OUR will and pleasure is, that all French vessels and cargoes that may have been captured or detained by reason of the late declaration of hostilities against France, on any voyage to or from Martinique or Marseilles, and also all vessels and cargoes captured on a voyage from any French port at which the white flag was hoisted at the time when the vessel sailed from her port of lading, shall be released forthwith, on payment of such expenses as have been duly incurred in consequence of such capture or detention.

Given at the Palace of Carlton-House, this twenty-sixth day of August one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, in the fifty-fifth year of Our reign.

AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 17th of August 1815,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty, until six weeks after the commencement of the next session of Parliament, to regulate the trade and commerce carried on between His Majesty's subjects and the inhabitants of the United States of America," His Majesty in Council is authorised, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from time to time, to give such directions, and to make such regulations with respect to duties, drawbacks, or otherwise for carrying on the trade and commerce between the people and territories belonging to the Crown of Great Britain and the people and territories of the said United States, as to His Majesty in Council shall appear most expedient and salutary; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent is thereupon pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the date of this Order, until six weeks after the commencement of the next session of Parliament, there shall be paid on the importation into this kingdom from the territories of the United States of America, in vessels of the said States, of any goods, wares, or merchandise, being of the growth, production, or manufacture of the said territories, the same duties of Customs that are by them payable on such goods, wares, or merchandise when imported from the United States in British vessels, and no other or higher duties of Customs; and it is hereby further ordered, that on the exportation of any goods, wares, or merchandise, the growth, production, or manufacture

of His Majesty's territories in Europe from this kingdom to the territories of the United States, in vessels of the said States, there shall be paid the same duties as are by law payable on such goods, wares, or merchandise when exported to the said States in British vessels, and none other or higher duties; and it is hereby further ordered, that, on the exportation from this kingdom to the United States, of any goods, wares, or merchandise, of the growth, production, or manufacture of His Majesty's territories in Europe, in vessels of the said States, there shall be paid and allowed the same bounties as are paid and allowed on such goods, wares, and merchandise when exported to the said States in British vessels: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly. *Chetwynd.*

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto Alexander Bethune (heretofore Alexander Sharpe), of Blebo, in the county of Fife, Esq. Lieutenant-Colonel in the Army, and Major on half-pay of the late 15th Garrison Battalion, His Majesty's royal licence and authority that he may, in compliance with a deed of settlement made by his maternal uncle Henry Bethune, of Blebo aforesaid, Esq. deceased, continue to use the surname of Bethune, the designation of Blebo, and bear the arms of Bethune, of Blebo, only, and that the said surname and arms may also be borne by his issue; such armorial ensigns being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise His Majesty's said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And His Royal Highness hath been also pleased to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto Thomas Campbell, Esq. Captain in His Majesty's 1st (or the Royal Scots) Regiment of Foot, His Majesty's royal licence and authority, that he and his issue may, in compliance with an injunction contained in the last will and testament of Robert Graham, late of Gartgranagh, in the county of Monaghan, in that part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland called Ireland, Esq. deceased, take and use the surname of Graham, in addition to that of Campbell:

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms, otherwise to be void and of none effect.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His

Majesty, to give and grant unto William Morris, of the city of Gloucester, Esq. and Mary his wife, only surviving child of Walter Lawrence, late of Sevenhampton, in the county of Gloucester, Esq. deceased, on behalf of Walter Lawrence Morris, their son, a minor, His Majesty's royal licence and authority that he, the said Walter Lawrence Morris, may, in compliance with a clause contained in the last will and testament of his aforesaid late maternal grandfather, take and use the surname of Lawrence only, and that he may also bear the arms of Lawrence; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise His Majesty's said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And His Royal Highness hath been also pleased to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto Stephen John Welch Fletcher, of Ebworth-House, in the county of Gloucester, Esq. His royal licence and authority, that he and his issue may assume and take the surname of Welch, in addition to and after that of Fletcher, pursuant to the direction of the last will and testament of his maternal grandfather, Stephen Welch, late of Ebworth-House aforesaid, Esq. deceased, and may also bear and use the armorial ensigns of Welch, quarterly with those of Fletcher; provided the said armorial ensigns be first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise the said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command, that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.
