BY THE KING.

A PROCLAMATION

PROHIBITING THE EXPORTATION FROM THE UNITED KINGDOM TO SWITZERLAND OF CERTAIN ARTICLES.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS it is provided by Section one of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, that We may by Proclamation prohibit the exportation of all or any of the following articles, namely, arms, ammunition, military or naval stores, and any article which We shall judge capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of arms, ammunition, or military or naval stores, to any country or place therein named whenever We shall judge such prohibition to be expedient in order to prevent such arms, ammunition,

military or naval stores, being used against Our subjects or forces or against any forces engaged or which may be engaged in military or naval operations in co-operation with Our forces:

And whereas it is provided by Section one of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that Section one of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, shall have effect whilst a state of war in which We are engaged exists as if, in addition to the articles therein mentioned, there were included all other articles of every description:

And whereas by Our Proclamation, dated the tenth day of May, 1917, certain articles were prohibited to be exported from the United Kingdom to, among other destinations, all destinations in Switzerland:

And whereas Our said Proclamation has been varied or added to by various Orders of Council, and may hereafter be varied or added to by other Orders of Council, or We may hereafter think fit to revoke Our said Proclamation and to issue another Proclamation in lieu thereof:

And whereas We judge it expedient that, in addition to such articles as may for the time being be prohibited to be exported to destinations in Switzerland under Our Proclamation aforesaid or under any like Proclamation which We may hereafter issue in lieu of Our said Proclamation, the articles hereinafter specified should also be prohibited to be exported to all destinations in Switzerland:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Acts and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf do hereby declare, and it is hereby declared, as follows:—

1. As from and after the date of this Proclamation, the articles specified in the Schedule hereto shall be prohibited to be exported to any destination in Switzerland.

2. Our Proclamation made the thirteenth day of March, 1917, as amended by the Orders of Council, dated the 10th August and 27th November, 1917, relating to the exportation of certain articles to Switzerland during the present War, is hereby revoked.

A PROCLAMATION

FOR PROHIBITING THE IMPORTATION OF COCAINE AND OPIUM INTO THE UNITED KINGDOM.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by Section forty-three of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, it is provided that the importation of arms; ammunition, gunpowder or any other goods may be prohibited by Proclamation:

And whereas it is expedient that the impor-

tation into the United Kingdom of cocaine or of opium should be prohibited except as hereinafter provided:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council in pursuance of the said Act and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:—

As from and after this date, subject as hereinafter provided, all cocaine and all opium shall be prohibited to be imported into the United Kingdom:

Provided always, and it is hereby declared, that nothing in this Proclamation shall apply to cocaine or opium imported under the licence of one of Our Principal Secretaries of State and in accordance with the provisions of such licence.

The word "cocaine" includes ecgonine, and any substance, whether preparation, admixture, extract or otherwise, containing 0.1 per cent. (one part in a thousand) or more of cocaine or ecgonine, or of any salt or derivative thereof.

The word "opium" means raw opium, powdered or granulated opium, or opium prepared for smoking, and includes any solid or semi-solid mixture containing opium.

The Cocaine and Opium (Prohibition of Import) No. 2 Proclamation, 1916, is hereby revoked.

This Proclamation may be cited as The Cocaine and Opium (Prohibition of Import) No. 3 Proclamation, 1918.

A PROCLAMATION

FOR A BANK HOLIDAY.

GEORGE R.I.

WE, considering that it is desirable that Monday, the First day of July next, should be kept as a close Holiday in all Banks throughout the United Kingdom, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, and in pursuance of Section four of the Bank Holidays Act, 1871, appoint the said Monday, the First day of July next, to be observed as a Bank Holiday throughout the United Kingdom, for the purposes of the said Act, and We do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, command the said day to be so observed, and all Our loving subjects to order themselves accordingly:

And whereas it is customary for the usual Bank Holidays to be kept as holidays by Our loving subjects generally and not only for the purposes of the said Act, but it is not Our intention that the said First day of July should be kept as a general holiday:

Now, therefore, We do hereby enjoin that the said First day of July shall not be kept as or deemed by virtue of this Our Royal Proclamation to be a holiday for any purposes

whatsoever other than the purposes of the said Act.

Given at Our Court at *Buckingham Palace*, this Twenty-fifth day of *June*, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and in the Ninth year of Our Reign.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November, nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make regulations (called the "Defence of the Realm Regulations") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915, and other enactments:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner herein after appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendments be made in the said regulations:—

1. At the end of Regulation 2A the following sub-section shall be inserted:—

"(3) It shall be lawful for the Admiralty for the purpose of housing, with or without their wives and families, workmen employed in the building or repairing of ships or their machinery or accessories, to take possession of any premises (whether furnished or not) which are not ordinarily inhabited during the winter months or which have not been inhabited for a total period of three months at least during the twelve months immediately preceding the taking of possession. Provided that in the case of furnished premises possession shall not be taken until seven days after notice of the intention so to do has been left on the premises and sent by post to the owner or occupier."

2. After Regulation 2r the following regulations shall be inserted:—

"2v. (1) The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries with a view to maintain or develop eel fisheries may in respect of or in relation to any waters to which this regulation is applied by order made by the Board, exercise any of the following powers, that is to say, the Board may

(a) assume and take possession of the sole right to fish for or take eels in the waters, or to stock the waters with eels and exercise such rights or authorise their exercise by any person; and

(b) construct or place and maintain or authorise any person to construct or place and maintain in the waters or on any land adjacent thereto any traps or other appliances or works for taking eels, or for the purpose of maintaining or developing the eel fishery; and

(c) enter or take possession of or authorise any person to enter on or take possession of any land for the purpose of access to the waters or fishing for eels therein by the use of boats or otherwise, or the exercise of any other power conferred by this regulation.

"(2) If any person without authority of the Board fishes for or takes eels in any waters to which this regulation is applied or obstructs or otherwise interferes with or impedes any person in the exercise of his powers under this regulation he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

"200. (1) Where the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries are of opinion that with a view to maintain or develop any fisheries it is expedient that they should exercise the powers given to them under this regulation, they may:

(a) enter on and take possession of or authorise any person to enter on and take possession of; any several fishery and take any fish therein and for this purpose enter or authorise the entry on any land;

(b) authorise the fishing for, taking, or removal of fish by any method or appliance, at any time, or in any circumstances by, at or in which the same would otherwise be unlawful;

(c) authorise the possession, sale, exposure, consignment for sale or purchase of fish at any time at which the same would otherwise be unlawful;

(d) prohibit or regulate the taking of fish or of fish of any kind or size by any method or at any time, or in any area specified in the prohibition or regulation, or the taking, possession or sale of immature fish;

(e) authorise any person to kill or take any bird injurious to fisheries, or to take the eggs of any such bird, at any time when such killing or taking would otherwise be illegal;

(f) by notice served on any person require him to make and send to the Board a return, on a form supplied by the Board, of all fish or any specified kind of fish taken by him, and within such time as shall be required by the notice;

(g) by notice served on any person entitled to or exercising, whether as owner or tenant, a right of several fishery, or the power of regulating a fishery, require him to take such measures for the cultivation, management and development of the fishery as the Board may think necessary or desirable and may require by the notice;

(h) enter on and take possession of any portion of the foreshore and bed of the sea or any estuary or tidal river or of any land abutting on, or in close proximity thereto and within the area on which they have entered exercise or authorise any person to exercise the exclusive right of fishing, and construct and provide or take possession of or acquire appliances for taking fish or

tanks, machinery, appliances, vessels and works for the purpose of cleansing and purifying shell-fish, or storing or cultivating or dealing with shell-fish.

"(2) Any person authorised by the Board in that behalf may for the purpose of this regulation, and on production if so required of his authority, enter on any fishery or land for the purposes of this regulation.

"(3) If any person without the authority of the Board enters or remains on any part of the foreshore or bed of the sea of which the Board have taken possession under this regulation, and which is marked out by stakes or buoys or other means and on or near which a notice of this provision is conspicuously displayed, or takes or attempts to take or injures any fish thereon, or does or attempts to do anything in contravention of any prohibition or regulation issued under this regulation or any condition imposed by any authority given under this regulation or fails to do anything which by notice under this regulation he is required to do, or having been served with a notice requiring him to take any measure fails to take such measure or obstructs or otherwise interferes with or impedes any person in the execution of his powers under this regulation, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

"(4) In this regulation the expression 'fish' includes shell-fish, and the expression 'shell-fish' includes mollusca and crustacea.

"(5) Any notice under this regulation may be served on the person to whom it is to be given, either personally or by leaving it for him at his last known place of abode or by sending it through the post in a registered letter addressed to him there.

"2000. (1) The two last foregoing regulations apply only to England and Wales and the territorial waters thereto adjoining, but nothing therein contained shall authorise the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries to enter on or take possession of, or erect or authorise the erection of any fixed net, net-stake, or other erection on any part of the foreshore or bed of the sea without the consent of the Board of Trade, and also if the area belongs to His Majesty in right of the Crown or the Duchy of Lancaster or belongs to the Duchy of Cornwall without the consent of:—

(1) The Commissioner of Woods, if the area be under his management;

(2) The Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, if the area belongs to that Duchy;

(3) The Secretary of the Duchy of Cornwall, if the area belongs to that Duchy.

"(2) The powers conferred by the last two foregoing regulations on the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries shall be in addition to and not in derogation of any other powers of the Board."

3. After Regulation 18B the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"18c. No person shall, without the permission of the Admiralty, Army Council, or Air Council, obtained through the Directors of the Official Press Bureau, publish any instructional work or article of a technical nature relating to warlike training, tactics or organisation, and if any person contravenes

this regulation he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations."

4. In Regulation 38 after the words "from entering" there shall be inserted the words "or being in, either at all times or at such times as may be specified in the order" and for the words "enters any such area" there shall be substituted the words "contravenes any such order, the owner and".

5. In sub-section (11) of Regulation 40B for the definition of cocaine the following definition shall be substituted:—

"Cocaine includes ecgonine, and any substance, whether preparation, admixture, extract or otherwise, containing 0.1 per cent. (one part in a thousand) or more of cocaine or ecgonine, or of any salt or derivative thereof."

6. After Regulation 41D the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"41DD. (1) Any person engaged in banking, bill discounting, or any transaction in foreign moneys or exchange, or any business of a similar nature shall not, without permission in writing from the Treasury, do or allow to be done through him or through any account kept by him, directly or indirectly, any transaction on behalf of a Russian subject or a person for the time being in Russia involving the sending of money, credit or securities out of the United Kingdom.

(2) Any person who contravenes or fails to comply with any of the provisions of this regulation shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

(3) The Treasury or any person authorised by them in that behalf may make such orders as to them or him may seem reasonable for the further or better carrying into effect of this regulation."

7. In Regulation 45 after paragraph (i) the following paragraph shall be inserted:—"or

"(j) Without lawful authority uses or communicates or attempts to elicit any secret official code-word or pass-word."

8. Regulation 45F shall be amended as follows:—

(1) In subsection (3) for the words "before any person duly authorised" there shall be substituted the words "before any

officer or other person duly authorised by the laws of the Ally."

(2) In subsection (4) after the words "in the United Kingdom" there shall be inserted the words "by standing mute or without lawful excuse refusing to testify, or."

(3) In subsection (5) for the words "before any person duly authorised" there shall be substituted the words "before any officer or other person duly authorised by the laws of the Ally."

(4) For subsection (6) the following subsection shall be substituted:—

"(6) It shall be lawful for a member of any naval or military court or board of an Ally, or any person duly authorised by the laws of the Ally to take evidence in connection with any proceedings before such court or board or for any administrative purpose connected with the naval or military service of the Ally, to take evidence in or in connection with any proceedings before such court or board or for such administrative purpose, and to administer oaths to witnesses or other persons, and to take depositions, and perform all such other notarial or consular acts as he may be authorised by the laws of the Ally to perform in foreign countries, and such authority may be exercised anywhere within the United Kingdom."

(5) In subsection (9) for the words "passed on such a man" there shall be substituted the words "passed on such a person."

(6) After subsection (10) the following new subsection shall be inserted:—

"(11) For the purposes of the foregoing provisions the expression "Members of a naval or military force of an Ally" shall be deemed to include any persons being subjects or citizens of that Ally, who are subject to the naval or military law of that Ally."

9. For the purpose of adapting to the Air Force the Defence of the Realm Regulations the amendments specified in the second column of the table appended to this Order shall be made in the regulations mentioned in the first column to that table.

2. Where a man fails to comply with any notice to join under this Order he shall be deemed as from the expiration of the time specified in the notice to have become a member of Section B of the particular Corps of the Volunteer Force which he shall have been so required to join in the like manner in all respects as if he had complied with the notice.

3. Any man who joins or is deemed to have joined the Volunteer Force as aforesaid shall perform such drills, undergo such training and undertake such military duties as are or may hereafter be laid down for members of Section B of the particular arm of the service to which the Volunteer unit which he is required to join belongs; provided that either in addition to or instead of such drills, training and military duties any such man may, in such cases as the Army Council direct, be required to perform such military duty not exceeding twelve hours a week as may be prescribed by the Army Council, and to enter into the necessary agreements accordingly.

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to approve of the Regulations laid down in Your Orders in Council before-mentioned being extended to the Ranks promoted for service other than in the Royal Naval Division.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.”

"Whereas the Right Reverend Herbert Hensley, now Bishop of Hereford, is desirous that certain improvements should be made at the said Episcopal House of Residence, and has submitted to us the particulars of such improvements, and we have approved the same:

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous, and it appears to us to be expedient, that towards the cost of effecting the said improvements a sum of £600 should be provided by the borrowing of the same sum by way of Mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, endowments or emoluments, which now belong, or may hereafter belong, to the Bishopric of Hereford:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Herbert Hensley, Bishop of Hereford, (testified by his having affixed his signature

and episcopal seal to this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend, under the provisions of the above-mentioned Acts, any sum not exceeding £600, and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, and endowments or emoluments, which now belong, or may hereafter belong, to his said See to the said Governors by Deed for the term of 15 years, or until the said sum, so to be borrowed as aforesaid, with the interest for the same as herein-after mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in the manner following, that is to say:—during and in respect of the first period of 12 months of the said term, computed from the day of the date of the Mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his Successors shall yearly, at the end of the second period of 12 months, so computed, and at the end of every such like period of 12 months thereafter, pay to the said Governors, their Successors or Assigns, one-twelfth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also, at the end of the first and each succeeding period of 12 months, computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of £4 per cent. per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid. And that, if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as herein-before mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of 40 days after the same shall become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors, their Successors and Assigns, to recover the same, and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof, by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale, and that such Mortgage Deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall bind as well the said Herbert Hensley, now Bishop of the said Diocese of Hereford, as every succeeding Bishop of the same Diocese, until the principal money and interest, costs and charges, shall have been paid off and discharged.

“ And we further recommend and propose that the said sum, so to be borrowed as aforesaid, shall be paid to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and that the receipt of one of our Joint Treasurers for the time being, indorsed on the said Mortgage Deed, shall be a good and sufficient discharge of the said Governors and their Successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof, and that upon receipt of the said sum, so to be borrowed as aforesaid, the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us, at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient, towards effecting the said proposed improvements at the Episcopal House of Residence aforesaid.

keep insured the said Episcopal House of Residence, the said insurance to be for a sum of not less than £9,560, and to be effected in one or more of the public offices of insurance in London or Westminster to be approved by us, and that in case of loss or damage by fire to the same Episcopal House of Residence the moneys receivable in respect of such insurance shall be paid over to us by the said Bishop, and shall, with any interest or accumulation thereon, be applied by us in rebuilding or repairing the same Episcopal House of Residence with the concurrence of the said Bishop.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the herein-before mentioned Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Leicester, of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Philip, Leicester, and of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint John the Baptist, Knighton, both in the said County and Diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several Churches of such New Parishes:

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Leicester, of the said New Parish of Saint Philip, Leicester, and of the said New Parish of Saint John the Baptist, Knighton, should be formed into a Consolidated Chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said Church of Saint James, Leicester, situate as aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Frank Theodore, Bishop of Peterborough, as such Bishop, and also as the Patron, in right of his See, as well of the Vicarage of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Leicester, as of the Vicarage of the said New Parish of Saint John the Baptist, Knighton, and with the consents of the Venerable John Edward Stocks, Clerk in Holy Orders, Archdeacon of the Archdeaconry of Leicester, of the Reverend Edward Lloyd Simpson, Clerk in Holy Orders, Vicar or Incumbent of the Vicarage of the Parish of Evington, in the said County and Diocese, of the Reverend Frederick Papprell, Clerk in Holy Orders, Vicar or Incumbent of the Vicarage of the New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Leicester, in the said County and Diocese, of William Thornley, of Stoneygate, Leicester, Esquire, and of Frederick Samuel Shipp, of Bradenham, Knighton Park Road, Leicester, Esquire, as the Patrons of the Vicarage of the said New Parish of Saint Philip, Leicester (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this Representation), We, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Leicester, of the said New Parish of Saint Philip, Leicester, and of the said New Parish of Saint John the Baptist, Knighton, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the *Map* or *Plan* hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one Consolidated Chapelry for the said Church of Saint James, Leicester, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint James, Leicester.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal Consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint James, Leicester, comprising:—

"All those contiguous portions of the New Parish (sometime Consolidated Chapelry) of Saint Peter, Leicester, of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Philip, Leicester, and of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint John the Baptist, Knighton, all in the County of Leicester, and in the Diocese of Peterborough, which, taken together, are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the junction of Granville Road, London Road, and St. Albans Road, where the boundaries of the New Parish of All Souls, Leicester, the New Parish of Saint John, Leicester, (both in the said County and Diocese), and the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Leicester, all meet, and extending thence first north-eastward and then eastward along the middle of St. Albans Road for a distance of 7 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Churchill Street, and extending thence northward along the middle of Churchill Street for a distance of 6½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Upper Tichborne Street, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Upper Tichborne Street for a distance of 10 chains or thereabouts to its junction with St. Stephen's Road, and extending thence northward along the middle of St. Stephen's Road for a distance of 2½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Biddulph Street, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Biddulph Street for a distance of 12½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Laurel Road, and extending thence northward along the middle of Laurel Road for a distance of 5½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with St. Peter's Road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of St. Peter's Road, (thereby passing at the junction of St. Peter's Road and Mere Road the point where the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Leicester, the New Parish of Saint Stephen, North Evington, in the said County and Diocese, and the said New Parish of Saint Philip, Leicester, all meet), for a distance of 7½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with East Park Road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of East Park Road for a distance of 19½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Evington Road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Evington Road for a distance of 14 yards or thereabouts to its junction with Dashwood Road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Dashwood Road for a distance of 7½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Devana Road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Devana Road for a distance of 5 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Lyme Road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Lyme Road for a distance of 2½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Kimberley Road, at or near the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Philip, Leicester, from the said New Parish of Saint John the Baptist, Knighton, and continuing thence south-westward in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of 5 chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of Stanley Road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Stanley Road for a distance of 8½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with London Road, and extending thence north-

westward along the middle of London Road (thereby crossing the boundary of the said New Parish of Saint John the Baptist, Knighton, and following in part the boundary which divides the said New Parish of All Souls, Leicester, from the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Leicester) for a distance of 29½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Granville Road and St. Albans Road where the boundaries of the said New Parish of All Souls, Leicester, the said New Parish of Saint John, Leicester, and the said New Parish of Saint Peter, Leicester, all meet, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

The following Statutes made by the Governing Body of Pembroke College, Cambridge, on the 4th day of May, 1918, have been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions of "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

STATUTES to alter and amend the Statutes of the College of Valence-Mary, commonly called Pembroke College, in the University of Cambridge, which amending Statutes were duly made at a Meeting of the Governing Body of the College, specially summoned for the purpose, and held on the 4th day of May, 1918, and having been passed at such Meeting by the votes of more than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting, are now submitted for the approval of His Majesty The King in Council.

We, the Master or Keeper and Fellows and Scholars of the said College, in exercise of the powers given to us by the 54th Section of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, do hereby alter and amend the existing Statutes of our said College in manner following:—

By repealing in Chapter III, intituled "Of the Fellows," Section 18, and substituting therefor the following Section to form an amended Section 18:—

"18. Subject as hereinafter provided a Fellowship shall be tenable for the period of 6 years from the day of admission."

By adding to the same Chapter, and inserting therein between Section 18 as amended and Section 19, the following Sections to form Sections 18A and 18B:—

"18A. If at the time of election the majority of those persons present at the General College Meeting to be held under Section 7 for the purpose of electing a Fellow so determine a Fellow

may be elected in the first instance for a period of 3 years, and the tenure of such Fellowship may be extended by one or more periods of not less than one year each up to a total period of not more than 6 years in all except as herein after provided under Sections 19A and 20 of this Chapter.

The Society may either at the time of election, or at any subsequent date during the continuance of a Fellowship held under this Section, make it a condition that the Fellow elected shall from the date of his admission or from any subsequent date that may be fixed perform such duties in College or do such work as the Society shall require, and also may make it a condition, or if so desired a further condition, that during full term such Fellow shall live in his rooms in College and not be absent more than two nights in each week except for a reason and to an extent to be sanctioned at a College Meeting.

On any breach of a condition so to be imposed the Society shall have power to declare the Fellowship vacant."

"18B. The order for the extension of a Fellowship held under the last preceding Section may be made at any time during the last year of the original period of 3 years, or within 3 months after the expiration of such period; and where extension has already taken place, within the year or the last year of extension, or within 3 months after the expiration of the period of extension, and (if occasion shall require) such order when made shall have retrospective effect.

An order for extension under this Statute shall require a majority similar to that required for re-election under Section 20A of this Chapter."

By repealing Section 19 of the same Chapter, and substituting therefor the following Section to form an amended Section 19:—

"19. In computing with reference to any Fellowship the period of 6 years mentioned in Section 18 of this Chapter (except a Fellowship held under Section 18A of this Chapter) any year during which the Fellow shall have been engaged in what the Society shall by resolution, to be passed by a majority of at least two-thirds of the Members of the Society present at the Audit Meeting next after the expiration of that year, recognize as College or University work of importance shall be treated as only half a year."

By repealing Section 20B of the same Chapter, and substituting the following Section to form an amended Section 20B:—

"20B. On the occasion of making an order for the extension of a Fellowship under Section 18A, or the re-election of a Fellow under Sections 19A and 20A of this Chapter, the Junior Fellow present and voting shall vote first and the rest of the Fellows in ascending order according to their seniority and the Chairman shall vote last.

The majority required for an order of extension shall be the same as that required under Section 20A for re-election."

By repealing Section 20C of the same Chapter, and substituting therefor the following Section to form an amended Section 20C:—

"20C. A Fellow shall not be present at any College Meeting during such time as the extension of his Fellowship under Sections 18A and 19 of this Chapter, or his re-election to a Fellowship under Section 20, shall be under

discussion, but if he shall have previously been present he shall withdraw from the Meeting during that time. In the voting however his vote shall be counted as if it had been given in his own favour."

By repealing Section 20D of the same Chapter, and substituting therefor the following Section to form an amended Section 20D:—

"20D. A Fellow whose Fellowship shall be extended under Section 18A of this Chapter, or who shall be re-elected during the last year before the expiration of his Fellowship, or within 3 months after such expiration, shall enjoy all the rights, privileges, and emoluments of his Fellowship as from the day of expiration. It shall not be necessary for him to be admitted afresh to his Fellowship under Section 16 of this Chapter, and he shall retain his seniority among the Fellows.

The following Statutes made by the Governing Body of Trinity College, Cambridge, on the 8th day of June, 1918, and sealed on the 18th day of June, 1918, have been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions of "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877."

STATUTES to alter and amend the Statutes of Trinity College, in the University of Cambridge, which amending Statutes were duly made at a College Meeting, being a Meeting of the Governing Body of the College specially summoned for this purpose, held on the 8th day of June, 1918, and, having been passed at such meeting by the votes of more than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting, are now submitted for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council.

We, the Master, Fellows, and Scholars of Trinity College, in the University of Cambridge, in exercise of the powers given to us by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, do hereby alter and amend the existing Statutes of our said College in the manner following:—

I. By adding to Statute VI A intituled "The Ely Fellowships" the following Section to form Section 5 of the same Statute:—

"5. Provided always that so long as the Allen estate is kept as a separate fund

(i) If in the opinion of the Council the income of the fund is insufficient to maintain the number of Ely fellowships already founded they shall have power at their discretion to suspend, for such period as they shall think fit, or to suppress altogether, any Ely fellowship which may be or may become vacant.

(ii) No payment shall be made to the Suspended Fellowship Fund in respect of any Ely fellowship which shall have been suspended under any of the provisions contained in these Statutes."

II. By adding after Statute XV intituled "Tenure and Vacating of Fellowships" the

following Statute to form Statute XV A of the said Statutes:—

“ XV A. TEMPORARY PROVISIONS FOR PROLONGATION OF FELLOWSHIPS.

“ In the case of any Fellow elected under the title (a) and not holding or having held any of the qualifying offices specified in these Statutes who at any time during his tenure of the fellowship shall have been engaged during the present War in the naval or military service of the Crown, or in some other service of the Crown connected with the present War, or in any work abroad of the British Red Cross Society, the St. John Ambulance Association, or any body with similar objects, or been made a prisoner of War, the following provisions shall apply (anything to the contrary contained in these Statutes notwithstanding) that is to say:—

“(i) If such Fellow shall not have actually vacated his fellowship before the approval of this Statute by His Majesty in Council he shall retain his fellowship subject to the conditions hereinafter contained concerning the same after the date at which it would otherwise be vacated for an additional period equal to the whole period of his said service, work, or imprisonment, subsequent to the date of his election, and shall vacate it at the end of such additional period unless he shall then hold one of the said qualifying offices, or be, under any other of the provisions of these Statutes, entitled to retain his fellowship.

“(ii) If he shall have actually vacated his fellowship before the approval of this Statute by His Majesty in Council the Council may, at their discretion, re-elect him to a fellowship for the remainder of the period for which he would have retained his fellowship if this Statute had been so approved before he vacated it: and he shall, if so re-elected, hold such fellowship subject to the conditions hereinafter contained concerning the same, and shall vacate it at the end of the period for which he was so re-elected unless he shall then hold one of the said qualifying offices, or be, under any other of the provisions of these Statutes, entitled to retain his fellowship.

“(iii) Any Fellow holding a fellowship which he has retained, or to which he has been re-elected, under the foregoing provisions shall be and remain a Fellow to all intents and purposes and enjoy all the benefits and advantages of his fellowship save and except that he shall not be entitled to any dividend. Provided always:—

“(a) that if he hold one of the said qualifying offices he shall be entitled to his proper dividend from the beginning of his tenure of any such qualifying office;

“(b) that if he be permitted by the Council to retain his fellowship by reason of being engaged in the systematic study of some important branch of literature or science under the provisions in that behalf in these Statutes contained he shall be entitled to his proper dividend from such date as the Council shall direct.

“(iv) For computing at any time the number of vacant fellowships every fellowship held under the provisions of this Statute shall be regarded as vacant so long as the holder thereof is not entitled to a dividend.

“(v) If any Fellow holding his fellowship under the provisions of this Statute becomes entitled to a dividend at a time when there is no vacant fellowship his fellowship shall until

a vacancy occurs be deemed to be a temporary additional fellowship and the cost thereof shall be met as far as possible out of the Suspended Fellowship Fund.”

III. By repealing Section 1 of Statute XXI intituled “ The Entrance Scholars,” and substituting therefor the following Section to form an amended Section 1 of the same Statute:—

“ 1. There shall be 8 or more Entrance Scholars chosen every year at some time to be fixed by the Council if in the opinion of the Board of Electors hereinafter mentioned there shall be so many candidates who deserve to be elected. The entrance scholarships shall be open to all persons who have not yet commenced residence in the University, and are of such age, not exceeding nineteen years, on the first day of October preceding the election as the Council shall from time to time determine. They shall be tenable for 2 years from the time of commencing residence but no longer unless they are prolonged by the Council. Such prolongation may be granted at any time not less than 6 months after the Scholar shall have commenced residence, and may be for any period not exceeding one year after the expiration of the 2 years for which the Scholar was originally elected. An entrance scholarship shall not be tenable with a senior scholarship.”

IV. By adding to Statute L intituled “ The Suspended Fellowship Fund ” the following Section to form Section 2 of the same Statute:—

“ 2. If and whenever the value of the fund shall exceed £2,000 such excess or any part of it may be transferred to any special fund other than the Reserve Fund or appropriated to any special purpose of the College at the discretion of the Council. Provided always that no moneys so transferred or appropriated shall be applied as part of the current income of the College to the payment of the ordinary expenses, stipends, or salaries, or the fixed payments mentioned in the Statute for the Distribution of Revenues, or to the payment of dividends other than the dividends of temporary additional fellowships.”

THE COAL (PIT'S MOUTH) PRICES ORDER, DATED THE 21ST DAY OF JUNE, 1918, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER THE PRICE OF COAL (LIMITATION) ACT, 1915, AND UNDER REGULATIONS 2F, 2J AND 2JJ OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

Whereas the Board of Trade are satisfied that special circumstances affect all the coal mines in the United Kingdom,

And whereas the Board of Trade deem it expedient to make further exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations for the purpose of maintaining and regulating the supply of coal,

Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by Section 1, Sub-section 2, of the Price of Coal (Limitation) Act, 1915, and by Regulations 2F, 2J and 2JJ of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, the Board of Trade hereby order as follows:—

1. For the standard amount of 4s. fixed by Section 1, Sub-section 2, of the Price of Coal (Limitation) Act, 1915, there shall be substituted in the case of mines in the South Wales and Monmouthshire and Forest of Dean districts a standard amount of eleven shillings and sixpence, and in the case of mines situated elsewhere a standard amount of nine shillings.

2. The price at which coal may be sold or offered for sale at the pit's mouth for use in the United Kingdom shall be the price at which coal of the same description was sold in similar quantities and under similar conditions affecting the sale at the pit's mouth at the same coal mine on the corresponding date (or as near thereto as having regard to the course of business may be practicable) in the twelve months

ended the thirtieth day of June, nineteen hundred and fourteen, increased by the amounts mentioned in paragraph 1, and such price shall be both the maximum and, unless the Controller of Coal Mines in any particular case otherwise orders, the minimum price. The price of all such coal dispatched from the colliery on or after the 24th June under any existing contract shall be increased accordingly.

3. Where in consequence of this Order the price paid or to be paid by any person to whom coal is or has been sold is increased the price paid or to be paid by any person to whom the coal is or has been sold in pursuance of any subsidiary contract shall be increased by the same amount and all contracts for the purchase and sale of coal shall remain in force subject to such modification as aforesaid.

4. This Order shall come into force on the 24th day of June, 1918, and may be cited as the Coal (Pit's Mouth) Prices Order, 1918.

1918.

mohair, which are now situated on or in any
quay or warehouse in the United Kingdom, or
may arrive in the United Kingdom, after the
date hereof, or at prices exceeding the prices
indicated in the Schedule hereto annexed, or
at such other prices as in any particular case
may be allowed by or on behalf of the Director
of Raw Materials.

2. No person shall without a permit issued
by or on behalf of the Director of Raw Mate-
rials, deliver for shipment to any place outside
the United Kingdom any bands of the descrip-
tion aforesaid.

3. It shall be the duty of any person having
in his possession, custody, or control any bands
of the description aforesaid to cause them to
be removed from the bales in such manner as
may be directed by or on behalf of the Director
of Raw Materials.

4. It shall be the duty of any person having
in his possession, custody, or control any
bands of the description aforesaid to furnish
such particulars as to his business as may be
required by or on behalf of the Director of
Raw Materials.

5. It shall be the duty of all persons to
comply strictly with the provisions hereof, and
with any requirement or direction made or
given by or on behalf of the Director of Raw
Materials for the purposes hereof, and any
person failing to comply with any such pro-
vision, requirement, or direction shall be
guilty of an offence against the said Regula-
tions.

SCOTLAND NORTH-EAST COAST, WITH ORKNEY AND SHETLAND ISLES.

Former Notices.—Nos. 762, 888, 1024, 1129 and 1248 of 1917; Nos. 9, 153, 319, 454, 553 and 676 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

(1) *Pentland and Moray Firths—Restriction of Traffic; Pilotage Regulations.*

The following regulations have been made with a view to safeguarding the interests of shipping in the Pentland and Moray firths:—

I.—RESTRICTION OF TRAFFIC.

1. No vessel, either British, Allied or Neutral, is to be in the shaded area on the accompanying portion of Admiralty Chart No. 2, from half an hour after sunset to half an hour before sunrise, unless at anchor. No vessel, however, is to anchor:—

(a) Anywhere along the coast between Tarbet ness and North Sutor, except within one mile radius of Balintore;

(b) Anywhere off the south shore of the Moray firth between the meridians of Port Gordon and Burghead, except within three-quarters of a mile of the low-water mark;

(c) Outside a distance of one mile of the coast in any other portion of the shaded area.

Notwithstanding the above order a limited number of fishing drifters are allowed to fish at night by special permit within certain areas in the Moray firth.

2. Vessels proceeding to ports in the Moray firth should endeavour to enter the firth in time to reach their destinations not later than half-an-hour after sunset. Should they not reach their destinations by that time they are to anchor, weather permitting, subject to the restrictions given in clause 1.

3. Any vessel contravening the foregoing regulations will run the gravest risk of being sunk.

Caution.—Neutral or Allied vessels are particularly warned that the passage through the Pentland firth presents very grave risks to a Westbound vessel and are strongly advised not to take it.

II.—PILOTAGE REGULATIONS.

1. Pilotage is compulsory at the ports of Cromarty and Inverness for all vessels (includ-

ing fishing vessels) which have a draught of over eight feet, and it is highly dangerous for any vessel to enter or leave without a pilot. Fishing and other small vessels having a draught of over eight feet are to assemble at the Pilotage stations, and will be conducted into and out of port in groups.

Vessels bound for Cromarty and Inverness will be led through the defences from a position off Tarbet ness by a pilot boat. They should follow directly astern of her.

Local arrangements for leading vessels through the defences will be made for vessels leaving Cromarty or Inverness.

2. It is dangerous for any vessel to be under way to the south-westward of a line joining Tarbet ness and Findhorn without a pilot.

3. No vessels of any description other than H.M. Ships and Auxiliaries are to be under way between sunset and sunrise in the waters contained between a line drawn from Tarbet ness to Findhorn, and a line drawn from Fort George to Chanonry point.

(2) *Orkney Isles—Traffic Regulations.*

I.—SCAPA FLOW AND APPROACHES.

1. All entrances are dangerous, and entry is absolutely prohibited by any of them except as provided in succeeding paragraphs.

2. Examination services have been established in the entrances to Hoxa and Hoy sounds; vessels directed to enter must communicate with the Examination vessel and follow the instructions received from her very carefully.

3. No vessel is permitted to approach the entrance to Hoxa sound within a radius of 5 miles under any circumstances whatever, except when actually ordered to Scapa Flow.

4. The only vessels permitted to enter Hoy sound from the westward are those ordered to Stromness.

5. Vessels are not permitted to enter Hoxa or Hoy sounds by night or in thick weather.

6. Passage through Cantick sound is entirely prohibited.

II.—PORT OF KIRK WALL AND APPROACHES.

1. The port of Kirkwall shall comprise all enclosed waters of the Wide Firth and Kirkwall bay to westward of Thieves holm.

2. Merchant vessels shall obey all orders given them by the Admiralty Port Officer as regards anchoring or shifting position.

3. No vessel other than H.M. Ships shall enter or leave the Port of Kirkwall during hours of darkness, *i.e.*, between half an hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise, except in special circumstances with special permission from the Admiralty Port Officer.

4. During foggy and thick weather, traffic in and out of the port is stopped, and no vessel shall approach the boom from either direction.

5. No vessel other than H.M. Ships or boat shall move in the harbour during hours of darkness as aforesaid. And no boat other than those belonging to H.M. Ships shall approach the shore or go alongside any pier in the Port of Kirkwall.

6. All vessels other than H.M. Ships entering or leaving the Port of Kirkwall shall be piloted in and out by a Pilot drifter, and are prohibited from entering or leaving harbour unless so piloted, save and except only, (1) in the case of such British vessels as have a written exemption therefrom, issued by the Admiralty Port Officer, (2) when a liner is entering the

harbour, the Pilot may at his discretion, when circumstances of tide and sea render it advisable, direct such liner to enter the harbour without being piloted, provided always that the gate is open for incoming traffic.

7. Vessels, when cleared, shall wait for the Pilot vessel to conduct them out of port, or proceed as directed by the Naval Authorities.

8. Drifters engaged on pilot duty will fly the pilot flag (white and red, horizontal).

9. Incoming and outgoing traffic will be regulated by signals hoisted at the yardarm of

Gate "Open for Outgoing Traffic":

By day—A cone, point upwards.

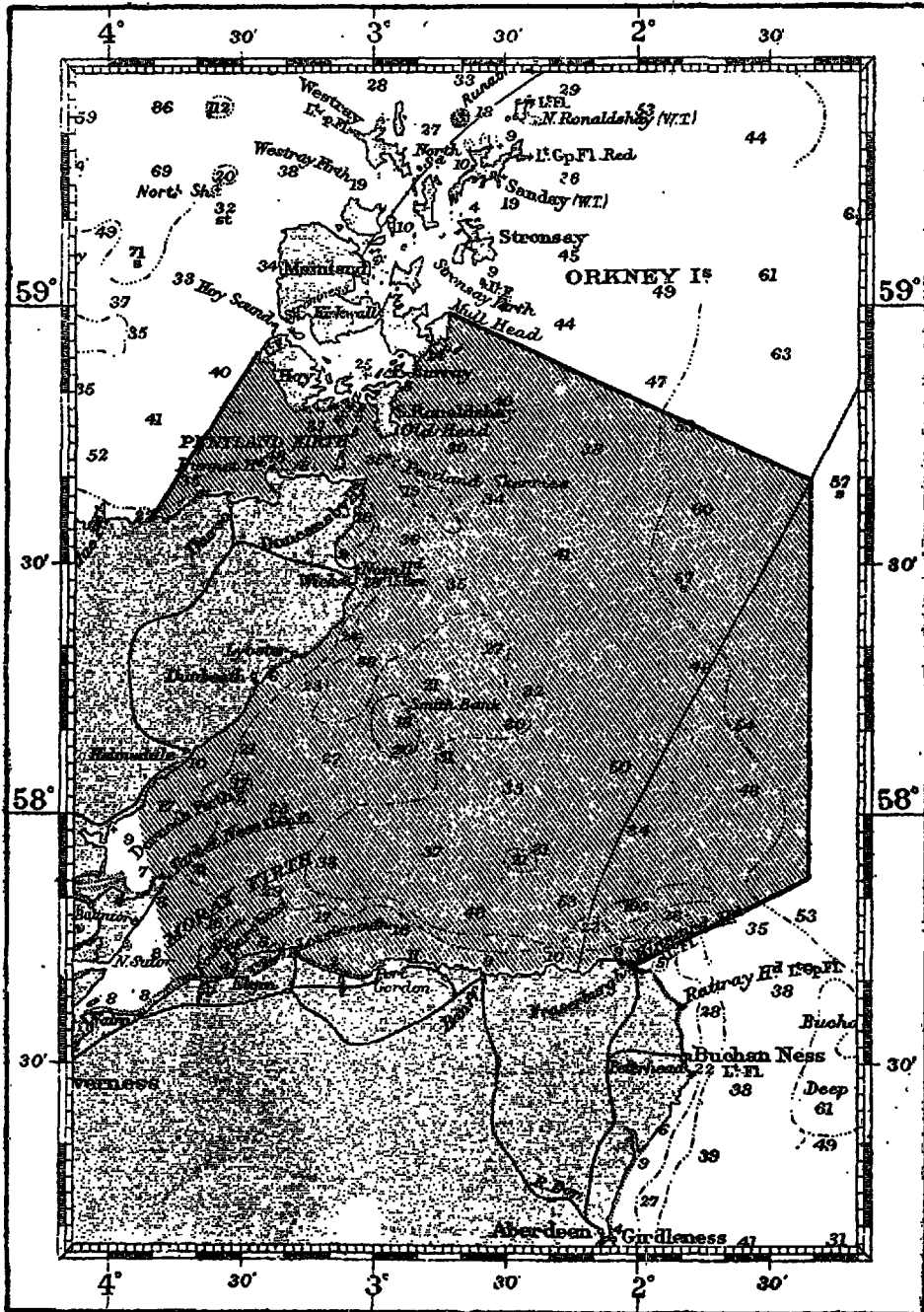
By night—A green light.

Gate Closed: By day—Three balls at Hellier holm.

By night—Three red lights at Hellier holm.

12. Vessels entering will, as a rule, be given priority over those leaving.

13. All outgoing vessels shall pass round the Turning buoy (red and white striped, spherical) moored approximately 285° (*N. 56^{\circ}* *W. Mag.*), one mile from the entrance.



the Boom trawler and repeated at the Hellier holm lighthouse.

10. Traffic signals are to be strictly obeyed, and no vessel shall approach the entrance against the signal.

11. The following Traffic signals will be displayed at the Boom and at Hellier holm:—

Gate "Open for Incoming Traffic":

By day—Two balls, vertical.

By night—A red light.

14. Incoming vessels will not pass round the Turning buoy, but will shape course as requisite for the anchorage on entering.

15. No outgoing vessel shall pass the Turning buoy, unless the signal for outgoing traffic is up. If the signal is against it, such vessel shall stop and wait in the neighbourhood of the Turning buoy.

16. No incoming vessel shall pass Hellier holm, unless the signal for incoming traffic is up at Hellier holm. If the signal is against it, such vessel shall wait in Shapinsay sound.

17. Incoming and outgoing vessels shall not pass through the gate simultaneously. If, through any misunderstanding, an outgoing and an incoming ship are approaching the gate simultaneously, then the outgoing ship shall give way, and shall turn round, and return to the Turning buoy and there wait till such time as the entrance is clear.

18. As a rule only one ship will be conducted out at a time, but under exceptional circumstances, in the event of two ships being conducted out, then the pilot will give instructions as to which ship is to go first and the rear ship shall then keep a full half-mile directly astern, and is on no account to close or over-haul or attempt to pass the ship ahead.

19. *Caution.*—Caution is necessary when approaching the boom, as the tidal stream does not set fairly through the opening and attains considerable velocity especially on the ebb or west-going stream, which sets in a north-westerly direction.

Variation.—19° W.

(3) *Shetland Isles—Traffic of Neutral Vessels Prohibited.*

No vessels other than those of British Nationality or those of the Allied Nations, except vessels calling for the purpose of Examination, shall enter any ports or harbours in, or anchor off any part of, the coasts of the Shetland Isles until further notice.

Note.—Special traffic regulations for the Port of Lerwick and approaches will be found in Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 767 of 1917.

Port of Inverness and Approaches—Traffic Regulations.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, No. 307 64.

1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

1. All Merchant Vessels, including Fishing Craft, are to speak the Examination Vessel off Cromarty, and are to obtain permission from her to proceed into the Port of Inverness, the seaward entrances to which are dangerous.

2. Merchant Vessels shall obey all orders given them by the Naval Port Authorities as regards anchoring or shifting berth.

3. Vessels proceeding in the same direction must not attempt to overtake and pass a vessel ahead in any of the Channels in the Firth, or within the seaward entrances of the North and South Channels.

This is not intended to apply to small fishing craft, and vessels of similar size, which must carefully observe the rule of the road whilst keeping out of the way of larger vessels.

4. No vessel (other than H.M. Ships and allied Men-of-War) or boat shall without special permission move in or approach the Port during the hours of official Night, and no boat (other than those belonging to H.M. Ships and allied Men-of-War) shall without special permission approach the shore or go alongside any pier or wharf in the Port of Inverness.

5. Pilotage is compulsory for all vessels of 8 feet draught and over (other than H.M. Ships and allied Men-of-War) entering or leaving the Port of Inverness, unless otherwise ordered by the Naval Authorities.

6. Vessels, when cleared, shall wait for the orders from Naval Authorities before leaving.

7. Drifters engaged on Inverness Pilotage Duty will fly the Pilot Flag and will be stationed at the Examination Anchorage off Cromarty, and all vessels arriving are to close the drifter flying this flag, after speaking the Examination Vessel, and obey any orders they may receive.

8. Incoming and outgoing traffic will be regulated by Signals hoisted at Fort George and on the Control Vessel stationed seaward of the entrance to the Port.

9. Traffic Signals are to be strictly obeyed, and no Vessel shall approach the Entrances when the Signals displayed are not in her favour, and no outgoing Vessel is to approach Chanonry Point within half a mile whilst the Signals are against her.

10. Vessels proceeding with the tidal stream will, as a rule, be given priority over those proceeding against the tidal stream, but the Signals are equally applicable to all Vessels, entering or leaving the harbour, and they are only to use the Channel between the light-buoys defining the Ship Passages.

11. Incoming and outgoing Vessels shall not pass through the Ship Passages simultaneously. If, through any misunderstanding an outgoing and an incoming Ship are approaching the Ship Passages simultaneously, then the Ship proceeding against the tidal stream shall give way and wait until the entrance is clear.

12. Vessels are to pass through the Ship Passages at a speed not exceeding 12 knots.

13. Inward-bound Vessels, with special permission to be under way in Inverness Firth and Approaches during the hours of official Night, when within 3 miles of the Whistle Buoy off Cromarty and until they arrive at their

anchorage within the Port of Inverness are to exhibit Navigation Lights (with the exception of a stern light, which is not to be shown), dimmed as provided for in Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 689 of 1918, or any subsequent revision or re-publication thereof.

Outgoing Vessels are to carry similar lights which are to be extinguished as soon as they are past Cromarty.

14. All Vessels under way within the limits of the Port of Inverness are to exhibit Navigation Lights during the daylight hours, when owing to mist or other weather conditions the visibility is sufficiently low to render such a course desirable.

15. Vessels at anchor in the Port of Inverness and Approaches are to obey all orders given them by the Naval Authorities as to the exhibition or obscuring of riding lights and darkening of ships.
