WE, your Majesty's faithful and devoted subjects, Members of the Loyal Wellington Club, established in the Town of Stockport, in the County Palatine of Chester, in honour of the great Captain of the Age, and upon the principles of "Patriotism and Friendship," most humbly beg leave to approach the Throne with assurances of our most affectionate attachment to your Majesty's sacred Person, and of our unshaken loyalty and allegiance to your Government,

We feel ourselves called upon thus to address your Majesty at a time when a daring faction is, in peculiar activity, striving to poison the minds of your Majesty's subjects, with sentiments of hatred and contempt" for every thing that they ought as Britons to hold dear and sacred. We retain, unimpaired by all such machinations, our deliberate sense of the manifold blessings which, under Providence, we have derived from a Constitution, the envy and wonder of the world; administered as that Constitution has now been for above a centry | the Grand Jary associated at the lower

Recent occurences have unbappily afforded another occasion to these disturbers of the public peace, and in this instance the baseness of the spirit that actuates them has been most conspicuous; and we have seen, with feelings of detestation and disgust, the Throne insulted, the Church held up to contempt, and the constituted Authorities reviled by open invective and abuse.

At such a moment, however, it is gratifying to us to observe, that the sound and loyal part of your Majesty's subjects have begun to raise their voice, and we rejoice to find in the numerous addresses to your Majesty, which are now issuing from

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every part of the kingdom, the strongest assurances of attachment to your Majesty's Person, and a steady determination to uphold the laws and protect our civil and religious institutions.
