

ment of certain Fellowships, and to raise the sum payable by the College to the Sedleian Professor, and to remove certain obsolete provisions from the Statute relating to the Sedleian Professor:

The College, under and by virtue of the powers conferred upon it by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, and of any other power enabling it, at a General Meeting of the Governing Body, especially summoned for the purpose, and after due notice, held upon the 19th day of December, 1919, by the unanimous vote of the persons present and voting, made the following amendments to a Statute made by the University Commissioners for the Queen's College, Oxford:

1. In *Statt. Tit. ii, Clause 21, line 1*, for the words "A Fellowship" read "An Official Fellowship and an Ordinary Fellowship held under the provisions of *Statt. Tit. ii, Clause 8 (b)* and of *Statt. Tit. ii, Clause 22*."

2. In *Statt. Tit. ii, Clause 21, line 1*, for "£200" read "£300."

3. In *Statt. Tit. ii, Clause 21, line 7*, for "£200" read "£300."

4. In *Statt. Tit. ii, Clause 21*, in the addition to this clause made by the College upon the 15th day of June, 1906, and approved by His Majesty in Council upon the 26th day of March, 1907, for the last four words of the clause, namely, "said sum of £200" read "said sum of £300."

5. In *Statt. Tit. ii, Clause 21*, at the end of the clause shall be added the words:—

"The emolument of an Ordinary Fellowship, not being an Ordinary Fellowship held under the provisions of the College Statutes, *Tit. ii, Clause 8 (b)*, or of the College Statutes, *Tit. ii, Clause 22*, shall be £200 per annum."

6. In *Statt. Tit. xx, Clause 1, line 6*, for "£900" read "£1,000."

7. In *Statt. Tit. xx, clause 1, line 6*, omit all the words from "this augmentation shall" . . . to the end of the clause.

The KING has been pleased to award the Albert Medal to Mr. Walter Cleall, of Cardiff, a demobilised soldier, in recognition of his gallantry in saving life at a fire at Cardiff in August last.

On August 11th a fire broke out at the top of the Royal Hotel, Cardiff, and it was not until the sixth floor of the building was burning fiercely that one of the maids was seen to come to a window on that floor and gesticulate for help. Mr. Cleall, who was in the crowd below watching the fire, at once entered the building without a smoke helmet, and eventually succeeded in getting to the sixth floor and into a room from which he could see the girl. From the window of that room he climbed along a narrow parapet, and reached the window where the girl was.

Above the ledge which afforded him foothold was a stone balcony for a part of the intervening space, but a very dangerous corner had to be negotiated with a sheer drop to the street of fully one hundred feet. The risk of falling was very great, but he succeeded in carrying the girl back along the parapet, and into the room from which he started. A portion of the roof collapsed as the girl was assisted from the room.
