**T**HE following Despatch has been received by the Secretary of State for India from Lieutenant-General Sir Alfred Gaselee, K.C.B., Commanding the British Contingent, China Expeditionary Force:—

MY LORD, Peking, 17th January, 1901.

AS the conclusion of the year 1900 and the winter season together mark the cessation of active operations at least for the present, I deem the moment a fitting one for reviewing the events which have occurred since the 14th August, as well as for placing on record my appreciation of the good work done by both Officers and troops during the last few months.

2. In my Despatch No. 36 S., dated 19th August,\* I made no reference to the part played in the attack on Peking by those portions of the British forces which were not with me at the moment of the relief of the Legations, as I had not, on the date of my Despatch, received any reports on these operations. In paragraph 8 of that Despatch I informed your Lordship that on entering the Chinese city I ordered the 1st Bengal Lancers and the 24th Punjab Infantry to occupy the Temple of Heaven enclosure, which I wished to secure as a camping ground and also as a protection to my left and rear. This was effected about 2.30 p.m. without serious opposition, but the south gate of the Chinese city close to it was held by a strong body of Chinese till late in the afternoon, when the 12th Battery, Royal Field Artillery, and portions of the 24th Punjab

Infantry and Hong Kong Regiment, under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel O'Sullivan, Assistant Adjutant-General, arrived to reinforce the Temple of Heaven. Fire was then opened on this gate, a company of the 24th Punjab Infantry being detached to cut off the retreat of the enemy along the wall to the east, with the result that the gate fell into our hands, the enemy losing heavily as they retired.

3. At the time that I, with a portion of the 7th Rajputs and 1st Sikhs, was moving towards the Water Gate, as already described in my previous Despatch, another party (vide margin\*) under the command of Brigadier-General Sir Norman Stewart, pushed along the main street until they reached the great thoroughfare running north into the Tartar city through the Chien-men (gate), where they turned to the right. At this point some 40 or 50 of the enemy emerged from a side lane, but were easily dispersed. The advance of the party was then continued towards the Chien-men, where the force was met with a sharp fire from the enemy on the wall of the Tartar city. The bridge leading to the gate was at once seized and held. Lieutenant Bainbridge was the first to occupy this bridge with a small party of the 1st Sikhs, and he there remained in an exposed position holding a Union Jack to attract the notice of the Legation defenders occupying a portion of the wall to the east, who, for a short time, failed to recognize our men, and were firing on them. The Royal Welsh Fusiliers meanwhile covered the left flank, occupying the roofs of the houses and firing on the enemy holding the wall to the west of the gate.

While arrangements were being made for forcing the Chien-men a sortie along the top of the wall from the Legation barricades, by Russian and American troops of the Legation garrison, carried the large building over the inner gateway. At the same time a gun of the 12th Battery was brought into action by hand against the enemy on the wall to the west of the gate, and a few well placed rounds crushed all opposition from that direction. By this time it had been ascertained that the east gateway of the hornwork of the Chien-men was not closed; the troops accordingly entered by it and a passage was then found through a small hole in the inner gate, by which a party of the 1st Sikhs, with one Maxim gun of the Hong Kong and Singapore Artillery, and about 20 dismounted men of the 1st Bengal Lancers penetrated the Tartar city.

As the second Maxim gun was being taken through the hole of the gateway about 50 of the enemy occupying some ruined houses in the vicinity made a determined effort to capture it, actually closing with our men at the gate, but were beaten off and nearly all killed. The Chinese thereupon retired hurriedly westward from the direction of the Legations across the main road leading to the Imperial city, under a heavy fire from our Maxims and the troops holding the Chien-men. The 1st Sikhs then moved down Legation-street, clearing away the enemy still remaining and entered the British Legation. At the same time the rest of the force, consisting of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers, two guns 12th Field Battery, and detachments of various regiments, moved along the foot of the wall outside the Tartar city, and entered the Legation by the Sluice Gate about 5 P.M. At about 7 P.M. some 500 of the enemy advanced

along the wall from the westward against the Chien-men, but were easily driven back by a few rounds from the Maxims at the gate, abandoning two guns in their retreat. The fact that British troops had already forced an entrance into the Legations through the Sluice Gate fully accounts for the feeble resistance made at the Chien-men.

4. I would take this opportunity of observing, with reference to paragraph 10 of my last Despatch, that I have since learnt that the absence of all opposition at the Chinese city wall was due to the premature attack made by the Russians and Japanese, which had the effect of drawing all the defenders of the Chinese city wall northwards. When we appeared it was too late to recall the troops thus withdrawn, and so mortified was the responsible Chinese General at his mistake that he committed suicide on the spot.

5. The next operation in which our troops took part was the relief of the Peh-lang, the headquarters of the Roman Catholic Missions in Peking.\* This duty was entrusted by the Allied Commanders to General Frey of the French Army, but in accordance with agreement we co-operated with a detachment of 350 men (details in margin†) under the command of Major E. V. Luke, Royal Marine Light Infantry.

The force concentrated at the Chien-men on the morning of the 17th August, and was first directed on the Shun-chih-men (gate). The Hong Kong and Singapore Artillery opened fire on this gate from the wall near the Chien-men with a 12-pr. Q.F. naval gun, and under this fire the enemy evacuated the gate, which was immediately occupied by the Allies. The main body then advanced along the Shun-chih-men-street and entered the Imperial City. The British troops assisted the French in clearing the streets of the Imperial City of Chinese troops, and at nightfall bivouacked on the southern slopes of Coal Hill.

On the 21st October this detachment again co-operated with the French troops under General Frey in clearing the Imperial City north of the Peh-tang Cathedral. Our men were never seriously engaged, but Major Luke appears to have acted throughout with tact and discretion and Major General Frey expressed himself as much gratified at the assistance thus rendered.

6. On the 17th August I sent a detachment to occupy the ruins of the railway terminus at Machiapu, with a view to asserting our interest in the railway to Tientsin. Owing, however, to a Russian report that the enemy were advancing in force from the Hunting Park, this detachment was withdrawn on the 18th August, and a day or two afterwards the post was occupied by the Russians without reference to us. In consequence of this action, at the request of the British Minister, I sent detachment to occupy the railway junction at Fengtai and the walled town of Liukachao commanding the road and railway bridges across the Hunho. These posts have been maintained ever since, and have proved of the utmost value in facilitating the collection of supplies and of railway material as well as in restoring confidence.

On the withdrawal of the Russians in October from Machiapu, that post was handed over to the Germans, and subsequently, by Field-Marshal Count Von Walderssee's orders, transferred to the British, to whom the construction of the railway line from Peking to Huang-Hsun was entrusted:

7. Apart from various reconnaissances, the only military operations of any importance in which our troops have been engaged since the occupation of Peking are those detailed below:—

(i.) Reconnaissance South of Tientsin on 15th August.

On the 15th August a small cavalry reconnaissance, consisting of 30 men 1st Bengal Lancers and about 50 American cavalry, was sent south of Tientsin, supported by a detachment of Madras Sappers and Miners. As the advance party of the cavalry patrol approached within 300 yards of the village of Yaud-shia-Tsun a large number of Chinese troops suddenly showed themselves, and from the whole line of villages, nearly a mile in length, a heavy but badly-aimed fire was opened on them. The cavalry wheeled about and retired rapidly. At this point the horse of one of the American troopers suddenly came down throwing the rider heavily, the Chinese soldiers dashed out to secure him, when Lieutenant Gausson, 1st Bengal Lancers, seeing how matters stood, at once rode back in the face of a heavy fire, took the American trooper on his horse and brought him back into safety. The force then returned to Tientsin.

Both Lieutenant-Colonel Wint, 6th U.S. Cavalry, and Major-General Chaffee, Commanding the United States Forces in Northern China, have brought Lieutenant Gausson's services on this occasion to my special notice.

(ii.) Action 19th August South of Tientsin.

As it was evident that an increasing number of Imperial troops and Boxers were collecting in villages from 7 to 10 miles south of Tientsin, a combined force\* under the orders of Brigadier-General A. R. F. Dorward, C.B., D.S.O., was despatched from Tientsin on the 19th August to disperse them.

The cavalry, under Lieutenant-Colonel Wint, 6th United States Cavalry, covered the advance and came into touch with the enemy near the village of Wang-Landi. The cavalry were dismounted and returned the enemy's fire; meanwhile, the infantry changed direction to the left, and, pushing steadily on, intercepted a large body of Chinese who were advancing against the flank of the cavalry, and drove them back upon their main position, which they had not time to properly occupy before it was rushed by our infantry. Only a slight stand was made here, and the enemy was soon in full flight pursued by the cavalry. Sixty prisoners, a quantity of arms and a large number of standards were captured, and 300 killed and wounded were left on the field. Our casualties were one officer slightly wounded and one soldier severely, while the Americans and Japanese had a few more.

The expedition, which was ably conducted by General Dorward, had a most excellent effect on the districts, and freed the peaceful villagers from the terrors of the Boxer rule.

(iii.) Tiu-Liu Expedition.

In order to free the country lying between the Grand Canal and Tientsin of Boxers who were raiding villages and cutting off supplies, a force was sent to the town of Tiu-Liu, 22 miles distant from Tientsin.†

Three columns‡ under the command of

Brigadier-General A. R. F. Dorward, C.B., D.S.O., were despatched to operate against them.

The Left column moved from Tientsin on 8th, and the Central and Canal columns on the 9th September. The several columns were ordered to be in position round Tiu-Liu on the morning of the 10th September. Heavy rain fell on the night of the 8th and all day on the 10th, causing much discomfort to the troops and adding to the difficulties of the march; nevertheless, on the 10th Tiu-Liu was occupied without opposition, the enemy having fled on the approach of the attacking force. The troops then returned to Tientsin.

Brigadier-General Dorward reports that each column succeeded in carrying out its orders exactly, and was in the prescribed position round Tiu-Liu at 9 A.M. on the 10th September. As a manoeuvre, therefore, over partially unknown country the expedition was, he considers, a distinct success, reflecting credit on Brigadier-General Richardson and on Colonel Garioni, of the Italian Army, commanding the left and centre columns respectively, which view I cordially endorse, and, at the same time, wish to bring to your Lordship's notice the excellent arrangements made by Brigadier-General Dorward on this occasion.

(iv.) Affair at Matao.

On the 9th September a small American foraging party was attacked by Boxers near Matao. On hearing of this Captain Browne, Central India Horse, with 21 Lancers at once proceeded to clear the village in which the Boxers, some 300 in number, had established themselves. The enemy were completely dispersed with a loss of about 40 men, our only casualty being one man wounded.

(v.) Affair at Liang-Hsian.

A German column under Major General Von Hoepfner marched out on the 11th September to attack Liang-Hsian,\* about 10 miles south of Liukochao; a half squadron 1st Bengal Lancers and two Maxim guns, Hong Kong and Singapore Artillery, co-operated under the command of Captain Griffin, 1st Bengal Lancers. The detachment behaved most creditably, and General Von Hoepfner in his report stated that "Captain Griffin attacked the Boxers, who made an energetic resistance in the maize fields, several times with great valour. His horse was shot under him in a hand-to-hand combat." General Von Hoepfner adds that he has submitted Captain Griffin's name for a decoration.

(vi.) Punitive Expedition to Pa-ta-Ch'u.

This place is a group of temples in the low hills 14 miles west of Peking,† which temples have for many years been used as a summer resort by the members of the Corps Diplomatique at Peking, and near which were several prosperous mission stations as well as the new summer retreat of the British Minister. Since the troubles began Pa-ta-Ch'u has been a head centre of the Boxer movement, and the neighbouring foreign buildings have all been ruthlessly levelled to the ground. As a punishment for these acts and with a view to

striking a blow at the Boxer movement, a combined allied operation was decided on, the command being entrusted to Brigadier-General Wilson, United States Army.

The British Forces (as per margin\*) were under the immediate command of Lieutenant-Colonel Tulloch, 26th Bombay Infantry, while Major-General Barrow accompanied General Wilson on my behalf.

The Anglo-American column marched to Liukochao on the afternoon of the 16th September, bivouacked there, and then, by a well-devised and successful night march, succeeded in gaining the south-west or rear of the enemy's position, while German and Japanese columns approached it from the east and north-west.

The resistance made was short and ineffective, and all the temples were occupied by the Anglo-American troops without a single casualty. Two Gatling guns were captured, and the Boxers who held the place were all dispersed or killed.

In the afternoon a small British detachment of Sappers, Cavalry, and Infantry was sent to destroy the new arsenal at San-Chia-Tien. This was most effectually carried out by Lieutenant Pearson, Royal Engineers, and on the following morning the bulk of the troops returned to Peking, a small British detachment only remaining, with a view to destroying the principal buildings as a punishment, these having been designated as the Boxer Head-Quarters by Imperial Edict.

#### (vii.) Paotingfu Expedition. †

A punitive expedition to Paotingfu † having been decided on, a combined converging force was despatched thither by Field-Marshal Count von Waldersee, one column operating from Tientsin under the command of Major-General Bailloud, of the French Army, and the other from Peking, under my orders. I was directed to assume command of the whole international force on arrival of the two columns within striking distance of Paotingfu.

Major-General Lorn Campbell commanded the British portion of the Tientsin column, and Major-General G. Richardson, C.B., C.I.E., the British portion of the force despatched from Peking.

The force from Peking commenced its march on the 12th October. The country was quiet, the inhabitants were friendly, and the Chinese regular

troops retired before us in the direction of Paotingfu.

On the 15th October the force advanced unopposed to the left bank of the Pei-ho River near Ting-hsing. I there heard that about 2,000 French troops had occupied Paotingfu two days previously.

On the 17th the Peking column reached An-hsu and halted there one day. Here I received visits from certain Chinese officials of Paotingfu and was informed that all Chinese troops had withdrawn from the neighbourhood.

On the 18th General Bailloud, commanding the French troops, arrived, and arrangements were made for cantoning the troops on their arrival at Paotingfu, to which town the force marched on the 19th.

On the 20th the Allied Generals rode through the town and allotted certain districts to the troops of each Power.

The Tientsin troops operated in two columns, one via Du-liu and Wen-an-hsien, the other by the river, escorting supplies and hospital boats.

The walled town of Wen-an-hsien was reached by the former column on the 14th, and a small party of Chinese Imperial Cavalry was there captured, while on the 17th October, at Mao-chao, 200 Chinese Imperial Infantry surrendered to our troops. Both columns reached Paotingfu on the 21st, after passing through the very heart of a Boxer district, the people of which were threatening and hostile in manner, though no actual hostilities were attempted.

A reconnoitring party which was sent out from Paotingfu on the 23rd October to Kushan, 32 miles west of Paotingfu, having met with some opposition, a small force under Colonel Phayre, 3rd Bombay Cavalry, marched on the 24th to punish the village. The place was easily taken, and about 100 of the enemy were killed.

The immediate object of the expedition, namely, the release of certain Europeans and the punishment of the officials principally implicated having been attained, the British portions of the force were ordered to return to Tientsin and Peking.

The Tientsin column left Paotingfu on the 27th October under Major-General Lorn Campbell. Several Boxer villages were occupied on the return journey, and large quantities of arms and ammunition were captured, while nine Chinese war junks, with one gun each and 600 good mules, were also seized during the operations, which, in my opinion, were conducted by Major-General Lorn Campbell with skill and judgment, while Lieutenant-Colonel Retallick commanded the River Column in a satisfactory manner.

On the 23rd October, at the request of Major-General von Gayl, Quartermaster-General Allied Forces, I despatched a force, consisting of German troops, with a few British Cavalry and Mounted Sappers, to I-chou, under Colonel von Normann, to occupy that place, and to reconnoitre westward to the Great Wall, returning thence along the foot of the hills to Peking. This column, with small loss to itself, took the gate in the wall near Tsu-king-kuan, and killed about 100 Chinese regular troops out of 1,200.

The remainder of the German and Italian troops of the Peking force, under Colonel Garioni, left Paotingfu on the 28th October for Peking, via Yungchen and Huang-tsun, while the bulk of the British troops of the Peking force, under the command of Major-General Richardson, returned to Peking via Yung-chen and Lang-fang. The first-named town, where two English missionaries were murdered in June, 1900, was severely punished, and throughout the march various

Boxer centres were demolished, the objects of the movement being successfully carried out by Major-General Richardson.

I myself left Paotingfu on the 28th October, after handing over to General Bailloud, and reached Peking on the 1st November.

The expedition was practically bloodless, but nevertheless has, I believe, had a salutary effect in convincing the Chinese of the power of the Allies to move where they like, and of the uselessness of armed resistance.

8. I must now refer to those other portions of my command which have not been under my immediate direction. The 2nd Brigade commenced to arrive at Hong Kong on the 29th July, and on the 10th August proceeded to Woosung under orders from your Lordship. The ships conveying them began to arrive at Woosung on the 14th, but on the 16th the Brigade was ordered to proceed to Wei-hai-Wei. They had hardly started, however, before they were recalled, and on the 18th August the troops began to disembark at Shanghai, at which city they have since been quartered.

I have nothing further to relate regarding this Brigade, except that I understand the demeanour, discipline, and appearance of the troops have been unexceptionable, and that Major-General Creagh has established the most cordial relations with our Allies.

9. I now turn to the 3rd Brigade, under Major-General Reid, C.B.

The 3rd Brigade arrived at Wei-hai-Wei between the 20th and 22nd September, and remained there till summoned by Field-Marshal Count Von Waldersee to occupy Shan-hai-Kwan, where the troops were landed on the 3rd October.

On the 5th October two companies of infantry were sent Ching-Wangtao, with a view to protecting what is intended to be the winter port for the Allies.

On the 16th October a column, consisting of detachments of the Allies, was despatched through Lanchow to Nikkoo under the orders of Major-General Reid, in order to disperse Boxers who were reported to be threatening the railway line. The British portion of the force (as per margin\*) left Shan-hai-Kwan on the 16th October by rail for Lanchow, and marched to Nikkoo on the 17th, where they bivouacked for the night. No opposition was met with, and on the 20th the force returned to Shan-hai-Kwan.

Major-General Reid brings to notice the loyal support he received from the commanders of the various nationalities, and particularly mentions Captain Oznobishine, of the Russian Army, who performed the duties of Chief of the Staff, and Colonel Génêt, German Contingent.

On the 5th November, 180 rifles, 4th Punjab Infantry, co-operated with a Russian and French column from Tongshan to Tsun-Hwa, which place was occupied on the 7th November without opposition. The force returned to Tongshan on the 11th November and to Shan-hai-Kwan on the 12th. Our detachment was under the orders of Colonel Tomasheffski, of the Russian Army, to whom much credit is due for the cordial relations that existed.

Since then the troops have been busily employed in hutting themselves and preparing for the severe winter of Shan-hai-Kwan. General Reid has had many difficulties to contend with, and that he has surmounted them is due to his tact and discretion.

10. It will complete this general narrative of

the British operations in North China if I here make a few brief remarks regarding the medical and commissariat arrangements for this force.

The Medical Department have, I rejoice to say, not been severely tested by this campaign, and ample provision for contingencies was made by Government. The number of sick and wounded on the march to Peking was comparatively small, and the river afforded an easy and rapid means of transferring the sick from the front to the base, while at Tientsin and Wei-hai-Wei suitable hospitals had been prepared for their reception. Credit for the good arrangements on the march are chiefly due to Lieutenant-Colonel W. J. R. Rainsford, Royal Army Medical Corps, and Major C. C. Manifold, Indian Medical Service.

11. As regards the Commissariat-Transport Department, I may say at once that, considering the difficulties of the first advance, the results were eminently satisfactory. The only land transport at first available was that afforded by the obligatory mules of regiments, but the foresight and energy of General Dorward and the naval authorities secured for the force a sufficient supply of boats to supplement the transport; while, thanks largely to the exertions of Commander G. H. Borrett, Royal Navy, Captain R. P. Lee, Royal Engineers, and Captain H. O. Parr, 7th Rajputs, to whom the organization of river transport was first entrusted, and thanks also to the energy of Captain D. R. Adye, 6th Infantry, Hyderabad Contingent, who commanded the land transport, the British Contingent was, from first to last, well supplied with food and necessaries, while the anxious and responsible duties of supply during the march up were admirably performed by Major F. W. B. Koe, Army Service Corps. Since the relief of Peking both supply and transport arrangements have been perfected. We have now a well organized cart train, formed chiefly from captured mules and ponies, and our stocks of food and clothing are ample and good. For these gratifying results I am chiefly indebted to the organizing faculty which distinguishes Lieutenant-Colonel W. J. H. Bond, Indian Staff Corps, and to the energetic assistance afforded him by Captains R. E. Vaughan and F. E. Geoghegan, Indian Staff Corps, of the Indian Commissariat Department.

12. I take this opportunity of making a few general observations regarding regiments and other units of this force. In my Despatch of the 19th August I commented on the arduous nature of the march, and it is gratifying to think of the spirit and endurance which all ranks displayed. The Naval Brigade and other British units\* behaved admirably, and I only regret they had so little opportunity for displaying their fighting qualities. The 1st Bengal Lancers did good service throughout the march by covering the advance, these duties were the more important as the Allies as a whole were somewhat deficient in cavalry. The 7th Rajputs afforded me the most lively satisfaction. In marching powers they were second to none, while their spirit, discipline, appearance, and steadiness has been a credit to the Indian Army. I particularly mention these two corps, because the experience of this campaign tends to show that good Bengal regiments may be thoroughly relied on. The 1st Sikhs and 24th Punjab Infantry maintained their previous high reputation, while the small detachment of the Hong Kong Regiment, whom I

detailed as escort for the Artillery throughout the operations, exhibited great endurance in always keeping touch with the guns.

13. In an over-sea expedition like this much of the success of the operations must always be due to the exertions of the Royal Navy and Royal Indian Marine, and in addition to the Officer named in paragraph 11, I desire to place on record the great assistance I have received in sea and river transport business from—

14. It is now my pleasing duty to bring to your Lordship's special notice those officers whose duties have been performed in such a manner as to call for my recognition.

General Officers and Head-Quarters Staff.

Major-General E. G. Barrow, C.B., as Chief of the Staff, has throughout given me most valuable support and assistance. His high reputation as a Staff Officer is already well established, but I venture to bring his services most particularly to your Lordship's notice.

Major-General L. R. D. H. Campbell has carried out the important duties of General, Lines of Communication, thoroughly and satisfactorily. He is a zealous officer with untiring energy, whose services are worthy of recognition.

Major-General A. R. F. Dorward, C.B., D.S.O., was for some time in command at Tientsin, where he displayed much tact and judgment in dealing with difficult situations and gave me invaluable help in pushing on supplies, while at the same time clearing the country of gatherings of the enemy who were then threatening to interrupt our communications. His services throughout have been of a high order.

Major-General Sir Norman Stewart, Bart., had the good fortune to command the 1st Infantry Brigade on the advance to Peking, and I am indebted to him for his ready help on all occasions.

Major-General O'Moore Creagh, V.C., commanding 2nd Brigade at Shanghai, although not actively employed in the field, has fully maintained his reputation as a thoroughly good officer, while the fact of his presence at Shanghai, in a necessarily detached command, has been a great relief to me.

Major-General A. J. F. Reid, C.B., since the beginning of October has been employed at Shanhaikwan, where he has had many difficulties to contend with. He has proved himself thoroughly reliable as a commander.

Major-General J. T. Cummins, D.S.O., is an officer with a good record, who has commanded his brigade satisfactorily.

Major-General G. Richardson, C.B., C.I.E., commanding Cavalry Brigade, has twice commanded troops in the field with credit and has proved himself a good officer.

Sir W. Hillier, K.C.M.G., who was attached to my Staff as Political Adviser, has rendered invaluable services to this force. It is chiefly owing to his tact and great knowledge and experience of the country that our relations with the Chinese round Shanhaikwan have been so satisfactory.

Lieutenant-Colonel G. H. W. O'Sullivan, Royal Engineers, Assistant-Adjutant and Quartermaster-General, is an officer of wide experience. During the march to Paotingfu he was my Senior Staff Officer, and in dealing with officers of the Allied Forces showed much tact and judgment. I recommend him to your Lordship's notice for advancement.

Captain I. Philipps, Indian Staff Corps, Deputy-Assistant-Adjutant and Quartermaster-General, has had very hard work throughout, which he has performed with zeal and ability. He is a Staff Officer of much promise whose advancement would be in the interests of the public service.

Colonel J. B. Bookey, Principal Medical Officer during the first part of the operations, is an experienced officer of long service whose advice was valuable, and who performed his duties to my satisfaction until he was unfortunately invalided.

Major (local Lieutenant-Colonel) G. K. Scott-Moncrieff, Royal Engineers, was Commanding Royal Engineer during the first part of the operations until relieved in October by Colonel W. T. Shone, C.B., D.S.O., Royal Engineers. He performed his duties with great credit.

Lieutenant S. G. Loch, Royal Engineers, in charge of Telegraph Section, has had considerable difficulties to overcome in completing telegraphic communication. He has not spared himself, and I have much pleasure in commenting favourably on his work.

Major (local Lieutenant-Colonel) W. J. H. Bond, Chief Commissariat Officer, has carried out his arduous duties in a most satisfactory manner, and I consider the force is much indebted to him for his care and forethought. I desire to bring his services especially to notice.

Captain E. W. M. Norie, Deputy-Assistant Quartermaster-General for Intelligence, has carried out his duties with judgment and zeal and has shown much ability in utilizing all sources of information. He was much aided in the march to Peking by Captain A. W. S. Wingate, Indian Staff Corps, whose previous knowledge of North China was of great value.

Captains C. H. Selwyn and G. de S. Barrow, Indian Staff Corps, Special Service Officers, have been employed since the occupation of Peking as police officers in charge of the portions of the city under British control. They have performed their duties with tact and discretion and fully maintained the British reputation for justice and good government.

Captain M. E. Willoughby, 2nd Bengal Lancers, as Special Service Officer on the Yangtse has shown special aptitude for Intelligence duties.

I would wish to bring to notice Captain B. T. Pell, the "Queen's" Regiment, my Aide-de-Camp, whom I consider to be an officer of considerable capacity; he rendered most valuable assistance on the advance to Peking, and, on the day we entered the city, carried out alone a reconnaissance which proved of great value.

I also beg to mention Lieutenant Commander (now Commander) Roger Keyes, Royal Navy, whose services were most useful to me as Orderly Officer; and the following Officers of the Head-Quarters Staff, who, according to their opportunities, have done good service and proved themselves to be efficient and deserving Officers:—

I trust the services of Major-General Gascoigne, C.M.G., will meet with their due recognition.

17. I wish to take this opportunity of paying a tribute to some of the foreign officers with whom British troops have been associated. By the force of circumstances this contingent has been more in touch with the American and Japanese Forces than with those of the other Powers, and in consequence of their close co-operation with us on their march to Peking, I have good reason for particularizing these forces among our Allies. General Chaffee and General Baron Yamaguchi, who respectively commanded the United States Forces and Imperial Japanese Contingent, have been most loyal in all their relations with me, and I may say the same of General Wilson, United States Forces, and General Fukushima, Chief of the Staff of the Japanese Contingent, while among the many officers with whom we have been closely associated, I desire to mention the following:
