The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing date the fifteenth November last, to order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) should, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the thirtieth day of November then instant), presume to transport any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place within the dominions of the King of Spain, or to any port or place on the Coast of Africa (except to any ports or places within the Streights of Gibraltar), or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, or ports or places in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places within the dominions of the King of Spain, or into any such port or place on the Coast of Africa (except as above excepted), or in the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Second, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gun-

powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gun-powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His late Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council;" His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased hereby to revoke His said Order in Council; and His Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service), do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the date of this Order), presume to transport any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place on the Coast of Africa (except to any ports or places within the Streights of Gibraltar) or ship or lade any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa (except as before excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf, first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Second, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gun-powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gun-powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His late Majesty's reign, cap. 2,

intituled " An Act to enable His Majesty to
 " restrain the exportation of naval stores, and
 " more effectually to prevent the exportation of
 " salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohi-
 " bited by Proclamation or Order in Council :

And the Right Honourable the Lords Com-
 missioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Com-
 missioners for executing the Office of Lord High
 Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of
 the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the
 rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance,
 and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give
 the necessary directions herein as to them may
 respectively appertain. *Jas. Buller.*

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the third
 year of His Majesty's reign (chapter 104),
 intituled " An Act to continue, until the thirty-
 " first day of December one thousand eight hundred
 " and twenty-four, the bounty to vessels employed
 " in the Greenland Seas and Davis's Streights;
 " and to authorise His Majesty to alter the times
 " for the sailing of the said vessels, and any of
 " the limitations contained in the Acts for allow-
 " ing the said bounty," His Majesty is authorised,
 by any Order or Orders in Council to be issued for
 that purpose, to suspend, or vary, any or either of
 the limitations and restrictions contained in the
 several Acts granting bounties to vessels employed
 in the fisheries carried on in the Greenland Seas
 and Davis's Streights, in such manner as may ap-
 pear expedient, and as may be expressed and set
 forth in such Order or Orders in Council; And
 whereas by an Act, passed in the thirty-second
 year of His late Majesty King, George the Third
 (chapter 22), it is enacted, " that every ship or
 " vessel having on board one apprentice for every
 " fifty tons burthen, every such apprentice not ex-
 " ceeding the age of twenty years, nor being under
 " twelve years at the time he shall be indentured,
 " shall be deemed properly fitted and qualified,
 " with respect to the number and age of apprentices,
 " to proceed on the said fishery to the Greenland
 " Seas and Davis's Streights, and to be entitled to
 " the respective bounties granted by this Act;"
 And whereas it is expedient, that further provision
 should be made with respect to the number of ap-
 prentices to be taken on board ships proceeding to
 the said fisheries, His Majesty is pleased, by virtue
 of the authority vested in him by the Act first,
 above recited, to order, and it is hereby ordered
 that from and after the date of this Order, British
 vessels employed in the fisheries in the Greenland
 Seas and Davis's Streights, having on board one
 apprentice for every one hundred tons burthen
 of each vessel, every such apprentice not exceed-
 ing the age of twenty years, nor being under
 twelve years at the time he shall be indentured,

shall be deemed properly fitted and qualified, with
 respect to the number and age of apprentices, to
 proceed on the said fisheries to the Greenland Seas
 and Davis's Streights, and to be entitled to the re-
 spective bounties granted by law for the encou-
 rage-ment of the said fisheries; provided that all
 the other provisions of the laws for regulating the
 said fisheries be duly complied with: And the Right
 Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Ma-
 jesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions
 herein accordingly. *Jas. Buller.*
