As also our Thanfulness for that Peace and Plenty, which by Gods good Provilence we enjoy under his Meek, Just, and Peaceable Government; and calling to mind those dreadful confusions which covered the face of this Land in the late horrid Rebellion; Do bereby Declare, This we do detest and abborall Covenants, Confederacies, and Associations, under what pretences, or upon what accounts jo ever, that are, or shall be contrived, or entred into by any sorts of persons against the Luws of His Mujesties established Government, either in Churchor State; more especially, that Trainerous and unparalell'd Association, Tately discover'd in the Proceedings against the Earl of Shaftesbury: and that we will Defend His Majefly, and His lawful Heirs and Succeffors, with our Lives and Fortunes against all such Covenants and Associations. And further, for the better preservation of our Peace

both in Church and State (a Blessing highly to be esteemed and valued by us:) We heartly desire this Honourable Bench. That the Laws against as Popish and Phanatick Dissenters, especially against such as Preach, and lead them into Error and Sedition, within the Precinits of this Gity and County, may be put into a vigorous and impertial execution; and the rather, because it is nototically evident, that divers persons, who have been followed and admired by the seduced People, as summon discovered to be known Fesuits and Emissaries of the Church of Rome; so that we cannot be secure and safe against the one, without suppressing the other, which in our opinion) may be less effected, by putting those wholsome; Laws in execution, which the wisdom of former Parliaments bath provided against both.

And Lastly, His Majesty baving been Graciously pleased so often to repeat his Will and Pleasure to support and maintain the true Reformed Ptotestant Religion, as nowestablished by Law; His Resolution (as be shall see occasion) to call frequent Parliaments, and to Govern according to the known Laws of the Land; we are bound in Duty to rest satisfied with toose His Gracious Resolutions; to Bless God for setting so Good, Fust, and Gracious a Prince over us; To pray for His long Life and Reign in these His Dominions, to obey His Co mands, and to assist him when soever he shall have occasion of our Service.

Wethe Mayor, Aldermen, &c. do return, our real Thanks to the Grand Jury for this their Loyal Declaration; and do hearly concur with them therein; and do delire the Right Honourable Mr. Seymour, the Recorder of this City, that he would be pleased humbly moacquaint His Majesty with this our Loyal, Hearty, and Dutiful Resolution.
