COURT OF CLAIMS.

Council Chamber, Whitehall, July 1, 1901.

A LL persons desirous of presenting Petitions or Claims concerning Services to be done or performed by them at the time of the ersuing Coronation, pursuant to His Majesty's Royal Proclamation of the 26th June last, may send the same under cover to the Clerks of the Court of Claims, Privy Council Office, Whitehall.

The Commissioners are required by the Proclamation to exclude from their consideration such claims as may be submitted to them in respect of rights or services connected with the parts of the Ceremonial heretofore performed in Westminster Hall and with the Procession, the Ceremony being confined to Westminster Abbey.

THE following Despatch has been received from Lord Kitchener, G.C.B., &c., Commander-in-Chief, South Africa:—

From Lord Kitchener to the Secretary of State for War.

Army Head-Quarters, South Africa, Pretoria, 8th May, 1901.

IN continuation of my despatch dated 8th March, 1901, which closed with the failure of De Wet's attempt on Cape Colony, I have the honour to submit an account of the subsequent operations carried out by the troops under my command.

1. Lieutenant - General Lyttelton, who was directing the operations against De Wet, received early information of the retirement of the commandos from Cape Colony, and at once ordered the pursuing columns to cross the Orange River and converge on Philippolis. Brigadier-General Plumer, Colonel Haig, and Lieutenant-Colonel Thorneycroft entered the Orange River Colony at Norval's Pont and operated from the railway between Springfontein and the river; Major-General C. Knox and Colonel Bethune, moving by Orange River Bridge, threatened the retiring enemy from the west.

Brigadier-General Plumer, whose troops had been sent by rail to Springfontein, marched rapidly on Philippolis. He arrived at that town on the evening of the 3rd of March, and learned that on the previous day Hertzog, with 500 men, had left in the direction of Luckhoff, De Wet himself,

with the remainder of his force, having retired northwards towards Fauresmith.

General Plumer marched at dawn on the 4th on the track of De Wet's commando, and, after a slight engagement with the enemy's rear guard, at Zuurfontein, entered Faurcamith on the 5th. Information was there obtained that De Wet was about 24 hours shead, and had passed through the town, taking the Petrusburg road. Plumer's columns pressed on, passed Petrusburg, and reached the Modder River at Abral am's Kraal Drift on the 7th. It was then apparent that the Boer force had broken up and scattered, and the direction which De Wet himself had taken became a matter of some uncertainty. General Plumer therefore halted on the 8th to replenish his supplies and gain information. On the 9th he resumed his northerly march, and on the 10th captured a despatch rider, from whom it was ascertained that De Wet had crossed the railway on the night of the 8th on his way to Senekal. General Plumer therefore marched into Brandfort, and received instructions to proceed to Winburg.

Colonel Haig's columns from Norval's Pont reached Philippolis on the 4th March. Hearing that General Plumer had followed De Wet, Colonel Haig took up the pursuit of Hertzog's commando and engaged him on the 5th at Grootfontein, 10 miles north-west of Philippolis, driving him westward. The columns then returned to the railway line at Springfontein, to be ready in case it might be necessary to move them north by

rail.

Colonel Bethune's Brigade left Orange River Bridge on the let March, and two days later attacked and dispersed a body of about 1,000 Boers near Open Baar. The brigade passed Petrusburg on the 6th, and on the 8th reached the Modder River, halting on the line Abraham's Kraal—Boodewal. On this date the Boers attacked an empty convoy returning from Colonel Bethune's column to Bloemfontein. The escort held its own and on being reinforced by a detachment of the Prince of Wales's Light Horse drove off the enemy.

Major-General C. Knox's columns left Orange River Bridge on the 4th March, Lieutenant-Colonel Pilcher on the right moving by way of Kalabas Bridge, Lieutenant - Colonel Crewe through Koffyfontein, their lines of advance being generally parallel. The right column crossed the Reit River at Kalabas Bridge on the 6th, captured a Boer larger at Dassieport on the 8th, and reached Bloemfontein on the 10th. The casualties in this force amounted to 3 killed, 11 wounded, and 3 missing, whilst its captures included 24 prisoners, 1,500 horses, and a large number of cattle.

Lieutenant-Colonel Crewe's column was slightly engaged with Brand's commando at Olivenberg, to the south-west of Petrusburg, and entered Bloemfontein on the 11th, bringing with it 5 prisoners, 21 waggons and carts with teams complete, and 2,000 horses.

2. During the progress of these operations General Lyttelton was preparing to carry out with the troops at his disposal a combined movement with the object of clearing the country to the east of the railway between the Orange River and

the Thabanchu—Ladybrand line.

Major-General Bruce Hamilton's columns under Lieutenant-Colonels Monro, Maxwell, and White began the northward movement on the 10th March, advancing from Aliwal North and extending to both flanks. Colonel Hickman and Lieutenant-Colonel Thorneycroft, moving out from Bethulie and Springfontein respectively, prolonged the line on the left to the railway; Colonel Haig's troops from Edenburg, joined in the general advance, as the other columns came abreast of them, and at a later stage, Colonel Bethune's Brigade, from Bloemfontein, filled up the gap, between Leeuw Kop and Boesman's Kop, with its right flank resting on the Kaffir River.

The line of posts from Bloemfontein by Thabanchu to the Basutoland Border was temporarily reinforced by Colonel Harley, whose force of 200 mounted men, two guns and a battalion was detached from that portion of Lieutenant-General Sir Leslie Rundle's force which was holding Ficksburg. Lieutenant-Colonel Pilcher's column was in position near Hout Nek, to guard against any movement from the north.

The troops advancing north, met with little opposition. The Boers, following the tactics which have frequently enabled them to evade our columns during recent operations, dispersed and broke back, abandoning their stock. The columns reached the Thabanchu line on the 20th March, having captured 70 prisoners, 4,300 horses and

many trek oxen.

On the conclusion of these operations General Bruce Hamilton, with his own three columns and Colonel Hickman's force, proceeded to the vicinity of Wepener and Dewetsdorp. Colonel Haig was sent south to secure the line of the Caledon and to watch for the possible return of some of the raiders from Cape Colony. Colonel Bethune's Brigade, required to join a mounted force which was being organized at Kroonstad, marched north via Winburg and Ventersburg; Lieutenant-Colonel Thorneycroft's column, placed at the disposal of Major-General C. Knox, moved by his direction upon Brandfort.

3. Concurrently with the operations for the pursuit of De Wet and those just described in the south-eastern portion of the Orange River Colony, some useful work was being carried out by other columns in the Winburg and Heilbron Districts.

During the first week in March, Lieutenant-Colonel E. Williams and Major Pine Coffin, working in combination, were engaged in clearing the Doornberg, a supply depôt, which, in the absence of De Wet, had been left but weakly guarded.

In the course of this operation eight Boers (including General P. Botha) were killed, two were wounded, and several were taken prisoners; all stock was removed from the district.

Lieutenant-Colonel Williams with the combined forces was then directed to take up a position near the junction of the Vet and Zand Rivers, where he would be favourably placed for intercepting the retreat of De Wet if the latter should move north. Major Massy's small column was brought by rail from Edenburg to reinforce these troops.

When, however, it became evident that De Wet had broken eastward, that his forces had dispersed, and that, for the moment, he meditated nothing but escape, Lieutenant-Colonel Williams's column was moved north to the Heilbron district.

Leaving Heilbron on the 27th March, accompanied by a detachment from the garrison, under Major Weston, Lieutenant-Colonel Williams proceeded to clear the country to the east and southeast. Satisfactory results were obtained, in spite of the most persistent opposition on the part of the local commando, and large quantities of grain. forage, foodstuffs, and ammunition were seized and destroyed.

Subsequently, Lieutenant - Colonel Williams moved through the country to the north of Heilbron, collecting all stock and supplies between the Wilge River and the main line of railway. By a well executed night march he captured a small Boer convoy near Grobler's Drift, and, on the 16th April, arrived at Wolvehoek, bringing in with him 30 captured waggons and a number of cattle.

4: The temporary lull which occurred in the Orange River Colony about the middle of March as a result of the dispersion of De Wet's forces afforded me a favourable opportunity for the rearrangement of the mobile columns in that part of the theatre of war.

Without in any way altering the disposition of the troops employed in guarding the lines of communication, I decided to subdivide the Colony into four districts, each one under the control of a General Officer whose special duty it should be to deal promptly with any concentration of the enemy, and to clear the country systematically of all horses, cattle, and supplies.

The Southern District bounded on the south by the Orange River, on the north by the line Petrusburg - Ladybrand, on the west by the Kimberley Railway, and on the east by the Basuto border, was entrusted to Lieutenant-General the Honourable N. G. Lyttelton, his mobile troops including Major - General Bruce - Hamilton's columns, and the troops commanded by Colonels Hickman and Haig.

The Central District, bounded on the south by Lieutenant-General Lyttelton's command, on the north by the line Bultfontein—Winburg—Ficksburg, and extending as far west as Boshof, was assigned to Major-General C. Knox, the columns under Lieutenant-Colonels Pilcher and Thorney-croft being placed at his disposal.

The Northern District, including that part of the Orange River Colony situated to the north of Major-General Charles Knox's command, and bou ded on the east by the line of Frankfort—Reitz—Bethlehem, was allotted to Major-General E. L. Elliott. His force of mounted troops consisted of Colonel Bethune's Cavalry Brigade Lieutenant-Colonel De Lisle's column (withdrawn from Cape Colony), and a brigade under Brigadier-General Broadwood, composed of the 7th Dragoon Guards, three battalions of Imperial Yeomanry, and six guns.

Lieutenant-General Sir Leslie Rundle retained in his sphere of operations the country east of the line Frankfort—Reitz—Bethlehem—Ficksburg; the troops under his command being those of the th Division, with a proportion of Mounted

Infantry and Yeomanry.

5. Towards the end of March the Boer raiders under Kruitzinger in Cape Colony were being gradually driven by our columns towards the Orange River in the direction of Bethulie, and as it appeared that they might at any time be forced across, General Lyttelton recalled the troops under Major-General Bruce-Hamilton and Colonel Hickman from Dewetsdorp and Wepener, and so disposed them, in combination with Colonel Haig's columns, as to block any attempt to move north-wards from the Orange River. By the 5th April the necessary arrangements had been made, but, with the exception of the return into the Orange River Colony of 300 Boers, Kruitzinger's forces made no general movement to the north. General Bruce - Hamilton, therefore, returned to the Dewetsdorp district. During this movement Lieutenant-Colonel Monro, with a detachment of 150 mounted men and a pompom, after two hours' fighting, cleverly effected the capture of a Boer convoy and 83 prisoners, including Commandant Bresler and Lieutenant Lindique of the Staats Artillery. Colonel Monro's casualties were one man killed and four wounded.

On the 13th April, Lieutenant-General the Honourable N. G. Lyttelton proceeded to England on leave, being succeeded in his command by Major-Geneval Bruce-Hamilton. At the same time Colonel Haig was sent to take charge of operations in Cape Colony.

The subsequent operations of General Bruce-Hamilton's columns east of the railway up to the end of April resulted in the capture of 95 prisoners and 300 horses; many cattle and sheep

were also brought in.

6. Major-General Elliott's force, as organized at Kroonstad under the scheme of redistribution, was ready to take the field by the 10th of April. At this time there were signs of a possible junction of the enemy's forces in North-West Orange River Colony and those in South-West Transvaal, and as the country about Reitzburg and Parys still contained supplies in some quantity, General Elliott was directed to move through this district. He met with very little opposition, and returned to the railway on the 20th, having thoroughly cleared all supplies from the neighbourhood.

General Elliott was then instructed to sweep the country east of the railway line, especially those districts beyond the Wilge River, where the enemy was known to have collected a large amount

of stock and supplies.

The plan for this operation contemplated in its first phase a movement by parallel columns on a wide front, eastward beyond Heilbron. It was intended that the left or Northern Column when past that point should halt, while the other columns, wheeling to the left, should clear the country, the right passing east of Frankfort. The whole division, moving north in line, was then to press the Boers and their stock back on the Vaal River. In order to drive as many as possible of the scattered enemy into the sphere of General Elliott's operations, it was arranged that General C. Knox, concurrently with General Elliott's first eastward move, should send a column towards Reitz. Co-operation was also arranged on the north by stationing a force under Major Western, who had now succeeded to the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Williams's column, on the lower drifts of the Wilge River, while columns under Colonels E. Knox and Rimington moved from Heidelberg and Standerton respectively towards the junction of the Vaal and Waterval rivers.

These operations are now in progress, and I have already been informed, although not in detail, of large captures made by the several

On his arrival at the Vaal, General Elliott intends to form his force along the river, facing south; then wheeling to the left, he will move his columns in parallel lines to the Natal border, his left following the course of the Klip River and his right passing south of Vrede.

7. In Major-General Charles Knox's sphere of operations Lieutenant-Colonel Pilcher's column was in the first instance employed in the country about Clocolan, Mequatling's Nek, and the Korannaberg, where he did much useful work, attacking and harassing the enemy whenever opportunity occurred both by night and day.

Lieutenant-Colonel Thorneycroft, who reached Brandfort on the 28th March, was employed in that neighbourhood for some days, surprising and capturing on their farms, by night, many armed burghers who having been disbanded from De Wet's commandos, were living at their homes.

On the 7th April, Lieutenant-Colonel Thorneycroft was moved towards Winburg to deal with a minor concentration of the enemy in that neigh-This gathering dispersed on his bourhood. approach, and after visiting the Tabaksberg district, he returned to Brandfort.

Subsequently, in accordance with the scheme for General Elliott's operations, General Knox occupied Senekal with his whole force on the 25th April. Lieutenant-Colonel Pilcher entered Reitz on the 28th, and found that the enemy had evacuated the town on the previous evening. On the 29th, patrols reported General Elliott's columns passing to the north of Reitz; Colonel Pilcher's purpose being therefore accomplished, he returned to Senekal. General Knox's force was then ordered to move to the railway.

8. At the beginning of March, General Sir Leslie Rundle's troops were holding Harrismith, Ficksburg, Bethlehem and Vrede. His mobile column under Major-General Campbell was in the vicinity of Standerton, temporarily reinforcing the troops under Major-General Wynne, and furnishing a small force, under Lieutenant-Colonel Inglefield, for escort duty on the Utrecht-Luneburg line in connection with General French's movements in the Eastern Transvaal.

On the 9th March, General Campbell arrived at Vrede and withdrew the garrison to Standerton, his return march being rendered very difficult by the swollen state of the rivers and spruits.

The unavoidable delay which occurred in the completion of General French's movements on the Zululand border, prevented the return of these troops to General Rundle's district for some time, and it was not until the 10th April that General Campbell's column was again concentrated at Harrismith. As information then tended to show that Fouriesburg was once more a centre of Boer activity, and also one of the enemy's chief bases of supply, Lieutenant-General Sir Leslie Rundle arranged to move out from Harrismith and enter the Brandwater basin. General Rundle himself accompanied the column, which left Harrismith on the 19th April, for Bethlehem, and arrived there on the 24th. On the march he met with some opposition from parties of the enemy, amounting in all to 800 men, who persistently hung on the flanks of the force. After operating for four days round Bethlehem, General Rundle passed Retief's Nek on the 29th, and penetrated unopposed into the Brandwater basin, entering Fouriesburg on the 2nd May. He has completed extensive clearing operations in the immediate vicinity of Fouriesburg, and is now engaged in searching the surrounding country by

means of flying columns.

Colonel Harley, whose Head-Quarters are still at Ficksburg, has been engaged with the enemy from time to time, making frequent expeditions into the adjoining districts with his mounted troops. From the 10th March to the 4th April 200 mounted men, two guns, and the 2nd Battalion Worcestershire Regiment were absent from Ficksburg, as already mentioned, temporarily reinforcing the Thabanchu line.

9. Lieutenant-General French had reached Piet Retief on the 16th February, and from that date until the 21st March, incessant rain rendered the roads almost impassable, preventing the arrival of the supplies required for the continuation of his general eastward movement. This enforced delay, however, was not without advantages, as it enabled our troops to search the surrounding country, discovering several guns and considerable stores of ammunition which had been buried

by the enemy in different places.

On the 16th March, Major-General Smith-Dorrien's force arrived at Piet Retief from Amsterdam, and Colonels E. Knox and Pulteney moved out from Piet Retief along the Wakkerstroom road to meet a convoy which was then on the way from Volksrust, escorted by a force under Colonel Bullock. On the same day Brigadier-General Dartnell from the Intombi River, and Lieutenant-Colonel Rimington from Schikhoek (24), proceeded towards Paul Pietersburg, their

supplies having been replenished from Utrecht.

The Luneburg—Utrecht route was now abandoned as a line of supply. General Burn-Murdoch's troops, which had been guarding that road, fell back gradually towards Natal, detaching a column under Lieutenant-Colonel Inglefield to move south down the Blood River Valley towards Vryheid and clear the country to the right of General French's advance. General Dartnell occupied Paul Pietersburg on the 18th; on the same day Colonel Rimington seized the stone bridge over the Pivaan River south of that village, and Brigadier-General Alderson reached Jagd Drift, where he bridged the Pongola by means of pontoons.

General French left Piet Retief on the 21st March, with two columns under Colonels Knox and Pulteney, having placed Major-General Smith-Dorrien in charge of the troops north of the Pongola. At Paul Pietersburg he was joined by General Dartnell and moved on to Pivaan Bridge where he left Colonel Knox with instructions to clear the country to the east, between the Pivaan and Pongola Rivers. Continuing his march with the columns of General Dartnell and Colonel Pulteney he arrive i at Vryheid on the 25th March and there established his Head-Quarters.

At Vryheid, General Hildyard had accumulated a large reserve of supplies for the whole force, thus materially facilitating the further progress of the operations. The advance to clear the angle between the borders of Swaziland and Zululand was resumed on the 27th March, General Dartnell marching due east from Vryheid, with Colonel Pulteney moving on his right rear. General Alderson who had arrived at Welgevonden (1) from Jagd Drift, moved on General Dartnell's left.

At this time General Smith-Dorrien with his own force, and the columns under Lieutenant-Colonels Campbell and Allenby, while actively engaged in clearing the country and Lunting the scattered bands of Boers near the Swaziland Delagoa Railway.

Border, was in a position to prevent any attempt on the part of an organized force of the enemy to break north. His troops held a line from Langdrasi Drift on the Lower Pongola by Henwood's Stere, Platnek, Mahamba, Zandbank (100), and Pict Retief to Jagd Drift. Colonel Knox, operating south of the Pongola, continued the line and barred the roads to the west.

The enemy made several attempts to break through this line, but without success. On 31st March, a force endeavouring to break north over the Lower Pongola was headed by Colonel Allenby, who captured a 15-pr. and two pompoms

with several prisorers.

The columns moving from Vryheid soon came in contact with Grobelaar's commando. Pulteney, who had diverged in a southerly direction, threatened to enclose this force, and, in endavouring to evade him, Grobelaar came within reach of General Dartnell who immediately

engaged him, inflicting some loss.

Colonel Pulteney remained in observation south-east of Vryheid. General Dartnell with General Alderson pushed on eastward through broken country. The difficulties of the march were such, that on 30th March, both Generals left their wheeled transport in charge of Infantry, and pushed on with only the mounted men and a few guns. General Dartnell's depôt was at Toovernaar's Rust (518) 30 miles E.S.E. of Vryheid; General Alderson's at Allendale (404) further north.

These light columns then traversed the country near the Zululand border, following the enemy's bands and engaging them wherever found. On 31st March General Dartnell overtook a party under Emmett and Grobelaar at Smaldeel (575), 12 miles north of Toovernaar's Rust, and captured 10 prisoners and 30 waggons. Following up the retreating enemy, our troops found a pompon which had been thrown over a cliff and abandoned. After a difficult journey through the lowlying bush veldt, during which he met with occasional opposition, General Dartnell returned on 4th April to Toovernaar's Rust. Alderson had meanwhile been operating more to the north, and had also succeeded in bringing a party of the enemy to action, capturing their waggons and stock.

The energy and persistence with which these operations w.re carried out caused great demoralization among the Boers, who had moved for safety into these almost impassable districts. Nearly 200 fighing men crossed into Zululand,

and surrendered to the local magistrates.

By the end of March it had been found possible to withdraw Colonel Pulteney's column, which was required elsewhere. He, therefore, marched for Glencoe to entrain for Pretoria. Colonel Knox followed on the 10th April, his destination being Springs, and, on the 12th, General Dartnell left Vryheid for Volksrust by route march.

General Alderson returned to Vryheid on 6th April, and moved at once on Berthasdorp, marching in three columns, and clearing the country thoroughly in that direction. Having accomplished all that was feasible, he returned by the east of the Umvolosi River, and reached Vryheid on the 13th. The operations in the south being now concluded, General French accompanied this column to the railway, and proceeded to Johannesburg to resume his former command.

On the 14th April, General Smith-Dorrien, having previously concentrated his own troops and those under Colonels Campbell and Alienby, at Piet Retief, set out on his return march to the

General Smith-Dorrien, with his own column, moved on the right by Krom River (67), Bankplaats (87), to Lillieput (142), where he arrived on the 22nd, and established communication by heliograph with our post at Wonderfontein.

Colonel Campbell, with his own and Colonel Allenby's troops, marched on the left, advancing by Waterval Drift (f), Alkmaar (115), Twyfelaar (3), thence across the Vaal at Roodeval (93), to Vogelfontein (4), which he reached on the evening of the 22nd.

On the 18th April, and succeeding days, both forces had been engaged with strong parties of the enemy, who did their utmost to harass the movements of our troops without coming to close quarters. From Lillieput, General Smith-Dorrien moved on Wonderfontein, arriving there on the 27th April, and on the same day Colonels Campbell and Allenby's columns entered Middelburg, having marched down the valley of the Klein Olifants River.

In the operations subsequent to General French's arrival at Piet Retief, the captures made by the columns under his command include 56 prisoners, 175 surrendered burghers, 1—15-pr. gun, 3 pompoms, 496 rifles, 19,000 rounds of small-arm ammunition, 534 waggons and carts, 1,016 horses, 250 mules, and many oxen; 73 Boers were killed or wounded.

10. In the south-west of the Transvaal, during the latter part of February, Lord Methuen's troops, together with a small column under Lieutenant-Colonel Benson, had been successfully employed in dealing with bands of the enemy in the triangle—Klerksdorp, Potchefstroom, Ventersdorp.

On the 4th March Lord Methuen left Klerksdorp for Hoopstad, to withdraw the garrison from that place. On his way to the Vaal he made a descent on Wolmaranstad, in hope of being able to rescue the British and Boer State prisoners who were known to be detained there.

To carry out this latter object he left his convoy under strong escort on the road to Commando Drift, and on the evening of the 5th pushed on with the greater part of his mounted troops by night, entering Wolmaranstad at dawn. He found it deserted, but in the vicinity an important capture was effected in the person of Pearson, the landdrost, an individval who had become notorious through his connection with the cases of Messrs. Maclachlan and Boyd who, with three burghers were shot at Wolmaranstad. The charges against Pearson are now being investigated. Leaving Wolmaranstad to return to his waggons, Lord Methuen was opposed by 400 Boers under Du Toit and Potgieter in the hills to the south-east of Wolmaranstad. In this action the enemy lost 11 killed and wounded, our casualties being seven wounded.

On his arrival at Commando Drift Lord Methuen found the Vaal so much in flood that it was impossible to attempt a crossing. He therefore continued his march along the right bank, with the intention of passing the river at one of the lower drifts. The passages at Bloemhof and Christiana being, however, equally impracticable, Lord Methuen was eventually obliged to conduct his troops to Fourteen Streams, where the columns effected a crossing by the railway bridge.

Soon after his arrival at Fourteen Streams, Lord Methuen was placed temporarily upon the sick list, and Brigadier-General the Earl of Errol assumed command of the force.

On the 28th March the Earl of Errol started with his column by the left bank of the Vaal to carry out the withdrawal of the Hoopstad Garrison, a simultaneous movement in that

direction being made by a mobile column from Kimberley.

Lord Errol's force reached Hoopstad on the 2nd April, having been unsuccessfully attacked by Badenhorst's commando at Steenbokpan. The force left again on the 3rd, accompanied by the garrison and most of the inhabitants of Hoopstad, and arrived at Warrenton on the 7th.

By the 23rd April Lord Methuen was able to resume his command, and at once arranged to transfer his force to Mafeking, in order to be ready to move on Lichtenburg early in May, with a view to subsequent operations against Delarey.

11. On the 6th March I received through Mafeking a report from Lieutenant-Colonel C. G. Money, commanding the garrison of Lichtenburg, stating that he had been heavily attacked on the 3rd of the month by Generals Delarey, J. C. Smuts, Celliers, and Commandant Vermaas, with a force of 1,500 men and one gun. The attack began at 3 AM. and continued till midnight, when the enemy retired, having been completely repulsed at all points with a loss of 60 killed and wounded. and 7 prisoners. The casualties of the garrison. who made a gallant defence, amounted to 2 officers and 14 rank and file killed, and 26 rank and file wounded. General Babington, who was then at Naauwpoort (214) north-west of Krugersdorp, was ordered to march at once on Lichtenburg via Ventersdorp, at which latter place Lieutenant-Colonel Shekleton was instructed to join him with supplies. Owing to bad weather this convoy was much delayed, and General Babington did not reach Lichtenburg till the 17th. The enemy had then withdrawn towards Klerksdorp in which direction General Babington at once followed in pursuit. He met with little opposition, and arrived at Hartebeestfontein (624) on the 20th, having killed 8 and captured 62 of the enemy. A number of waggons and their teams were also taken.

On the 22nd March a strong patrol of the 1st Imperiel Light Horse, consisting of 200 men and a pompom, was attacked near Geduld (158) by General Delarey with 500 men and 3 guns. The enemy, of whom 11 were killed and 13 wounded, were completely defeated. Commandant Venter was found amongst the dead, and Field-Cornet Wolmarans, who was severely wounded, fell into our hands.

Advancing northward early on the 23rd, General Babington pressed back the enemy and drove the main body north, Colonel Shekleton meanwhile operating against the enemy's right flank. Following up his success with mounted troops and guns only, General Babington, on the 24th, pushed on after the Boers, whose rearguard was overtaken and driven in at Zwartlaagte (251). The enemy attempted to take up a second position a few miles further north, to cover the withdrawal of his convoy, but Lieutenant-Colonel Grey's New Zealanders and Bushmen, overcoming all opposition, closed rapidly in on the convoy from both flanks. The enemy then abandoned guns and waggons, and fled in confusion pursued by General Babington's troops. The captures included 140 prisoners, 2—15-pr. guns, 1 pompom, 6 maxims, 160 rifles, 320 rounds 15-pr. ammunition, 15,000 rounds rifle ammunition 53 waggons, 24 carts. 22 dead and 32 wounded 22 dead and 32 wounded Boers were found on the field. Our losses were 2 killed and 7 wounded.

Between the 2nd and 6th April, General Babington, operating northwards towards Tafelkop, was slightly engaged with a small force under General Smuts at Rietpan.

On his return to Venteredorp, General Babing-

ton received definite information that Smuts's main laager was at Goedvooruitzicht (264) and at once moved in that direction. A night march across the hills south of Kaffirs Kraal (135) resulted in the suprise of the Boer camp at dawn on the 14th, the laager being rushed by the men of Roberts's and Kitchener's Horse under Lieutenant-Colonel Sir Henry Rawlinson. The enemy, numbering some five or six hundred, fled in haste pursued by our troops. The enemy's losses included 6 killed, 10 wounded, 23 prisoners, 1-12-pr. gun, 1 pompom, 2 ammunition waggons, 18 rounds 12-pr. ammunition, 500 rounds pompom ammunition, 12,000 rounds rifle ammunition, 12 waggons and carts, and a large number of cattle. Our casualties were 3 men wounded.

General Delarey now concentrated his commandos to the number of some 2,000 men in the hills about Hartebeestfontein (624). Having ascertained the disposition of this force, General Having Babington decided to move to Syferkuil (42) and to work from that point as a convenient base.

On the 22nd, a determined attack was made near Brakspruit (5) by 700 Boers, under the personal command of General Delarey, on a convoy passing between General Babington's camp and Klerksdorp. The escort, however, being well handled repelled the attack, inflicting a loss upon the enemy of 12 killed and 6 wounded.

Lord Methuen, who, as already mentioned, had moved his troops to Mafeking, in order to cooperate against Delarey from the west, marched on Lichtenburg; General Dixon's column from the vicinity of Krugersdorp moved by Tafel Kop to Leeuwfontein (42) north of Ventersdorp, to block any attempt to break north-east, and a fresh column of Mounted Australian troops was organized at Klerksdorp under Lieutenant-Colonel E. Williams to reinforce General Babington.

Lord Methuen left Lichtenburg on the 4th May, and on the following day co-operated with General Babington against the enemy between Kaffir's Kraal (135) and Brakpan (121), an engagement in which he captured one 12-pr. gun, 7 prisoners, and 5 waggons, the enemy retiring in several bodies which are still being followed by

12. Between the 13th and 24th of April, Major-General Dixon who had succeeded Brigadier-Genèral Cunningham, in command of the column south, of the Magaliesberg, made a sweep from Naauwpoort (214), by Welverdiend-Banks -Dwarsvlei (66) and Hekpoort, with the object of clearing these districts, an operation which resulted in the capture of 16 prisoners and 11 rifles, with some cattle and waggons, and a large amount of supplies. He was back again at Naauwpoort on the latter date, and subsequently moved to Tafel Kop, as already stated, in connection with the operations against Delarey.

To the south of the railway in the Gatsrand and along the right bank of the Vaal, thoroughly good work was done in the latter part of March by Lieutenant-Colonel Benson, operating from Potchefstroom after the departure of Lord Methuen for Hoopstad. The column under his command, although in daily touch with strong parties of the enemy, was able to collect in this area and send in to the railway, several prisoners, 1,090 head of cattle, and 45 waggons. On the 4th of April, Lieutenant-Colonel Benson's column marched to Krugersdorp, where the troops composing it were merged into General Dixon's force, Colonel Benson himself being transferred to a

more important command on the eastern line.
13. During the latter phases of the war, the seat of the Boer Government had been removed and east against the commandos in the Tautesberg

from Pietersburg to Roos Senekal, and its presence there together with the natural effects of General French's advance to the Swaziland border, had caused many of the scattered bands of the enemy to collect in the difficult country of the Tautesberg and Bothasberg. An early movement againt these forces from the line Middelburg—Belfast—Lydenburg was in preparation, and to obtain satisfactory results from this operation, it was desirable that Pietersburg and the drifts over the Oliphant's River should be held, to prevent the escape of the enemy into the Zoutpansberg and Waterberg districts. I, therefore, brought up Brigadier-General Plumer with his troops from the Orange River Colony, and directed him to occupy Pietersburg and to be prepared to take part in the combined movement in the north-east.

General Plumer left Pretoria on the 26th March for Pienaar's River, then our most advanced garrison on the Pietersburg line, and was there joined by the 2nd Battalion Gordon Highlanders and "C" Section, Pompons. A break in the line having been repaired, the advance was resumed on the 29th, Warmbaths, Nylstroom, and Piet Potgieter's Rust being occupied successively without difficulty, and the railway line found intact. On the 7th a slight delay occurred, owing to the enemy blowing up one of the smaller bridges on the railway, but on the morning of the 8th, General Plumer's advanced troops entered Pietersburg with only slight opposition, and found that the enemy had evacuated the town on the previous night. During the advance from Pienaar's River 48 Boers had been taken or surrendered.

In Pietersburg itself the following captures were effected :-

46 voluntary surrenders, 1 Krupp gun (80-mm.), 30 rifles, 1,000 rounds 7-pr. ammunition, 210,000 small-arm ammunition, 8,300 lb. gunpowder, 480 lb. dynamite. Two engines and 36 trucks were found at the railway station.

As General Plumer's mounted troops were intended to shold the line of the Olifant's River, the Northamptonshire and Wiltshire Regiments, together with the 12th Battalion Mounted Infantry, were brought up to occupy posts on the line Warmbaths,-Pietersburg, which I placed in charge of Colonel Hall.

Having established an adequate garrison at Pietersburg, General Plumer left that town on the 14th to secure the drifts over the Olifant's River, and, by the 17th, was in position, Major Colvin's column being posted at Bathfontein, and Colonel Jeffreys occupying a lower drift at Blazuw bloemjes Kloof.

On the night of the 24th April, a very gallant act was performed by Lieutenant Reid, Imperial Bushmen Corps, who had been detached from General Plumer's post at Commissie Drift. This Officer, when in charge of a patrol of 20 Australians, located a Boer laager some 15-miles southeast of the drift, which he surrounded and boldly attacked at dawn. The enemy at once surrendered, Commandant Schroeder and 41 other prisoners, with a Maxim being taken. ar salthit

The results of General Plumer's operations between the 14th and 28th April were as follows :-

- 91 prisoners, 20 surrendered; 1 Maxim, 20,360 rounds ammunition, 26 waggons and carts, 46 mules.
- 14. Lieutenant General Sir Bindon Blood, whom I had recently appointed to command the troops on the eastern line, assumed the direction of the columns detailed to operate from the south

and the Bothasberg. The force at his disposal was distributed as follows:-

No. 1 Column. Lieutenant-Colonel Park, Lydenburg.

No. 2 Column. Major-General W. Kitchener,

No. 3 Column. Lieutenant-Colonel Douglas, Witklip (south of Lydenburg).

No. 4 Column. Colonel Pulteney, Belfast. No. 5 Column. Lieutenant-Colonel Benson,

Middelburg. No. 6 Column. Major-General Beatson, Middelburg.

Major-General Fetherston augh commanded Nos. 4 and 5 columns.

These columns moved on the 14th April, on which date, as already mentioned, General Plumer left Pietersburg to seize the drifts on the Olifant's River, and thus close the avenues of escape leading towards the north-west.

The various stages by which Sir Bindon Blood carried out his part of the combined movement were as follows:-

Lieutenant-Colonel Park's column, moving by the north of Lydenburg, passed round into the Waterval Valley, effecting a junction with the force under Major General Kitchener near Rietfontein (129). Thence General Kitchener with his own column continued his advance across the Steelport River to Fort Weber, while Lieutenant-Colonel Park remained in the Waterval and Dwars River Valleys to check any attempt to move north from Roos Senekal.

Lieutenant - Colonel Douglas, proceeding by Zwagershoek (1,448) and Palmietfonteia (1,027), entered Dullstroom on the 17th April, and was there joined next day by Colonel Pulteney's column from Belfast. Lieutenant Colonel Douglas' column remained in the vicinity of Dullstroom during the remainder of the operations, while Colonel Pulteney pushed on by Witpoort (26), to occupy Roos Senekal.

Lieutenant-Colonel Benson, leaving Middelburg on the 16th, marched by Bankfontein (234) and Klipspruit (117) to Blinkwater (44), and, after clearing the surrounding country, was directed on Roos Senekal, to co-operate with Colonel Pulteney in sweeping through the Steelpoort and neighbouring valleys, where large numbers of burghers were

Major-General Beatson's line of advance lay through Avontuur (136), and Laatste Drift (82) to Brakfontein (157). Besides clearing the country through which he marched Major-General Beatson had been instructed to hold both Wagen and Krokodile Drifts on the Olifant's River, and to push out patrols to connect with General Plumer's troops on the lower reaches of the river.

Moving south from Fort Weber, where his mounted troops had arrived on the 18th April, Major-General Kitchener proceeded to Paardeplaats (564), and, disposing his troops on the line Buffels Kloof (1,022)-Holnek (481), operated for several days in that neighbourhood, during which period he captured some prisoners and much stock. On the completion of this work Major-General Kitchener's force was ordered further south to clear the Bothasberg on its way to Middelburg.

Colonel Pulteney's column was also withdrawn from Roos Senekal through Blinkwater (44) to Middelburg, and Lieutenant-Colonel Benson's column, having been moved to Dullstroom to co-operate with Lieutenant-Colonel Douglas, marched in with him to Belfast.

These operations have just been concluded, and although some isolated parties of the enemy have effected their escape through the broken country east of the Steelpoort Valley, and thence across the railway to the south, the able dispositions made by General Sir Bindon Blood, and the good work done by the various columns under his command have undoubtedly led to very satisfactory results, our troops having swept through a portion of the Transvaal in which the enemy believed themselves to be secure from attack.

The losses inflicted on the enemy are reported to be as follows:-

1,081 Boers taken or surrendered. The other captures included 1-1-pr. Q.F. Krupp gun complete with 100 rounds of ammunition, one pompon, 540 rifles, 204,450 rounds of ammunition, 247 horses, 611 waggons and carts. One Long Tom, 1-4.7-inch gun (captured at Helvetia), 1-15-pr. gun, 1-12-pr. Krupp gun, two pompoms, and two Maxims were blown up by the enemy to avoid capture.

On the completion of the combined operations, Brigadier-General Plumer was directed to concentrate his troops and march by the line of the Elands and Kameel Rivers to Eerste Fabrieken. To co-operate with this movement, General Sir Bindon Blood directed Major-General Beatson to move his force from Wagen Drift up the left bank of the Wilge River towards Bronkhorst Spruit Colonel Allenby, whose force had returned to Middelburg from Piet Retief, was ordered to move out from Witbank to clear the angle of Wilge and Olifant's Rivers and to co-operate with General Beatson. The columns met no large bodies of the enemy; one party, driven westward by General Beatson was pursued and overtaken by a detachment from General Plumer's force under Major Vialls, 3rd Victorian Bushmen; 27 prisoners, 18 rifles, 30 waggons and 1,000 head of cattle being captured. General Plumer arrived at Eerste Fabrieken on the 4th of May.

15. Shortly after the departure of General Plumer from Pietersburg, a reconnaissance conducted by Mounted Infantry reported the presence of a strong commando at Klipdam (147) 15 miles to the north of Pietersburg, which was said to be under the command of General Beyers. Lieutenant - Colonel Grenfell, whose regiment, Kitchener's Fighting Scouts, had been sent by rail to Pietersburg, was, therefore, directed to clear up the situation.

. Starting on the night of the 26th April, Lieutenant-Colonel Grenfell discovered the enemy's laager at Klipdam, and attacked it at dawn on the 27th with complete success, and the loss of only one man wounded. Seven Boers were killed, 41 were captured, besides, which, he obtained possession of the enemy's camp with 26 horses, 10 mules, many waggons and carts, and 76,000 rounds of ammunition.

Information having been obtained that the enemy's last Long Tom was at Berg Plaats, about 20 miles east of Pietersburg on the road to Haernertsberg, I desired Colonel Grenfell to make every effort to capture the gun. He moved at once, and at daylight on the 30th occupied Doornhoek, thence pushing on to Berg Plaats. approach the enemy opened fire at over 10,000 yards range, but after 16 rounds they blew up the gun while Colonel Grenfell's men were still about 3,000 yards distant, and retreated in a north-east direction. Colonel Grenfell captured 10 prisoners and 35 rounds of Long Tom ammunition; our only casualties being two men wounded.

As the result of a careful search on the farm Bergvlei (61) adjoining Berg Plaats, 100,000 rounds of Martini-Henry ammunition were discovered and destroyed.

With Bergylei as a centre, Colonel Grenfell

continued to operate for several days with success, and a detachment of the 12th Battalion Mounted Infantry under Major Thomson, was able under cover of a thick fog to effect the capture of Commandant Marais and 40 of his men. Other prisoners were brought in by Lieutenant-Colonels Colenbrander and Wilson, of Kitchener's Fighting Scouts, and on his return to Pietersburg, on the 6th May, Colonel Grenfell reported that altogether he had accounted for seven Boers killed, 129 prisoners, and 50 voluntary surrenders. 240,000 rounds of ammunition were destroyed.

16. Since the expulsion of De Wet from Cape Colony on the 28th February, operations have been continued in Graaf Reinet, Cradock, and Steynsburg districts against scattered bands of the enemy under Kruitzinger, Fouché, Scheepers, and Malan, whose ability to keep the field against our troops is accounted for by the persistent way in which they avoid fighting, and the manner in which they cling to the rugged and mountainous localities. These raiders have during the last two months undoubtedly received a certain number of recruits from amongst the Colonial Dutch, and the friendly feelings of a considerable portion of the rural population assure to them at all times not only an ample food supply, but also timely information of the movements of our pursuing columns, two points which tell heavily in their favour. Our troops in the Midland Districts have since the beginning of March been acting with untiring vigour under the control, first of Major-General Settle, and latterly of Colonel Douglas Haig, whose instructions have been well executed by the column commanders—Lieutenant-Colonels Henniker, Gorringe, Grenfell, Scobell, and Crewe. The increased activity shown lately by the Colonial Defence Force gives good reason for the hope that with the energetic co-operation of these local corps, the task of finally disposing of the Boer raiders will now be rendered much easier. The fact that about 300 Boers under Vanreenen were forced northward across the Orange River at Oude-fontein Drift on the 3rd April, and that another body of somewhat similar strength quitted Cape Colony on the 1st May, crossing eight miles west of Bethulie, is a sign that the raiders are losing heart, and that the leaders are only able to retain in the field small bodies of desperate men, who are prepared to adapt themselves to the vicissitudes of guerilla warfare and brigandage.

Some unrest has lately been shown in the extreme north-west of Cape Colony, where, in close proximity to the frontier of German Namaqua Land, parties of the enemy have at times attempted to harass our posts. Hitherto, however, the local troops have been quite able o maintain their positions, and to frustrate any movements made towards the interior of the

Colony.

His Excellency the Governor, having heard the: opinion of the Council of Health, has been pleased: to modify Government Notice No. 102 of the 18th ? April, 1901, and to direct that the following regulations be observed, viz. :—

1. The importation is forbidden of-

(a.) Cattle (except horses, mules, and asses) from Egypt, the Province of Naples, Calabria and Salonica;

(b.) Wool, hides, skins, horns, bones, and hoofs from the above places and from countries where, epidemic diseases are reporte 1;

(c.) Cattle arriving from any place, if affected with any disease in view of which, in the opinion of the Chief Government Medical Officer, their admission into the lazaretto might prove detrimental to other cattle already in the Island.

Cattle which may be allowed to be landed under the conditions hereinafter specified, and subject to their being kept isolated and under observation in such of the inclosures at the Lazaretto as may be assigned or approved for that purpose for the period hereinafter stated. A Propagation

(a.) Cattle from the Black Sea, Sea of Azov Syria, and Roumelia (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited) subjected to three months' observation.

(b.) Cattle from Morocco, Prevesa, and Sardinia (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited) subjected to 15 days' observation.

(c) Cartle from Sicily (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited) subjected to 10 days' observation.

(d.) Cattle from the Regency of Tunis and from Bengazi (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited) subjected to two days' observation.

(e.) Horses, mules, and asses from Egypt, the Province of Naples, Calabria, Salonica, and Turkey in Asia, subjected to three days' observation, provided that such horses, mules, and asses shall be released, after inspection at the lazaretto. if the owner undertake to keep the animals in a place approved of by the Collector of Customa. and to cause them to be inspected by a Government medical officer or veterinary surgeon twice a week for nine weeks.

The cattle referred to in this paragraph: shall, not be allowed to be landed, unless the consignée shall have in each case and before shipment, made . a written application, stating the approximate number of animals intended to be imported; and obtained the necessary permission after having agreed to abide by any regulations which may be established. Such application shall implyethat the consignee has bound himself to abide by any regulations which may be in force on the day of importation, or which may be issued during the time in which the cattle may have to remain in quarantine, and also to pay the entrance fees, fees for guards, and other fees for ordinary or extraordinary expenses usually levied on cattle at the... lazaretto.

3. Swine.

(a.) Swine arriving from Prevesa may be imported subject to 90 days' quarantine at the

A. Medical Inspection.

- 1. All vessels and passengers shall, on arrival, undergo strict medical inspection.
  - B. Vessels without a clean Bill of Health.
- 2. Vessels arriving from any port without a clean bill of health, unless otherwise provided for in these regulations, are allowed to enter the quarantine harbour to load under quarantine restrictions.
- 8. The vessels referred to in the preceding paragraph will be admitted to free pratique when they have been admitted to free pratique at an intermediate port and disinfected there to the satisfaction of the Port Authorities at Malta, or when ten days have elapsed from date of departure.

C. Infected Vessels.

- 4. Vessels which have, or have had, on board, during the voyage or the preceding 21 days, cases of cholera, yellow fever, plague, or any disease with symptoms which, in the opinion of the Chief Medical Government Officer, resemble symptoms of the said diseases are not allowed to enter the harbour, but may be allowed to communicate with quarantine establishments.
- 5. Whenever such vessels carry a recognized medical practitioner and have not actually on board a case of the diseases mentioned in the preceding paragraph, they are allowed to enter the quarantine harbour only to load under quarantine restrictions.
- D. Vessels from infected Countries or Ports.6. Vessels with pilgrims from the East are not allowed to enter the harbour, but are allowed to communica'e with quarantine establishments.

7. When such vessels carry a recognized medical practitioner and have not actually on board a case of the diseases mentioned in paragraph 4, they will be allowed to enter the quarantine harbour only to load under-quarantine restrictions.

8. Vessels arriving from ports in the Persian Gulf or from Chinese, Indian, or Arabian Ports, which have not been admitted to free pratique at Suez or at Port Said, are not allowed to enter the harbour, but are allowed to communicate

with quarantine establishments.

9. When such vessels carry a recognized medical practitioner and have not actually on board a case of the diseases mentioned in paragraph 4, they will be allowed to enter the quarantine harbour to load under quarantine restrictions.

10. When the vessels mentioned in paragraph 8 have been admitted to free pratique at Suez or Port Said, they will be admitted to free pratique

at Malta.

11. Vessels arriving from Alexandria are allowed to enter the harbour to load under quarantine restrictions, unless ten days have elapsed from date of departure, in which case

they will be admitted to free pratique.

12. The restrictions imposed in the next preceding paragraph shall remain in force until 20 days have elapsed from the last case of plague, cholera, or similar disease reported officially, and the removal of such restrictions will be made known to the public by a notice published by the Collector of Customs.

E. Passengers.

- 13. Passengers arriving at Multa, unless when otherwise provided for in these regulations, shall be subject to the restrictions which are applicable, for the time being, to the vessels on which they arrive.
- 14. Passengers arriving on vessels without a clean bill of health shall be allowed to land at the lazaretto, to complete a period of ten days from the date of the departure of the vessel.

15. Passengers arriving from ports in the Persian Gulf, or from Chinese, Indian, and Arabian ports, shall be dealt with as follows:-

- (a.) If the vessel by which they have arrived carry a recognized medical practitioner, they shall be permitted to land in free pratique; but their luggage shall not be released before disinfection in one of the quarantine establishments.
- (b.) If the vessel does not carry a recognized medical practitioner, they shall be permitted to land in one of the quarantine establishments, where they are to be subjected to strict medical inspection until their clothing and all other articles of personal use likely to retain infection, as well as their luggage, shall have been thorougly disinfected.

F. Goods.

16. The importation is prohibited of—

(a.) Cosee, in beans or ground, coloured with substances injurious to health.

(b.) Rags.

- (c.) Susceptible goods which do not admit of being disinfected arriving on board the vessels referred to in sections B, C, and D.
- (d.) Hides from any port subject to quarantine, or from any place in which cattle disease exists.
- (e.) Vines, vine shoots, and fruit packed in vine leaves.
- (f.) Hoofs and hair, raw silk, wool, and human hair, skins raw, fresh, or untanned, when such articles arrive from infected ports.

(g.) Cotton seed arriving from countries in

which anthrax is epidemic.

17. The importation is prohibited, unless the goods le accompanied by a satisfactory certificate from the British Consular Authority that Phylloxera is not known to exist in the place of origin of :-

Plants or roots from any port in the Mediter-

18. The importation is allowed, after disinfec-

(a.) Wearing apparel, soiled linen and clothing, articles of bedding, feathers, bones, and jute goods, whatever be the port whence such articles may have arrived.

(b.) Used sacks, carpets and embroideries which have been used, when such articles arrived

from infected ports.

(c.) Goods which admit of being disinfected, or are not susceptible to infection, arriving on the vessels referred to in paragraphs 2, 3, and 11.

19. Cereals imported from infected ports are to be kept for 21 days at the lazaretto or any other place to be appointed by the Collector of Customs, to be aired under the direction of the Quarantine Authorities.

We found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act was minus one thousandth of an ounce (-001 oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said Gold coins so taken out and weighed, into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard Gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act was plus one ten-thousandths (or + COO1), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We then melted the said Silver coins, so taken out and weighed, into an ingot, coinș, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard Silver Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether

the said Act, and we found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act was minus two ten-thousandths (or -0002), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said Silver coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as We then took from such residue one to Weight.
