Genoua, Fan. 21. Ere is arrived the Affifance, Sir Robert Robinfon Commander, in twelve days from Majorca (whither he Convoyed three finall English Veffels) in his company came the Sarab from Ireland, the Merchants Adventure from London, and the Henrietta; as allo three French Ships bound for Marfeilles; they give us an account, that on the first Instant they met, off of Majorca. two English Frigats and a Fireship who the day before had taken the Golden Lyon of Argiers, 65 24 Guns and 200 Men, the Algerines were four in company, but the other three it feems cleaped. Here is arrived from Legborne the Anne, the Palestine, and the Dublin Pink, who intend to go hence under the Convoy of Sir Robert Robinson.

Bruffels, Feb. 6. Every diy brings us fresh accounts of the great Damages canied by the late Floods. The breach in the Dyke upon the Schelde, between Wilbrooke and Fort Margaret is fo great, that they know not which way to fet about the repairing of it; the Current not being ftronger in the River than in the Breach, which is about 30 yards wide, and enlarges daily. The Counts of Uriel, Rupplemond, Groesbeck, Bornhem, the Marquis Wargny, and Duke of Bournonville, have all their Effates in those parts under Water. It is much feared that the Dyke between the great and little Willbrooke upon the Canal will break; to prevent which, many hands are at work. The Prince of Parma has fent feveral Enginiers with a good fum of Money to Offend, to repair the Fortifications there. We have an account from thence of the arrival of 200 Irilh Recruits. From Liege they write, that the French in purfuance of a Decree of the Chamber of Metz, are going to posses themselves of the Abby and Principality of Stavelo, lying between Luxemburg and Limburg and containing about 300 Villages, Bruffels, Feb. 10. Here is much discourse of a sud-

dain change in this Government, fome speak of the Doke of Lorrain, some of the Duke of Neuburg, and others of the Quee 1 Mother of Spain, and that the Marquis de Grana is to have the chief Adminifration of Affairs under her, with the Title of Governor of Arms ; what Truth there is in any of the'e Reports, time must inform us. Our last Spanifh Letters gave us an Account, that the great preparations were making for the defence of Fonterabia, and that Don Gabriel de Carilla was sent to Command there, upon the Advice they had seceived at Madrid, that the French Troops on that fide did increase daily. The Prince de Barbançon, Governor of Namur, is come hister to give his Highnessan Account of the condition of that Garrifon. From Lille we are told, that Monfieur de Sourdis, with most of the Officers of the Gens d' Arms have leave to return to Paris, and that the Marcichal d' Humieres intended to go thither himf: If about Mid-Lent.

Rotterdam, Feb 13: It is generally faid, that the damages fullained by the late Ploods, amount to many Millions; and that near 20000 performs have been drowned. It is doubted whether the Ifland of *Teriolen* will ever be recovered, for the charge of the work will much exceed the advantage of it.

Higue, Feb. 13. The fad accounts we receive every day of the Loffes inflained by the late Inundations, and of the lamentable condition of those that remain alive (for it is almost incredible what numbers are faid to be drowned) in the Countreys that have fallen under this calamity, cannot be contained in a Letter; it will fuffice to tell you in geral, that the Damages are beyond a computation, and the milery of the poor Countrey People inexpressible. The care at present is to repair the Dykes, and to recover the Lands that are under Water, a Matter which the States have now before them, in order to the giving it all the Adissance and furtherancethey can. The States of Holland met again the 11th Inflant, and his Highness the Prince of Orange came to Town the day before. The Pensioner Fagel is very ill. The Heer Van Odyke is gone for Zealand,

Hague, Feb. 13. The Letters. we receive frott France inform us, That the Heer Fax Starenberg, A ma ballador of this State at Paris, had received an Anfiwer to the Memorial the Prefented, to this effect; That his molt Christian Majelites intentions are, Religioufly to observe the Peace of Nimzguen, but shat the Crown of Spain refusing to yield to him Alott, and other places in Flanders belonging to him, in pursuance of the faid Peace of Nimzguen, be had crufed his Troops to block up the City of Luxemburg, where by to induce the Spaniards to give him latisfattion, which when they fhall have done, either by yielding to his Majely will remove his Troops from before Luxemburg.

, Paris, Feb. 14. The 9th Inflant the Deputies of the Clergy waited upon the King in a Body at st. Garmains, the Archbilhop of Paris, their Prefident, 4polse for them, and returned the King their Thanks for his Zeal and Care of the Church; and then prefented to His Majelty an Act, containing the confent of the Alfembly to the Extension of the Regale, purlhant to the Kings late Declartions, and at the fame time put into his Majelties hands a Copy of the faid Act; as allo a Coppy of the Edfer concerning the ulage of the Regale; and a Letter written on this Subject by the Affembly to the Pope, which they prayed his Majelty would caufe his Ambailador at Rome, to prefent to the Pope. The 19th Inflant the Morocco Ambaffador that is here, had his Audience of Leavening degipot only continue, but we are informed, that the French Troops have built feveral Redoubts, the more to fireighten it.

And further, for the better prefervation of our Peace both in Church and State (a Bleffing bighly to be esteemed and valued by us:) We heartily defire this Honourable Bench. That the Laws against a'l Popish and Phanatick Diffenters, especially against fuch as Preach, and lead them into Euror and Sedition, within the Precinits of this Gity and County, may be put into a vigorous and importial execution; and the rather, because it is nototions of evident, that divers persons, who have been followed and admired by the seduced People, as famous Preachers in unhardful Conventicles, have at last been discovered to be known fesuits and Emissians of the Churab of Rome; so that we cannot be secure and safe againstate one, without suppressing the other, which in our opinion) may be less effected, by putting those wholfomer Laws in execution, which the wildow of former Parliaments bath provided against both.

. And Laftly, His 'Majefty baving been Gracioufly pleafed so often to repeat his Will and Pleafure to support and maintain the true Reformed Ptotestant Religi-ON, as now established by Law; His Resolution (as be shall fee occasion) to call frequent Parliaments, and to Govern according to the known Laws of the Land; we are bound in Duty to rest fatisfied with those His Gracicus Resolutions; to Blefs God for setting so Good, Fust, and Gracions a Prince over us; To pray for His long Life and Reign in these His Dominions, to obey His (g mands, and to affist bim when sover be shall bave occasion of our Service.

We the Mayor, Aldermen, Sc. do return, our real Thanks to the Grand Jury for, this their Loyal Declaration; and do heartily coveur with them therein; and do defire the Right Hononrable Mr. Seymour, the Recorder of this City, that he would be pleafed humbly no.acquaint His Majefly with this our Loyal, Hearty, and Dutifal Refolution.
