WHEREAS in the Act of Uniformity, which established the Liturgy of the Church of England, provision is made for such alterations in the Prayers for the Royal Family as from time to time shall become necessary, and be directed by lawful authority; it is, thereupon, this day ordered in Council, that in the Morning and Evening Prayers, in the Litany, and in all other parts of the Public Service, as well in the occasional offices as in the Book of Common Prayer, where the Royal Family is appointed to be particularly prayed for, the following form and order shall be observed:—

“Our Gracious Queen Alexandra, George Prince of Wales, the Princess of Wales, and all the Royal Family.”

And it is further ordered, that no edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth printed but with this amendment; and that in the meantime, and until copies of such edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars, and Curates within this Realm do (for the preventing of mistakes), with the pen, correct and amend all such prayers in their Church Books, according to the foregoing direction: And for the better notice hereof, that this Order be forthwith printed and published, and sent to the several parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take care that obedience be paid to the same accordingly.

THE following Despatches have been received from Lord Kitchener, G.C.B., &c., Commanding-in-Chief, South Africa:—

From Lord Kitchener to the Under Secretary of State for War, War Office, London, S.W.

Pretoria,

8th August, 1901.

Sir,

1. IN continuation of my Despatch, dated 8th July, 1901, I have the honour to submit an account of the operations carried out by the troops under my command since that date.

The Blockhouse System.

2. The month of July has been marked by a wide development of our system of blockhouse defence. Experience had shown that the line of defensible posts, extending across the Orange River Colony, from Jacobsdal to Ladybrand, constituted a considerable obstacle to the free movement of the enemy's roving bands, and that the gradual completion of chains of blockhouses placed at intervals of a mile, sometimes less, along the Transvaal and Orange River Colony railways, had obtained for our traffic a comparative security which it had not previously enjoyed.

Arrangements were therefore made about the middle of the month for the commencement of a continuous line of blockhouses following the course of the river from Aliwal North to Bethulie, and running thence along the railway through Stormberg, Rosmead, Naauwpoort Junction and De Aar to Kimberley. This work, which will absorb about six battalions as its

garrison, has made good progress, and will shortly, I hope, be completed.

Another line, with Frederikstad as its starting point, was commenced on 8th July by two battalions under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Mackenzie, Suffolk Regiment. It runs northward to the source of the Mooi River, whence it will be extended to Breedt's Nek in the Magaliesberg hills. From Breedt's Nek other posts will be established along the Magaliesberg, which will connect with our garrison at Commando Nek.

To the east of the Pretoria-Vereeniging line, the South African Constabulary, under Lieutenant-Colonel Pilkington, have been employed in the construction of a line of posts running from Eerste Fabriken, by Springs and Heidelberg, to the Vaal River.

These blockhouse lines give promise of being of much future assistance to us. Not only do they protect our communications and render inter-communication difficult between the different portions of the Boer forces, but they serve as barriers against which our mobile columns are able to drive bands of the enemy and force them to surrender.

A concerted movement, with this idea in view, was arranged for the middle of July, its object being the clearance of the country between the Vaal and Modder Rivers by the convergence of a number of columns, acting together and driving the enemy southward on to the line of posts garrisoned by the South African Constabulary, along the Modder River between Bloemfontein and Jacobsdal. It produced the most satisfactory results, but the stages by which the troops so employed reached their assigned stations, and the preliminary operations, must be dealt with by successive reference to the work of the different columns.

Operations in the Southern portion of Orange River Colony.

3. Two forces were operating in the southern portion of the Orange River Colony in the second week of July, those of Major-Generals Bruce Hamilton and C. Knox.

Of Major-General Bruce Hamilton's troops, two columns, under Lieutenant-Colonels Williams and Dawkins, occupied the Jacobsdal and Luckhoff districts; two, under Colonel Rochfort and Lieutenant-Colonel Du Moulin, were moving by Wepener on Edeburg, which they reached on the 17th of the month. After that date Major-General Bruce Hamilton disposed all his columns to the west of the railway to act as a support to the barrier of police posts on the Modder River, and to be in readiness for any possible movement of the enemy to the south when pressed by our contemplated sweep from the Vaal River.

The section to the east of Emmanus was allotted to Colonel Rochfort, who also occupied Tafel Kop and Zwartkoppies to the south-east and south-west, respectively, of Petrusburg. Further west, Colonel Williams' troops were posted at Blaauwbank and Wegdraai Drifts on the Riet River, whilst the line of the Orange River between Norval's Pont and Ramah was watched by the columns under Lieutenant-Colonels Du Moulin and Dawkins.

On the 27th July Colonel Rochfort learned that a party of burghers under Commandant Myburg, said to be destined for Cape Colony, was encamped on the banks of the Riet River between Dassiespoort and Jagersfontein Drift. Calling upon Lieutenant-Colonel Lowry Cole, who was under his orders in the vicinity, to

co-operate with him, Colonel Rochfort arranged to surprise this laager at dawn the following morning. His orders were well carried out, and 24 prisoners (including Field Cornet W. Kock), 100 good horses, and most of the Boer carts and ammunition were taken; Commandant Myburg, who was dangerously wounded, was also captured.

On the same day Captain Going, with a detachment of Mounted Infantry, who was taking part in Colonel Rochfort's combined movement, had a successful encounter with Van den Berg's commando, which had been in laager not far from Myburg's party.

Majors Bogle Smith and Damant made some useful captures of prisoners and stock on the 30th July in Fauresmith and the surrounding country.

Major-General C. Knox's columns under Colonels Pilcher and Thorneycroft, which had left Brandfort marching east on 1st July, met with few of the enemy in the country between Senekal and the Basutoland border.

They were accordingly directed to move into Thabanchu and Ladybrand, and Colonels Pilcher and Thorneycroft reached these places on the 14th and 13th July respectively. From this line Major-General C. Knox marched south on the 17th of the month with his force subdivided into four small columns, his intention being to sweep through the country down to the Orange River and search for any straggling parties of the enemy. Colonel Pilcher's troops, under Major Lean and Lieutenant-Colonel Taylor, marched through Reddersburg and Dewetsdorp respectively upon Bethulie; Colonel Thorneycroft, starting from the vicinity of Ladybrand, led his columns under Major Copeman and Lieutenant-Colonel Minchin, by the Smithfield-Commissie Drift and Wepener-Rouxville roads to Aliwal North.

Colonel Pilcher's columns were reassembled at Bethulie on the 26th July, and Colonel Thorneycroft's at Aliwal on the 28th. No considerable body of the enemy had been met, and little opposition encountered. A few prisoners, 2,300 horses, 1,800 cattle, 126 wagons and carts, and a large quantity of grain fell into General Knox's hands during his march south.

In anticipation of the intending sweep from the Vaal to the Modder River (which might possibly force parties of the enemy south), and to continue his search for any hostile bands lurking to the north of the Orange River, Major-General C. Knox was next directed to transfer his troops to the west of the line into the area between the railway and the Philippolis-Fauresmith road.

Colonel Thorneycroft left Aliwal North on the 30th July, with his troops still divided into two columns, and marched, through Jagersfontein Road Station and Kruger's Siding on the railway, in the direction of Jagersfontein. Colonel Pilcher moved from Bethulie on the same date, marching west along the right bank of the Orange River to Philippolis, from which place he turned north to Fauresmith.

By the 8th August General Knox's troops had reached the Fauresmith-Edenburg road, from which line they have been instructed to operate to the south of the Riet River, in conjunction with Major-General Bruce Hamilton's columns.

During Colonel Thorneycroft's march from Aliwal North to Jagersfontein he took 28 prisoners, 1,000 horses, 69 wagons and carts, and much stock.

Major-General Elliot's operations in Northern Orange River Colony.

4. After leaving Springfield Drift on the Wilge River on the 4th July, Major-General Elliot marched north in three columns between the Wilge River and Liebenberg's Vlei, with General Rundle's troops in co-operation to the east of the Wilge. Little opposition was met with, although the rear guard of the central column was attacked by about 100 Boers shortly after quitting the town of Reitz.

On the 11th General Elliot's three columns, under Brigadier-General Broadwood, Lieutenant-Colonel De Lisle, and Colonel Bethune, wheeled to the left towards Heilbron, the right column under Brigadier-General Broadwood passing through Frankfort.

Detached patrols were frequently sent out at night to endeavour to surprise parties of the enemy, but with small result, until on the 12th July at daylight Colonel Harrison, with 300 Imperial Yeomanry, was successful in capturing 12 prisoners, 9 carts, and 60 horses.

On the same night General Broadwood was ordered to execute a movement back in the direction of Reitz in the hope that some of the enemy, in fancied security, had followed their frequent practice of closing in behind the line of march of our troops.

To effect this General Broadwood had to pass in rear of the other two columns and make a forced march by night of 30 miles, his intention being to surround Reitz at dawn. Unfortunately, the loss of touch by a connecting file during the night delayed the force three-quarters of an hour, with the result that instead of being able to surround the town before daybreak General Broadwood was compelled, for the last three miles, to gallop straight at it. Despite this accident he was able to make a number of important captures.

Ex-President Steyn, who, with his leading adherents, had been passing the night in the town, narrowly escaped being made a prisoner, but all his government officials, together with Generals A. P. Cronje and J. B. Wessels, Commandant Davel, and Field Cornet Steyn (brother of the Ex-President), 29 persons in all, were secured. £11,500 (mostly in Orange Free State notes), Mr. Steyn's official papers, and his recent correspondence with the leaders of the Transvaal Boers, were found amongst the captured baggage.

The ex-President himself, who had been aroused at the first alarm, just managed to escape on a pony without either coat or boots. He was closely followed for some distance by an officer and sergeant to whom his identity was unknown, but pursuit on such tired horses was useless, and General Broadwood had to rest content with the success already achieved.

Returning without delay to join his brigade, General Broadwood met with considerable opposition, but, with only two casualties, he regained his place in General Elliot's line, having covered over 60 miles with his force during his short absence.

I consider that this was a fine piece of work, admirably conceived and well carried out, and that it is deserving of high commendation.

The remainder of General Elliot's march by Heilbron to the railway was uneventful. He reached the line on 16th July, the total result of his movement being eight Boers killed and wounded, 61 prisoners, 4,000 horses, 3,600 cattle, 5,400 rounds of ammunition, and many vehicles. Our casualties were three men wounded.

In connection with these large captures of horses, it should be noted that only about 20 per cent. are fit for remount purposes, the remainder being brood mares, foals, &c.

Having obtained fresh supplies at Groot Vlei, Vredefort Road, and Kopjes Stations, General Elliot continued his march westward with the twofold object of intercepting any Boers who might seek to cross the river to escape from General Fetherstonhaugh's force, which was then sweeping down from Lichtenburg towards Klerksdorp, and of placing his columns in their assigned positions for the contemplated drive southward from the line of the Vaal to the Modder River. General Broadwood passed the Vaal at the difficult and little-used Vermaas Drift, whilst Colonels Lowe and De Lisle crossed the river lower down at Coalmine Drift. By the 24th July General Elliot's troops were concentrated at Klerksdorp, having captured, since leaving the railway, as a result of numerous surprise visits by patrols to likely localities, 15 prisoners, 120 horses, 25 cases of dynamite, some stock, vehicles, and ammunition.

Towards the middle of July our information pointed to a contemplated reinforcement of the raiders in Cape Colony by picked bands of volunteers from both the Orange River Colony and Transvaal. Further reports stated that the men proceeding from the south-western portion of the Transvaal would pass through Hoopstad, and that General Smuts from the Losberg would join the expedition. Colonel Henry, who had left Bloemhof for Christiana on the 8th July, with the intention of operating to the north-west of the latter town, was accordingly recalled to watch the Hoopstad district. Having summoned the Kimberley column from Warrenton to join him as soon as possible, he crossed the Vaal at Christiana on 16th July, and moved east to Aaronslaagte, 23 miles south-west of Hoopstad. In this neighbourhood he captured three prisoners, 12 wagons, 70 horses, and some stock.

Major Paris, R.M.A., with the Kimberley column, left Warrenton on 19th July, and, after an engagement with 150 of the enemy, who were gallantly driven from a strong position by Dennison's Scouts, effected a junction on the 24th with Colonel Henry at Palmietpan near Aaronslaagte. Operating from Palmietpan on the 25th July with 230 mounted men, two guns, a pom-pom, and 30 infantry carried in carts, Major Paris again found the enemy in some strength at Wolvepan, under Commandants Badenhorst and Erasmus and Field Cornet van Aswegan. He attacked on three sides, maintained a running fight, in which the 74th Squadron Imperial Yeomanry, the Kimberley Light Horse, and Dennison's Scouts seem to have been well handled, and finally forced the enemy to beat a very hasty retreat. Seven dead burghers were left upon the field, and Field Cornet van Aswegan was captured; Major Paris' casualties being one man killed and three wounded. Colonel Henry then moved to Hoopstad, and, on the 31st July, the Kimberley column returned to the railway at Windsorton Road.

Other columns were also set in motion to gain touch with any parties of the enemy who might be actually trying to find their way south from the Transvaal.

On the 21st July Brigadier-General Gilbert Hamilton left Klerksdorp for Wolmaranstad, where he arrived on the 23rd. Here he was informed that 30 volunteers had already left for Cape Colony, but the information obtainable

was not very reliable. A successful night march, however, for which Brigadier-General Hamilton left Wolmaranstad at midnight on the 25th July, terminated in the complete surprise of Commandant Potgieter's laager near Blinklip at dawn on the 26th. All the enemy's wagons and supplies, 70 horses, and 1,520 cattle were captured; 11 Boers were killed or wounded, and 10 were made prisoners; General Hamilton's casualties being only two men wounded.

With a view to watching the line of the Vaal further to the east, Lieutenant-Colonel Western had left Klerksdorp on the 11th July. He reconnoitred along both banks of the river up to Venterskroon without gaining touch with any party of the enemy; then, returning to Coalmine Drift, on the 17th July he pushed out beyond Bothaville with his mounted troops, and searched the country towards Hoopstad and Bultfontein. Observing no signs of any movement from the north of the Vaal, Colonel Western moved back on the 25th July to Coalmine Drift.

The various movements already described had now brought General Elliot's columns and those of Colonels Henry and Western into suitable positions for the general sweep south from the Vaal on the west of the main line. General Elliot assumed control of the operations, for which he was reinforced by Colonel Sir Henry Rawlinson's column from Klerksdorp and Lieutenant-Colonel Garratt's from Reitzburg. Colonel Sir Henry Rawlinson, set free at the conclusion of General Fetherstonhaugh's movement from Lichtenburg to Klerksdorp, which will be described later on, had marched from Klerksdorp on the 24th July. He crossed the Vaal, after a skirmish, near Lindique Drift, and then moved by Parys to Vredefort Town.

Before starting, General Elliot also organised from the troops composing the three columns under his command a fourth one, consisting of the 1st Dragoon Guards and two guns, under Lieutenant-Colonel Owen.

On the 29th July six of the eight columns placed at General Elliot's disposal were in line facing south, the right resting on the Vaal south of Wolmaranstad, and the left (Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson) at Vredefort. Colonel Henry's column was to join in on the extreme right at Hoopstad on the 1st August, and Lieutenant-Colonel Garratt was directed to follow in rear of the left flank on a wide front, to deal with any parties of Boers who might succeed in breaking north again through the other columns. To close the avenues of escape to the east it was further arranged that as General Elliot moved south, columns under Major Pine-Coffin and Colonel Barker should issue from the main line at Kroonstad and Vet River respectively, and then march parallel to the railway somewhat in advance of Sir Henry Rawlinson's left. To the west the roads were to be blocked by Brigadier-General Plumer, who was to move out from Modder River Station to the Boshof-Makauw's Drift road, and establish communication with Colonel Henry's right.

The presence of Brigadier-General Plumer at Modder River, which has not yet been alluded to, requires some explanation. In anticipation of these combined operations in the Orange River Colony, his force had been moved south by rail from the Transvaal after his return from Carolina in the second week of July. He arrived at Bloemfontein on the 18th July, and on the 23rd left there for Modder River Station, marching *via* Bains Vlei, Kruger's Drift, Poplar Grove, Koodoosrand, and Pandamfontein. He

had several slight engagements to the north of the river during this march, and brought in with him to Modder River Station 11 prisoners, 200 cattle, and 62 horses.

General Elliot's columns commenced their movement on the 29th July, on which date Brigadier-General Broadwood made a night march upon the village of Bothaville, which he found deserted. His action, however, was the means of driving a number of Boers into the arms of Colonel De Lisle's South Australians, who captured 18 prisoners and 12 wagons. At midnight on the 30th July Colonel Lowe, 7th Dragoon Guards, successfully surprised a farmhouse, from which he took 11 armed prisoners with rifles, bandoliers and horses.

On the 2nd August, near Graspan, Captain Quicke, King's Dragoon Guards, of Colonel Owen's column, with two squadrons of his regiment, effected the capture of a laager of 65 wagons and 4,000 cattle, and the same night Major Shea, with 200 of Colonel De Lisle's South Australians, made a gallant attack on Smit's commando at Grootvallei Farm, near the Vet River. Wire fencing, unseen in the darkness, prevented the complete success of the plan and enabled the Boers to escape, despite the fact that the South Australians pressed forward on foot with fixed bayonets. Five Boers, however, were left dead upon the ground, and 11 were captured, including Field Cornet Wolmarans of Potchefstroom. On the 3rd August General Broadwood captured seven wagons and 2,000 cattle, and the same morning at dawn, after an 18-mile march, Colonel Lowe surprised and captured 13 prisoners and a laager of 86 wagons and 56 horses. On the 6th and 7th August Colonel De Lisle was able to account for 40 prisoners, 147 wagons, 600 horses, and 2,000 cattle, and on the 8th Colonel Henry and Lieutenant-Colonel Carr-Ellison, the latter in command of 250 of the 4th Imperial Yeomanry, were instrumental in capturing two laagers and a number of prisoners.

In the meantime, Brigadier-General Plumer had moved out from Modder River Station on the 4th August, to complete the encircling cordon to the west by a junction with Colonel Henry's right flank. He subdivided his troops into two columns under Lieutenant-Colonel Colvin and Lieutenant-Colonel Sir John Jervis, the latter of whom captured 15 Boers near Botha's Hoek at the conclusion of a 25-mile march. On the 7th General Plumer learned that Colonel Henry was just to the east of Boshof, and on the following day Colonel Colvin got touch with him as he marched across Colonel Sir John Jervis's front from Doornhoek to Quaggapan in the direction of the Modder.

General Elliot's march, in which all ranks seem to have displayed energy and enterprise, is scarcely concluded, but its results, which are highly satisfactory, are practically known. Seventeen Boers have been killed and wounded, and, up to date, he has reported the capture of 326 prisoners, 2,600 horses, 20,000 cattle, 377 wagons, 371 other vehicles, and 12,500 rounds of ammunition.

Lieutenant-General Sir L. Rundle's operations in Eastern Orange River Colony.

5. Lieutenant-General Sir L. Rundle's troops, which had advanced north from Harrismith simultaneously with General Elliot's move from Springfield Drift, marched in three columns on the east of the Wilge River. Although a certain amount of opposition was encountered, the march was uneventful until the 12th July,

when General Rundle's force had reached the line Tafel Kop-Maidstone-Driespruit. On that date a party, consisting of one officer and 40 men of Imperial Yeomanry, sent from the centre column (Colonel Harley's) to communicate with Major-General Campbell on the right, was suddenly attacked by 60 Boers under Captain Charles Botha. Although Lieutenant Edgell (the officer in command), the sergeant, and four men were wounded at the first volley, the Yeomanry dismounted and returned the fire with so much effect that the Boers retired out of range, leaving the dead body of their leader behind them.

On the evening of the 13th General Rundle, hearing that the enemy were trying to move east to clear his line of advance, directed Colonel Harley (centre column) to close towards General Campbell and strengthen the right flank. On the 14th the hills round Rondel's Hoek (five miles south-east of Vrede) were occupied, and communication established with a column, under Colonel Rimington, which had moved on Vrede from the north-east.

Having relieved Colonel Rimington of his prisoners and captures, General Rundle, with his right and centre columns, then marched by De Lange's Drift over the Klip River to Standerton, where he was rejoined by his left column, under Lieutenant-Colonel Reay, which had crossed the Vaal at Roberts' Drift. Irrespective of the prisoners handed over to him by Colonel Rimington, General Rundle's troops had accounted for 12 Boers killed and wounded, 13 prisoners, 7,000 horses, 35 vehicles, and 1,000 tons of forage. His own casualties amounted to four men killed, one officer and 15 men wounded.

Having refilled with supplies at Standerton, General Rundle marched south again, on the 20th July, to a camp near the Bothasberg a few miles south-west of Vrede. From here he turned towards the Witkoppies, some 30 miles south-east of Vrede, and then traversed, on his way back to Harrismith, the mountainous country lying between the Natal border and the Vrede-Harrismith road. Few Boers were seen, and these followed their usual tactics of sniping at long ranges by day and retiring to a safe distance at night; 12 Boers, however, were killed and wounded, six prisoners were taken, and 3,590 horses, 679 trek oxen, and 4,760 cattle were brought in to Harrismith.

On the 7th August Major-General Campbell marched from Harrismith with a column composed of the Grenadier Guards, Leinster Regiment, 1st Battalion Imperial Yeomanry, four guns, and a pompom, to operate in the Brandwater basin in connection with other movements projected for the future. Colonel Harley left at the same time to escort a convoy from Harrismith to Bethlehem.

Operations of Colonel Rimington, Brigadier-General Bullock, and Brigadier-General Spens in Northern Orange River Colony.

6. Colonel Rimington's meeting with the Harrismith columns was due to his having been ordered to march from Platrand, through the Verzammelbergen, towards Vrede, to deal with any commandos trying to break away east from in front of Sir Leslie Rundle. On the 13th July Colonel Rimington, who had passed the Klip River north-east of Gembokshoekberg on the previous day, overtook, as had been anticipated, a large Boer convoy moving east. The enemy's rearguard, covering the march, was forced from its position by the rapid

advance of Colonel Rimington's mounted troops, who rode down the convoy, capturing 10 prisoners, 44 wagons, and 2,000 head of cattle. Six Boers were also killed or wounded. The following day Colonel Rimington, moving south-west, gained touch with General Rundle's force near Vrede, and, on the 15th, he again left Vrede for Heilbron, which he reached on the 21st, after several unimportant skirmishes.

During the latter part of July and the first week of August, Colonel Rimington undertook three very successful expeditions into the triangle marked by Heilbron, Lindley, and Kroonstad, which resulted in the capture of 36 prisoners, 68 ox wagons, 52 other vehicles, and 5,300 cattle. Fourteen Boers were killed, and 25 surrendered voluntarily. At the conclusion of this work, Colonel Rimington is now moving into Kroonstad from the east.

Brigadier-General Bullock's column crossed to the south bank of the Vaal at Roberts' Drift on 19th July, with the object of trying to drive any scattered parties of the enemy which might be found in the neighbourhood of Villiersdorp and Cornelia into General Elliot's line of march from Springfield to Heilbron. Few Boers, however, were seen, and the column consequently recrossed the Vaal at Villiersdorp and marched into Heidelberg, where Brigadier-General Spens took over command. The latter officer left Heidelberg for Heilbron on 27th July, moving on a front of nearly 35 miles. Two convoys were captured by flying columns sent out by him under Lieutenant-Colonel Jenner and Major Gough, who, with a loss of one man killed and four wounded, brought in 42 prisoners, 110 carts and wagons, 5,600 cattle, and a large quantity of supplies.

On the 6th August General Spens left Heilbron to operate in the direction of Kroonstad.

Operations on the Vaal.

7. The work of Lieutenant-Colonel Garratt in connection with General Elliot's movement to the Modder River has already been referred to, but his operations prior to 29th July have yet to be described.

On the 9th July his column left Springs with orders to move to the junction of the Wilge and Vaal Rivers, and there to demonstrate, to the west of General Bullock, upon the right flank of General Elliot's troops as they marched through Frankfort and Heilbron to the railway. On the 13th Colonel Garratt surprised and captured a Boer laager with several prisoners and horses at Kopiesfontein (198) on the right bank of the Vaal. He then proceeded *via* Wolvehoeck, where he filled up with supplies, to the Losberg, west of Vereeniging. On the 21st July he sighted two Boer convoys, one trekking down the right bank of the Vaal a few miles to the west of Lindique Drift, the other moving south on the left bank of the river. Both these convoys were pursued by Colonel Garratt's mounted troops and captured. Eleven Boers were killed or wounded, and 25 prisoners, 34 wagons, 31 Cape carts, and 1,240 cattle were taken.

On the following day Lieutenant-Colonel Garratt engaged General Smuts near Lindique Drift, driving the Boers into some hills, from which it was impossible for one column to dislodge them.

Colonel Sir Henry Rawlinson, who was then at Klerksdorp ready to join General Elliot, was accordingly ordered to move by Patchesstroom and co-operate with Lieutenant-Colonel Garratt from the north; a small column was also sent

out from Vereeniging by Brigadier-General Cunningham. The action of these three columns drove the enemy from their positions on to the plains near the river, where Sir Henry Rawlinson's Mounted Infantry captured 18 prisoners, 24 wagons, 5 Cape carts, 30 horses, and 150 cattle.

Lieutenant-Colonel Garratt, who crossed the Vaal at Reitzburg, then took up his assigned position in rear of General Elliot's left.

Operations in the South-Western Transvaal.

8. The chief feature of recent operations in the South-Western Transvaal has been the march of the four columns composing Major-General Fetherstonhaugh's force from the Magaliesberg to Zeerust, and thence back to Klerksdorp.

These four columns were commanded during this period by Brigadier-General Dixon and Colonels Sir Henry Rawlinson, E. Williams, and Hickie. Zeerust was reached on 10th July. The country traversed between the Magaliesberg and this village was found extremely difficult, and the enemy, favoured by almost inaccessible ground, offered considerable opposition to the columns of Colonels Williams and Hickie. The result, however, of the march was on the whole satisfactory, for 13 Boers were killed or wounded, 47 surrendered, and 26 prisoners of war, 31 wagons, and 2,900 head of cattle were captured. Besides this 13 burghers, who had been kept as prisoners of war by the comandos for some months, were released by the action of our troops.

On 12th July Major-General Fetherstonhaugh commenced his return movement from Klerksdorp, the direction of which seemed likely to drive parties of the enemy into the area shortly to be visited by Major-General Elliot's troops. He marched with his right centre column through Lichtenburg, his own three columns being on the right and Brigadier-General Dixon on the left. The progress of the march, though uneventful, was marked from day to day by sharp skirmishes with small parties of the enemy, in which 10 Boers were killed or wounded and 22 prisoners were taken. Large quantities of stores, some of which were found bricked up in houses or hidden in caves in the hills, were also destroyed. On the 20th and 21st July General Fetherstonhaugh's columns marched into Klerksdorp, having parted a few days previously from Brigadier-General Dixon, who returned, *via* Ventersdorp, to Krugersdorp. The march had been a very trying one, especially to Colonel Hickie's column on the right, which had passed through a very badly watered district.

General Fetherstonhaugh rested his men and animals for a few days at Klerksdorp, and then started again on 27th July to carry out a movement towards the Taungs-Vryburg line where the enemy was reported to be active. Lord Methuen marched south from Lichtenburg to co-operate in the movement and, keeping on General Fetherstonhaugh's right, traversed the Marokani Range to the east of Taungs. Lieutenant-Colonel Von Donop's column, of Lord Methuen's force, advanced through Kraaipan and Geysdorp by the west side of the hills, and a small column under Lieutenant-Colonel Scott co-operated from the direction of Vryburg. The results reported from these operations have been six Boers killed or wounded, 58 prisoners of war, and extensive captures of foodstuffs and wagons.

Before turning from this portion of the

theatre of operations it must be mentioned that Brigadier-General Gilbert Hamilton, after his capture of Potgieter's laager near Wolmaranstad, marched north-east by Klerksdorp towards Ventersdorp, through which district he is now moving northwards.

Operations near the Magaliesberg.

9. Colonel Allenby's column, which had reached Vlakplaats (20) near Krugersdorp from the west on the 7th July, moved north at midnight on the 9th, and at daybreak surprised a small laager at Zeekoehoek (95). The majority of Boers with this laager made good their escape to the hills, but Field Cornet Naude, 12 other prisoners, and 13 wagons remained in the hands of our cavalry. On the 11th Colonel Allenby located a laager in an almost inaccessible position on the Magaliesberg. He was unable to get to close quarters with his mounted troops, but his artillery fire set the whole laager in flames, and blew up two wagons containing dynamite and ammunition.

On the 28th July Colonel Kekewich, who had taken over command of Brigadier-General Dixon's column, left Krugersdorp to escort a convoy into Rustenburg. Colonel Allenby assisted in covering this convoy between Naauwpoort (214) and Olifant's Nek, and on the 3rd August Colonel Kekewich returned to Naauwpoort. Two days later Colonel Kekewich again passed Olifant's Nek, and turned to the east with the intention of attacking Breedt's Nek from the north, whilst Colonel Allenby operated against it from the south. This, however, turned out to be unnecessary, as the Boers evacuated the pass, and enabled us on the 7th August to occupy the defile and establish a post upon its summit. On the following day both columns moved east in the direction of Damhoek Pass, Colonel Kekewich searching the northern slopes and crests of the mountains, whilst Colonel Allenby moved parallel to him on the south.

Two other columns have been operating in this district. On the Schurvsberg and in the Hekpoort Valley, west of Commando Nek, Major-General Barton has been employed with a force from Pretoria, in clearing the country of supplies, and establishing—for occupation by the South African Constabulary—a network of posts, which will deny to the Boers the use of this favourite haunt.

Lieutenant-Colonel Lord Basing, with the Royal Dragoons, two guns, and a pompom, has been engaged in covering the construction of the Frederikstad-Breedt's Nek line of block-houses, and in keeping up communication thence to General Barton's column.

Operations on the Pietersburg Line.

10. During the past month Lieutenant-Colonel Grenfell has continued to operate from Nylstroom and Zandriverspoort (315) against General Beyer's men, who aimlessly roam about the country to the west of the northern line. The Boers in this district have displayed little activity or enterprise, and they invariably scatter at the approach of our troops. In the desultory fighting which has taken place Lieutenant-Colonel Grenfell has captured 11 prisoners, a number of wagons, some transport animals, and 7,700 rounds of ammunition.

Lieutenant-General Sir Bindon Blood's Operations in the Eastern Transvaal.

11. The progress of the war in the Eastern Transvaal during the past month has been

marked by the completion of the movement from Middelkraal (298), south of Middelburg, to a line Spring-Elands River, and thence back to Middelburg, and by the operations of several columns to the north of the Delagoa Railway against General Viljoen's commando.

The first stage of the southern movement, which was under the personal command of Lieutenant-General Sir B. Blood, closed with the arrival of the columns under Major-Generals Babington and W. Kitchener, at Springs, on the 7th and 10th of July. The third column employed, which was under Colonel Campbell, marched into Elands River on the 9th.

Major-General Babington's column (now under Sir B. Blood) left Springs again for Middelburg on the 10th July, and it was followed on the 15th by Major-General W. Kitchener's troops. Colonel Campbell, after conducting a reconnaissance north of the line from Elands River Station towards Wagen Drift (455), returned along the railway line to Middelburg to refit.

A few prisoners were captured during the course of these operations, but the results obtained were disappointing, as the enemy displayed their usual ingenuity in avoiding contact with our troops, and took full advantage of the opportunities of escape afforded by the wide extent of the country traversed.

North of the line Colonel Benson moved out from Dullstroom on the 9th July to follow General Viljoen's force. To his right about Klipbank Spruit (1443) was Colonel Park, who sought to co-operate by preventing the retreat of the enemy northwards towards Roos Senekal. The object of their search, General Viljoen's commando, was soon found at Middelkraal (60), to the north-west of Dullstroom, from which position it was driven by Colonel Benson, and pursued in a northerly direction by the 2nd Scottish Horse. Colonel Benson then turned west, and drove General Muller's men north-west from the neighbourhood of Witpoort (26). The following day he marched on Roos Senekal, but hearing, as he approached the place, that General Viljoen had gone west the previous night, and had crossed the Steelpoort River at Paardekloof (99), he detached the 18th Mounted Infantry in pursuit. This pursuit was well pressed, and 15 wagons were cut off and captured from the tail of the enemy's convoy.

On the 11th Colonel Benson moved on with his main body towards Paardekloof, detaching the 2nd Scottish Horse to make a wide detour, during which they successfully located and captured six prisoners, 40 horses, and 24 vehicles belonging to Viljoen's commando, which were hidden in a kloof of the Tantesberg. After replenishing his supplies from a convoy brought out from the railway to Blinkwater (44) by Brigadier-General Spens, Colonel Benson resumed his pursuit of General Viljoen, who was discovered on the 15th July at Laatstedrift (82), on the right bank of the Olifant's River. An engagement ensued, in which, after some close fighting, Colonel Benson turned both the enemy's flanks and drove them westwards into the thick bush across the river. Colonel Benson then returned to the railway line, having killed or wounded 17 Boers in the course of his operations, and captured 20 prisoners, 110 horses, 64 wagons, and a quantity of ammunition.

After handing over supplies to Colonel Benson at Blinkwater, Brigadier-General Spens moved on Middelburg, where he arrived on the 20th July. He had captured 11 prisoners and some

wagons during his march at Klipplaat Drift (52), 16 miles north-east of Middelburg. Brigadier-General Spens was then transferred to the command of another column.

Major-General Beatson left Middelburg on the night of 7th July, and before dawn on the 8th had broken up Commandant Trichard's laager at Buffel's Kloof (198), 25 miles north of the town. After following up these men for some distance into the difficult country near the Olifant's River he returned to Middelburg.

On the 12th July General Beatson was ordered to proceed to Groot Olifant Station to operate from thence towards the junction of the Olifant and Wilge Rivers, in case General Viljoen should be driven west by Colonel Benson. He ascertained, however, that General Viljoen, after his reverse at Laatsdrift, had doubled back to the north-east into the hilly country on the right bank of the Olifant. General Beatson therefore moved south along the Wilge River to Bronkhorst Spruit Station, searching the kloofs of the valley on his way to the railway. This search was rewarded by the discovery of 25 wagons, containing ammunition and clothing.

After refitting their troops at Middelburg Major-General Kitchener and Colonel Campbell were again sent north in pursuit of General Viljoen, and on the 29th July General Kitchener was able to report from Blaauwbank (34) the gratifying news of a very successful engagement, in which the 19th Hussars, after a long chase, had recaptured one of the two pompoms taken from the Victorians on the 11th June. The 18th Hussars, who had followed the 19th in support, were also able to come up with the enemy and assist in the capture of 32 prisoners and 20 wagons all belonging to Viljoen's commando. In consequence of this defeat General Viljoen withdrew his force by Krokodil and Commissie Drifts to the north-west and north of the Olifant's River.

On the 3rd August a mounted party detached by Major-General Kitchener from his camp at Diepkloof (375), on the Kruis River, successfully surprised a small commando at Doornpoort (97). Two Boers were killed, 13 prisoners and several wagons were brought in.

Colonel Park returned to Lydenburg from the vicinity of Dullstroom, and after some minor operations near the former place, has recently moved into the country between Roos Senekal and the Tantesberg.

On the 29th July General Sir Bindon Blood left Wonderfontein with Colonel Benson's column for Carolina. During the march Colonel Benson, with his mounted troops, made a successful descent by night upon a Boer camp at Moolvley (56), 24 miles south-west of Carolina, in which he carried off 17 prisoners, 50 horses, and 10 wagons. A few days later another raid in the same neighbourhood placed in our hands 29 prisoners (including five of General Louis Botha's despatch riders), 70 horses, and five carts. Colonel Benson is still operating about Carolina.

Operations in the Standerton-Heidelberg District.

12. During the latter part of July Lieutenant-Colonel Colville operated from Greylingstad in the district north of the railway line between the Waterval River and Leeuwspuit. Here his troops were in almost daily contact with the commandos under Alberts, Mears, and Pretorius.

At the end of the month it was reported that the members of the Boer Government had

arrived at Watervalshoek (204), about 26 miles north of Greylingstad, and arrangements were made to concentrate three columns upon this spot with the least possible delay. Lieutenant-Colonels Colville and Stewart (Johannesburg Mounted Rifles) accordingly moved their troops on the 4th August to Rooipoort (15), 10 miles west of Bethal, and the same day a column, under Lieutenant-Colonel Bewicke-Copley, left Springs for Watervalshoek. From Rooipoort Colonel Stewart marched by the northern road through Driefontein and Saltpeter Krantz, whilst Colonel Colville followed the southern route to Watervalshoek. On approaching the point where the Waterval River and Klipspruit unite, Colonel Colville sighted a Boer convoy on the march. He at once gave chase, and after a pursuit of seven miles captured the entire convoy, which proved to be that belonging to General Alberts. The captures included 18 prisoners, 28 loaded wagons, 12 Cape carts, 55 horses, 1,400 cattle, and over 2,000 rounds of ammunition.

No trace of the Boer Government could be found at Watervalshoek. Never long in one place it had moved on, probably in a north-easterly direction, a day or two before the arrival of our troops. After the capture of this convoy, Colonels Colville and Stewart marched south-east towards Standerton, while Lieutenant-Colonel Bewicke-Copley turned north to follow up parties of the enemy into the valley of the Wilge River.

The Natal Frontier.

13. On the 28th July a force, consisting of 200 mounted men, under command of Major Henderson, 8th Hussars, while employed in scouring the country lying east of Nqutu was sharply engaged a few miles east of Nondweni. The enemy, about 400 strong, fought with great boldness and evident determination to intercept our troops, if possible, during their retirement. Our casualties during the fighting, which lasted all day, were one officer (Major Jervis-Edwards) and three men killed, and five wounded.

Patrols from Volksrust, Wakkerstroom, Utrecht, and Vryheid have made some useful captures of prisoners and stock in the country adjoining these towns.

Operations in Cape Colony.

14. The past month has been one of great activity for our troops in Cape Colony, and their efforts to expel the raiders have been rewarded with considerable success, in spite of the serious difficulties with which they have had to contend.

In the middle of July, General French organised a combined movement to dislodge the enemy from the Camdeboo Mountains, near Graaff Reinet. In this he was successful. Several Boers were killed or wounded, and 31, mostly Cape rebels, were captured.

On the 14th of the month the Connaught Rangers, under Major Moore, entrenched in a position at Zuurvlakte, between Aliwal North and Jamestown, had to withstand a determined attack by the combined commandos of Fouché and Myburg. The enemy pressed forward with great boldness, but were finally driven off at dusk after many hours' fighting, during which our casualties were seven men killed, three officers and 17 men wounded. Colonel Monro, who at once went in pursuit, engaged these men a few days later to the south-west of Jamestown, drove them north with loss, and forced them in their retreat upon the Con-

naught Rangers, who attacked them once more as they passed. The efforts of Colonel Monro and Major Moore were finally rewarded at the close of July by the withdrawal of Fouché across the Orange River in the neighbourhood of Aliwal North.

While operating in the mountains south of Cradock early on the 21st July, Colonel Crabbe's column was suddenly attacked by Kruitziuger's men. The outburst of musketry at close quarters caused 200 of our horses to stampe, but, after fighting all day, Colonel Crabbe withdrew without further mishap to Mortimer Station, having had five men wounded.

On the 23rd July General French's columns, which had been driving the enemy steadily towards the Orange River, reached a line north of Richmond. In the course of this operation Lieutenant-Colonel Scobell on the east had surprised Lategan's laager, and had taken 10 prisoners (including Field Cornet Buys), with 105 horses and saddles; and Lieutenant-Colonels Doran and Wyndham and Captain Lund had also met with some success.

It was found, however, that the enemy, when pressed up into the extreme north of the Colony, again managed to break through our columns by remote bridle paths and under cover of darkness. General French was, therefore, obliged to undertake a general movement back southward from a line Vlakfontein (east of Victoria Road) - Richmond - Middle Mount - Middelburg - Schombie - Steynsburg - Stormberg, with the object of again getting beyond the enemy and forcing their scattered bands once more to the north. In this movement to the south, which was commenced on 29th July, our columns were ordered to contract their fronts so as to let the enemy through the intervals. This arrangement met with so much success that by the 3rd August, turning to the north

and extending laterally upon a line Beaufort West - Pearston - Drennan Station - Cameron's Glen - Cathcart, the whole of the troops employed were once more to the south of the enemy and pressing him northward towards our line of blockhouses on the Steynsburg-De Aar line.

Scheepers' commando alone remained to the south, and General French has detached a force consisting of the 10th Hussars, 12th Lancers, and two guns, to deal with this body of the enemy, who were last reported to be moving between Willowmore and Steytlersville.

General Remarks.

15. The steady progress which we are making towards exhausting the enemy's resources has been fully maintained during the past month, and the number of captures effected compares favourably with previous returns.

The influence, however, of the Boer loaders and their organised system of intimidation still keep in the field a large number of burghers who, if left to themselves, would be only too ready to surrender. I have, therefore, under present circumstances, considered it advisable to form some specially mobile columns for independent and rapid action in different parts of the country, generally at some distance from the operations of other troops. These special columns have a free hand regarding their movements, and are guided by special intelligence which they themselves collect in addition to any information that may be sent them.

Recommendations for Good Service.

16. I enclose lists (A) of officers, and (B) of non-commissioned officers and men whose good services I desire to bring specially to notice.

IN continuation of my despatch dated 8th August, 1901, I have the honour to submit an account of the operations carried out by the troops under my command since that date.

At the termination of Major-General Elliot's movement from the Vaal to the Modder River the several columns which had taken part in the operations were withdrawn east and west to the railways to refit and replenish their supplies. General Elliot himself, who had reached Truter's Drift on 9th August, marched with his four central columns into Glen to prepare for a fresh advance to the north-east from a line Ladybrand-Sannah's Post-Glen. Brigadier-General Plumer returned to Modder River Station. Colonel Henry moved back on 10th August to Boshof, and Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson and Lieut.-Colonel Western took their columns into Glen and Bloemfontein respectively.

To the south of the Riet River the combined operations of the troops under Major-Generals Bruce Hamilton and U. Knox, alluded to in my despatch of 8th August as being then in contemplation, were continued for a few days and then curtailed to some extent in consequence of a series of incidents which transferred attention for a time to the south-eastern districts of the Orange River Colony, and necessitated a concentration in that direction.

These incidents must be briefly alluded to in explanation of the movements of our different columns.

On the night of 12th August a party of 250 Transvaal Boers, under Commandant Boshoff, which had been driven by General Elliot's recent move first south from the Vaal and then east over the main railway, was successful in breaking from the north through our line of block-houses near Sannah's Post. The following day Commandant Kruitziuger, with 250 men, was forced by General French's columns out of the Cape Colony at Ruightfontein 9 miles east of Norval's Pont, from which point he moved north-east and crossed the Springfontein-Bethulie line near Providence Siding, apparently making for Boesmanskop. Finally on 15th August a third party of the enemy, 250 strong, under General Smuts and Commandant Dreyer, who seem to have followed from the Vaal in the wake of General Elliot's columns, managed to penetrate the line of Police posts on the Modder River to the north of Petrusburg. This party a few days later passed over the railway near Jagersfontein road and moved in the direction of Smithfield.

The coincidence of these three movements pointed to the assembly, in the area marked by Wepener, Rouxville and Smithfield, of a force of from 700 to 800 men, who joined by other local parties, would probably seek to reinforce the rebels and raiders still to the south of the Orange River.

Major-General C. Knox's Operations in South-Eastern Orange River Colony.

2. This concentration demanded immediate attention, as it was all important to gain touch with the enemy and prevent, if possible, any fresh attempt to enter Cape Colony. Major-General C. Knox, who had been operating on the Riet River, was accordingly ordered to transfer his troops from the west to the east of the railway, and to interpose them between the enemy and the river line. For this purpose he was reinforced by Major Damant's column, temporarily detached from General Bruce Hamilton's command, and by the Royal Dragoons, under Lord

Basing, who were brought down by rail from the Transvaal to Springfontein. Lieut.-Colonel Western's troops were moved by train from Bloemfontein to Bethulie, and placed at the disposal of Major-General Hart, who, with Lieut.-Colonel Hon. A. D. Murray's column and the Connaught Rangers, were watching the line of the river east and west of Aliwal North, and Colonel Sir Henry Rawlinson was instructed to move from Glen through Dewetsdorp towards Wepener, in pursuit of the party under Boshoff, which had broken south through the Bloemfontein-Ladybrand line. I regret that the subsequent action of these different columns has been only partially successful.

The movements of the Boers, who scattered and carefully avoided all contact with our troops, are extremely difficult to follow. After crossing the Springfontein-Bethulie line, Kruitziuger appears to have marched by Boesmanskop towards Smithfield, and thence in a north-easterly direction to Rietspruit, where he probably met the commandos under Smuts and Boshoff. Thus reinforced, he moved parallel to the Basuto border towards Zastron, from which neighbourhood, on the morning of the 4th September, a party of 300 men effected a crossing into Cape Colony at Kiba Drift.

Major-General Knox made every effort to gain touch with the enemy.

Major Damant crossed the railway to the east on the 14th August, and then moved to Spitzkop (10 miles north-west of Smithfield). Here, at sunrise on the 23rd, he discovered by means of patrols that a Boer commando was at Oudam, to the west of Boesmanskop. He at once started in that direction with 300 mounted men, 2 guns, and a pompom, and upon coming up with the enemy pushed forward at a gallop. Chased for 10 miles, the Boers scattered into the Marsfontein hills, leaving in Major Damant's hands 4 prisoners, 20 horses, 6 mules, 5 rifles, a heliograph, and their Commandant's despatch box. The prisoners stated that they belonged to Delarey's commando, and that they had come down from the Transvaal, under Commandant Dreyer, to endeavour to reinforce Kruitziuger's men in Cape Colony.

On the 17th August Lord Basing left Springfontein for Boesmanskop, but failing to obtain news of Kruitziuger, continued his march to Smithfield, where he joined Major Damant.

Colonel Thorneycroft reached the railway from the west on the 16th August, and his two columns under Lieut.-Colonel Minchin and Major Copeman then moved out to Reddersburg and Smithfield respectively. From Reddersburg Lieut.-Colonel Minchin marched to Sterkwater, west of Rouxville, where he arrived on the 30th August, and the same day Major Copeman, who had moved from Smithfield to Aliwal North to draw supplies, was marching up the Aliwal-Rouxville road to join Lieut.-Colonel Minchin. These two columns met at Zandfontein, 12 miles east of Rouxville, but failed to discover any parties of the enemy, who must have been hidden in the kloofs and kopjes between Zastron and the Orange River.

On 22nd August, Colonel Pilcher's two columns of Major-General Knox's force, under Lieut.-Colonel Taylor and Major Lean, marched into Bloemfontein and Edenburg from the west. They were at once moved south to Bethulie, and Colonel Pilcher then pushed up the valley of the Caledon towards Smithfield to enable Colonel Thorneycroft and Lord Basing to pass still further to the east.

Colonel Sir Henry Rawlinson marched south from Dewetsdorp, and on 25th August encountered a party of Smuts' men to the south-

east of Reddersburg. He pursued at once, and after a gallop of 7 miles effected the capture of 18 prisoners and 30 horses. The commando engaged consisted of 120 men, who fled in a north-easterly direction, followed by a detachment of Sir Henry Rawlinson's mounted troops, under Major Gosset, who took 5 other prisoners before abandoning the pursuit.

Sir Henry Rawlinson then returned to Edenburg to obtain supplies, and on 30th August again left the railway with the intention of crossing the Caledon River at Bastard's Drift and moving thence towards Zastron. At Bastard's Drift, on 1st September, he received intelligence that the Transvaalers were working towards the Orange River. He accordingly pushed on after them along the Basuto border, and hearing from native sources that parties of Boers were making their way west from Vechtkop to the Elandsberg, made a night march on the 7th towards the Koesberg. This placed him to the south of a number of the enemy, whom he drove north on the 8th from a position which they had taken up in the vicinity of the Elandsberg.

A commando, under Smuts, had, however, already passed towards the river, and, in spite of the close proximity of Colonel Thorneycroft's troops to the east of Rouxville, was successful on 4th September in crossing unobserved into Cape Colony at Kiba Drift. General Hart, with his mobile troops from Aliwal, was on this date at Diefontein Drift, and he was about to move still further to the east when the news of the enemy's passage of the river necessitated immediate pursuit in the direction of Ladygrey.

The operations against Kruitzinger, who is still in the Zastron district, continue, and Generals French and Hart have despatched troops eastward to follow those who have effected a crossing. Colonel Pilcher's column, recalled to Bethulie from the Caledon valley to reinforce General French, reached Burghersdorp on 7th September.

Major-General Bruce Hamilton's Operations in South-Western Orange River Colony.

3. With the exception of Major Damant's column, which was detached, as already shown to the east of the railway, Major-General Bruce Hamilton's troops have continued to operate in the south-western portion of the Orange River Colony, where several successes have been obtained against the commandos under the two Hertzogs, Lategan, and Nieuwhoudt.

The most important of these successes occurred near Vaalhoek at daybreak on 25th August, when, after a night march by Liebenberg's Pan, Slahtkraals and Uitkomst, Lieut.-Colonel Lowry Cole completely surprised a party of 80 Boers under Munnik Hertzog. The extent of the kloof in which their laager lay prevented Lieut.-Colonel Cole from surrounding it on all sides, but he secured a position at dawn which enabled him to capture 14 prisoners, 29 rifles, 54 saddles, 43 horses, and all the enemy's baggage, whilst the fugitives who escaped towards the Joostenberg were kept under artillery and musketry fire for fully 20 minutes.

The Operations of Brigadier-General Plumer and Colonel Henry in Southern Orange River Colony.

4. After fulfilling his rôle of blocking the exits to the west during Major-General Elliot's move from the Vaal to the Modder River, Brigadier-General Plumer returned on 11th August to Modder River Station, bringing in with him 32 prisoners, 346 horses, 566 cattle, 28 wagons, and 39 carts.

On 15th August he again left Modder River

Station, with instructions to operate between the Orange and Modder Rivers in an area bounded on the west by the Kimberley railway and on the east by a line drawn through Paardeberg Drift and Lückhoff. The force moved south in four small columns, Lieut.-Colonel Colvin's troops on the right passing through Doornhoek and Koedepan to Zoutpansdrift on the Orange River, and Lieut.-Colonel Sir J. Jervis on the left, through Koffyfontein and Lückhoff. Hardly a Boer was seen; the columns were only able to discover about 200 head of cattle in this deserted district, and by 21st August Brigadier-General Plumer had again concentrated his columns at Zoutpansdrift. From this point, on the 23rd August, he moved east along the right bank of the Orange River towards Springfontein-Norval's Pont line of railway, searching for any Boers who might be lurking in the kloofs of the Orange River valley, and watching for any party which might be driven out of Cape Colony by the pressure of General French's columns from the south. One such opportunity occurred. When near Tafelkop, a few miles south of Philippolis, General Plumer's mounted troops encountered a commando, under Lategan, which had been forced out of Cape Colony near Zand Drift, and had already been roughly handled, after crossing, by Lieut.-Colonel Byng. This party was hotly pursued in a north-easterly direction, and Brigadier-General Plumer was able to effect the capture of 8 prisoners, 4 rifles, 44 horses, and 11 vehicles.

Brigadier-General Plumer's force reached Prior's Siding and Springfontein on the night of 30th August, and left again immediately for the Smithfield district to assist Major-General C. Knox in his search for Kruitzinger. From Boshof Colonel Henry was directed to move to the Lückhoff district, and he has since been operating in that neighbourhood.

Major-General Elliot's Operations in Eastern Orange River Colony.

5. Major-General Elliot rested his troops at Glen from the 13th to the 18th of August. On the latter date he moved out to place his columns on a general line, Glen-Sannah's Post-Edybrand, preparatory to undertaking a sweep in a north-easterly direction, which was to terminate with a wheel on to the Wittebergen Mountains. It was hoped that this wheel would be the means of driving a number of Boers east towards the Brandwater basin, which had been occupied in anticipation by Major-General Campbell's column from Harrismith. On General Elliot's left, Lieut.-Colonel Barker and Major Pine-Coffin were to move out from Winburg and co-operate towards the Tabaksberg and Doornberg, whilst the troops of Brigadier-General Speus, Colonel Rimington, and Lieut.-Colonel Wilson were disposed in the Senekal district, with the object of intercepting any bodies of the enemy which might be driven north by the action of General Elliot's force. On 29th August General Elliot ordered his four columns to converge, by a night march, upon the Korannaberg, where Commandant Haasbruck was reported to be with 300 men. The Korannaberg was surrounded on three sides, the Mounted Infantry co-operating from Thabanchu and Ladybrand, whilst Colonel Barker and Major Pine-Coffin took up a position to cut off the enemy's probable retreat to the Doornberg. No signs of Haasbruck, however, could be seen, and the men of Colonel Lowe's Brigade, who scaled the heights on foot, found only some 20 Boers on the summit, two of whom were killed and one wounded.

On 22nd August a party of the Black Watch

Mounted Infantry, detached from Ladybrand, to Modderpoort, to endeavour to drive any Boers found in that direction towards General Elliot's right front, was caught in unfavourable ground and captured by a commando said to be under De Wet. Our casualties were one man killed and one Officer and four men wounded, whilst the Boers who rushed the position had five men killed including Field Cornet Crowther.

The Division halted in the vicinity of the Koonaberg from 23rd August to 26th August awaiting the return of wagons sent in for supplies to Warringham's store and Winburg. These days were spent in thoroughly clearing the surrounding country.

On 23rd August, when at Maquatling's Nek on General Elliot's right, Brigadier-General Broadwood heard of the mishap to the Black Watch Mounted Infantry. He at once made a forced night march to their assistance, but arrived too late either to prevent the capture or to overtake the enemy.

Three days later the march towards the Wittebergen was resumed, Brigadier-General Broadwood passing through Clooclan on the right, and Lieut.-Colonel Barker and Major Pine-Coffin co-operating on the extreme left.

As the advance progressed it was reported that 1,000 Boers under Haasbruck, Froneman, Koen, and Hermanus Steyn had moved north from Wonderkop on the 26th on hearing of the approach of our troops. On the 30th General Elliot's columns arrived upon a line Retief's Nek-Commando Nek, and several days were employed in exploring the valleys and kloofs on the western slopes of the Wittebergen. A large number of horses, cattle, and wagons were found hidden in the valleys, and others were driven over the ridges in the direction of General Campbell's troops.

The division then commenced its march back to refill and refit at Winburg where it arrived on 5th and 6th September. Colonel Barker and Major Pine-Coffin remained in the vicinity of Slabbert's and Retief's Nek until 5th September and then followed General Elliot's force to Winburg.

During General Elliot's movement from Glen 13 Boers were killed and 11 were wounded, the captures being 21 prisoners, 4,257 horses, 9,580 cattle, 136 carts, and 69 wagons. These results were disappointing.

Lieutenant-General Sir L. Rundle's Operations in Eastern Orange River Colony.

6. Major-General Campbell's column which had left Harrismith on 8th August passed through Retief's Nek on the 14th, and took up a position in the Brandwater basin near Fouriesburg in anticipation of General Elliot's movement from Glen towards the Wittebergen. Colonel Harley's column was employed at the same time in escorting supplies from Harrismith to Bethlehem for the use of the garrison and any troops operating in the neighbourhood.

The results of General Elliot's movement did not, as already stated, fulfil my expectations, for it had been hoped that his march would have had the effect of driving a considerable number of Boers into the hands of General Campbell. As, however, nearly all the enemy escaped towards the north, General Campbell's opportunities were greatly limited, and his captures on the eastern slopes of the Wittebergen were confined to a few wagons, carts, and horses.

A third mobile column, which will work from Bethlehem as a centre, has just been organised at Harrismith. It will be under the command of Brigadier-General Sir John Dartnell, and will consist of the two regiments of Imperial Light

Horse, specially equipped with a view to securing increased mobility.

Operations of Brigadier-General Spens and Colonel Rimington in the Kroonstad District.

7. Brigadier-General Spens, who had moved south from Heilbron on 6th August, passed through Paardekraal on the 10th, and arrived at Kroonstad two days later, bringing in with him 12 prisoners, 900 cattle, 30 carts, 2 wagons, and 186 horses, which had been captured during the march by his Mounted Infantry, under Major Gough.

General Spens again left Kroonstad on 16th August, moving east along the right bank of the Valsch River to a farm north of Welvert. From this point, on the same night, the whole of his mounted troops, under Lieut.-Colonel Jenner and Major Gough, with four Royal Horse Artillery guns, made a forced march of 35 miles, and surrounded the town of Lindley before daylight on the 17th. The place was, however, found to be deserted, and on the 18th the mounted troops rejoined Brigadier-General Spens, at Paardeplaats, 6 miles north-west of Lindley.

On 20th August, General Spens marched through the country north of the Lindley-Reitz road as far as Lovedale, his Mounted Infantry working well out on both flanks of his line of march. He reached Stryfontein on the 21st, and the same evening despatched Lieut.-Colonel Jenner and Major Gough to make a night march upon Sterkfontein and Kraaipunt, two farms on the Lindley-Bethlehem road, to surprise a party of 75 Boers, who had been reported in that neighbourhood. The morning light, however, was bad, and the Boers, warned of our approach, managed to escape under fire up the valley of the Valsch River. General Spens then pursued his march by Winkfontein and Sidbury (a few miles south of Lindley) to Uitkyk and Olievenfontein on the Lindley-Kroonstad road. At Olievenfontein his left flank guard became hotly engaged with a party of 200 Boers, who came to close quarters, and were only driven off after a sharp fight. In this affair Lieutenant Wallis, Royal Irish Fusiliers, and 2 men were killed and 13 of our men were wounded. The force reached Mariba, close to Kroonstad, on the 29th August.

Colonel Rimington's light column, which has also been employed in this part of the Orange River Colony, marched out of Kroonstad on 13th August, and on the 15th, near Doornkloof, 17 miles north-west of Lindley, captured a small convoy belonging to Field Cornet Reeves. On the 17th, Colonel Rimington moved to Vechtkop, where he found 200 Boers collected under Naude, Mentz, and Boshoff, whom he chased for about 8 miles in a south-easterly direction. His next objective was Trommel, near Reitz. Here on the morning of the 21st August, he successfully surprised a small laager and captured 16 prisoners, 10 wagons laden with provisions, 6 Cape carts, 20 horses, and 600 cattle. His force then marched back to Kroonstad, which was reached on 28th August.

Two days later, Colonel Rimington again left Kroonstad to operate in the direction of Senekal in connection with the advance to the Wittebergen, which had had the anticipated effect of forcing a number of Boers to move north out of General Elliot's line of march into the Senekal district. Colonel Rimington was followed on 1st September, by the columns under Brigadier-General Spens and Colonel Wilson, which also moved south upon his right flank to endeavour to intercept such parties of the enemy. On 31st August, Colonel Rimington encountered small commandos,

under De Vos and Latégan, which were chased and dispersed with a loss to themselves of 8 wagons, 4 carts, and a number of cattle. On approaching Senekal, Colonel Rimington sighted another Boer convoy, which was captured after a hard chase of 10 miles to the south of the town; 4 Boers were killed and 10 prisoners, 61 loaded wagons, 25 carts, and over 2,000 cattle with some horses and mules were taken; our own casualties being 4 men wounded. On 3rd September, Colonel Rimington reconnoitred towards Blitzberg, and on the 6th returned to Kroonstad with his captives. He left again yesterday to search some likely localities to the south and east of Heilbron.

Lieut.-Colonel Wilson, whose troops co-operated on the right of the other two columns, marched back to Kroonstad on 8th September. He reports that on 1st September, when near Zuurfontein on the Kroonstad-Senekal road, he was engaged with some of De Vos's men, and that on the 4th he encountered Haasbruck's commando half-way between Senekal and Ventersburg; 7 Boers were killed and 3 prisoners, 2,000 cattle, 15 loaded wagons, 18 empty ones, and 22 carts were captured.

The central column, under General Spens, which moved direct upon Senekal is also returning towards Kroonstad, having met with some success; 5 Boers have been killed, 3 have voluntarily surrendered, and 11 prisoners, 34 Cape carts, and 1,800 cattle have been captured.

Lieutenant-Colonel Garratt's Operations.

8. On 8th August, Lieut.-Colonel Garratt, who had followed in rear of Major-General Elliot's movement to the Modder River, was near the junction of the Vet and Zand Rivers. On the 9th he marched to Bultfontein, where 2 Boers were killed and several wagons taken, and on the 12th captured 2 prisoners and 250 cattle in a pursuit which took him to the right bank of the Zand River. He then turned north to Honing Spruit from which point, on 18th August he detached 300 mounted men and 30 Burgher Police, under Lieut.-Colonel Hon. H. White, upon a night march to the junction of the Khenoster and Honing Spruit. This force at dawn on the 19th completely surprised Spanneberg's laager, killed 1 Boer, and captured 25 prisoners, 31 rifles, 8 Cape carts, 4 wagons, 70 horses, 8 mules, and some cattle. Amongst the prisoners was Mr. Steyn, late Landdrost of Vredefort. During this successful movement, which was accomplished without any loss, our troops covered 56 miles in 36 hours.

On 21st August, Lieut.-Colonel Garratt recrossed the Vaal at Lindique Drift, and on the 23rd his mounted troops made a night march to the southern slopes of the Losberg in the hopes of surprising any parties of the enemy which happened to be in the neighbourhood. The effort was not unrewarded, for at daylight on the 24th, a small convoy, guarded by 50 Boers, was detected moving towards Buffelshoek (629). It was at once pursued, and 8 prisoners, 8 wagons, 8 Cape carts, 63 trek oxen, 162 other cattle, and 16 horses fell into the hands of our troops. Three Boers were left dead on the ground. At noon the same day a determined effort to retake the convoy was made by 300 Boers, who came from the southern side of the Gatsrand, and it was not till 5 p.m. that they were beaten off and driven in the direction of the Vaal. Our casualties in this engagement were 1 officer and 1 man killed, and 2 men wounded.

From 26th to 31st August Lieut.-Colonel Garratt remained near the Losberg, covering the establishment of posts by the South African Constabulary. Whilst employed on this duty on

28th August, he executed a night march in two columns from the Losberg to Leeuwoort (526) and was once again successful in capturing 13 prisoners (including Piet Delarey, a nephew of General Delarey), 40 horses, 12 mules, 40 cattle, and some rifles and ammunition. Having completed his work in this district, Lieut.-Colonel Garratt marched into Meyerton on 2nd September, and on the 5th entrained at Vereeniging for Paardekop Station on the Standerton line. This movement was consequent on the report of a Boer gathering at Blauwkoop, on the Vaal to the east of Ermelo, which, taken in conjunction with other intelligence, seems to point to the possibility of hostile action in the direction of the Natal border. Lieut.-Colonel Garratt was directed to move out from Paardekop on 8th September and to work towards Wakkerstroom.

Operations in the Magaliesberg District.

9. The military situation in the district south of Magaliesberg has much improved during the past month, and there is at the present moment scarcely a Boer to be found in the area bounded on the north by the Magaliesberg, on the south by the Vaal, on the east by the Pretoria line, and on the west by the Frederikstad-Breedt's Nek line of blockhouses. This satisfactory state of affairs has been due to the gradual extension of the system of Constabulary posts over this district, and to the recent work of the columns under Major-General Barton, Colonels Kekewich and Allenby, and Lieut.-Colonel Lord Basing, which has been very thorough in every way.

After the occupation of Breedt's Nek on 7th August, Colonels Allenby and Kekewich, with some assistance from Major-General Barton's troops, moved further to the east against Damhoek and Pampoen's Kraal passes, which were both successfully occupied. At the latter place they completely hemmed in and captured the whole of a party of 40 Boers, who included among their number Mr. F. Wolmarans, chairman of the late Volksraad. The majority of these prisoners, who were fully equipped with rifles, horses, and saddlery, were taken by the Volunteer Service Company of the King's Own Scottish Borderers under Major Mayne. Between 10th August and 12th August Colonel Allenby continued his search of the southern slopes of the Magaliesberg between Nooitgedacht and Grobelaar's Pass, a search which enabled him to discover and bring in 9 prisoners, 14 rifles, 20 wagons, 7 carts, and a quantity of dynamite.

On completion of these operations, which had resulted in the entire evacuation of the Magaliesberg by the enemy, Colonels Kekewich and Allenby moved to Commando Nek for supplies, whilst Major-General Barton made good their work by the establishment of a chain of posts from Breedt's Nek eastwards along the crests of the hills.

On 19th August Colonels Kekewich and Allenby again left Commando Nek for Zwartkopies (132) to follow up the Boers who had retired north from the Magaliesberg. After slight opposition Zwartkopies was occupied the following day by Colonel Allenby, who drove the enemy in the direction of Kameel Drift. Colonel Kekewich moved to Zoutpan Drift, and, searching from there the bed of the Crocodile River, effected the capture of 14 prisoners with their horses. On 23rd August Colonel Kekewich was at the junction of the Crocodile and Elands Rivers, Colonel Allenby being at Beestekraal (296) where 29 burghers tendered their voluntary surrender to him. On 25th August a further surrender of 16 burghers (including T. Kruger, a nephew of the ex-President) was made to Colonel Kekewich. As the enemy, however,

then continued their withdrawal still further north into a most difficult and inaccessible country the pursuit was abandoned, and Colonel Kekewich marched south upon Wolhuter's Kop, whilst Colonel Allenby moved west of the Hex River towards Rustenburg.

On 31st August Colonel Kekewich left Wolhuter's Kop for Rustenburg and Magato Nek to participate in some combined operations against General Kemp's commando on the western side of the Magaliesberg. Colonel Allenby preceded him with the same object, moving to Bashoek (1922), at the northern extremity of the Magaliesberg range.

Brigadier-General Gilbert Hamilton's Operations in the Ventersdorp District

10. On 8th August, as he approached Ventersdorp from the south, Brigadier-General Gilbert Hamilton was instructed to clear the country east of Lichtenburg as far as Tafel Kop. In this district he soon came into contact with Liebenberg's commando, but, despite every effort to overtake it, and repeated forced marches by day and night, General Hamilton was never able to bring the enemy to a serious action, and had to rest content with the capture of a few prisoners and cattle. He returned to Ventersdorp on 11th August, and then moved rapidly north to co-operate with the Carabineers (detached under Major Butler from Colonel Allenby's column) in a simultaneous attack upon Koperfontein (560) and Basfontein (923). This attack was successfully delivered on the morning of the 14th, and resulted in the capture of 10 prisoners, 27 wagons, and 100 cattle. Three Boers were killed; our own casualties being 1 officer and 1 man killed and 5 men wounded. Major Butler with the Carabineers then rejoined Colonel Allenby at Damhoek.

On 15th August General Hamilton again reconnoitred towards Tafel Kop, capturing 3 Boers and 1 wagon, and on the 19th he returned to Ventersdorp. His subsequent movements in connection with the combined operations against General Kemp are alluded to later.

Operations of Lord Methuen and Major-General Fetherstonhaugh in South-Western Transvaal.

11. At the conclusion of their work in the Marokani range and the valley of the Hart's River near Taungs, Lord Methuen and Major-General Fetherstonhaugh were directed to march back by parallel routes to Klerksdorp. Major-General Fetherstonhaugh, whose force had reached Taungs on 8th August, started for this return movement on the 9th. He marched in two columns along the right bank of the Vaal, searching the kloofs for hidden parties of the enemy and destroying a considerable quantity of supplies. Lieut.-Colonel Hickie was unfortunate in failing to meet with any large number of Boers, but on the 19th, when near Wolmaranstad, Lieut.-Colonel E. Williams obtained information that a convoy, under Commandant Vermaas, was to the north of him, near Katdoornplaats (23). He accordingly sent his wagons, under escort, towards Leeuwfontein (71) to give the appearance of a continuance of the march in that direction, and then with his Australians (New South Wales Mounted Rifles and Bushmen) made a rapid night march upon Katdoornplaats, which he reached at 6.15 a.m. on the following morning. Their wheel tracks showed Colonel Williams the direction taken by the Boers, and, after a gallop of 12 miles, he was able to ride down and capture the whole convoy, with 18 prisoners, 65 ox-wagons, 14 other vehicles, and 1,500 cattle. Amongst the

prisoners were the late Landrost of Bloemhof, and Du Toit, a telegraphist, with complete tapping apparatus. During this very successful enterprise the Australians covered 60 miles in 27 hours, and brought away with them every one of the captured vehicles.

General Fetherstonhaugh's two columns reached Klerksdorp on the 22nd and 23rd of August.

Lord Methuen left Taungs on 11th August, and moved towards Klerksdorp, on General Fetherstonhaugh's left. He was engaged during his march with commandos under General Delarey and Commandant Vermaas, and was able to bring into Klerksdorp on 22nd August 13 prisoners of war, 23 voluntary surrenders, 400 trek oxen, 1,848 other cattle, 43 wagons, 19 carts, 76 horses, and 8 mules. Several Boers were killed and wounded in the fighting which took place, Lord Methuen's casualties being 1 man killed, 1 Officer and 8 men wounded.

An effort was now made to encircle General Kemp, who, with 800 men, was reported to be in the hills south-west of Olifant's Nek. The columns employed in this attempt were those of Colonels Allenby and Kekewich, which were moving, as already shown, towards Bashoek (1022) and Magato's Nek. Brigadier-General Gilbert Hamilton's troops, which had marched from Ventersdorp to Naauwpoort (214), and the forces which had just arrived at Klerksdorp, under Lord Methuen and Major-General Fetherstonhaugh.

At noon on 1st September the situation was as follows:—Lord Methuen, who had left Klerksdorp on 27th August, at Brakfontein (278); Lieut.-Colonel Hickie (of Major-General Fetherstonhaugh's command) at Bankdrift (549); General Fetherstonhaugh at Leeuwfontein (339); Lieut.-Colonel Williams between Rietfontein (911) and Syferwater; Brigadier-General Gilbert Hamilton holding the ground between Zandfontein (256) and Vlikfontein (584); Colonel Kekewich at Magato's Nek; and Colonel Allenby at Bashoek (1022) extending his right towards Lord Methuen's left. General Kemp on this date was apparently within the encircling cordon, but a necessary movement of Lord Methuen's troops, who were covering a good deal of ground to block a reported attempt at escape towards Lindley's Poort, enabled the Boer leader to turn sharp to the west and break out through the increased interval between Lord Methuen and Colonel Hickie. His escape, however, was only partial, for, though his mounted men got through, a large body of dismounted Boers, wagons, carts, ammunition, and stores were left behind secreted in the kloofs of this rugged country. At least 169 prisoners are already in our hands, and Major-General Fetherstonhaugh continues to search for others who may still be hiding. 14,000 rounds of ammunition, and a large quantity of supplies have also been captured.

At the conclusion of this operation which may be said to have terminated on 3rd September, Lord Methuen returned to Zeerust, and Brigadier-General Hamilton was directed to march on Kaffir's Kraal (135), 15 miles north-west of Klerksdorp. Colonel Kekewich remained upon the ground for a day or two, to assist General Fetherstonhaugh in his search for any stragglers of Kemp's force, and on 7th September moved to Middelfontein (622) on his way back to Naauwpoort (214).

Colonel Allenby was recalled, by Rustenburg, to Commando Nek, which he will reach on 9th September. His return march has been marked by a well-managed surprise of a Boer

laager at Schaapkraal (41), where he captured 22 prisoners, 30 rifles, 10 loaded wagons, 4 carts, 300 cattle, and a lot of ammunition. Two Boers and 2 men of the Scots Greys were killed.

On his way to Zeerust Lord Methuen had some sharp fighting. He marched from Brakfontein (278) to Roodeval (263) on 2nd September, and at Pella, 12 miles further to the north-west, captured Field Cornet van Tonder's convoy after a hard gallop. Six Boers were left dead on the field, and 22 prisoners, 28 wagons, 10 carts, 1,200 cattle, and 7,400 rounds of ammunition were captured. The following day Lord Methuen moved on to Straat's Drift (977), and on the 4th turned south to Rieckert's Dam (203) where he took 9 prisoners and 4 wagons. On 5th September his troops had a long and hard day's fighting in the difficult bush country of the Marico valley, in which he appears to have been opposed on his right front by General Delarey and Field Cornet van Tonder, and on his left front by Commandants D. Botha and Liebenberg, whilst the Marico commando under Commandant Lemmer and Field Cornet Louw engaged his rear guard. The brunt of the action was borne by the 5th Battalion Imperial Yeomanry, and Lord Methuen's two Welsh squadrons. 11 Boers were killed, 8 were wounded, and 11 prisoners, with 10 wagons and 5 carts were captured. On the 8th the force marched to Vaalkop on its way to Zeerust.

A column detached from Lord Methuen's command, under Lieut.-Colonel Von Donop also simultaneously made its way from Brakfontein to Zeerust by a more southern route through Quagshoek (243) and the lead mines, during which march 3 prisoners, 39 vehicles, and some cattle were captured. Lord Methuen's casualties between Brakfontein and Zeerust were 1 Officer and 12 men killed, and 2 Officers and 28 men wounded.

Operations on the Pietersburg Line.

12. Lieut.-Colonel Grenfell has continued his operations during the past month against General Beyers, in the districts to the west of the Pietersburg line, but meagre results have been obtained owing to the determination of the enemy to avoid all risk of contact with our troops. 9 Boers have been killed, and Colonel Grenfell has captured 15 prisoners, 23 wagons, and a few horses and oxen.

The district, however, has been the scene of two train-wrecking incidents, which bring discredit I think on the Boer forces. The first of these occurred on 10th August, when a train was derailed by the explosion of a mine near Naboom Spruit Station, and the passengers at once attacked by a party of Boers in ambush. Upon this occasion 1 civilian was killed, and 2 soldiers and 2 refugees (1 of whom was a woman) were wounded. On 31st August this incident was entirely surpassed by the derailment of another train between Waterval and Hamanskraal Stations by means of an observation mine. The spot chosen for this attack was a deep cutting, from the banks of which the inmates of the train were shot down before they had time to recover from the shock of derailment. In this painful affair, out of some 50 persons who were travelling in the train, we had to deplore the loss of 1 Officer, 13 men, 1 civilian, and 2 natives killed, and 4 Officers, 20 men, and 1 woman wounded. Amongst the killed was Lieut.-Colonel Vandeleur, Irish Guards, an Officer universally regretted, who had proved his worth to the Army at a very early age. Although it may be admitted that the mining of railways and the derailment of trains is in no way opposed to the customs of war where any

definite object is in view, it is impossible to regard senseless and meaningless acts of this nature, which have no effect whatever on the general course of operations, as anything better than wanton murder.

To pursue these train wreckers, who retired eastward from Hamanskraal towards Wagen Drift (453), Major-General Barton at once despatched a flying column from the Hekpoort valley by Zilikat's Nek to Waterval. This force consisting of 250 men and two Royal Horse Artillery guns, under Lieut.-Colonel Hackett Thompson, overtook the marauders near Wagen Drift. Four of the latter were killed, and Lieut.-Colonel Hackett Thompson was able to recover a portion of the mails which had been removed from the derailed train. After this engagement the column marched into Eerste Fabriken, and returned thence to Waterval on 8th September.

General Blood's Operations in North-Eastern Transvaal.

13. On 9th August Major-General Walter Kitchener and Colonel Campbell, with their columns, were at Diepkloof (375), 35 miles north of Middelburg, and Colonel Park, who had been operating about the Tantesberg, was at Paardekloof (99). From the mounted troops of these three columns Major-General Kitchener now organised, under his own command, a flying column, consisting of the 18th and 19th Hussars, the 4th Mounted Infantry Battalion, two guns of the 81st Battery, Royal Field Artillery, a pompom, and 60 men of the Devonshire Regiment, who were to be carried in carts. He moved the remainder of the Infantry and wagons, under Colonels Campbell and Park, to Rooikraal (14) and Holnek (481), and then with the flying column left Diepkloof at 4 a.m. on the 10th for Krokodil Drift on the Olifant's River. No Boers were seen in the valley of the Blood River, across which the column passed, and Kafir reports stated that Viljoen and his commando would be found on the banks of the Moos. Leaving one company of Mounted Infantry and the pompom to hold Krokodil Drift, General Kitchener pushed on with the remainder of his force over the Moos stream, where he saw no signs of the enemy, towards the valley of the Eland's River. On arrival upon the low heights overlooking this river, clouds of dust were observed about 7 miles away on the Slagboom-Droukfoutein road, but the impenetrable nature of the bush in that direction defeated all efforts to close with what appeared to be a large convoy. As this convoy seemed to be moving down the left bank of the Eland's River towards Commissie Drift, Major-General Kitchener headed for the same point along the right bank, only to find on arrival there that the Boers had turned back to the south-west. He therefore retraced his steps to Uyskraal (228), and on 16th August the 19th Hussars pushed up the Eland's valley towards Vrieskraal (18), followed at some distance by the remainder of the flying column. At 2.30 p.m. that day a report was received from the Officer Commanding the 19th Hussars to the effect that the Boers were in position to his front, and that he was being hard pressed by parties of the enemy, who sought to surround his regiment in the dense bush. The 18th Hussars and guns were at once pushed forward in support, and upon their arrival the enemy were steadily forced back into some kopjes, which were evacuated altogether during the night. During this engagement we had 5 men killed, and 4 Officers and 19 men of the 19th Hussars, who were at one time surrounded and captured, were released during the progress of the fighting.

Major-General Kitchener then rejoined Colonel

Campbell at Rooikraal, and the flying column was broken up, the 4th Mounted Infantry returning to Colonel Park.

From Rooikraal Major-General Kitchener and Colonel Campbell moved south by Blinkwater (41) to the railway, and Colonel Park proceeded through Roos Senekal towards Witpoort (26). On the 4th September both General Kitchener and Colonel Campbell were refitting their columns at Wonderfontein, and on the 8th September Colonel Park reached Bankfontein (234) 5 miles north-east of Middelburg. The result of the operations of these three columns during the period here referred to has been 16 Boers killed, 53 prisoners, 22 voluntary surrenders and 2,072 cattle, 76 horses, 60 wagons, and 24 carts captured. Colonel Park also found a 15-pr. gun and 3 Maxims, which had been destroyed by the enemy.

Between the 8th and 14th August, on which latter date he returned to Carolina, Colonel Benson operated between that town and Ermelo. On the 15th he left Carolina for Nootgedacht (178) with the intention of surprising a Boer laager reported to be at Warmbaths, 34 miles north-east of Carolina. At Nootgedacht he dropped his wagons, and he then made a long night march which terminated with the complete surprise and surrender of the enemy's camp. Two of the Boers were killed, and 32 prisoners, 500 cattle, and 110 horses were captured. The prisoners included C. Breytenbach, Captain of Scouts for the Carolina district, and Mr. De Villiers, father-in-law of Mr. Schalk Burger. In this, as in other enterprises undertaken by Colonel Benson, the greatest credit was due to Lieut.-Colonel Wools Sampson, whose careful leading across the veldt, for 34 miles on a dark night, contributed materially to the success achieved. The majority of the prisoners were captured by the Eastern Transvaal Scouts, who were well directed in the attack by Major Young. At the conclusion of this successful operation Colonel Benson returned to Carolina.

An incident then occurred which pointed to a considerable gathering of Boers in the upper part of the Bronkhorst Spruit valley. On 17th August a force of the South African Constabulary and Morley's Scouts, which had been patrolling under Captain Wood, South African Constabulary, in front of the Constabulary posts to the south of Bronkhorst Spruit Station, unexpectedly came upon and attacked a greatly superior Boer force which was halted at Middelburg (487), 23 miles south of the railway. The enemy, who were subsequently reported to have numbered 800, were completely surprised by the sudden rush of our men. Twenty-three Boers were killed, 11 were taken prisoners, a large number were wounded, and all their horses stampeded. Our success, however, was rather short-lived. Discovering that the force by which they had been attacked was a small one, the enemy rallied, assumed the offensive, and drove our men back, after a hand-to-hand fight, in the direction of Bronkhorst Spruit. In the retirement the Boers were able to recover the 11 prisoners who had been taken from them, and to capture 14 of our men, including Captain Moiley, of Morley's Scouts, who was dangerously wounded. Our other casualties were 1 man killed and 5 men wounded.

On receipt of the news of this affair, Lieut.-Colonel Bewicke-Copley, whose column was at Springs, was ordered to make a forced march on Middelburg (487) and to endeavour to get touch with the command to which Captain Woods had been engaged. He left Springs on 18th August, and on the 19th reached the scene of

the encounter, where he learned that the enemy's laager had already moved away in a south-easterly direction. A few Boers who still hovered about the neighbourhood were dispersed, and Colonel Bewicke-Copley then moved to Olifantsfontein (138) and sent in his wagons to bring out further supplies from Springs.

Colonel Benson had already been ordered to move west in consequence of reports of this Boer concentration, but some delay occurred owing to a misapprehension as to the urgency of his orders. He left Carolina on 21st August, moving west by Vaalbank to Middlekraal (298), then turned north to Roodeport (8) to draw supplies from Middelburg, and on the 28th pushed on west again towards Brakfontein (126) near the sources of the Wilge River. To co-operate with him in this locality Lieut.-Colonel Bewicke-Copley was again ordered to move east from Olifantsfontein to Springs. At dawn on the 31st August Lieut.-Colonel Bewicke-Copley occupied Haverklip and Brakfontein after a night march of 20 miles, and at once became engaged with 450 Boers, whom he drove back with loss. Seven prisoners (including Lieutenant Roos, Staats Artillery, who was dangerously wounded), 2 wagons, 21 horses, and 95 cattle remained in Colonel Bewicke-Copley's hands. On 30th August Colonel Benson reached Rietvlei (169), and there learnt that the enemy had gone south towards the upper part of the Waterval valley. He, therefore, left his wagons and made a night march upon Kroomdraai (100) where he overtook and captured a small laager with 14 prisoners (two of whom were wounded), 12 wagons, 17 Cape carts, 80 horses, 514 cattle, 11 mules, and some supplies. Amongst the prisoners were T. Beesters, late Landdrost of Heidelberg, and Brink, a member of the Special Government Court for the trial of prisoners.

As the majority of the Boers had escaped south-east and further pursuit was useless, Colonel Benson then marched on 6th September to Witbank Station on the Delagoa line, whilst on the 4th Lieut.-Colonel Bewicke-Copley returned to Springs.

Operations of Lieutenant-Colonel Colville's Column.

14. After the operations near Watervalshoek, north of Greylingstad, the columns under Lieut.-Colonel Colville and Lieut.-Colonel Stewart marched back to Standerton, where the latter, on 10th August, entrained for Dundee to reinforce the troops on the north-east frontier of Natal. Colonel Colville left Standerton again on 15th August and, crossing the Klip River at Kaffir's Kraal (211), marched by the west of Gembokhoekberg to Brakpan (423), 18 miles south-east of Vrede, where he established an entrenched camp. On the 20th with his mounted troops and guns he searched the Upper Klip Valley, and then crossed the Drakensberg into Natal by Muller's Pass, taking into Newcastle a quantity of captured stock and several prisoners. He returned to Brakpan by Botha's Pass, and thence moved back to De Lange's Drift, near Standerton. During these operations, Colonel Colville's men were constantly sniped at by parties of Boers under Mou'nan and other local leaders, who frequent this district. Colonel Colville, who had several casualties in his force, returned to Standerton on 6th September.

Natal Frontier.

15. Persistent reports in the second week of August of a concentration of Boers in the districts to the east of Vryheid and Utrecht seemed to point to the possibility of trouble on the frontiers of Natal, and it was therefore arranged that Lieut.-General Sir H. Hildyard's command

should be strengthened by the addition of two mobile columns under Lieut.-Colonels Pulteney and Stewart. Colonel Stewart's movement from Standerton to Dundee has already been alluded to, and Colonel Pulteney's column was formed at Utrecht by 16th August. The latter consisted of the Victorian Mounted Rifles (brought round by train from Brugspruit on the Delagoa line), a squadron of the 8th Hussars, the Dublin Fusiliers Mounted Infantry, and two guns. From Dundee Lieut.-Colonel Stewart moved to Vryheid, and, on 18th August, Lieut.-Colonel Pulteney left Utrecht for Kambuladraai, where he effected a junction on the 23rd with Lieut.-Colonel Stewart. On this date Lieut.-Colonel Pulteney had a sharp engagement with the enemy on the west side of the Schurveberg, in which the Victorian Mounted Rifles had 2 men killed and 5 wounded.

On 24th August, both columns returned to Vryheid, and on the 27th again moved out, united under the command of Colonel Blomfield, to the junction of the Pivaan and Manzaan Rivers. The march was opposed by parties of Boers under Hans Scholtz, who had two men killed, but little could be done, owing to the impracticable nature of the country, and on the 31st the force returned to Vryheid. On 2nd September, Colonel Blomfield again marched from Vryheid to operate down the valley of the Umvalosi. His columns reached Bethal (683) and Brakfontein (374) on the 4th, where they were engaged with the enemy, and on the 5th moved to Nondweni. From Nondweni they have returned to Dundee.

Cape Colony.

16. The movement of General French's column from the line Beaufort West-Pearston-Drenuan Station-Cameron Glen-Cathcart, which commenced in the first week in August, was steadily carried out, the enemy being gradually pressed northward towards the Orange River. On the night of the 9th and 10th August Krutzinger's men retiring before our advance, broke in small parties through the line of blockhouses between Middelburg and Steynsburg, and re-assembling north of the Zuursberg at Langekloof, 15 miles north-west of Steynsburg, were there joined by other bands under Erasmus, Wessels, and Pypers. This gathering was attacked on the 13th near Rooifontein (20 miles north-east of Steynsburg) by Lieut.-Colonel Gorringer, who drove the enemy past Venterstad into Orange River Colony. In their retreat the Boers suffered considerable loss. Commandant Cachet being among the killed, and Commandant Erasmus and Krutzinger's Secretary being captured. Another party of 80 Boers, under Lategan, was also forced on 12th August into the Orange River Colony to the west of Norval's Pont being attacked, as already mentioned, after crossing the river by both Lieut.-Colonel Byng and Brigadier-General Plumer. The commandos, however, under Lotter and Botha, which had been driven north from the Rhenosterberg (south-west of Middelburg) between 11th and 14th August, were successful in breaking back through our columns and regaining the hills about Spitzkop, 30 miles south of Middelburg, whilst Commandant Smits' party, also dislodged from the Rhenosterberg, retired in a north-westerly direction across the railway to Platkuil, 12 miles west of Deelfontein.

After breaking back Lotter and Botha returned to the Cradock district, a party under Theron moved south by Aberdeen towards Willowmore, and Smit from Deelfontein made his way into the country between Carnarvon and Fraserburg road.

General French was able to report at the con-

clusion of this drive to the north that 19 Boers had been killed, 43 wounded, and 17 captured.

On reaching the line of the Orange River he made the following dispositions with a view to watching for the possible return of those who had been driven out of Cape Colony, and taking up the pursuit of the different parties which had escaped once more to the south. Lieut.-Colonel Wuydham was directed to follow Smit to the west; Colonel Crabbe, Lieut.-Colonel Hunter-Weston, and Captain Lund remained to the west of Colesberg to close Zand Drift and prevent the return of Lategan; Colonel Gorringer's column and the 17th Lancers were ordered to continue in observation of the Orange River between Norval's Pont and Bethulie; and Lieut.-Colonels Doran, Scobell, and Kavanagh were sent south to regain touch with Lotter, Botha, and Theron. A few days later Colonel Crabbe's column was railed to Matjesfontein in consequence of a report that Smit had moved south-east from Fraserburg with the object, if possible, of joining Scheepers near Laingsburg. Colonel Crabbe arrived at Matjesfontein on 3rd September.

On 5th September Lieut.-Colonel Scobell was able to achieve a brilliant success near Petersburg (40 miles west of Cradock), where he surrounded and captured the whole of Lotter's commando and a party of Boers under Breedt. 14 of the enemy were killed and 105 captured (46 of whom were wounded). The prisoners included Commandant Lotter and Field Cornets J. Kruger, W. Kruger, and Schoeman, and amongst the dead were two notorious rebels named Voster. 200 horses, 29,000 rounds of ammunition, and all the vehicles and supplies of the enemy fell into our hands.

Colonel Scobell, who deserves the greatest credit in connection with this affair, has brought to my notice the exceptional gallantry displayed during the engagement by Captain Lord Douglas Compton, 2nd Lieutenants Wynn and Neilson, all of the 9th Lancers, and Captain Purcell and Lieutenant Bowers, Cape Mounted Rifles. Our casualties were 10 men killed and 8 wounded, the latter including Lieutenant Burgess, Cape Mounted Rifles. It must also be mentioned that three days previously Lotter's commando had been checked by a party of Midland Mounted Rifles who killed 7 and wounded 6 of their number, and prevented the Boers from escaping by a pass which the patrol was then holding.

Other operations have been continued in different parts of Cape Colony. In the north-eastern area the Boers who remained after the departure of Fouché for the Orange River Colony, have been acting under the command of Myburg in the triangle Ladygrey, Dordrecht, and Burghersdorp. These men have been constantly kept on the move by Colonel Monro, who had a successful engagement with Myburg on the 29th August at Wolvekloofpoot, 20 miles north-east of Dordrecht, and drove a number of his commando over the Drakensberg into Transkei territory. Since this engagement Colonel Monro, with the aid of the local troops, has been blocking the defiles and holding the passes to prevent their return.

In the south the pursuit of Scheepers has been maintained by Brigadier-General Beaton, whose services were placed at the disposal of General French for this purpose. Scheepers has moved rapidly about from place to place. On the 13th August he was at Wanhoop, 15 miles south of Willowmore. He then passed by Aventure (8 miles south of Uniondale), to a point near George, where on the 24th he turned west to Klip Drift, south-east of Oudtshoorn. From Klip Drift he moved south of Oudtshoorn and

Ladysmith, being engaged by local troops, to Barrydale, which he reached on 31st August. He then marched to Montague, where he was anticipated by a detachment of the Berkshire Regiment, and he has since made several ineffectual attempts to cross the western line of railway near Matjesfontein, probably with the object of effecting a junction with Smit. Throughout these wanderings he has been closely pursued by our mounted troops under Lieut.-Colonel Alexander, who had 4 men killed, and 2 Officers and 10 men wounded in some sharp skirmishes about the 20th August to the south of Uniondale.

In the south-western portion of Cape Colony, Lieut.-Colonel Capper has controlled operations against a commando under Maritz, whose scattered followers aimlessly roam about the remote and thinly populated regions to the north of the Roggeveld Mountains.

Two attacks have been made on our troops in the Kimberley district. The first on 12th August upon Griquatown was repulsed by the little garrison of 100 men, who drove back a hostile force which was said to be under De Villiers and Conroy. The second attempt at Rooikopje on the 24th of the month, was an effort to capture a convoy which was making its way towards Griquatown. Upon this occasion, the escort which consisted of the 74th (Irish) Squadron, Imperial Yeomanry, under Captain Humby, behaved with great gallantry and determination. Though outnumbered by 400 Boers, who surrounded the convoy, and pressed to close quarters, our men held their ground and offered such a stubborn resistance, that at nightfall the enemy abandoned the attack and withdrew. On the following day Captain Humby, who did not lose a single wagon, took his convoy safely into Griquatown, but his losses were extremely heavy. Nine men of the escort were killed, and 2 Officers and 21 men were wounded.

17. During the month of August the losses inflicted on the enemy and captures made from him were as follows:—186 killed, 75 wounded, 1,384 prisoners, 529 voluntary surrenders, 930 rifles, 90,958 rounds of ammunition, 1,332 wagons and carts, 13,570 horses, 65,879 cattle. (The number of killed and wounded include only those that actually fell into our hands.) Taking into consideration the great reduction already effected in the numbers and resources of the enemy, it is very satisfactory to see that there is no falling off in the results which the columns have to show for their hard work. So long as this rate of progress can be maintained, there can be very little doubt as to its ultimate effect, even on an enemy to whom no other form of argument seems to appeal,
