His Majesty's Government are doubtless aware of the services rendered at home by officials at the War Office and Woolwich, and by the Officers who were responsible for the embarkation of troops, horses, war material, and supplies.

While I held the Chief Command in South Africa I had every reason to be satisfied with the promptitude and completeness with which my demands were met, and now that I am Commander-in-Chief of His Majesty's Army I gladly avail myself of this opportunity to record my

appreciation of the assistance rendered me by the administrative departments in the United Kingdom.

I cannot bring my final despatch to a conclusion without referring in terms of the highest appreciation to the promptitude with which a contingent from India, complete in every detail, was despatched to South Africa in the autumn of 1899. Its opportune arrival saved the situation in Natal. Subsequent demands on India for native followers, horses, equipment, and clothing were complied with in a way which reflects equal credit on the organization of the Indian Army, and on the loyalty of His Majesty's Indian subjects. I venture to express a hope that the attachment to the Crown and Empire of the Native Princes and Gentlemen, who at a critical period rendered valuable assistance, may not pass unrecognized by His Majesty's Government.

The Army in South Africa is under the greatest obligations to Their Excellencies the Viceroy and the late and present Commanders-in-Chief in India, also to the Military Department of the Government of India, the Head-Quarters Staff of the Army in India, the Director of Indian Marine, and the heads of the other Departments concerned.

I wish also to bring to your notice the assistance rendered by Rhodesia, in the shape of the Rhodesian Field Force. The number of men contributed by that Colony to His Majesty's Forces on active service was approximately 1,500, or at least 12½ per cent. of the European population.

The London Board of the British South Africa Company, assisted by the administrator, Mr. Milton, together with many subordinate officials of the Company, have been untiring in their efforts to assist the force in the field.

In conclusion, I wish once more to draw attention to the great civil Hospitals in South Africa, which did so much to alleviate suffering and to moderate the strain thrown on the Royal Army Medical Corps, and to the patriotic efforts of Sir John Furlly, Lieutenant-Colonel G. S. Ryerson, Commissioner of the Canadian Red Cross Society, and Major W. G. Macpherson, Royal Army Medical Corps, and the Red Cross Society, and finally to bring to your notice the following names, in addition to those previously submitted, of persons who helped to raise and equip these hospitals and maintain them in a state of efficiency:—

I regret the delay which has occurred in preparing the list, but the number of Officers, soldiers, and others whose services were brought to notice by General and Commanding Officers was very large, and in order that the claims of each individual might be correctly estimated, frequent reference had to be made to South Africa.

As this Despatch is in continuation of my Despatch dated London, 2nd April, 1901, I would request that all the mentions herein made may be considered as bearing the same date—29th November, 1900—as those in that Despatch.

Eldama Ravine, Uganda Protectorate, MY LORD, February 5, 1901.

I FORWARD, for your Lordship's information, a report on the Nandi Expedition, drawn up by Lieut.-Colonel Evatt, D.S.O.

I thoroughly endorse all the recommendations made by Colonel Coles, the Commandant of the Uganda Rifles.

SIR, Entebbe, January 5, 1901.

IN forwarding the enclosed report on the Nandi Expedition, received from Lieut.-Colonel Evatt, D.S.O., I have the honour to bring to your notice, for favourable consideration, the services performed by this officer during the Nandi Expedition. Lieut.-Colonel Evatt had a very difficult task in engaging a fierce and warlike enemy, located in an extremely difficult country favourable in every way to the enemy's tactics, and I consider that his success in

bringing the Wa-Nandi to submission reflects the greatest credit on him.

With regard to his letter recommending the services of certain officers, &c., for favourable consideration, I cordially endorse all that Colonel Evatt has said, and, in addition, I would call attention to the services of Mr. Stordy, mentioned in the body of the report, and to those of Captain Pelham Johnson, of the Army Service Corps, Acting Director of the Road Transport. Although the names of transport officers do not come prominently forward in operations of this description, a great deal of hard work, entailing serious continuous effort on their part, always falls to their lot, and I consider that the present opportunity of noticing the very valuable services rendered by Captain Johnson to the Protectorate should not be lost.

I would also, in consideration of the large amount of fighting which fell to the lot of No. 14 Company, Uganda Rifles, shown by the very heavy losses incurred by that company, bring to your notice the services of Captain Parkin and Yuzbasha Ebrahim Effendi Hassan. I consider that this is due to the local troops, who, before the arrival of Lieut.-Colonel Evatt, had a very difficult task to perform. It is quite possible that the men, most of them Somalis, may have suffered more heavily than was necessary, owing to the fact that their contempt of the enemy made them easier victims to ambuscades; still, the mails and convoys had to go forward; large escorts were not available, and had the escorts been actuated by more consideration for their personal safety, serious delay would very likely have occurred. I hope my recommendation may be favourably considered, as an acknowledgment of the undoubtedly good work performed by the local companies.

I have the honour to recommend also that a medal may be issued for the expedition, with a clasp inscribed "Nandi 1900," and that the medal and clasp may be issued to all officers and men in the Eastern Military District between Kisumu and Eldama (including Nandi Station, Fort Ternan, and Mumias), between the dates mentioned, viz., 24th May and 30th October.

I HAVE the honour to submit the following report on the Nandi punitive expedition:—

1. The following outrages were the immediate cause of military operations being undertaken:—

In March, 1900, the railway telegraph line in the Nyando Valley, between Molo Store and Kisumu, was reported to have been damaged by local tribesmen.

On the 24th May the Nandi were reported to have raided the telegraph office at Kitotos, and to have attacked a railway party at Camp Ya Blackett.

On the 8th June a bridge-repairing party was attacked near Abushire, and seven men killed.

On the 11th June a telegraph party was attacked at Camp Bagamoyo. One porter was slightly wounded, but the Nandi were driven off, one being killed.

On the 12th June the Nandi attacked a caravan of Messrs. Boustead, Ridley, and Co.,

near Abushire, killing one European and 16 natives.

On the 14th June the post at Abushire was attacked, and one man (Uganda Rifles) was killed, the Nandi being driven off with a loss of seven killed.

This post was again attacked on the 24th June; two men (Uganda Rifles) were wounded, the enemy losing 15 killed.

In the meantime, Captain A. Parkin, Commanding Eastern Military District, after instituting inquiries at Kitotos, attacked (with 25 rifles and some Masai spearmen) that section of the Nandi implicated in the raid on the telegraph office, killing 31 Nandi and capturing 229 head of cattle and about 1,800 sheep and goats. Captain Parkin was closely followed, but succeeded, with some difficulty, in reaching Abushire Post, having sustained a loss of two men killed and one man severely wounded.

On the 14th June the Officer Commanding Eastern Military District reported to military headquarters at Entebbe that the road between Nandi Station and Kitotos was unsafe, and on the 16th June the Sub-Commissioner, Nandi District, telegraphed, asking for the dispatch of troops. I was authorised to make arrangements for the infliction of exemplary punishment on the Nandi, and to assume immediate control of the operations.

2. The company at Fort Teruan remained at that post, the remaining local troops being concentrated at Nandi Station on the 6th July, and the headquarters of the expedition, with the Indian troops, at Kisumu, on the 3rd July. The latter portion of the force advanced on the 5th idem, and, entering the Nandi country from the west, reached Abushire with little opposition on the 9th July.

It was here ascertained that the following events had in the meantime taken place:—

On the 7th July an escort of one corporal and four privates of the Uganda Rifles was attacked and destroyed near Abushire.

On the 8th July an escort of 25 rifles was attacked near Abushire, and seven privates, Uganda Rifles, and two others were killed.

On the 9th July an escort of seven rifles was attacked near Abushire, and four were killed, the enemy being beaten off with a loss of seven killed.

I have no doubt that these casualties were mainly due, in the first instance, to failure to observe the orders I had issued, closing the road except for specially arranged convoys, to neglect of standing orders, and to the escorts having been surprised on the march in unfavourable formations, owing to the troops not realising the determined hostility of the enemy, and, probably, in some measure to their holding them in contempt. The nature of the country lends itself to ambuscades, and it should be remarked that on all occasions the escorts

endeavoured to retrieve the situation, so far as possible, by personal gallantry.

On the 18th July information was received that the Nandi in the vicinity of Fort Ternan (who had hitherto declined to join in the rising and had maintained friendly relations) had broken out, and that a patrol of 27 rifles proceeding towards Kisumu had been heavily attacked on the 9th July, and had only regained the protection of the post with difficulty, sustaining a loss of nine men killed besides having two wounded.

Immediately on receipt of this information endeavours were made to intercept the down mail, which had been arranged should proceed by this route, but without success. It was subsequently (on the 6th August) ascertained that the mail escort of 19 rifles had been surprised and destroyed on the 19th July.

This party unfortunately travelled by night, and thus surrendered the advantage they had in bearing firearms.

Until the 25th August the troops were employed principally on convoy duty and on what was, in effect, a reconnaissance of the country, regarding which and the people who occupied it practically no information was available. Within the first month, however, it became evident that, excepting the doubtful attitude of a small minority in the immediate neighbourhood of Nandi Station, the whole of the Nandi were in rebellion, and that the attitude of certain sections of the Lumbwa was truculent and threatening. It was also ascertained without doubt that as soon as additional troops appeared in the country a large portion of the Nandi live stock had been driven across the Nyando River into Lumbwa or its immediate vicinity.

During this preliminary stage some damage was inflicted by the destruction of the enemy's habitations and grain supply. Although this was not, perhaps, felt at the time, there is no doubt that the Nandi subsequently experienced privations from want of shelter and food.

3. It was not until the advent of some 300 Masai and Kamasia spearmen that really effective results were obtained. After the arrival of these auxiliaries (on the 25th August) the operations assumed the nature of a series of raids of two or three days' duration, when columns consisting of about 40 rifles and 100 Masai (generally under a British officer) moved from a central camp on the lightest possible scale of baggage. It was on these occasions that the heaviest casualties were inflicted on the Nandi. These operations involved some independent fighting, mostly borne by the auxiliaries, who, from their superior mobility, were generally in advance of the troops, who thus acted as a support. In spite of their alertness by day, the Nandi were on several occasions taken completely by surprise at night, and heavy damage inflicted on them.

In this manner the Nandi country was a second time traversed, *i.e.*, from east to west, columns being sent in all directions as the main body of the force moved forward.

In the vicinity of the western extremity of the escarpment operations were undertaken against the cave strongholds of the Nandi, which they regarded as impregnable. These caves are of considerable extent, some of them being capable of holding from 200 to 300 head of cattle. Situated amongst rocks and boulders it is almost impossible without a guide to locate their entrances. Of these there are generally several, barricaded with rocks and stones, and

loopholed in such a manner that to take them with troops armed with rifles and with no protective arrangement against arrows would result in disproportionate loss of life. The caves were, however, reduced with comparatively inconsiderable casualties by employing bodies of auxiliaries, who advanced against the entrances under cover of their shields and were supported by rifles. The barricades were then pulled away and an entrance forced. After the reduction of the second cave the enemy evacuated the remainder, in some of which considerable quantities of grain were found.

The country was again worked through from west to east, almost every day having its record of losses inflicted on the enemy both in life and in captures, until Nandi Station was reached on the 24th September. It was here necessary to detach a portion of the force for escort duty and for the protection of the route *via* the Nyando Valley. For this purpose the additional troops enumerated in the margin became available.*

Acting on information which consistently pointed to the majority of the Nandi live stock (and therefore the fighting men) being in the low-lying hills between the Lumbwa Escarpment and the Nyando River, I proceeded with the remainder of the force, consisting of 145 rifles (local troops) and 300 Masai, in a southerly direction from Nandi Station, and striking the Fort Ternan-Kisumu Road on the 12th October advanced along it in the direction of Fort Ternan and encamped at Ligatet. I had on the previous day received authentic information as to the whereabouts of the most troublesome leaders of the rebellion, the two Laibons, or medicine men, Kibiles and Goitalel, and of the intention of the enemy to break back to the Nandi Escarpment as soon as the troops should arrive in the vicinity of Fort Ternan. I therefore decided to attack at once. Leaving a sufficient guard in camp I divided the remainder of the force into two columns, which left camp at 11 p.m. on the 12th October. One column, under Colour-Sergeant J. Ellison, was to proceed to the east, cross the Nyando River, and attacking the Bomas or zaribas (which were stated to be grouped in a comparatively small tract of country), to drive the enemy to the west, returning to camp, if possible, before nightfall. I may here mention that this programme was carried out in a thoroughly satisfactory manner by Colour-Sergeant Ellison, who inflicted severe loss on the enemy.

With the other column I proceeded with the intention of surprising the Boma of the Laibons, and of subsequently acting as circumstances might demand. After marching continuously until about 4 a.m. on the 13th the zariba was surrounded and taken after considerable opposition. The column then continued its advance, and after making large captures of live stock, and inflicting severe losses on the enemy, a suitable site was selected (at about 1 p.m. on the 13th) for a bivouac, as it was impossible to reach camp before nightfall. Owing to various circumstances it was found impracticable to complete more than a zariba for the captured live stock. The troops and auxiliaries were placed in the most favourable positions for protecting the captures and resisting an attack, and were warned of the extreme probability of this being made. The attack, in fact, took place at about 11 p.m., when it appears that the enemy assaulted in three bodies, one of which, breaking through the Masai spearmen, entered the cattle

zariba, and thence inflicted most of the losses which occurred. The night was pitch dark, and nothing could be seen at more than a few yards distance. Fire was opened at once, and no entrance was effected through the troops, who generally behaved with commendable steadiness. Some confusion was occasioned by the Masai spearmen crowding round the Maxim gun and preventing it from coming into action. This was, however, soon rectified, and after the gun commenced fire the enemy made no further attacks. A portion of the cattle, however, stampeded, and was lost in the darkness.

I regret that in this engagement Dr. J. L. Sherlock, Uganda Medical Service, and 10 native ranks (including auxiliaries) were killed, and Lieutenant K. Henderson, Indian Staff Corps, and 18 native ranks were wounded. The enemy left 21 dead in close proximity to the Boma; their total losses during the operations of the 12th and 13th October being 74 authenticated killed, including the Laibon Gaitalel, 1,039 cattle, and 3,100 sheep and goats.

This was the last event of the expedition, the Lumbwa and Nandi tribes having since submitted, and peace having been concluded.

4. The terrain of operations includes an area of, roughly, 1,600 square miles, and the nature of the country varies, from the comparatively open grass land (interspersed with brushwood) on the top of the escarpment, to the thick (and often impenetrable) forests to the north and east, from undulating and easy country to that which is precipitous and very broken. It was naturally in the most difficult and inaccessible parts that the enemy sought refuge for themselves and their live stock.

5. The tactics adopted by the Nandi were essentially those of watching and waiting. Organised resistance was seldom met with, and was confined to attacks on escorts before the commencement of the expedition, and to one or two other occasions which have been specially referred to. It was, therefore, generally impracticable to get to close quarters. The enemy were seldom to be seen, and their presence was not discoverable except when their warning cries from one commanding point to another gave notice of the approach of the troops, or when Kavirondo porters broke bounds and straggled from camp to loot, or escape work, when they were generally speared by parties of Nandi lying in the bush. The latter appear to have been particularly alert in intercepting messengers, and it was impracticable to communicate between the various posts in the country except at considerable intervals, since it was impossible to obtain runners who would venture to carry letters.

In adopting the tactics dictated by those of the enemy, I have been guided by the ordinary military principle of making the destruction or deprivation of what they prize most as my first object. This is undoubtedly their live stock, the capture of which has, I firmly believe, been the only means through which it was possible to kill an exemplary number of an extremely mobile enemy, who (from a record of hostility, treachery, and murder probably unexampled in the history of the Protectorate) have called on themselves such punishment as has been meted to them. I venture to hope that the experience of the past will be verified in the future, and that the deprivation of a portion of their live stock from an almost purely cattle-keeping (and consequently aggressive) tribe may result in a largely increased area of cultivation, and in, therefore, the prospects of permanent peace.

Breaks in the continuity of the operations by the whole force were unfortunately unavoidable, owing to the necessity for escorting convoys of food, captured live stock, passengers, mails, &c.

6. Although the local troops and porters subsisted mainly on grain obtained from the country and on meat from captures, it was, nevertheless, necessary to obtain supplies from Mumias, Kisumu, and Eldama Ravine. In addition to keeping the active portion of the force in rations, it was necessary to arrange for the supply of the garrisons at Fort Ternan and Nandi Station, and for the transport establishments at the latter place.

7. Transport naturally presented difficulties, as permanent establishments for this purpose were, of course, insufficient for the requirements of the force engaged. It was, therefore, necessary to obtain porters from amongst the Kavirondo. These, though excellent carriers, are exceedingly difficult to manage, in view of the necessities and requirements of an expedition. Besides being essentially unreasoning creatures, they laboured under the additional disadvantage of working in an unfavourable climate. In spite of this, however, their health and death-rate compare not unfavourably with those of the troops, a result mainly due to the care bestowed on them by the Principal Medical Officer of the force, and to other officers to whose columns the Kavirondo were attached as porters.

8. The general behaviour of the troops and auxiliaries was good. The work was arduous in the extreme, the necessity for rapid and continued moves entailing an unusual amount of exposure consequent on the demand for frequently moving with nothing beyond a blanket. The weather was often wet, and the nights generally cold. The Masai being lightly armed and rapid movers, necessitated, in comparison, greater exertion on the more heavily-equipped troops, who had to keep up.

I cannot speak too highly of the auxiliaries, especially the Masai, who, so long as they were supported by rifles, were always ready to go anywhere. Considering their natural instincts and mode of life, their behaviour under the light discipline imposed on them was exemplary, and they seldom gave any trouble. They have, however, apparently in common with most Africans, a liability to nostalgia, and after a month's hard work hanker after their homes to such an extent that there is no resource but to dismiss them.

9. I would desire to bring to notice the services of the following:—

Captain M. L. Hornby, D.S.O., 1st Battalion (Indian contingent) Uganda Rifles, whose unflinching energy and absolute reliability on all occasions contributed greatly to such success as has been attained, and relieved me of much anxiety.

Captain P. B. Haig, Indian Medical Service, was in charge of the medical arrangements of the force. It is due to his management and careful attention to the most minor complaint of the meanest native, that confidence was established amongst the horde of savages employed as auxiliaries and porters in the desire to secure their well-being, and that so small a proportion of wound cases terminated fatally. The ready and cheerful assistance rendered by this officer, whether connected with his department or otherwise, deserves the warmest acknowledgment.

I venture to commend to notice the assistance rendered by Mr. R. J. Sturdy, Principal

Veterinary Officer to the Protectorate, who placed his surgical skill at my disposal at a time when there were a considerable number of severe wound cases, to attend which there was no medical officer available, in consequence of the regretted death in action of Dr. J. L. Sherlock. I would invite attention to the testimony recorded in the medical report on the expedition on the care and skill with which these cases were conducted.

I have especially to mention the services of Colour-Sergeant James Ellison, R.M.L.I. This non-commissioned officer has throughout the expedition distinguished himself for his untiring energy and desire to render all and every service possible. He has been (owing to sickness amongst officers) on several occasions in independent command of a detached column, whose operations he has conducted with ability and success.

I also wish to record my acknowledgments of the services rendered by Lieutenant Kenneth Henderson, 1st Battalion (Indian contingent) Uganda Rifles, who acted as my Staff Officer until incapacitated through severe wounds received in action, and of those of Lieutenant J. Whittle, 5th Battalion Liverpool Regiment, who subsequently carried on the duties of the appointment to my entire satisfaction by his energy and attention to duty.

Despatch relating to Field Operations.

SIR, April 4, 1901.

I HAVE the honour to transmit to you a despatch from Lieut.-Colonel Brake, D.S.O., Commanding the Gambia Expedition, in which a full account of the proceedings of the expeditionary force is given for the period extending from the date of Colonel Brake's appointment to the command of the Gambia Field Force to that of his departure from the Colony on the 2nd instant.

2. Colonel Brake has given such a minute and accurate description of all that has occurred that it only remains for me to add a few words in support of the opinions he has expressed. I am quite in accord with him in his estimate of the value to the Colony of the recent expedition, and I am confident that, at any rate for a very considerable time to come, the different native peoples of the Protectorate, recognising the futility of resistance to British authority, will accept the responsibilities imposed on them by us, and prove obedient and law-abiding.

3. One very pleasing incident of the expedition has been the very few charges that have been made against the troops for offences against the inhabitants of the country. In only two cases was anything of at all a serious nature alleged, and in both of these the allegations proved on investigation to be groundless. This speaks well for the discipline that has been maintained, and reflects the greatest credit on Colonel Brake and the officers serving under

him; in this connection I may perhaps be allowed to say that as far as my opinion goes, the half battalion of the Central Africa Regiment, recently serving in the Gambia, is by far the smartest and most soldier-like body of men I have seen on the West Coast of Africa.

4. My best thanks are due to Colonel Brake for his unvarying kindness and courtesy, and the Colony is much indebted to him for the valuable services he has rendered it. He has throughout shown the greatest consideration for the natives of the country, and to any suggestions I may have thought it my duty to make he has given the most prompt and ready attention.

5. With your permission I beg to recall to your notice the valuable services rendered to the expedition by Captain Sparkes and the officers of H.M.S. "Forte," "Dwarf," and "Thrush." During the three months the expedition has lasted Captain Sparkes has been untiring in his efforts to render it successful, and I have no hesitation in saying that had the assistance he gave this Government been less cordial and thorough, very many difficulties must have arisen, which it would have been impossible to meet except at great expense and with long delay.

6. The arrangements with the Government of Senegal, which were required in connection with the concerted operations against Fodi Kabbah, were most ably carried out by Captain Arthur.

7. I would also bring to your notice that the preliminary arrangements for the expedition, as far as this Colony is concerned, which proved most satisfactory, fell entirely upon Mr. H. M. Brandford Griffith, who acted as Administrator from the date of Sir R. Llewelyn's departure in March, 1900, until my arrival, on the 10th January last.

From the Officer Commanding Gambia Field Force to the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Bathurst, The Gambia,
March 31, 1901.

SIR, I HAVE the honour to forward the following report on the military operations in the Colony of the Gambia, which took place during the months of January, February, and March, 1901.

2. Before detailing the operations it may be well to recall the events which led to their being undertaken.

On 14th June, 1900, Messrs. Sitwell and Silva, Travelling Commissioners, were murdered with their escort of police at the village of Sankandi, in the Kiang district, inhabitants of the neighbouring town of Dambutu being largely implicated. At the time there were no troops in Gambia, and, on account of the war in Ashanti, none could be spared from Sierra Leone or elsewhere, and, consequent on the apparent impunity with which the crime was committed, a dangerous spirit of disaffection spread through parts of the south half of the Colony, notably in Kiang and Jarra, several of the chiefs of which declared that the rule of the British was at an end, and refused to recognise the power of the civil authorities. This disloyal feeling spread to the north bank, and in December, 1900, Mr. J. H. Ozanne, C.M.G., Travelling Commissioner, was obliged to escape by night from the large town of Salikeni, on account of the threatening behaviour of the natives. For a time it appeared that outside Combo British authority no longer

existed in the Gambia, and an expedition became necessary to reassert it.

Owing to the narrowness of the British territory and the rapidity with which news travels, being communicated from village to village by runners, it is difficult to inflict adequate punishment upon the natives, who have only to cross into French territory to be safe from attack. It was therefore necessary that the greatest secrecy should be observed to prevent news of the impending expedition reaching the natives, and that when the troops arrived in Gambia they should move with the utmost rapidity.

3. The troops detailed for the expedition were:—

Four companies 3rd Battalion West India Regiment, with two 7-pr. R.M.L. guns from Sierra Leone, and four companies 2nd Battalion Central Africa Regiment, *en route* from Somaliland to the Gold Coast Colony, making a total of 802 men, exclusive of officers. In case of extreme necessity assistance could be obtained from H.M.S. "Forte," "Dwarf," and "Thrush," which were in the Gambia River.

4. The following plan of action was adopted:—

The transport "Dwarka," with the half-battalion 2nd Central Africa Regiment, was due to arrive at Gibraltar from Berbera (Somaliland) on or about 2nd January, and, allowing for unforeseen accidents, might be expected to reach Bathurst on 10th January. Instructions were therefore telegraphed to the Senior Naval Officer, West Coast of Africa (Captain R. C. Sparkes, Royal Navy), to despatch the half-battalion 3rd West India Regiment in time to arrive on that day, together with 500 carriers from Sierra Leone, as it was not considered advisable to excite suspicion by collecting carriers locally.

It was decided to strike the first blow at Dumbutu, as the village of Sankandi had been deserted and burnt by its inhabitants, who had moved to Nema, in French territory.

After a consultation with the Administrator the whole expedition was to proceed, without landing at Bathurst, to Tendebar, 63 miles up the river, disembark during the night or early morning, and march on Dumbutu on 11th January. It was hoped that by so doing the troops would be in Dumbutu before the news of their arrival at Bathurst could reach that place, and so permit the escape of the headmen implicated.

After occupying Dumbutu and Kwinella, the troops were to march through any districts indicated by the Administrator, and to thoroughly pacify the Colony and restore British authority.

5. Before leaving London I made arrangements with the Crown Agents for the Colonies for the despatch of rations for officers and men, and of medical stores, instruments, and dressings, by the steamer leaving Liverpool on 29th December, 1900. This was a matter of some difficulty, owing to the Christmas holidays, but it was successfully accomplished by the Crown Agents, and I left London on 29th December, travelling overland to Gibraltar, where the transport "Dwarka" arrived on 4th January.

On her passage to Bathurst the "Dwarka" called in at Dakar, Senegal, to embark Captain L. R. Arthur, H.M. Consul, who had been appointed to the staff of the expedition as Political Officer. The "Dwarka" anchored off the mouth of the Gambia River on the evening of the 9th January, where H.M.S. "Dwarf" and the mail steamer "Bornu," both from Sierra Leone, had already arrived. The latter ship had been intercepted by Captain

Sparkes at Sierra Leone, and brought the 500 carriers and a quantity of stores.

Sir George Denton, K.C.M.G., the newly-appointed Administrator of Gambia, was a passenger on this ship. H.M.S. "Dwarf" (Lieutenant Commander H. F. Shakespear, Royal Navy) brought one company 3rd Battalion West India Regiment.

6. H.M.S. "Forte," Captain Sparkes, Royal Navy, with the remaining three companies 3rd Battalion West India Regiment, from Sierra Leone, arrived before daybreak of the 10th January, and led the way into the river, the ships anchoring off Bathurst.

I had been fortunate in being able to stop Major H. Bryan, the Manchester Regiment, and Captain H. A. Thorne, the West India Regiment, on their way home from the Ashanti Expedition, and to secure their services as Chief Staff Officer and Chief Transport Officer respectively. They had arrived at Bathurst on 30th December, and had made all the necessary arrangements, with the help of Lieutenant Commander W. H. D'Oyly, Royal Navy (H.M.S. "Thrush"), for the immediate transfer of both men and stores from the "Forte" and "Bornu," which at once commenced.

I had an interview with Sir George Denton and Mr. Brandford Griffith, the Acting Administrator, and obtained the sanction of the former for the immediate move up the river; but Mr. Griffith expressed great doubts as to whether a surprise would be possible.

A weak company (47 men) of the 2nd Battalion Central Africa Regiment, with all the women and children of the regiment, was landed at Bathurst and accommodated in the barracks there.

7. The expedition started up the river at 2 p.m. and anchored at dusk off the mouth of the Vintang Creek, to await the rising of the moon. H.M.S. "Dwarf," with H.M.C.S. "Mansah Kilah," was ordered to proceed with two companies 3rd West India Regiment up the Vintang Creek, and, after landing the companies at Jaror and Sandeng, to watch the crossing at Bondali. The officer in command of these troops (Major Westmorland) was directed to occupy the towns named and to intercept any natives who might endeavour to cross the Vintang from the north.

H.M.S. "Forte" remained at the mouth of the Vintang, being unable, on account of her draught, to ascend higher up the river.

H.M.S. "Thrush" and the transport "Dwarka" resumed the journey up river at 2 a.m., the navigation of the latter ship being undertaken by Lieutenant F. Massey-Dawson, Royal Navy, of H.M.S. "Forte." The movement of so large a ship, drawing 16 feet of water, up an intricate river like the Gambia by night was attended by considerable risk, but it was of paramount importance to reach Tendebar by daylight, and the task was successfully accomplished.

8. The ships anchored off Tendebar at 4.30 a.m., and the troops at once commenced to land, but there was no pier and the banks shoaled so rapidly that the boats were unable to approach the shore, and it was not till 8.30 a.m. that the landing was completed. Each man carried three days' rations, with 100 rounds of ammunition, a reserve of 100 rounds per man being carried by porters. Three loads were allowed for each officer, but all other baggage was left on board the ships and placed ashore subsequently.

The column left Tendebar at 8.55 a.m., its

strength and composition being:—Head-quarters Staff; one and a half companies, 3rd Battalion West India Regiment; three companies 2nd Battalion Central Africa Regiment; demolition party Royal Navy; one 7-pr. R.M.L. gun; four Maxims. A half company 3rd Battalion West India Regiment was left at Tendebar. At Batelling, Lan Sanyang, chief of that town, and son of the chief, Mansah Koto, who had been killed with Messrs. Sitwell and Silva, joined me, with some 50 followers, horse and foot. They were ordered to wear a bunch of leaves in the headdress, so that the troops might recognise them, and were then sent on to form a screen of scouts in front of the column, with orders to capture all persons they might meet, but on no account to fire. They performed these duties well, and by hiding in the grass were able to capture all the natives met with, and thus effectually prevented news of the advancing column reaching the enemy.

9. At 11.45 a.m. the scouts reported that Dumbutu was in sight, and going forward to reconnoitre I found that the town consisted of two collections of buildings, one of large size, lying in an open cultivated plain. To the right of the line of march a patch of scrub and high grass offered good cover, and by moving the troops through this I was able to bring them within a quarter of a mile of the town, unobserved by the enemy. I ordered Major A. W. V. Plunkett, 2nd Battalion Central Africa Regiment, to march with two companies of that regiment with all speed round the left of the town, and place himself between it and the French border, here about one mile distant, and when he was in position I advanced with the rest of the troops through the fields.

The surprise was complete, and before any considerable number of the enemy could escape the troops had barred all exit. The town, part of which was defended by a stockade, was seen to be full of armed men, but a white flag was hoisted, and they appeared about to surrender, when a heavy fire was opened on one of the advancing companies, and almost simultaneously upon all the troops from the doors of the houses and the compound walls. It was fortunately badly aimed, and little damage was done. At this time parties of the enemy endeavoured to break through the cordon, but most of them were driven back.

Early in the engagement the headman, Mai Dabu, was captured, and as there were many women and children in the town I sent him under escort to persuade the inhabitants of the hopelessness of further resistance, and after an engagement lasting over an hour they surrendered.

Of the five rebel headmen whose capture was desired, two, Karamu Dabu and Jaringo Darami, were killed, and three, Mai Dabu, Bakari Dabu, and Jaranku Darami, taken. Over 60 of the enemy were killed, and subsequently buried by the troops, and more than 200 men and women captured, all of whom, with the exception of 35 men, were released by His Excellency the Administrator on 15th January, when he visited Dumbutu.

Our casualties were as follows:—

Died of wounds.—One carrier.

Severely wounded.—One private 3rd West India Regiment.

Slightly wounded.—One private 3rd West India Regiment; two privates 2nd Central Africa Regiment; one camp follower.

10. The troops occupied the town, and the following morning (12th January) I marched

with two companies to Kwinella, a large town, two and a half miles from Tendebar, a considerable number of inhabitants being reported as actively disloyal. The troops were halted outside the town, and I requested Mr. H. L. Pryce, Travelling Commissioner, who accompanied the column, to summon the headman, and order him to arrest the leading rebels. Those present in the town, three in number, were arrested and handed over to Mr. Pryce, and the troops returned the following day to Dumbutu.

Owing to the difficulty experienced in navigating the Vintang, the companies despatched up that creek were not able to reach Sandeng and Jaror till the evening of the 11th January. They met with no resistance, and rejoined the main body on the 13th January.

Whilst awaiting the arrival of His Excellency the Administrator, small columns visited the neighbourhood, and spies were sent out to obtain information of the movements of the hostile natives. They reported that the town of Nema, where the Sankandi murderers had established themselves, together with other villages across the border, had been deserted by their occupants, who were living in the bush. A messenger was sent with a letter, informing him of my movements, to the Commandant of the nearest French post, which proved to be Sedhiu, on the Casamance River, and an answer was received on 21st January.

11. As no further resistance appeared likely in the Kiang district, I proposed to His Excellency the Administrator that the troops should forthwith move to the north bank to attack Salikeni, whence the Travelling Commissioner, Mr. Ozanne, had been driven in December last, and where some 3,000 men were reported to be in arms, before the news of the fighting on 11th January, and of the movements of the troops, could reach that place.

One and a half companies 3rd West India Regiment remained at Dumbutu to watch the frontier, and a half company at Tendebar, to guard the depôt and base hospital which had been established there. The remainder of the troops embarked on 16th January, and proceeded down stream to the mouth of the Jaring Creek, where the ships anchored for the night. It was hoped that by anchoring near the south bank and some distance from the mouth of the Salikeni Creek, the inhabitants of that town might, if news of the movement reached them, be deceived with regard to the intentions of the troops. The landing was to be effected in two parties, and the first party was transferred to lighters and boats at 4 a.m. It was intended that the ships should tow these to the mouth of the creek, where the steam cutters would take them in tow, the current in the main stream being rather strong for the cutters. Unfortunately H.M.S. "Dwarf" grounded on a sandbank, and the landing, which was to have taken place at 6 a.m., was not effected till 8 a.m.

A raised track, which it was impossible to leave, about 5 feet wide, led for nearly a mile through the mangrove swamps and had to be traversed in Indian file, but beyond it open ground was reached, and the leading companies were able to deploy and advance for the anticipated attack. The town of Salikeni was found to be about two miles distant from the wharf. It is situated at the crest of a gentle slope, at the foot of which a belt of rice fields offered a good position for defence. It was not until these fields had been passed that any natives

were seen, but when the troops approached the town they were met by the chief with a few of his followers, all being unarmed, and it was seen that no resistance was intended.

Mr. Ozanne, the Travelling Commissioner of the District, was present, and pointed out the portion of the town occupied by the most disloyal headmen, and this being surrounded all were arrested. As at Dumbutu, the natives appear to have been taken completely by surprise, otherwise it is difficult to understand why they either did not resist the troops or escape across the French frontier, less than six miles away. Serious losses might have been inflicted on the troops whilst crossing the causeway, and again whilst wading through the rice fields, and that stubborn resistance would be offered was the opinion of the civil officials who accompanied me. A fine was inflicted on the town by His Excellency the Administrator, and a search for arms instituted, some 200 guns being discovered and confiscated. Flying columns were despatched to No-Kunda and Saba to disarm the natives and to bring in the chief of the former town. They were not opposed in any way.

12. The expedition left Salikeni on 20th January, and embarked for conveyance to the upper reaches of the river.

In order to shorten the duration of the operations and as the prospect of serious resistance on the part of the natives in any overwhelming strength was small, I decided to form the troops under my command into two columns, each to move in accordance with a definite programme, and at such a distance from each other that in case of either requiring assistance the other could reach it without difficulty by the river.

13. Accordingly, H.M.S. "Thrush" conveyed the two companies of the 3rd West India Regiment, with one 7-pr. gun, to Ballangar, where they landed on 22nd January, and commenced a march through the districts of Sanjal, Niani, and Bamkuk, visiting all the chief towns, and arriving at Lamin-Koto, opposite to McCarthy's Island, on 28th January.

14. As information had been received from the civil authorities that Jimbermang Jala, chief of Sandugu, and Nyakadu, chief of Wuli, intended to resist any troops entering their countries, and that the latter was erecting stockades, I proceeded with three companies 2nd Battalion Central Africa Regiment to Kanube, and marched thence to Misera, the chief town of Jimbermang Jala. The troops were well received, and the chief had an interview with His Excellency the Administrator.

I then proceeded to Bantoding, the chief town of Nyakadu, marching in two columns by Kambati and by Madina respectively. No stockades were discovered, and the chief appeared perfectly friendly and loyal, and accompanied me back to Kanube to meet His Excellency the Administrator. H.M.S. "Dwarf" ascended the Gambia to a point two miles below Basse, beyond which it was not considered advisable for her to go, on account of the shallowness of the river, and on her return journey with the Central Africa Regiment on board, this ship ran aground, and two days elapsed before she could be got off.

15. It was not considered advisable to enter Fuladugu, on the south bank of the river, this being the country ruled over by Musa Mullah, a powerful chief, on good terms with and loyal to the British.

The two companies of the West India Regi-

ment therefore returned to Dumbutu, and those of the Central Africa Regiment landed at Bai, in the Jarra district, on 1st February. From Bai this column, under Major Plunkett, visited the disloyal towns of Jassong and Buiba, where fines imposed by His Excellency the Administrator were collected by the Travelling Commissioner, and marching by Toniataba reached Kwinella on 5th February.

16. It had been my intention to have marched without any further delay through the districts of Kiang, Fogni, and Combo, which would have brought the operations to an end on 13th February. My presence at Bathurst was, however, required by the Administrator, on account of negotiations which had been commenced with the French with regard to combined operations against Fodi Kabba, a chief who had for years kept the valley of the Gambia in a state of unrest, and until definite information was received with regard to the movements of the French troops it was impossible to move my own.

The march through these districts did not, therefore, commence until 15th February, three companies of the 3rd West India Regiment traversing Kiang, and three of the 2nd Central Africa Regiment Fogni and Combo, but nothing worthy of report occurred. With this march the operations as originally contemplated ended.

17. From Bathurst the Central Africa Regiment returned to Dumbutu on 23rd February, and three companies of the 3rd Battalion West India Regiment, from that station, left the colony for Sierra Leone, on the transport "Dwarka," on 26th February, the half battalion of the Central Africa Regiment being considered sufficient for the work remaining to be accomplished. One company of the 3rd West India Regiment was retained to remain as a garrison in the Colony after the departure of the rest of the expedition.

H.M.S. "Thrush" had already left on 10th February, her presence being required by the Lords of the Admiralty at the Cape of Good Hope.

18. I have already mentioned Fodi Kabba. For many years the Gambia Colony had suffered from the raids of this chief, who, when driven out of the Colony in 1892, established himself at Medina, about six miles within French territory and 18 miles due south of Dumbutu, whence he harried both the British and French Colonies impartially.

It was felt that the presence of troops in Gambia presented a good opportunity of destroying his power once and for all, but as he lived in their territory it was necessary that the French should co-operate. Negotiations with M. Ballay, Governor-General of French West Africa, on this subject were opened on 15th January, and were favourably received, but as time was of importance Captain L. R. Arthur, Political Officer with the Field Force, proceeded on H.M.S. "Forte" to Dakar on 4th February, and had interviews with the Governor-General and with General Combes, commanding the troops in French West Africa, which were completely satisfactory.

19. A French expedition, consisting of 40 Spahis Sénégalais, 200 Tirailleurs Sénégalais, three guns, was being prepared for despatch to the Casamance River, and Captain Arthur was informed that it would land at Zinguichor and march on Medina, whilst levies under Musa Mullah approached that town from the east, in such a manner as to close all chance of escape. M. Ballay promised that Medina should be

assaulted on 8th March at the latest. This date was somewhat later than the one first mentioned, which was six weeks from 16th January, namely, 27th February, but an earlier movement was impossible until officers from France could reach Dakar.

A further delay occurred, owing to the French gunboats conveying the expedition being detained in the Casamance River by stress of weather. It had been arranged that I should meet the French Commander at Zinguichor on the 3rd March to discuss the details of the operations, but after several alterations in their plans, Lieut.-Colonel Privé, Chief Staff Officer in French West Africa, and Commandant Rouvel, in command of the expedition, arrived at Bathurst on the 5th March, and the plan of attack was discussed and satisfactorily settled. I regret, however, that the date was again postponed, but the French officers pledged themselves to leave their base, Zinguichor, between the 12th and 15th March, and that the assault on Medina should take place between the 20th and 25th March.

20. It was arranged that the main body of French troops should advance upon Medina from Zinguichor by way of Bignona, whilst the cavalry worked round to approach the town from the south. The troops under my command were to take up a position along the frontier line to bar the roads leading to the northward. From the east the followers of Musa Mullah, reported to number some thousands, were to block the country between the Gambia and Casamance Rivers.

The French expedition was somewhat stronger than had originally been proposed, and numbered 40 Spahis, 400 Tirailleurs, three guns, with 18 officers and 400 porters.

21. The information regarding Fodi Kabba was vague. His chief town, Medina, was known to be surrounded by mud walls, and to be full of slaves, who were employed as fighting men, under three head chiefs, but no approximate estimate could be formed of their numbers. Less important strongholds were Nema and Dator, both believed to be stockaded.

22. In accordance with the above plan of operations, the company of the 3rd Battalion West India Regiment marched on 19th March to Bumari and Dumbutu, and the three companies 2nd Battalion Central Africa Regiment occupied the frontier villages of Kusambu, Sanya-Kunda, and Jandeng, strong picquets being posted on all the roads leading from Medina. My headquarters was established at Sanya-Kunda, and a detachment remained at Sandeng, on the Vintang, to watch the crossing there.

Two 7-pr. guns, manned by the Bathurst Police, under Superintendent J. Brown, joined me, and a body of native levies, about 100 strong, was raised by Mr. G. H. Sangster, Travelling Commissioner, to furnish advanced picquets on the roads and to collect information. These levies wore a distinguishing badge of yellow, that in use by the French being red. Letters, informing me of the progress of his march, were received from Commandant Rouvel, commanding the French column, on the 18th and 21st March, the latter announcing that he hoped to be in the vicinity of Medina on the 23rd March.

23. At noon on that day the sound of the French guns reached our camps, and continued till 3.30 p.m., when the magazines were heard to explode. The following morning a letter from Commandant Rouvel reached me, announcing

that the town was bombarded from noon to 3.30 p.m., and stormed at 4 p.m. The Commandant suggested that I should visit his camp to discuss future operations.

On the 25th March I therefore proceeded to the French camp with my staff officers, and was most hospitably received. We were conducted over Medina, the buildings in which had been completely destroyed by the French guns, which, firing melinite shells, had effectually breached the walls. The losses of the French were two Tirailleurs killed and seven wounded, whilst of the enemy 150 were killed and 50 captured, amongst the former being Fodi Kabba himself. Owing to the fact that Musa Mullah's levies had not approached sufficiently near to the town when the attack was delivered, a large number of Fodi Kabba's followers, passing through the breaches, effected their escape in an easterly direction.

24. The French troops halted at Medina till the 28th, to await the arrival of a convoy of provisions and to rest, as they had suffered severely from the excessive heat. I placed a lighter at the disposal of Commandant Rouvel to facilitate his passage of the Vintang at Kusakong, and Lieutenant G. P. E. Hunt, D.S.O., Royal Navy, kindly volunteered to superintend the operation of crossing. The new objectives of the French were Nema and Dator.

To effectually co-operate with them the company of the West India Regiment moved, on the 26th March, eastward to Sotokoi and Jollofin, the three companies of the Central Africa Regiment occupying the frontier line from Dumbutu to Bumari, with a detached post at Sandeng.

25. Information was brought in by the native scouts that both Nema and Dator were deserted by their inhabitants after the fall of Medina, and that the latter town had been occupied by a detachment of Musa Mullah's troops. This information was immediately communicated to the French. In consequence, instead of the whole French force moving forward, a flying column, under Captain Forrestier, left Medina on the 28th March, and crossed the Vintang, at Kusakong, on the evening of that day by means of the lighter. Nema and Dator were destroyed, and information was brought to me that Dari Bana Dabu was a prisoner in the French camp.

26. The object of the expedition having been completely attained, I gave orders that the 2nd Central Africa Regiment, with the carriers, should embark on board the transport "Dwarka" at Tendebar on the 30th March, for conveyance to Sierra Leone and the Gold Coast Colony. I wrote to Commandant Rouvel, informing him of my intended movement and the reasons for it, and told him that a company of the West India Regiment, under Captain Long, would remain at Kwinella until such time as its presence was no longer considered necessary by him. Further, I requested that the captured murderers might be handed over to Captain Long, or to Mr. G. H. Sangster, Travelling Commissioner. A letter was addressed to Captain Forrestier, commanding the flying column, informing him of my movements.

The company of the West India Regiment will remain at Kwinella until the temporary repairs necessary for the occupation of the barracks at Bathurst have been completed.

27. With regard to the effect of the operations thus brought to an end, I am confident that no further trouble with the inhabitants of Gambia and the neighbouring French territory need be anticipated for many years to come, and the

trade, which appears to have suffered severely from the lawless state of the country, may be expected, both in Gambia and Casamance, to revive.

The natives have seen a heavy blow struck at Dumbutu, with such secrecy and celerity that the presence of troops in Gambia was altogether unknown to them. Those on the north bank witnessed the surprise of Salikeni and the arrest of all the chief agitators accomplished without the slightest resistance being possible.

Every district in Gambia in the least suspected of disaffection has been visited by troops, and the display of force should have a lasting effect. Of still greater importance has been the co-operation of the French forces with the British against a common enemy, and the total destruction of his power. These combined operations have been marked by the greatest cordiality and goodwill, and the natives have been taught that the boundary line no longer affords an asylum to criminals who flee from justice. This idea has hitherto proved a great stumbling-block to the pacification of the countries near the Gambia, and has now been destroyed.

28. In their dealings with the natives the conduct of the troops has been very good, for, although operating in a country largely disaffected, if not actually hostile, no complaints of ill-treatment by soldiers have been received. The heat during the last weeks has been intense, and officers and men have suffered considerably from it.

29. Most of the Europeans serving with the field force suffered from fever at different times, but the majority of the attacks were not sufficiently severe to oblige them to report themselves sick. The intense heat appears to have been the chief cause.

Amongst the native soldiers, both West Indian and Central African, the most prevalent complaints were dysentery and diarrhoea. I am inclined to attribute many of the cases amongst the West Indians to the quality of the rations of tinned meat issued to them. This has been made the subject of a special report to the Officer Commanding the troops at Sierra Leone.

30. To His Excellency Sir G. C. Denton, K.C.M.G., Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Gambia, my most sincere thanks are due. Sir George Denton accompanied several of the columns, and in every way in which he could do so, helped the progress of the expedition and added to the comfort of the troops. His advice and assistance to me were of the very greatest value.

31. I wish to bring prominently to notice the important part taken by the officers and men of H.M.S. "Forte," "Dwarf," and "Thrush" in the expedition. Without their assistance, always readily and cheerfully given, the transport of the troops and their supplies would have been matters of great difficulty. The work of constantly embarking and disembarking the troops was very heavy, and all operations of this nature were conducted by the officers and men of His Majesty's ships. I am also indebted to them for assisting me ashore. The number of officers at my disposal at the commencement of the operations was too small for the efficient organisation of the services of transport and supply, and the services of naval officers were placed at my disposal for these important duties, and in many other ways on different occasions I was given most valuable help.

32. To Captain R. C. Sparkes, Royal Navy,

Senior Naval Officer on the West Coast of Africa, my thanks are especially owed. The whole arrangements for the transport of troops, carriers, and stores from Sierra Leone and on the Gambia River were in his hands, and to the efficient and expeditious manner in which they were carried out the success of the expedition is largely due. In every manner possible Captain Sparkes went out of his way to assist me.

On Lieut.-Commander H. F. Shakespear, H.M.S. "Dwarf," and Lieut.-Commander W. H. D'Oyly, H.M.S. "Thrush," the main work of transporting the troops fell, and it was carried out in a most satisfactory and considerate manner. Both these officers served for short periods with the Central Africa Regiment, which was very short of officers when it arrived in Gambia. They did excellent service.

I have already mentioned Lieutenant F. Massey-Dawson. Lieutenants P. Johnson and J. M. Steel, with Mr. E. Holland, gunner, served with the transport at the beginning of the expedition, and carried out their unaccustomed duties completely to my satisfaction.

Fleet-Surgeon F. J. Lilly volunteered to organise a base hospital at Tendebar, as there were not sufficient medical officers to spare from the field columns for this duty. The hospital was a model of what it should be, and Fleet-Surgeon Lilly was untiring in his exertions.

I have also to thank Mr. W. H. Rothwell, Royal Naval Reserve, and the officers of the transport "Dwarka" for assistance cheerfully rendered me in many ways.

To Captain (temporary Major) H. Bryan, the Manchester Regiment, Chief Staff Officer, I am most indebted for valuable services rendered. On my arrival in Gambia I found that he had already made all the necessary preliminary arrangements, and throughout the operations Major Bryan performed his duties in a manner worthy of high praise. I consider him a most energetic and capable staff officer, and worthy of special notice.

Captain H. A. Thorne, the West India Regiment, acted throughout the expedition as Chief Transport Officer. He is hard working and able, and I beg to recommend him.

Captain L. R. Arthur, the Rifle Brigade, His Majesty's Consul at Dakar, was attached to my staff as Political Officer, and assisted me most loyally. He conducted the negotiations with the French authorities in Senegal, which resulted in the combined operations against Fodi Kabba being undertaken. I consider myself exceptionally fortunate in having had his assistance.

Captain (temporary Major) A. W. V. Plunkett, the Manchester Regiment, commanded the half battalion 2nd Central Africa Regiment, and was on more than one occasion in charge of detached columns. He is able and untiring, and has done very good service.

Lieutenant H. Hardy, Royal Army Medical Corps, is a hard-working and capable officer, and deserves my thanks. He accompanied me through Gambia, and did very good service. Mr. G. H. Sangster, Travelling Commissioner, Gambia, rendered good service in obtaining supplies, and during the operations against Fodi Kabba he did well at the head of the native levies.

Government Notice. No. 228.

His Honour the Officer administering the Government, having heard the opinion of the Council of Health, has been pleased to modify Government Notice No. 208 of the 6th August, 1901, and to direct that the following regulations be observed, viz.:—

1. The importation is forbidden of:

(a.) Cattle (except horses, mules, and asses) from Egypt, the Province of Naples, Calabria, and Salonica.

(b.) Wool, hides, skins, horns, bones, and hoofs from the above places and from countries where epidemic diseases are reported.

(c.) Cattle arriving from any place, if affected with any disease in view of which, in the opinion of the Chief Government Medical Officer, their admission into the lazaretto might prove detrimental to other cattle already in the Island.

2. Cattle which may be allowed to be landed under the conditions hereinafter specified, and subject to their being kept isolated and under observation in such of the enclosures at the lazaretto as may be assigned or approved for that purpose for the period hereinafter stated.

(a.) Cattle from the Black Sea, Sea of Azov, Syria, Roumelia, and Prevesa (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited), subject to three months' observation.

(b.) Cattle from the Regency of Tunis, Morocco, and Sardinia (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited), subjected to 15 days' observation.

(c.) Cattle from Sicily (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited) subjected to 10 days' observation.

(d.) Cattle from Bengazi (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited) subjected to two days' observation.

(e.) Horses, mules, and asses from Egypt, the Province of Naples, Calabria, Salonica, and Turkey in Asia, subjected to three days' observation, provided that such horses, mules, and asses shall be released, after inspection at the lazaretto, if the owner undertake to keep the animals in a place approved of by the Collector of Customs, and to cause them to be inspected by a Government Medical Officer or Veterinary Surgeon twice a week for nine weeks.

The cattle referred to in this paragraph shall not be allowed to be landed unless the consignee shall have in each case and before shipment made a written application, stating the approximate number of animals intended to be imported, and obtained the necessary permission after having agreed to abide by any regulations which may be established. Such application shall imply that the consignee has bound himself to abide by any regulations which may be in force on the day of importation, or which may be issued during the time in which the cattle may have to remain in quarantine, and also to pay the entrance fees, fees for guards, and other fees for ordinary or extraordinary expenses usually levied on cattle at the lazaretto.

3. Swine.

(a.) Swine arriving from the ports of Turkey and Greece, except those referred to in sections 1 and 2, will be subjected to eight days' observation at the lazaretto.

4. General Provisions.

All cattle intended for importation into these Islands must be accompanied by a certificate from the British Consular Authority, or, in default, of the Local Government Authority of the places of origin and embarkation, stating that cattle disease has not been officially reported in those places during the three months previous to the date of embarkation.

The term cattle includes horses, mules, asses, animals of the bovine species, sheep, goats, and swine.

5. Vessels with Cattle on Board.

Vessels arriving in this Island, having on board more than 250 head of cattle (bovine), are to go into the quarantine harbour, and the cattle are to be inspected in the cattle enclosures of the lazaretto.

Aberdeenshire and Kincardineshire.—An Area comprising the parishes of Belhelvie, New Machar, Fintroy, Kinellar, Dyce, Old Machar, Newhills, Skene, Echt, Drumoak, and Peterculter, in the administrative county of Aberdeen; and the parishes of Maryculter, Banchory Devenick, and Nigg, in the administrative county of Kincardine; and also comprising the city of Aberdeen (6 July, 1901).

Bedfordshire.—An Area comprising the petty sessional division of Luton, and the borough of Dunstable, in the administrative county of Bedford (23 August, 1901).

Berkshire.—See under *Oxfordshire and Berkshire.*

Buckinghamshire.—(1.) An Area comprising the petty sessional divisions of Stoke and Burnham, and the parishes of Hughenden, West Wycombe, Chepping Wycombe Rural, Little Marlow, Wooburn, and Hedsor, in the administrative county of Buckingham; and also comprising the borough of Chepping Wycombe (6 September, 1900).
