CORONATION OF THEIR MAJESTIES.

COURT OF CLAIMS.

THE Right Honourable the Commissioners appointed by His Majesty to hear and determine all Claims of Services to be performed at the time of the ensuing Coronation (except those dispensed with by His Majesty's Royal Proclamation of the 26th day of June last), and of fees to be received for the same, at their last meeting held at the Council Office, Whitehall, on the 17th day of July last, resolved as follows:—

1. All Claims must be made by Petition. Petitions may be sent under cover to the Clerks of the Court of Claims, Privy Council Office, Whitehall.
2. Petitioners are not required to appear in person before the Court, unless summoned.
3. Petitioners may appear by Solicitors, Agents, or Counsel.
4. If a Claim was admitted in 1838, the Court will forthwith admit such Claim, provided the Commissioners are satisfied that the present Petitioner represents the person whose Claim was admitted in 1838, and that there is no counter-claim.
5. Petitioners to be requested to present their Claims on or before the 31st day of October, 1901.

The Court stood adjourned till some day in the month of November next, of which notice will be given in the London Gazette.

The Commissioners are required by the Proclamation to exclude from their consideration such claims as may be submitted to them in respect of rights or services connected with the parts of the Ceremonial heretofore performed in Westminster Hall and with the Procession, the Ceremony being confined to Westminster Abbey.

WHEREAS, by an Order in Council dated the nineteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, pro-

vision has been made for the surrender by the Government of the Straits Settlements to Foreign States in the case of which the Extradition Act, 1870, does not apply, of persons accused or convicted of the commission of certain crimes and offences within the jurisdiction of such States:

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, the said Order of the nineteenth of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, was amended:

And whereas it is expedient to further amend the said Order of the nineteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine:

Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, as follows:—

1. The said Order in Council of the nineteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and this Order shall be read and construed as one Order.

2. The said Order in Council of the nineteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, may be cited as The Straits Settlements Extradition Order, 1889, and this Order may be cited as The Straits Settlements Extradition Order, 1901.

3. The Straits Settlements Extradition Order, 1889, shall continue to be construed and take effect as if the territory of the British North Borneo Company had been specified in the second schedule thereto, and the said territory shall be deemed to be a "Protected State" for the purposes of the said Order.

4. In Clause 13 of the Straits Settlements Extradition Order, 1889, the expression "Minister of State" shall in the case of any of the protected States (except the territory of the British North Borneo Company) include any officer appointed by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, by His Majesty, or by the Governor as Resident-General, Resident, or Secretary to the Resident in such State, and shall in the case of the territory of the British North Borneo Company mean the Principal Representative for the time being of the British North Borneo Company in North Borneo.

The said Order in Council of the twenty-sixth day of October one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six is hereby revoked without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder.

WHEREAS by Letters Patent passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland bearing date the thirteenth of January one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, provision was made for the government of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria's Settlements on the Gold Coast, and it was provided that the Gold Coast Colony of Her said late Majesty should, until Her Majesty should otherwise provide, comprise all places, settlements, and territories belonging to Her Majesty on the Gold Coast in Western Africa between the fifth degree of west longitude and the second degree of east longitude, and the Legislative Council of the said Colony was empowered, subject to any conditions, provisos, and limitations prescribed by any Instructions under Her Majesty's Sign Manual and Signet to establish such Ordinances not being repugnant to the law of England and to constitute such courts and offices, and to make such provisions and regulations for the proceedings in such courts, and for the administration of justice as might be necessary for the peace, order, and good government of the Colony:

And whereas it is expedient that the boundaries of the Gold Coast Colony should be further defined and that all such portions of the territories on the West Coast of Africa, within the limits hereinafter defined, which have not already been included within His Majesty's dominions should be annexed to, and should henceforth form part of, the said Gold Coast Colony:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

I. This Order may be cited as the Gold Coast Order in Council, 1901.

II. The limits of this Order shall be the territories on the West Coast of Africa which are bounded as follows, namely:—On the south by the Atlantic Ocean; on the west by the line of the frontier between the British and French possessions from the sea to a point on the frontier one thousand metres to the south of Aburuferasi; on the north by a line drawn from the last-mentioned point through the point where the road from Mem to Patubosu crosses the Tano River to the right bank of the River Ofin, then along this bank to the confluence of the Ofin with the River Prah, then along the left bank of the Prah to the point where the road from Obo to Bompata crosses the river, then due north until it meets the parallel of latitude which passes through Agogo, then straight to the point where the road from Abetifi to Attabubu crosses the River Sumi near Suminsu, then straight to the village of Achriang, and then straight to a point on the left bank of the Volta River due west of the village of Krobo; and on the east by the line of the frontier between the British and German possessions southwards to the Atlantic Ocean.

III. All such parts of the territories within the limits aforesaid as have not heretofore been included in His Majesty's dominions shall be, and the same are hereby annexed to His Majesty's dominions, and the whole of the said territories are declared to be part and parcel of His Majesty's Gold Coast Colony in like manner, and to all

intents and purposes as if all such territories had formed part of the said Colony, at the date of the said Letters Patent of thirteenth January one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

IV. It shall be competent for the Governor of the Gold Coast Colony, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council of the said Colony, to make laws for the peace, order, and good government of the said territories.

V. As and from the date of the coming into operation of this Order, all laws and Ordinances which shall at such date be in force in the territories heretofore known as the Gold Coast Colony, shall take effect within the limits of this Order, and shall remain in force therein until the same shall have been altered or repealed by the Governor of the Gold Coast Colony, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, or by His Majesty.

VI. This Order shall come into operation on a day to be fixed by the Governor of the Gold Coast Colony by a Proclamation published in the Gold Coast Government Gazette.

And the Right Honourable Joseph Chamberlain, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS His Majesty has power and jurisdiction within divers countries on the West Coast of Africa near or adjacent to His Majesty's Gold Coast Colony:

And whereas by an Order of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, it was provided that it should be lawful for the Legislative Council for the time being of the Gold Coast Colony, by Ordinance or Ordinances, to exercise and provide for giving effect to all such powers and jurisdiction as Her late Majesty might at any time before or after the passing of the said Order in Council have acquired in the said countries near or adjacent to the Gold Coast Colony, and certain other provisions were by the said Order made for such purpose:

And whereas it is expedient to revoke the said Order in Council of the twenty-ninth day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven:

Now therefore His Majesty, in pursuance of the powers by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

I. The Order of the twenty-ninth day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven is hereby revoked.

II. All Ordinances or reputed Ordinances enacted or purporting to have been enacted by the Legislative Council for the time being of the Gold Coast Colony, for the purpose of giving effect to any such powers and jurisdiction as Her late Majesty may at any time before or after the passing of the said Order in Council, or before or after the respective dates of such Ordinances, have acquired in the said territories near or adjacent to

the Gold Coast Colony which have received the assent of Her late Majesty in Council, or which have received the assent of the Governor of the said Colony in the name and on behalf of Her late Majesty or of His Majesty, shall be, and shall be deemed to have been, valid and effectual from the date of such assent for all purposes whatever; provided that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to give effect to any Ordinance which has been disallowed by Her late Majesty, or which has expired or has been lawfully repealed, or to prevent the lawful disallowance or repeal of any such Ordinance.

III. All acts done within the territories aforesaid, under authority of the said Order in Council of the twenty-ninth day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven in the exercise of the powers and authorities granted or purporting to be granted thereby within the territories aforesaid, shall be and are hereby declared to be and to have been done lawfully.

IV. This Order shall come into operation on a day to be fixed by the Governor of the Gold Coast Colony, by notice published in the Gold Coast Government Gazette.

And the Right Honourable Joseph Chamberlain, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," passed in the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty to hold, exercise, and enjoy, any jurisdiction which Her Majesty then had and might at any time thereafter have within a foreign country in the same and as ample a manner as if Her Majesty had acquired that jurisdiction by the cession or conquest of territory:

And whereas the territories of West Africa, situate within the limits of this Order, as hereinafter described, are under the protection of His Majesty the King:

And whereas by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, His Majesty has power and jurisdiction in the said territories:

And whereas it is necessary to provide for the peace, order, and good government of the territories aforesaid:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

I. This Order may be cited as the Northern Territories Order in Council, 1901.

II. Until further provision be made in respect thereof the limits of this Order are the territories which are bounded on the south by the eighth parallel of north latitude, on the west and north by the line of the frontier between the British and French possessions, and on the east by the line of the frontier between the British and German possessions.

The territories so bounded shall be known as

the Northern Territories of the Gold Coast, and are hereinafter referred to as the Northern Territories.

III. In this Order, unless the subject or context otherwise requires—

"His Majesty" includes His Majesty's heirs and successors.

"Secretary of State" means one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

"Treaty" includes any existing or future treaty, convention, agreement, or arrangement, made by or on behalf of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria or His Majesty with any civilized Power, or with any native tribe, people, chief, or king, and any regulation appended to any such treaty, convention, agreement, or arrangement.

"Gazette" means the Gold Coast Government Gazette.

"Governor" includes the Officer for the time being administering the Government of the Gold Coast Colony.

IV. The Governor of the Gold Coast Colony may, on His Majesty's behalf, exercise all powers and jurisdiction which His Majesty, at any time before or after the date of this Order, had, or may have, within the Northern Territories, and to that end may take or cause to be taken all such measures, and may do or cause to be done all such matters and things therein as are lawful, and as in the interest of His Majesty's service he may think expedient, subject to such instructions as he may from time to time receive from His Majesty, or through a Secretary of State.

V. Subject to the approval of a Secretary of State, the Governor may appoint a Chief Commissioner and so many fit persons as, in the interest of His Majesty's service, he may think necessary to be Commissioners, Judges, Magistrates, or other Officers, and may define from time to time the districts within which such Officers shall respectively discharge their functions.

Every such Officer may exercise such powers and authorities as the Governor may, with the like approval, assign to him, subject nevertheless to such directions and instructions as the Governor may from time to time think fit to give him. The appointment of such Officers shall not abridge, alter, or affect the right of the Governor to execute and discharge all the powers and authorities hereby conferred upon him.

The Governor may, subject to confirmation by a Secretary of State, remove any Officer so appointed.

VI. In the exercise of the powers and authorities hereby conferred upon him, the Governor may, amongst other things, from time to time by Ordinance provide for the administration of justice, the raising of revenue, and generally for the peace, order, and good government of the Northern Territories, and of all persons therein, including the prohibition and punishment of acts tending to disturb the public peace.

The Governor, in issuing such Ordinances, shall respect any native laws by which the civil relations of any native chiefs, tribes, or populations under His Majesty's protection are now regulated, except so far as the same may be incompatible with the due exercise of His Majesty's power and jurisdiction, or clearly injurious to the welfare of the said natives.

VII. Every Ordinance of the Governor shall be published in the Gazette, and shall from and after a date to be mentioned in such Ordinance, and thereafter until disallowed by His Majesty, or repealed or modified by any subsequent Ordinance, have effect as if contained in this Order, and the Governor shall take such measures as he

thinks proper for giving due publicity thereto within the Northern Territories.

VIII. His Majesty may disallow any such Ordinance wholly or in part, and may signify such disallowance by Order in Council or through a Secretary of State, and upon such disallowance being notified in the Gazette, the provisions so disallowed shall, from and after a date to be mentioned in such notification, cease to have effect, but without prejudice to anything theretofore lawfully done thereunder. Due notification shall be publicly made by the Governor within the Northern Territories of the disallowance of any such Ordinance.

IX. The Governor shall use the Public Seal of the Gold Coast Colony for sealing all things whatsoever relating to the Northern Territories that are required to be under the Public Seal.

X. The Governor may, upon sufficient cause to him appearing, suspend from the exercise of his office any person holding or exercising any office within the Northern Territories, whether appointed by the Governor or under or by virtue of any Commission or Warrant granted, or which may be granted, by His Majesty in His Majesty's name or under His Majesty's authority, which suspension shall continue and have effect only until His Majesty's pleasure therein shall be signified to the Governor by a Secretary of State. The Governor, in proceeding to any such suspension, shall observe the directions in that behalf given to him by any instructions from His Majesty or signified through a Secretary of State.

XI. The Governor, or in the absence of the Governor from the Northern Territories the Chief Commissioner, may, as he shall see occasion, when any crime has been committed within the Northern Territories, or for which the offender may be tried therein, grant a pardon, in His Majesty's name, to any accomplice, not being the actual perpetrator of such crime, who shall give such information and evidence as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of the principal offender; and further, may grant to any offender convicted of any crime in any court, or before any Judge, Justice, Magistrate, or other Officer within the Northern Territories a pardon, either free or subject to lawful conditions, or any respite of the execution of the sentence of any such offender, for such period as to the Governor, or, in the absence of the Governor from the Northern Territories, to the Chief Commissioner, may seem fit, and may remit any fines, penalties, or forfeitures which may become due and payable.

XII. This Order shall be published in the Gazette, and shall thereupon come into operation, and the Governor shall give directions for the publication of this Order at such places, and in such manner, and for such time or times as he thinks proper for giving due publicity thereto within the Northern Territories.

XIII. His Majesty may from time to time revoke, alter, add to, or amend this Order.

And the Right Honourable Joseph Chamberlain, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the territories in West Africa situate within the limits of this Order, heretofore known as Ashanti, have been conquered by His Majesty's forces, and it has seemed expedient to His Majesty that the said territories should be annexed to and should henceforth form part of His Majesty's dominions, and that provision should be made for the peace, order, and good government of the said territories in manner hereinafter provided:

Now therefore His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

I. This Order may be cited as the Ashanti Order in Council, 1901.

II. Until further provision be made in respect thereof the limits of this Order are the territories which are bounded as follows:—On the south by the Colony of the Gold Coast; on the west by the line of the frontier between the British and French possessions from a point on that frontier 1,000 metres to the south of Aburuferasi to the point where the frontier cuts the eighth parallel of north latitude; on the north by the eighth parallel of north latitude; and on the east by the line of the frontier between the British and German possessions from the point where that frontier cuts the eighth parallel of north latitude to a point on the left bank of the Volta River due west of the village of Krobo.

III. In this Order, unless the subject or context otherwise requires,—

“His Majesty” includes His Majesty's heirs and successors.

“Secretary of State” means one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

“Treaty” includes any existing or future Treaty, Convention, Agreement, or Arrangement, made by or on behalf of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria or His Majesty with any civilized power or with any native tribe, people, chief, or king, and any regulation appended to any such Treaty, Convention, Agreement, or Arrangement.

“Gazette” means the Gold Coast Government Gazette.

“Governor” includes the Officer for the time being administering the Government of the Gold Coast Colony.

IV. From and after the coming into operation of this Order the aforesaid territories shall be annexed to and form part of His Majesty's dominions and shall be known as Ashanti.

V. The Governor of the Gold Coast Colony may, on His Majesty's behalf, exercise all powers and jurisdiction of His Majesty within Ashanti, and to that end may take or cause to be taken all such measures, and may do or cause to be done all such matters and things therein as are lawful, and as in the interest of His Majesty's service he may think expedient, subject to such instructions as he may from time to time receive from His Majesty, or through a Secretary of State.

VI. Subject to the approval of a Secretary of State, the Governor may appoint a Chief Commissioner and so many fit persons as, in the interest of His Majesty's service, he may think

necessary to be Commissioners, Judges, Magistrates, or other Officers, and may define from time to time the districts within which such Officers shall respectively discharge their functions.

Every such Officer may exercise such powers and authorities as the Governor may, with the like approval, assign to him, subject nevertheless to such directions and instructions as the Governor may from time to time think fit to give him. The appointment of such Officers shall not abridge, alter, or affect the right of the Governor to execute and discharge all the powers and authorities hereby conferred upon him.

The Governor may, subject to confirmation by a Secretary of State, remove any Officer so appointed.

VII. In the exercise of the powers and authorities hereby conferred upon him, the Governor may, amongst other things, from time to time by Ordinance provide for the administration of justice, the raising of revenue, and generally for the peace, order, and good government of Ashanti, and of all persons therein, including the prohibition and punishment of acts tending to disturb the public peace.

The Governor in issuing such Ordinances, shall respect any native laws by which the civil relations of any native chiefs, tribes, or populations under His Majesty's protection are now regulated, except so far as the same may be incompatible with the due exercise of His Majesty's power and jurisdiction, or clearly injurious to the welfare of the said natives.

VIII. Every Ordinance of the Governor shall be published in the Gazette, and shall, unless otherwise provided, thereupon come into operation and thereafter shall, until disallowed by His Majesty or repealed or modified by any subsequent Ordinance, have effect as if contained in this Order, and the Governor shall take such measures as he thinks proper for giving due publicity thereto within Ashanti.

IX. His Majesty may disallow any such Ordinance wholly or in part, and may signify such disallowance by Order in Council or through a Secretary of State, and upon such disallowance being notified in the Gazette, the provisions so disallowed shall, from and after a date to be mentioned in such notification, cease to have effect, but without prejudice to anything theretofore lawfully done thereunder. Due notification shall be publicly made by the Governor within Ashanti of the disallowance of any such Ordinance.

X. The Governor shall use the Public Seal of the Gold Coast Colony for sealing all things whatsoever relating to Ashanti that are required to be under the public seal.

XI. The Governor may, upon sufficient cause to him appearing, suspend from the exercise of his office any person holding or exercising any office within Ashanti whether appointed by the Governor or under or by virtue of any Commission or Warrant granted, or which may be granted by His Majesty in His Majesty's name or under His Majesty's authority, which suspension shall continue and have effect only until His Majesty's pleasure therein shall be signified to the Governor by a Secretary of State. The Governor, in proceeding to any such suspension, shall observe the directions in that behalf given to him by any instructions from His Majesty or signified through a Secretary of State.

XII. The Governor, or in the absence of the Governor from Ashanti the Chief Commissioner, may, as he shall see occasion, when any crime has been committed within Ashanti, or for which the offender may be tried therein, grant a pardon,

in His Majesty's name, to any accomplice, not being the actual perpetrator of such crime, who shall give such information and evidence as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of the principal offender; and further, may grant to any offender convicted of any crime in any court, or before any Judge, Justice, Magistrate, or other Officer within Ashanti, a pardon, either free or subject to lawful conditions, or any respite of the execution of the sentence of any such offender, for such period as to the Governor, or in the absence of the Governor from Ashanti to the Chief Commissioner, may seem fit, and may remit any fines, penalties, or forfeiture, which may become due and payable.

XIII. This Order shall be published in the Gazette, and shall thereupon come into operation, and the Governor shall give directions for the publication of this Order at such places, and in such manner, and for such time or times as he thinks proper for giving due publicity thereto within Ashanti.

XIV. His Majesty may from time to time revoke, alter, add to, or amend this Order.

And the Right Honourable Joseph Chamberlain, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by sub-section (one) of section two hundred and thirty-eight of "The Merchant Shipping Act 1894" it is provided that where it appears to His Majesty that due facilities are or will be given by the Government of any foreign country for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in that country His Majesty may by Order in Council stating that such facilities are or will be given declare that that section shall apply in the case of such foreign country subject to any limitations conditions and qualifications contained in the Order. And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the Government of the Republic of Honduras gives and will give due facilities for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in that country.

Now therefore His Majesty by virtue of the power vested in him by the hereinbefore recited sub-section (one) of section two hundred and thirty-eight of "The Merchant Shipping Act 1894" and by and with the advice of His Privy Council is pleased to order and declare that the said section two hundred and thirty-eight of "The Merchant Shipping Act 1894" shall apply in the case of the Republic of Honduras.

And the Right Honourable Charles Thomson Ritchie, the Right Honourable Joseph Chamberlain, and the Right Honourable Lord George Hamilton, three of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by the provisions of "The Patents Designs and Trade Marks Act 1883" as amended by "The Patents Designs

and Trade Marks (Amendment) Act 1885" it is amongst other things provided.—

That if His Majesty is pleased to make any arrangement with the Government or Governments of any Foreign State or States for mutual protection of inventions, designs and trade marks, or any of them, then any person who has applied for protection for any invention design or trade mark in any such State shall, subject to the conditions further provided and set forth in the said Act, be entitled to a patent for his invention, or to registration of his design or trade mark (as the case may be) under the said Act, in priority to other applicants, and such patent or registration shall have the same date as the date of the application in such Foreign State :

And whereas it pleased Her late Majesty Queen Victoria to make an arrangement with the Republic of Honduras of the nature contemplated by the said Act by and in virtue of a Treaty of friendship commerce and navigation signed and sealed by Her late Majesty's Minister Resident and Consul-General to the Republic of Honduras and sealed by the Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the said Republic at Guatemala in the Republic of Guatemala on the twenty-first day of January one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven ratifications whereof together with two explanatory protocols dated respectively the twenty-first day of January one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven and third day of February one thousand nine hundred were duly exchanged at Guatemala aforesaid on the third day of February, one thousand nine hundred :

And whereas it is provided by Article VIII of the said Treaty that the subjects or citizens of each of the contracting parties shall have in the dominions and possessions of the other the same rights as natives or as subjects or citizens of the most-favoured-nation in regard to patents for inventions trade marks and designs and the protection of industrial property upon the fulfilment of the formalities prescribed by law :

Now therefore His Majesty by and with the advice and consent of His Privy Council and by virtue of the authority committed to Him by the said Act, doth declare and it is hereby declared that from and after the date of this Order the provisions of the said Act amended as aforesaid and hereinbefore specified shall apply to the following country, viz. :—

Republic of Honduras.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the twenty-fifth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and one, in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas by Article two thousand one hundred and seventy-three, paragraph six, of the Regulations for the Government of Your Majesty's Naval Service, money allowances at the rate of one

shilling or two shillings a week, according to circumstances, may be paid from the funds of Greenwich Hospital to naval pensioners admitted into hospitals or infirmaries, and whereas we deem it expedient to extend the payment of the allowance to men who may not be naval pensioners,

"We beg leave to recommend that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to authorize the payment of the allowance at the minimum rate of one shilling a week to non-pensioners—to take effect from the twelfth day of November one thousand nine hundred."

And whereas the provisions of section one of "The Rules Publication Act, 1893," have been complied with.

His Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

And whereas the Corporation of the Guild or Brotherhood of Masters and Pilots Seamen of the Trinity House in Kingston-upon-Hull, being a Pilotage authority within the meaning of the said Act, have in exercise of the powers vested in them by that Act, made certain bye-laws fixing the rates to be demanded and received for Pilotage between the Ports of Hull and Goole, and for reducing the Commission formerly payable to the Pilot Master at Goole for collection of Pilotage, keeping the accounts, and general management :

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the said bye-laws should be confirmed for a limited period :

And whereas the immediate operation of this Order is urgent :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Him by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," and by and with the advice of His Privy Council is pleased to approve of and doth by this Order confirm the said bye-laws as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, and to declare that they shall be in force until the second day of September, one thousand nine hundred and four, and be *provisional* within the meaning of "The Rules Publication Act, 1893."

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Acts 1860 and 1898, namely, the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and forty-two, and the Act of the sixty-first and sixty-second years of Her said late Majesty chapter twenty-three duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the second day of May, in the year one thousand nine hundred and one, in the words and figures following, that is to say :—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Acts 1860 and 1898, namely, the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and forty-two, and the Act of the sixty-first and sixty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter twenty-three, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting an union of two contiguous benefices within the Metropolis and within the city and diocese of London, namely, the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Mary-at-Hill with Saint Andrew Hubbard and the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint George Botolph-lane with Saint Botolph Billingsgate and for effecting certain other measures incidental to or arising out of such union.

“ Whereas the patronage of the said benefice of Saint Mary-at-Hill with Saint Andrew Hubbard is vested, as to one moiety, in Richard Davis Odell of number 15 Lower Thames-street, Fish

Factor; Sidney Lambert Odell, also of number 15, Lower Thames-street, Fish Factor, Percy Bence Trower, of number 39, Saint Mary-at-Hill, Wine Merchant, Ernest Frederic Calrow, of number 36, Saint Mary-at-Hill, Wine Importer, Alfred Edward Ellen, of number 33 Saint Mary-at-Hill, Wholesale Tea Dealer, Richard Joseph Grant, of number 10 Love-lane, Eastcheap, Fruit Broker; William Read of number 14 Saint Mary-at-Hill, Rope and Net Maker, and Henry Alfred Roper of number 36, Saint Mary-at-Hill, Wholesale Tea Dealer, being parishioners of Saint Mary-at-Hill their heirs and assigns, in trust for the said parish of Saint Mary-at-Hill and as to the other moiety in the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Bishop of London alternately.

“ And whereas the patronage of the said benefice of Saint George Botolph-lane with Saint Botolph, Billingsgate, is vested in Your Majesty your heirs and successors and in the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London alternately.

“ And whereas the late Bishop of the said diocese of London caused proposals for a scheme for effecting an union of the said two benefices, to be laid before us, which proposals were prepared under the seventh and eighth sections of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act, and were approved by the said late Bishop of London and were assented to by the patrons of the said benefice of Saint Mary-at-Hill with Saint Andrew Hubbard and by the Right Honourable Arthur James Balfour, First Lord of the Treasury, on behalf of Her said late Majesty, and by the said Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London as the patrons of the said benefice of Saint George Botolph-lane, with Saint Botolph, Billingsgate and the same proposals were also assented to, subject to certain modifications, by

the Vestry of the parish of Saint Mary-at-Hill, by the Vestry of the parish of Saint Andrew Hubbard, and by the united Vestry of the parishes of Saint George Botolph-lane and Saint Botolph, Billingsgate.

"And whereas it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England to be expedient that the said proposed union of the said two benefices should be effected and that such arrangements relating thereto and to the other matters hereinafter referred to should be made as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Arthur Foley, now Bishop of London, as such Bishop, and the patrons of the said two benefices, and the vestries of the said parishes respectively, are willing that the scheme for effecting the said union should embody certain modifications of the said proposals and this present scheme does embody the same modifications accordingly, but otherwise is based upon the said proposals.

"And whereas the said Richard Davis Odell, Sidney Lambert Odell, Percy Bence Trower, Ernest Frederic Calrow, Alfred Edward Ellen, Richard Joseph Grant, William Read, and Henry Alfred Roper, as the trustees on behalf of the parish of Saint Mary-at-Hill would be entitled to present to the said benefice of Saint Mary-at-Hill with Saint Andrew Hubbard, if the same were now vacant.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said Richard Davis Odell, Sidney Lambert Odell, Percy Bence Trower, Ernest Frederic Calrow, Alfred Edward Ellen, Richard Joseph Grant, William Read, and Henry Alfred Roper (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick, Archbishop of Canterbury (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and Archiepiscopal seal), and with the consent of the said Arthur James Balfour (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul, in London (in testimony whereof they have to this scheme set their common or capitular seal) and with the consents of the vestries of the said parishes of Saint Mary-at-Hill, Saint Andrew Hubbard, Saint George, Botolph-lane and Saint Botolph, Billingsgate (in testimony of which consent this scheme is signed, in the case of each of the said vestries, by the chairman of a meeting of the same vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council all that is in this scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned as follows:—

"PART I.

"As to the proposed union itself and certain immediate incidents thereof, we recommend and propose:—

"1. That the said benefice of Saint Mary-at-Hill with Saint Andrew Hubbard, and the said benefice of Saint George, Botolph-lane, with Saint Botolph, Billingsgate, be united into one benefice under the style of 'The United Benefice of Saint Mary-at-Hill with Saint Andrew Hubbard, Saint George Botolph-lane and Saint Botolph Billingsgate,' which said united benefice is hereinafter called the united benefice.

"2. That if upon the day when any Order of

Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said present benefices shall be vacant the union shall forthwith take effect, and if one only shall be then vacant, the said union shall also forthwith take effect if the incumbent of the other of the said present benefices shall consent to become the first incumbent of the united benefice but if he shall not so consent then the said union shall take effect upon the then next avoidance of his benefice, and the then incumbent of the other of the said two benefices shall be the first incumbent of the united benefice, and if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, both of the said present benefices shall be full then the said union shall take effect on the next avoidance of either of them if the incumbent for the time being of the other of the said present benefices shall consent to become the incumbent of the united benefice; but if he shall not so consent then the said union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacancy of his benefice, and the then incumbent of the other of the said two benefices shall be the first incumbent of the united benefice and in any case, it shall be lawful for the Bishop of the said diocese of London to admit to the united benefice such first incumbent (if an incumbent for the time being of either of the said present benefices) without any form or fee of or for presentation, and he shall thereupon become the incumbent of the united benefice. Until the time of the union taking effect the said two benefices shall remain separate, and the rights and liabilities in respect thereof and of the incumbents of each of them shall remain unaffected.

"3. That if after this scheme shall have been ratified by an Order of Your Majesty in Council, and before the said union shall have taken effect, the incumbent for the time being of either of the said two benefices shall with the consent of the Bishop of London retire from his incumbency in order that the said union may take immediate effect, then the incumbent so retiring from his incumbency shall be entitled during the period hereinafter specified to receive out of the annual income of the united benefice, and by way of compensation, an annual sum equal to the net annual value of the tithe or rate in lieu of tithe and all other endowments belonging to the incumbency from which he shall so retire, computed on the average receipts of the three years immediately preceding the year in which the said incumbent shall so retire (including in such receipts in the case of the benefice of Saint George Botolph-lane with Saint Botolph Billingsgate the net rent or profits which shall have been derived from the Parsonage House belonging to that benefice which is now let), which annual sum shall commence as from the day on which the said union shall take effect, and shall be payable by equal half-yearly payments in every year; the first half-yearly payment thereof to become due at the end of six calendar months next after the day on which the said union shall take effect, and the said annual sum shall be payable to the retiring incumbent during the remainder of his life if he continue to be a member of the Church of England, but not otherwise, or until he shall accept other Church preferment of a net annual value equal to, or greater in amount than, the said annual sum to be so made payable to such retiring incumbent. And upon his accepting such preferment the said annual sum shall thenceforth absolutely cease to be payable, but if he shall accept other Church

preferment of a less net annual value (to be ascertained without reference to and exclusively of the house of residence, if any) than as aforesaid then whilst he shall hold such other preferment the said annual sum shall in each year be reduced by a sum equal in amount to the net annual sum (to be ascertained as aforesaid) payable to him for the same year in respect of such other preferment. Provided always that if such retiring incumbent shall hereafter be convicted of any offence against the ecclesiastical law, the punishment for which would be deprivation or suspension, his right to receive such annual sum, payable by way of compensation as aforesaid shall cease or shall be suspended as from the date of such conviction. And provided also that if the same annual sum or any part thereof payable by way of compensation as aforesaid shall cease to be payable to such retiring incumbent by his ceasing to be a member of the Church of England as aforesaid or by his being convicted of any offence against the ecclesiastical law as aforesaid, or by his acceptance of such Church preferment as aforesaid, or by his death (as the case may be) on any other than one of the half-yearly days of payment, then he or his executors or administrators shall be entitled to a proportionate part of the said annual sum for the period which at the time of such cesser shall have elapsed of the current half-year, which proportionate part shall be payable at the end of the current half-year.

"4. That the said annual sum shall be charged upon the annual income of the united benefice, and shall be payable out of the same by the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice and as between the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice, and the retiring incumbent and his assigns, the said annual sum shall be a first charge at law and in equity upon the income of the united benefice, the incumbent of which united benefice shall be deemed to have accepted the same subject to a trust to pay to the said retiring incumbent or his assigns the said annual sum out of the income of the said united benefice, and for that purpose to use all due diligence to receive and collect the income of the said united benefice, and that if such annual sum or any part thereof shall at any time be in arrear and unpaid for more than twenty-eight days after any of the said half-yearly days of payment, and the fact of the same being so in arrear shall be verified by the declaration of the incumbent who shall have so retired or his assigns, or in such other or further manner as shall be required by the Bishop of London, it shall be lawful for the said Bishop to make an order upon the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice requiring him to pay the amount in arrear within a time to be specified in such order, and if the same be not paid within such period then it shall be lawful for the said Bishop to sequester the profits of the said united benefice until all such arrears and the costs of the sequestration shall have been paid and satisfied, but the power to be so conferred upon the said Bishop shall not in anywise abridge or interfere with the rights of the incumbent who shall have so retired or his assigns to recover the said annual sum and all arrears thereof by proceedings at law or in equity, or with the legal or equitable rights of the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice to recover from the preceding incumbent of the united benefice, his executors or administrators any arrears of the said annual sum which ought to have been paid by such preceding incumbent.

"5. That if the said union shall have taken

immediate effect by reason of the incumbent for the time being of either of the present benefices having retired from his incumbency, and such incumbent shall be living when the united benefice shall for the time after such union become vacant, the incumbent who shall have so retired shall (if in the opinion of the Bishop of London he be not disqualified by age or otherwise) be entitled to fill such vacancy, and may be admitted by the Bishop to the united benefice, without any form or fee of or for presentation, and he shall upon such admission become the second incumbent of the united benefice, and the annual sum hereinbefore made payable to him shall thenceforth absolutely cease to be payable, but as regards the future patronage and right of presentation to the united benefice and the rights of the patrons in regard thereto, and the order of the turns of presentation the admission of such retired incumbent as aforesaid to the united benefice shall not be deemed to be a presentation but shall as regards such patronage right of presentation and other rights be deemed to be a continuance of the first incumbency of the united benefice.

" PART II.

"As to the parish church of the united benefice and certain officers of the same, and certain matters connected therewith, or with the church of Saint George, Botolph-lane, we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further recommend and propose:—

"1. That upon the union taking effect the church of Saint Mary-at-Hill shall become, and thereafter continue to be, the parish church of the united benefice.

"2. That upon the union taking effect we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners shall, out of the moneys received by us under the fourteenth section of the City of London Parochial Charities Act, 1883, make a grant of forty-one pounds per annum for the repair of the fabric of the parish church of the said united benefice, such grant to be in addition to the sum of ninety-five pounds per annum allotted for the repair of the fabric of the church of Saint Mary-at-Hill under the scheme of the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales for the regulation of the City Church Fund created under the said City of London Parochial Charities Act, 1883.

"3. That we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners shall out of the moneys received by us as aforesaid under the fourteenth section of the said City of London Parochial Charities Act, 1883, make a grant of forty-four pounds per annum for the maintenance of Divine service in the parish church of the united benefice such grant to be in addition to the sum of three hundred and fifty pounds per annum allotted under the above-mentioned scheme of the Charity Commissioners for the maintenance of Divine service in the church of Saint Mary-at-Hill and to commence to be payable as to twenty pounds, part thereof, upon the union taking effect and as to the remainder wholly or from time to time in part as a sum or sums sufficient to provide the payment of the whole or a further part of such remainder shall absolutely cease to be payable in respect of the pensions hereinafter mentioned in clause 11.

"4. That upon the union taking effect the sum of sixty pounds per annum allotted under the above-mentioned scheme of the Charity Commissioners and payable to the incumbent of the benefice of Saint George, Botolph-lane, with Saint Botolph Billingsgate, for the maintenance of an assistant curate shall so long as it shall continue payable under the said scheme be paid to the

incumbent of the united benefice for the same purpose.

"5. That upon the union taking effect the font and communion table, now in the church of Saint George, Botolph-lane, shall, if the joint vestry of the united benefice desire it, and if the Bishop of London shall approve, be transferred to the parish church of the united benefice, but if not needed for such church, they shall be transferred to any other church or chapel, or churches or chapels within the diocese of London which the Bishop may select.

"6. That upon the union taking effect if the sacramental plate, or any portion thereof, used in the church of Saint George Botolph-lane shall in the opinion of the joint vestry of the united benefice be needed for use in the parish church of the united benefice, such sacramental plate or such portion thereof, as the case may be, shall, if the Bishop of London shall approve, be transferred to the parish church of the united benefice; but if not needed for such church, such sacramental plate, or the portion thereof which shall not be so needed, shall, if the Bishop of London shall approve, be offered to the incumbent and churchwardens of the church of the new benefice hereinafter mentioned, if such new benefice shall be within the diocese of London, and if accepted by the said incumbent and churchwardens, shall be transferred to the church of such new benefice, but if not so accepted, or if such new benefice shall not be within the diocese of London, then such sacramental plate, or the portion thereof which shall not be needed for the parish church of the united benefice, shall be transferred to any other church or chapel, or churches or chapels within the diocese of London, which the Bishop may select.

"7. That upon the union taking effect the organ and the carved work now in the church of Saint George, Botolph-lane, or so much of such carved work as the joint vestry of the united benefice shall desire, shall, with the approval of the Bishop of London, be transferred to the parish church of the united benefice; but if such organ or the whole or a part of such carved work be not needed for such church, the whole or such part as shall not be needed for such church shall be transferred to the church of the new benefice hereinafter mentioned, unless it shall seem more expedient to the Bishop of London that the same shall be sold, and the proceeds to arise from such sale shall in such case be added to the proceeds to arise from the sale hereinafter recommended of the materials and site of the church of Saint George, Botolph-lane.

"8. That upon the union taking effect if the tables of fees used in the two churches be alike in all particulars the table of fees used in the church which will become the parish church of the united benefice shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the table of fees for the united parishes, but if such tables of fees be not alike in all particulars, the same shall be of no authority, and a new table of fees shall be made by the proper authority for the use of the united parishes as if the same were one parish.

"9. That if upon the union taking effect the persons who at the present time hold the respective offices of organist and sexton of Saint Mary-at-Hill shall at that time hold their respective offices, such persons shall be respectively organist and sexton of the united benefice; but no organist or sexton of the united benefice shall have any larger estate and interest in his office than he shall have possessed in his original office before the union.

"10. That upon the final closing of the church of Saint George Botolph-lane the register books of baptisms, marriages, and burials of the parishes of Saint George, Botolph-lane and Saint Botolph Billingsgate, shall be transferred to the parish church of the united benefice.

"11. That if upon the union taking effect Mr. George Packer, who is now the parish clerk of Saint George Botolph-lane, Miss Annie Ward who is now the sextoness of the church of Saint George, Botolph-lane, and Mr. John Samuel Ollier, who is now the organ blower of the same church, or one or more of them, shall hold their respective offices, their services shall be dispensed with, and by way of compensation for the loss of their offices the said George Packer shall receive for the remainder of his life a yearly sum or pension of forty pounds, the said Annie Ward shall receive for the remainder of her life a yearly sum or pension of forty-five pounds and the said John Samuel Ollier shall receive for the remainder of his life a yearly sum or pension of twelve pounds, such yearly sums or pensions to be paid by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners out of the moneys received by us under the fourteenth section of the City of London Parochial Charities Act, 1883.

"12. That the joint vestry of the united parishes for all ecclesiastical purposes shall include the members for the time being of the select vestry of the parish of Saint Mary-at-Hill, and the churchwardens for the time being (being parishioners) of the parish of Saint Andrew Hubbard, the parish of Saint George Botolph-lane and the parish of Saint Botolph Billingsgate respectively.

"PART III.

"As to the endowments and parsonage house of the united benefice, we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further recommend and propose:—

"1. That upon the union taking effect, all the properties, revenues and income, constituting the endowments of the rectory of Saint Mary-at-Hill with Saint Andrew Hubbard, and of the rectory of Saint George Botolph-lane, with Saint Botolph, Billingsgate (including the parsonage house belonging to the last-mentioned rectory) shall be transferred to and annexed to the united benefice and that so soon after the union taking effect as the existing vested interest in the income of the united benefice shall have ceased and determined, the incumbent at that time of the said united benefice, and his successors shall be entitled to retain an annual sum of five hundred and thirty pounds out of the income arising from or constituting such endowments, and that the residue of such income, and also a sum of seventy-three pounds per annum, to be paid by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, after the ceasing of the pensions contemplated by clause 11 of Part II of this scheme, out of the moneys received by us under the fourteenth section of the City of London Parochial Charities Act, 1883, shall form the endowment or part of the endowment, of the new district which is hereinafter proposed to be constituted or created and such residue of the income of the united benefice shall from time to time be paid by the incumbent of the said united benefice by half-yearly payments to the minister or incumbent of such new district or until such new district shall have been constituted or created to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners to be accumulated by us towards the endowment of such new district. Provided always that if the full annual sum shall under clause 3 of Part I of this scheme, become payable to a retiring incumbent by way of compensation, then, and in such case, the recom-

mendations contained in this present clause shall come into full operation only as from and after the cesser and determination of the payment of such annual sum by way of compensation. Provided further, that in case the full annual sum payable under the said clause 3 to a retiring incumbent by way of compensation, shall (as provided by the same clause) be in any year or years reduced in consequence of the receipt by such retiring incumbent of income derived from other Church preferment of a less annual value than the said full annual sum payable by way of compensation, then, and in every such case, the annual amount or sum by which such reduced annual sum shall fall short of such full annual sum shall become available and be applicable for the endowment or part of the endowment of the said proposed new district and any portion of the income of the said united benefice which from any other cause shall not be required for the purpose of the said payment to be made under this present clause shall also become available and be applicable for the endowment or part of the endowment of the same new district.

"2. That upon the union taking effect, the parsonage house of the Rectory of Saint Mary-at-Hill with Saint Andrew Hubbard, shall become the parsonage house of the united benefice.

"PART IV.

"As to a certain new district we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"1. That an ecclesiastical district within the limits of the Metropolis or within the vicinity of the Metropolis as defined by the hereinbefore-mentioned Act of the sixty-first and sixty-second years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter twenty-three (such district having then been, or being then about to be formed, or legally constituted under some or one of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England authorizing the formation or constitution of such district) shall be selected by the Bishop of London as the district for which a church shall be built out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinafter recommended.

"2. That the patronage of such new district and benefice shall be vested alternately in Your Majesty, Your heirs and successors, and the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London the first turn of presentation thereto to be vested in the Dean and Chapter of Saint Paul's.

"3. That when a church for such district has been built out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinafter recommended, it shall be consecrated by the name and style of Saint Botolph and Saint George or by such other name or style as may appear to the Bishop of the diocese to be more expedient.

"PART V.

"As to the Church of Saint George Botolph-lane, and the site and appurtenances thereof and as to the proceeds of any sale or sales of the materials site furniture or fittings of the same church, we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners recommend and propose:—

"1. That, upon the union taking effect, the Church of Saint George, Botolph-lane be taken down.

"2. That subject to the provisions contained in clause 7 of Part II of this scheme, the furniture or fittings and the materials and site of said church, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use or enjoyment thereof shall be sold and disposed of by us, the

said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient such sale or disposal being made in all respects subject to the provisions contained in the seventeenth section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and forty-two.

"3. That the net proceeds to arise from the sale or sales to be made by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners as aforesaid, of the site and materials and furniture or fittings of the said church shall form one aggregate fund, and shall be applied for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for, and the erection of a new church within the limits of the said new district, constituted or to be constituted as aforesaid, and as the church of such new district; and if the amount of such fund shall be sufficient for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for, and the erection of, a parsonage house (or the purchase, enlargement, or alteration of any existing house suitable with or without enlargement or alteration for a parsonage house) within the limits of the said new district constituted or to be constituted as aforesaid, and as the parsonage house of such new district, and the remainder (if any) of such fund shall be added to the fund created under the twenty-second section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty chapter one hundred and forty-two.

"PART VI.

"Upon the subject of patronage we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners recommend and propose:—

"1. That the patronage of the said united benefice of Saint Mary-at-Hill with Saint Andrew Hubbard Saint George Botolph-lane and Saint Botolph Billingsgate shall be vested as to one moiety, namely as to the first and third out of every four turns of presentation, in the said Richard Davis Odell, Sidney Lambert Odell, Percy Bench Trower, Ernest Frederic Calrow, Alfred Edward Ellen, Richard Joseph Grant, William Read and Henry Alfred Roper being parishioners of Saint Mary-at-Hill, their heirs and assigns in trust for the said parish of Saint Mary-at-Hill and as to the other moiety namely, as to the second and fourth out of every four turns of presentation in the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Bishop of London alternately the first of such alternate turns namely, the second out of the four turns above mentioned, to belong to the Archbishop of Canterbury, and that by way of exchange for the patronage now vested in Your Majesty and the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London alternately of the rectory of Saint George Botolph-lane with Saint Botolph Billingsgate the patronage of the new district to be formed or constituted as aforesaid shall, as aforesaid, be vested in Your Majesty and the Dean and Chapter of Saint Paul's alternately.

"Provided always that this scheme shall not take effect until the consent and approval which by the seventeenth section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and forty-two, are made requisite to the sale or letting or appropriation under the powers conferred by that Act of the site or any church shall be obtained to the sale and appropriation hereby proposed of the Church of Saint George Botolph-lane and of the site thereof, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use

and enjoyment thereof, and to the mode of dealing with such site which is hereby proposed.

"And provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts, and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of July in the year one thousand nine hundred and one in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter seventy of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-seven and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter fifty-five have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew Stourton within the limits of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Middleton in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Middleton, of the new parish (sometime district) of All Saints Woodlesford in the said county and diocese, and of the new parish (sometime district) of Saint Mary Hunslet, in the same county and diocese which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the Schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parishes respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said new parish of Middleton, of the said new parish of All Saints Woodlesford and of the said new parish of Saint Mary Hunslet, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical

purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew Stourton situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Boyd Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon as such Bishop and also as the patron in right of his See of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Mary Hunslet, with the consent of the Reverend William Birkbeck Pierson the Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Rothwell in the said county and diocese, and as such vicar or incumbent, the patron of the vicarage of the said new parish of Middleton; and with the consents of the Right Reverend Norman Dumenil John Bishop of the diocese of Sodor and Man, of Bishop's Court in the Isle of Man, of Richard Harrison, of Grimston Lodge, Tadcaster in the said county of York Esquire of Henry Cumberland Bentley of Arthingworth in the county of Northampton, Esquire, of Sir Charles Bingham Lowther of Swillington House Leeds in the said county of York Baronet, and of Gerard Frederick Towlerton Leather a Major in Your Majesty's Regiment of the Northumberland Fusiliers as the patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of All Saints Woodlesford (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Middleton of the said new parish of All Saints Woodlesford, and of the said new parish of Saint Mary Hunslet which are described in the Schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Andrew Stourton situate as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew Stourton.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew Stourton comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Middleton in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon which is bounded upon part of the south and upon the south-east by the parish of Rothwell upon the north-east by the hereinafter described portion of the new parish (sometime district) of All Saints Woodlesford upon the north-west by the new parish (sometime district) of Saint Mary Hunslet (including the hereinafter described portion thereof) all in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the west and upon the remaining part of the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary Hunslet from the new parish of Middleton aforesaid at the point on the southern side of the Woodhouse Hill Cemetery where such boundary is joined by the Parliamentary boundary dividing the Morley Division of the Southern Division of the West Riding of the county of York from the Normanton Division of the same county and extending thence southward along the said Parliamentary boundary for a distance of forty-seven chains or thereabouts to the point

where it is crossed by the footpath leading from the Middleton-road near Ebor House to the Wakefield-road at the top of Bell-hill and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-described footpath for a distance of fifty-one chains or thereabouts to its junction with the said Wakefield-road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to its junction with Wood-lane upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Middleton from the parish of Rothwell aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of All Saints Woodlesford which is bounded upon the east by the parish of Whitkirk upon the north-east and upon the north by the new parish of Saint Hilda Leeds both in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the north-west by the hereinafter described portion of the new parish of Saint Mary Hunslet aforesaid upon the south-west by the hereinbefore described portion of the new parish of Middleton aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Middleton from the new parish of All Saints Woodlesford aforesaid at the point where the Pontefract-road is crossed by the tramway which leads from Rothwell Haigh Quarries to the Aire and Calder Canal and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said tramway for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts to its terminus on the bank of the said canal and continuing thence north-eastward and in a straight line for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to the boundary in the middle of the same canal which boundary divides the said new parish of All Saints Woodlesford from the parish of Whitkirk aforesaid.

"III. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint Mary Hunslet which is bounded upon the south-east partly by the hereinbefore described portion of the new parish of Middleton aforesaid and partly by the hereinbefore described portion of the new parish of All Saints Woodlesford aforesaid upon the north-east by the new parish of Saint Hilda Leeds aforesaid and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the north upon the west and upon the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Hilda Leeds from the new parish of Saint Mary Hunslet aforesaid at the point where it crosses the middle of Forge-lane, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its junction with Low-road and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Iveridge-grove and extending south-westward along the middle of Iveridge-grove for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to its south-western end and continuing thence still south-westward and in a straight line to a point in the middle of Derbyshire-street and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of nine yards or thereabouts to its junction with Devonshire-road and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of four and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called or known as Sussex-avenue and extending thence still in precisely the last-mentioned direction and in a straight line for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts (thereby passing at the backs of Messrs. Mann's Auto-carriage Works and of Messrs. Deighton's

Iron Works) to the point situate at a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to the south-east of Pepper-road in the middle of the main line of the Midland Railway and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary Hunslet from the new parish of Middleton aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

And whereas by "The Burial Act, 1900," it was enacted that the powers and duties of the Secretary of State under the Burial Acts should be transferred to the Local Government Board:

And whereas the Local Government Board after giving to the incumbents and the churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of their intention to make such

representations made representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the under-mentioned civil parishes without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials should be discontinued therein as hereinafter directed.

BLUNHAM.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Edmund Blunham, in the county of Bedford; and in the churchyard, after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and one, except as follows :—

In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed, subject to the condition that any coffin buried in any such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

FLORE.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of All Saints Flore, in the county of Northampton; and in the churchyard, after the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and two, except as follows :—

In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed, subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

BROUGHTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Andrew Broughton, in the county of Northampton; and in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed, subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In the churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the bodies of Sarah Botterill and Charles William Rice Higgins, or of one other member of his family at their decease respectively.

WESTBERE.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of All Saints Westbere, in the county of Kent; and in the old portion of the churchyard except as follows :—

enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such earthen graves as are now existing in the said portion of the churchyard burials may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the bodies of any members of the family of any of the persons heretofore buried in such graves.

ECKINGTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Holy Trinity Eckington, in the county of Worcester, and in the churchyard within twenty-five feet of any dwelling-house; and in the remainder of the churchyard except as follows :—

(a.) In such earthen graves as are now existing in the last-mentioned portion of the churchyard burials may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the bodies of members of the family of any of the persons heretofore buried in such graves.

(b.) In such last-mentioned portion of the churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family to which such grave space may be allotted.

WILLINGHAM.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Helen Willingham, in the Parts of Lindsey; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first day of December one thousand nine hundred and one.

BELTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of All Saints, Belton, in the Parts of Lindsey; and in the old portion of the churchyard except as follows :—

In such vaults and walled graves as are now existing in the said portion of the churchyard burials may be allowed, subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

And also in the rest of the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and walled graves as are now existing in the last-mentioned portion of the churchyard burials may be allowed, subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such earthen graves as are now existing in the last-mentioned portion of the churchyard burials may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the bodies of any members of the family of any of the persons heretofore buried in such graves.

(c.) In the last-mentioned portion of the churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family to which such grave space may be allotted.

LOCKLESHAM.—Forthwith and entirely in the Church of the Holy Spirit, Rye Harbour; and in the churchyard, except as follows :—

In a grave space reserved for the purpose the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of the widow of the late Alfred Ferris.

TUXFORD.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of *Saint Nicholas*, Tuxford, in the county of *Nottingham*; and in that portion of the churchyard which existed prior to one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, except as follows :—

(a.) In the vault beneath the mortuary chapel which adjoins the chancel of the said church burials may be allowed subject to the conditions following, that is to say—

(i.) That as soon as conveniently may be after the deposit of a coffin in the said vault the coffin shall be wholly and permanently enclosed by means of stone flagging properly jointed in cement or brickwork in cement, and otherwise in such manner as effectually to prevent the escape of any noxious gas from the interior of the enclosure so formed.

(ii.) That as soon as conveniently may be after the deposit of a coffin in the said vault the entrance to the said vault from the mortuary chapel shall be properly covered, and the covering shall be hermetically sealed by concrete or cement in such a manner as effectually to prevent the escape of any noxious gas from the said vault into the mortuary chapel.

(b.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the said portion of the churchyard burials may be allowed, subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(c.) In the said portion of the churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family of any person heretofore buried in the said portion of the churchyard.

ISHAM.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of *Saint Peter* Isham, in the county of *Northampton*; and in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the bodies of any members of the family of any of the persons heretofore buried in such graves.

LONGFRAMLINGTON.—Forthwith and entirely in *Longframlington* Church, in the county of *Northumberland*; and in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) This Order shall not apply to the portion of the churchyard included between a line drawn due north from the church tower to the northern boundary of the churchyard and a line following the footpath leading from the chancel to the north-east gate.

(b.) In the churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family to which such grave space may be allotted.

BOCONNOC.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of *Boconnoc*, in the county of

Cornwall; and in the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In such walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in any such grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the bodies of any members of the family of any of the persons heretofore buried in such graves.

(c.) In the churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family to which such grave space may be allotted.

(d.) In the churchyard in a grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burials may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of Mr. J. B. Fortescue and of the bodies of any members of his family.

WIGMORE.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint James, Wigmore, in the county of Hereford; and in the churchyard, except as follows:—

In the walled grave, wherein are interred the remains of the late Mr. Walter Jones, the burial may be allowed of one member of the family of the said Mr. Walter Jones, subject to the condition that the coffin buried in the said grave be separately entombed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

His Honour the Officer administering the Government, having heard the opinion of the Council of Health, has been pleased to modify Government Notice No. 228 of the 2nd September, 1901, and to direct that the following regulations be observed, viz. :—

1. The importation is forbidden of :

(a.) Cattle (except horses, mules, and asses) from Egypt, the Province of Naples, Calabria, and Salonica ;

(b.) Wool, hides, skins, horns, bones, and hoofs from the above places and from countries where epidemic diseases are reported ;

(c.) Cattle arriving from any place, if affected with any disease in view of which, in the opinion of the Chief Government Medical Officer, their admission into the lazaretto might prove detrimental to other cattle already in the Island.

2. Cattle which may be allowed to be landed under the conditions hereinafter specified, and subject to their being kept isolated and under observation in such of the enclosures at the lazaretto as may be assigned or approved for that purpose for the period hereinafter stated.

(a.) Cattle from the Black Sea, Sea of Azov,

Syria, and Prevesa (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited), subjected to three months' observation ;

(b.) Cattle from Roumelia, except swine (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited), subjected to three months' observation ;

(c.) Cattle from Morocco and Sardinia (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited), subjected to fifteen days' observation ;

(d.) Cattle from Sicily (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited), subjected to ten days' observation ;

(e.) Cattle from the Regency of Tunis (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited), subjected to five days' observation ;

(f.) Cattle from Bengazi (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited), subjected to two days' observation ;

(g.) Horses, mules, and asses from Egypt, the Province of Naples, Calabria, Salonica, and Turkey in Asia, subjected to three days' observation, provided that such horses, mules, and asses shall be released, after inspection at the lazaretto, if the owner undertake to keep the animals in a place approved of by the Collector of Customs, and to cause them to be inspected by a Government Medical Officer or Veterinary Surgeon twice a week for nine weeks.

The cattle referred to in this paragraph shall not be allowed to be landed, unless the consignee shall have in each case and before shipment, made a written application, stating the approximate number of animals intended to be imported, and obtained the necessary permission after having agreed to abide by any regulations which may be established. Such application shall imply that the consignee has bound himself to abide by any regulations which may be in force on the day of importation, or which may be issued during the time in which the cattle may have to remain in quarantine, and also to pay the entrance fees, fees for guards, and other fees for ordinary or extraordinary expenses usually levied on cattle at the lazaretto.

3. Swine.

(a.) Swine arriving from the ports of Turkey and Greece, except those referred to in sections 1 and 2, and swine arriving from Roumelia, will be subjected to eight days' observation at the lazaretto.

4. General Provisions.

All cattle intended for importation into these Islands must be accompanied by a certificate from the British Consular Authority, or, in default, of the local Government Authority of the places of origin and embarkation, stating that cattle disease has not been officially reported in those places during the three months previous to the date of embarkation.

The term cattle includes horses, mules, asses, animals of the bovine species, sheep, goats, and swine.

5. Vessels with Cattle on Board.

Vessels arriving in this Island having on board more than 250 head of cattle (bovine) are to go into the quarantine harbour, and the cattle are to be inspected in the cattle enclosures of the lazaretto.
