## REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

## PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in

order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS (Supplementary to the General Regulations of 8th April, 1872.) respecting Open Competitive Examinations for the situation of Second Class Assistant of Excise in the Department of Inland Revenue.

1. The limits of age for this situation are 19 and 22, and candidates must be of the prescribed age on the day of the examination.

2. Candidates must be unmarried and without family.

3. The examination will be in the following subjects, viz. :—

	Marks.
1. Handwriting ... ..	200
2. Orthography ... ..	200
3. Arithmetic (to Vulgar and Decimal Fractions) ... ..	300
4. English Composition ... ..	200

4. Candidates failing in any of the above-named subjects will not be eligible.

5. Application for permission to attend an examination must be made at such times and in such manner as the Commissioners may appoint.

6. A fee of 15s. will be required from each candidate attending the examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice, that an Open Competition will be held in London, Edinburgh, Dublin, Liverpool, Bristol, Leeds, Glasgow, Cork, Galway, and Belfast on the 12th July, 1872, under the above Regulations. 100 persons will be selected, if so many should be found qualified, with the view of filling the 100 vacancies in the Excise which are expected to occur before the middle of September. Persons wishing to compete should apply at once for the necessary form to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, London, S.W.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 44.)—NORTH SEA—HANOVER.

*Light Vessel at Jade River Entrance.*

THE North German Government has given notice, that from the 15th day of May, 1872, the following alteration will be made in respect to the Jade River entrance light vessel; viz. :—

The lights will be at the respective heights of 51 feet on the mainmast and 31 feet on the foremast, above the sea, and during a heavy sea it may become necessary to reduce those heights to 41 and 26 feet respectively.

The black baskets hitherto exhibited on the fore and mizen masts will be on the fore and main masts.

If the light vessel is not on its station, no baskets will be hoisted, but a black square flag will be shown at the main, and the light will not be exhibited.

During thick and foggy weather a bell will be sounded for a period of *one minute, every three minutes*.

Vessels steering a wrong course, when in sight of the light vessel, will be warned of their danger by the firing of minute guns, sounding the bell, or by signals of the International Code, and the proper course will be communicated when possible.

*Cable Bar and Torpedoes in Jade River.*

Also, that for experimental purposes a cable bar will in a short time be placed at No. 15 white buoy, extending 130 yards east and west, and 70 yards north and south, into the navigable channel of the Jade River. It will be marked by buoys.
