His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the appointments of the undermentioned Officers to be Companions of the Distinguished Service Order in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:—

*Maj. Robert Geoffrey Baker, Punjabis, Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed a quick grasp of the situation, and with great ability secured his left flank at a critical time, rendering it possible to organise further attacks elsewhere. His fearless, personal example contributed largely to the success of a difficult operation.

*Temp. Capt. Aubrey David Mapleton Farrer, R. Welsh Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward alone a distance of 1,000 yards under very heavy fire to take command of an advanced post. Although wounded, he succeeded in reaching the post, and held it with marked skill and determina-

tion against great odds. Later in the day he was severely wounded.

Capt. Alexander Harcourt Griffiths, D.C.L.I., attd. King's African Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his column in a most gallant manner against a strongly entrenched position and captured a field gun. He has consistently shown great coolness and ability.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Harold Everett Hitchin, Durh. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a bombing party. He made three most gallant attempts to force his way into the enemy's position and himself shot four of the enemy with his revolver. Later, he voluntarily joined in another Company's attack, and rendered invaluable assistance. He was largely responsible for the final success of the operations.

2nd Lt. Mark King, C. Gds., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon through an intense hostile barrage, displaying the greatest

bravery. Later, on reaching the first objective and finding his left flank exposed, he got his men out of the enemy's front line, formed front to the left, advanced 400 yards, and captured an enemy second line trench, thereby saving a critical situation.

Lt.-Col. Ronald Ernest Murray, British S. Africa Police.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his column. He set a splendid example of gallantry and able leadership during a successful assault on very superior forces of the enemy.

*2nd Lt. Edgar Kinghorn Myles, V.C., Welsh R., attd. Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When all the officers except two had become casualties, he, for five hours, inspired confidence in the defence against two counter-attacks, and sent back most accurate and valuable reports of the situation. His courage and fine example were largely responsible for the steadiness of all ranks with him.

*Capt. Allan Watson, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward under very heavy fire, before his own unit was ordered to advance, and commenced to dress the wounded of another battalion. He worked untiringly under fire both day and night, never resting until all the wounded had been brought in.

AUSTRALIAN IMPERIAL FORCE.

Maj. Henry Arnold Crowther, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in leading the front line of his battalion during a reconnaissance in force on the enemy position. He repeatedly traversed the front line under heavy fire to superintend the action of the companies. Later in the day he personally directed the necessary movements to break off the action, showing marked ability and initiative.

(The names marked with an asterisk appeared in the London Gazette dated 17th March, 1917, without deeds.)

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award a Bar to the Military Cross to the undermentioned Officers:—

Temp. 2nd Lt. Thomas Charles Herring, M.C., E. Yorks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rallied his men and led them forward at a critical time. On another occasion he displayed great courage and initiative when in command of his company. He has at all times set a splendid example.

(M.C. gazetted 25th Aug. 1916.)

Capt. Charles Harold Howden, M.C., Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised and carried out two successful attacks under the most difficult conditions, thereby capturing 500 yards of

the enemy's trenches and sixty prisoners. He set a splendid example throughout.

(M.C. gazetted 14th Nov. 1916.)

Temp. Capt. Charles Barclay Leatham, M.C., York. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He directed operations from an exposed position in the enemy's lines under very heavy fire. Later, he took charge of a platoon and personally led it to its objective. He was severely wounded.

(M.C. gazetted 3rd June 1916.)

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to confer the Military Cross on the undermentioned Officers and Warrant Officers in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:—

Lt. George Allan, K.R. Rif. C. (frmly. S.A. Mtd. Rif.).

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He reorganised the men of various companies and greatly assisted in repelling several enemy counter-attacks. He set a splendid example throughout, and although slightly wounded remained at his post.

Temp. Capt. Thomas Macdonald Banks, Essex R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led the left assaulting company in a most gallant manner, and succeeded in capturing his objective in spite of strong hostile opposition.

Lt. Hough Treherne Barrett, Intel. Dept., Nyassaland Fld. Force.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He reconnoitred the enemy's position, and subsequently guided a column three miles by night, enabling them to deploy unobserved between picquets of the enemy to within 250 yards of the position.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Reginald Elphinstone Baty, North'd. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in leading a raiding party. Although severely wounded, he continued to lead his men, and entered the enemy's trench. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Capt. Robert Ernest Beckerson, Norf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his company with great courage and determination throughout, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He has previously done fine work.

Lt. Alfred James Biddulph, R.F.A., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when conducting wire cutting operations under very heavy hostile shelling. He set a magnificent example to his men and carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Christopher Joseph Quintin Brand, R.F.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty whilst on patrol with one other machine. He attacked a formation of five hostile machines and shot one of them down in flames. On another occasion he brought down two hostile machines. He has at all times shown great courage and initiative.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) David Haliburton Brand, Scots Gds., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He made a personal reconnaissance of the enemy line, and brought back most valuable information. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

2nd Lt. Randall Matthew Burdon, R.W. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He succeeded in leading his platoon through two rows of uncut wire. Although wounded early in the attack, he continued to command his men until wounded a second time.

*Lt. James Rattray Burns, Sco. Rif. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when co-operating with artillery. He attacked a hostile machine, and by skilful manoeuvring forced it down out of control.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) William Samuel Caster, Cyclist Bn. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a successful long distance raid, and brought six machines safely back in very bad weather. On another occasion, while leading a long distance bomb raid, he engaged five hostile machines.

Temp. Capt. Randolph Arthur Chell, Essex R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward to ascertain the situation, and skilfully organised a plan for retaking a lost bit of trench. He has at all times set a fine example of courage and initiative.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Willoughby George Chapman, Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in leading a raiding party. He gallantly led his men into the enemy's trenches, inflicted many casualties, and captured several prisoners. He set a fine example to his men.

2nd Lt. Geoffrey Staley Clarke, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He entered a pit where some ammunition had been set on fire and extinguished the burning rounds at great personal risk. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Leonard Coulshaw, Essex R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon in the attack in a most gallant manner, reached his objective, and consolidated his position under very heavy hostile shell fire.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Gerald James Hardwick Cowie, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men in a most gallant manner to their objective, inflicted many casualties on the enemy, and captured four prisoners. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Capt. Thomas Horsfall Crofton, Conn. Rang., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a counter-attack and went to the assistance of another unit, thereby driving the enemy back at a critical time. He has at all times set a fine example of courage and initiative.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Ernest Crowther, W. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a bombing party and drove the enemy back. He then established a bombing post and maintained his position all day in spite of very heavy fire.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Joseph George Culver, Essex R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Accompanied by six men he rushed an enemy machine-gun which was holding up the attack and captured the gun, together with the gun team.

Temp. 2nd Lt. George Courtenay Dell-Clarke, Genl. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when his machine was set on fire. Although himself severely burnt, he landed and extinguished the flames in his machine. Later, although his machine was in a dangerous condition, he flew back to his aerodrome and handed in his reconnaissance report.

2nd Lt. Reginald Arthur Dench, Leins. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He set a magnificent example to his men, and himself fired a machine gun which inflicted many casualties on the enemy. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. John Francis Dennis, Notts. and Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He directed the fire of the rifle grenadiers, and by his fine example materially assisted in driving back the enemy at a critical time. He was wounded.

Temp. 2nd Lt. George Edwin Dillon, Norf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in a most gallant manner and captured the enemy position together with fifty prisoners. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. Lt. Leonard Dodson, Genl. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He has continually shown great courage and determination in photographing the enemy's positions under the most trying

conditions, and has brought down three enemy machines.

*2nd Lt. Francis Drayton Drewitt, Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he continued to supervise the digging of a communication trench in a very exposed position until ordered to cease work. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Bernard Henry Driver, R.W. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. By his able leadership he succeeded in getting a number of his company through two rows of uncut wire entanglements, being exposed the whole time to heavy fire.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Harold Forrester Duncan, High. L.I and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an aerial combat. Although twice wounded, he continued firing until his gun was hit and put out of action. He then kept in communication with his pilot during the remainder of the action, and continually informed him as to the whereabouts of hostile aircraft.

Lt. (actg. Maj.) George St. John Armitage Dyson, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and judgment in getting his battery into position within three hundred yards of the front line under heavy fire. He has at all times set a fine example to his men.

Temp. Lt. John Oliver Richard Evans, M.G.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men forward in a most gallant manner, and succeeded in capturing two enemy machine guns. He set a splendid example to his men, and rendered invaluable assistance throughout.

2nd Lt. Leslie Emerson Faber, R. Fus., Spec. Res., attd. M.G. Coy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He kept his machine guns in action in spite of the most intense hostile fire, thereby materially assisting a raiding party to carry out their task.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Thomas Francis Geraty, R. Ir. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his men with great gallantry, and succeeded in reaching his objective. Later, although wounded, he killed one of the enemy and brought his party safely back to our lines.

2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Fleming Clement Gregory, Yeo., attd. Imp. Camel Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his company with great determination throughout the action, and was responsible for the capture of two enemy machine guns. He set a fine example to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William George Hamm, E. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great initiative in organising parties of bombers and patrols, and succeeded in securing many strong positions which proved of the utmost value. He set a splendid example throughout the operations.

Temp. Capt. Frederick Joseph Haney, R.F.A., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his heavy trench mortar battery with the greatest skill throughout, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He set a fine example to his men.

2nd Lt. Vivian Morel Harrison, Norf. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He kept his men together under the most trying conditions, and showed marked initiative in establishing an advanced strong point under heavy fire.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) William Wynne Honeywood, Lrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when patrolling with an armoured car. He opened fire on a large enemy force, and wounded six of them. At great personal risk, under heavy fire, he placed one of the wounded men in the car, and returned, having obtained valuable information.

Temp. 2nd Lt. James Arthur Hopper, North'd. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Accompanied by a N.C.O., he penetrated the enemy's line and brought back most valuable information. He has previously carried out most valuable patrol work.

Jemadar (actg. Subadar) Iman Din Khan, R.G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. On two occasions he displayed great coolness and courage under heavy fire. He has at all times set a fine example to his men.

2nd Lt. Leslie Nethercote Johnson, Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a party across the open to cut through the hostile wire, thereby enabling an enemy strong point to be captured. He has at all times set a splendid example of courage and determination.

2nd Lt. Edward Kershaw, Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a strong fighting patrol forward in daylight, and obtained most valuable information. Later, he successfully effected the withdrawal of his party under very heavy fire. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

*Lt. John Newton Lamont, Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rallied his own men and those of other units at a critical time, and by his personal example inspired them to hold on to the position. He remained in command directing operations until the line had been consolidated.

*Capt. Arthur John Lunn, Punjabis, Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of the third wave, and led it to the enemy's trench, and then returned under heavy fire to report the situation. Later, when communication failed, he again proceeded across the open to make a further report.

*2nd Lt. Ronald MacDonald, R. Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He collected a party and led them out to occupy an enemy mine crater. Later, he established and maintained his position under the most trying circumstances.

2nd Lt. William Alexander MacInnes, High. L.I., attd. Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon in a most gallant manner, and inflicted many casualties on the enemy. Later, he reorganised his men and materially assisted in repulsing a hostile counter-attack.

2nd Lt. Sidney Charles Maxwell, York. & Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He succeeded in bringing his Commanding Officer, who had been wounded, to a place of safety under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

*Temp. 2nd Lt. Robert McDowell, N. Staff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company in the assault, and after all the remaining officers of the battalion had become casualties, he assumed command of the whole line. He reorganised his men and maintained his position, in spite of a strong enemy counter-attack.

2nd Lt. William Henry Purvis McKenzie, Yeo., attd. Light Car Patrols.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He commanded a light car patrol throughout the action with great courage and skill. He was responsible for the evacuation of a large number of wounded men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William Francis Mead, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He registered his battery with conspicuous success, working continually for five hours under very heavy fire. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Lt. Phillip Edmund Mitchell, King's Afr. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He gallantly led his half company in a charge, and captured an enemy machine gun, together with several prisoners.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Charles Reginald Morris-Eyton, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He, with great coolness and personal courage, directed the arrangements for extricating guns and wagons which had become stuck in the mud, and eventually succeeded in getting his guns into position under very heavy hostile fire.

Temp. Lt. Charles Fletcher Musgrave, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in handling his battery under heavy hostile shell fire, and under very difficult circumstances. He set a fine example to all ranks.

Temp. Capt. William Cecil Neild, Essex R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led the right assaulting company in a most gallant manner, and succeeded in capturing his objective. Later, he skilfully organised the defence of the captured position.

Lt. Harry Thomas Onyett, B.S.A. Police.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. With a small party, he captured an enemy entrenched position held by 150 rifles and three machine guns.

2nd Lt. Kenneth Kemble Pelton, Leins. R., Spec. Res., attd. R. Ir. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He formed a defensive flank and brought two machine guns into action, thereby forcing a strong enemy raiding party to retire. He subsequently led a bombing party with great gallantry.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Charles Edward Murray Pickthorn, A.S.C., Spec. Res., and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in attacking hostile aircraft, and in carrying out difficult reconnaissances. On one occasion, although wounded, he continued his combat and brought down a hostile machine. On two other occasions he brought down hostile machines in flames.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Ronan, Leins. R., attd. Mach. Gun Serv.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He ran his car over obstacles into a village, in spite of his armour being pierced in many places, and all the crew, including himself, being wounded. He greatly assisted in the success of the operations.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frederick Sherlock, Norf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed marked courage and determination in carrying out the work of clearing a village. He set a fine example to his men throughout, and succeeded in capturing twenty-seven prisoners.

Temp. Lt. Thomas Slattery, King's Afr. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. By his own magnificent personal

example he inspired his men, who were largely responsible for repulsing a strong enemy attack.

*2nd Lt. Charles Arthur Cholmley Steward, R. Welsh Fus., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of a bombing party, and pushed forward with great determination. Although wounded in the head and rendered unconscious for a time, he stuck to his duty for nearly twenty-four hours until all the points had been made good.

2nd Lt. Frederick William Arthur Stubbs, Notts. & Derby. R., attd. York. & Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a patrol for 800 yards along unknown trenches in order to ascertain the situation, and later personally covered the withdrawal of his party. On another occasion he made a gallant attempt to rescue a wounded N.C.O. He has at all times set a splendid example.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Charles Kingsley Thomas, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in entering a tunnel where an explosion had occurred and rescuing two men who had been buried.

2nd Lt. John Ridley Thompson, Durh. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men in a most gallant manner, inflicted many casualties on the enemy, and captured six prisoners.

2nd Lt. Douglas Henry Wells, York. & Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a patrol. He carried out a difficult reconnaissance, and obtained most valuable information. Later, he rendered invaluable service when in command of a company.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Piggott Wheeler, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He, with great coolness and disregard of danger, reorganised his drivers and teams, and succeeded in getting his guns into action under the most trying conditions.

2nd Lt. Arthur Sidney Williamson, H.A.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his platoon through two rows of the enemy's wire, and when held up by a third row, lay down in a shell hole with his men. Later, he himself accounted for four or five of the enemy with a rifle.

2nd Lt. Fred Wilson, Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rallied his men, and dug in close to the enemy's trenches, where he maintained his position throughout the day under heavy fire.

Temp. Lt. Alexander Henry L. Wyatt, King's Afr. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to

duty. He most ably organised the defence of his position, and gallantly commanded his men. His fine leadership greatly contributed to the enemy being repulsed with severe losses.

2nd Lt. James Thomas Young, Arg. & Suth'd Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his men with great gallantry, penetrated to the enemy's second line, and himself killed two of the enemy. He set a splendid example to his men.

*10160 Coy./Sjt./Maj. W. A. Henderson, R. Welsh Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When all his officers had become casualties, he assumed command, and succeeded in holding off the enemy, defeating determined bombing attacks and attempts to rush his post from three sides.

S/3937 C.S.M. Frederick James Oliver, K.R.R.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He organised and led a bombing attack to gain touch with the division on his left, cleared three enemy dugouts, and single-handed captured about twenty prisoners.

AUSTRALIAN IMPERIAL FORCE.

Lt. Leslie George Allen, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a bombing attack at a critical time, and succeeded in capturing the enemy's position. He set a splendid example of courage and initiative.

2nd Lt. David Henry Avar, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a patrol. He carried out a dangerous reconnaissance under very heavy fire, and obtained most valuable information.

Lt. Frank Pogson Bethune, M.G. Coy. (late Infy.).

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out several daring reconnaissances, and obtained most valuable information. Later, he fought his machine-guns with great gallantry, and set a fine example to his men.

2nd Lt. Bert Bradford, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of a blocking party. He rendered invaluable assistance to a raiding party and was largely responsible for keeping off several strong enemy counter-attacks.

Lt. Leslie Kenneth Browning, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led out a patrol, successfully engaged a strong party of the enemy and brought back most valuable information. He set a fine example to his men.

Lt. Stanley Charles Calderwood, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great courage and deter-

mination in continually leading his men forward to the assault.

Capt. Percy Herbert Cherry, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in the attack with great gallantry and captured the enemy's position together with two machine guns. Later, although wounded, he continued to command his men.

Lt. Edmund Cornish, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led an attacking party with great gallantry and captured an enemy strong point, together with 29 prisoners. Later, although severely wounded, he continued to command his men.

Lt. Eden Lloyd Davies, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of a bombing party. He bombed along the trench for a distance of over 200 yards and held his position against several strong enemy counter-attacks.

Lt. William Lawrence Davies, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took charge of a company, and by his fine example enabled a successful attack to be launched. He continued to command throughout the day, and was largely responsible for the capture of 600 yards of the enemy's trench.
