*Board of Trade (Fisheries and Harbours

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy and translation of a Royal Decree of the Queen of the Netherlands, dated 25th March, 1899, amending the Police Regulations hitherto affecting the Fishing Harbour at Ymuiden.

The translation of the Decree is subjoined:—

Laws, Appointments, Decrees, &c. (Staatsblad No. 85) Decree of the 25th March, 1899, amending the Police Regulations for the Fishing Harbour at Ymuiden.

We, Wilhelmina, by the Grace of God, Queen of the Netherlands, Princess of Orange Nassau, &c., &c., &c.

On the proposal of Our Minister of Waterstaat Trade and Industry of 25th May, 1898, No. 147, section Waterstaat;

Having regard to the law of 28th February, 1891 (Staatsblad No. 19), enacting provisions relating to Waterstaat Works;

Having consulted the Council of State (advices of 21st June, 1898, No. 25, and of 7th March, 1899, No. 17);

Having regard to the further proposals of Our Minister aforesaid of 13th February, 1899, No. 164, section Waterstaat, and of 22nd March, 1899, No. 126, section Waterstaat;

Have approved and sanctioned beginning from 1st July, 1899, while repealing the police regulations for the fishermen's harbour at Ymuiden enacted by Royal Decree of 15th June, 1896 (Staatsblad No. 96), the enactment of the following Police Regulations for the fishermen's harbour at Ymuiden:—

ART. 1. Fishing boats with the boats which have them in tow, as also boats which have to load or unload in the service of the fishery or of the fish trade, are the only craft allowed to enter the harbour.

The greatest draught of water allowed to the vessel is 4 metres.

It is prohibited to enter the harbour with other vessels than those mentioned in the first paragraph or with vessels with a deeper draught.

ART. 2. The having and keeping at hand fish cars, bumboats, or other storing places for live fish, unless, under conditions to be assigned, the Director has given his permission, are prohibited.

ART. 3. It is prohibited to make the harbour whenever during the day a red flag or red globular signal, or whenever at night a red light is placed on the east side of the harbour mouth.
