And whereas by clause five of the said Order it was provided that the said Order should apply to all the Colonies and Foreign Possessions of Her Majesty excepting to those named in the said clause but that nevertheless the provisions of the said Order might be applied by further Order to any Colonies or Foreign Possessions named in the said clause on whose behalf notice to the effect indicated in Article 1X of the said Convention

should be duly given:

And whereas the Government of India being one of the British Possessions excepted from the operation of the said Order has expressed a wish that the said Convention may be made applicable to such British Possession and the notice required by Article IX of the said Convention has been duly given on behalf of such British Possession by Her Majesty's Representative at the Court of His Imperial and Royal Apostolic Majesty

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the International Copyright Acts, 1844 to 1886, and f the proviso in clause five of the said Order of the mirtieth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, and Article IX of the said Convention, doth order and it is hereby ordered that the provisions of the said Order of the thirtieth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, shall apply and the same are applied

accordingly to the following British Possession, that is to say:

W HEREAS section 8 (3) of "The Muil Ships Act, 1891," provides that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make Rules for carrying into effect, as respects British Possessions, the provisions of that Act with respect to the security given by mail ships, and in particular with respect to the commencement of a legal proceeding by service of a writ or process in the Possession, and to the notices to be given to arresting authorities in the Pos-ession, and the evidence to be receivable by such authorities of the security having been given or withdrawn, and the application of the security in discharge of any damages, fine, debt, claim, sum, or for eiture, where the same are or is recovered or payable either in the British Possession, or under proceedings pending concurrently in that British Possession, and in any other British Possession or the United Kingdom:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order,

and it is hereby ordered, as follows: -

Notices of Exemption.

1. Any rules of the High Court of Justice in England, made under the provisions of "The Mail Ships Act, 1891" (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), shall be transmitted by a Secretary of State to the Government of every Possession to which the Act is applied for the purpose of a Convention, and shall be published by such Government in the Gazette of the Possession, and also in such local official Gazettes published in the Possession as the Government of the Possession may prescribe.

2. A copy of every notice and list published by the Board of Trade under the Act, or under any rules of Court made under the Act, shall be transmitted by a Secretary of State to the Government of every Possession to which the Act is applied for the purpose of a particular Convention.

3. A copy of every such Notice and list, signed by a Secretary to the Government of the Possession, or other prescribed officer, shall be published in the official Gazette of the Possession, and a copy of such Guzette Notification shall be kept publicly exhibited in the Court-room of every Colonial Court of Admiralty in the Possession, and a copy of the said Gazette containing any such Notification shall be receivable in evidence by every arresting authority in the Possession.

4. If notwithstanding its exemption, an exempted mail ship is arrested in the Possession, the Government of the Possession, on being informed by the owner of such arrest and of the arresting authority, and on being satisfied that the ship is an exempted mail ship, shall forthwith send a special Notice to the arresting authority, nforming him that the ship is an exempted mail the subsequent discontinuance or other conclusion ship, and as such entitled to release.

Actions Against Exempted Ships.

5. An action may be commenced against the owners of an exempted mail ship in the like cases, in the same manner and subject to the same rules as an Admiralty action in rem, and in any Colonial Court of Admiralty in the Possession in which such an action might have been brought if the ship were not an exempted mail ship.

Orders, by Courts in British Possessions, for Application of the Security.

6. Any order of a Court in a British Possession directing any security to be applied shall recite the name of the Court and of the action or proceeding, the cause of action, and the judgment debt, and shall comprise a certificate by the Judge of the Court that the ship in respect of which the Judgment is given is an exempted mail ship, and might but for such exemption have been arrested and sold in execution thereof, and that the judgment debt is still unsatisfied, and is payable out of the security lodged in respect of the ship in the High Court of Justice in England.

7. The order may require payment to be made either in London to a named agent of the execution creditor, or in the Possession to some named officer of the Court from which the order issues.

8. Every such order shall be sealed with the seal of the Court, and shall be drawn up in duplicate, addressed to the Admiralty Registrar, Royal Courts of Justice, London, and shall be transmitted under cover to the prescribed officer of the Government of the Possession.

9. The said duplicate orders when received by the prescribed officer shall be countersigned by him, and shall be forthwith transmitted to a Secretary of State, who shall cause one of such orders to be delivered to the Admiralty Registrar, and the Admiralty Registrar shall, subject to any direction of the High Court, make an order upon the Paymaster-General for payment of the required sum out of the security in accordance with these Rules.

10. Unless the High Court shall otherwise order, and subject to existing rights of priority of lieus, orders for the application of any security shall be paid in the order in which they are received by the Admiralty Registrar; but where two or more orders are received at the same time, they shall be paid in the order of their respective dates.

11. Where the order requires payment to a named agent of the execution creditor in London, the money shall be payable at the rates of exchange current on the day on which the order is

received by the Secretary of State.

12. If the order requires payment to be made to a named officer of the Court from which the order issues, such an amount shall be paid out by the Paymaster-General, to a person nominated by the Secretary of State, as will at the rates of exchange current on the day on which the order is received by the Secretary of State be necessary to purchase a draft for the amount of the order payable at sight in the Possession, and such draft shall be in favour of the said named officer of the said Court.

13. Where any action or proceeding against the owners of an exempted mail ship is pending in a Court in a British Possession, involving a claim against the security lodged in the High Court in England, the Court in the British Possession shall transmit to the Admiralty Registrar notice of the pendency of such action or proceeding, stating the nature and amount of the claim and the proceedings taken in regard thereto; and in case of

the subsequent discontinuance or other conclusion of such action or proceeding, whereby the security ceases to be affected, the Court shall transmit notice of such discontinuance or conclusion. Every such notice shall be scaled, drawn up, addressed and transmitted to the Admiralty Registrar in like manner as an order for the application of the security.

Miscellaneous Provisions.

14. In every British Possession to which these Rules apply, the Governor in Council may, by Order, prescribe any matter directed by these Rules to be prescribed, or necessary for carrying them into effect.

15. In the application of these Rules to British India, the following provisions shall have effect:—

(a.) The Presidencies of Madras and Bombay, the lower Provinces of Bengal, and the Province of Burmal shall be deemed to be separate British Possessions.

(b) The expressions "Government of the Possession" and "Governor in Council" respectively shall mean the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal and the Chief Commissioner of Burmah, with respect to the territories administered by them respectively.

(a.) All Orders made in pursuance of Rule 14 with respect to any part of British India shall be made with the previous sanction of the Governor-

General in Council.

16. In the application of these Rules to any British Possession in which there is a Vice-Admiralty Court, and no Colonial Court of Admiralty, these Rules shall be read as if "Vice-Admiralty Court" were Colonial Court of Admiralty.

17. In these Rules "judgment debt" means any damages, fine, debt, claim, sum, or forfeiture found by any Court to be payable by the owner of a ship, and "execution creditor" means the person

entitled to a judgment debt.

Other expressions have the same meaning as in he Act.

18. This Order may be cited as "The Mail Ships (Rules) Order in Council, 1895."

And the Most Honourable the Marquess of Ripon, KG., the Right Honourable the Earl of Kimberley, K.G., and the Right Honourable H. H. Fowler, three of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Designs and Trade Marks Acts 1883 to
1888 it is amongst other things provided—

Mr. Arnold Morley.

That if Her Majesty is pleased to make any arrangement with the Government or Governments of any Foreign State or States for mutual protection of inventions designs and trade marks or any of them then any person who has applied for protection for any invention design or trade mark in any such State shall be entitled to a patent for his invention or to registration of his design or trade mark (as the case may be) under the said Act in priority to other applicants and such patent or registration shall have the same date as the date of the application in such Foreign State.

Provided that his application is made in the case of a patent within seven months and in the case of a design or trade mark within four months from his applying for protection in the Foreign State with which the arrangement is in force.

Provided that nothing in the aforesaid provision contained shall entitle the patentee or proprietor of the design or trade mark to recover damages for infringements happening prior to the date of the actual acceptance of his complete specification or the actual registration of his design or trade mark in this country as the case may be.

The publication in the United Kingdom or the Isle of Man during the respective periods aforesaid of any description of the invention or the use therein during such periods of the invention or the exhibition or use therein during such periods of the design or the publication therein during such periods of a description or representation of the design or the use therein during such periods of the trade mark shall not invalidate the patent which may be granted for the invention or the registration of the design or trade mark.

The application for the grant of a patent or the registration of a design or the registration of a trade mark under the said provisions must be made in the same manner as an ordinary application under the said Act: Provided that in the case of trade marks any trade mark the registration of which has been duly applied for in the country of origin may be registered under the said

Act.

And it is further provided—

That where it is made to appear to Her Majesty that the Legislature of any British possession has made satisfactory provision for the protection of inventions designs and trade marks patented or registered in this country it shall be lawful for Her Majesty from time to time by Order in Council to apply the provisions first recited with such variations or additions if any as to Her Majesty in Council may seem fit to such British possession.

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Empress of India that the Legislature of the Colony of Western Australia has made satisfactory provision for the protection of inventious designs and trade marks patented or registered in this country:

Now therefore Her Majesty by and with the

advice of Her Privy Council and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said Acts doth declare and it is hereby declared that the provisions of the said Acts hereinbefore specified shall apply to the Colony of Western Australia.

And it is further ordered and declared that this Order shall take effect so far as regards patents at the expiration of seven months and so far as regards designs and trade marks at the expiration of four months from the date of this Order.

And whereas it is expedient that the training of the Edinburgh Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, the Lancashire Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, the Limerick City Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, the Wicklow Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, the Londonderry Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, and the Clare Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, and also of the Royal Anglesey Engineer Militia, Fortress Forces, Royal Engineers, the Royal Monmouthshire Engineer Militia, Fortress Forces, Royal Engineers, and of the several Militia Divisions of Submarine Miners, Royal Engineers, should be extended beyond the period of twenty-eight days for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and direct that the period of training and exercise of the before-mentioned Regiments and Divisions of Militia, shall, for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, be extended, under the provisions of the before-cited Act, from twentyeight days to the number of days in each case hereinafter mentioned, that is to say :-

And whereas the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, being a Pilotage Authority within the meaning of the said Act, have made certain Byelaws with respect to the contribution to be made towards the Pilotage Funds of the Liverpool District by the masters and mates of vessels holding Pilotage Certificates granted in pursuance of section five hundred and ninety-nine or. six hundred of the said Act, which Bye-laws are in substitution for the Bye-laws for the same purpose already made by the said Pilotage Authority, and approved by Order in Council of the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninetytwo, for a period of three years from the thirtyfirst day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the proposed Bye-laws are

reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of and signify Her consent to the said Bye-laws as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, for a period of three years from and after the thirty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninetyfive.

And whereas the operation of the said Byelaws immediately from and after the thirty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, is urgent, the said Bye-laws shall come into operation from and after that date.

SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Order refers,

BYE-LAWS made by the Mersey Docks and Har-bour Board, the Pilotage Authority of the Port of Liverpool. pursuant to "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," section five hundred and eighty-two.

1. The following Bye-law shall commence and

take effect from and after the thirty-first day of the powers vested in Her by the said "Merchant May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five. 2. Every Master or Mate who holds a Pilotage Certificate granted in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Acts, enabling such Master or Mate to Pilot any ship or ships within any part of the district over which the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, as the Pilotage Authority, has jurisdiction, shall contribute towards the Pilotage Fund of the said district, as follows, that is to

(a.) Every such Master or Mate to whom a Pilotage Certificate shall be or shall have been granted or who shall obtain or who shall have obtained a renewal of any Certificate so granted enabling him to pilot any ship or · ships therein specified drawing seventeen feet of water and upwards, shall contribute towards the said fund the sum of three pounds three shillings yearly, provided that such sum does not exceed five per cent. of the Pilotage dues which would be payable in respect of his ship if he had not held a Pilot-

age Certificate.

(b.) Every such Master or Mate to whom a Pilotage Certificate shall be or shall have been granted or who shall obtain or shall have obtained a renewal of any Certificate so granted enabling him to pilot any ship or ships therein specified drawing less than seventeen feet of water, shall contribute towards the said fund the sum of two pounds two shillings yearly, provided that such sum does not exceed five per cent. of the Pilotage dues which would be payable in respect of his ship if he had not held a Pilotage Certificate.

The contributions above mentioned shall be payable to the Treasurer for the time being of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board at the time when the fee for the granting or for the renewal of the Certificate of such Master or Mate is payable.

And whereas the said Pilotage Authority have made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty the Byelaws and Regulations as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed for the establishment of a Fund for the payment of Pensions and Retiring Allowances, and disablement and other Allowances to the Goole Pilots' being contributors to such Fund:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the proposed Byelaws and Regulations are proper and reasonable: Now therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of

Shipping Act, 1894," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council is pleased to approve of and signify Her consent to the said additional Byelaws and R gulations as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed.

SCHEDULE.

GOOLE PILOTS' SUPERANNUATION FUND. Bye-laws and Regulations.

The Corporation of the Guild or Brotherhood of Masters and Pilots Seamen of the Trinity House in Kingston-upon-Hull, as the Pilotage Authority for the district in which the port of Goole is situate, do make and publish the Byelaws and Regulations hereinafter set forth for the establishment of a Fund for the payment of Pensions and Retiring Allowances, and disablement and other Allowances to the Goole Pilots being contributors to such Fund. ..

Definitions.

1. In the construction of every clause, regulation, matter and thing hereinafter contained, the following words and expressions shall have the meanings hereby assigned to them respecively, so far as such meanings are not excluded by the context or by the nature of the subject matter, hat is to say :-

"The Trinity House" means the Guild or Brotherhood of Masters and Pilots Seamen of the Trinity House in Kingston-upon-Hull.

"The Fund" means the Fund for the time being provided under these Bye-laws and Regulations.

"Pilot" or "Goole Pilot" means any pilot duly appointed by the Trinity House for the Port of Goole or the waters thereof.

"The Service" means the Goole pilotage

service.

"The General Committee" means the Wardens, Elder Brethren and Assistants of the Trinity House.

"The Managing Committee" means the Committee for the time being acting in the management and direction of the Fund according to the provisions of this scheme:

"The Act" means the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894.

Establishment and Maintenance of Fund.

2. The Fund shall be deemed to be established as from such date as shall be fixed by the General Committee for that purpose, and shall be administered for the exclusive benefit of the Goole

3. The pilots entitled for the time being to the benefits of the Fund shall be termed "The Goole Pilots' Superannuation Fund Society," and the Fund shall be maintained by contributions thereto by the Members of the Society and the Trinity House in manner hereinafter provided.

Membership,

4. All Goole pilots to be hereinafter appointed, and all Goole pilots under the age of fifty-five years in the service at the date of the establishment of the Fund and who apply to become members within six months from the establishment of the Fund, shall become and be members upon and subject to the terms and conditions hereinafter appearing. In every other case the Managing Committee shall determine whether and upon what terms a pilot who may be disqualified by age may be admitted as a member. A person appointed pilot temporarily, or for a special purpose, shall not be eligible as a member

5. Every pilot shall, prior to becoming a mem ber of the Society, make an application for tha purpose in writing under his hand, addressed to the Managing Committee. Such application shall be in the Form set out in the Schedule hereto,

> Contributions. (a) By Members.

6. Every pilot who becomes a member of the Society shall, until he dies, retires, or is dismissed from the service, pay to the Fund yearly, at such times and in such manuer as shall from time to time be determined by the General Committee, a sum to be calculated after the rate of Two pounds ten shillings per centum per annum on his net earnings as a pilot.

(b) By the Trinity House.

7. The Trinity House have already contritributed the sum of sixty-five pounds fifteen shillings to the fund, and will so long as there shall be a sufficient surplus of the fees be a sufficient surplus of mentioned in section six hundred and two of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," and so long as such surplus shall be applicable to such purpose, contribute to the Fund yearly out of the surplus of such fees such sum as they shall in their discretion think fit.

Pensions, Retiring Allowances, Disablement Allowances and Repayments.

8. Every member under the age of fifty-five years at the date of his becoming a member, and every member hereafter appointed a pilot, shall be at liberty to retire from the service on attaining the age of sixty-five years, and upon such retirement his contributions shall cease, and he shall become entitled to receive a Pension at the rate of two pounds twelve shillings per annum for every complete year of service as pilot, calculated from the day of his becoming a member, or of such other amount as the General Committee shall from time to time, having regard to the financial position of the Society, determine. Provided always that in no case shall the amount of a Pension exceed one pound per week, unless the General Committee shall otherwise determine.

9. If through failure of health any member retires from the service before he becomes entitled to a Pension, upon such retirement his liability for contributions shall cease, and he shall become

entitled to the following benefits:-

(a.) If such retirement takes place when the Retiring member has completed fifteen years in the service, he shall (subject as hereinafter provided) receive during his life a Retiring Allowance at the rate of one pound fourteen shillings and eightpence per annum for every complete year of service as pilot, calculated from the date of his becoming a member, or of such other amount as the General Committee shall from time to time, having regard to the financial position of the Society, determine.

(b.) If such retirement takes place when the Retiring member has completed ten years in the service he shall (subject as hereinafter provided) receive during his life a Retiring Allowance at the rate of seventeen shillings and fourpence per annum for every complete year of service as pilot, calculated from the date of his becoming a member, or of such other amount as the General Committee see shall from time to time, having regard to the financial position of the Society, determine.

7 (c.) Provided that if any member in receipt of such Retiring Allowance as aforesaid shall re-enter the service or recover in health so far as to be capable of carning his own livelihood, wholly or partially, as before his retirement, the General Committee may revoke or reduce his Allowance accordingly while he is under the age of sixty-five: Provided also that no Retiring Allowance shall be increased by reason of the retiring. member subsequently attaining the age of

sixty-five years or otherwise.

(d.) In cases other than aforesaid, members retiring from the service from ill-health may be refunded all or part of the payments made by them to the Fund, but without interest, if the Managing Committee so recommend, and if the General Committee shall in their. determine that the absolute discretion financial position of the Fund is such as to amply justify such return; such refunding to be made in such manner or by such instalments as the General Committee determine.

10. If a member shall be temporarily disabled. by accident occurring whilst in the discharge of duty, or shall be temporarily disabled from performing his duty by sickness, he shall be entitled on the recommendation of the Managing Committee to receive a Sick Allowance, the amount and period of such Allowance to be in all cases determined by the General Committee.

11. Failure of health, disablement, or sickness shall in every case be proved to the satisfaction of the Managing Committee. No allowance, gratuity, or bonus shall be paid in respect thereof, ctherwise than on a Certificate of a qualified medical practitioner, approved of by the Managing Committee. Any applicant for relief in consequence of disablement or sickness who shall refuse to be examined by the medical officer will be excluded from relief.

12. All pensions and Allowances shall be paid weekly, fortnightly, or monthly as the Managing Committee shall from time to time determine. .

13. If a member voluntarily, or on notice from the Trinity House (except in case of dishonesty or fraud, or gross misconduct, or neglect of duty as a pilot) retire from the service, he may be refunded all or part of the payments made by him to the Fund, but without interest, if the Managing Committee so recommend, and if the General Committee think fit and determine that the financial position of the Fund is such as to amply justify such return, such refunding to be made in such manner or by such instalments as the General Committee shall determine.

14. If a member dies before he shall become a pensioner, his Personal Representatives shall be paid an amount equal to two-thirds of all sums contributed by him to the Fund, but without interest, after deducting therefrom all sums which the member shall have received by way of Allow-

ances or otherwise.

15. If a member die after becoming a pensioner, or while he is in receipt of a Retiring Allowance, but before the payments to him by way of Pension or Retiring Allowance or otherwise have reached a sum equal to two thirds of the amount of his contributions, the difference between such sum and the aggregate payments made to him by way of Pension or Retiring Allowance or otherwise, shall be paid out of the Fund to the Personal Representatives of such member, but without interest.

16. The sums payable under any of these Regulations to the Personal Representatives of a deceased member shall be paid to his executors or administrators, if any, but if Probate or Letters of Administration be not produced to the clerk to the Fund within one month from the date of the death of such member, then the amount payable under these Regulations to his Personal Repre-

sentatives may be paid to such one or more of his relatives as the Managing Committee may decide, and the receipt in writing of the person or persons to whom the same shall be paid be a full and complete discharge to the Managing Committee and the Trinity House respectively. For the purposes of these Regulations persons under the age of twenty-one years shall be competent to give a good discharge for any moneys paid to them.

. 17. If a member shall be broken and dismissed as a pilot, or retire from the service on account of gross misconduct or neglect of duty, or on account of having committed or abetted dishonesty or fraud, he shall forfeit all his contributions and lose all benefit whatsoever from the Fund. The Managing Committee shall, after having made enquiry and investigation, have full power to determine, and shall be absolute judges, whether any member has or has not been dis-missed or has retired from the service on account of miscorduct, neglect of duty, or dishonesty, or of fraud, or abetting the same. Provided that the Managing Committee may, in exceptional cases, if they consider any extenuating circumstances exist, grant to a member so broken and dismissed or retiring as aforesaid, such a sum, not in any case exceeding one-half of the amount of his contributions, without interest, as in their discretion they may think fit, such grant to be made in such manner and by such instalments as the Managing Committee shall determine.

18. With the consent of the Managing Committee any Pension to which a member has become entitled may be commuted at any time for a sum to be approved of by the General Committee and the Actuary to the Fund, or in accordance with a Scale to be from time to time fixed'by them and

Management of Fund.

19. The Fund shall be managed by a Committee consisting of three persons, viz.:-Two members of the General Committee, to be appointed by the General Committee for such term as the General Committee shall think fit, and One Representative of the members of the Society, to be appointed by the members of the Society as hereinafter provided, and he shall remain in office two years. In the event of the death or retirement of such last-mentioned member or of his inability or refusal to perform the duties, the General Committee shall fill up the vacancy for the remainder of the term of his office.

20. The decision of a majority of the members of the Managing Committee, present at any meeting of such Committee, shall be deemed to be the decision of the Managing Committee. members of the Managing Committee shall form a quorum for the transaction of business. The Managing Committee shall elect a chairman for the year at their first meeting in the year. the absence of the chairman, the other members of the Managing Committee may choose a chairman. The chairman of the meeting shall in case of equal division have an additional or casting vote. The procedure of the Managing Committee shall be regulated by such Committee.

· Officers.

21. The Managing Committee shall from time to time, with the approval of the General Committee, appoint such officers or agents as they shall think necessary for the proper manage-ment of the affairs of the Society and the Fund, and shall fix the salaries or other remuneration (if any) of such officers or agents respectively, and may remove any such officers or agents.

Trustees and Treasurers. 22. The Trinky House shall be the Trustees and Treasurers of the Society.

> Accounts. Audit of Accounts.

23. The Managing Committee shall cause the accounts of the Fund to be regularly entered in proper books and shall balance the same once at least in every year up to the thirty-first December then last, and shall cause a balance sheet or statement of the accounts of the Fund at that day, with all necessary vouchers up to the date of the said balance sheet, to be made out and laid before two auditors within two months after the date of the The first balance sheet or said balance sheet. statement of accounts shall be prepared up to the thirty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, and shall be audited by two members of the General Committee, not being members of the Managing Committee. All subsequent balance sheets shall be audited by two auditors, to be appointed as hereinafter provided.

24. One of such auditors shall from time to time be appointed by the General Committee for such term as the General Committee think fit, and the other of such auditors shall be appointed from time to time on the part of the members of the Society, at meetings of the Society, to be held as hereinafter provided, and he shall remain in office two years. In the event of the death or retirement of such last-mentioned auditor, or of his inability or refusal to perform the duties, the General Committee shall fill up the vacancy for

the remainder of the term of his office.

25. The accounts shall at all reasonable times be open to the inspection of any member of the Society.

Meetings of the Society. 26. A General Meeting of the Members of the Society shall be held within twelve months after the establishment of the Fund, and thenceforth during the month of March or April in each year, at such place, day, and hour as may be fixed by the Managing Committee. At such meetings the Managing Committee shall present a report of their proceedings during the previous year, and a statement of accounts.

Voting.

27. All questions which may arise at such meetings, or at any meeting of the Society held under these Bye Laws and Regulations, shall be determined by the majority of the members of the Society then and there present, who, in the absence of the chairman of the Managing Committee, way elect one of the members of the Managing Committee, or in their absence, one of the members of the Society present, as chairman for the occasion. The chairman of the meeting shall be entitled to vote, and in the event of an equality of votes at any meeting the chairman of that meeting shall be entitled to a casting vote. All members of the Managing Committee shall be summoned to attend all meetings of the Society. Minutes of the proceedings shall be made, and shall be authenticated by the signature of the chairman of the meeting.

Special Meetings.

28. A Special General Meeting of the Members of the Society may be convened at any time by the Chairman of the Managing Committee; or upon a requisition to the chairman to that effect, signed by at least three of the members of the Society. Meetings may be adjourned. Fourteen days' notice shall be given of all meetings, in such manner as the Managing Committee may direct. The Auditor to be appointed on the part of the

members of the Society, and the Representative on the Managing Committee of the members of the Society, shall be elected by the members at the first of such meetings, and thenceforth at every succeeding biennial meeting.

GENERAL PROVISIONS.

Disqualification.

29. No payment shall be made to any member, or to the representative of any member, if his contribution, or any part thereof, shall be one month in arrear at the time when he shall become disabled or retire or die. And no allowance shall be granted to any member during any disablement or sickness, which may have arisen from any profligacy, quarrelling, drunkenness, or immorality, nor during confinement in prison, nor while placed in a workhouse or lunatic asylum by any parish or parish officers.

Alteration of Rules.

30. Subject to the provisions of the Act, and to any addition to, or diminution of, the benefits of the fund being approved or determined to be necessary by the General Committee, or by the Actuary to be appointed by them, these Bye-laws and Regulations may from time to time be modified, altered or rescinded, or such new Bye Laws may be made as the Trinity House, with the consent of the Managing Committee, and subject to the approval of the Board of Trade, and to confirmation by Order in Council, may from time to time think proper.

Disnutes Referred to General Committee.

31. The General Committee shall decide all cases not provided for by these Bye Laws. Any dispute, difference, or question respecting the construction, operation, or meaning of these Bye Laws, or any modification thereof, or addition thereto, or otherwise, relating to the Fund, shall be submitted to and determined by the General Committee, whose decision shall be bind-

ing and conclusive upon all parties.

32. In the event of any Public General Act being hereafter passed, authorizing the establishment of pension fund, annuities or other provisions for pilots, which the Trinity House considers preferable to, or inconsistent with, any of the provisions of this scheme, or calculated to interfere with or prevent its efficient working by or on behalf of the Trinity House, the Trinity House may by resolution declare that the Fund shall be discontinued at such time as may be stated in the resolution, subject to the maintenance and future payment of all then existing Pensions, Retiring Allowances, and claims on the Fund, and subject to such compensation being made to members of the Society not yet entitled to pensions, as two Actuaries, one to be appointed by the members of the Society at a General Meeting, and the other by the Trinity House, or their umpire, shall think fair and reasonable. Subject, as aforesaid, the Fund, when discontinued, shall vest in the Trinity House, and be held by them, subject to the provisions of the Acts for the time being relating to pilotage.

A7 HEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act 1838" after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, " chapelries, and other places or districts may be " separated from the parishes or mother churches " to which they belong, with great advantage, "and places altogether extra-parochial may in "some instances with advantage be annexed to " parishes or districts to which they are con-"tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his "own diocese it shall appear to the Arch-" bishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of "any diocese shall represent to the said Arch-" bishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, " place, or district within the diocese of such Arch-" bishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the " case may be, may be advantageously separated " from any parish or mother church, and either be "constituted a separate benefice by itself or be " united to any other parish to which it may be "more conveniently annexed, or to any other "adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to "form a separate parish or benefice, or that " any extra-parochial place may with advantage "be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said "Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme "in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for liis " consideration) describing the mode in which it "appears to him that the alteration may best be "effected, and how the changes consequent on " such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical juris-" diction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and " other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments, " and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, " may be made with justice to all parties " interested; and if the patron or patrons of the "benefice or benefices to be affected by such " alteration shall consent in writing under his or " their hands to such scheme, or to such modifica-"tion thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and enquiry, be satisfied with any " such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, " by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall "be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make "an Order for carrying such scheme, or modifica-" tion thereof, as the case may be, into effect.

And whereas by section eight of "The Church Building Act 1839" it is, amongst other things, further enacted, "That when by any Order "of Her Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a "separate parish for eccl-siastical purposes is "constituted, the same shall, on registration "thereof, and with the consent in writing of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice "or benefices to be thereby affected, become a "perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister

" thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, "and his successors, shall be a body politic and "corporate, with perpetual succession, and may " receive and take to himself and his successors " all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him " or them, and such perpetual curate shall thence-"forth have, within the limits of the district " parish formed under the Church Building Acts, "for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole " and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in " anywise be subject to the controul or interference " of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice " or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he "or they shall have consented to such Order as " aforesaid; but if such Incumbent or Incumbents " shall not have so consented thereto, this last-"mentioned provision shall not come into opera-" tion until the next avoidance of the benefice by " the Incumbent objecting thereto, or by the sur-"viving Incumbent objecting, if more than one "shall object thereto, and in such case the last! " mentioned provision shall forthwith after such " avoidance come into operation, and shall be " binding on all persons whatsoever."

And whereas the Right Reverend George Wyndham Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid represented in a writing dated the twenty-eighth day of February one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of the Province

of Canterbury as follows:-

"To the Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

"1. I the Right Reverend George Wyndham Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells do hereby represent to your Grace that to the vicarage and parish church of Butleigh in the county of Somerset and the diocese of Bath and Wells belongs an ancient parochial chapelry known by the name of Baltonsborough the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"2. That according to the Census of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one the population of Butleigh is seven hundred and seventy-two and that of Baltonsborough seven hundred and

eighteen.

"3. That there is in Baltonsborough a church or chapel distant from the parish church of Butleigh about two miles and wherein Divine service is performed by the incumbent of Butleigh or his

"4. That the said chapelry of Baltonsborough appears to have been from time immemorial treated as a separate and distinct parish for all civil purposes and baptisms churchings marriages and burials have been from time immemorial and are now solemnized and performed in the said church or chapel of the said chapelry and the burial-ground thereto belonging and the said chapelry has its own churchwardens overseers and parish officers and is in no way connected with the said parish of Buileigh in respect to rates of any kind.

"5. That the net annual value of the said vicarage of Butleigh (exclusive of the value of the vicarage-house and appurtenances) is three hundred and eighty-seven pounds or thereabouts arising from glebe lands tithe rent charges and other endowments and emoluments including the tithe rent charges of Baltonsborough of the net annual value of one hundred and forty pounds or

thereabouts.

"6. That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants or landowners of Butleigh possess any legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive

use of any pews or sittings in the church or chapel of Baltonsborough or that any of the inhabitants or landowners of Baltonsborough possess any legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the church of Butloich

"7. That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six and of the second and third years of the same reign chapter fortynine the said chapelry of Baltonsborough may be advantageously separated from the said vicarage and parish church of Butleigh and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"8. That it is proposed to reserve for the parish of Baltonsborough the whole of the tithes and rents of glebe in that parish amounting to the sum of one hundred and forty pounds.

"9. That James Goodson Esquire of London has by a deed of gift dated the thirteenth day of April one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four conveyed certain freehold hereditaments at Baltonsborough of the estimated annual value of forty-five pounds fifteen shillings to Trustees to be held for ever as an endowment for the said parish of Baltonsborough when and as soon as it

is constituted a separate parish.

"10. That there is a house in the parish of Baltonsborough called the Church House which was originally intended for a vicarage-house. This can be purchased for the sum of eight hundred pounds and a Committee has been formed to raise a fund for the purchase of it as a vicarage and sums amounting to seven hundred and seventeen pounds eighteen shillings and sixpence have been subscribed or promised and it is expected that further subscriptions or grants will be obtained for making up the balance required to purchase this house.

"11. That pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act I have prepared the following scheme which together with the consent of the Patron of the said vicarage I do submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme certify the same and such consent by your report to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation, are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"1. That the said chapelry of Baltonsborough shall be separated from the said vicarage and parish church of Butleigh and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice by the name or style of the Perpetual Curacy of Baltonsborough of which the said church or chapel in the said chapelry shall be the parish church.

"2. That the proposed separate parish and benefice shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said vicarage of Butleigh and that the incumbent of such separate parish and benefice shall have exclusive cure of souls within

the limits of the same.

"3: That two Churchwardens shall be annually chosen as heretofore in and for such separate parish and benefice and every person so chosen shall be duly admitted and shall do all things pertaining to the office of Churchwarden as to ecclesiastical matters within the said separate parish and benefice.

"4. That so much and such part of the tithe rent-

charges and other payments or compositions for or in lieu of tithes now belonging to the vicarage of Butleigh and Baltonsborough as arise or accrue or are payable within or in respect of the parish of Butleigh to the extent or commuted value of two hundred and four pounds two shillings and fourpence and that so much of the glebe lands belonging to the vicarage of Butleigh and Baltonsborough as lie within the parish of Butleigh together with the rents thereof shall belong and be attached to the vicarage of Butleigh for ever and be held received and enjoyed by the incumbent thereof for the time being accordingly.

"5. That all the tithe rent-charges or other payments or compositions for or in lieu of tithes belonging to the vicarage of Butleigh and Baltonsborough that arise and accrue or are payable within or in respect of the said chapelry of Baltonsborough to the extent or commuted value of one hundred and seventy-five pounds fourteen shillings and tenpence and so much of the glebe lands belonging to the vicarage of Butleigh and Bultonsborough as lie within the said chapelry of Baltonsborough together with the rents thereof amounting to about thirteen pounds shall belong and be attached to the proposed separate benefice of Baltonsborough for ever and be held received and enjoyed by the incumbent thereof for the time being accordingly.

"6. That the income of the endowment made by the said James Goodson and estimated at forty-five pounds fifteen shillings shall be paid to the Vicar of Baltonsborough for the time being.

That the Vicar of the said vicarage of Butleigh for the time being shall continue to pay the same amounts for firstfruits and yearly tenths as have heretofore been payable in respect of the said vicarage with the said chapelry annexed. And also shall continue to pay the sum of five shillings and sixpence yearly to the Archdeacon

of Wells for procurations.

That the parishioners of the said proposed separate parish of Baltonsborough shall as heretofore be exclusively subject and liable to all rates charges and assessments to be made for or in respect of the maintenance and repair of the church or chapel of Baltonsborough aforesaid and the expenses incidental to the due performance of Divine service therein and shall be exempt from all rates charges and assessments to be made for or in respect of the parish church of Butleigh · aforesaid or for or in respect of any other church · or chapel situate elsewhere than within the limits of the said proposed separate parish.

"10. That the patronage or right of nomination of or to the said proposed separate benefice of Baltonsborough shall be vested in Robert Neville Grenville of Butleigh Court in the county of Somerset Esquire his heirs and assigns for ever.

"11. That the parishioners of the said proposed separate parish shall not hereafter be entitled to accommodation in the church of Butleigh nor shall | all parties interested which scheme together with

the parishioners of Butleigh be entitled to any accommodation in the church or chapel of Baltonsborough.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said 'Pluralities Act 1838,' the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes tithe rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to

the consents thereto in writing of Robert Neville Grenville of Butleigh Court near Glastonbury in the said county of Somerset Esquire the patron of the said vicarage of Butleigh-with-Baltonsborough and of the Reverend George William Berkeley the incumbent of the same vicarage has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in

Tees comprising :-

"I. QUARANTINE PROCLAMATION. State of Louisiana, Executive Department. Baton Rouge, April 19, 1895.

At the request of the Board of Health of the State of Louisiana, embodied in a resolution adopted by that body at a regular meeting held on April 11, 1895, and by virtue of the authority in me vested by law, I, Murphy J. Foster, Governor of the State of Louisiana, do hereby issue this, my proclamation, to take effect from and after the 1st day of May, AD. 1895, that all vessels, together with their crews, passengers, baggage, and cargoes, arriving at the several quarantine stations of Louisiana, shall be subjected to inspection and sanitation according to the following schedule, to wit :-

First Class-Vessels arriving from non-infected ports.

Second Class-Vessels arriving from suspected ports. (Inter-tropical American and West Indian and Brazilian ports and other ports which may be considered suspicious by the Board of Health.)

Third Class-Vessels arriving from ports known to be infected.

Fourth Class-Vessels which, without regard to port of departure, are infected; that is to say, vessels which have yellow fever, cholera, or other contagious or infectious disease on board at the time of arrival, or have had same on voyage.

Vessels of the first class to be subjected to necessary maritime sanitation at the Mississippi River Quarantine Station without detention of either vessels or persons longer than may be necessary to place such vessels in perfect sanitary condition.

Vesse's of second and third classes to undergo the same treatment as those of the first class, together with detention for observation for such length of time after completion of disinfection as the Board of Health may determine.

All vessels arriving from ports known or suspected to be infected with cholera, shall be subjected to maritime sanitation and such detention

as the Board of Health may determine.

Vessels arriving from ports and places belonging to the second, third, and fourth classes, as set forth in the above schedule, shall not be allowed to pass the Rigolets, the Atchafalaya, or Lake Charles Quarantine Station, or other quarantine stations which may hereafter be established, without having undergone proper maritime sanitation at the Mississippi River Quarantine Station.

Vessels engaged in the tropical fruit trade, whose sanitary condition and health record are satisfactory, may be allowed to pass the Mississippi River Quarantine Station after inspection, subject, however, to such regulations and sanitary treatment as the Board of Health may prescribe.

Quarantine officers at the several stations in this State are specially charged and required to strictly enforce the execution of this proclamation, and the Board of Health in the city of New Orleans is requested to prosecute vigorously all violators of the same, as well as of the quarantine laws and regulations of this State.

At a meeting of the Board of Health of the State of Louisiana, held April 24 1895, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That in accordance with the Governor's proclamation of quarantine, the period of detention of vessels from infected or suspected ports having no sickness on board shall be three (3) full days from time of completion of disinfection.

This regulation to apply to all vessels not otherwise provided for and continue in full force during the quarantine season, unless modified by action of this Board.

Resolved, That hereafter full quarantine restrictions will be imposed on all vesse's whose officers witfully attempt deception in regard to any case of sickness, or material capable of carrying infection, or wilfully disregard the rules and regulations of the Board of Health; and such detention will be imposed thereafter on every vessel on which any officer who has previously attempted to practise deception is found in any official capacity.

Resolved, That vessels from tropical quarantined ports, where a United States medical officer is stationed, such vessels carrying a crew, each of which is acclimated—i.e., has had yellow tever, may be given practique to come to New Orleans immediately after disinfection at the Mississippi River Quarantine Station, under the following additional conditions: They shall bring no passengers from such ports. They shall not be moored at any wharf in any quarantined port, but lie in the-open bay: cargoes to be lightered.

Only the captain and purser, or officer necessary to enter and clear the vessel, shall be allowed to go on shore at quarantined ports. Crews shall not be allowed to sleep on deck while in such ports. They must bring certificates from the United States medical officer that there has been no unnecessary communication between the ship's crew and the shore, and that they leave such port in perfect sanitary condition. No bedding or household effects will be allowed to be brought from any infected port at any season of the year.

Special Instructions to Owners, Agents Masters of Vessels, and Passengers.

The Louisiana State Board of Health recommends the following suggestions to agents, owners, masters of vessels, and passengers for the purpose of facilitating the work of quarantine officers and reducing the period of detention to a minimum:

1. That vessels should be stripped during the quarantine season of all woollen hangings, carpets, curtains, and such-like materials, and upholstered furniture as far as practicable. Hair or moss mattresses to be replaced by wire or wicker beds.

2. That, as far as possible, vessels trading with tropical ports should be manned with acclimated

crews.

3. Masters of vessels, ship and consular agents are earnestly requested to instruct passengers from quarantinable ports to dispense, as far as possible, with baggage which may be injured by wetting, or heat (230° F.) while undergoing disinfection. Such passengers are especially warned against bringing furs, silks, skins, laces, velvets, and other fabrics of delicate texture, as they will be compelled to assume all risks of injury.

While in ports infected with yellow fever, vessels should be anchored out in the harbour, when this is possible, and the crew prohibited

from going ashore, especially at night.

5. When practicable, cargoes should be loaded in such a manuer as to allow access to the pumps, and also to allow the quarantine officers to pump out and wash the bilge.

6. For the purpose of avoiding delay and expense at quarantine, owing to the necessity of shifting of cargo for the object of disinfection, it is recommended that there be constructed in all vessels from quarantined ports, an open framework shaft, fifteen inches in diameter, from the centre of each hatch, through which the fumigating pipe may be introduced down to the dunnage of the vessel.

7: Special attention should be given to cleanliness of vessels and persons, and provision should be made for all possible ventilation of the entire vessel. The best dis nfectant, and instructions for using same, can be obtained by application to the

Board of Health or any of its officers.

8. Masters should, before arrival, see that the bilge is thoroughly pumped out and cleansed, and that the entire vessel be put in such good sanitary condition as to permit of the least possible detention. Fruit vessels, particularly, should be kept thoroughly cleansed for the purpose of avoiding delay at the quarantine station.

9. Vessels observing the above recommendations will receive special consideration at the quarantine station, detention and cost of cleaning, disinfecting, etc., being materially lessened

thereby.

WHEREAS by Section 4 of the District Auditors Act, 1879, it is enacted that the Local Government Board may from time to time assign to District Auditors their Duties, and the Districts in which such Auditors respectively are to act, and may from time to time change wholly or in part such Duties or Districts;

And whereas the said Charles Luxmoore Hockin is a District Auditor duly appointed under the provisions of the Statutes in that behalf, and is acting as Auditor for the Durham Audit District:

And whereas it is expedient that another District should be assigned to the said Charles Luxmoore Hockin:

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, hereby certify the appointment of the said Charles Luxmoore Hockin accordingly, and hereby Order and Prescribe as follows:

ARTICLE I .- It shall be the duty of the said District Auditor, on and after the date hereof, to audit the Accounts of the following Authorities and their Officers; namely,

(1.) The Guardians of the Poor of the several Poor Law Unions named in the Schedule to this Order.

(2.) The Overseers of the Poor of the several Parishes comprised in the said several

- (3.) The several other Authorities for the time being whose Accounts are or may be by law subject to be audited by a District Auditor, and whose Districts or the areas of whose jurisdiction are for the time being wholly situated within one or more of the said Unions.
- (4.) The Rural District Council of Saffron Walden, the District of such Council being partly situated within one or more of the said Unions.

(5.) The Port Sanitary Authority for the Port of Harwich.

(6.) Such other Authorities whose Accounts are or may be by law subject to be audited by a District Auditor, and whose Districts or the areas of whose jurisdiction are for the time being partly situated within one or more of the said Unions, as We may by Order under Seal hereafter prescribe.

ARTICLE II.—'The said District Auditor shall audit the said Accounts according to the provisions of the several Statutes and of the Orders issued by competent authority, in force for the time being in that behalf, and shall perform all such duties and exercise all such powers in connection with the audit of such Accounts as are prescribed and conferred by the said Statutes and Orders.

ARTICLE III .- The District in which the said Charles Luxmoore Hockin shall on and after the date hereof act as Auditor, for the performance of his duties under this Order, and which District We hereby assign to him, shall be termed "The Essex Audit District," and shall, until We otherwise prescribe, comprise the area for the time being included in the several Poor Law Unions named in the Schedule to this Order, the District of the Rural District Council named in paragraph (4) of Article I of this Order, and the District of the Port Sanitary Authority named in paragraph (5) of the said Article I, and the Districts or areas subject to the jurisdiction of any such Authority as is mentioned in paragraph (6) of the said Article I.
