THIS day the Right Honourable Sir Henry Russell, Bart. was, by command of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his place at the Board accordingly.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent having been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to appoint Francis Marquess of Hertford, K.G. to be Lord Lieutenant of the county of Warwick, his Lordship this day took the oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the oaths of allegiance and supremacy.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS His Majesty, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing date the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and one, did, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, amongst other things, appoint and declare that, with the arms or ensigns armorial of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, there should be borne, on an escocheon of pretence, the

arms of His Majesty's dominions in Germany, ensigned with the electoral bonnet; and that the standard of the said United Kingdom should be the same quarterings as were therein declared to be the arms or ensigns armorial of the said United Kingdom, with the escocheon of pretence thereon, therein before described; and that the arms or ensigns armorial aforesaid should be used thenceforth, as far as conveniently might be, on all occasions wherein His Majesty's arms or ensigns armorial ought to be used: and whereas His Majesty having substituted to His antient title of Elector of the Holy Roman Empire, the title of King of Hanover, it is fit that an alteration should be made in His Majesty's arms or ensigns armorial, We have therefore thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to appoint and declare that, instead of the arms of His Majesty's dominions in Germany, ensigned with the electoral bonnet, as directed by His Majesty's Proclamation above mentioned, there shall henceforth be used and borne with the arms or ensigns armorial of His Majesty's said United Kingdom, on an escocheon of pretence, the arms of His Majesty's dominions in Germany, ensigned with the Hanoverian royal crown; and that the standard of the said United Kingdom shall be the same quarterings as by His Majesty's said Proclamation were declared to be the arms or ensigns armorial of the said United Kingdom, with the escocheon of pretence, ensigned with the said Hanoverian royal crown, instead of the electoral bonnet: but, nevertheless, it is Our will and pleasure, that all such gold, silver, and copper monies, as on the day be-

fore this eighth day of this instant June were current and lawful monies of Great Britain, and all such gold, silver, and copper monies, as shall on or after this day be coined by Our authority with the like impressions, until Our will and pleasure shall be otherwise declared, shall be deemed and taken to be current and lawful monies of the said United Kingdom in Great Britain; and that all such gold, silver, and copper monies, as on the day before this eighth day of this instant June were current and lawful monies of Ireland, and all such gold and silver, and copper monies, as shall on or after this day be coined by Our authority with the like impressions, until Our will and pleasure shall be otherwise declared, shall be deemed and taken to be current and lawful monies of the said United Kingdom in Ireland; and all such monies as shall have been coined for and issued in any of the dominions of the said United Kingdom; and declared by Our Proclamation to be current and lawful money of such dominions respectively, bearing His Majesty's arms or ensigns armorial, or any part or parts thereof; and all monies which shall hereafter be coined and issued according to such Proclamation, shall continue to be lawful and current money of such dominions respectively, notwithstanding such change in His Majesty's arms or armorial bearings respectively as aforesaid, until Our pleasure shall be further declared thereupon; and all and every such monies as aforesaid shall be received and taken in payment in Great Britain and Ireland respectively, and in the dominions thereunto belonging, after the date of this Proclamation, in such manner and as of the like value and denomination as the same were received and taken before the date hereof: and it is also Our will and pleasure that the several dies and marks which have been used to denote the stamp duties, and all other stamps and marks and instruments, which before the issuing of this Proclamation shall have been in actual use for any public purpose, and in which His Majesty's arms or ensigns armorial, or any parts or part thereof respectively may be expressed, shall not, by reason of this Proclamation or any thing therein contained, be changed or altered, until the same may be conveniently so changed or altered, or until Our pleasure shall be further declared thereon; but that all such dies, stamps, marks, and instruments respectively, bearing His Majesty's arms or ensigns armorial, used before this eighth day of June instant, or any parts or part of such arms or ensigns armorial,

shall have the like force and effect, as the same had before the said eighth day of June instant.

AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 27th of June 1816,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the present session of Parliament, cap. 38, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to suspend the ballot or enrolment for the local militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order in Council, to direct that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia shall take place; but that such ballot and enrolment shall remain and continue suspended for the period specified in any such Order of Council, and from time to time by any like Order or Orders in Council, to continue such suspension so long as His Majesty shall deem the same expedient, any thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary notwithstanding; And whereas it is deemed expedient that such ballot and enrolment should be suspended for the space of one year; it is ordered by His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia do take place from and after the date of this Order for the space of one year, but that the ballot and enrolment for the local militia do remain and continue suspended for the space of one year from the date of this Order.

An Act to alter and amend several Acts relating to the redemption of the national debt of Ireland; and to make further provision in respect thereof.

An Act to provide for a new silver coinage, and to regulate the currency of the gold and silver coin of this realm.

An Act to continue, until the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, two Acts of the fifty-fourth year of His present Majesty, for repealing the duties of Customs on madder imported into Great Britain; and for granting other duties in lieu thereof.

An Act to explain and amend the Acts for granting duties on the profits arising from property, professions, trades, and offices, so far as extend to the due assessment and collection of the duties for past years; for confirming certain abatements already made of the said duties, and exempting collectors' bonds from the stamp duties.

An Act to amend an Act of the fifty-first year of His present Majesty's reign, for discharging certain arrears of quit, crown, and composition rents, in Ireland.

An Act for removing difficulties in the conviction of offenders stealing property from mines.

An Act to enable such officers, mariners, and soldiers as have been in the land or sea service, or in the militia, or in the militia, or any corps of fencible men, since the forty-second year of His Majesty's reign, to exercise trades.

An Act to repeal several Acts relating to the militia of Great Britain; and to amend other Acts relating thereto.

An Act for repealing the several bounties on the exportation of refined sugar from any part of the United Kingdom, and for allowing other bounties in lieu thereof until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and eighteen.

An Act to repeal certain duties granted by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for repealing the provisions of former Acts granting exclusive privileges of trade to the South Sea Company.

An Act for the purchase of certain lands, tenements, and hereditaments at Sheerness and Chatham, in the county of Kent, for the use of the navy.

An Act for more effectually repairing and maintaining the road from Borrowstounness, by the west of Linlithgow, and by Tompfechen, Battigate, and Whiteburn, to the confines of the county of Linlithgow, at or near Hallhouseburn; and for making and maintaining a certain road from Borrowstounness to the River Avon.

An Act to render valid the judicial acts of Surrogates of Vice-Admiralty Courts abroad, during vacancies in office of Judges of such Courts.

An Act for regulating the carrying of passengers to and from the island of Newfoundland and coast of Labrador.

An Act for the better accommodation of His Majesty's packers within the harbour of Holyhead, in the island of Anglesea, and for the better regulation of the shipping therein.

An Act for the more speedy and easy recovery of small debts in the city and county of the city of Bristol, and the liberties thereof, and in the several parishes and places therein mentioned in the counties of Gloucester and Somerset.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, for declaring His Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for establishing an agreement with the Governor and Company of the Bank of England for advancing the sum of three millions, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and sixteen.

An Act to authorise the advancing for the public service a proportion of the balance that shall remain from time to time in the Bank of England, for the payment of dividends on account of the public debt, for lottery prizes or benefits not claimed, and principals of stocks and annuities remaining unclaimed.

An Act to provide for the charge of certain additions to the public debt of Ireland, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and sixteen.

An Act to make further regulations for securing the collection of the duties of Customs and Excise in Ireland, and for the importation into Ireland of American staves, and of old plate and books from Great Britain.

An Act to regulate the trade of the colonies of Demerara, Berbice, and Essequibo; to allow the

importation into and exportation from such colonies of certain articles by Dutch proprietors of the European dominions of His Majesty the King of the Netherlands; and to repeal an Act of the fifty-fourth year of His present Majesty, for permitting a trade between the United Provinces and certain colonies in His Majesty's possession.

An Act to defray the charge of the pay, cloathing, and contingent expences of the disembodied militia in Great Britain, and of the miners of Cornwall and Devon; and for granting allowances, in certain cases, to subaltern officers, adjutants, surgeon's-mates, and serjeant-majors of militia, until the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and seventeen.

An Act to enable His Majesty to authorise the exportation of the machinery necessary for erecting a mint in the United States of America.

An Act to authorise such person as His Majesty shall appoint, to transfer a certain sum in Three Pounds per Centum Reduced Annuities, now standing in the name of the Dissolved College of Hertford, in the University of Oxford; and also to receive dividends due upon such annuities.

An Act for enabling the officers of the Customs at creeks, harbours, and basins of Great Britain, to take entries of ships and goods arriving from and bound to Ireland.

An Act to allow makers of oxygenated muriatic acid to take crushed rock salt, duty free, for making such acid or oxymuriate of lime, for bleaching linen and cotton.

An Act for establishing regulations respecting aliens arriving in, or resident in, this kingdom, in certain cases, for two years from the passing of this Act, and until the end of the session of Parliament in which the said two years shall expire, if Parliament shall be then sitting.

An Act to regulate proceedings of Grand Juries, in Ireland, upon bills of indictment.

An Act to amend the law of Ireland respecting the recovery of tenements from absconding, overholding, and defaulting tenants, and for the protection of the tenant from undue distress.

An Act for altering and enlarging the powers of an Act, of the thirteenth year of His present Majesty, for improving the town and parishes of Gravesend and Milton, in the county of Kent; and for the better assessment and collection of the poor rates and other rates within the parish of Gravesend.

An Act for preventing frauds in the admeasurement and delivery of coals within the several parishes lying contiguous to the water side, in the county of Kent.

An Act for continuing the term, and altering and enlarging the powers, of an Act of the thirty-fifth year of His present Majesty, for repairing the road from Horseley Upright Gate, leading down Bowden Hill, in the county of Wilts, to the top of Kingsdown Hill, in the parish of Box, in the said county, and several other roads near or adjoining thereto.

An Act to continue the term, and alter and enlarge the powers, of several Acts of His present Majesty's reign, for repairing the highways from Speenhamland, in the county of Berks, to Marl-

Borough, in the county of Wilts; and other roads therein mentioned, so far as relates to the Speenhamland district of the said roads.
