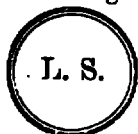


2. The Area described in the Schedule to this Order shall as from the commencement of this Order continue to be and is hereby declared to be an Area infected with swine-fever for the purposes of the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1894, No. 3.

3. Nothing in this Order shall be deemed to interfere with or affect the operation of the Shropshire Prohibited District (Swine-Fever) Order of 1895.

4. This Order shall come into operation on the second day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.
