The route was through the Norman Gateway, across the Quadrangle, through George IV. Archway, down the Long Walk, and through the Lodge leading from the Long Walk to the Mausoleum.

The whole of the road from George IV. archway to the gates of the Mausoleum was lined with troops, under the command of Colonel Napier Miles, First Life Guards.

A battery of Royal Horse Artillery fired a salute of 81 guns in the Long Walk.

The Queen's Pipers played from the gates to the Mausoleum.

On arrival, the Queen's Company opened outwards and formed a double rank on the steps of the Mausoleum. The Band of the Grenadier Guards went to a position assigned to them.

The Dean of Windsor and the Choir met the Cortège on the steps of the Mausoleum.

The Highlanders, Pipers, and Servants, on arrival, went straight into the Mausoleum and took up the position allotted to them.

The Coffin was then carried into the Mausoleum, preceded by the Choir and the Clergy.

The Royal Family on entering the Mausoleum took their places on either side of the Sarcophagus, the Royal Households standing in the Transepts on either side.

The Anthem, "Man that is born of a woman," was sung by the Choir.

The sentence of committal to the Grave was read by the Bishop of Winchester. Earth was cast upon the Coffin by Colonel Lord Edward Pelham Clinton, K.C.B. (Master of the Household to Her late Majesty).

The Prayers were read by the Dean of Windsor.

After the concluding Anthem a Prayer of Thanksgiving and the Benediction were pronounced by the Bishop of Winchester.

Levée Dress and Great Coats were worn, with Ribbons and Stars but no Collar.
