Government Notice. No. 289.

His Excellency the Governor, having heard the opinion of the Council of Health, has been pleased to repeal Government Notice No. 280 of the 6th December, 1902, and to direct that the following regulations be observed as regards vessels and passengers, viz:—

Infected Places.

1. The following countries are, for purposes of quarantine, to be treated as infected:—

- (a.) Arabia (excepting Perim and Aden);
- (b.) China;
- (c.) Egypt (excepting Port Said and Suez);
- (d.) India.

2. And the following ports:—

- (a.) Ports in the Persian Gulf;
- (b.) Syria between Sur and Port Said (exclusive of the latter port).

Infected Vessels.

3. Infected vessels are vessels which have, or have had, on board, during the voyage or the preceding 20 days, cases of cholera, yellow fever, plague, or any disease with symptoms which, in the opinion of the Chief Government Medical Officer, resemble the symptoms of the said diseases.

Vessels which are not allowed to enter the Harbour, but are allowed to communicate with Quarantine Establishments.

- 4. Infected vessels.
- 5. Vessels with pilgrims from the East, when not carrying a recognized Medical Officer.
- 6. Vessels from infected places, when not carrying a recognized Medical Officer.

Vessels allowed to load in Quarantine.

7. Vessels arriving at Malta without a clean bill of health.

8. Infected vessels when carrying a recognized Medical Officer and not having on board an actual case of the diseases mentioned in paragraph 3 on board.

9. Vessels from infected places not having on board an actual case of the diseases mentioned in paragraph 3, when arriving within 10 days from departure.

10. Vessels with pilgrims from the East when carrying a recognized Medical Officer.

Vessels from Infected Places admitted to pratique.

11. Vessels without a clean bill of health, or from infected places, will be admitted to pratique after 10 days from date of departure.

Medical Inspection.

12. All vessels and passengers on arrival are subject to medical inspection.

Passengers.

13. Passengers, before landing, must declare on oath before a Marine Police Officer that they have not been in, or have not communicated with, an infected place within the last 10 days. Otherwise they shall remain in quarantine to complete 10 days from departure.

14. Passengers arriving on vessels without a clean bill of health shall complete 10 days' quarantine from departure.

15. Passengers arriving from infected places, after 10 days from date of departure are allowed to land in free pratique after strict medical inspection and thorough disinfection of their persons, effects, and luggage, if the inspecting Medical Officer is satisfied that they are in good health.

16. Passengers not otherwise provided for are subjected to the restrictions applicable to the vessels on which they arrive.

17. When 20 days have elapsed from the last case of plague, cholera, or other disease against which restrictions have been in force with regard to a country or place declared to be an infected place, a notice will be issued by the Collector of Customs to the effect that the place or port is no longer to be dealt with as infected.

N.B.—Vessels that carry a doctor and pass through the Suez Canal without taking on board either cargo or passengers, will not be considered infected by contact with Canal Pilots taken on board from a disinfecting station or by coaling and provisioning at Port Said or Suez, under restrictions approved by the Chief Government Medical Officer.

The word "passengers," as used in this Notice, includes the crew.

Government Notice. No. 290.

His Excellency the Governor, having heard the opinion of the Council of Health, has been pleased to modify Government Notice No. 169 of the 4th July, 1902, and to direct that the following Regulations be observed, viz. :—

1. The importation is forbidden of

(a.) Cattle (except horses, mules, and asses) from Egypt, the Province of Naples, Calabria, Salonica and from Mersina and the other ports in the Vilayet of Adana.

(b.) Wool, hides, skins, horns, bones, and hoofs from the above places and from countries where epidemic diseases are reported;

(c.) Cattle arriving from any place, if affected with any disease in view of which, in the opinion of the Chief Government Medical Officer, their admission into the Lazaretto might prove detrimental to other cattle already in the Island.

2. Cattle which may be allowed to be landed under the conditions hereinafter specified, and subject to their being kept isolated and under observation in such of the enclosures at the Lazaretto as may be assigned or approved for that purpose for the period hereinafter stated.

(a.) Cattle from the Black Sea except Odessa, from the Sea of Azov, Syria, and Prevesa (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited)—subjected to 3 months' observation;

(b.) Cattle from Roumania, except swine, (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited)—subjected to 3 months' observation;

(c.) Cattle from Sardinia (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited)—subjected to 15 days' observation;

(d.) Russian cattle from Odessa (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited)—subjected to 14 days' observation;

(e.) Cattle from Sicily (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited)—subjected to 10 days' observation;

(f.) Cattle from the Regency of Tunis and from Morocco (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited)—subjected to five days' observation;

(g.) Cattle from Bengazi (unless the importation is otherwise prohibited)—subjected to two days' observation.

(h.) Horses, mules and asses from Egypt, the Province of Naples, Calabria, Salonica, and Turkey in Asia—subjected to three days' observation. Such horses, mules, and asses shall be released, after inspection at the Lazaretto, provided the owner undertakes to keep the animals in a place approved of by the Collector of Customs, and to cause them to be inspected by a Government Medical Officer or Veterinary Surgeon twice a week for nine weeks. The cattle referred to in this paragraph shall not be allowed to be landed, unless the consignee shall have in each case and before shipment, made a written application, stating the approximate number of animals intended to be imported, and obtained the necessary permission after having agreed to abide by any regulations which may have been established. Such application shall imply that the consignee has bound himself to abide by any regulations which may be in force on the day of importation, or which may be issued during the time in which the cattle may have to remain in quarantine, and also to pay the entrance fees, fees for guards, and other fees for ordinary or extraordinary expenses usually levied on cattle at the Lazaretto.

3. Swine.

Swine arriving from the Ports of Turkey and Greece, except those referred to in sections 1 and 2, and swine arriving from Roumania, will be subjected to eight days' observation at the Lazaretto.

4. General Provisions.

All cattle intended for importation into these Islands, must be accompanied by a certificate from the British Consular Authority, or, in default, of the Local Government Authority of the places of origin and embarkation, stating that cattle disease has not been officially reported in those places during the three months previous to the date of embarkation.

The term "cattle" includes horses, mules, asses, animals of the bovine species, sheep, goats, and swine.

5. Vessels with Cattle on board.

(a.) Vessels arriving in this Island, having on board more than 250 head of cattle (bovine) are to go into the quarantine harbour, and the cattle are to be inspected in the cattle enclosures of the Lazaretto.

(b.) Vessels which have, or have had, on board animals suffering from any contagious or infectious disease shall be disinfected in such manner

as the Superintendent of the Public Health Department may direct. Should such disinfection be objected to, the vessels will be subject to quarantine, pending disinfection, on their returning to the Malta Harbour.

SHORES OR BANKS OF THE RIVER CONWAY, IN THE VICINITY OF CYMRYD ISAF.

REMOVAL OF MATERIALS PROHIBITED.

Whereas the Board of Trade, acting in pursuance of the Harbours Act, 1814, as amended by the Harbours Transfer Act, 1862, find it necessary for the protection of the Port of Beaumaris, to prohibit the taking or removing of any shingle or ballast from the shores or banks on the Carnarvonshire side of the river Conway, between the lane leading from the river to Cymryd Isaf and the boundary of Fachleidog Farm (*i.e.* from an area embracing all the shores and banks adjacent to Cymryd Isaf, Cae Ysagubor, Buckley Field, Cae Penrhyn and the fields of Tyddyn Cynnal), being within the said port.

Now the Board of Trade do hereby, by this Order, prohibit the taking or removing of any shingle or ballast from the shores or banks of the river Conway between the points above mentioned.

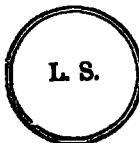

such church be vested in and be exercised by and belong to the said Augustus, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, and his successors, Bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

And whereas the said church has since been consecrated and is called "The Church of Saint Mary and All Saints, Palfrey, Walsall."

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England deem it expedient that a particular district to comprise a part of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Caldmore, should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mary and All Saints, Palfrey, Walsall, and also that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church.

Now know ye that the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in exercise and execution of the powers or authorities for this purpose contained in the several Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts" as aforesaid, or in some of them, and particularly in the Act of the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter thirty-eight in the said Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-seven, and in the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling them in this behalf, do hereby with the consent of the said Augustus, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield (testified by his being a party to and executing these presents) assign to the said Church of Saint Mary and All Saints, Palfrey, Walsall, as a particular district, all that part of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Caldmore, which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended, and do direct that the same shall be called "The Particular District of Saint Mary and All Saints, Palfrey, Walsall."

And the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the like consent of the said Augustus, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield (testified as aforesaid), in further exercise and execution of the powers or authorities contained in the said Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts," or in some of them, and particularly in the said Act of the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter thirty-eight, in the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter sixty, in the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her said late Majesty chapter fifty-six (such two lastly-mentioned Acts being also two of "The Church Building Acts" before named); in the said Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-seven, and in the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling them in this behalf, do hereby determine and declare that banns of matrimony shall be published and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be solemnized or performed at the church of the said particular district of Saint Mary and All Saints, Palfrey, Walsall, and do hereby order and direct that all the fees, dues, offerings, or other emoluments to be received in respect of such publication of banns of matrimony and of such solemnization or performance of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials at the same church shall from and after the next avoidance of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Caldmore, belong to the

Incumbent for the time being of the said particular district of Saint Mary and All Saints, Palfrey, Walsall. Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

In witness whereof the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have hereunto affixed their common seal, and the said Augustus, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, has hereunto set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal this eighteenth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and two.
