IN pursuance of the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Most Honourable Privy Council, to order as follows:—

1. The Northern and Salford Divisions (as defined by the Order in Council of the 4th day of May, 1864) of the County of Lancaster shall, for the purpose of the next Spring Assizes, be united together under the name of the Spring Assize County, No. 2.
2. The said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be held at Manchester.
3. The Court at the said Spring Assizes at Manchester shall have jurisdiction to try any prisoner committed in the said Spring Assize County who may be brought before it, and shall have the same powers with respect to the trial of and passing sentence upon such prisoner as a Court of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery would have had at the Assizes in the county where, but for the said Spring Assizes Act, 1879, such prisoner would have been tried.

The provisions of section thirteen of the Sheriffs Act, 1887, shall apply to the execution of any capital sentence passed at such Assizes as herein mentioned; provided that the expression in the said section "the Sheriff of such County" shall mean the Sheriff of the County in which the prisoner so sentenced would have been tried if the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, had not been passed.

4. The Sheriff of the County of Lancaster shall act for the purpose of the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.
5. The precepts of the judges to the said sheriff shall direct him to summon the grand jurors and petty jurors from the County of Lancaster.
6. The gaol delivery precept of the judges to the said sheriff shall direct him to cause the prisoners from all the prisons in the said Spring Assize County who under the provisions of this Order will have to be tried at Manchester, to be brought there, and the sheriff shall cause such prisoners to be brought accordingly without any writ of habeas corpus.

7. All justices of the peace, mayors, coroners, escheators, stewards, bailiffs, gaolers, constables, officers, and persons having authority, and being under an obligation to attend the Assizes for either division comprised in the said Spring Assize County, or to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper officer thereof, any indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document, shall have the same authority and be under the same obligation to attend at the said Spring Assizes held for the said Spring Assize County, and to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper officer thereof, such indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document.

8. In all indictments and presentments at the said Spring Assizes the venue laid in the margin thereof shall, in addition to the name

of the county where the offence is charged to have been committed, contain the words "Spring Assize County, No. 2."

9. Any person who, after the date of this Order and before the said Spring Assizes, enters into a recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer before a Court of Oyer and Terminer or General Gaol Delivery, to be holden for either of the divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County, shall be bound to attend at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.

10. In all cases in which the like recognizances have been entered into in respect of any offence committed in either of the divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County prior to the making of this Order, such recognizances shall be deemed to have been entered into for attendance at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and every person bound by such recognizance shall be bound to appear at such last-mentioned Spring Assizes or forfeit his recognizance.

11. Ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the Commission at Manchester, a list of the prisoners to be removed for trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, so far as the same list can then be made out, shall, together with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, be transmitted by the gaoler of each prison in which such prisoners may be, to the Sheriff of the County of Lancaster, and the said sheriff shall cause to be inserted in one or more newspapers in the Spring Assize County the said list and statement, and a notice that the persons bound by recognizances to appear and prosecute or give evidence for or against the prisoners so removed shall appear and prosecute and give evidence at Manchester.

12. It shall be lawful for the gaoler of the gaol in which prisoners who are to take their trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be in custody, three days before the day upon which the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County are appointed to be held, to send, without any writ of habeas corpus, such prisoners to His Majesty's Gaol at Strangeways, Manchester, in the County of Lancaster, for the purposes of their trial, and to take all proper steps for their transmission to the said gaol, and their maintenance by the way, and the gaoler of the said gaol shall receive such prisoners into his charge and custody on their arrival, and shall keep and maintain them in the said gaol until they are either ordered to be discharged or remanded by proper authority, or until they shall have been tried and sentenced, and proper arrangements have been made for their being sent back to the prison from which they were sent for trial, or sent to any other prison which has been duly appointed as an alternative for such prison. If, however, the said gaol has itself been duly appointed as an alternative prison for the prison from which such prisoners were sent to trial, the governor of the said gaol shall, subject to the orders of the Secretary of State, keep and maintain in the said gaol such prisoners after sentence, until they are discharged in due course of law.

13. The Clerk of Assize at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall have all powers of taxation of bills of costs, expenses of prosecution and witnesses, and all other powers necessary for checking and paying

such costs relating to the trial of prisoners that the clerk of assize in the county where such prisoners were committed would have had if such prisoner had been tried at the Assizes held in such last-mentioned county.

Where any person is committed for trial, or is bound by any recognizance to appear and answer, in the said Spring Assize County, any Judge of the High Court of Justice, or the committing justice or justices, or any two of the justices of the county or place from which he is committed or admitted to bail, may, upon the application of such person, direct the treasurer of the county or place where such person was committed, or entered into any recognizance to appear and answer as aforesaid, to advance to such person a sum not exceeding 20*l.* to enable him to defray the travelling expenses of such of his witnesses as may have been bound by recognizances to appear on his behalf, and the treasurer shall advance such sum, and shall deduct it out of the amount ultimately allowed in respect of such witnesses.

14. In any case where money is ordered by the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County to be paid in respect of costs and expenses of prosecutors and witnesses, the same shall be paid by the treasurer of the county or place by whom the same would have been payable had a like order been made by a Court of Oyer and Terminer or Gaol Delivery in the county where the trial would have taken place but for the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, and this Order; and every such treasurer, or some known agent on his behalf, shall attend the said Spring Assizes during the sitting of the Court to pay all such orders.

15. Where the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County remand a prisoner or adjourn any trial, or otherwise make an order respecting a prisoner committed for trial but not acquitted or convicted, the Court may take such order with respect to the removal of such prisoner to a prison in the county or place in which he was committed for trial as to the Court seems just, and the prisoner may be removed accordingly, without any writ of habeas corpus.

16. Except where the context otherwise requires, terms used in this Order shall have the same meaning as that which the same terms have in the Spring Assizes Act, 1879.

17. This Order, unless earlier revoked, shall be in force during the continuance of the Spring Assizes, 1911.

IN pursuance of the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Most Honourable Privy Council, to order as follows:—

1. The North and East Riding Division and the West Riding Division (as defined by the Order in Council of the 10th day of June, 1864) of the County of York and the County of the City of York shall, for the purpose of the next Spring Assizes, be united together

under the name of the Spring Assize County, No. 3.

2. The said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be held at Leeds.

3. The Court at the said Spring Assizes at Leeds shall have jurisdiction to try any prisoner committed in the said Spring Assize County who may be brought before it, and shall have the same powers with respect to the trial of and passing sentence upon such prisoner as a Court of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery would have had at the assizes in the county where, but for the said Spring Assizes Act, 1879, such prisoner would have been tried.

The provisions of section thirteen of the Sheriffs Act, 1887, shall apply to the execution of any capital sentence passed at such Assizes as herein mentioned; provided that the expression in the said section "the Sheriff of such County" shall mean the sheriff of the county in which the prisoner so sentenced would have been tried if the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, had not been passed.

4. The Sheriff of the County of York shall alone act for the purpose of the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and subject to the provisions of this Order shall have jurisdiction for that purpose over the whole district constituting the said Spring Assize County, and precepts and other documents relating to the said Spring Assizes shall be addressed to him alone.

5. The gaol delivery precept of the judges to the said sheriff shall direct him to summon the grand jurors and petty jurors from the County of York; and the jurors so summoned shall be deemed to be good and lawful men of the body of the several counties constituting the said Spring Assize County, and the grand and petty jury formed out of those jurors shall be deemed to be a grand and petty jury respectively of the body of the said counties respectively, and shall have jurisdiction accordingly.

6. The precepts of the judges to the said sheriff shall direct him to cause the prisoners from all the prisons in the said Spring Assize County who under the provisions of this Order will have to be tried at Leeds, to be brought there, and the Sheriff shall cause such prisoners to be brought accordingly without any writ of habeas corpus.

7. In all matters not before specifically mentioned the precepts to the said sheriff shall direct him to issue, and he shall issue the like notices, precepts, warrants, and documents, and perform the same acts (*mutatis mutandis*) as if he were sheriff for the whole of the said Spring Assize County, and all under sheriffs, bailiffs, constables, and officers in the said Spring Assize County shall obey accordingly.

8. The said sheriff shall, as to all matters in relation to such Spring Assizes for which no specific provision is made by this Order, have the same power, jurisdiction, and responsibility as if he were sheriff for the whole of the said Spring Assize County, except that this provision shall not authorize the said sheriff to carry sentences into execution outside the County of York, or to levy outside the said county fines imposed or recognizances estreated at the said Spring Assizes.

9. All justices of the peace, mayors, coroners, escheators, stewards, bailiffs, gaolers, constables, officers, and persons having authority, and being under an obligation to

attend the Assizes for either of the counties comprised in the said Spring Assize County, or to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper officer thereof, any indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document, shall have the same authority and be under the same obligation to attend at the said Spring Assizes held for the said Spring Assize County, and to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper officer thereof, such indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document. This provision shall not apply to the Sheriff of the County of the City of York.

10. In all indictments and presentments at the said Spring Assizes the venue laid in the margin thereof shall, in addition to the name of the county where the offence is charged to have been committed, contain the words "Spring Assize County, No. 3."

11. Any person who, after the date of this Order and before the said Spring Assizes, enters into a recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer before a Court of Oyer and Terminer or General Gaol Delivery, to be holden for any of the counties constituting the said Spring Assize County, shall be bound to attend at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.

12. In all cases in which the like recognizances have been entered into in respect of any offence committed in any of the counties constituting the said Spring Assize County prior to the making of this Order, such recognizances shall be deemed to have been entered into for attendance at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and every person bound by such recognizance shall be bound to appear at such last-mentioned Spring Assizes or forfeit his recognizances.

13. Ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the Commission at Leeds, a list of the prisoners to be removed for trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, so far as the same list can then be made out, shall, together with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, be transmitted by the gaoler of each prison in which such prisoners may be, to the Sheriff of the County of York, and the said sheriff shall cause to be inserted in one or more newspapers in the Spring Assize County the said list and statement, and a notice that the persons bound by recognizances to appear and prosecute or give evidence for or against the prisoners so removed shall appear and prosecute and give evidence at Leeds.

14. It shall be lawful for the gaoler of the gaol in which prisoners who are to take their trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be in custody, three days before the day upon which the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County are appointed to be held, to send, without any writ of habeas corpus, such prisoners to His Majesty's gaol at Leeds for the purposes of their trial, and to take all proper steps for their transmission to the said gaol, and their maintenance by the way, and the gaoler of the said gaol shall receive such prisoners into his charge and custody on their arrival, and shall keep and maintain them in the said gaol until they are either ordered to be discharged or remanded by proper authority, or until they shall have been tried and sentenced, and proper arrange-

ments have been made for their being sent back to the prison from which they were sent for trial, or sent to any other prison which has been duly appointed as an alternative for such prison. If, however, the said gaol has itself been duly appointed as an alternative prison for the prison from which such prisoners were sent to trial, the Governor of the said gaol shall, subject to the orders of the Secretary of State, keep and maintain in the said gaol such prisoners after sentence, until they are discharged in due course of law.

15. The Clerk of Assize at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall have all powers of taxation of bills of costs, expenses of prosecution and witnesses, and all other powers necessary for checking and paying such costs relating to the trial of prisoners that the Clerk of Assize in the county where such prisoners were committed would have had if such prisoner had been tried at the Assizes held in such last-mentioned county.

Where any person is committed for trial, or is bound by any recognizance to appear and answer, in the said Spring Assize County, any judge of the High Court of Justice, or the committing justice or justices, or any two of the justices of the county or place from which he is committed or admitted to bail, may, upon the application of such person, direct the treasurer of the county or place where such person was committed, or entered into any recognizance to appear and answer as aforesaid, to advance to such person a sum not exceeding 20*l.* to enable him to defray the travelling expenses of such of his witnesses as may have been bound by recognizances to appear on his behalf, and the treasurer shall advance such sum, and shall deduct it out of the amount ultimately allowed in respect of such witnesses.

16. In any case where money is ordered by the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County to be paid in respect of costs and expenses of prosecutors and witnesses, the same shall be paid by the treasurer of the county or place by whom the same would have been payable had a like order been made by a Court of Oyer and Terminer or Gaol Delivery in the county where the trial would have taken place but for the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, and this Order; and every such treasurer, or some known agent on his behalf, shall attend the said Spring Assizes during the sitting of the court to pay all such orders.

17. Where the court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County remand a prisoner or adjourn any trial, or otherwise make an order respecting a prisoner committed for trial but not acquitted or convicted, the court may make such order with respect to the removal of such prisoner to a prison in the county or place in which he was committed for trial as to the court seems just, and the prisoner may be removed accordingly, without any writ of habeas corpus.

WHEREAS by an Order made by the late King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council, on the 19th March, 1908, His Majesty was pleased to order (amongst other things) that, where any property belonging to or held for the benefit of a unit of Volunteers or Yeomanry, mentioned in the first column of the schedule to that Order, was vested in or held by any trustees other than the Commanding Officer of such unit, those trustees should, until otherwise directed by Order in Council under section 29 of the Territorial and Reserve Forces Act, 1907, be appointed in regard to the property so vested in or held by them to be special trustees, to the exclusion of the Association, and should continue to hold such property in trust for the corresponding unit of the Territorial Force in like manner in all respects as they previously held it for the unit of the Volunteers or Yeomanry, and that the corresponding unit should, notwithstanding any trust, limitation, or condition affecting any such property, continue entitled to the benefit thereof in like manner as the unit was entitled thereto before it became a unit of the Territorial Force.

And whereas by virtue of the above recited provisions of the said Order in Council the trustees named in the first column of the schedule to this Order hold the property described and set opposite to their names in the second column of that schedule in trust for the unit of the Territorial Force mentioned in the third column of that schedule for the purposes and subject to the limitations mentioned in the deed (if any) referred to in the fourth column of that schedule, and it is expedient that such property should be transferred from those trustees to the County Association mentioned in the fifth column of that schedule.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that as from the date of this Order the said property shall in each case be by virtue of this Order transferred from the said trustees to and vested in the said County Association, subject to any charges thereon and to any liabilities in or towards the discharge of which the said property is properly applicable, and shall be held by that Association in like manner in all respects as it was held by the said trustees for the benefit of the said unit of the Territorial Force or for such other purposes as the Association, with the consent of the said unit (to be ascertained in manner prescribed by regulations of the Army Council), shall direct, but so that the interest of any beneficiary other than the said unit or the unit of the Volunteers or Yeomanry with which it corresponds shall not without the consent of such beneficiary be affected.

WHEREAS the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish of Broughton, in the county of Denbigh; and of the parish of Cottenham, in the county of Cambridge, ten days' previous notice of their intention in that behalf, have, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, made representations to His Majesty in Council, stating that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in the civil parishes of Broughton and Cottenham aforesaid, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein, as follows, viz.:—

BROUGHTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Methodist Chapel, Pentre Broughton, in the county of Denbigh; and in the burial ground attached thereto, with the following exceptions, that is to say:—

(a) In the walled graves now existing in the said burial ground in which the remains of William Williams and John Williams are interred burial may be allowed, at their decease, of the bodies of Maria Williams, and Hannah Williams, subject, in each case, to the condition that every coffin buried in such grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and that the grave is not situate within fifteen feet of any dwelling house.

(b) In earthen graves now existing in the said burial ground the burial may be allowed of the bodies of the undermentioned persons at their decease, viz.: Susan Edwards, Harriet Edwards, Anne Griffiths, Jane Griffiths, Mary Parry (formerly Griffiths), Emma Jones, Mary Elizabeth Morris (formerly Rogers), and David Morris; subject in each case to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than four feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave and that the grave is not situate within fifteen feet of any dwelling house.

COTTENHAM.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of All Saints, in the parish of Cottenham, in the county of Cambridge; and in the churchyard as it existed on the 9th day of February, 1911, with the following exceptions, that is to say:—

In the said churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom, or of any member of a family for which, such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

The following Statutes made by the Governing Body of Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge, have been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

STATUTES to amend certain of the existing Statutes of Gonville and Caius College in the University of Cambridge under the fifty-

fourth section of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877.

Whereas Gonville and Caius College in the University of Cambridge is now governed by a body of Statutes made under the authority of "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877" and approved by His late Majesty the King in Council on the sixteenth day of May one thousand nine hundred and four:

And whereas it is expedient to amend certain of the said Statutes:

Now we the Master and Fellows of the said College being the Governing Body within the meaning of the said Act being assembled at a meeting of the Master and Fellows of the said College specially summoned for this purpose on the tenth day of February one thousand nine hundred and eleven do hereby in exercise of the powers given to us by the fifty-fourth section of the said Act amend the said Statutes by the amending Statutes following, which have been passed at such meeting by the votes of more than two-thirds of the persons present and voting and are now submitted for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council.

STATUTE 3. *The Governing Body.*

By repealing section (6) of Statute 3 and substituting the following section to form an amended section (6) of the same Statute.

(6) At the first General Meeting in each year after the fifth day of October the Rota for membership of the Governing Body by seniority shall be settled and shall remain in force until the corresponding General Meeting in the following year. For the purpose of the foregoing provisions the names of the following persons and no others shall be placed upon the Rota:

(a.) Every Fellow (subject as hereinafter provided) who shall be resident for the time being within one mile and a half as the crow flies from Great St. Mary's Church temporary absence excepted and shall have been actually resident within the same limits for eighteen weeks at the least during the year ending on the last preceding thirtieth day of September:

(b.) Every Fellow (subject also as hereinafter provided) who shall for the time being be in the actual discharge of his duties as a Professor or Reader in the University provided that he shall be required by the University to reside under the provisions of Chapter XI of Statute B of the University Statutes and shall have so resided during the preceding two terms:

(c.) Every Fellow (subject also as hereinafter provided) who shall for the time being be in the actual discharge of his duties as Tutor Assistant Tutor Lecturer Bursar or Dean of the College and shall have been so throughout the two last preceding terms:

Provided that (1) on the aforesaid thirtieth day of September his age shall not have exceeded seventy years (2) the name of no Fellow who has been qualified to attend all the ordinary meetings of the Governing Body in the year ending on the thirtieth day of September shall be placed upon the Rota for the following year unless he shall have attended at least two-thirds of the ordinary meetings held during the year and the name of any Fellow omitted under this provision shall not

at any time be replaced except by a vote of the General Meeting but these provisos shall not apply to Fellows elected before the ninth day of October eighteen hundred and ninety.

In each academical year on or before the fifth day of October the Registry shall prepare and send to the Master and each of the Fellows a draft copy of the Rota.

STATUTE 10. *Election of Fellows.*

By repealing sections (8) and (13) of Statute 10 and substituting therefor the following sections to form respectively amended sections (8) and (13) of the same Statute.

(8) A Corporate Fellow shall not be transferred to a Drosier Fellowship but a Drosier Fellow may by College Order be transferred to a Corporate Fellowship and the tenure of his Corporate Fellowship shall be the same as if he had been elected a Corporate Fellow on the date on which he was elected a Drosier Fellow. Any Drosier Fellow who shall hold any one of the offices enumerated in Statute 11 section (3) shall become a Corporate Fellow upon the first occurrence of a vacancy in the list of Corporate Fellows. If there be more than one such Drosier Fellow they shall become Corporate Fellows as vacancies occur in order of seniority. These provisions shall not apply to Drosier Fellows elected before the year eighteen hundred and ninety-four.

(13) The Governing Body shall have power on electing a Fellow or at any time within one year after his election or on granting permission to a Drosier Fellow to retain his Fellowship under the Provisions of Statute 11 section (1) B or at any time within one year after granting such permission to attach any special condition to the tenure of his Fellowship which may seem to them desirable. On any breach of a condition so attached the Fellowship shall become vacant if and when it shall be so declared by a special vote of the Governing Body.

STATUTE 11. *Tenure of Fellowships.*

By repealing sections (1) and (2) and (3) and (6) of Statute 11 and substituting therefor the following sections to form respectively amended sections (1) and (2) and (3) and (6) of the same Statute.

(1) A. Except as provided by sections (2), (3) and (6) of this Statute, every Corporate Fellow shall vacate his Fellowship at the expiration of six years less fifteen days from the date of his election. Except as provided by sections (1) B, (2) and (3) of this Statute every Drosier Fellow, elected after the year nineteen hundred and ten, shall vacate his Fellowship at the expiration of three years less fifteen days from the date of his election.

(1) B. The Governing Body may by a vote sufficient to carry a College Order passed within six calendar months before the expiration of the first tenure of his Fellowship by a Drosier Fellow elected after the year nineteen hundred and ten permit him to retain his Fellowship for a further period of three years, and if the Governing Body exercise this power the Fellow shall except as provided by sections (2), (3) and (6) of this Statute, vacate his Fellowship at the end of the said period of three years.

(1) C. If any Fellow vacate his Fellowship at the end of an integral number of years less fifteen days from the date of his election he shall be entitled to receive the dividends of his Fellowship and his allowances as if he had vacated his Fellowship at the end of the said fifteen days.

(1) D. No ex-Fellow shall be re-elected to a Fellowship except under the provisions of Statute 10 section (7) or section (10) or under the provisions of section (4) or section (6) of this Statute.

(2) Any Fellow who at the expiration of any period during which he may under the provisions of this Statute retain his Fellowship shall be actually holding the office of Reader or Lecturer in the University may unless otherwise disqualified by these Statutes and subject as hereinafter provided be allowed by a special vote of the Governing Body passed within six calendar months before the expiration of such period to retain his Fellowship for a further period of six years, provided that if during such further period of six years he shall cease to hold such office he shall vacate his Fellowship at the expiration of three calendar months from the day of his ceasing to hold the said office unless before the expiration of such three months he be appointed to a Readership or Lectureship in the University in which case unless otherwise disqualified by these Statutes and subject as hereinafter provided he shall be allowed to retain his Fellowship until the expiration of the said period of six years or until his ceasing to hold such office whichever shall first happen but the powers of the Governing Body under this section shall not be exercised at a time when the number of Fellows who do not hold their Fellowships under section (3) or section (5) of this Statute or under this section is less than six except in favour of a Fellow elected under Statute 10 section (10) or one whose tenure has already been extended under the powers of this section.

(3) Any Fellow who at the time when under the provisions of either of the preceding sections of this Statute he would but for the provisions of this section vacate his Fellowship shall be actually holding the office of Professor Public Orator or Librarian in the University or the Office of Tutor Assistant Tutor Lecturer Senior Bursar or Senior Dean or if in a particular case or cases the Governing Body by a special vote shall so determine the office of Junior Bursar or Junior Dean in the College shall unless otherwise disqualified by these Statutes and subject as hereinafter provided be at liberty to retain his Fellowship so long as he shall hold any such office but the number of College offices entitling to prolongation of Fellowship under this section shall not be increased or diminished except by a special vote of the Governing Body and the number of such College offices shall not be increased at a time when the number of Fellows who do not hold their Fellowships under section (2) or section (5) of this Statute or under this section is less than six unless and until such special vote is confirmed by a vote of a General Meeting of the Master and all the Fellows in which not less than two-thirds of those present such two-thirds being a majority of the Master and all the Fellows shall concur.

6. A. Any Corporate Fellow, or any Drosier Fellow elected before the year nineteen hundred and eleven or any Drosier Fellow who has been permitted to retain his Fellowship under section (1) B of this Statute may be permitted by a resolution stating the grounds for such permission passed at any General Meeting of the Master and Fellows by a vote in which not less than two-thirds of those present such two-thirds being a majority of the Master and all the Fellows shall concur

to retain his Fellowship for a period named in such resolution (subject as hereinafter provided) on account of his literary or scientific labours, but the number of Fellowships which may be held at one time by virtue of this provision shall be limited by the provision contained in section (6) B of this Statute. The General Meeting shall have power on so allowing a Fellowship to be retained to attach any special condition to the tenure of the Fellowship which may seem to them desirable in the interests of the College. On any breach of a condition so attached the Fellowship shall be declared vacant by the Governing Body and shall thereupon become vacant.

(6) B. Any ex-Fellow may be re-elected to a Fellowship on the ground of his eminence for science learning or art by a resolution stating the grounds for such re-election passed at any General Meeting of the Master and Fellows by a vote in which not less than two-thirds of those present, such two-thirds being a majority of the Master and all the Fellows, shall concur, the renewed Fellowship to be held for a period named in such resolution subject as hereinafter provided but the number of Fellowships that may be held by virtue of this provision and the provision contained in section (6) A respectively shall taken together never at any one time exceed four.

The General Meeting shall have power on so re-electing to a Fellowship to attach any special condition to the tenure of the Fellowship which may seem to them desirable in the interests of the College. On any breach of a condition so attached the Fellowship shall be declared vacant by the Governing Body and shall thereupon become vacant.

If any person re-elected to a Fellowship under this Section shall at the time of such re-election be the Head or a Fellow of any University or of any College and in receipt of a stipend as such, he shall forthwith after his re-election resign such Headship or Fellowship; and if he do not resign the same within one calendar month from the time of his re-election his re-election shall be void.

STATUTE 39. *Special Payments and Allowances.*

By repealing section (1) of Statute 39 and substituting therefor the following section to form an amended section (1) of the same Statute.

(1.) The Governing Body may from time to time make such payments as they shall think fit out of the College income to the College Building Fund to the Reserve Fund to the Pension and Endowment Fund to the Tuition Fund to the Studentship Fund and to the Scholarship Fund.

CONVOCAATION OF CANTERBURY.

To The King's Most Excellent Majesty.

We, Your Majesty's loyal and faithful subjects, the Archbishops, Bishops and Clergy of the Province of Canterbury in Convocation assembled, approach Your Majesty with the dutiful assurance of our devotion to Your Majesty's Throne and Person.

Seven months ago it was our privilege to lay before Your Majesty an Address from the Convocation then assembled, and to assure Your Majesty of our earnest, continuous and expectant prayers that the blessing and guidance of Almighty God may be assured in rich measure to Your Majesty.

In such forecast as we are allowed to make of the year which has now begun, great days stand out which will make it memorable in the history of the Throne and Empire. We look forward to the august and uplifting rite of Your Majesty's Coronation; and of the Coronation of Her Majesty the Queen. In one of the noblest and most historic Churches of Christendom, in the midst of this vast City, with the thoughts and prayers of millions set towards the scene from every quarter of the world, that solemn service will, please God, be held this summer. We pray that the Most High may accept therein Your Majesty's dedication of your life to the immense task appointed for it; that He may bestow upon Your Majesty the full wealth of that enlightening and ennobling grace which is sufficient for every duty which His Providence assigns; that He may make the memory of that day a fresh link, binding to Your Majesty the hearts of your faithful people; that all the years of the reign thus hallowed may be guided by His free and princely Spirit, and that after a long and glorious course of ruling this temporal Kingdom wisely, justly, and religiously, you may at last be made partaker of an Eternal Kingdom.

We rejoice to think of the welcome which will greet Your Majesty, after the solemnity of the Coronation, in the visits promised to Scotland, to Ireland, and to Wales; for we are sure that there could be no happier way of knitting together in one enthusiasm of loyalty all parts of the United Kingdom.

For the British Dominions beyond the seas Your Majesty has shown a constant and thoughtful consideration which has deepened their allegiance to the Throne, and strengthened with a sense of personal devotion the ties which bind them to this country. And we thankfully believe that as the splendour of Oriental homage gathers round Your Majesty's presence in the midst of your subjects in India, the blessings of tranquillity and loyalty will be confirmed amongst the multitudes of that great Empire.

Amidst all our anticipation of happiness and welfare in Your Majesty's reign, we think with reverence of that load of care and responsibility which needs must weigh on him who wears the Crown of this far-reaching sovereignty. The words of the gracious answer given to our Address last summer told that, in bearing this heavy load, Your Majesty looks to the One Source of strength. We thank God that it is so: and further we thank Him that, for the lightening of the burden, He has granted to Your Majesty not only the affection of your people, but also that best and surest spring of refreshment and of gladness, the pure love of a true English home.

It is the high privilege of the National Church to be in special duty bound to set forward among the people of this country all that makes for peace and justice, for purity and self-control, and for the upbringing of our children in the faith and fear of God. We are confident that we may rely upon the encouragement and help which Your Majesty will give to the Church in all such work, as also in the special care which it is ours to have for the helpless, the suffering, and the poor. We retain the hope to which we have on former occasions been allowed to give expression when dutifully addressing the Crown, that at an early date some at least of the wise and well-considered suggestions, which have resulted from the discussions upon the Report of the Royal Commission on the Poor Law and which are now receiving increased support among the local authorities, upon whom responsibility is laid, may be carried into effect by legislation.

We would conclude, as always, with the dutiful assurance of our unceasing prayers that the blessing of Almighty God our Heavenly Father may rest upon Your Majesty and upon every member of the Royal House.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious answer:—

I am glad to receive, for the second time since the commencement of My Reign, a loyal and dutiful Address from Your Grace and the Bishops and Clergy of the Province of Canterbury, assembled in Convocation.

I am profoundly sensible of the solemn significance and character of the ceremony which, in God's providence, is to mark the coming summer and will confirm and consecrate My Accession to the Throne. Your prayer that

My life may, by the Grace of God, be devoted to the service of My People is fervently repeated in My heart.

Regulations under Section 9 (1).

COUNTY OF SURREY.

Banstead, Cheam, and Ewell Parishes.

To the County Council of Surrey;—
And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by sub-section (1) of section 9 of the Motor Car Act, 1903 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), it is enacted that, within any limits or place referred to in regulations made by Us, the Local Government Board, with a view to the safety of the public, on the application of the local authority of the area in which the limits or place are situate, a person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour;

And whereas We have received and duly considered applications from the County Council of Surrey for the issue of Regulations in pursuance of the said sub-section putting the above-mentioned provisions of that sub-section in force within the limits comprising certain roads or parts of roads situate within the parishes of Banstead, Cheam, and Ewell, in the county of Surrey;

NOW THEREFORE, in pursuance of the powers given to Us in that behalf, We do, by this Our Order, make the following Regulations:—

ARTICLE I.—The provisions of sub-section (1) of section 9 of the Act with respect to the driving of a motor car at a speed not exceeding ten miles per hour shall apply and have effect within the limits comprising the roads or parts of roads within the said parishes which are specified in the Schedule hereto.

ARTICLE II.—These Regulations shall come into operation on the 6th day of March, one thousand nine hundred and eleven.

SCHEDULE.

IN THE PARISH OF BANSTEAD.

High Street, from a point opposite the Police Station to its junction with Park Road;

So much of Park Road as extends from its junction with High Street to a point situate 50 yards beyond the Well House;

So much of Sutton Lane as extends in a northerly direction for a distance of 50 yards from its junction with High Street; and

So much of Woodmansterne Lane as extends in a north-easterly direction for a distance of 50 yards from its junction with Park Road.

IN THE PARISH OF CHEAM.

So much of the road from Ewell to Sutton (including part of High Street) as extends from a point situate 120 yards to the west of the

junction of that road with Station Road, in the village of Cheam, to the footpath on the eastern side of Manor House; and

So much of Station Road as extends from a point situate 50 yards to the north of the said road from Ewell to Sutton to a point situate 50 yards to the south of that road.

IN THE PARISH OF EWELL.

So much of High Street as extends in a northerly direction from a point opposite the southern end of the chapel to a point situate 120 yards south of the junction of the London and Kingston Roads.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 3RD MARCH 1911.)

DERBYSHIRE (PARASITIC MANGE) ORDER OF 1911.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts,

1894 to 1910, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Definition of Parasitic Mange.

1. The expression "parasitic mange" in this Order means sarcoptic mange or psoroptic mange.

Separation of Diseased and Suspected Animals and Notice of Disease.

2.—(1.) Every person having in his possession or under his charge a horse, ass or mule affected with or suspected of parasitic mange shall (a) as far as practicable keep that animal separate from horses, asses and mules not so affected or suspected; and (b) with all practicable speed give notice of the fact of the horse, ass or mule being so affected or suspected to a constable of the police force for the police area in which the horse, ass or mule so affected or suspected is.

(2.) The constable receiving such notice shall forthwith give information of the receipt by him of the notice to an Inspector of the Local Authority, who shall forthwith report the same to the Local Authority.

Veterinary Inquiry by Local Authority as to existence of Parasitic Mange.

3.—(1.) The Local Authority on receiving information of the existence, or supposed existence, of parasitic mange shall forthwith cause inquiry to be instituted as to the correctness of such information with the assistance and advice of a Veterinary Inspector, or of a veterinary practitioner qualified according to the Act of 1894 to be a Veterinary Inspector.

(2.) The owner and occupier of any premises on which there is a horse, ass or mule affected with, or suspected of, parasitic mange, shall give all reasonable facilities for the inquiry by the Local Authority under this Article, and any person failing to give such facilities shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Detention of Animals.

4.—(1.) A Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority may serve a Notice (in the Form A set forth in the Schedule to this Order, or to the like effect) on the occupier of any stable, shed, field or other premises in which there is a horse, ass or mule which in his opinion is affected with parasitic mange, and thereupon the following restrictions shall take effect:—

(i.) The horse, ass or mule so affected shall not be moved out of the stable, shed, field or other premises specified in the Notice, except with the written authority, and under the supervision, of an Inspector of the Local Authority, and only to some other place of detention; and during the detention it shall from time to time, as often as may be necessary, be treated by the owner thereof with some dressing or other remedy for parasitic mange approved for that purpose by a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority;

(ii.) No other horse, ass or mule shall be moved out of the stable, shed, field or other premises unless on each occasion immediately before the movement it is treated with some dressing or other remedy for parasitic mange

approved for that purpose by a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority;

(iii.) No horse, ass or mule shall be allowed to stray out of the stable, shed, field or other premises.

(2.) A Notice under this Order shall remain in force until it is withdrawn by a Notice in writing served on the occupier of the premises by an Inspector of the Local Authority.

(3.) An Inspector shall with all practicable speed send a copy of any Notice served under this Article to the Local Authority and to the police officer in charge of the nearest police station of the District.

Regulations of Local Authority as to Cleansing and Disinfection.

5.—(1.) The Local Authority may, for the purpose of preventing the spreading of parasitic mange, make Regulations for the following purposes, or any of them:

(i.) For providing for the cleansing and disinfection of any place used by, and of utensils, mangers, feeding troughs, pens, hurdles, harness, or other things used for or about, any horse, ass or mule affected with or suspected of parasitic mange;

(ii.) For prescribing the mode in which such cleansing and disinfection are to be effected;

(iii.) For requiring the owner, lessee or occupier of any such place to cleanse and disinfect any such place, utensils, mangers, feeding-troughs, pens, hurdles, harness or other things, at the expense of the Local Authority, or at the expense of such owner, lessee or occupier;

(iv.) For requiring the removal by the owner from contact with horses, asses or mules of litter used for or about any horse, ass or mule affected with or suspected of parasitic mange.

(2.) The mode of disinfection shall be one of those prescribed by the Diseases of Animals (Disinfection) Order of 1906.

(3.) If any person fail to cleanse and disinfect any place or any utensil, manger, feeding-trough, pen, hurdle, harness, or other thing, or to remove any litter, in accordance with any such Regulation, it shall be lawful for the Local Authority, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of such Regulation, to cause such place or such utensil, manger, feeding-trough, pen, hurdle, harness or other thing to be cleansed and disinfected, or to remove such litter, and to recover summarily the expenses thereby incurred from such person.

(4.) Where the power conferred by the preceding provisions of this Article is exercised by the Local Authority, the owner, lessee or occupier of the place to be cleansed and disinfected shall give all reasonable facilities for that purpose.

Provisions as to Regulations of Local Authority.

6.—(1.) The Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board two copies of every Regulation made by them under this Order.

(2.) If the Board are satisfied on inquiry, with respect to any Regulation made by the Local Authority under this Order, that the

same is for any reason objectionable, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Extension of certain Sections of Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

7. Horses, asses and mules shall be animals, and parasitic mange of horses, asses and mules (in this Order called parasitic mange) shall be a disease for the purposes of this Order and of the following sections of the Act of 1894 (namely):

Section forty-three (*Police*);

Section forty-four (*General Administrative Provisions*);

and also for the purposes of all other sections of the said Act containing provisions relative to or consequent on the provisions of those sections and this Order, including such sections as relate to offences and legal proceedings.

Exemption of Army Veterinary Service and Veterinary Colleges.

8. Nothing in this Order applies to any horse, ass or mule kept in stables of military barracks or camps under the care and supervision of the Army Veterinary Service, or in stables of any Veterinary College affiliated to the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons.

Offences.

9.—(1.) If a horse, ass or mule is moved in contravention of this Order, or of any Notice thereunder, the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If any horse, ass or mule is allowed to stray in contravention of this Order, or of any Notice thereunder, the owner of the animal, and the person in charge thereof, and the occupier of the premises from which the animal is allowed to stray, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If anything is omitted to be done as regards cleansing or disinfection in contravention of this Order, or of any Regulation made thereunder, the owner and the lessee and the occupier and the person in charge of any place or thing in or in respect of which the same is omitted, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If any owner, occupier, or person in charge of premises requiring to be cleansed and disinfected fails to give the facilities to a Local Authority required under this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

10. In this Order—

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries;

"Inspector" includes Veterinary Inspector;

"The Act of 1894" means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Extent.

11. This Order extends to the administrative county of Derby; and the county borough of Derby.

Commencement.

12. This Order shall come into operation on the seventeenth day of March, nineteen hundred and eleven.

Short Title.

13. This Order may be cited as the DERBYSHIRE (PARASITIC MANGE) ORDER OF 1911.

We, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of the city of Manchester, in Council assembled in the Town Hall, Albert Square, in the city of Manchester, on the first day of March, 1911, in exercise of the powers vested in us in and by the Tramways Act, 1870, and the Manchester Corporation Tramways Act, 1900, and all other powers us hereunto enabling, do hereby revoke the following provision of Bye-law No. 1 of the series of Bye-laws made by us on the fifth day of April, 1905, in pursuance of the said Acts, namely:—

“(a) In the Central area hereinafter described, the distance at which a carriage shall follow a preceding carriage using the same tramway shall be such as may be directed by the police. Any driver who shall fail to obey

such direction shall be deemed to have committed an offence against this Bye-law. The Central area above referred to is as follows:— The area bounded by Swan Street, Miller Street, Ducie Bridge, New Bridge Street, Great Ducie Street, Victoria Street, Deansgate, Whitworth Street West, Whitworth Street, Store Street, Great Ancoats Street, and Swan Street, and such area shall include the above-named streets or portions thereof bounding the same”;

And in lieu thereof we in exercise of the said powers do hereby make and adopt the following Bye-laws, and declare that the same shall have effect as if they had been inserted in and formed part of the aforesaid Bye-law No. 1, namely:—

(a) In the Central area the distance at which a carriage shall follow a preceding carriage using the same tramway shall be not less than ten yards, with the following exceptions, viz.:

(1) When a carriage is stopped at a stopping place or tramway terminus, or by direction of any police officer, or in case of accident or emergency, each of the carriages following the stationary carriage and using the same tramway (but not exceeding two such carriages exclusive of the stationary carriage) may stop within a distance which shall not be less than two yards from the stationary carriage immediately in front of them respectively;

(2) When a carriage is re-started after having been stopped as hereinbefore mentioned, it may, for the space of 40 yards from the place where it was stopped, follow a preceding carriage using the same tramway at a distance of not less than five yards;

(3) In the portion of Piccadilly between Portland Street and Mosley Street a carriage using the same tramway may follow a preceding carriage in motion at a distance of not less than five yards and may stop within a distance which shall not be less than two yards from a stationary carriage immediately in front.

In these Bye-laws the following expressions have the meanings hereinafter mentioned, namely:—

“The Central area” means the area bounded by Swan Street, Miller Street, Ducie Bridge, New Bridge Street, Great Ducie Street, Victoria Street, Deansgate, Whitworth Street West, Whitworth Street, Store Street, Great Ancoats Street, and Swan Street, and includes the above-named streets or portions thereof bounding the same;

“Stopping place” means a stopping place indicated by either of the signs “All Cars Stop Here” and “Cars Stop Here by Request.”
