A PROCLAMATION,

In order to the Electing a Peer of Scotland.

EDWARD R. & I.

Whereas the Right Honourable Ronald Ruthven, Earl of Leven and Melville, was duly elected and returned to be one of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland to sit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and is since deceased: In order to the Electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his room, We do, by the advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood House, at Edinburgh, on Thursday, the eighth day of November, one thousand nine hundred and six, between the hours of twelve and two in the afternoon, to nominate and choose another Peer of Scotland to sit and vote in the House of Peers in this present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in the room of the said Ronald Ruthven, Earl of Leven and Melville, deceased, by open election and plurality of voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the proxies of such as shall be absent (such proxies being Peers and producing a mandate in writing duly signed before witnesses, and both the constituent and proxy being qualified according to law); and the Lord Clerk Register, or the two Principal Clerks of the Session appointed by him to officiate in his name, are hereby respectively required to attend such meeting, and to administer the oaths required by law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their votes, and immediately after such election made and duly examined to certify the name of the Peer so elected, and to sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the Electors, and return such certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain: And We strictly charge and command

that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the county towns of Scotland, ten days at least before the time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such election.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to carry into effect with certain modifications the Fourth Report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues," duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following

scheme for confirming an alteration in the statutes of the cathedral church of Lichfield.

"Whereas it is by the said recited Act enacted, that the chapters of the several cathedral and collegiate churches shall from time to time, of their own accord, or upon being required by the visitors of the said churches respectively, propose to such visitors such alterations in the existing statutes and rules as shall make them consistent with the constitution and duties of the chapters respectively as altered under the authority of the said Act and that all such alterations may be confirmed by the authority of the visitor, and that all such statutes and rules, when so altered, shall be submitted to us and may be confirmed by the authority in the same Act provided, that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and a duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same.

"And whereas the dean and chapter of the said cathedral church of Lichfield acting under the provisions of the said Act have proposed to the Honourable and Right Reverend Augustus Bishop of Lichfield as visitor of the said cathedral church an alteration in the statutes of the said cathedral church with a view to making such statutes consistent with the constitution and duties of the chapter of the said cathedral church as altered under the authority of the said Act which proposed alteration in the statutes of the said cathedral church has been approved and confirmed by the said visitor and submitted to us and is set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed and it appears to us to be expedient that the same should also be confirmed by Your Majesty as contemplated by the said recited provisions of the said Act.

"Now therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the alteration set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed in the statutes and rules of the said cathedral church be confirmed.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

"The SCHEDULE.

"We, Herbert Mortimer Luckock, Doctor in Divinity, Dean of the cathedral church of Lichfield, and the chapter of the same church, acting under the provisions of 'The Ecclesiastical Commissioners Act, 1840,' do hereby propose to the Honourable and Right Reverend Augustus, by Divine permission, Bishop of Lichfield, as visitor of our cathedral church, that the following alteration be made in the existing statutes of the said cathedral church.

"Whereas the office or dignity of treasurer of the said cathedral church was anciently annexed to the prebend or prebendal stall of Sallow otherwise Sawley founded in the said church and the duties of the said office performed by the canon or prebendary thereof.

"And whereas under the provisions of section eleven of an Act of Parliament seven Anne, chapter thirty-four, intituled 'An Act for the Building of a Parish Church and Parsonage House, and making a New Church Yard and a New Parish Church in Byrmingham, to be called the Parish of Saint Philip, in the county of Warwick,' it was provided for the better maintenance of the rector of the new church of Saint Philip, Birmingham that the said Prebend of Sawley whenever it became void should be conferred by the Bishop of Coventry and Lichfield on the rector for the time being of the said

church who was to hold it during his incumbency of the church and no longer.

"And whereas by the sixth section of an Act of Parliament thirty-seven George Third, chapter twenty, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend an Act passed in the fourth and fifth years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Anne intituled 'An Act for augmenting the Number of Canons Residentiary in the Cathedral Church of Lichfield and for improving the Deanery and Prebends of the said Cathedral,' and to make further provision for the Canons Residentiary of the said Cathedral Church and an addition to the Fabric Fund thereof' it was enacted that the third residentiaryship should consist of, besides a sixth part of the dividends of the residentiaries thereinbefore mentioned, the house in the close of the said cathedral church therein described and the prebend of Sallow otherwise Sawley founded in the said cathedral church and the treasurership of the said church thereto then annexed with the appurtenances, which said prebend of Sawley with the said treasurership and appurtenances should be and the same was thereby inseparably annexed to the said third residentiaryship.

"And whereas by another Act of Parliament which received the Royal assent on the twenty-sixth day of May in the thirty-eighth year of the said reign to explain and amend the said last-mentioned Act of Parliament, it is provided that from time to time and at all times thereafter the precentor, chancellor, and treasurer of the said cathedral church of Lichfield and their successors for the time being should have precedency in the said church and chapter and priority of choice of residence in gradation according to their respective ranks as dignitaries in preference of all other canons residentiary, except that the canon residentiary in actual residence should have precedency but not priority of choice of residence, unless otherway entitled thereto during the time of his residence.

"And whereas by section thirteenth of 'The Ecclesiastical Commissioners Act 1840' it is provided (inter alia) that the canonry annexed to the rectory of the church of Saint Philip Birmingham that is to say the third residentiaryship comprising the prebend of Sawley and the treasurership as aforesaid should immediately upon the first vacancy thereof be detached from the said rectory and suspended, which suspension took effect in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-five by the death of the Reverend Lawrence Gardner, Doctor in Divinity, rector of Saint Philip's Birmingham, the last canon thereof and still continues.

"And whereas the said office of treasurer is necessary to the due constitution of the chapter of the said cathedral church and by reason of the suspension of the said canonry consisting of (inter alia) the prebend of Sawley and the treasurership as aforesaid it is desirable that other provision consistent with the altered constitution of the chapter should be made for the performance of the duties of the treasurership and that the statutes of the said church should be altered accordingly.

"And whereas by section forty-seven of 'The Ecclesiastical Commissioners Act, 1840' it is enacted that the chapters of the several cathedral and collegiate churches shall from time to time of their own accord or upon being requested by the visitors of the said churches respectively propose to such visitors such alterations in the existing statutes and rules as (inter alia) shall make them consistent with the constitutions and duties of the chapters respectively as altered under the authority of the said Act, and all such

alterations, if approved, may be confirmed by the authority of such visitors, and all such statutes and rules when so altered shall be submitted to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and may be confirmed by the authority thereafter provided.

"We, therefore, propose that it be provided under the authority aforesaid as follows, that is to say:—

"The dignity or office of treasurer of the cathedral church, which was formerly annexed to the prebendal stall of Sawley comprised in the third residentiaryship which residentiaryship was suspended under the provisions of 'The Ecclesiastical Commissioners Act, 1840,' shall, on the next avoidance of the fifth residentiaryship become and be attached to the said fifth residentiaryship and the prebendal stalls of Offley and Flixton held therewith and shall be held by the fifth canon residentiary, who shall perform the duties anciently performed and enjoy the precedence and priority of choice of residence and all other honorary rights and privileges (if any) anciently enjoyed by the treasurer of the cathedral church as such treasurer and not as the holder of such third residentiaryship or of the prebend of Sawley: Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prejudice or in anywise affect any present canon residentiary without his consent.

"In witness whereof we have hereunto caused our Common Seal to be affixed this twelfth day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and six.

"We, the Honourable and Right Reverend Augustus, by Divine permission, Lord Bishop of Lichfield, the visitor of the said Cathedral Church of Lichfield, do hereby signify our approval to and do confirm the alteration hereinbefore proposed to be made in the Statutes of the said Church.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lichfield.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty, Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said Majesty, chapter sixty three, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty chapter sixty-three have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a new archdeaconry within the diocese of Birmingham and for endowing such new archdeaconry.

"Whereas the said diocese of Birmingham has heretofore comprised one archdeaconry and no more namely the archdeaconry of Birmingham.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Charles Bishop of Birmingham has represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that a new archdeaconry should be constituted within the said diocese of Birmingham and should comprise the rural deaneries of Aston-juxta-Birmingham Bordesley East Birmingham Polesworth Solihull and Sutton Coldfield which are at present within the said archdeaconry of Birmingham and within the said diocese of Birmingham, and that such new archdeaconry should be endowed in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas no part of the income of the said archdeaconry of Birmingham is now derived from procurations synodals visitation fees and induction fees and it appears to us to be undesirable that fees derived from any of these sources should be received by the archdeacon of the said proposed new archdeaconry.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that by reason of the discontinuance of the collection of the said fees there will be no annual income available for the said proposed archdeaconry from fees dues and emoluments and that the grant hereinafter recommended and proposed will not be such as to raise the annual income of the said proposed archdeaconry to an amount exceeding two hundred pounds.

"Now therefore we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England with the consent of the said Charles Bishop of Birmingham (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme) humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day upon which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order one new archdeaconry shall be created within the said diocese of Birmingham and that such archdeaconry shall be named 'The Archdeaconry of Aston' and shall comprise and consist of the rural deaneries of Aston-juxta-Birmingham Bordesley East Birmingham Polesworth Solihull and Sutton Coldfield which have hitherto been situate within the said archdeaconry of Birmingham.

"And we further recommend and propose that the rural deans and other the clergy and the

inhabitants generally of the said proposed archdeaconry of Aston shall be under and subject to the archidiaconal jurisdiction authority and control of the archdeacon of such proposed archdeaconry for the time being and that such archdeacon shall have and exercise all the rights powers and duties of an archdeacon within the limits of his archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that we be authorized to pay by half-yearly instalments on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year out of the common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act to the archdeacon of the said proposed archdeaconry of Aston and to his successors in the same archdeaconry the yearly sum of two hundred pounds the instalment so first becoming due being an apportioned part only of the said sum of two hundred pounds in respect of the period between the date of the appointment of the first archdeacon and the first half-yearly day of payment next ensuing Provided always that every payment in respect of the said yearly sum of two hundred pounds shall be made by us only after we shall have been satisfied that the archdeacon who applies for the same has during the previous twelve calendar months complied with the conditions as to residence which for the time being are required by law and that he has not collected procurations synodals visitation fees or induction fees during the same period.

"And we further recommend and propose that whenever any archdeacon who may be entitled to receive the said yearly sum of two hundred pounds shall resign or otherwise avoid his archdeaconry such yearly sum shall be apportionable between such archdeacon or his representatives (as the case may be) and the archdeacon who shall next be collated to the same archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas a notice of the said scheme has in accordance with the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act been transmitted to the Archdeacon affected by the scheme, that is to say the Archdeacon of Birmingham.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Birmingham.

the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the forty-seventh and forty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-five duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme or representation, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the forty-seventh and forty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the district of Saint Stephen, Cardiff, in the county of Glamorgan, and in the diocese of Llandaff.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the eleventh day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, and published in the London Gazette on the thirteenth day of the same month, a certain part of the parish of Saint Mary, Cardiff, in the said county of Glamorgan, and in the said diocese of Llandaff, was constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and the said district was named 'The District of Saint Stephen, Cardiff.'

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said district of Saint Stephen, Cardiff, shall be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Joshua Pritchard, Bishop of Llandaff, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said district of Saint Stephen, Cardiff, shall be altered so that all that portion of the said district of Saint Stephen, Cardiff, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink, shall be dissevered from such district and shall be restored to and shall in future form part of the said parish of Saint Mary, Cardiff.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the district of Saint Stephen, Cardiff, in the county of Glamorgan, and in the diocese of Llandaff,

and to be restored to the parish of Saint Mary, Cardiff, in the same county and diocese, being:—

“All that portion of the said district of Saint Stephen, Cardiff, which is bounded upon the north-west by the said parish of Saint Mary, Cardiff, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Mary, Cardiff, from the said district of Saint Stephen, Cardiff, crosses the middle of Harrowby-lane, and extending thence southward along the middle of Harrowby-lane for a distance of five chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Clarence-road, and extending thence westward along the middle of Clarence-road for a distance of seven chains and a half or thereabouts to a point near the south-eastern end of Clarence Bridge upon the boundary which divides the said district of Saint Stephen, Cardiff, from the said parish of Saint Mary, Cardiff.”

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the two cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and the Patron and Incumbent of the cure of Saint Mary, Cardiff, have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the Patrons of the district of Saint Stephen, Cardiff, have either signified their assent to the said scheme or representation or raised no objection thereto.

And whereas the Minister or Incumbent of the said district of Saint Stephen, Cardiff, has raised certain objections to the said scheme or representation.

And whereas a period of one calendar month has elapsed since the said drafts were transmitted to the said Patrons and Incumbents as aforesaid.

And whereas, notwithstanding the said objections, the said scheme or representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Llandaff.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words following; that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and

ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Gabriel, situate at Bounds Green, within the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Michael, Wood Green, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London.

“Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Saint Michael, Wood Green, of the consolidated chapelry of Saint Michael at Bowes, Southgate, and of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint Paul, New Southgate, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parishes and consolidated chapelry.

“And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said new parish of Saint Michael, Wood Green, of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Michael at Bowes, Southgate, and of the said new parish of Saint Paul, New Southgate, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Gabriel, situate at Bounds Green, as aforesaid.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, as such Bishop and also as the patron (in right of his See) of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Michael at Bowes, Southgate, with the consent of the Reverend Denton Jones, Vicar of Tottenham, in the said county of Middlesex, as the patron of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Michael, Wood Green, and with the consent of the Reverend Charles Drummond Stooks, Vicar of Southgate, in the said county of Middlesex, as the patron of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Paul, New Southgate (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint Michael, Wood Green, of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Michael at Bowes, Southgate, and of the said new parish of Saint Paul, New Southgate, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Gabriel, situate at Bounds Green as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Gabriel, Bounds Green.’

“We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Gabriel, Bounds Green, comprising:—

“All those contiguous portions of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Michael, Wood Green, the consolidated chapelry

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Saint Mark the Evangelist, Leicester, and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Michael and All Angels, Belgrave, in the said county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parishes.

WHEREAS two-thirds of the Council of the Borough of Accrington, on the 5th day of February, one thousand nine hundred and six, agreed to petition, and the Council of the said borough thereupon petitioned His Majesty for an alteration of the number and boundaries of the wards of the said borough.

And whereas His Majesty has been pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council and in pursuance and in exercise of the powers vested in His Majesty by "the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882," to fix the number of wards into which the borough of Accrington shall be divided, and, to order and direct that the said borough shall thenceforth be divided into eight wards, which Order was made on the 11th day of May, one thousand nine hundred and six. Now I, the said Samuel Pope, in pursuance of the powers given me by virtue of the said appointment under the said Act, do hereby determine as hereinafter mentioned the boundaries of the said eight wards into which the said borough is divided, which wards are hereinafter named and numbered as follows, that is to say:—

1. West Ward.
2. Central Ward.
3. North Ward.
4. Peel Park Ward.
5. East Ward.
6. South Ward.
7. Higher Antley Ward.
8. Spring Hill Ward.

And where in the following descriptions of the ward boundaries a street is given as the boundary thereof, the boundary is to be taken as the centre of such street, and where any street is described as joining another street, the point of junction is to be taken as the point at which lines, drawn along the centres of the two streets, and continued, would intersect each other, and a point described as being opposite a street is to be taken as opposite the centre of the street.

No. 1.—West Ward.

I do hereby determine that West Ward shall comprise so much of the township and borough of Accrington as lies within the following boundary:—

And I hereby determine that the Wellow Ward shall comprise so much of the borough as is contained within a line commencing at the point where the centre line of the Great Central

And I hereby determine that the Wellington Ward shall comprise so much of the borough as is contained within a line commencing at the point on the eastern boundary of the borough in Park-street opposite the centre line of Oxford-street, proceeding southwards along the eastern boundary of the borough to the point opposite the centre of Wellington-street, thence in a westerly direction along the centre line of Wellington-street to the boundary between the parishes of Great Grimsby and Clee, thence in a north-easterly and northerly direction along the parish boundary aforesaid, to the centre line of Oxford-street, and thence in an easterly direction along the centre line of Oxford-street to the point of commencement aforesaid.

And I hereby determine that the Hainton Ward shall comprise so much of the borough as is contained within a line commencing at the point in the boundary between the parishes of Great Grimsby and Clee in the centre of Welholme-road, and proceeding thence in a northerly and north-easterly direction along the parish boundary aforesaid to the centre line of Wellington-street, thence in an easterly direction along the centre line of Wellington-street to the point opposite the centre of Convamore-road, thence in a southerly direction along the centre line of Convamore-road to the centre line of Welholme-road, thence in a westerly direction along the centre line of Welholme-road to the point of commencement aforesaid.

And I hereby determine that the Clee Ward shall comprise so much of the borough as is contained within a line commencing at the point in Welholme-road opposite the centre of Convamore-road, proceeding thence in a northerly direction along the centre line of Convamore-road to the centre line of Wellington-street, thence in an

easterly direction along the centre line of Wellington-street to the eastern boundary of the borough at the centre line of Park-street, thence along the borough boundary in a south-easterly, north-easterly, south-easterly and south-westerly direction to the point where the centre line of the stream which crosses Weelsby-road nearly opposite the end of Humberstone-avenue intersects the said boundary, thence in a north-westerly direction along the centre line of the said stream to the point opposite the centre line of Welholme-road, thence in a westerly direction in a straight line to and along the centre line of Welholme-road to the point of commencement aforesaid.

And I hereby determine that the Weelsby Ward shall comprise so much of the borough as is contained within a line commencing at the point in the boundary between the parishes of Great Grimsby and Clee in the centre of Welholme-road, proceeding thence in a southerly, easterly and southerly direction along the parish boundary aforesaid to the point where the parish boundary aforesaid intersects the southern boundary of the borough, thence along the borough boundary in an easterly direction to the point where the centre line of the stream which crosses Weelsby-road nearly opposite the centre of Humberstone-avenue intersects the said boundary, thence in a north-westerly direction along the centre line of the said stream to the point opposite the centre line of Welholme-road, thence in a westerly direction in a straight line to and along the centre line of Welholme-road to the point of commencement aforesaid.

And I the said Thomas Dalton Lawrence, in further pursuance of the said warrant of appointment do hereby assign and apportion three Councillors to each and every Ward as follows, that is to say:—

WHEREAS at a Council held at Buckingham Palace on the twenty-third day of October, one thousand nine hundred and five, His Majesty was pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to fix the number of wards into which the Borough of South Shields should be henceforth divided, and to order and direct that the number of the said wards should be fourteen: and whereas His Majesty was further pleased to order and direct that the number of the Aldermen of the said borough should henceforth be fourteen, and that the number of Councillors of the said borough should be forty-two, thereby increasing the number of such Aldermen and Councillors, and that the said Councillors should be apportioned among the wards of the borough by the Commissioner, who should be appointed by the Secretary of State in pursuance of section thirty, sub-section three of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882.

And whereas on the thirty-first day of October, one thousand nine hundred and five, the Right Honourable Aretas Akers-Douglas, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State did, under his hand and seal, duly appoint Edward Thornton Hill Lawes, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, to be a Commissioner for determining the boundaries of and for apportioning the Councillors among the wards of the said borough:

And whereas the said Commissioner did by his scheme dated the ninth day of January, one thousand nine hundred and six, duly determine the boundaries of the said fourteen wards, and did assign and apportion three Councillors to each and every of the said wards:

And whereas at a Council held at Buckingham Palace on the eleventh day of May, one thousand nine hundred and six, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, was pleased to

approve of the said scheme of the said Commissioner and to order the same to be published in the London Gazette accordingly:

And whereas the said scheme was duly published in the London Gazette of May fifteen, one thousand nine hundred and six:

And whereas section seven, sub-section one of the South Shields Corporation Act, 1896, enacts as follows:—

If a majority of the whole of the Council of the borough agree to petition, and that Council thereupon petition the King for an increase of the number of the Aldermen and Councillors of the borough, it shall be lawful for His Majesty by Order in Council to increase the number of such Aldermen and Councillors, and to apportion such Councillors among the wards of the borough, and to make such other provisions as appear to His said Council to be necessary or proper for carrying such purposes into effect.

And whereas at this present time the respective numbers of Aldermen and Councillors duly elected fall short of the numbers fixed as aforesaid by His Majesty in Council, and it is necessary that other provisions should be made for the election of additional Aldermen and Councillors in order that the increase of the number of the Aldermen and Councillors of the said borough and the apportionment of the Councillors among the wards of the same may be carried into effect.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance and exercise of the power by the said Act of Parliament vested, and of every other power enabling him in that behalf, doth by and with the advice of His Privy Council order and direct as follows:—

(1.) Such additional number of Aldermen as may be necessary to complete the total number of fourteen Aldermen shall be elected in the manner provided in the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, on the ninth day of November next, being the day appointed for the ordinary election of Aldermen by the said Municipal Corporations Act.

(2.) One half of the number of additional Aldermen so elected shall go out of office on the ninth of November, one thousand nine hundred and seven, when in accordance with the provisions of section fourteen of the said Act one half of the existing Aldermen of the Borough of South Shields will go out of office; and the remaining half of the additional Aldermen shall go out of office on the ninth of November, one thousand nine hundred and ten, when the remainder of the Aldermen of the said borough will go out of office in accordance with the provisions of the Act and section above mentioned.

(3.) The order of the retirement of the new Aldermen shall be determined by the number of votes which they respectively receive, and the two Aldermen who receive the larger number of votes shall sit for the longer period. In the event of two or more of such Aldermen receiving an equality of votes the Mayor for the time being shall determine which of such Aldermen shall sit for the longer period.

(4.) Such additional number of Councillors as shall be necessary to make up a total of forty-two Councillors shall be elected in the manner provided by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, on the first day of November next, being the day appointed by the said Act for the ordinary election of Councillors.

(5.) Where one such additional Councillor is required by the scheme recited above to be elected for a ward, such Councillor shall hold office for three years, and the remaining

Councillors apportioned to such ward by the said scheme shall retire respectively at the dates at which they would have retired had there been no increase in the number of wards.

(6.) Where two of such additional Councillors are required by the scheme recited above to be elected for one and the same ward, and a Councillor is required on the first day of November next to be elected to fill a vacancy occurring for the same ward caused by the retirement of a Councillor, the date at which such Councillors shall respectively retire shall be determined by the number of votes cast for each, the Councillor with the greatest number of votes holding office for three years, the Councillor with the next greatest number of votes holding office for two years and the Councillor with the fewest number of votes holding office for one year, but if such Councillors are elected, either without a contest, or two or more of them have an equality of votes, the Mayor for the time being shall determine at what date each of them shall go out of office.

And His Majesty is further pleased by and with the advice of His Council to order that the provisions above recited shall be published in the London Gazette.

WHEREAS by section two hundred and fourteen of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is provided that a local authority whose district includes a seaport may, with the approval of the Board of Trade, make bye-laws relating to seamen's lodging-houses in their district, and that those bye-laws shall be binding upon all persons keeping houses in which seamen are lodged, and upon the owners thereof and persons employed therein, and further that such bye-laws should amongst other things provide for the licensing, inspection, and sanitary conditions of seamen's lodging-houses, for the publication of the fact of a house being licensed for the due execution of the bye-laws for preventing the obstruction of persons engaged in securing that execution, for the preventing of persons not duly licensed holding themselves out as keeping or purporting to keep licensed houses, and for the exclusion from licensed houses of persons of improper character, and should impose sufficient fines, not exceeding fifty pounds, for the breach of any bye-law, and further that whenever His Majesty in Council orders that in any district or any part thereof, none but persons duly licensed in pursuance of bye-laws under the said section should keep seamen's lodging-houses or let lodgings to seamen from a date therein named, a person acting in contravention of that Order should for each offence be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds:

And whereas the Council of the City and County of Kingston-upon-Hull is a Local Authority under the Public Health Acts and a Local Authority within the meaning of the said section two hundred and fourteen of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894:

And whereas the said Council of the City

and County of Kingston-upon-Hull have with the approval of the Board of Trade made the bye-laws and regulations set out in the Schedule hereto:

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by the said Act, doth order that, from and after the first day of November, one thousand nine hundred and six, none but persons duly licensed in pursuance of the said bye-laws and regulations shall keep seamen's lodging-houses or let lodgings to seamen in the district of the City and County of Kingston-upon-Hull, or in any part thereof.

The SCHEDULE hereinbefore referred to.

1. In the construction of the following bye-laws, unless the context otherwise requires, the following expressions have the meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say:—

"The Council" means the Council of the City and County of Kingston-upon-Hull.

"The City" means the City and County of Kingston-upon-Hull.

"The Town Clerk" means the Town Clerk of the City and County of Kingston-upon-Hull.

"The Medical Officer of Health" means the Medical Officer of Health of the City and County of Kingston-upon-Hull.

"Seaman" means any male person other than the holder of a certificate of competency or service as master, mate, or engineer, in the merchant service who within four weeks immediately preceding the date of any transaction or occurrence within the scope of these bye-laws, has been employed in any capacity whatsoever on board a ship, whether British or foreign.

"Licence" means a licence granted or which may be granted by the Council in pursuance of these bye-laws to a person authorizing him to keep the house specified therein as a seamen's lodging-house.

"Licensed keeper" means a person to whom a licence has been granted in pursuance of these bye-laws.

"Keeper" means and includes both a licensed keeper and a person who keeps a seamen's lodging-house or a house in which seamen are lodged to whom a licence has not been granted in pursuance of these bye-laws.

"Licensed house" means a seamen's lodging-house in respect of which a licence has been granted in pursuance of these bye-laws.

"House" means and includes both a licensed house and a seamen's lodging-house or a house in which seamen are lodged in respect of which a licence has not been granted in pursuance of these bye-laws.

2. A person who shall apply to the Council for a licence shall furnish, on the application form to be supplied by the Council, a true statement of the particulars therein required to be specified.

3. The Council shall cause a register to be kept of all licences granted under these bye-laws, and the suspension or revocation of any licence shall be noted in such register.

4. A person who, not being entered in the Council's register as a licensed keeper, shall himself or by means of any agent or servant hold himself out as keeping or purporting to keep a licensed house, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, and to a further penalty of ten pounds for every day during which he shall continue to do so after conviction for so doing.

5. A licence shall not be granted in respect of

a house or part of a house until it has been inspected and approved as fit for the purpose of a licensed house by the Medical Officer of Health, or by an Assistant Medical Officer of Health of the City, and any person who applies for a licence shall produce to the Council evidence to his satisfaction of his fitness to be licensed.

6. A licensed keeper shall not transfer or lend a licence to any other person.

7. A licence shall be subject to such conditions specified therein, or endorsed thereon, and not being inconsistent with the laws, bye-laws, or regulations for the time being in force in the City, as the Council sees fit, and a licensed keeper, or any person employed in a licensed house shall not commit a breach of, or fail to observe, such conditions.

8. A licence shall continue in force (subject to suspension or revocation as in these bye-laws provided) for one year from first January. The Council may at its discretion refuse to renew any licence.

9. A house or part of a house which is in connection with any public-house or beer-house shall not be licensed as a seamen's lodging-house.

10. A licence shall not be granted to a person who holds a licence for the sale of intoxicating liquor, or who is engaged or interested in the business of a clothier, outfitter, or slop-dealer; nor shall a licence be granted in respect of any house or part of a house where intoxicating liquor is sold, nor in respect of any house or part of a house occupied or used for the purpose of the business of a clothier, outfitter, or slop-dealer; nor shall any licensed keeper sell or be engaged or interested in the sale of intoxicating liquor, nor be engaged or interested in the business of a clothier, outfitter, or slop-dealer.

11. A licensed keeper shall affix and keep undefaced and legible a notice with the words "Licensed Seamen's Lodging-house" in the most conspicuous place on the outside of the main entrance from any street to the licensed house, and also the full name and address of the licensed keeper.

12. A keeper and any person employed in a house shall at all times, by day or night, when required by an officer appointed by the Council for the inspection of seamen's lodging-houses, or by an officer of the Board of Trade, or of the police, give him or them or any of them free access to all parts of such house and to the register of seamen lodgers hereinafter referred to.

13. A keeper shall not at any time receive, cause, or suffer to be received into a house, or permit to sleep in any room therein, any greater number of lodgers than shall be from time to time allowed by the certificate of the Town Clerk. Such certificate shall state the total number of lodgers allowed to sleep in each room of such house, as well as the total number such house may receive, and shall be supplied by the Council to the keeper; and he shall produce such certificate whenever required by any officer appointed by the Council for the inspection of seamen's lodging-houses.

14. A keeper shall fix and keep fixed in a conspicuous place in each room a ticket signed by the Town Clerk, stating the number of lodgers allowed to sleep in such room.

15. A keeper and any person employed in a house shall not at any time conceal, deface, alter, or obliterate, or permit, or suffer to be concealed, defaced, altered, or obliterated any such letters or figures.

16. Notwithstanding that the maximum number of lodgers to be received in a house or in any room therein may not have been fixed by the Council as hereinbefore provided, a keeper shall

not cause or suffer a greater number of persons than will admit of the provision of four hundred cubic feet of free air space for each person to occupy at one time as a sleeping apartment a room which is used for that purpose.

17. Whenever the Council shall consider it necessary to reduce the number of lodgers to be received in any room in a house, the keeper shall, upon receiving notice in writing to that effect, under the hand of the Town Clerk, cease to permit such room to be occupied by any greater number of lodgers than that specified in such notice.

18. A keeper shall not at any time cause or suffer any room which may be appointed for use as a kitchen, scullery, or sitting room, or any underground room, to be used as a sleeping apartment.

19. A keeper shall cause all such means of ventilation as may be provided in, or in connection with, any room or passage in a house, and in or in connection with any water-closet belonging to a house to be maintained at all times in good order.

20. A keeper shall cause the windows of every room and of the passages and water-closets in a house to be kept fully open for such time on each day as may be necessary for the purposes of ventilation, and shall cause the windows of every room which may be appointed for use and occupation as a sleeping apartment to be kept fully open from 9 A.M. to 4 P.M. in winter, and 9 A.M. to 6 P.M. in summer.

Provided that such keeper shall not be required in pursuance of this bye-law to cause any window in any room to be opened or to be kept open at any time when the state of the weather is such as to render it necessary that the window shall be closed, or when any bed in such room may be occupied by any lodger in consequence of sickness or of other sufficient cause.

21. A keeper shall, in the first week in the month of April, and, if required in writing by the Council, in the first week in the month of October, in every year, cause every part of a house to be cleansed, and shall, at the same time, except in such cases as are hereinafter specified, cause every area, the interior surface of every ceiling and wall of every water-closet belonging to the premises, and the interior surface of every ceiling and wall of every room, staircase, and passage in the house, to be thoroughly stopped, cleansed, and lime-washed or distempered. Provided that if any such interior surface is painted or covered with material which is such as to render the lime-washing thereof unsuitable or inexpedient, this bye-law shall be deemed to be satisfied, so long as such surface is thoroughly cleansed, and the paint or other covering thereon is renewed, if such cleansing or renewal be necessary for the purpose of keeping the house in a cleanly and wholesome condition.

22. A keeper shall as often as may be necessary to keep the same in a clean and wholesome state, cause all the rooms, passages, stairs, floors, windows, doors, and walls of a house to be thoroughly cleansed and freed from vermin, and shall also cause the floors of every room to be thoroughly swept daily, before the hour of ten in the forenoon, and to be well and sufficiently washed on Friday in each week before the hour of twelve noon.

23. A keeper shall cause all bed clothes and bedding and every bedstead used in a house to be thoroughly cleansed as often as shall be required for the purpose of keeping such bed clothes, bedding, and bedsteads in a clean and wholesome condition, and free from vermin.

24. A keeper shall, for the use of the lodgers received into a house, cause to be provided a

sufficient number of chamber utensils, and a sufficient number of washing basins or other proper receptacles for water, of adequate capacity and suitably placed, and a sufficient supply of water, and a sufficient number of towels for use in connection with such washing basins and other receptacles, and shall cause such basins or receptacles to be kept clean and in good order, and the supply of towels to be renewed as often as may be requisite.

25. A keeper shall cause all solid or liquid filth or refuse to be removed once at least in every day before the hour of ten in the forenoon from every room in a house, and shall once at least in every day cause every vessel, utensil, or other receptacle for such filth or refuse to be thoroughly cleansed.

26. In the event of any inmate of a house, whether a lodger or otherwise, being attacked by any infectious disorder, the keeper shall forthwith give intimation of the same to the Medical Officer of Health.

27. A keeper, immediately after being informed or having ascertained that any inmate of a house, whether a lodger or otherwise, is ill of any infectious disease, shall adopt all such precautions as may be necessary to prevent the spread of such infectious disease. Such keeper shall not, at any time while such inmate is suffering from such infectious disease, cause or allow any other person, except a person voluntarily in attendance on such inmate, to use or occupy the same room as such inmate.

(a) Where in pursuance of the statutory provision in that behalf, the sanitary authority may order the removal of such inmate to a hospital or other place for the reception of the sick, such keeper, on being informed of such order, shall forthwith take all such steps as may be requisite on his part to secure the safe and prompt removal of such inmate in compliance with the order of the sanitary authority, and shall, in and about such removal, adopt all such precautions as, in accordance with any instructions which he may receive from the Medical Officer of Health, may be most suitable for the circumstances of the case.

(b) Where, in consequence of the illness of such inmate, there may be reasonable grounds for apprehending the spread of infection through the admission of a lodger to any room or rooms in a house or through the admission to such room or rooms of the maximum number of lodgers authorized to be received therein, such keeper, after being furnished with the necessary instructions from the Medical Officer of Health, and until the grounds for apprehending the spread of infection shall have been removed, shall cease to receive any lodger into such room or rooms or shall receive therein such number of lodgers, being less than the maximum number, as the exigencies of the case may require.

(c) Such keeper shall, immediately after the death, removal, or recovery of any inmate who may have been ill of any infectious disease, give written notice thereof to the Medical Officer of Health.

(d) When a registered medical practitioner has certified that any inmate of a house is suffering from any dangerous infectious disorder, and can be safely removed to hospital, such inmate shall not obstruct the sanitary authority in effecting his removal to any hospital or infirmary with the consent of the authorities thereof.

(e) When the Medical Officer of Health certifies that the cleansing and disinfecting of any house or part thereof, or of any articles therein likely to retain infection; or the destruction of such articles would tend to prevent or check any dangerous infectious disease, such keeper shall give the sanitary authority such facilities as may be necessary to enable such authority to carry out such works of cleansing, disinfection, or destruction as such Medical Officer of Health may deem to be necessary.

(f) Unless and until by such cleansing and disinfection the necessary precautions for preventing the spread of disease shall have been duly taken, such keeper shall not cause or suffer any other lodger to be received into the room or rooms which, in the case hereinbefore specified, may have been exposed to infection.

28. A keeper shall provide, in a suitable and convenient situation for the use of lodgers, properly constructed water-closets in the proportion of one such water-closet for every twelve lodgers; and shall cause such water-closets and every part of the apparatus of such water-closets to be kept clean, and shall cause the same and every drain or means of drainage with which they or either of them may communicate, to be maintained in good order and efficient condition.

29. A keeper shall cause every part of the structure of a house to be maintained at all times in good order.

30. A keeper shall cause the yard, area, forecourt, or other open space within the curtilage of a house to be maintained at all times in good order and thoroughly clean, and free from any accumulation of filth or other refuse.

31. A keeper and every person employed in a house shall not receive any female lodger into such house.

32. A licensed keeper and every person employed in a licensed house shall not knowingly lodge, or knowingly harbour, any thief or reputed thief, any prostitute or reputed prostitute, or any other person of improper character.

33. A keeper shall keep a register and shall enter therein the name, age, and nationality of every seaman lodger received into a house, the name of the last vessel from which such seaman lodger was discharged, and the port of discharge, with the name and port of registry of any vessel he may join while resident in such house, and his declared destination on leaving.

34. A keeper shall put up or affix and keep up or affixed a copy of these bye-laws in a suitable and conspicuous position in the common sitting-room of a house in such a manner that the contents of such copy may be clearly and distinctly visible and legible, and shall enter upon the space left for the purpose at the foot of that copy, a scale of the charge per day for board, lodging, and necessaries made in such house, and shall not make a higher charge than is provided by the scale on any pretence whatever.

35. Upon the Council being satisfied that any licensed keeper has been guilty of a breach of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, or the Acts amending the same, or that such keeper has kept, or is keeping, or is allowing to be kept, a house in which drunkenness, gambling, or immoral or fraudulent practices prevail, or is or has been a party to such proceedings, or neglects to remove from such house any person of improper or immoral character who may have entered therein, or has failed, or is failing to comply with these bye-laws or any of them, the Council

may suspend or revoke all licences granted to such keeper.

36. No person shall obstruct any officer or person engaged in securing the execution of these bye-laws.

37. Every person offending against any of the foregoing bye-laws, except where otherwise expressly provided, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds for every such offence, and in the case of a continuing offence to a penalty of five pounds for every day during which the offence may be continued after conviction for the first offence.

38. These bye-laws shall come into force on the first day of August, one thousand nine hundred and two.

The Seal of the Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of the City and County of Kingston-upon-Hull, was hereunto affixed on the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and two.

A Despatch has been received from His Majesty's Ambassador at Tokio enclosing an official translation of the Regulations and Supplementary Rules for the control of residents in Kwantung, issued by the Government of Kwantung.

The translation is as follows:—

REGULATIONS.

ART. 1.—The term "Residents" in the present Regulations signifies persons who visit or reside in Kwantung.

ART. 2.—Any person who establishes his residence in Kwantung shall report the fact, within five days, to the Civil Administration

Office or its Branch Office concerned, stating his name, domicile (or nationality in the case of a foreigner), status, calling, age, and whether he is the head or a member, inmate or employé of a family, as well as the locality of his residence. A similar notice shall be given when any person has changed his residence.

The aforesaid notice shall be made in the case of a member or inmate of a family or household and in the case of an employé by his employer.

ART. 3.—Foreigners (excepting Chinese) shall be permitted until further notice to reside and lease or own real property only within the town limits of Tairen and Port Arthur.

ART. 4.—When a birth or death or change in residence, or other matters relating to family register or in matters whereof notice is required to be made occurs in the family or household of a resident, notice shall be given within five days to the Civil Administration Office or its Branch Office concerned, by the head or a member of such family or household.

ART. 5.—If any resident is deemed likely to injure public tranquility or morals, the Chief of the Civil Administration Office concerned may prohibit his residence within the jurisdiction limits of the Government of Kwantung for a period of more than one year and not exceeding three years.

ART. 6.—Any person who has been prohibited his residence in Kwantung shall leave, within five days, the jurisdiction limits of the Government of Kwantung. If, however, proper reason is found to exist for his inability to leave within the prescribed period, the Chief of the Administration Office concerned may grant him temporary suspension of the prohibition, receiving or not receiving from him a reasonable money security.

ART. 7.—If any person to whom temporary suspension has been granted as in the preceding Article again behaves, within the prescribed period, in such a manner as to fall under Art. 5, the suspension granted shall be cancelled and the security confiscated.

ART. 8.—If any person who has been prohibited his residence in Kwantung, is found to have remarkably ameliorated his conduct, the Chief of the Civil Administration Office concerned may at any time cancel his prohibition.

ART. 9.—If any person who has been prohibited his residence in Kwantung has any objection to the prohibition, he may, within three days from the day on which he was so prohibited, apply to the Governor-General through the Chief of the Civil Administration Office concerned for a countermand of the prohibition.

Even in such case the execution of the order of prohibition shall not be suspended.

ART. 10.—Any person who violates Art. 2 or 4 shall be liable to a fine not exceeding thirty *yen* or to detention or a police fine.

ART. 11.—If any person does not leave within the period prescribed for his leaving or within the term of temporary suspension granted him or returns before the prescribed period of prohibition expires, he shall be liable to imprisonment not exceeding six months or to a fine not exceeding two hundred *yen*.

ART. 12.—Necessary rules besides the provisions of the present Regulations shall be established by the Chief of Civil Administration Office.

SUPPLEMENTARY RULES.

In regard to the residence and travel of Russian subjects, rules hitherto obtained shall remain in force for the time being.

The present Regulations shall take effect from the date of publication.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations have been approved by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz.:—

REGULATIONS respecting Boy Clerks registered for Temporary Employment in Public Departments.

* * Revised Regulations may at any time be issued.

1. Two Registers of Boy Clerks for temporary employment in Public Departments will be kept by the Civil Service Commissioners.*

2. These Registers will contain the names of boys who, being either natural-born or naturalized British subjects, have satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners that they are of good health and character, and that they are duly qualified under the following regulations (3 and 4). One Register will contain the names of boys for service in London, Edinburgh, and provincial towns of England, Scotland and Wales. The other will contain the names of boys for service in Dublin and provincial towns of Ireland.

* Boy Clerks who entered the Service by competitions earlier than May, 1906, will remain registered as heretofore on a single Register for Great Britain and Ireland

3. *The limits of age are 15 to 17. If an Examination begins in one of the first four months of any year candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of January in that year. If an Examination begins in one of the second four months of any year candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of May in that year. If an Examination begins in one of the last four months of any year candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of September in that year.*

4. The subjects for examination are:—

1. Handwriting and Orthography.
2. Arithmetic, including Vulgar and Decimal Fractions.
3. English Composition.
4. Copying Manuscript.

And any two of the following:—

5. Geography.
6. English History.
7. Translation from Latin.
8. Translation from French.
9. Translation from German.
10. Mathematics, the subject matter of Books I and II of Euclid's Geometry; and Algebra up to, and including, Simple Equations.
11. The rudiments of Chemistry and Physics.

No subjects are obligatory, but no Candidate will be regarded as qualified who fails to obtain such an aggregate number of marks as may indicate in the judgment of the Civil Service Commissioners a competent amount of general proficiency.

5. Open Competitive Examinations for the purpose of testing the qualifications of Candidates in the above-mentioned subjects will be held by the Civil Service Commissioners from time to time as may be necessary, and a certain number, regulated by the probable demand from the Public Departments, of those who show sufficient proficiency will be placed upon the Registers kept by the Commissioners, and will be available for employment as their services are required. The competitions for the Irish service will, as a rule, be held at the same time as the competitions for service in Great Britain, and the list of successful candidates for Ireland will be separate from that of the successful candidates for service in Great Britain. Candidates can enter for both competitions, when they are held simultaneously, paying only one fee. If successful in both they will be entered on the Register for Great Britain only, or on that for Ireland only, or on both Registers according to their choice.

6. The fee payable for attending the Open Competitive Examinations will be 5s.

7. Boy Clerks placed on these Registers will be summoned for employment in any of the Public Departments as they are wanted. When not wanted, they will have no claim to employment. Refusing to serve when called upon, except for reasons satisfactory to the Civil

Service Commissioners, they will be removed from the Registers. The order in which they may be employed, the Departments to which they may be assigned, and their retention generally on the Registers, will be determined by the Civil Service Commissioners; but they will be subject to the orders of the Departments in which they are serving during the time of their actual employment, and will be liable to dismissal from them by the authorities thereof, without notice, for inefficiency or misconduct.

Boy Clerks resigning, or procuring their own discharges from Departments, except for sufficient reasons proved to the satisfaction of the Civil Service Commissioners, will be removed from the Registers.

Their assignment for service will, as a general rule, be according to their order of merit in the examination; but exceptions to this general rule may be made when the engagement offered is very short or for other sufficient reasons.

8*. These Boy Clerks will usually be engaged and paid by the week of 39 hours, viz.:—7 hours a day on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays, and 4 hours on Saturdays; and they will be paid 15s. per week during the first year of their service. After a year of approved service, an increase of pay to 16s. a week may be allowed; after a second year, an increase of pay to 17s. a week; after a third year, an increase to 18s.; after a fourth year, an increase to 19s.

In any case of absence without pay a Boy Clerk's increment shall be postponed one day for every day of such absence—absence without pay equally with the interval between two successive engagements not being reckoned as service for any purpose contemplated by the Regulations.

Boy Clerks may also be engaged and paid by the hour at the rate of 4½d. per hour during their first year of service; at the rate of 5d. per hour during the second; 5½d. during the third year of service; and afterwards at the rate of 6d. per hour. Any who may be engaged by the week and who may be required to attend for more than 7½ hours on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, or Friday, or more than 4½ hours on Saturday, will be paid at the hourly rate for such overtime attendance. But in no case must overtime attendance exceed 12 hours in any one week. They may also be paid by the piece at such rates as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners, with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury.

9. No service, however much it may happen to be prolonged, will confer any claim to superannuation or compensation allowance; and Boy Clerks will not be retained, as such, after they shall have reached the age of 20.

10. If a public holiday, on which the office is closed, fall within the period of a Boy Clerk's engagement, he may be paid in respect of it as for a working day. Boy Clerks may, with the consent of the Department in which they are serving, or if not at the time serving, with the consent of the Civil Service Commissioners, be allowed holidays, with pay at the rate for the official day in the proportion of one day for every 24 full days of actual

* Clause 8 applies to all Boy Clerks registered on the result of competitions held later than 1st April, 1902.

and approved service previously rendered by them as Boy Clerks. But no Boy Clerk shall be allowed to take more than 12 days' leave under these conditions, between the 1st day of January and the 31st day of December, both days inclusive, in any one year, and in calculating the leave to be allowed in any given year, no service rendered before the 1st day of January of the preceding year shall be counted.

Holiday pay can only be allowed for holidays actually taken, not for days on which the Boy Clerk is drawing pay in respect of employment in any capacity in the Public Service.

11. Boy Clerks who may fall ill while serving in any Department, and whose illness may be attested by medical certificate to the satisfaction of the authorities of such Department, may be allowed sick-leave, receiving three-fourths of the rate of pay for the official day; provided that no Boy Clerk shall be paid for holidays and sick-leave, taken together, for more than 28 days within any one year, exclusive of public holidays.

12. Except in conformity with Regulations 10, 11, 15, and 16, Boy Clerks will only receive pay for the hours, or parts of hours, during which they actually attend.

13. No person who has been trained, either wholly or partially, at the public expense, for the occupation of a teacher in schools in connection with the Board of Education in England, the Committee of Council on Education for Scotland, or the Commissioners of National Education, Ireland, is eligible for employment as a Boy Clerk until the consent of those Departments, given in conformity with rules sanctioned by the Lords of the Treasury, has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

14. Boy Clerks are not intended to travel during an engagement, nor will they, as a rule, be required to accept engagements at a distance from their residence; but any Boy Clerk who may be ordered to travel will be allowed such reasonable and customary expenses as the Lords of the Treasury may in each case approve.

15. If any case of infectious disease should occur in the house where a Boy Clerk is living, he must immediately report the fact to the Officer under whom he is employed, and must, if required, at once discontinue his attendance. In cases of such enforced absence from his employment, it is in the discretion of the Head of the Department in which he has been serving to allow the Boy Clerk full pay at the usual rate for the period for which it is medically certified that his attendance at the office would be likely to be dangerous to his colleagues.

16. In any year in which an open Competition for situations as Assistant Clerk (Abstractor Class) in the Civil Service or for Clerkships of the Second Division is held, a Boy Clerk who obtains from the Head of the Department in which he is serving leave of absence to attend such Examination may also, at the discretion of the Head of the Department, be allowed pay, at the usual rate, for the days during which he is attending the Examination.

17. Service Marks for each full period of three calendar months of actual approved service,

subject to a maximum of twelve such periods, will be allowed to Candidates attending Examinations for the following situations, viz.:—

Clerkships in the Second Division of the Civil Service,

Second Class Clerkships (Lower Section) for Post Service in the Department of His Majesty's Customs,

18. EAST SUFFOLK (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1906 (No. 5).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894

to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

Application of Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902, with modifications, to certain Scheduled Districts.

1. The provisions of the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902 shall apply to the Districts specified in the First Schedule hereto, (in this Order referred to as Scheduled Districts), as if they had been declared by Special Order of the Board to be a Swine-Fever Infected Area, but subject to the modifications hereinafter contained.

Markets Fairs Sales and Exhibitions of Swine by Licence of Local Authority.

2.—(1.) The Local Authority may grant a Licence for a market fair sale or exhibition of swine in a Scheduled District, if they are satisfied that the market fair sale or exhibition is to be held in a market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition which is capable of being thoroughly cleansed and disinfected, and thereupon the market fair sale or exhibition may be held accordingly: Provided that unless and until the Board otherwise order, no such Licence shall be granted by the Local Authority for the holding of a market fair sale or exhibition of swine within the parishes of Stowmarket, Stowupland, Earl Stonham, Little Stonham, Mickfield, Stonham Aspell, Creeting St. Mary, Creeting St. Peter, Badley, Battisford, Barkingcum-Darmsden with Needham Market, Ringshall, Combs, Great Finborough, and Little Finborough, in the administrative county of East Suffolk.

(2.) A Licence for a market fair sale or exhibition under this Article shall be signed by the Clerk of the Local Authority, by special direction of the Local Authority, and shall specify the name and address of the person licensed to hold the market fair sale or exhibition (as owner of a market, or as an auctioneer, or otherwise), and shall also specify the place where the market fair sale or exhibition is to be held, and may authorise the holding of periodical markets fairs sales or exhibitions on stated days for a time limited, not exceeding three months, but the Licence may be renewed from time to time or revoked at any time by the Local Authority.

(3.) A Licence shall be published in such manner as the Local Authority consider best fitted to ensure publicity for the same, and a copy of the Licence shall be posted and kept posted during the holding of such market fair sale or exhibition by the person licensed to hold or holding the same at or near the gate or other entrance of the market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition where such market fair sale or exhibition is held.

(4.) The Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board a copy of every Licence granted by them for the holding of a market fair sale or exhibition under this Article.

(5.) A fit person or a sufficient number of fit persons shall be appointed by the Local Authority

and named in the Licence for the purpose of receiving Licences authorising movement of swine to the market fair sale or exhibition, and for granting Licences for movement of swine therefrom in accordance with the provisions of this Order.

(6.) No swine shall be moved along, over, or across a highway or thoroughfare into a market fair sale or exhibition licensed under this Article unless accompanied by a Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902 or this Order.

Licences for Movement out of Licensed Markets, &c.

3.—(1.) Swine exposed at a market fair sale or exhibition licensed under this Order may be moved from the market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition along over or across a highway or thoroughfare in a Swine-Fever Infected Area or a Scheduled District if accompanied by a Licence authorising such movement—in the Form set forth in the Schedule to the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902 or to the like effect—granted by the Local Authority of the District in which the market fair sale or exhibition is held.

(2.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than four days inclusive of the day of issue.

(3.) The swine shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay, and where the place of destination specified in the Licence is in a Swine-Fever Infected Area, or a Scheduled District, the swine shall be moved to such place and not elsewhere.

Licences after Completion of Movement.

4.—(1.) Where swine are moved with a Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902, or this Order, to a market fair sale or exhibition in a Swine-Fever Infected Area or a Scheduled District, the Licence shall be delivered up at the entrance to the market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition by the person in charge of the swine to the person appointed under this Order to receive the same.

(2.) Where swine are moved with a Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902, or this Order, to any other premises in a Swine-Fever Infected Area or a Scheduled District, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station by the person in charge of the swine at the time of completing the said movement.

Attendance at Markets, &c.

5. A Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority shall attend at every market fair sale or exhibition licensed under this Order.

Revocation by Board of Licences.

6. If the Board are of opinion, with respect to any Licence for a market fair sale or exhibition under this Order, that the holding of such market fair sale or exhibition thereby licensed is inexpedient, or that the Licence is objectionable in any particular, and direct the revocation thereof the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

7.—(1.) Any person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, authorising the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

8. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Forms.

9. For the purposes of any Movement Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902 or this Order, the Scheduled Districts shall be deemed to be a Swine Fever Infected Area.

Offences.

10.—(1.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, or of the conditions of a Movement Licence thereunder, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any person fails to deliver up or send a Licence, as required by this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

11. In this Order—

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries:

“Swine-Fever Infected Area” means an area declared by Special Order of the Board to be a Swine-Fever Infected Area:

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Revocation.

12. The Order described in the Second Schedule hereto is hereby revoked as from the date of the commencement of this Order.

Commencement.

13. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-seventh day of October, nineteen hundred and six.

Short Title.

14. This Order may be cited as the EAST SUFFOLK (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1906 (No. 5).

BYE-LAWS and REGULATIONS made by the PORTSMOUTH STREET TRAMWAYS COMPANY in respect of the GOSPORT and FAREHAM TRAMWAYS, under the powers conferred on the Company by the Tramways Act, 1870.

1. The Bye-laws or Regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Company, and to all tramways worked by the Company, and to all places with respect to which the Company have power to make Bye-laws or Regulations.

2. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindermost or conductor's platform, and not otherwise.

3. No passenger shall smoke inside any carriage.

4. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any carriage, play, or perform upon any musical instrument.

5. A person in a state of intoxication shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

6. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

7. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, in or on the carriage, or break or scratch any window of or otherwise wilfully damage any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to the penalty

prescribed by these Bye-laws or Regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

8. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in the interior of any carriage, and may be prevented from entering the interior of any carriage, and shall not enter the interior of any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and, if found in the interior of any carriage, shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the interior of the carriage upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

9. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor or other duly authorised officer of the Company the fare legally demandable for the journey, and accept a ticket corresponding thereto, or if the car is provided with a money-box for the receipt of fares, each passenger shall, immediately on entering the car, deposit in the money-box the fare legally payable for the journey.

10. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any) when required so to do to the conductor or any duly authorised servant of the Company, and shall also when required so to do by the conductor or any duly authorised servant of the Company, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

11. A passenger not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of the statutory provisions relating to the Company, shall not use or attempt to use any ticket intended only for such artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

12. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any carriage.

13. No passenger or other person not being a servant of the Company shall be permitted to travel on the steps or platforms of any carriage, or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any carriage, and any person so travelling, standing, or sitting shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.

14. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount upon any carriage, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage, or travel therein otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers.

15. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is licensed to contain, no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or upon any such carriage when warned by the conductor not to do so.

16. When a carriage contains the full licensed number of passengers, a notice to that effect shall be placed in conspicuous letters and in a conspicuous position on the carriage.

17. The conductor shall not permit any passenger beyond the licensed number to enter or mount or remain in or upon any part of a carriage.

18. No person shall enter, or mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave, any carriage whilst in motion.

19. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or upon any carriage, except by permission of the conductor, nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or an annoyance to passengers. No person shall take a dog or other animal into any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor. Any dog or other animal taken into or upon any carriage in breach of this Regulation shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the carriage immediately upon request by the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request, may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor, or other duly authorised servant of the Company.

20. No person shall travel in or on any carriage of the Company with loaded fire-arms.

21. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Company in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Company.

22. The conductor of each carriage shall enforce or prevent the breach of these Bye-laws or Regulations to the best of his ability.

23. No person shall spit in or upon any carriage used on any tramway worked by the Company.

24. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws or Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

25. The expression "conductor" shall include any officer or servant in the employment of the Company and having charge of a carriage.

26. There shall be placed and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each carriage in use a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations.

27. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the first day of December, 1906.
