Prohibiting the Exportation from the United Kingdom to Switzerland of

CERTAIN ARTICLES.

GEORGE R.I.

W HEREAS it is provided by Section one of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, that We may by Proclamation prohibit the exportation of all or any of the following articles, namely, arms, ammunition, military or naval stores, and any article which We shall judge capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of arms, ammunition, or military or naval stores, to any country or place therein named whenever We shall judge such prohibition to be expedient in order to prevent such arms, ammunition,
