**T**HE Right Honourable the Commissioners appointed by His Majesty to hear and determine all Claims of Services to be performed at the time of the ensuing Coronation (except those dispensed with by His Majesty's Royal Proclamation of the 26th day of June, 1901), and of fees to be received for the same, met at the Council Office, Whitehall, on Tuesday and Wednesday, the 14th and 15th of January instant, and, after several petitions of claims had been heard and determined, the said Commissioners adjourned *sine die*.

**T**HE following Scheme for the adjustment of the property, rights, liabilities, &c., of the Urban District of Bexhill, and for other purposes, as settled by a Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, is published in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882:—

**WHEREAS**, by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, it is enacted that where a petition for a Charter of Incorporation is referred to the Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and it is proposed by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporations Acts to the municipal borough to be created by the Charter the said Committee of Council may settle a scheme for the purposes in the said Acts named and containing such provisions as are in the said Acts particularized.

And whereas certain inhabitant householders of the district of Bexhill, in the county of Sussex, in the month of June, one thousand nine hundred, petitioned Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, praying for a grant of a Charter of Incorporation.

And whereas the said petition for a Charter was referred to the Committee of Council, and it was proposed by the Charter to create the parish of Bexhill hereinafter described a municipal borough, and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof, and by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporations Acts to the municipal borough to be created by the Charter.

And whereas by an Order of the Local Government Board, dated the 7th day of May, 1884, the said parish of Bexhill was constituted a Local Government District and was governed by a Local Board constituted pursuant to and under the pro-

visions of "The Public Health Act, 1875," but such Local Board of Health has now become an Urban District Council by virtue of the provisions of "The Local Government Act, 1894."

And whereas the parish of Bexhill for Poor Law purposes is a part of and is situate in the Battle Union, which union comprises parishes situate in the county of Sussex.

And whereas the following Acts have been adopted by and are in force within the district of the District Council, namely, "The Infectious Disease (Notification) Act, 1889," "The Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1890," "The Infectious Disease (Prevention) Act, 1890," and "The Private Street Works Act, 1892."

And whereas by the Commons Regulation (Bexhill) Provisional Order Confirmation Act, 1895, confirming a Provisional Order made by the Board of Agriculture, dated the 29th day of April, 1895, the Bexhill Urban District Council were invested with certain powers for the management and improvement of Bexhill Down, and were authorized to defray the expenses incurred under the said Order in the manner therein provided.

And whereas it is intended that arrangement shall be made for the consolidation of the police force of the borough of Bexhill, when constituted by Charter, with the police force of the administrative county of East Sussex.

And whereas the District Council is the urban sanitary authority for the said district of Bexhill, and such urban sanitary authority and the Guardians of the Poor of the Battle Union, in the county of Sussex, are the local authorities within the meaning of Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882.

And whereas this scheme was, before being settled by the Committee of Council, referred for consideration to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department and to the Local Government Board.

And whereas it is expedient that a scheme should be made and settled containing the provisions hereinafter set forth.

Now therefore pursuant to the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, and every other power enabling them in that behalf, the said Committee of Council have settled a scheme containing the provisions herein and do hereby direct, order and declare as follows:—

*Preliminary Provisions.*

This scheme may be cited for all purposes as the Borough of Bexhill Scheme, 1902.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Bexhill are in this scheme referred to as the Corporation.

Borough and Municipal Borough mean the Borough of Bexhill.

"District Council" means the Urban District Council of Bexhill.

The term "property" in this scheme means and includes all property, real and personal, and all things in action, and all rights of common and commonable rights, and rights to toll, and all franchises, privileges, and rights which have any pecuniary value, and all charters, records, deeds, books and documents, and all rights and all claims to relief, and all rights to avoid contracts or otherwise, and includes any estate or interest, legal or equitable, in or in respect of any property so defined.

#### *Commencement of Scheme.*

This scheme when confirmed shall be deemed to have come into operation on the day of the first meeting of the Council of the municipal borough created by the said Charter, and this scheme shall be construed and applied as if it had been dated and confirmed by Parliament or Order in Council on the day before the day of the said first meeting, and everything thereunder shall be done and had accordingly. This date is hereinafter referred to as "the commencement of this scheme." So far as may be necessary this scheme shall operate retrospectively.

#### *Sanitary Authority.*

The municipal borough created by the said Charter shall from and after the commencement of this scheme and thenceforward be placed within the jurisdiction of the Corporation, acting by the council of the borough as the sanitary authority of the said borough.

#### *Urban District Council Abolished.*

The District Council and their powers, duties, rights, obligations, liabilities, and privileges shall continue and be deemed to have continued to exist until the commencement of this scheme, unaffected in any manner whatsoever by the grant of the said Charter or the creation of the said borough.

From and after the commencement of this scheme the District Council and their district shall be abolished, and shall thenceforth be dissolved and cease to exist.

#### *Transfer of Jurisdiction, Property, &c., of Urban District Council.*

All the jurisdiction, powers, duties and property vested in or possessed by the District Council, or by any person or body in trust for them or any of their members as such shall vest in the Corporation, and shall be held exercised and applied for the municipal and public purposes of the said borough.

All duties and liabilities which immediately before the commencement of this scheme attached to and were enforceable against the District Council or the property thereof, shall attach to and be enforceable against the Corporation.

Any investigations, legal proceedings or remedy in respect of any debt, liability, penalty, or forfeiture due to or incurred by or on behalf of the District Council before the commencement of this scheme, may be continued, prosecuted or enforced by or against the Corporation.

The district fund and the general district rate of the borough shall take the place of and be substituted for the district fund and general district rate respectively of the Urban District Council, and all sums of money respectively payable to, from or out of, and all liabilities charged upon or

attaching to the district fund or general district rate of the Urban District shall be paid to, from, or out of, and shall be charged upon the said district fund and general district rate of the said borough respectively.

All the rights, interests, powers, property, obligations and liabilities whatsoever of the District Council acting as the Urban Sanitary Authority of the district of Bexhill by virtue of the following Acts, namely, "The Public Health Act, 1875," "The Infectious Disease (Notification) Act, 1889," "The Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1890," "The Infectious Disease (Prevention) Act, 1890," and "The Private Street Works Act, 1892," and any Act amending or extending the same, the Sanitary Acts as defined by "The Public Health Act, 1875," "The Commons Regulation (Bexhill) Provisional Order Confirmation Act, 1895," and any local or general Act for purposes the same or similar to those of the aforesaid Acts, shall be transferred to, vested in, devolve upon, and be exercisable by and shall be enforceable against the Corporation.

The Town Clerk of the borough shall be substituted for and perform the duties of the Clerk to the District Council.

#### *Bye-laws.*

The regulations made under "The Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milk-Shops Order of 1885," and under "The Allotments Act, 1887," and the bye-laws and lists of fees and charges in force in the Urban District of Bexhill at the commencement of this scheme, shall, unless duly repealed, varied, or revoked, continue in force, and have operation in the borough, in like manner, and with the like effect, as if the Corporation, acting by the Council and their officers and the borough, were referred to therein instead of the Local Board or District Council, as the case may be, and their officers and the district.

The bye-laws for the good rule and government of the administrative county of the Eastern Division of Sussex, so far as they are now in force in the district of Bexhill, shall continue in force and be enforced within the borough for two years from the commencement of this scheme or until their earlier repeal or variation as respects the said borough.

#### *Savings for Rates, &c.*

Notwithstanding the incorporation of the borough and the provisions of this scheme, all rates, assessments, compositions, charges, mortgages, contracts, leases, conveyances, deeds, documents, acts, matters and things made, entered into, or done before the commencement of this scheme by, to, or with reference to the District Council shall be as good, valid, and effectual to all intents and purposes whatsoever for, against, and with reference to the Corporation, as if the same had been made, entered into, or done by, to or with reference to the Corporation instead of the District Council, and may be proceeded on and enforced in the same manner in all respects as if the Corporation instead of the District Council had been party or privy to the same, and been named or referred to therein.

#### *Compensation for existing Officers.*

In case any officer of the District Council who shall have been employed by the District Council shall not be employed by the Council of the said borough nor offered by the said Council a position in their employ of a similar character and of an equal value to that formerly held by him he shall be entitled to be paid by way of compensation for the loss of his position out of the funds of or under the control of the Corporation, acting

by the Council as the Sanitary Authority for the said borough, and the amount to be paid in each case shall be determined in accordance with the provisions of section 120 of the Local Government Act, 1889, and subsections (1) to (7) inclusive of that section shall apply as if they formed part of this scheme with the substitution of the words "Borough Council" for "County Council" and "this Scheme" for "this Act," and with such other modifications as are necessary to make them applicable hereto.

Provided, nevertheless, that if any such officer be so employed by the said Corporation and discharged by them (otherwise than for misconduct) within two years of the commencement of this scheme, he shall be entitled to compensation in the same manner as if he had not been employed by the said Corporation. Provided that the term "officer" shall include only persons employed by the said Council whose salaries or emoluments are payable at intervals of not less than one month, and no other persons.

The accounts of the District Council and their officers shall be (as soon as conveniently may be) audited by the District Auditor in like manner, and subject to the like powers, duties, provisions, and right of appeal as if the Charter had not been granted, and the provisions of sections two hundred and forty-seven and two hundred and fifty of "The Public Health Act, 1875," as amended by "The District Auditors Act, 1879," and any regulations duly issued by the Local Government Board with respect to the audit of accounts of Local Boards or Urban District Councils and of their officers shall apply to such audit, and the provisions of this scheme with respect to the District Council shall be construed so as to admit of such exceptions as may be necessary to enable such audit to be duly made, but such exceptions shall be strictly limited in time, extent, character, and operation, to the purposes of such audit.

Any money certified by the District Auditor at such audit to be due from any person shall be paid by such person to the Borough Treasurer.

And whereas Orders in Council have been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards hereinafter mentioned from the time specified in such Orders; and whereas it seems fit to His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards be postponed:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance

of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows, viz.:-

In the Parish Churchyard of Saint Helen, Willingham, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincoln, until the thirtieth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and two.

In the Parish Churchyards of Saint Michael and Christchurch, Stone, in the county of Stafford, until the thirtieth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and two.

THE following Despatches have been received from Lord Kitchener, G.C.B., &c., Commanding-in-Chief, in South Africa:—

From Lord Kitchener to the Secretary of State for War.

Army Head-Quarters, Pretoria,

SIR, 8th November, 1901.

WHEN I closed my last despatch dated 8th October, the attempted raid on Natal by General Louis Botha had completely failed, and the Boer commandoes had been driven back into the Piet Retief district.

1. On the 11th October, Lieut.-Colonel Colville's Column covering the construction of the blockhouse line from Wakkerstroom reached Piet Retief, and there learnt that the enemy was moving through Swaziland by Mahamba. He pushed on without delay, and on the 15th at Schwaabe's store succeeded in intercepting a convoy belonging to the Ermelo and Amsterdam commandoes, the burghers themselves with whom General Botha was reported to be having pressed on to effect their escape before Colonel Colville's advance.

There now remained south of Wakkerstroom—Piet Retief line, only the local men together with a considerable number of stragglers from the northern commandoes.

The construction of the blockhouse line had been well and rapidly carried out by the troops placed at Brigadier-General Bullock's disposal; and though not sufficiently far advanced to completely intercept the enemy's retreat, it did to a great extent hamper his movements, and forced him to abandon all his wagons, most of which together with the two guns of the 69th Battery captured at Blood River Poort have since fallen into our hands.

As soon as Brigadier-General Plumer's force could be released from its work in the south-east of the Orange River Colony it was railed to Volksrust, and marched on thence to act on the blockhouse line, midway between Wakkerstroom and Colonel Colville's Column on the Swazi border. Meanwhile, the line itself was being rapidly strengthened, and the obstacles to render it impassable were being gradually constructed between posts.

The columns which had driven the enemy north continued, under General Walter Kitchener's direction, to harass the stragglers and local commandoes south of the line, and when the news was confirmed that General Botha had actually passed north with a few men, near Piet Retief on night of 8th October, and not as was supposed with the commando which had moved through Swaziland, and that he was already near Amsterdam with a small following, I decided to send columns under Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson and Colonel Rimington, then on the Vaal within reach of Standerton, to attack his tired forces.

These two columns marched from Standerton on 19th October, by Paardekop, and reached

Amersfoort on 21st; thence they worked north, and before dawn on the 25th, Colonel Rimington after a long night march surrounded a farm near Schimmelhoek (89), where the Boer leader was stated to be encamped. The operation was a difficult one. Between the columns and their objective, a Boer force 300 or 400 strong had been collected, and smaller posts were guarding the farm on all sides at a considerable distance from it. Colonel Rimington's Column was to make for the farm, avoiding the main laager and posts, while Colonel Rawlinson moved in between Ermelo and the farm. Our information was good, and the operation was well carried out by both columns, but it was almost too much to hope that the surprise would be complete, and when Colonel Rimington's mounted troops rushed Schimmelhoek they captured only four prisoners and some of General Botha's papers and personal property, which in the hurry of his departure he had been obliged to leave behind him. Certain of these papers afforded us useful information.

The enemy's main laager had also received information of the approach of our columns, and retreated north, towards Lake Chrissie, without being engaged. Pursuit in this direction was useless, and both columns returned south, Sir Henry Rawlinson reaching Volksrust on 29th, and Colonel Rimington Zandspruit on the same day.

To complete his operations south of the block-house line General W. Kitchener had at his disposal the columns of Colonel Campbell, Lieut.-Colonels Garratt and Stewart; also those of Brigadier-General G. Hamilton and Colonel Pulteney, who had moved from Vryheid, through Utrecht, to block any possible attempt to break through Northern Natal into the Orange River Colony.

Further south, Major-General Bruce Hamilton, with the columns under Brigadier-General Spens and Colonel Allenby, made a careful search of the country between Vryheid and Ngomi Forest.

While these operations were in progress heavy and continuous rains and thick mists added much to the difficulties which the troops had to overcome, but all worked hard to hunt down the scattered bands and clear the district.

In the many small skirmishes which took place 21 Boers were killed and 11 wounded, and over 160 unwounded prisoners were taken, together with 8,600 rounds small-arm ammunition, 400 horses, 5,800 cattle, 165 wagons, 54 carts, and large quantities of food stuffs.

This practically completed the work for which reinforcements had been brought to Natal during the month of September, and their gradual withdrawal was commenced on the 22nd October, when Colonel Allenby's column marched from Vryheid to Dundee, and entrained for Standerton, followed by General Spens' column, which reached Newcastle, by march, on 28th October. General Walter Kitchener's columns, except those under Lieut.-Colonels Garratt and Pulteney, were brought into Volksrust about the same time, Lieut.-Colonel Stewart's being detained there to act in conjunction with Colonel Sir Henry Rawlinson, while General G. Hamilton's and Colonel Campbell's moved on to Standerton, together with Colonel Rimington's from Zandspruit. At the same time the troops brought from Harrismith to guard the Zulu border from Eshowe were sent back to the Orange River Colony.

General Botha, reporting to his so-called Government on the 28th September, writes in reference to these operations:—

"To my regret I must report that it was

impossible for my commandoes to enter Natal because the enemy was aware of our plans, and he already had troops just opposite all the drifts of the Buffalo River."

"We had specially unfavourable weather, for 11 days it rained almost day and night. This weakened the horses very much, especially as we had to keep them tied up at night, and as I saw no chance of getting through to the Biggarsberg in one night, without exposing a large body of men to the danger of capture, I decided to move lower down, to see if there was no chance of working through from that direction. I sent a strong patrol towards Nqutu, thence we moved on Babanango, as Rorke's and Vant's Drifts were also in possession of the enemy."

"From the Buffalo River, I sent back to the Vryheid district about 300 horsemen whose horses were knocked up, so that nearly half of the original commando has returned."

2. While the enemy had been directing his attention to the futile attempt on Natal, his commandoes in the Eastern Transvaal had remained weak and inactive. During the greater portion of this period, Colonel Benson's column had been operating alone in this district, and the line of South African Constabulary posts had been moved forward unopposed to the Wilge River.

On the 12th October Colonel Benson's Column moved into Middelburg from the south to refit, and to exchange certain units. On the 20th he moved south from Middelburg, and on the 22nd, after a long night march, he surprised a laager at Klippoortje (169), due south of Brugspruit, capturing 37 prisoners. The following day Colonel Benson moved towards Bethal, and continuing to operate in that neighbourhood, had several small skirmishes with the enemy. On 26th October, when moving from Yzervarkfontein near Bethal towards Rietkuil (288) on the Steenkool Spruit, his rear guard was attacked with rather more than the usual vigour, and Civil Surgeon Robertson and one man were killed, but the attack was easily repulsed. Colonel Benson was aware that Commandants Grobblaar, Trichardt, and Erasmus had concentrated some 600 or 700 men to oppose him, and continually endeavoured to engage them, till on the 29th October he reported from Syferfontein (19), that he was moving the following day by Bakenlaagte (455) towards Brugspruit.

At 5 a.m. on the 30th October, the force marched from Zwakfontein (20), and was soon engaged in front and on both flanks by the enemy, estimated at some 500. These attacks were easily kept off, and the march was continued without any serious interruption. The morning was thick and misty, and heavy rain fell at intervals. At about 9 a.m. the advanced guard on approaching the farm Bakenlaagte, where Colonel Benson intended to halt, found the ground was held by the enemy, who after a short resistance was dislodged, and the column moved gradually into camp, covered by the rear guard, composed of two companies of Mounted Infantry, two squadrons 2nd Scottish Horse, two guns 84th Field Battery Royal Artillery, a pompom, and one company of the 2nd Bn. the Buffs, the whole under the command of Major Anley, 3rd Mounted Infantry.

The guns, with the company of the Buffs and 50 Mounted Infantry, took up a position on an irregular ridge running generally east and west, some 2,500 yards south of the camp. Small posts of Mounted Infantry were well out on either flank, and the remainder, with the Scottish Horse, occupying some hillocks another 1,000 yards to the south of the ridge where the guns



were in position, formed a screen to the whole.

As the front of the column was cleared, the numbers of the enemy hovering round the flanks and the rear guard increased. It was now past noon, the rain continued, and a strong wind was blowing from the south-west. The country was open, an expanse of vast rolling downs without any very marked features, giving a far-reaching command of view, while the deep hollows afforded cover for the approach of an enemy who knew the ground and avoided heights.

As soon as the column and baggage had been brought into camp, and all arrangements made for the defence, Colonel Benson ordered the screen of Mounted Infantry and Scottish Horse to fall back on the remainder of the rear guard at Gun Hill; when about to carry this out between 12 and 1 p.m., Major Anley, who was in command, reported that the enemy was advancing in greatly increasing numbers, and was already close to his position, which he could no longer hold. He at once retired on Gun Hill, sending a company of Mounted Infantry to some small kopjes well to the left. The movement had hardly commenced, when a strong Boer force appeared over the rise, immediately to the left of the position just vacated by the screen, and wheeling sharp to its left, pushed in the Scottish Horse and Mounted Infantry. Our men passed over the ridge to the northern slope, while the Boers formed up in a large area of dead ground, which lay immediately under and in front of its western extremity; here they dismounted, and rapidly worked their way into a good position within close range of the guns on the crest. The company of the Buffs, which formed the original escort, posted well to the front of the guns on the south side of the ridge, was captured by the enemy, as he rode practically into our position almost in touch with our men.

In spite of the gallant efforts of the Mounted Infantry Company of the Yorkshire Light Infantry and a squadron of the Scottish Horse, which promptly formed up on the flanks of the guns, our troops were unable to offer any serious resistance, and the ridge, with the exception of the extreme western end, which was held by a party of the Mounted Infantry until dark, gradually fell into the enemy's hands.

As soon as Colonel Benson had become aware of the nature of the attack, he had ordered up two more companies of the Buffs to reinforce the rear guard on the ridge, but these did not succeed in reaching any position whence their fire could be effectually brought to bear.

It is now known that the sudden change in the enemy's tactics was brought about by the arrival of a reinforcement of 600 or 800 men under Commandant General Louis Botha, which came on the field from the direction of Ermelo, shortly before noon. Their subsequent attack, which was delivered simultaneously both on the camp and rear guard, was greatly aided by the heavy rain and mist which concealed the enemy's movements, as the storm burst in the faces of our troops. The attack on the camp was easily driven off, but no further reinforcements could be sent to the ridge, nor were the guns in camp able to materially assist the defence of those with the rear guard.

Both Colonel Benson and Colonel Guinness fell by the guns on the ridge, the former being wounded in three places. The fight was continued until dusk, and when our ambulance moved out after dark to collect the wounded, the guns were removed by the enemy.

All ranks in camp worked hard to entrench the position, and before midnight had rendered

it so strong that no subsequent attack was made. On Colonel Benson being brought into camp, he placed Colonel Wools-Sampson, C.B., in command. He died of his wounds the following morning.

I deeply regret the loss of Colonel Benson and of the officers and men who fell with him. Colonel Benson had served with the Army in South Africa since the commencement of the war, first on the Staff of the 1st Division, then for a short time on the Staff of General Clements' Force, and since January last in the command of columns in the field. In every capacity he had shown soldierly qualities of a high order, and had invariably led his column with marked success and judgment. In him the Army loses an Officer of great promise.

The first news of Colonel Benson's engagement was received at 9.30 a.m. on 31st, and immediately Colonel Barter's column, composed chiefly of Infantry from Leeuwkop (218), and all available mounted troops from Standerton, under Brigadier-General Gilbert Hamilton, were at once ordered out in support. Both columns started at 2.30 p.m. the same day, and both got touch with Colonel Wools-Sampson's camp early on the morning of the following day, covering respectively 25 and 55 miles. General G. Hamilton's march was slightly opposed by some 300 to 400 Boers, who retired north-east on his approach. The bulk of the enemy had moved off the previous day, and were already beyond the reach of our columns.

Colonel Wools-Sampson moved with Colonel Barter to Leeuwkop, whence the wounded were sent to Springs, and subsequently marched north to refit at Brugspruit.

The further operations in the Eastern Transvaal during the period covered by this despatch were confined to the columns under Colonel Park in the Lydenburg district, Lieut.-Colonels Hacket-Thompson and Bewicke-Copley supporting the South African Constabulary posts, and Colonel Sir Henry Rawlinson acting in the Heidelberg district.

Colonel Park's column, which returned to Lydenburg from the north on the 7th October, has since then been employed in protecting the communications with Machadodorp, and watching the movements of General Ben Viljoen's commando, which has from time to time threatened convoys and made desultory attacks on the blockhouse line to Lydenburg, now under construction.

Lieut.-Colonel Hacket-Thompson's column was withdrawn temporarily from the northern end of the Constabulary blockhouse line, on the Wilge River, on the 14th October, to disperse a Boer commando, collected in the neighbourhood of De Wagen Drift on the Eland's River, whence it threatened the Pietersburg line. On the way north the mounted troops of this column, under Major Ross (Canadian Scouts), surprised and broke up Field-Cornet Jan Visagie's commando at Kranspoort (513).

Marching from Bronkhorstspruit on 20th October, Colonel Hacket-Thompson met with considerable opposition in the difficult country after passing Tweefontein (522), and was obliged to fall back on this point to await reinforcements. 600 Australians, under Lieut.-Colonel E. C. Williams, were railed up from Klerksdorp, and reached Tweefontein on 25th, whence the two columns, under Lieut.-Colonel the Hon. C. G. Fortescue, who had been nominated to command the column when the Cameron Highlanders under Lieut.-Colonel Hacket-Thompson were withdrawn, moved forward the following day on Sybrand's Kraal (296), where the advance was

slightly opposed, and a few prisoners were taken.

At 10 p.m. on the 26th, Colonel Williams resumed his movement by Kameelpoort (278) to Wolvekraal (560), where a Boer picquet was driven in, and 50 prisoners, 52 wagons, and a large number of cattle fell into his hands. The column bivouacked at Klipplaat Drift (395), and at about 2 p.m. on the 27th proceeded to force the difficult Witnek defile from the north. The enemy held the pass in some strength, and again brought a pom-pom into action. The energetic advance of our troops, however, eventually forced him to abandon his strong position, and he finally fled, leaving 5 dead on the ground. In the pass, which is 6 miles long, 4 prisoners and 4 wagons were secured, and at nightfall our troops bivouacked at its southern exit.

On the 30th October Lieut.-Colonels Fortescue and Williams returned to Eerste Fabrieken, Colonel Fortescue having in the meanwhile employed his troops in clearing the country round Tweefontein (522) and Wagen Drift.

On the 3rd November both of these columns were moved to Bronkhorstspuit, to reconnoitre towards Leeuwkop (107) (28 miles N.N.E. of Bronkhorstspuit) where touch was gained on the 5th with Colonel Dawkins' column from Nylstroom. Finding, however, that the majority of Muller's commando had crossed the Olifant's River and gone east, Colonels Fortescue and Williams returned to the railway and are now marching on Middelburg.

Lieut.-Colonel Bewicke-Copley was employed throughout the month in supporting the centre and southern portion of the line of Contabulary posts and in making occasional raids to the front, or co-operating with Colonel Benson's column when opportunities offered.

Colonel Sir Henry Rawlinson's column, after effecting the capture of Hans Botha's laager at Kafferspruit (199), marched to Greylingstad on the 10th October, and thence continued to operate to the south of the railway until brought into Standerton to move with Colonel Rimington to the Ermelo district.

3. In the Northern Transvaal, Lieut.-Colonel Colenbrander (Kitchener's Fighting Scouts) has traversed the Waterberg between Warmbaths and Magalapye, on the Rhodesian Railway, a district hitherto unvisited by our troops. He left Warmbaths on the 6th October, and taking his troops by a north-westerly route, through Zandriverspoort (824) and Hopewell (56), followed the Matlala's River to the Western Railway line, which he reached at Magalapye on the 21st October. During this march Colonel Colenbrander visited a number of Boer supply depôts, which had been carefully located beforehand, and during his march captured 45 prisoners of war, 67 rifles, nearly 4,000 rounds of ammunition, and a very large number of cattle and wagons. He received 10 voluntary surrenders. Colonel Colenbrander left Magalapye on the 2nd November, and is now on his way back to the Pietersburg line.

Lieut.-Colonel Dawkins, who succeeded to the command of Lieut.-Colonel Wood's column at Nylstroom on the 16th October, has also displayed much activity during the past month, operating with marked success against the minor Boer commandoes which frequent the country west of the railway between Nylstroom and Geelhout Kop.

By the 25th October, when he returned to Nylstroom, he had captured 97 prisoners of war, 237 rifles, 9,200 rounds of ammunition, 850 cattle, 20 wagons, and some horses. The prisoners taken included Field-Cornets J. J. Van

Staden, J. P. Botha, and J. Duvenhage, Captain G. Coetzee, Adjutant P. C. Muller, and C. E. Schutte, a former Landdrost of Pretoria.

Colonel Dawkins again left the railway on the 28th, and moved south-east to Alman's Drift, on the Eland's River, to endeavour to intercept any Boers driven north by the operations of Colonels Fortescue and Williams, and after proceeding as far east as Leeuwkop (107) without encountering any considerable force of the enemy, is now marching westwards again towards Pieuaar's River station.

4. In the South-Western Transvaal, on the 13th October, Colonel Kekewich, from Rustenburg, proceeded to Bashoek (1022) with the object of again operating westwards in the direction of Lindley's Poort (102), in conjunction with Lord Methuen, who was advancing from Zeerust.

The columns met on the 22nd October, having failed to find the Boers in any strength during their converging movement. From Lindley's Poort Colonel Kekewich returned to Bashoek, and Lord Methuen left again for Zeerust on the 24th October.

While Lord Methuen had marched on Lindley's Poort to meet Colonel Kekewich, a column, detached from his force under Lieut.-Colonel von Donop, had moved out from Zeerust, on the 17th October, by Rietvley (655), in the direction of Tafel Kop. This body of troops was on its return march to Zeerust when on the 24th, whilst between Wonderfontein (41) and Wilgeboom Spruit (276), a most determined attack was made upon it by 1,000 Boers under Generals Delarey, Kemp, and Celliers. Taking advantage of the thick bush through which our troops were passing, the enemy galloped into close quarters, and though promptly repulsed captured 10 of our wagons. Round the two guns of the 4th Battery, Royal Field Artillery, a hard fight was maintained on both sides—1 Officer and 17 men of the gun detachments, and 27 of the escort of the Northumberland Fusiliers, some 60 strong, being either killed or wounded in their successful defence. Repulsed at all points, the Boers eventually drew off, leaving 40 dead and five wounded upon the field. Among the latter was Commandant Oosthuizen, who has since died.

On the night of the 28th Colonel Kekewich moved east from Bashoek to attack a laager at Beestekraal (296) on the Crocodile River, and having carefully concealed his troops in hollow ground at Hartebeestspuit (643) during the following day, at 8 p.m. resumed his march. On this night his Infantry moved to Klipplaat (359), whilst his mounted troops under Lieut.-Colonel Duff pushed on 12 miles further to Beestekraal. The Boers had left the western approaches to their camp unguarded, and soon after dawn on 30th were completely surprised, making but slight resistance. 78 prisoners (including B. A. Klopper, a former Chairman of the Volksraad), and all the enemy's wagons and stock were taken. Colonel Kekewich marched next day for Rustenburg, and moved out again on 5th through Olifant's Nek to co-operate with Lord Methuen, who left Zeerust on the same date, marching northwards through Mabalstad.

Soon after General Fetherstonhaugh's arrival at Klerksdorp on the 16th October, his force was broken up, and he was transferred to the command of the Middelburg district and Eastern Lines of Communication in succession to Lieut.-General Sir Bindon Blood, who has returned to India. Lieut.-Colonel Hickie, after halting a few days at Klerksdorp, moved out to operate towards the Vaal in the direction of Dood's Drift (502). On the 29th October he returned to Klerksdorp, and the same day made a forced march on Ven-

tersdorp, where the garrison was reported to be in difficulties, the only foundation for which proved to be a successful cattle raid by the enemy in the neighbourhood. After a day's halt near Ventersdorp, Lieut.-Colonel Hickie marched south, and has since been employed in covering the construction of blockhouses on the Schoon Spruit, between Klerksdorp and Ventersdorp.

5. Lieut.-Colonel the Hon. J. Byng, who left Kroonstad on the 6th October, was soon engaged between the Valsch and Rhenoster Rivers with commandoes, under van Niekerk and Spanneberg. On the 13th he attacked a laager at Jackfontein capturing 18 prisoners and some horses. He called at Klerksdorp for supplies, and on the 25th started to march back to the railway. Shortly after recrossing the Vaal, he surrounded Spanneberg's laager at Huntersvlei, where he took Field-Cornets Spanneberg and Oosthuysen and 20 burghers. The column reached Vrededorp Road on the 1st November, having captured 11 other prisoners near Plessis Rust.

On the 2nd Colonel Byng continued his movement on Heilbron to take up his position for combined operations in the direction of Reitz.

Major Damant at Frankfort, and Lieut.-Colonel Wilson (Kirchener's Fighting Scouts) at Heilbron have continued to cover the completion of the line of blockhouses between these places, and to operate in the neighbourhood. On the 13th October Major Damant engaged 300 Boers near Naudesdrift on the Wilge River, and 2 days later encountered a commando 500 strong under Commandants Ross and Hattingh, which he drove towards the Bothersberg. Among the prisoners taken on this occasion was Adjutant Theron.

On the 25th Major Damant returned to Frankfort, bringing in with him 19 prisoners, 13 vehicles, 40 horses, and 500 cattle, captured near Villiersdorp. Some minor night raids by Major Damant's Corps have resulted in the capture of 12 other prisoners.

Further to the east, the valley of the Vaal has been the scene of operations by the columns under Colonels Sir H. Rawlinson and Rimington, the former of whom had returned to Greylingstad from the north on the 10th October, whilst the latter had reached Standerton from Roberts's Drift on the Vaal on the 7th.

Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson moved out south-west from Greylingstad on the 13th October in the direction of Barnard's Kop, where his troops got into contact with the commando under Commandant Buys, which was driven across the Vaal into Orange River Colony, near Villiersdorp. On the same day Colonel Rimington, who had marched on Vrede from Standerton, and subsequently turned north-west to cooperate with Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson, was approaching the junction of the Vaal and Waterval Rivers from the south-east. On the 14th these two columns were in touch, near Niemand's Kraal, and joined in pursuit of the commandoes driven south by Sir H. Rawlinson. Their united captures in this chase amounted to 20 prisoners, 18 wagons, 21 Cape carts, 66 horses and over 2,800 cattle. Both columns then marched into Standerton, where they arrived on the 16th and 17th of October. Their subsequent movements have been described in an earlier portion of this despatch.

6. In the eastern districts of Orange River Colony, Major-General Elliot's columns, under Brigadier-General Broadwood, and Colonels Lowe and De Lisle, have continued to operate to the north of Harrismith, in the country lying to the east of the Wilge River.

The movements of these troops have been greatly hampered by the rapid spread of rinderpest, which necessitated the return of General Broadwood's column to Harrismith on the 14th October, for the inoculation of his oxen.

In the Vrede district Colonel De Lisle was unable to co-operate effectively with Colonel Rimington, owing to the incessant rain and fog which greatly impeded movement and made communication by signal impossible. On the 15th October Colonel De Lisle, working independently, surprised a Boer laager in the vicinity of the Wilge River, and captured 15 prisoners, 34 vehicles, 500 horses, and 1,500 cattle. He continued to operate for a few days on the Wilge River, and then marched north to Standerton, where he arrived on the 27th October.

Towards the end of October, General Broadwood, with a force consisting of 700 of his own mounted men, and some detachments of Lieut.-General Sir Leslie Rundle's troops, made an expedition to Witzie's Hoek, at the eastern extremity of the Brandwater Basin, in which a few prisoners and a considerable quantity of ammunition were taken. The force returned to Harrismith on the 30th October.

Major-General B. Campbell has remained in occupation of the Brandwater Basin, where his troops have constructed forts at Steenkamp's Kop and Retief's Nek, with several intermediate works designed to deny the use of certain important points to the enemy, and to restrict his sphere of action.

From Bethlehem, Lieut.-Colonel Briggs, with the 1st Imperial Light Horse, has carried out several long-distance raids in all directions, whereby the country round for a radius of 25 miles has been completely cleared.

The 2nd Imperial Light Horse, which had been temporarily detached to the Zulu Frontier at the end of September, returned to Harrismith, by march route, on the 3rd November.

Although no events of importance have occurred during the past month in the north-east of the Orange River Colony, the movements described, had, by the 6th November, placed a number of our columns in suitable positions for a converging movement upon the area between Reitz and Vrede, a district which has for some time past been left in comparative quietness. This movement, which is just commencing, will be undertaken by the columns commanded by General Broadwood and Colonel Lowe, under General Elliot, and the 2nd Imperial Light Horse from Harrismith, General Spens from Botha's Pass, Colonels Rimington and De Lisle from Standerton, Major Damant from Frankfort, Lieut.-Colonels Byng and Wilson from Heilbron, Lieut.-Colonels Barker and W. H. Williams and Major Holmes from Winburg, and the 1st Imperial Light Horse from Bethlehem.

7. In the south-eastern portion of Orange River Colony, columns under Major-General C. Knox and Colonel Rochfort have continued to work from fixed points under the general control of Lieut.-General Tucker.

The object of these operations has been the complete clearance of the country, and the capture of the roving bands under Commandants Brand, Ackerman, and Coetzee who still frequent this area. Small captures have been made, but the enemy's knowledge of the ground, evasive tactics, and powers of concealment have enabled him so far to avoid any serious loss. Since the 8th October the troops operating in this area have killed and wounded 7 Boers, and have captured 125 prisoners.

Colonel Henry has remained in observation of the south-western portion of the Orange River.

Colony, moving from Luckhoff towards Faure-smith, and then north-west by Koffyfontein to Modder River Station on the Kimberley line. In the first week of November, Colonel Henry marched north, in conjunction with the Kimberley column and the South African Constabulary, to undertake a series of fresh operations to the east of Boshof. A simultaneous advance is being made by the Constabulary posts from the Modder to a general line Boshof—Bultfontein.

8. The operations carried out in Cape Colony during the past month by the columns under the orders of Lieut.-General French have resulted in the expulsion of the raiding bands from the central districts of the Colony, thus setting free a considerable body of troops, which will now be utilized in dealing vigorously with the enemy in the south-western and north-eastern areas.

On the 11th October Commandant Scheepers was taken by a patrol of the 10th Hussars, under Captain Shearman, at Koppies Kraal, 6 miles south of Blood River Station, where he had been left by his men too ill to proceed further. He was succeeded in his command by Commandant Pypers, who at once turned eastwards with the commando, and on the 16th effected a junction with Smuts and Bouwers to the north of Willowmore. Their combined force then almost immediately moved in a south-westerly direction across the Komanassie Mountains into the country between Willowmore and Oudtshoorn.

From the vicinity of Oudtshoorn, Smuts, Bouwers, and Pypers were chased in a north-westerly direction by Colonels Crabbe and Kavanagh, across the main line of railway near Touws River Station on 31st October.

On the 14th October a detachment of Smuts' followers, under Van der Venter, who had been for some time lurking in the Zuurberg, south-west of Somerset East, passed north-east of Pearston, over the Bankberg, and then north-west across the Graaf Reinet—Middelburg line of railway. This party was pursued by Colonel Haig's columns and Lieut.-Colonel Lukin, the latter of whom surprised their laager, 6 miles south-west of New Bethesda, at dawn on 21st October, killing 1 and taking 14 prisoners.

Colonel Scobell's column, after chasing Smuts and Bouwers out of the Aberdeen district, was brought into the railway, and entrained for Victoria Road, where it arrived on the 24th October. Near here Colonel Scobell engaged Van der Venter's party as it escaped westwards over the main line before our pursuing columns.

To the west of Cape Town—De Aar line General French has organized some combined operations with the object of driving the commandoes, under Maritz, Smit, and Theron, into the remote districts beyond Van Rhynsdorp, Calvinia, and Williston. The columns employed in this work have been under Lieut.-Colonels Capper and Wyndham and Captain Wormald, who, on the 25th October reached the line Lambert's Bay—Clanwilliam. From these points the advance is still being continued in a northerly direction.

In the north-eastern area of Cape Colony, Myburg, Fouché, and Wessels, whose combined force is estimated at 500 men, have remained more or less inactive in the triangle Burghersdorp—Dordrecht—Rhodes.

Colonel Monro's column has been employed in covering the construction of a line of blockhouses from Stormberg to Queenstown, and is now about to undertake operations against the enemy in the country to the north of Dordrecht, acting in conjunction with a force, under Colonel

Scobell, which is being concentrated at Stormberg.

Other work carried out in Cape Colony during the month has included the construction of a line of blockhouses from De Aar to Beaufort West, which will greatly add to the security of the main line of railway.

At De Aar General Settle has assumed command in place of Colonel Colin Mackenzie, who has been placed in charge of the late Colonel Benson's column.

The Proclamation of Martial Law at Cape ports, which came into force on 9th October, will, it is anticipated, have a beneficial effect upon the situation in that Colony. Whilst the regulations, agreed upon by the Colonial Government and myself, have been framed with a view to minimizing interference with legitimate trade, and preventing unnecessary inconvenience to the law-abiding portion of the community, adequate powers have at length been secured for the military authorities to enable them to deal with the plots and intrigues of Boer spies and sympathizers at the seaport towns, and to close to them this source of supply of munitions of war.

There is little doubt that the non-existence hitherto of Martial Law on the coast line of Cape Colony has enabled the agents of the enemy to carry on their operations in complete security, and has afforded opportunities for the introduction of foreign recruits, and for frequent intercourse between Europe and the burghers and rebels in the field.

The new regulations which are now being put into force by the General Officer Commanding in Cape Colony, in co-operation with the Colonial authorities, will, no doubt, soon end this state of affairs, and enable us to deal promptly and effectively with any further attempts to utilize the Cape Ports as channels of supply and information for the enemy.

IN continuation of my despatch dated 8th November, 1901, I have the honour to report that the past month has been marked by a considerable extension of the boundaries of the enclosed areas, and by a proportionate diminution of the enemy's field of operations.

In Cape Colony, General French's troops have made substantial progress, and the work of his columns has resulted in the expulsion of the Boer commandoes from the Midland districts between the Cape Town—De Aar, and East London—Bethulie Railways. The clearance of this central tract will probably have an effect out of proportion to the size of the area reclaimed, and the presence of the small commandoes which still rove about in the north-east and south-west districts of the Colony, is more of a serious inconvenience than a menace or danger of any consequence. They are in an inhospitable country and are being given no rest.

In the Orange River Colony, the country to the west of the railway and south of the Modder remains practically clear, whilst a northward advance of the Constabulary posts from the valley of the Modder towards the line Bultfontein and Boshof, is being carried out simultaneously with the completion of a blockhouse line from Kroonstad to Coal Mine Drift on the Vaal.

East of the railway our troops have steadily strengthened their grip upon the country, and the enemy's field of operations in this district will shortly be completely cut in two by a line of blockhouses which, starting from Kroonstad, will pass by Lindley and Bethlehem to Harrismith.

The existing blockhouse line between Heilbron and Frankfort is in course of extension to Tafel Kop, which has long been a favourite Boer rendezvous and signalling station, and will eventually be joined by a line about to be pushed out from Botha's Pass. Besides the advantages that may accrue from thus cutting up a vast stretch of country, these lines tend to increase our own power of mobility, and under their protection the extension of the railway from Harrismith to Bethlehem is about to be commenced. The earthworks and culverts of this line were finished before the outbreak of the war, and the opening of it for traffic, while greatly facilitating the passage of troops, material, and supplies into the heart of the north-east district of the Orange River Colony, will go far towards establishing our hold on that portion of the country which has hitherto been the general resort of De Wet's bands.

A similar extension is already working from Bloemfontein to the Waterworks, and is gradually being prolonged to Ladybrand.

In the Transvaal and Orange River Colony, the protected area is now roughly marked by the points Rustenburg—Brugspruit Station (on the Eastern line), Waterval Station (on the Standerton line), Villiersdorp, Heilbron, Wolvehoeck, Kroonstadt, Coalmine Drift, Klerksdorp, Ventersdorp, Naaupoort, Rustenburg, the principal extension of this boundary being an advance eastward of the Constabulary posts from a line between Wilge River Station and Greylingstad to a fresh position between Brugspruit and Waterval Station, and westward of the blockhouse line on the Mooi River to a new line on the Schoon Spruit.

The eastward advance of the line of South African Constabulary posts; which has just been completed, has been covered by a number of columns operating in the Eastern Transvaal under Major-General Bruce Hamilton, who is now dealing with the commandoes under General Louis Botha, within the somewhat reduced areas remaining open to his burghers.

In connection with these operations, Major-General Clements has been instructed to establish a line of blockhouses from Standerton to Ermelo, thus subdividing the district lying between the Wakkerstroom—Piet Retief line and the Constabulary posts.

Thus the system of protection of the railway lines by blockhouses has been extended to the protection of areas in conjunction with the establishment of lines which divide up the country outside these areas. The value of this undertaking is already evident, and its completion promises to produce lasting and beneficial results.

At the end of October, Major-General Bruce Hamilton assumed the general control and direction of operations in the Eastern Transvaal, and on the 7th of November four columns were ready to take the field under his immediate orders, whilst Colonel Williams' column from Wonderfontein, Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson from Volksrust, and Brigadier-General Spens from Standerton, were instructed to co-operate as the situation required.

The columns under General Hamilton's command were:—Colonel Allenby's and Colonel Campbell's at Standerton; Colonel Barter's at

Leenwkoop (218), 44 miles west of Bethal; and Colonel Mackenzie's (late Colonel Benson's), at Brugspruit. Lieutenant-Colonels E. C. Williams and the Honourable C. G. Fortescue were approaching Middelburg from the west, and available. Brigadier-General Spens' troops were covering the construction of the Standerton—Ermelo line of blockhouses.

By the 16th November, Major-General Hamilton had made the following dispositions:—Lieutenant-Colonels Fortescue and Williams at Middelkraal (298); Colonel Mackenzie at Bombardary (388); Colonels Allenby and Wing (the latter commanding a portion of Colonel Campbell's column) at Trigaardsfontein (151), just west of Bethal; Colonel Campbell with the remainder of his troops at Ruigtekuilen (298); Lieutenant-Colonel Barter at Rietkuil (113); and Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson, with Lieutenant-Colonel Stewart, at Goedgedacht (282) to the south of Bethal. On this date the forward movement of the Constabulary posts to the line Brugspruit Station—Waterval Station was commenced, and carried out without interruption.

When he had seen the Constabulary posts secure in their new position, General Bruce Hamilton next prepared for a further advance eastwards of his columns, and on the 22nd, having forced the Boer commandoes to retire, established his headquarters at Bethal.

In connection with this move, his left columns under Colonel Mackenzie, Lieutenant-Colonel Fortescue, and Lieutenant-Colonel Williams, were disposed on a line Middelburg—Middelkraal (298); his centre consisting of the columns under Colonels Campbell, Allenby, and Wing, were in and about Bethal; and Colonels Sir H. Rawlinson and Stewart on the right had arrived at Uitkyk (286). The same night General Bruce Hamilton, with a strong mounted force, made a rapid movement upon Mooivlei (56), twenty-five miles north-east of Bethal, where General Louis Botha was reported to be laagered, but the enemy's advanced picquets gave the alarm, and enabled the Boer force to retire in safety upon Ermelo. Finding, therefore, that the enemy had fallen back out of reach, General Bruce Hamilton returned at once to Bethal to complete his preparations.

On the 1st of December his columns again moved eastwards, with the exception of Lieutenant-Colonel Barter's, which remained in occupation of Bethal. On the left the three columns under Colonel Mackenzie and Lieutenant-Colonels Fortescue and Williams reached Carolina on the 2nd, and on the following day General Bruce Hamilton, with the troops of Colonel Campbell's column (now commanded by Lieutenant-Colonels Wing and Simpson), arrived upon a line Klipstapel (145)—Ermelo, whilst Colonel Allenby, moving north-east from Bethal, through Middelkraal to Boschmansfontein (204), took up a position in rear of the left centre to watch for any attempt to break back through our columns.

On the right Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson had marched to Klipfontein (9), south-west of Ermelo, and General Spens, advancing from the neighbourhood of Standerton, had reached Klipfontein (101), between Ermelo and Beginderlyn (286) on the Vaal. From these points these two columns converged upon Ermelo, which they entered simultaneously with General Bruce Hamilton on the 3rd of December.

Still further to the south-east, in prolongation of our line, Brigadier-General Plumer and Colonel Pulteney were also instructed to move north-east from the Wakkerstroom—Piet Retief line, to close all roads between the Vaal and the

border of Swaziland. General Plumer and Colonel Pulteney were at Brereton on the 30th of November in readiness to march further to the north, but this they found, for the moment, impossible, owing to the flooded state of the rivers and spruits.

Feeling the effects of this concentration, which promised to encircle and hem them in against the Eastern Transvaal Frontier, the Boers commenced a series of more or less successful efforts to break back into the country between our columns and the South African Constabulary posts, whilst some small parties made north over the Delagoa line of railway.

On the night of the 3rd of December, General Bruce Hamilton, aware that a force of the enemy had worked round his right flank in a south-westerly direction, probably between his troops and those of General Spens, made a long and very successful night march, with portions of General Spens' and Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson's columns, in pursuit to Oshoek (33), twenty miles south-west of Ermelo. At dawn on the 4th, he surprised a scattered laager and captured 93 prisoners, 116 horses, 26 wagons, 29 cape carts, besides a quantity of ammunition, telegraph and signalling apparatus. General Bruce Hamilton brings to my notice the excellent work done by Colonel Woolls-Sampson, his intelligence officer, upon this occasion in locating the enemy and guiding the force to its objective, and ascribes great credit to the 8th Battalion Mounted Infantry, who displayed both dash and enterprise in closing with the enemy and preventing their escape.

General Bruce Hamilton returned to Ermelo on the 5th of December.

On the same night as this descent upon Oshoek, Colonel E. Williams, at Smutsog (143), between Ermelo and Carolina, discovered a Boer commando of about 500 men under P. Viljoen, Prinsloo, and Erasmus, who were trying to escape westwards in the direction of Knapdaar (58). He at once pursued to Weltevreden (179), and found the enemy in position commanding the passages over the Olifant's River, which a slight engagement showed was too strongly held for attack by his small force. Colonel Williams therefore drew off and returned to Smutsog, having killed 5 Boers and captured 12 prisoners, 8 wagons, 3,500 rounds of ammunition, and some stock in the course of his westerly pursuit.

At dawn on the 7th of December, Colonel Sir H. Rawlinson's troops, after a night march from Ermelo, took 3 prisoners at Hamelfontein Farm, and on the same night Colonel C. Mackenzie, moving out from Carolina upon Krantz Kloof and Waterval (97) against a Boer force which he drove in the direction of the Komati Valley, took 16 prisoners, 38 horses, 32 mules, 4 wagons, and a large herd of cattle.

General Bruce Hamilton's operations are still in progress. To the east of him are a number of Boers under General Louis Botha, who are evidently in dread, and certainly in danger, of being enclosed against the border of Swaziland, whilst to the west, between our troops and the Constabulary posts, are the parties who have evaded our columns during the eastward move.

A small column, under Lieutenant-Colonel Urnston, composed of men taken temporarily from the eastern line of communications, has been formed during the past month at Middelburg. It has been employed in patrolling the left flank of the Constabulary posts, and watching for attempts to cross the railway to the north, and has now been sent out from Groot Olifant's Station to support the Constabulary

posts in case of attack by the Boers now between them and our columns.

The success of any of these bands in piercing the Constabulary line would make their position even more isolated than before, so that their temporary escape from General Hamilton's columns has but placed them in a situation of added danger and difficulty. Moreover, there are good hopes that General Bruce Hamilton, who is fully informed of their whereabouts, will be able to account for them before long.

To the north of the Delagoa Railway, Colonel Park has continued to operate in the Lydenburg district, where it is necessary to keep a small force in observation of General Viljoen, who has, for the time at least, left Pilgrim's Rest and transferred his headquarters to the vicinity of Dullstroom.

In the Northern Transvaal, the columns under Lieutenant-Colonels Dawkins and Colenbrander have continued their operations during the past month. The former of these returned to Pienaar's River Station from the east on the 13th November, bringing in 24 prisoners. Colonel Colenbrander's force, after a very successful march from the Mafeking—Rhodesia railway, reached Warmbaths on the 19th of the month. His total captures in the various skirmishes en route were 54 prisoners of war, chiefly of Beyers' commando, including Field Cornets Ross and Louw, and Adjutant Pretorius, 28 wagons, 35 horses, and a large amount of stock.

Soon after reaching Pienaar's River, Colonel Dawkins marched north to Nylstroom to protect the railway, which was momentarily threatened in that neighbourhood by a body of local Boers, and on the 23rd he left Nylstroom for the Rooiberg to co-operate with Colonel Colenbrander, who moved simultaneously in the same direction from Warmbaths.

The two columns met on the 27th at Hartbeestfontein (1786), preparatory to making an attack upon Badenhorst's commando, then reported to be at Sterkfontein (1590). The operations commenced at dusk that day, when 200 of Kitchener's Fighting Scouts pushed out through Zand River's Poort, whilst the remainder of the mounted troops moved by Rietvlei (1814) and Langkloof (333). For the next two days the enemy, falling rapidly back, were successful in eluding our troops. The pursuit was not relaxed, and, on the 29th Colonel Colenbrander, with half of Kitchener's Fighting Scouts, pressed on ahead of the remainder of the column upon Badenhorst's tracks, and following them closely till the morning of December 3rd, Colonel Colenbrander, after a long and exhausting chase, through an almost waterless region, came suddenly upon the enemy, and captured 15 prisoners with all the wagons of the commando. Badenhorst himself with 60 fugitive followers escaped being taken by scattering in the dense bush which fringes the Poer Zyn Loop River.

The remainder of Kitchener's Fighting Scouts who, near Sterkfontein, were searching for some of Badenhorst's dismounted men left behind by the mounted portion of the commando, were successful in killing 3 and capturing 17 burghers. Sixty stragglers, driven up into the hills near Sterkfontein, were cleverly secured by the 12th Mounted Infantry of Lieutenant-Colonel Dawkins' column.

The total results of these well-planned and carefully-executed operations were 104 prisoners, 50 horses, 50 mules, 500 cattle, 6 wagons, 6,000 rounds of small arm ammunition, and the serious discomfiture of the enemy in a district in which he had long considered himself immune.

At their conclusion, Lieutenant-Colonel Dawkins marched to the line at Nylstroom, while



Lieutenant-Colonel Colenbrander remained at Sterkfontein to rest his tired horses.

The two columns are now converging again towards Geelhout Kop, with a view to fresh operations in that neighbourhood.

On the departure to India of Colonel Hall, Royal Artillery, who has commanded the line of communications north of Pienaar's River since the occupation of Pietersburg in April last, Colonel Harrison, Liverpool Regiment, assumed command.

At the date of my last despatch, Lord Methuen was advancing from Zeerust by Mabalstad to co-operate with Colonel Kekewich, whose column had passed west through Olifant's Nek from Rustenburg on the 5th of November.

To effect this junction, Lord Methuen marched through Mabalstad upon Blokkloof (400) where he arrived on November 9th, Colonel Kekewich proceeding by Vlaktfontein (584) to Brakfontein (278) on the Rustenburg—Zeerust Road. Neither column met any serious opposition, though Lord Methuen's captured, during its march, 13 prisoners, 34 wagons, 13 carts, and some cattle.

The enemy, as it subsequently appeared, had moved south, and on November 10th a report was received from Lieutenant-Colonel Hickie whose column was covering the construction of the Schoon Spruit Blockhouse Line, that a strong Boer force was threatening his camp at Brak spruit (5). No attack was delivered on the camp, but on the 13th November a squadron of Imperial Yeomanry, detached by Lieutenant-Colonel Hickie with the object of verifying the enemy's reported presence, was suddenly surrounded and captured by a superior Boer force, which only retired, releasing its prisoners, on the arrival of reinforcements under Lieutenant-Colonel Hickie.

On receipt of this intelligence, Lord Methuen and Colonel Kekewich were ordered to move south to disperse the commandoes in front of Colonel Hickie.

Colonel Kekewich reached Ventersdorp on November 15th, and from there marched down the left bank of the Schoon Spruit towards Klerksdorp; whilst Lord Methuen, moving on a wide front, followed a route which brought him down the right bank of the spruit some miles to the west of Colonel Kekewich. Both columns reached Klerksdorp on the 18th without having encountered the enemy, who withdrew to the west on their approach.

Lord Methuen's column again left Klerksdorp to operate to the west about Hartebeestfontein (624) and Kaffi's Kraal (135), Colonel Hickie and Colonel Kekewich co-operating on Lord Methuen's right. Lord Methuen soon got touch of the enemy at Doornlaagte (160), and following south in the direction of Woluwanstad, he was again engaged at Rooipoot (114), his total captures in the two skirmishes being 26 prisoners (including Liebenberg's adjutant), 33 wagons, some horses and some stock. He returned to Klerksdorp on December 4th.

Colonel Kekewich's co-operation during this time had contributed in a large measure to Lord Methuen's success, whilst the presence of both columns had so effectively relieved all pressure from Colonel Hickie, and the blockhouse line that rapid progress was made, and on the 5th December the work being completed, Colonel Hickie's column was released and marched into Klerksdorp, whither Colonel Kekewich's had proceeded two days earlier.

In the north-eastern portion of Orange River Colony, the early part of November was marked by a carefully-arranged converging movement

by a number of columns upon the country lying between Vrede and Reitz.

A concentration of Boers had been reported in this neighbourhood, and the rendezvous, of various columns having been suitably arranged for the purpose by November 6th, a gradual contraction from their wide perimeter upon the infested area was devised so as to surround the Boer bands within the country to be enclosed.

The operation was a comprehensive one, and some idea of its extent and the difficulty attending its execution may be gained when it is noted that the rendezvous and starting points of the outermost columns engaged upon it were roughly at the angles of a parallelogram, whose diagonal is 175 miles in length, and of which no side is less than 100 miles, marked by the points:—Standerton, Harrismith, Winburg, and Heilbron.

Although the difficulties of distance and of marches designedly tortuous were most successfully overcome by the column commanders, and although the time of arrival at their allotted positions on the circumference of the inner circle was as perfect in this far-reaching manoeuvre as could have been in the most restricted of peace operations, I was disappointed in the event. The results were less than the excellence of the work performed by Officers and men deserved, and this was in a great measure due to accident.

Almost as soon as the converging movement had commenced, and before it could possibly have been recognized as such by the enemy, a portion of them (about half) began to pass out of the threatened area towards the north-westward, and moving in their usual indefinite and undetectable fashion, succeeded in drifting through the gaps, at this time and at this point necessarily wide, of our encircling line, the number of Boers within the circle, originally somewhat over-estimated, was thus materially reduced, and these, aided by the misty, rainy weather prevalent at this season, displayed even more than their accustomed ability in making use of it to effect their escape from the troops in touch with them.

The columns selected to participate in this movement were disposed on the 6th of November in the following positions:—General Elliot (with Brigadier-General Broadwood and Colonel Lowe under his orders), together with the 2nd Imperial Light Horse at Harrismith; Brigadier-General Spens at Botha's Pass; Colonels Rimington and De Lisle at Standerton; Major Damant at Frankfort; Lieutenant-Colonels Hon. J. Byng and Wilson at Heilbron; Lieutenant-Colonels Barker and W. H. Williams, and Major Holmes at Winburg; and Lieutenant-Colonel Briggs with the 1st Imperial Light Horse at Bethlehem.

The instructions issued to these column commanders were briefly to the following effect:—The Winburg force, on the first day of the operations, was to move in six marches via Senekal to the line Bethlehem—Lindley, where it would remain blocking any egress to the south-west by parties breaking through our inner columns. At the same time, Sir Leslie Rundle's troops were to perform a similar function between Bethlehem and Harrismith, holding the main passes of the Langeberg, and all roads leading south, thus forming in conjunction with the Winburg column a second line to the south and south-west some seventy-five miles in length. Meanwhile, the remainder of the columns, starting from the points mentioned, would converge in six marches upon a gradually diminishing circle, whose centre was about Paardehoek, some 20 miles south of Frankfort.

Major Damant's column would, it was hoped, assist to allay any suspicion on the part of the enemy by remaining immobile at Frankfort until the other columns had completed the fourth day's march.

The need for both punctuality and deception of movement was especially enjoined upon all column commanders, and thus a difficult combination was effected without a hitch. No column marched straight upon its objective; some at times were actually moving away from it, and the marches of all were circuitous and misleading to a degree, yet none were late, and all reached their allotted points fresh and ready for the work they hoped would ensue. A more or less free hand as to the route he should pursue had been given to each commander, the necessity for inter-communication on the third day, and for the punctual arrival of the columns at their final positions being alone insisted upon. The last march was performed at night, and when dawn of the 12th November brought the columns to their objective, the fears that the bulk of enemy they had hoped to enclose had escaped were realized.

On the night of the 9th November, when there was still a large gap between General Elliot's left column and General Dartnell's right, small parties of the enemy were detected moving south-east. The following morning a thick heavy mist, hanging over the whole country made it impossible for the columns to verify the movement indicated by the direction taken in the night by the enemy's patrols. Such information as was obtainable pointed to a body, some 300 or 400 strong, having escaped south-east, but under the existing conditions the columns could do no more than adhere to the original programme, and trust to finding their objective still within their grasp on its completion. This they did not do. The bulk of the Boers, favoured by the weather, had escaped through our columns, leaving their stock and transport, which fell into our hands.

Although the actual loss inflicted upon the enemy in these operations was not heavy, the damage in respect to his means of mobility and subsistence was very considerable indeed. Twenty-two Boers were killed, and 98 prisoners (12 of whom were wounded) were taken, together with 10,200 cattle, 3,000 horses (not more than 5 per cent. of any use), nearly 200 wagons, and a large number of other miscellaneous vehicles.

At the conclusion of this converging movement, the whole of the columns returned to their original points of departure, with the exception of those under Brigadier-General Spens and Colonel Rimington, which marched respectively into Standerton and Frankfort.

The return of our columns was uneventful, except in the case of the combined force under Lieutenant-Colonels Byng and Wilson, whose troops were vigorously attacked on the 14th of November, some few miles to the south of Heilbron, by a party of 400 Boers, said to be under the personal command of De Wet. This was almost certainly the party which had moved through the cordon almost before it had begun to be drawn, and it was rather by their good fortune than the result of any preconceived plan or especially good information of our dispositions that they thus found themselves in a position from which to strike at a favourable moment at one of our returning columns.

The attack, delivered in a resolute manner, was, after two hours' hard fighting, successfully repulsed on all sides by Lieutenant-Colonel Byng's rear guard, which was well and skilfully

handled by Lieutenant-Colonel Wilson, of Kitchener's Fighting Scouts, and the enemy retired leaving 8 dead on the field.

Colonels Byng and Wilson marched into Heilbron the same evening.

Since the 15th of November, successful operations have been carried out by Colonel Rimington and Major Damant, operating from Frankfort along the valley of the Vaal. Frequent captures have been made by these Officers, who have exhibited marked ability in adapting themselves to the peculiar methods of Boer warfare. It would be tedious indeed to give in detail the many minor successes which have rewarded their energy and ingenuity.

The most important capture effected by Colonel Rimington was that of Commandant Buys, who fell into his hands after being wounded in a skirmish with a detachment of the Railway Pioneer Regiment, to whose assistance Colonel Rimington had gone.

In the course of their operations on the Vaal, Colonel Rimington and Major Damant have covered the advance of the South African Constabulary blockhouses between the river and the Heidelberg—Standerton line, made in conjunction with the eastward advance of their posts on the north of the railway.

General Elliot's Division returned to Harrismith at the termination of the operations in the vicinity of Reitz, and left again on the 19th of November to sweep across the Orange River Colony from Harrismith by Bethlehem and Lindley to Kroonstad.

During the first part of this march, General Dartnell, with the Imperial Light Horse Brigade, moved parallel with General Elliot's line of advance and to the south of the Harrismith—Bethlehem Road. Little or no opposition was encountered, and General Dartnell having come west, as far as Bethlehem, left General Elliot, returning with his own command to operate near Harrismith.

On the 24th of November, the 2nd Imperial Light Horse, belonging to Brigadier-General Dartnell's command, surprised Lauren's commando between Eland's River Bridge and Bethlehem, killing 2 Boers in their attack, and capturing 12 prisoners. This success was followed up on the 27th by a raid by a combined force of the 1st and 2nd Imperial Light Horse under Lieutenant-Colonel Mackenzie, in which 24 prisoners, 150 horses, and 800 cattle fell into our hands.

Co-operation by other columns during the second part of the march had already been arranged. Colonel Rimington and Major Damant leaving their work in the Vaal valley, marched south from the Heilbron—Frankfort line to co-operate on the right flank of the Cavalry Division. To the west and south-west Colonels Byng, Barker, and W. H. Williams, and Major Holmes were ordered to watch for any parties of the enemy who might be driven towards them by General Elliot's movement from Harrismith.

General Elliot marched in three columns, two of which—those under Brigadier-General Broadwood and Colonel De Lisle—were organized with a special view to mobility, whilst the third, under Colonel Lowe, acted as an escort to a convoy working as a supply base by more easy stages in rear of the centre, which was directed by the south of Reitz upon Karoospruit.

Between the 26th and 28th of November, several night raids were undertaken with more or less success, but the enemy was not met with in strength, and on the 1st of December General Elliot arrived at Kroonstad with 15 prisoners, 114 wagons, 89 carts, 2,470 cattle, and 1,280

horses (most of the latter of no practical value as remounts).

The columns co-operating on the flanks also met with a very fair measure of success.

Working from Winburg, Lieutenant-Colonel Barker reached Kaffir's Kop, 22 miles west of Bethlehem, on the 26th of November. Here he learnt that a number of Boers had passed round General Broadwood's left flank in the direction of Wonderkop. Colonel Barker at once moved in pursuit by Rexford and Wonderkop upon Uintsjeshoek, and, engaging the enemy frequently, inflicted considerable damage.

Colonel Rimington left Frankfort on the 27th November, and on the following day effected a junction with Kitchener's Fighting Scouts, under Lieutenant-Colonel Wilson, at Jagersrust, 25 miles south-west of Frankfort. From the latter place, the combined force moved on to Tochgetry, the advanced troops pursuing scattered parties of the enemy who retired rapidly whenever our men approached. These tactics, as it subsequently appeared, were intended as a mask for a sudden attack upon Colonel Rimington's baggage and rear guard by a force under De Wet. The attack was promptly and gallantly repulsed. Field Cornet Klopper and 2 burghers were killed, 4 were wounded, and 13 prisoners remained in our hands.

Our casualties in this engagement included Lieutenant Oliver, Inniskilling Dragoons, who was killed in a dashing charge upon the enemy.

Colonel Rimington halted after the fight at Victoria Spruit, and then, seeing no further opportunity of engaging the enemy, moved back with his troops in the direction of Heilbron.

In the districts of the Orange River Colony, south of the Bloemfontein—Ladybrand line, the several groups of columns under Major-General U. Knox and Colonel Rochfort have continued to harass and pursue the scattered fragments of the commandoes under Brand, Ackerman, and Coetzee, which still haunt this country.

The work has necessarily been of an uneventful and uninteresting nature, but has been well carried out, and over 170 prisoners have been taken by the columns since the date of my last despatch.

West of the railway, and south of the Modder River, the country continues practically clear of the enemy, whilst north of the Modder satisfactory progress has been made under cover of Colonel Henry's column, in clearing the country and establishing a line of constabulary posts between Boshof and Bultfontein.

At the date of my last despatch, the columns under Colonel Pulteney and Lieutenant-Colonel Garratt were still operating in the Vryheid district; Brigadier-General Plumer was searching the country between Wakkerstroom and Piet Retief; and Lieutenant-Colonel Colville at Mahamba Drift on the Assegai River, near Piet Retief, was watching for straggling parties who might seek to escape through Swaziland. Whilst in these positions, some excellent work was done by these columns.

On the 8th of November, Colonel Colville reported that a detached force of the 26th Mounted Infantry Battalion, under Major Wiggin, had successfully surrounded a laager and captured 14 prisoners (including Landdrost Kelly and Field Cornet van Rooijen), at a farm 8 miles south of Mahamba, and at dawn on the 16th at Plat Nek, within the Swaziland border, another detached force—under the same officer—effected a further capture of 12 prisoners, 19 wagons with teams, and a number of Krupp cartridges.

Between the 8th and 20th of November, Brigadier-General Plumer, working both north

and south of the Wakkerstroom—Piet Retief line of blockhouses, inflicted considerable loss on the enemy.

On the 20th of November, having been joined by Colonel Pulteney from Vryheid, he turned north in the direction of Brereton, to endeavour to act in co-operation, when opportunity offered, with General Bruce Hamilton's contemplated advance upon Ermelo; but finding this for some time impossible owing to the swollen rivers and spruits which barred his way, he turned south-west to search the Randberg and neighbourhood for scattered parties believed to be lurking in that broken country.

At the beginning of December Colonel Garratt was ordered to march through Newcastle to Botha's Pass in the Drakensberg, and from here will cover the construction of a contemplated chain of blockhouses to be pushed out westwards.

Colonel Garratt's place in the Vryheid district, where the Boers are not aggressive, has been taken by a small column under Lieutenant-Colonel Chapman, who is now moving up from Babanango.

Since the date of my last despatch, the central districts of Cape Colony have been kept clear of the enemy, who have confined their operations to the Barkly East district and the country to the west and north of the Cape Town—De Aar line.

In the former of these two areas, Colonels Monro and Scobell have operated together against Myburg Fouché, and Wessels, who, constantly pursued and engaged by our columns, have wandered about in the Drakensberg to the south of Jamestown, and between Barkly East and Maclear. In the many skirmishes which have from time to time taken place, the Boers have suffered considerable losses, and devote the whole of their energies to avoiding our columns.

In the neighbourhood of Philipstown, Lieutenant-Colonel Hunter Weston has been employed in chasing an isolated party of Boers, about 100 strong, under Naude, who seem to have crossed into Cape Colony on the 22nd of November, probably near Zand Drift, and who have now taken refuge in the Karee Kloof hills to the north-west of Philipstown.

To the west of the main line of railway, the remainder of General French's columns, acting under the orders of Major-General Stephenson, have continued their operations against the Boers under Maritz, Theron, Lcuw, Smit, and other leaders of less importance, whose followers are now widely dispersed between a line Picquetberg—Sutherland—Carnarvon and the frontier of German South-West Africa. Our forces acting against the enemy in this vast extent of country were disposed on the 1st of December as follows:—Colonel Crabbe's column at Lambert's Bay; Major-General Stephenson, with Lieutenant-Colonel Kavanagh, at Clanwilliam; Lieutenant-Colonel Capper at Picquetberg; Captain Wormald at Wagon Drift, 30 miles north of Ceres; Major Lund to the south (south) west of Sutherland; and Lieutenant-Colonel Doran between the latter place and Matjesfontein.

Since the beginning of this month, our columns have again pressed the enemy further north towards Van Rhynsdorp, and Colonel Doran is advancing upon Tontelboschkolk, 100 miles north of Sutherland, to strike at a considerable gathering of Boers under Maritz assembled in that neighbourhood.

The Boer casualties reported by General French in this area during the past month have amounted to 29 killed, 21 wounded, and 45 prisoners.

Rinderpest is still raging, but the process of inoculation and the care taken of uninfected animals have combined to prevent the movements of our troops from being seriously interfered with by the difficulty of meeting transport requirements. This successful coping with the disease has surprised the old inhabitants of the country to whom rinderpest and wet weather have usually meant the cessation of all operations dependent on ox transport.

Unlike the horses, the cattle captured from the enemy are mostly in good condition, and form a substantial contribution to our transport and commissariat. I do not, therefore, anticipate any marked decrease of efficiency in our transport, although at the present moment it is attacked by the greatest danger incident to its existence in this or any other country.

The health of the troops is most satisfactory, and is only equalled by their spirit. There is of course a certain wastage due to sickness, but it is far less than might be expected from the arduous labour entailed by the constant pursuit of a very mobile and scattered enemy, frequently

at night and in a season of heavy rains. Despite the fatigues of incessant marching, the harassing anxieties of night outpost work in exposed and isolated positions, and the discomfort of wet bivouacs, the cheerfulness and energy of our men is always evident, and there is a quiet determination on the part of all ranks to relax no effort until the campaign has been brought to a successful issue.

The hardening of newly-arrived drafts is most noticeable, and in those men who have been out since the commencement of the campaign the country possesses a fine body of soldiers well skilled in the difficult warfare in which they are engaged, and capable of any efforts which they may be called upon to make.

I beg to enclose lists of Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men whose good services I desire to bring to favourable notice in connection with recent operations.

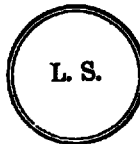

## County Borough of Croydon.

**BYE-LAWS AND REGULATIONS** made this thirteenth day of January, 1902, by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the County Borough of Croydon, under the powers conferred by the Croydon Corporation Act, 1900, and the Tramways Act, 1870.

## Application of Bye-Laws.

1. The Bye-Laws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall apply to all carriages used on the tramways, and to all places with respect to which the Corporation, as the promoters of any tramway, now have or at any time hereafter may have power to make Bye-Laws and Regulations.

## Interpretation of Terms.

2. For the purpose of these Bye-Laws and Regulations the term "the Corporation" shall mean the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the County Borough of Croydon, the term "the Borough" shall mean the County Borough of Croydon, the term "carriage" shall mean any engine, car, or carriage using any tramway laid down within the said Borough, the terms "Driver" and "Conductor" shall respectively mean the Driver and Conductor or other person having charge of an engine, car, or carriage, and the term "tramways" shall include all tramways now or hereafter constructed by the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses within the Borough. The word "Lessees" shall mean the persons, Corporation, or Company, to whom, in accordance with the statutory provisions in that behalf, the Corporation may have demised or granted the right of user of the tramways, and in demanding or taking in respect of the same the authorized tolls.

## Stopping Places Provided.

3. The Driver or Conductor of a carriage shall stop the same at any of the stopping places which may from time to time be appointed by the Corporation or its Lessees for the purpose of setting down or taking up passengers when required by any passenger desiring to leave the carriage, or by any person desirous of travelling by the carriage, for whom there is room, and to whose admission no valid objection can be made.

## Warning Bell or Whistle.

4. The Driver of a carriage, on coming in sight of a vehicle standing or travelling on any part of the road so as not to leave sufficient space for the carriage to pass, shall sound his bell or whistle as a warning to the person in charge of such vehicle, and that person shall, with reasonable despatch, cause such vehicle to be removed so as not to obstruct the carriage.

## Impeding Traffic.

5. No person shall in any way wilfully impede or interfere with the traffic on the tramway, nor shall any Driver or Conductor needlessly cause interruption to the ordinary road traffic.

## Hindermost Platform.

6. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindermost or "Conductor's" platform, and not otherwise.

## Smoking.

7. No person shall smoke inside any carriage.

## Expectorating.

8. No person shall expectorate inside or outside any carriage.

## Musical Performances.

9. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any carriage, play or perform on any musical instrument.

No. 27398.

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## Intoxicated Persons.

10. Any person in a state of intoxication or affected with any infectious or contagious disease shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the Conductor.

## Offensive Conduct.

11. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

## Damaging Cars.

12. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil or damage the seats, cushions, linings or other fittings of any carriage, or remove or deface any number plate, printed, painted or other notice, or break or scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage any carriage, and no person, not being a servant of the Corporation or its Lessees duly authorized in that behalf, shall touch, handle or interfere with any electric machine or appliance in, under, upon or about any carriage (except electric bells provided for the use of passengers). Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-Laws and Regulations in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

## Passengers' Dirty Clothing.

13. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the Conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the Conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in the interior of any carriage; and may be prevented from entering the interior of any carriage, and shall not enter the interior of any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the Conductor; and if found in the interior of any carriage shall, on the request of the Conductor, leave the interior of the carriage, upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

## Paying Fare.

14. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the Conductor, or other duly authorized officer of the Corporation or its Lessees, the fare legally demandable for the journey.

## Passengers to Produce Tickets.

15. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any) when required so to do to the Conductor or any duly authorized servant of the Corporation or its Lessees, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

## Availability of Tickets.

16. Any ticket for the time being issued by the Corporation or its Lessees in respect of fares shall be only available for the carriage on or for which it is issued (except in the case of transfer or season tickets), and no passenger shall be entitled to leave any carriage for any purpose whatever at any stage and resume his journey by a different carriage to that on or for which such ticket was issued without the payment of a fresh fare from the point at which the passenger entered the second or other carriage.

## Personal Luggage.

17. Personal luggage not exceeding 28 lbs. in weight (including the tools of artisans, mechanics and daily labourers), may be carried by hand, or, unless otherwise permitted by the

Conductor, shall be placed on the front or Driver's platform. The Conductor may decline to take into or upon the carriage any luggage of a form or description calculated to annoy or inconvenience any passenger.

#### Rail Platform and Steps.

18. No passenger or other person, not being a servant of the Corporation or its Lessees, shall be permitted to travel on the steps or Driver's platform of any carriage, or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof or platform of any carriage, and shall cease to do so immediately on request by the Conductor.

#### Passengers Only.

19. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage, or travel therein otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers.

#### Full Car.

20. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is authorized to contain, no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage after being warned by the Conductor not to do so.

#### Full Notice.

\*21. When a carriage contains the full authorized number of passengers, a notice to that effect shall be placed in conspicuous letters in a conspicuous position on the carriage.

#### When Car Full.

22. The Conductor shall not permit any passenger beyond the authorized number to enter, mount, or remain in or upon any part of a carriage.

#### Car in Motion.

23. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave any carriage whilst in motion.

#### Dogs.

24. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage. Any dog or other animal taken into or on any carriage in breach of this Regulation shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the carriage immediately upon request by the Conductor, and in default of compliance with such request may be removed by or under the direction of the Conductor.

#### Firearms.

25. No person shall enter, get upon, or travel in or on any carriage with loaded firearms, or with any article, instrument, or implement which may be dangerous or offensive to any passenger.

#### Obstructing Servants.

26. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Corporation or its Lessees in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Corporation.

#### Breach of Bye-Laws.

27. The Conductor of each carriage shall enforce or prevent the breach of these Bye-Laws and Regulations to the best of his ability.

#### Penalty.

28. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these Bye-Laws or Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

29. There shall be placed and kept in a conspicuous position, inside of each carriage in use, a printed copy of these Bye-Laws and Regulations.

30. These Bye-Laws shall come into force on the 1st day of April, 1902.
