A PROCLAMATION

REVOKING A PROCLAMATION, DATED THE 21ST DAY OF DECEMBER, 1917, RELATING TO THE IMPORTATION OF CERTAIN ARTICLES INTO THE UNITED KINGDOM.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation, dated the twenty-first day of December, 1917, made in pursuance of Section 43 of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, We thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to prohibit the importation into the United Kingdom of all bonds, debentures, stock or share certificates, scrip and other documents of title relating to any stocks, shares or other securities; with the exception of matured bonds redeemable in the United Kingdom and coupons falling due for payment in the United Kingdom, and of any such goods imported under licence given by or on behalf of Our Treasury, and subject to the provisions and conditions of such licence:

And whereas it appears to Us that the said Proclamation should be revoked:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby proclaim, direct and ordain, that the said Proclamation of the twenty-first day of December, 1917, shall be, and the same is hereby, revoked.

Given at Our Court at *Buckingham Palace*, this Eighteenth day of *August*, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and nineteen, and in the Tenth year of Our Reign.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by virtue of the Aliens Restriction Act, 1914, His Majesty is empowered to make Orders in Council imposing restrictions on aliens:

And whereas His Majesty in exercise of the powers conferred upon Him by that Act has been pleased to impose restrictions by the Aliens Restriction Order upon aliens and to make various provisions for carrying those restrictions into effect:

And whereas it is provided by the said Act that His Majesty may by Order in Council revoke or add to any Order in Council made thereunder:

And whereas it is now expedient to revoke the said Aliens Restriction Order and to substitute therefor the provisions hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

PART I.

ADMISSION OF ALIENS.

1.—(1) An alien coming from outside the United Kingdom shall not land in the United Kingdom except with the leave of an immigration officer.

(2) Leave shall not be given to a former enemy alien to land in the United Kingdom

except by permission of the Secretary of State.

(3) Leave shall not be given to an alien to land in the United Kingdom unless he complies with the following conditions, that is to say:

(a) he is in a position to support himself and his dependents;

(b) being desirous of entering the service of an employer in the United Kingdom he produces a permit in writing for his engagement issued to the employer by the Minister of Labour;

(c) he is not a lunatic, idiot, or mentally deficient;

(d) he is not the subject of a certificate given to the immigration officer by a medical inspector that for medical reasons it is undesirable that the alien should be permitted to land;

(e) he has not been sentenced in a foreign country for any extradition crime within the meaning of the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906;

(f) he is not the subject of a deportation order in force under the Aliens Restriction Act, 1914, or any Order in Council thereunder, or of an expulsion order under the Aliens Act, 1905;

(g) he has not been prohibited from landing by the Secretary of State;

(h) he fulfils such other requirements as may be prescribed by any general or special instructions of the Secretary of State.

(4) An immigration officer may in accordance with general or special directions of the Secretary of State attach such conditions as he may think fit to the grant of permission to an alien to land, and the alien shall comply with the conditions so attached.

(5) For the purposes of this Part of this Order the Isle of Man shall not be deemed to be outside the United Kingdom.

2.—(1) An alien coming from outside the United Kingdom shall not land in the United Kingdom elsewhere than at an approved port.

(2) For the purposes of this Order the ports specified in the Second Schedule to this Order shall within the limits defined therein be approved ports.

(3) The Secretary of State may by order add any port to the list of approved ports or remove any port from that list and prescribe or alter the limits of any approved port and this Order shall thereupon have effect accordingly.

3.—(1) An immigration officer or a medical inspector may inspect any alien seeking to land in the United Kingdom, and any such inspection shall be made as soon as practicable after his arrival.

(2) For the purpose of any such inspection an alien may land subject to such conditions as may be imposed either by an immigration officer or by the Secretary of State and any alien on whom any such condition is imposed shall not, for the purposes of this Order, be deemed to have landed so long as the conditions are complied with. An alien conditionally landed may, however, be detained in the prescribed manner, and whilst so detained shall be deemed to be in legal custody. The Secretary of State may prescribe for security to be given by the owners, agents, or master of the ship in the case of aliens conditionally landed.

(3) An alien landing in contravention of this Order and an alien arriving at any port other than an approved port may, until dealt with under this Order, be detained in such manner as the Secretary of State may direct,

and whilst so detained shall be deemed to be in legal custody.

(4) Where leave to land is refused to an alien and the ship in which he arrived is not leaving the port of arrival within 48 hours the alien may with the leave of an immigration officer be placed temporarily on shore and detained at some place approved by the Secretary of State, and whilst so detained shall be deemed to be in legal custody.

An alien so placed on shore shall not for the purpose of this Order be deemed to have landed, and shall on the first opportunity be removed from the United Kingdom by the owners, agents or master (as the Secretary of State may direct) of the ship in which he arrived.

4. Nothing in this Part of this Order shall prevent the landing in the United Kingdom of any alien who satisfies an immigration officer either—

(i) that he holds a prepaid ticket to some destination out of the United Kingdom and that the master or owner of the ship in which he arrived in or by which he is to leave the United Kingdom has given security to the satisfaction of the Secretary of State that, except for the purposes of transit or in other circumstances approved by the Secretary of State, the alien will not remain in, or having been rejected by another country will not re-enter, the United Kingdom, and will be properly maintained and controlled during transit; or

(ii) that having taken his ticket in the United Kingdom and embarked direct therefrom for some other country after a period of residence in the United Kingdom of not less than six months, he has been refused admission to that country and has returned direct therefrom to a port in the United Kingdom.

5. The master of any ship landing or embarking passengers coming from outside the United Kingdom at any port in the United Kingdom shall furnish to such person and in such manner as may be prescribed a return giving the prescribed particulars with respect to any passengers who are aliens, and any passenger shall furnish to the master of the ship any information required by him for the purpose of the return.

PART II.

SUPERVISION AND DEPORTATION OF ALIENS.

6.—(1) An alien shall comply with the following requirements as to registration:—

(a) He shall as soon as may be furnish to the registration officer of the registration district in which he is resident particulars as to the matters set out in the First Schedule to this Order, and shall, unless he gives a satisfactory explanation of the circumstances which prevent his doing so, produce to the registration officer either a passport furnished with a photograph and duly issued to him not more than five years previously or some other document satisfactorily establishing his nationality and identity;

(b) He shall furnish to the registration officer of the registration district in which he is resident particulars of any circumstance affecting in any manner the accuracy of the particulars previously furnished by him for the purpose of registration within seven days after the circumstance has occurred, and

generally shall supply to the registration officer all information (including where required by the registration officer a recent photograph) that may be necessary for maintaining the accuracy of the register kept under this Order;

(c) He shall, if he is about to change his residence, furnish to the registration officer of the registration district in which he is then resident particulars as to the date on which his residence is to be changed, and as to his intended place of residence, and on effecting any change of residence from one registration district to another he shall within forty-eight hours of his arrival in the registration district into which he moves report his arrival to the registration officer of that district;

(d) If at any time he is absent from his residence for a continuous period exceeding two months, he shall, on the expiration of the two months, forthwith report his current address to the registration officer of the district where he is for the time being, and shall, until he returns to his residence, report every change of address to the registration officer of the district of each new address. He shall also report his return to his residence to the registration officer of the district of his residence.

(e) He shall—

(i) On his registration obtain from the registration officer a registration certificate;

(ii) on every subsequent alteration or addition of any entry in the register relating to his registration produce the certificate to the registration officer in order that, if necessary, a corresponding alteration or addition may be made in the certificate;

(iii) produce the certificate upon demand to any police officer or immigration officer or to any other person authorized by the Secretary of State for the purpose.

(2) If an alien has no residence in the United Kingdom he shall report his presence in a registration district to the registration officer of the district, and conform to such instructions as to registration or otherwise as may be given him by that officer.

(3) If an alien who is required under this article to register or report is lodging with, or living as a member of the household of, any other person, it shall be the duty of that person to take steps, either by giving notice to the registration officer of the presence of the alien in his household or otherwise, to secure compliance with the terms of this Order in respect of the registration of or reporting by the alien.

(4) A registration certificate shall be in such form and shall contain such particulars as may be prescribed.

(5) The provisions of this article shall not apply to any person under the age of sixteen years or to any alien not resident in the United Kingdom who has been in the United Kingdom for a period of not more than one month since the date of his last arrival.

7.—(1) It shall be the duty of the keeper of any premises to which this article applies, to keep a register of all persons staying at the premises who are aliens not being under the age of sixteen years.

The keeper of any such premises shall, on

the arrival of any such alien at the premises, ascertain and enter or cause to be entered in the register kept for the purpose the name and nationality of such alien, together with the date of his arrival and the address from which he last came; and on the departure of any such alien the keeper of the premises shall enter or cause to be entered in the register the date of departure and destination on departure of the alien, and he shall also ascertain and enter in the register from time to time such other particulars as to the alien as may be prescribed.

(2) The keeper of any premises to which this article applies shall also, if directions for the purpose are issued by the Secretary of State, make to the registration officer of the registration district in which the premises are situate, such returns as to the persons staying at the premises, at such times or intervals, and in such form, as may be specified in such directions.

(3) It shall be the duty—

(a) of every person (whether an alien or not) staying at any premises to which this article applies to sign, when so required, a statement as to his nationality and, if an alien, to furnish and sign a statement of the particulars required under this article;

(b) of the keeper of any premises to which this article applies to require any person who stays at the premises to sign the statement and furnish the particulars required from him under this article and to preserve such statements for such period and in such manner as may be prescribed.

(4) Every register kept, and all particulars furnished, under this article, shall at all reasonable hours be open for inspection by any officer of police or by any person authorised by the Secretary of State.

(5) The Secretary of State may prescribe the form in which a register is to be kept or statements furnished under this article.

(6) This article applies to any premises where sleeping accommodation is provided for reward.

8.—(1) There shall be provided and maintained under the directions of the Secretary of State a central register of aliens in which there shall be registered such particulars in such form as may be prescribed.

(2) (a) For the purposes of this Order the chief officer of police of each police district shall be the registration officer for that district, and the police district shall be the registration district.

(b) A registration officer shall—

(i) keep for his registration district a register of the aliens resident therein and required to be registered under this Order, and enter in the register particulars as to the matters set out in the First Schedule to this Order, and such other particulars and in such form as may be prescribed; and

(ii) furnish to the Secretary of State for the purposes of the central register at such time and in such manner as may be prescribed copies of all entries in the register or such of them as may be prescribed; and

(iii) supply registration certificates to aliens in accordance with the provisions of this Order and on such terms as to payment or otherwise as may be prescribed.

9.—(1) The Secretary of State, on the recommendation of the Admiralty, Army

Council, or Air Council, may by order declare any area to be a protected area.

(2) The Secretary of State may as to any protected area by order—

(i) prohibit any alien or any class of aliens from entering or remaining in the area;

(ii) impose on any alien or class of aliens entering or being in the area such conditions or restrictions as he may think fit as to (a) registration with or reporting to the police or any naval, military, or air-force authority, (b) surveying or making sketches or photographs, (c) the use or possession of any machine, apparatus, or other article of any description, (d) the acquisition of land or any interest in land within the area, (e) any other matter or thing as to which he may deem it necessary in the interests of public safety to impose conditions or restrictions;

(iii) impose on any householder or other person the obligation to report to the police or any naval, military, or air-force authority, the presence of any alien in his household or in any premises occupied by him or under his control, and the departure of any such alien;

(iv) exempt from the restrictions imposed in respect of the area aliens or any class of aliens who pass through the area in the course of a continuous journey;

Provided that the Secretary of State may authorise, subject to any general or special directions, the registration officer to grant to any individual alien a special permit dispensing with compliance with any general order made under this section.

10.—(1) A chief officer of police, if so authorised by general or special order of the Secretary of State, may direct that any premises within his jurisdiction which, in his opinion, are used for the sale of refreshments to be consumed on the premises, or as a place of public resort or entertainment, or as a club, and which are or have recently been frequented by aliens, shall be either closed altogether or kept closed during such hours or for such purposes as may be required by him, if, in his opinion, either—

(a) the aliens so frequenting the premises are of criminal or disloyal associations or otherwise undesirable; or

(b) the premises are conducted in a disorderly or improper manner, or in a manner prejudicial to the public good; and if any premises are kept open in contravention of any such direction the occupier or person having control of the premises shall be deemed to have acted in contravention of this Order.

(2) Where any premises have been closed under this section the occupier or person having control of the premises shall not occupy or control any other premises which are used for the sale of refreshments or as a place of public resort or entertainment or as a club without the consent of the chief officer of police for the district in which the premises are situate.

(3) Any constable, if authorised by the chief officer of police, may, for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this article, enter, if necessary by force, and search or occupy any premises in respect to which an order under this article has been made by the Secretary of State.

11. The Secretary of State may by order impose on any alien or class of aliens such restrictions (either in addition to or in substitution for the other restrictions imposed by this Order)

as to residence, reporting to the police, registration, the use or possession of any machine, apparatus, arms and explosives, or other article, or otherwise, as he may deem to be necessary in the public interest, and any alien in relation to whom any such order is made shall comply with the terms of the order.

12.—(1) The Secretary of State may, if he deems it to be conducive to the public good, make an order (in this Order referred to as a deportation order) requiring an alien to leave and to remain thereafter out of the United Kingdom. The Secretary of State may, by a deportation order, require the alien to return to the country of which he is a subject or citizen.

(2) An order made under this article may be made subject to any condition which the Secretary of State may think proper.

(3) An alien with respect to whom a deportation order is made shall leave the United Kingdom for the destination and at the time prescribed by the order, and shall thereafter, so long as the order is in force, remain out of the United Kingdom.

(4) An alien with respect to whom a deportation order is made, may be detained in such manner as may be directed by the Secretary of State and may be placed on a ship about to leave the United Kingdom, and shall be deemed to be in legal custody whilst so detained, and until the ship, if British, reaches the port (if any) fixed by the Secretary of State or, whether British or foreign, finally leaves the United Kingdom.

(5) The master of a ship about to call at any port outside the United Kingdom shall, if so required by the Secretary of State or by an immigration officer, receive an alien against whom a deportation order has been made and his dependents, if any, on board the ship, and afford him and them a passage to that port and proper accommodation and maintenance during the passage.

13. Where a deportation order is made in the case of any alien, the Secretary of State may, if he thinks fit, apply any money or property of the alien in payment of the whole or any part of the expenses of or incidental to the voyage from the United Kingdom and the maintenance until departure of the alien and his dependents (if any).

PART III.

GENERAL.

14. The Secretary of State may direct that any person or class of persons shall be exempt either unconditionally or subject to such conditions as the Secretary of State may impose from all or any of the provisions of this Order.

15.—(1) Every person (other than a person under the age of sixteen years or an alien to whose landing Part I. of this Order does not apply) landing in the United Kingdom shall be in possession of a passport furnished with a photograph and duly issued not more than five years before the date of his arrival, or some other document establishing his nationality and identity to the satisfaction of an immigration officer.

(2) Every person landing or embarking in the United Kingdom shall furnish to an immigration officer such information in such manner as may be prescribed.

(3) This article shall not apply to any person not coming from or embarking for a place

(other than the Isle of Man) outside the United Kingdom.

16.—(1) Immigration officers for the purposes of this Order shall be appointed by a Secretary of State, and the Secretary of State may arrange with the Commissioners of Customs and Excise for the employment of officers of Customs and Excise as officers under this Order.

(2) Medical Inspectors for the purposes of this Order may be appointed by the Minister of Health with the concurrence of the Secretary of State, and shall in the exercise of their powers under this Order act under instructions issued by the Minister of Health with the concurrence of the Secretary of State.

(3) Subject to any such instructions, officers and inspectors appointed under this Order shall have power to enter or board any vessel, and to detain and examine any person arriving at or leaving any port in the United Kingdom who is reasonably supposed to be an alien, and to require the production of any documents by such person, and shall have such other powers and duties as are conferred upon them by or under this Order or as may be prescribed for giving effect to this Order.

17.—(1) The Secretary of State may make regulations for prescribing anything which is by this Order to be prescribed.

(2) Any order made, directions or instructions given, or conditions imposed by the Secretary of State or by any immigration officer or other person under this Order may be revoked or varied either wholly or in part by any subsequent order, direction, instruction, or condition.

18.—(1) If any person acts in contravention of, or fails to comply with, any provisions of this Order, or any order or rules made or conditions imposed thereunder, he shall be guilty of an offence against this Order.

(2) If any person aids or abets any person in any contravention of this Order, or knowingly harbours any person whom he knows or has reasonable ground for believing to have acted in contravention of this Order, he shall be guilty of an offence against this Order.

(3) Where a person lands in contravention of this Order, the master of the ship from which he lands shall, unless he proves the contrary, be deemed to have aided and abetted the offence.

(4) Any person shall be guilty of an offence against this Order if, in reply or in relation to any immigration officer, inspector, registration officer, or other person lawfully acting in the execution of the provisions of this Order, he—

(a) refuses to answer any question reasonably put to him or to produce any document in his possession; or

(b) makes or causes to be made any false return, false statement, or false representation; or

(c) alters any certificate or copy of a certificate or any entry made in pursuance of this Order; or

(d) obstructs or impedes that person in the exercise of his powers or duties under this Order; or

(e) without lawful authority uses or has in his possession any forged altered or irregular certificate, passport or other document.

(5) A person who is guilty of an offence against this Order shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding one hundred

pounds or to imprisonment, for a term not exceeding six months, and the court before which he is convicted may, either in addition to, or in lieu of any such punishment, require that person to enter into recognizances, with or without sureties, to comply with the provisions of this Order or any order or regulations made thereunder as the court may direct.

(6) If any person fails to comply with an order of the court requiring him to enter into recognizances, the court, or any court of summary jurisdiction sitting for the same place, may order him to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding six months.

(7) Sections six hundred and eighty-four, six hundred and eighty-five, and six hundred and eighty-six of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894 (which relate to the jurisdiction of courts and justices), shall apply with respect to jurisdiction under this Order as they apply with respect to jurisdiction under that Act, and section six hundred and ninety-three of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894 (which relates to the levying of sums ordered to be paid by distress on a ship), shall apply with respect to any fines or other sums of money to be paid under this Order by the master of a ship as it applies with respect to fines and other sums of money to be paid under that Act.

(8) Proceedings for an offence under this Order, which consists of making or of causing to be made any false statement, false representation, false return, or false information, or of furnishing or of causing to be furnished any false particulars, may be instituted at any time within two months after the statement, representation, return, information, or particulars, as the case may be, was or were discovered to be false.

(9) For the purpose of the trial of a person for any offence under this Order, the offence shall be deemed to have been committed either at the place in which the same actually was committed or at any place in which the offender may be.

(10) Where any offence under this Order consists of failure to comply with any of the provisions of this Order requiring any particulars to be furnished, or any report or return to be made, or any notice to be given, the offence shall, for the purposes of this Order, be deemed to have continued so long as such failure continues, whether or not any time is specified at or within which the particulars, report, return, or statement are to be furnished, made, or given.

19. Any person who acts in contravention of this Order, or is reasonably suspected of having so acted, or being about so to act, may be taken into custody without warrant by an immigration officer or by any constable.

20.—(1) The Interpretation Act, 1889, shall apply for the purpose of the interpretation of this Order in like manner as it applies for the purpose of the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

(2) In this Order—

The expression "former enemy alien" means an alien who is a subject or citizen of a State with which His Majesty was at war at any time during the year nineteen hundred and eighteen:

The expression "police district" means any district for which there is a separate police force; and the expression "chief officer of police" means the chief constable,

or head constable, or other officer, by whatever name called, having the chief command of the police force of the district:

The expression "keeper" where used in relation to premises where accommodation is provided for reward includes any person who for reward receives any other person to lodge in the premises, either on his own behalf or as manager or otherwise on behalf of any other person:

The expression "residence" means ordinary dwelling-place, and where an alien has more than one dwelling-place, each of such dwelling-places; and the expression "resident" shall have a corresponding meaning:

The expression "prescribed" means prescribed by the Secretary of State, or by rules made by the Secretary of State:

The expression "port" includes any place where a person lands in or embarks from the United Kingdom:

The expression "land" shall include arrival or entry by any form of conveyance, and references to landing shall, unless the context otherwise implies, be deemed to include references to attempting to land:

The expression "embark" shall include departure by any form of conveyance:

The expression "ship" includes aircraft and the expression "master of a ship" includes the pilot of an aircraft.

21.—(1) In the application of this Order to Scotland—

The expressions "the court" and "any court of summary jurisdiction" mean the sheriff:

The expressions "enter into recognizances with or without sureties" and "enter into recognizances" mean "find caution":

A reference to the Scottish Board of Health shall be substituted for any reference to the Minister of Health.

(2) In the application of this Order to Ireland—

(a) The expression "police district" means the police district of Dublin metropolis and any county or other area for which a county inspector of the Royal Irish Constabulary or officer having the rank of such county inspector is appointed; and the expression "chief officer of police" means, as respects the police district of Dublin metropolis, the Chief Commissioner of the Dublin Metropolitan Police and as respects any other police district the county inspector of the Royal Irish Constabulary or officer having the rank of such county inspector as the case may be; and

(b) For the purposes of a trial of a person for an offence under this Order, a summons may be issued by a justice to a witness who is not within his jurisdiction, and any such summons may in Ireland be issued, served, and enforced in the same manner as a summons to a witness within the jurisdiction of the issuing justice.

A reference to the Local Government Board for Ireland shall be substituted for any reference to the Minister of Health.

22.—(1) Nothing in this Order shall apply to any duly accredited head of a foreign diplomatic mission or any member of his household or of his official staff.

(2) Unless the Secretary of State otherwise

directs, either generally or in any particular case, nothing in this Order or regulations made thereunder shall apply to any alien who for the time being is in receipt of full pay as a member of His Majesty's naval, military, or air forces, or to the wife or child under the age of twenty-one years of any such alien.

23.—(1) Where by any Order in Council for the time being in force made after the making of this Order any articles or words are directed to be added to or omitted from this Order or to be substituted for any other articles or words in this Order, then copies of this Order printed under the authority of His Majesty's Stationery Office after such direction takes effect may be printed with the articles or words added or omitted or substituted for other articles or words as such direction required and with the articles and sub-sections thereof numbered in accordance with such direction, and this Order shall be construed as if it had at the time at which such direction takes effect been made with such addition, omission, or substitution.

(2) A reference in any Order in Council or other document to this Order shall, unless the context otherwise requires, be construed to refer to this Order as amended by any Order in Council for the time being in force.

(3) The provisions of this article shall apply to orders of the Secretary of State made under this Order varying the First, Second, or any subsequent Schedule to this Order as they apply to Orders in Council.

24.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Aliens Order, 1919.

(2) All Orders heretofore made under the Aliens Restriction Act, 1914, are hereby revoked, but without prejudice to the validity of anything done or any appointment made under those Orders, and any alien duly registered under those Orders with a registration officer shall be deemed to be duly registered under this Order at the date hereof, and an identity book issued under those Orders shall, until called in by a registration officer, be for the purposes of this Order equivalent to a registration certificate.

(3) This Order shall come into force on the first day of September nineteen hundred and nineteen.

(2) National Health Insurance (Approved Societies' Work).

(3) Local Health Administration.

(4) General Health Questions.

2. Each council shall consist of such numbers of members, not exceeding 20, as the Minister may determine, being persons having, in the case of each council, practical experience of the matters for the purposes of which the council in question is established.

3.—(1) The members of a council shall be appointed by the Minister, and shall include women as well as men.

(2) At the expiration of one, two, and three years respectively from the first appointment of the members of the council one-third of the original members, to be selected by lot, shall go out of office, but for the purpose of this provision an original member who has been re-appointed shall not be deemed to be an original member.

(3) Subject as aforesaid the members of a council shall hold office for three years and shall then go out of office:

Provided that on a casual vacancy occurring in a council the person appointed to fill the vacancy shall hold office until the time when the person in whose place he is appointed would regularly go out of office, and shall then go out of office.

(4) A member of a council on the expiration of his term of office may be re-appointed, so however that no member shall remain in office continuously for more than six years.

4. The Minister of Health shall be the President, and the Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Health shall be the Vice-President of each council.

5. The Minister shall appoint a Chairman and a Vice-Chairman of each council, who shall hold office until the next periodical expiration of the term of office of members of the council, but may be re-appointed so long as they remain members of the council.

6. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, or in the absence of both the President and the Vice-President, the Chairman, shall preside at every meeting of a council at which he is present.

7. The Minister shall appoint a person to be the Secretary of each council, and the person so appointed shall hold office during the pleasure of the Minister.

8.—(1) A council shall meet at such times, and notice of meetings shall be given to the members of the council in such manner as the council may, with the approval of the Minister, determine:

Provided that the council shall meet at least once in each quarter.

(2) At a meeting of a council 10 shall be a quorum.

(3) No act or proceeding of a council shall be questioned on account of any vacancy in their body.

9. A council may for special purposes approved by the Minister appoint committees of their members, and any committee so appointed may, within the limits approved by the Minister, add to their numbers persons not being members of the council.

B.—Hair Nets.

I. Threading Hair Nets which are the Product of Warp Machines.

General Minimum Piece Rates at present fixed.

 (c) All sizes over 18 inches with 50 holes or less, 9d. per gross nets.
 (d) For every 4 holes additional to those above specified, $\frac{1}{4}$ d. per gross nets.

Provided that in the case of the Hair Nets which are the product of Levers or Plain Net Machines, the General Minimum Piece Rates shall be higher by 50 per cent. than those specified above.

Variation Proposed.

- (a) Hair Nets up to and including $12\frac{1}{2}$ inches with 38 holes or less, 7d. per gross nets.
 (b) Hair Nets of over $12\frac{1}{2}$ inches but under 18 inches with 48 holes or less, $8\frac{3}{4}$ d. per gross nets.
 (c) All sizes of 18 inches and over with 50 holes or less, $10\frac{1}{2}$ d. per gross nets.

No variation is proposed in the following General Minimum Piece Rates at present fixed for Ticketing:

Ticketing Hair Nets (whether the product of Plain Net Machines or not).

For all Ticketing done at the same time as Threading, $\frac{3}{4}$ d. per gross nets.

Provided that the General Minimum Piece Rates for Hair Net Finishing shall not apply in any case in which special difficulty is caused by the inferior quality of the material or of the dressing, and in such cases the Piece Rate payable shall be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than $5\frac{1}{2}$ d. an hour to an ordinary worker.

The General Minimum Piece Rates set out above apply to the actual workers, and not to middlewomen; the custom of the trade is to pay middlewomen in addition to such rates a commission of 25 per cent.

The minimum or lowest Time-Rate for learners under fourteen years of age shall be 9s. per week of 48 hours, or 2½d. per hour, and on reaching the age of 14 years she shall be entitled to the amount shown in Column I. above as if she had commenced at 14.

PROPOSED PIECEWORK BASIS TIME-RATES FOR FEMALE WORKERS. (All Classes.)

For Female Workers other than HOME-WORKERS, 9½d. per hour.

For Female HOMEWORKERS, 9½d. per hour.

The Piecework Basis Time-Rates are for the purpose of securing, as respects each of the above-mentioned classes of workers that, in the case of all female workers employed on piecework, each piece rate paid shall be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 9½d. per hour to an ordinary worker.

PROPOSED GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES FOR MALE WORKERS.

For Male Workers of 22 years of age and upwards, 1s. 1½d. per hour.

For Male Workers of 21 and under 22 years of age, 1s. per hour.

For Male Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age, 10½d. per hour.

For Male Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age, 9d. per hour.

For Male Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

For Male Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 6d. per hour.

For Male Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 5d. per hour.

For Male Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 4d. per hour.

For Male Workers under 15 years of age, 3d. per hour.

It is proposed to fix General Minimum Time-Rates for Male Workers commencing employment in the Corset Trade for the first time at and over the age of 19 as follows:—As respects their first six months of employment, 7d. per hour; as respects their second six months of employment, 8½d. per hour.

PROPOSED PIECEWORK BASIS TIME-RATES FOR MALE WORKERS. (All Ages.)

For Male Workers, 1s. 3½d. per hour.

The Piecework Basis Time-Rate is for the purpose of securing that, in the case of all Male Workers employed on piecework, each piece rate paid shall be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 1s. 3½d. per hour to an ordinary worker.

PROPOSED OVERTIME RATES.

Male and Female Workers (All Ages).

In accordance with Section 3 (i) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board propose to declare THE NORMAL NUMBER OF HOURS OF WORK TO BE as follows:

In any week 48,

On any day (other than Saturday) 9,

On Saturday, 5,

and that all hours worked on Sundays and customary public and statutory holidays shall be regarded as overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply;

And the Trade Board propose to fix Overtime Rates in respect of Female and Male Workers to apply in respect of hours worked by a worker, whether engaged on Timework or on Piecework, in excess of such normal number of hours, as follows, that is to say:—

1. For the first two hours' Overtime on any day, except Saturdays, Sundays, and customary public and statutory holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to TIME AND A QUARTER, that is to say, one and a quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

2. For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day, except Sundays and customary public and statutory holidays, and for all Overtime on Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to TIME AND A HALF, that is to say, one and a half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

3. For all time worked on Sundays and customary public and statutory holidays the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to DOUBLE TIME, that is to say, twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

4. For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48 the Overtime Rate shall be TIME AND A QUARTER, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs 2 and 3 of Part V. The Overtime Rate shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or a customary public or statutory holiday) the number of hours worked exceeds 9, or, in the case of Saturday,

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exceeds 5, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

5. Provided:—

(a) That where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on 5 days a week, the Overtime Rate shall only be payable where on any day the number of hours worked exceeds 9½.

(b) That where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the normal number of hours for the week in which attendance on Saturday is required shall be deemed to be 50.

But in the application of these Provisos, where the employer requires attendance on any day on which it is not the established practice of the employer to require attendance, all time worked on such day (not being a Sunday or a customary public or statutory holiday) shall be paid for at time and a quarter for the first two hours and time and a half thereafter.

The above rates shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Act, to all workers who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Corset) Order, 1919—that is to say:

(a) The manufacture of corsets, stays, children's corset bodices, infants' stay bands, bust confiners, such as brassieres and bandeaux when boned or with elastic webbing in their construction.

(b) The manufacture of support or abdominal belts and similar articles, except where made in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of surgical instruments.

(c) The assembling of stocking suspenders in conjunction with or in association with the manufacture of any of the above-mentioned articles.

(d) All warehousing, packing, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of any of the above-mentioned articles.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposals to Fix which may be lodged with them within two months from 18th August, 1919. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Corset Trade Board, 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

These Regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.

1. The limits of age for these situations are 18 and 20. If an examination begins in one of the first six months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of March in that year. If an Examination begins in one of the last six months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of September in that year.

In reckoning age for Competition, persons who have served for two full consecutive years in any Civil situation to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding five years which they may have spent in such service.

COLCHESTER (CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF
1919.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Control of Dogs in Borough of Colchester.

1.—(1) Notwithstanding the provisions of the North Essex and Suffolk (Muzzling and Control of Dogs) Order of 1919, a dog whilst in or on any public place in the borough of Colchester shall be

(a) efficiently muzzled with an effective wire-cage muzzle, and also

(b) led by a person, with a collar and chain or other attachment.

(2) The provisions of this Article shall not apply to any dog confined in a suitable hamper, crate, box, or other receptacle, so constructed as to render it impossible for such dog while so confined to bite any person or animal.

Offences.

2.—If any dog is not kept under control in manner prescribed by this Order, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

3.—This Order shall take immediate effect.

Short Title.

4.—This Order may be cited as the COLCHESTER (CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1919.

NORTH ESSEX AND SUFFOLK
(MUZZLING AND CONTROL OF DOGS)
ORDER OF 1919.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894

to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

PART I.

Prohibition of Movement of Dogs out of certain District.

1.—(1) No dog shall be moved out of the District described in the Schedule hereto, hereinafter referred to as "the Scheduled District," unless it is accompanied by a licence of the Board authorizing such movement signed by an Officer of the Board, and any such licence may be subject to such conditions as to the detention and isolation of the dog or otherwise as the Board may think necessary or desirable, and shall be specified in the licence: Provided that this Article shall not apply to—

(a) the movement of a dog under a licence granted by the Board under the Importation of Dogs Order of 1914 and the Importation of Dogs (Amendment) Order of 1918 (No. 2) to a port in Great Britain for shipment, or to a place of detention for the purpose of detention and isolation; or

(b) the movement of a dog through the Scheduled District by railway from a place outside the District to another place outside the District without unnecessary delay and without being re-booked within the District.

(2) If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without the Scheduled District, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Scheduled District.

Seizure of Dogs in case of Default.

2.—(1) If a dog has been moved in contravention of this Order, or having been moved with a licence under this Order is not detained and isolated or otherwise dealt with as required by the conditions of the licence, an Inspector of the Board may seize the dog, and thereupon the Board shall detain and isolate it at the place of detention specified in the licence (if any), or any other place of detention selected by them for such time as the Board think necessary or expedient.

(2) If the owner of the dog does not, within ten days after the expiration of the period of detention specified in the licence (if any), or such other period as the Board may think necessary or expedient and notify to the owner, claim the dog from the Board and pay to them their expenses of detaining and isolating the dog, the Board may destroy or otherwise dispose of the dog as they think expedient.

Notice of Detention in case of Illegal Movement.

3.—(1) Where an Inspector or other Officer of the Board, or of a Local Authority, has reason to believe that a dog has been moved in contravention of this Order he may give notice to the owner or person in charge of the dog requiring that the dog shall be detained and isolated in accordance with the provisions of such notice, and that within a time specified in such notice the dog shall be moved to a place of detention for the purpose of such detention and isolation.

(2) Such provisions may be inserted in the notice as the Board may think necessary or desirable for any of the following purposes, namely:—

(i.) For prescribing and regulating the detention and isolation of the dog.

(ii.) For prescribing the person by whom and the premises on which the dog shall be detained and isolated.

(iii.) For regulating the movement of the dog to the place of detention.

(iv.) For prescribing the confinement of the dog in a suitable hamper, crate, box, or other receptacle, or the muzzling of the dog, during its movement by railway, or along a highway or thoroughfare.

(v.) For prescribing the mode of isolation of the dog.

(vi.) For prescribing the notice to be given of the death or loss of the dog, or of any matter arising in connection with the movement, detention, or isolation of the dog and the persons by whom and to whom the notice is to be given; and

(vii.) For prescribing the production of the notice for inspection by an Officer of the Board, or police constable, or officer of the Local Authority.

(3) The operation of a notice under this article may be terminated by notice to that effect given by an Inspector or other Officer of the Board or of the Local Authority to the owner or person in charge of the dog, on proof to the satisfaction of the Inspector or Officer that the dog was not moved in contravention of the said Order.

(4) If the owner or person in charge of the dog, after receipt of such notice, fails to move the dog as required by the notice, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5) If the provisions inserted in any notice under this Article are not complied with, the owner of the dog and the person in charge of the dog, and any person who, being required to comply with any such provision, fails to do so, shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

PART II.

Control of Dogs in Scheduled District.

4.—(1) A dog in the Scheduled District shall at all times—

(a) whilst in or on any public place be efficiently muzzled with an effective wire cage muzzle;

(b) whilst in or on any other place, be kept under control by being—

(i) confined in a kennel or other enclosure from which the dog cannot escape; or

(ii) secured to some premises by a collar and chain; or

(iii) efficiently muzzled with an effective wire cage muzzle; or

(iv) accompanied by the owner or some person deputed by him, and under effectual control.

(2) The provisions of this Article shall not apply to—

(a) any pack of hounds while being exercised under the supervision of two or more competent attendants; or

(b) any dog in charge of a competent person while being used for sporting purposes, or for the capture or destruction of vermin, or for the driving or tending of cattle or sheep; or

(c) any dog confined in a suitable hamper, crate, box, or other receptacle, so constructed as to render it impossible for

such dog while so confined to bite any person or animal.

Seizure, Detention, and Disposal of Uncontrolled Dogs.

5.—(1) Any dog in the Scheduled District which is not muzzled, or kept under control, as prescribed by this Order, may be seized by the Local Authority or by the police, and any dog so seized shall be dealt with by the Local Authority as follows:—

(i.) If the dog is diseased or suspected, or has been bitten by a diseased or suspected dog, it shall be forthwith slaughtered.

(ii.) If the dog has been exposed to the infection of rabies it shall be detained, slaughtered, or otherwise dealt with as the Local Authority think expedient, but so that the dog shall not, while detained by the Local Authority, be allowed to come in contact with any other animal.

(iii.) In any other case the dog shall be treated as a stray dog seized under the powers conferred by section three of the Dogs Act, 1906.

(2) No dog so seized shall be given or sold for the purposes of vivisection.

(3) Every dog shall, for the purposes of this Article, be deemed to have been exposed to the infection of rabies which has been in the same shed, stable, building, kennel, field, or other place, or otherwise in contact with any diseased or suspected dog, or which has in any other way been exposed to the infection of rabies.

Prohibition of Holding of Exhibitions or Shows of Dogs in Scheduled District.

6. No exhibition or show of dogs, whether for sale or otherwise, shall be held in the Scheduled District except with a licence of the Board, and any such licence shall be subject to such conditions as the Board may think necessary or desirable, and shall specify in the licence.

PART III.

GENERAL.

Offences.

7.—(1) If a dog is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the dog, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the dog is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2) If any dog in the Scheduled District is not muzzled, or kept under control, as prescribed by this Order, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If a dog which is being moved or has been moved with a licence under this Order is not muzzled or confined or is not detained and isolated or otherwise dealt with as required by the conditions of the licence, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and

in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If any person holds, or causes or permits to be held, any exhibition or show in contravention of this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If a person with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order or of the conditions of a licence under this Order, allows a dog to stray, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(6.) If the owner or person in charge of a dog fails to give, produce, or do any notice, licence, or thing which by this Order, or by the conditions of a licence thereunder, he is required to give, produce, or do, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

8.—In this Order—

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

“Disease” means rabies, “diseased” means affected with rabies, and “suspected” means suspected of rabies.

“Public place” includes any street, highway, thoroughfare, public bridge, royal park, public park, garden or pleasure ground, common, unenclosed land, or other place to which the public have for the time being access.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Rabies Order of 1919.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

9. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Commencement.

10. This Order shall come into operation on the sixteenth day of August, nineteen hundred and nineteen: Provided that until the twenty-first day of that month a dog in or on any public place in the Scheduled District need not be muzzled if it is led by a person with a collar and chain or other attachment.

Short Title.

11. This Order may be cited as the NORTH ESSEX AND SUFFOLK (MUZZLING AND CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1919.

I. TRAFFIC REGULATIONS.

1. Passage of vessels between Noman's fort and the charted position of Warner light-vessel is permitted during the hours of official daylight, but they are not to use this passage during official night or in thick weather.

2. Vessels of all descriptions are prohibited from anchoring in St. Helen's roads to the westward of a line drawn in a 162° (S. 3° E. Mag.) direction from Noman's fort.

3. No vessel or boat of any description is to anchor or trawl within 100 yards either side of a line drawn from southern corner of Stokes bay pierhead in a 177° (S. 12° W. Mag.) direction for a distance of 440 yards.

4. No vessel is to anchor or trawl within 100 yards of a line drawn from the north-eastern

corner of the prohibited area off Gilkicker point in a 7° (N. 22° E. Mag.) direction to the shore.

5. No vessel or boat of any description is to anchor kedge within 100 yards either side of a line joining the two buoys situated respectively 600 yards, 259° (N. 86° W. Mag.), and 600 yards, 246° (S. 81° W. Mag.), from the centre of St. Helen's fort.

Note.—Pilot cutters will cruise both on the eastern and western stations of the Isle of Wight district.

II. REGULATIONS REGARDING FISHING VESSELS.
