THIS evening, at five o'clock, the solemnity of the marriage of Field-Marshal His Royal Highness Adolphus-Frederick Duke of Cambridge, youngest son of His Majesty, with Her Serene Highness Augusta-Wilhelmina-Louisa, Princess of Hesse, youngest daughter of His Serene Highness Frederick Landgrave of Hesse, &c. and niece of His Royal and Serene Highness the Elector of Hesse (which marriage had been previously solemnized, in due form, at Hesse Cassel, on the 7th day of May last), was performed at the Queen's-Palace, by His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, in the presence of Her Majesty the Queen, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of York, Clarence, and Gloucester, His Serene Highness Frederick Landgrave of Hesse (the father of Her Royal Highness the Bride), His Serene Highness the Prince of Hesse Hombourg, Her Royal Highness the Princess Elizabeth (of Hesse Hombourg), Her Royal Highness the Princess Augusta-Sophia, Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Gloucester, Her Royal Highness the Duchess of York, Her Royal Highness the Princess Sophia of Gloucester: the Ministers of State, and the Officers of the Household of Her Majesty the Queen, assisting at the ceremony.

At the conclusion of the marriage service the registry of the marriage was attested with the usual formalities.

The Ministers of State, and other persons of distinction present, then paid their compliments on the occasion, after which Her Majesty the Queen, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, the Bride

and Bridegroom, with the rest of the Royal Family, retired to Her Majesty's private apartments.

Immediately after the conclusion of the marriage the Park and Tower guns were fired, and the evening concluded with other public demonstrations of joy in the metropolis.

in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the date of this Order, and during the continuance of the Act above recited, until further order made thereon, it shall be lawful, in any British-built ship or vessel, owned and navigated according to law, or in any ship or vessel belonging to the subjects of any Sovereign or State in amity with His Majesty, to import into the port of Halifax, in Nova Scotia, and the port of Saint John, in New Brunswick, any scantling, planks, staves, heading-boards, shingles, hoops, horses, neat cattle, sheep, hogs, poultry, or live stock of any sort, bread, biscuit, flour, peas, beans, potatoes, wheat, rice, oats, barley, or grain of any sort, pitch, tar, turpentine, fruits, seeds, and tobacco; provided that such articles shall, in all cases where the same shall be imported in foreign vessels, be of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the country to which the vessels importing the same shall belong; and that it shall be lawful, in any British-built ship or vessel, owned and navigated according to law, to export from the said ports any of the said articles either to the United Kingdom or to any other of His Majesty's possessions:

And it is hereby further ordered, that it shall and may be lawful, in any British-built ship or vessel, owned and navigated according to law, or in any ship or vessel belonging to the subjects of any Sovereign or State in amity with His Majesty, to export from the ports of Halifax, in Nova Scotia, and Saint John, in New Brunswick, any gypsum, grind-stones, or other produce or manufacture of the said provinces, and also any produce or manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of His Majesty's colonies or plantations in the West Indies, or any goods whatever, which shall have been legally imported into the said provinces; provided that none of the said articles shall be exported from the ports above-named, to any foreign country or place, in any foreign vessel, unless such foreign vessel shall belong to the country to which the said articles shall be exported:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the tenth of October last, for prohibiting the exportation of gunpowder, arms, or ammunition, to the places therein specified, will expire on the thirtieth day of this instant May;

and whereas it is expedient, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth, therefore, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the thirtieth of this instant May), presume to transport any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, or ports or places in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt-petre, and to enforce the law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intitled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council:"

do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for enabling His Majesty to make further provision for His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent, and to settle an annuity on the Princess of Leiningen, in case she shall survive His said Royal Highness.

An Act to amend an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, to encourage the establishments of banks for savings, in England.

An Act to explain three Acts, passed in the forty-sixth, forty-seventh, and fifty-first years of His Majesty's reign, respectively, for the abolition of the slave trade.

An Act to amend and continue, until the tenth day of November one thousand eight hundred and twenty, an Act, passed in the fifty-sixth year of His present Majesty, to repeal the duties payable in Scotland, upon wash and spirits and distillers licences, to grant other duties in lieu thereof, and to establish further regulations for the distillation of spirits from corn for home consumption in Scotland.

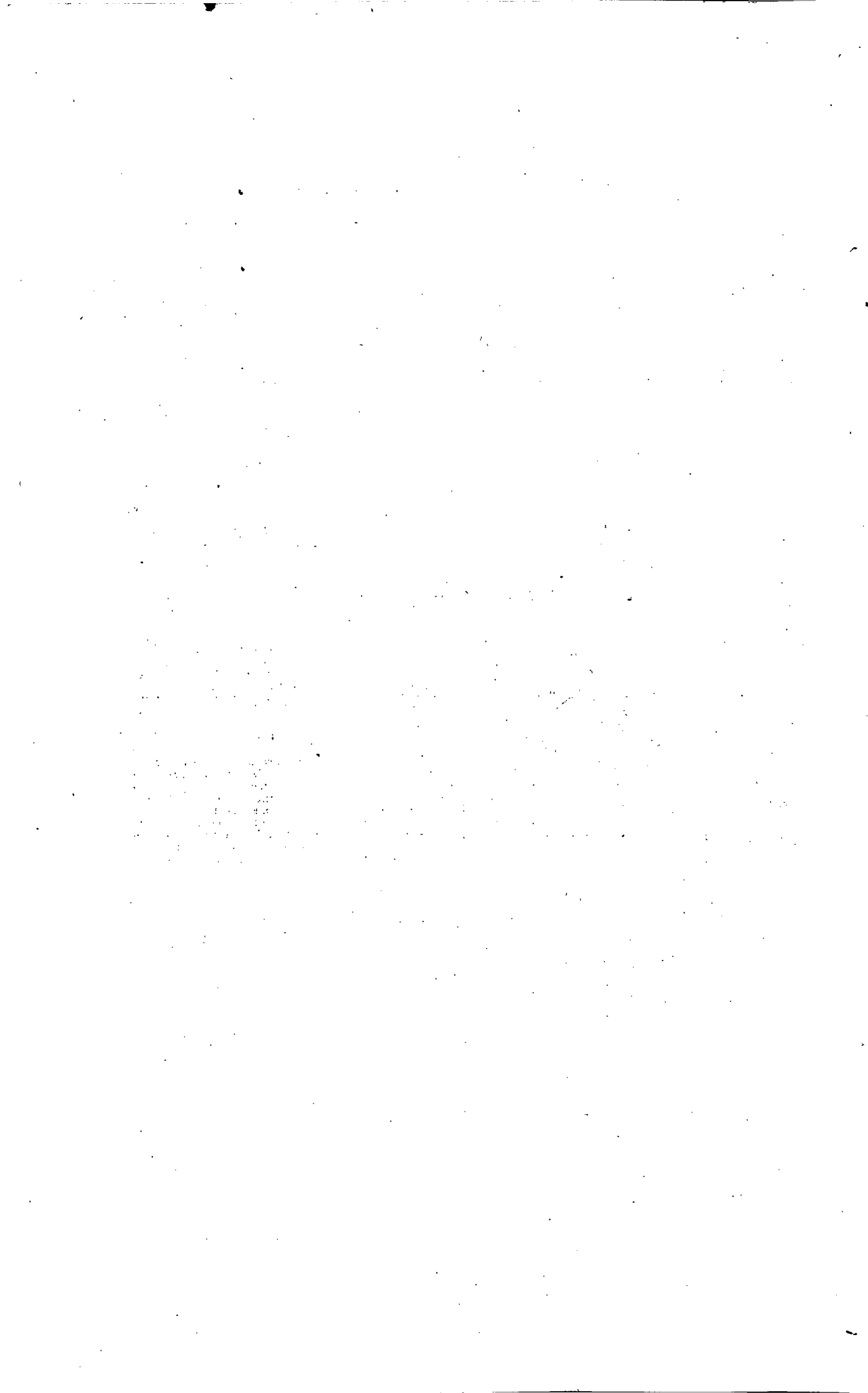
