Funeral of Her Late Most Sacred Majesty.

Earl Marshal's Office, May 15, 1901.

THE REMAINS OF HER LATE MOST SACRED MAJESTY QUEEN VICTORIA, of Blessed Memory, lay at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, from Tuesday, January 22nd, to Friday, February 1st, 1901.

The following Officers were on duty during that period at Osborne House:—Capt. Lloyd, Grenadier Guards; 2nd Lieut. I. O. Dennistoun, Grenadier Guards; and 2nd Lieut. Hon. C. M. B. Ponsonby, Grenadier Guards.

Four Sentries, with a Non-Commissioned Officer, were posted over the Coffin at Osborne.

At 1.45 p.m. on Friday the Coffin was borne from the House by Her Majesty's Highlanders, and placed on a Gun Carriage at the Queen's Entrance.

The Queen's Company of the Grenadier Guards, with the Queen's Colour, was drawn up facing the Entrance, and presented arms, after which, the Company wheeled about, and opened outwards, forming a double rank, through which the Gun Carriage passed.

This Escort marched on either side of the Coffin, outside the Equerries.

The Households of Her late Majesty, and of Their Majesties The King and Queen, and of the Royal Family, occupied the space outside the entrance and followed in the Procession after the Members of the Royal Family.

The Massed Bands were formed up on the Carriage Drive and moved off as soon as the Gun Carriage reached the Carriage Drive.

The Military Officers, the Royal Servants, and the Tenants of the Osborne Estate were formed up eight abreast in the Carriage Drive on the Barton Road side.

The Queen's Pipers took their place immediately in front of the Gun Carriage and played from the House to the Queen's Gate.

The Queen's Highlanders were in front of the Queen's Pipers.
