## The MONEY LENDERS ACT, 1900.

## Renewal of Order of Exemption.

**I**N pursuance of the powers conferred upon the Board of Trade by section 6 (e) of the Money Lenders Act, 1900, the Board of Trade do hereby order that the People's Bank Limited, of Bentinck Buildings, Wheeler-gate, Nottingham, being a body corporate exempted by an Order of the Board of Trade, dated the 22nd day of September, 1915, from registration as a Money Lender under the provisions of the above mentioned Act for a period of three years from the 1st day of October, 1915, the date of the publication of the said order in the London Gazette, be exempted from registration for a further period of three years from the date of the publication of this order in the London Gazette, or until earlier revocation of this order by the Board of Trade.—Dated this 23rd day of September, 1918.
