wilts.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Inhabitants of the Borough of Devizes, with the sincerest attachment to your Royal Highness, and with sentiments of the greatest veneration and respect for His Majesty's person and government, humbly beg leave to offer our heartfelt congratulations to your Royal Highness, on the termination of a bloody and protracted war; by the conclusion of peace with France, on terms consistent with the dignity and honour of His Majesty's crown, and the security and happiness of His subjects.

We beg to express to your Royal Highness, our most grateful thanks for the able and judicious direction, which His Majesty's government has given to the energies and resources of the country, and for the no less well timed and happily applied assistance which has been afforded to his Majesty's Allies, who have so nobly contended in the same cause, and whose valour and magnanimity in battle, have been only equalled by their forbearance and moderation in the hour of victory.

We congratulate your Royal Highness, ourselves and the world, on the most unhopd-for accomplishment of the principal objects of the war, particularly on the restoration of the ancient and legitimate authorities of Europe.

And we reflect with pride and satisfaction, that, under the favour of Divine Providence, Europe is indebted for deliverance from the tyranny under which she has so long groaned, to the glorious example and efforts of this country, to the firmness and perseverance with which your Royal Highness has adhered to the wisdom and sound policy pursued by our beloved Sovereign, to the unshaken loyalty and patient fortitude of the people during times of distress and difficulty, and to the splendid achievements of British valour, which (under the direction of a Commander whose renown has never been surpassed) have raised the military reputation of the country to the highest pinnacle of glory.

At the same time that we offer our sincere thanks for the exertions made by your Royal Highness to procure an immediate and universal abolition of the African slave trade, we beg leave humbly to express our regret, that those exertions have not yet been attended with complete success; but we rely with confidence, that no endeavours on the part of your Royal Highness will be omitted at the ensuing Congress to procure the immediate, final, and total extinction of this odious system, so repugnant to every principle acknowledged by Christian Nations, and so repeatedly and deservedly repro- bated by all classes of His Majesty's subjects.

Assistant- Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, July 19, 1814.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, being desirous of manifesting the royal approbation of the good and loyal services of Sir William Domville, of Saint Alban's, in the county of Hertford, Bart. Lord Mayor of the City of London, and particu- larly of the very dutiful, respectful, and dignified manner in which the said Lord Mayor, in his high office, received and entertained His Royal Highness and His Majesty's illustrious allies and visitors, His Imperial Majesty Alexander, Emperor and Auto- crator of All the Russias, and His Majesty Frederick William the Third, King of Prussia, accompanied by many illustrious and highly distinguished per- sonages, at a banquet in the Guildhall of the said city, on Saturday the 18th day of June last, in commemoration of the glorious successes which have attended the arms of His Majesty and His Allies, and, under the blessing of Divine Providence, effected the deliverance of the Continent of Europe from a system inimical to the repose, freedom, and happiness of mankind, and conduced to the establish- ment of peace on solid foundations; His Royal Highness has thought fit to evince the royal appro- bation of the said good and loyal services of the

said Sir William Domville, and also His Royal Highness's sense of the loyalty and public spirit manifested by the Corporation and Citizens of London, in a manner so highly honourable to themselves, and becoming the metropolis of this great empire, by granting His Majesty's royal licence and authority, that the said Sir William Domville, Bart. and his descendants, may bear the armorial ensigns following; that is to say, "A lion bearing a sword representing the sword of the said City, and on a chief of honourable augmenta- tion, three crowns radiated and encircled by branches of olive; and, as a crest, out of a mural crown, a demi lion issuant, supporting a shield charged with three crowns also radiated," as a lasting memorial to his posterity, of an event which will ever distinguish his Mayoralty in the annals of the said City; such armorial ensigns being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office; otherwise His Majesty's said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect;

The Lord Chancellor has appointed John Beevor, of Newark-upon-Trent, in the county of Nottingham, Gent. to be a Master Extraordinary in the High Court of Chancery.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the forty-third year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for permitting certain goods imported into Great Britain to be secured in warehouses without payment of duty," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the importer or importers, proprietor or proprietors, consignee or consignees of any goods, wares, and merchandise, enumerated or described in the table thereunto annexed marked (E), and which shall have been legally imported or brought into the port of London, to lodge and secure in a warehouse or warehouses, fit and proper for the reception and safe custody of such goods, wares, and merchandise, and wherein the same may be safely and securely deposited under the joint locks of the crown and the merchant, without payment, at the time of the first entry, of the duties of Customs, due on the importation thereof; and whereas it is

further provided by the said Act, that if the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, or any three of them, shall deem it expedient, that the provisions of the said Act shall be extended to any goods, wares, and merchandise, not enumerated or described in either of the tables to the said Act annexed, and shall cause a list of such goods, wares, and merchandise, to be published in the London Gazette, then and from thenceforth all and every the provisions, regulations, and restrictions of the said Act shall extend, and be construed to extend, to such goods, wares, and merchandise, in every respect in as full and ample a manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said tables respectively at the time of passing the said Act :

We the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the powers vested in us, do hereby give notice, that we have deemed it expedient, and do hereby direct, that the provisions of the said Act shall be extended to the article of succus liquoritia, or liquorice juice, legally imported or brought into the port of London, and that the same shall be added to the list of goods, wares, and merchandises enumerated or described in the table annexed to the said recited Act marked (E), and permitted to be lodged and secured in such warehouse or warehouses, and under such rules, regulations, and restrictions as are in the said Act contained.

WHereas it hath been humbly represented unto His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, that the following depredations have lately been committed in Scotland, viz.

Archibald Browning, tenant at Fereneze, in the parish of Neilston, in the shire of Renfrew, was, on Thursday night the 19th of May last, on his way home from Paisley, attacked by four villains who spoke the Irish accent, and was knocked down, robbed, most barbarously beat and wounded, and left for dead on the high road :

On the night of the 20th or morning of the 21st of April last, the toll-house at Waterland, in the parish of Dunlop and county of Ayr, possessed by John Raeside, was broken open by two men or more, disguised, and in the absence of the said John Raeside, his wife and children threatened with instant death if they made any noise, and the said house was deliberately robbed of cash, a watch (maker's name George Clark, London, No. 8004), new linen, cloth, and wearing apparel, to a considerable amount :

On Tuesday night the 14th of June last, several persons were assaulted, robbed, and wounded on the high road between Greenock and Largs :

In particular, Mr. John McCulloch, flesher, in Greenock, returning from Largs Fair, was attacked, dragged from his horse, robbed and beat in the most barbarous manner. The robbers took from

him about 30l. consisting of several 5l. Bank notes, a number of Greenock Bank guinea notes, and one Whitehaven bank note, also a red leather pocket book, containing several bills, and a pair of silver mounted spectacles in a red leather case :

James Crawford, servant to Mrs. Stuart, inn-keeper at Inverness, and a servant of Sir Michael Shaw Stewart's, at Ardgowan, were also attacked, knocked down and beaten, and the former, besides being most severely hurt, was robbed of eleven guinea notes, and fifteen shillings in silver :

These outrages were committed on different parts of the public road near Skelmorly, in the shire of Ayr, by a gang of seven or eight persons who spoke the Irish dialect ;

His Royal Highness, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the said atrocious acts, is hereby pleased, to promise His Majesty's most gracious pardon to any one of the offenders (except the principal actors or ringleaders), who shall discover his, her, or their accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further encouragement, a reward of FIFTY POUNDS is hereby offered to any person (except as before excepted) who shall discover his, her, or their accomplice or accomplices concerned in beating and robbing the said Archibald Browning, or to any person or persons who shall apprehend and convict the said offenders, or any of them, or cause them or any of them to be so apprehended and convicted thereof ; and a reward of TWENTY POUNDS is hereby offered to any person (except as before excepted) who shall discover his, her, or their accomplice or accomplices concerned in robbing the toll-house at Waterland, or to any person or persons who shall apprehend and convict the said offenders, or any of them, or cause them, or any of them to be so apprehended and convicted thereof.

The first mentioned reward of fifty pounds, to be paid by John Wylie, Procurator Fiscal of the county of Renfrew, and the latter reward of twenty pounds, to be paid on application to the Sheriff Substitute of Ayr.
