WHEREAS by "The Medical Act, 1886," it is provided (amongst other things) that His Majesty may from time to time by Order in Council declare that the second part of the said Act shall be deemed on and after a day to be named in such Order, to apply to any British possession which in His Majesty's opinion affords to the medical practitioners of the United Kingdom such privileges of practising in the said British possession as to His Majesty may seem just, and that from and after the day named in such Order in Council such British possession shall be deemed to be a British possession to which the said Act applies, within the meaning of the second part thereof, and that until such Order in Council has been made in respect of any British possession, the said second part of the said Act shall not be deemed to apply to any such possession.

And whereas the Island of Malta is a British possession within the meaning of the said Act, and affords, in His Majesty's opinion, to the registered medical practitioners of the United Kingdom such privileges of practising in the said Island as to His Majesty seem just.

Now, therefore, His Majesty doth hereby, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, order, direct, and declare that on and after the first day of October, one thousand nine hundred and one, the second part of the Medical Act, 1886, shall be deemed to apply to the Island of Malta.

WHEREAS by "The Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, from time to time, by Order in Council, to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of that Act, and to make regulations in relation to any Dockyard Port for all or any of the purposes in the said Act particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary, with a view to the proper protection of His Majesty's vessels, dockyards, or property, or to the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service:

And whereas the Harbour of Berehaven is a "Dockyard Port" within the meaning of the said Act:

And whereas it appears expedient to the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service that the limits of the Dockyard Port of Berehaven should be defined:

And whereas the provisions of section one of "The Rules Publication Act" have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act, or otherwise in Him vested, is pleased, on the recommendation of the Admiralty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Preliminary.

1. This Order shall take effect from the first day of October, one thousand nine hundred and one.

2. In this Order, unless the context shall otherwise require, the terms "Vessel," "Master," and "Justice" shall have the same meaning as in the said Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, and the term "the said Dockyard Port" shall mean the Dockyard Port of Berehaven, as described in paragraph three hereof.

Dockyard Port of Berehaven.

3. For the purposes of the said Act and of this Order, the limits of the Dockyard Port of Berehaven shall be as follows:—

All the waters, bays, and creeks so far as the tide flows lying between the lines drawn as follows:—

On the east, a line drawn south true through the western extreme of Bull Island to a position six thousand four hundred yards from the la

thence west true to a position south true from Clonaghlin Point, and thence to Clonaghlin Point.

At the west entrance a line drawn from the extremity of Fair Head to the extremity of Shee Head.

Delineation of Limits.

4. On the chart accompanying this Order are drawn all the limits referred to herein.

5. The regulations contained in the Schedule hereto are hereby made, and shall have effect in relation to the Dockyard Port of Berehaven.

SCHEDULE.

General.

(1.) Moorings for His Majesty's ships, mark buoys, and other aids to navigation, and such other buoys as may be required for any purpose in connection with naval or military operations, shall be placed by the King's Harbour Master as, from time to time, the requirements of His Majesty's service may demand.

(2.) Moorings for private vessels shall not be laid in the said Dockyard Port without the permission, in writing, of the King's Harbour Master, and in such positions as he shall deem fit, and such moorings shall be forthwith removed on the requisition of the King's Harbour Master to that effect.

(3.) If at any time the anchor of any merchant or other private vessel hooks any Government moorings, or any electric cables or moorings of buoys, the Master, or other person having the charge or command of such vessel shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice thereof to the Senior Naval Officer, or to the King's Harbour Master, in order that aid may be given for clearing such moorings or cables without doing damage to the same.

(4.) No merchant, or other private vessel, shall make fast to, or lie at, any of the buoys marking the channels or shoals in the Dockyard Port.

(5.) No merchant, or other private vessel, shall, without license in writing from the Senior Naval Officer or the King's Harbour Master, be moored or fastened to any of the forts, nor to any Government moorings, buoys, piles, or vessels, in the Dockyard Port.

(6.) Whenever it may be necessary for mining or gunnery operations or experiments, dredging operations, or other naval or military purposes, to reserve any area for such operations or purposes, the area will be marked by buoys coloured green and white, or by posts coloured red; and after twenty-one days' warning notice has been issued by the Admiralty, and published in the "Dublin Gazette," no vessel shall anchor within, or pass through, the area so marked, unless compelled to do so by stress of weather, or to avoid accident, nor when such area is uncovered or nearly uncovered at low water shall any person pass through it, or remain in it, unless by permission of, and under such arrangements as may be from time to time made by the Officer in charge of such operations.

(7.) No merchant, or other private vessel, shall anchor on the lines of any electric cable laid down in the Dockyard Port when such line is indicated by whitewashed posts, or other discernible marks erected on shore and a warning has been conveyed to mariners by notice issued by the Admiralty and published in the "Dublin Gazette."

(8.) Whenever practice is taking place at the Naval Rifle Range on Bere Island, a red flag will be hoisted at the flag-staff east of Perrin, to warn vessels not to cross the range, the danger area of

which extends in an easterly direction from the peninsula south of Lonehort Harbour for a distance of a mile and a half.

When such red flag is hoisted, no vessel shall approach the east entrance until the perch on Carrigavaddra bears westward of N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. magnetic.

(9.) Whenever it may be necessary for naval purposes to obstruct the east entrance by mines, booms, or other obstacles, no vessel shall use, or attempt to use, the east entrance. Warning will be given by the signal of the International Code of Signals FQ., "Entrance is Dangerous," hoisted at the flag-staff east of Perrin.

Anchorage Regulations.

(10.) All merchant or other private vessels shall be subject to the direction of the King's Harbour Master.

(11.) The anchorage in Berehaven from the east entrance to a line drawn north and south true through the western extreme of Minane Island shall be for the exclusive use of His Majesty's ships and vessels of war, and no merchant or other private vessels shall anchor to eastward of the above-mentioned line without the permission of the Senior Naval Officer or of the King's Harbour Master, and no vessel shall be anchored in such a position as to obstruct the fairway by the western entrance.

(12.) The master of every merchant or private vessel to which this Order relates shall observe, and cause to be observed, the said regulations as far as relates to his vessel, and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the said regulations, or fails to observe, and cause the same to be observed, he shall, for every such offence, be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of ten pounds.

In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the thirty-first day of October next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation one month before the said thirty-first day of October.

(b.) In such earthen graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground of the bodies of any

members of the family of any of the persons heretofore buried in such graves.

- (c.) In the churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burial may be allowed at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground of the body of any member of the family to which such grave space may be allotted.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the thirty-first day of October next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the *London Gazette*, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation one month before the said thirty-first day of October.

BLACKFORDBY.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Margaret, Blackfordby, in the county of Leicester; and in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such vault be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen or partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the bodies of any members of the family of any of the persons heretofore buried in such graves.

(c.) In the churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family to which such grave space may be allotted.

WASHINGTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Holy Trinity, Washington, in the county of Durham; and in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such vault or grave

be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen or partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the bodies of any members of the family of any of the persons heretofore buried in such graves.

GEDNEY.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Mary Magdalene, Gedney, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire; and in the churchyard after the expiration of twelve months from the date of the Order, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the bodies of members of the family of any of the persons heretofore buried in such graves.

SHINFIELD.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Mary, Shinfield in the county of Berks; and in the churchyard, after the thirty-first day of March, one thousand nine hundred and two, except as follows :—

In such vaults as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such vault be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

MELBOURN.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of All Saints, Melbourn, in the county of Cambridge; and in the churchyard, after the thirty-first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and two, except as follows :—

In such vaults or walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

YARDLEY.—Forthwith and entirely in "Job Marston" Chapel, Hall Green, in the parish of Yardley, in the county of Worcester; and in the chapelry, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and walled graves as are now existing in the chapelry burials may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves as are now existing in the chapelry burials may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the bodies of members of the family of any of the persons heretofore buried in such graves.

KNIPTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Baptist Chapel at Knipton, in the county of Leicester, and in the burial ground attached thereto.

(b.) In such earthen graves as are now existing in the said last-mentioned portion of the churchyard burials may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the bodies of any members of the family of any of the persons heretofore buried in such graves.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the thirty-first day of October next.

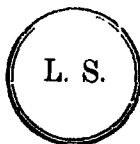
