To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the Bishops of the Episcopal Church in Scotland, in Synod assembled, desire to approach your Majesty to offer our loyal and hearty congratulations on the Marriage of your Majesty's Royal son, the Prince of Wales, with Her Royal Highness the Princess Alexandra of Denmark.

Deeply sympathizing, as we did, with your Majesty in that sad event which cast so heavy a gloom over your Royal House, and over the whole nation, we now no less warmly sympathize with your Majesty in the joy and gladness which a marriage, so auspicious and so full of promise of future happiness, must bring to your heart.
