In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under that Act and the Trade Boards Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1913, for the Hollow-ware Trade as defined in the Regulations made by the Board of Trade and dated the 6th July, 1914, having given due notice on 27th January, 1920, of Proposal to Vary, as therein shown, the General Minimum Time-rates for Female and Male Workers then in operation and set out in the Schedules of their Notices dated 27th October, 1919, and 21st January, 1918, and to Fix Minimum Rates of Wages for Overtime for Female and Male Workers hereby give Notice that they have varied and fixed such Minimum Rates of Wages for Female and Male Workers, and that the Minimum Rates of Wages as varied and fixed are shown in the Schedule set out below which is incorporated herewith.

And the Trade Board further give Notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order dated 9th April, 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the rates as varied and fixed by the Trade Board, and specifying 12th April, 1920,* as the date from which such minimum rates shall become effective.

**Note*.—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in no case later than 17th April, 1920.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

General Minimum Time-Rates. Female Workers.

SECTION I.

1. Female learners of under 15 years of age, 12s. 9d. per week of 47 hours.
2. Female learners of 15 and under 16 years of age, 15s. 9d. per week of 47 hours.
3. Female learners of 16 and under 17 years of age, 19s. 3d. per week of 47 hours.
4. Female learners of 17 and under 18 years of age, 23s. 3d. per week of 47 hours.

Provided that a female learner entering the trade over the age of 16 may serve a period of one year as a learner at the following general minimum time-rates, that is to say:

First six months, 16s. 3d. per week of 47 hours.

Second six months, 17s. 6d. per week of 47 hours.

Thereafter the minimum rate shall be that applicable to the worker's age.

5. Female workers other than learners, 30s. 9d. per week of 47 hours.

Male Workers.

SECTION II.

1. Male learners of under 14 years of age, 3½d. per hour.

2. Male learners of 14 and under 15 years of age, 3¾d. per hour.

3. Male learners of 15 and under 16 years of age, 4¼d. per hour.

4. Male learners of 16 and under 17 years of age, 6d. per hour.

5. Male learners of 17 and under 18 years of age, 7d. per hour.*

6. Male learners of 18 and under 19 years of age, 9d. per hour.*

7. Male learners of 19 and under 20 years of age, 10d. per hour.*

8. Male learners of 20 and under 21 years of age, 11d. per hour.*

9. Male workers other than learners, 1s. 1½d. per hour.

*Provided that a male learner entering the trade between 17 and 21 years of age may serve a period of one year at a general minimum time-rate, which during the first six months is 5s. per week of 47 hours less and during the second six months is 2s. 6d. per week of 47 hours less than the general minimum time-rate otherwise applicable as set out above.

SECTION III.—The weekly rates set out in this Part of this Schedule are based on a week of 47 hours and are subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours spent by the worker in the factory or workshop under contract of employment in any week is less than 47.

PART II.

SECTION I.—*Overtime Rates for Female and Male Workers.*

In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board hereby declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week, 47.

On any day (other than Saturday), 8½.

On Saturday, 4½.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker, whether engaged on time-work or on piece-work, in excess of such normal number of hours shall be as follows, that is to say:—

(a) For all Overtime on any day except Saturdays, Sundays and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rates shall be equivalent to time-and-a-quarter, that is to say, one and a quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

(b) For all Overtime on Saturdays the Overtime Rates shall be equivalent to time-and-a-half, that is to say, one and a half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

(c) For all time worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rates shall

be equivalent to double time, that is to say, twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

SECTION III.—Notwithstanding anything contained in Sections I. and II. of this Part of this Notice, it is hereby provided that:—

(a) All hours worked in any week in excess of 47 shall be paid for as Overtime.

(b) The Overtime Rates shall also be payable where, on any day, not being Sunday or a Statutory Holiday, the number of hours worked exceeds 8½, or in the case of Saturday, exceeds 4½, provided that the total number of hours worked in the week is not less than 47 or such lesser number of hours as the worker has had the opportunity of working in that week, not including any hours which rank as Overtime under the provisions of Section I. of this Part of this Notice.

(c) Where by agreement between an Employer and his Workers the number of hours of work on a Saturday does not exceed 4, the Overtime Rates shall not be payable as respects not more than one other day in each week (not being Sunday or a Statutory Holiday) until the number of hours worked on such day exceeds 9.

(d) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on 5 days a week, the Overtime Rates shall only be payable where, on any day, the number of hours worked exceeds 9½.

(e) The Overtime Rates are not applicable to Watchmen or to men employed solely as Firemen or Stokers.

SECTION IV.—The hours which female workers and young persons are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshops Act, 1901.

PART III.

For the purpose of this Notice a "learner" shall be deemed to be a person who is employed under conditions which, in the circumstances of the case, afford a reasonable prospect of advancement to the general minimum time-rate for workers other than learners. Provided that in the case of males no person shall be deemed to be a learner who is over 21 years of age.

PART IV.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Great Britain who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in those branches of the hollow-ware trade which are engaged in the making of hollow-ware from sheet iron or sheet steel, including the processes of galvanising, tinning, enamelling, painting, japanning, lacquering and varnishing.

PART V.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above minimum rates of wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for those branches of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Rope, Twine and Net) Order, 1919, HEREBY GIVE NOTICE, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to Fix General Minimum Piece-Rates and to Vary the Overtime Rates for certain classes of Male and Female Workers at present fixed and set out in the Schedule to their Notice dated 1st April, 1920, and made effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour, dated 31st March, 1920, the proposed General Minimum Piece-Rates and Variation of Overtime Rates for such classes of Male and Female Workers being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

The Minister of Labour has given his consent to the Notice of Proposal to Vary the Overtime Rates being given.

In lieu of the Overtime Rates at present fixed and set out in the Trade Board's Notice, dated 1st April, 1920, and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour, dated 31st March, 1920, the Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers employed on Piece-work to which the General Minimum Piece-Rates set out in Part I. of the Schedule apply in substitution for the above General Minimum Piece-Rates in respect of hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in the Notice above referred to, to be the normal number of hours of work shall, subject to the Provisions of Sections II. and III. of Part III. of the Schedule to the Notice of the Minimum Rates of Wages fixed, dated 1st April, 1920, be as follows:—

(a) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be a rate which is equivalent to the General Minimum Piece-Rate with the addition of one-quarter of the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate which, under the terms of the Trade

Board's Notice, dated 1st April, 1920, would be applicable to the worker if he or she were employed on piece-work for which General Minimum Piece-Rates had not been fixed by the Trade Board.

(b) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all Overtime on Saturdays the Overtime Rate shall be a rate which is equivalent to the General Minimum Piece-Rate with the addition of one-half of the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate which, under the terms of the Trade Board's Notice, dated 1st April, 1920, would be applicable to the worker if he or she were employed on piece-work for which General Minimum Piece-Rates had not been fixed by the Trade Board.

(c) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be a rate which is equivalent to the General Minimum Piece-Rate with the addition of the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate which, under the terms of

the Trade Board's Notice, dated 1st April, 1920, would be applicable to the worker if he or she were employed on piece-work for which General Minimum Piece-Rates had not been fixed by the Trade Board.

(d) All hours worked in any week in excess of 48 shall be paid for as Overtime irrespective of the number of hours worked

on any particular day, and the Overtime Rate shall also be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) the number of hours worked exceeds nine, or in the case of Saturday exceeds five, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

PART III.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Great Britain as specified in Part I. of this Schedule who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Rope, Twine and Net) Order, 1919; that is to say, the making or re-making of (a) rope (including driving rope and banding); (b) cord (including blind and window cord, but excluding silk, worsted and other fancy cords); (c) core for wire ropes; (d) lines; (e) twine (including binder and trawl twine); (f) lanyards; (g) net and similar articles; the bleaching, teasing, hackling, carding, preparing and spinning of the materials required for the making or re-making of any of the articles (a) to (g) above, when carried on in the same factory or workshop as such making or re-

making; the manufacture of packings, gaskins and spun yarns, when carried on in the same factory or workshop as the making or re-making of any of the articles (a) to (g) above; the braiding or splicing of articles made from rope, cord, twine or net; the mending of nets and the winding, twisting, doubling, laying, polishing, dressing, tarring, tanning, dyeing, balling, reeling, finishing, packing, despatching, warehousing and storing of any of the above articles, where these operations or any of them are carried on in a factory or workshop in which any of the articles (a) to (g) above are made or re-made; BUT EXCLUDING the making of wire rope (unless made in the same factory or workshop as hemp or similar rope or core for wire rope); AND EXCLUDING the making of net in connection with the lace curtain trade and the weaving of cloth.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions, other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect

of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above minimum rates of wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above Proposals which may be lodged with them within two months from 13th April, 1920. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address) and should be sent to the Secretary, The Rope, Twine and Net Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

II. For the classes of Male Workers employed on Piece-Work in Hand Hackling:

(a) For the first two hours' Overtime on any day except Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be a rate which is

equivalent to the General Minimum Piece-Rate with the addition of one-quarter of the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to Hand Hacklers, as set out in Section I. of Part I. of the Schedule of this Notice.

(b) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all overtime on Saturday, the Overtime Rate shall be a rate which is equivalent to the General Minimum Piece-Rate, with the addition of one-half of the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to Hand Hacklers, as set out in Section I. of Part I. of the Schedule of this Notice.

(c) For all time worked on Sundays and

Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be a rate which is equivalent to the General Minimum Piece-Rate, with the addition of the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to Hand Hacklers, as set out in Section I. of Part I. of the Schedule of this Notice.

(d) All hours worked in any week in excess of 48 shall be paid for as Overtime, irrespective of the number of hours worked on any particular day; and the Overtime Rate shall also be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or Customary Public or Statutory Holiday), the number of hours worked exceeds nine, or in the case of Saturday exceeds five, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

PART V.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Great Britain, as specified in Parts I., II. and III. of this Schedule, who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Rope, Twine, and Net) Order, 1919; that is to say, the making or re-making of (a) rope (including driving rope and banding), (b) cord (including blind and window cord, but excluding silk, worsted and other fancy cords), (c) core for wire ropes, (d) lines, (e) twine (including binder and trawl twine), (f) lanyards, (g) net and similar articles; the bleaching, teasing, hackling, carding, preparing and spinning of the materials required for the making or re-making of any of the articles (a) to (g) above, when carried on in the same factory or work-

shop as such making or re-making; the manufacture of packings, gaskins, and spun yarns, when carried on in the same factory or workshop as the making or re-making of any of the articles (a) to (g) above; the braiding or splicing of articles made from rope, cord, twine or net; the mending of nets and the winding, twisting, doubling, laying, polishing, dressing, tarring, tanning, dyeing, balling, reeling, finishing, packing, despatching, warehousing and storing of any of the above articles, where these operations or any of them are carried on in a factory or workshop in which any of the articles (a) to (g) above are made or re-made; but excluding the making of wire rope (unless made in the same factory or workshop as hemp or similar rope or core for wire rope), and excluding the making of net in connection with the lace curtain trade and the weaving of cloth.

PART VI.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions, other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of

contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to Workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposals which may be lodged with them within two months from 13th April, 1920. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary, The Rope, Twine and Net Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2. It is desirable that the Objections should

state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES AS FIXED AND AS VARIED FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

EFFECTIVE AS FROM 12TH APRIL, 1920.*

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, in Great Britain, for the Branches of Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Boot and Shoe Repairing) Order, 1919, having given due notice on 1st December, 1919, of Proposal to Vary and to Fix certain Minimum Rates of Wages, hereby give Notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they have

Fixed General Minimum Piece Rates for Male and Female Workers engaged in:—

(a) Repairing.

(b) Making Bespoke Handsewn, Pegged and Riveted Work (including Handsewn Work on the Sectional System).

The Trade Board also give Notice that they have Fixed General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Female Workers, and have declared the normal number of hours of work in the Trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates to Female Workers, and have varied the General Minimum Time-Rates for a certain class of Male Workers as set out below.

And the Trade Board further give Notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order dated 8th April, 1920, under Section 4 (2) of

the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the minimum rates as fixed and as varied by the Trade Board, and specifying 12th April, 1920,* as the date from which such Minimum Rates shall become effective.

* NOTE.—Should this date, however, not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in no case later than 18th April, 1920.

General Minimum Time-Rates for Female Workers.

(a) For Female Workers (other than workers specified in Sub-section (b) of this Section and in Section II. of Part II.), employed on Finishing or Benching Work:—

1. For Workers of 21 years of age and upwards, 65s. per week of 48 hours.
2. For Workers of 20 years and under 21 years of age, 45s. per week of 48 hours.
3. For Workers of 19 years and under 20 years of age, 37s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.
4. For Workers of 18 years and under 19 years of age, 32s. per week of 48 hours.
5. For Workers of 17 years and under 18 years of age, 27s. per week of 48 hours.
6. For Workers of 16 years and under 17 years of age, 22s. per week of 48 hours.

(b) For Female Workers employed in a Productive Department on Patching Machines:—

1. For Workers of 21 years of age and upwards, 45s. per week of 48 hours.
2. For Workers of 20 years and under 21 years of age, 40s. per week of 48 hours.
3. For Workers of 19 years and under 20 years of age, 35s. per week of 48 hours.
4. For Workers of 18 years and under 19 years of age, 30s. per week of 48 hours.
5. For Workers of 17 years and under 18 years of age, 25s. per week of 48 hours.
6. For Workers of 16 years and under 17 years of age, 20s. per week of 48 hours.

(c) The above rates are weekly rates based on a week of 48 hours, but they shall be subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours actually spent in the factory or workshop in any week is less than 48.

For Female Workers employed on Surgical Work, 2s. per hour.

Overtime Rates for Female Workers (All Ages).

In accordance with Section 3 (i) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

- In any week, 48.
- On Saturday, 4.
- On Monday, 8.
- On any other week-day, 9.

Provided that any other day not being Sunday may, by agreement in writing between an employer and a worker, be substituted in place of Saturday as the weekly short day, and in such case the normal number of hours on such substituted day shall be four, and the normal number of hours on Saturday shall be nine.

Provided also that all hours worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as overtime, to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

The above-mentioned provisions shall not

prejudice a worker's claim to a Saturday half-holiday where it is now given.

The Minimum Rates for Overtime to apply in respect of hours worked by a worker (so far as is allowed under the Factory and Workshop Acts), whether engaged on Time Work or on Piece Work in excess of the declared normal number of hours shall be as follows, that is to say:—

(1) For the first two hours Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to time-and-a-quarter; that is to say, one-and-a-quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

(2) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to time-and-a-half; that is to say, one-and-a-half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

(3) For all time worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to double time; that is to say, twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

Provided that where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rates set out in sub-paragraphs (1) and (2) above shall be payable in respect of—

- (a) All employment on a Saturday;
- (b) All employment in excess of 10 hours on a Friday or on one other day in each week (not being Saturday) as may be agreed between the employer and the worker;
- (c) All employment on any other week-day in excess of 9½ hours.

But in the application of this Proviso, where the employer requires attendance on any day on which it is not the established practice of the employer to require attendance, all time worked on such a day shall be paid for at time-and-a-quarter for the first two hours and time-and-a-half thereafter.

General Minimum Time-Rate for Male Workers Employed on Surgical Work.

For Male Workers employed on Surgical Work: General Minimum Time Rate, 2s. per hour.

1918, for the Fur Trade as specified in the Trade Boards (Fur) Order, 1919, having given due notice, on 8th December, 1919, and 5th January, 1920, of Proposal to Fix Minimum Rates of Wages for Male and Female Workers, hereby give Notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they have fixed General Minimum Time-Rates, General Minimum Piece-Rates and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers and Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for certain classes of Female Workers, and have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates, and that the Minimum Rates of Wages as fixed and the normal number of hours as declared are shown in the Schedule set out below.

And the Trade Board further give Notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order, dated 7th April, 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the Minimum Rates of Wages as fixed by the Trade Board and specifying 12th April, 1920,* as the date from which such Minimum Rates of Wages shall become effective.

* Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in no case later than 18th April, 1920.

(b) Learners as defined in Section I. of Part V. of this Schedule—

(i) Learners commencing employment in this section of the trade under the age of 21 years—

During the first year of employment, 20s. per week of 48 hours.

During the second year of employment, 30s. per week of 48 hours.

During the third year of employment, 40s. per week of 48 hours.

During the fourth year of employment, 45s. per week of 48 hours.

During the fifth year of employment, 50s. per week of 48 hours.

During the sixth year of employment, 55s. per week of 48 hours.

During the seventh year of employment, 60s. per week of 48 hours.

Provided that a male learner commencing employment in this section of the trade under the age of 21 years shall cease to be a learner and become entitled to the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to him under Sub-

section (a) of this Section on attaining the age of 21 years.

(ii) Learners commencing employment in this section of the trade at the age of 21 years or over—

During the first six months of employment, 50s. per week of 48 hours.

During the second six months of employment, 55s. per week of 48 hours.

Thereafter a learner shall cease to be a learner and be entitled to the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to him under Sub-section (a) of this Section.

SECTION II.—FUR SORTERS' SECTION (workers employed in Merchants' and Brokers' Warehouses).

(a) Workers of 21 years of age and over employed as Fur Sorters, 80s. per week of 48 hours.

For the purpose of this Sub-section, a Fur Sorter shall be deemed to be a worker who assumes sole responsibility for the proper grading of the skins.

(b) Workers of 21 years of age and over employed in a Fur Sorting Department under the supervision of a Fur Sorter, as defined in Sub-section (a) of this Section, or as Counters, Strippers or Sizers, 60s. per week of 48 hours.

SECTION III.—DYERS' AND DRESSERS' SECTION.

(a) Workers of 21 years of age and over employed as Tubbers, 70s. per week of 48 hours.

(b) Workers of 21 years of age and over employed as Grounders, Smearers or as Drum and Cage Hands (not including workers employed merely in carrying skins to Drums and Cages), 55s. per week of 48 hours.

(c) Combers, Dippers and all other Male Workers in this Section of the trade other than those specified in Sub-sections (a) and (b) of this Section—

Workers of 21 years of age and over, 53s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age, 50s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age, 44s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age, 41s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 28s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 24s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 18s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 14 and under 15 years of age, 16s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

SECTION IV.—PACKERS.

Workers of 21 years of age and over employed as Packers (excluding workers who are employed merely in the collection of articles for packing) 60s. per week of 48 hours.

SECTION V.—ALL MALE WORKERS other than those specified in Sections I., II., III. and IV. of this part of this Schedule—

Workers of 21 years of age and over, 53s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age, 50s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age, 44s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age, 41s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 28s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 24s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 18s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 14 and under 15 years of age, 16s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

(B) FEMALE WORKERS.

During the first year of employment, 15s. per week of 48 hours.

During the second year of employment, 20s. per week of 48 hours.

During the third year of employment, 30s. per week of 48 hours.

During the fourth year of employment, 35s. per week of 48 hours.

Provided that a female learner commencing employment in this section of the trade under the age of 18 years shall cease to be a learner and become entitled to the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to her under Sub-section (a.) of this Section on attaining the age of 18 years.

(ii.) Learners commencing employment in this section of the trade at the age of 18 years or over—

During the first six months of employment, 25s. per week of 48 hours.

During the second six months of employment, 30s. per week of 48 hours.

During the third six months of employment, 35s. per week of 48 hours.

Thereafter a learner shall cease to be learner and be entitled to the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to her under Sub-section (a.) of this Section.

SECTION II.—FUR SORTERS' SECTION (workers employed in Merchants' and Brokers' Warehouses).

Workers employed as Fur Sorters, Assistants to Fur Sorters, or as Counters, Stripers or Sizers—

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 40s. per week of 48 hours.

SECTION III.—ALL FEMALE WORKERS other than those specified in Sections I. and II. of this Part of this Schedule—

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 16s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

PART III.—PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF FEMALE WORKERS.

SECTION I.—Female Workers employed as Machinists, Liners or Finishers in the Furriers' Section of the trade:—

(a) Machinists, 60s. per week of 48 hours.

(b) Liners or Finishers, 50s. per week of 48 hours.

SECTION II.—In the case of the classes of female workers specified in Section I. of this Part of this Schedule who are employed on piece-work, each piece-rate paid shall be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case to an Ordinary worker not less than 1s. 3d. per hour in the case of Machinists, and not less than 1s. 0½ per hour in the case of Liners and Finishers.

PART IV.—OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS OF ALL AGES EMPLOYED ON TIME-WORK.

SECTION I.—The minimum rates for Overtime in respect of Male and Female Workers to apply in respect of hours worked by a worker employed on Time-work in excess of the declared normal number of hours set out in Section II. of this Part of this Schedule shall be as follows, that is to say:—

(a) For all Overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime rate shall be equivalent to *time and a half*, that is to say, one and a half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

(b) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime rate shall be equivalent to *double time*, that is to say, twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

(c) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48 the Overtime rate shall be *time and a half*, except in so far as the Overtime rate payable under the provisions of Sub-section (b) of this Section is applicable.

SECTION II.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board declare the *normal number of hours of work* in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week, 48.

On Saturday, 5.

On any other week day, 8½.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime rates shall apply.

SECTION III.—The Overtime Rates shall not apply to workers employed on Piece-work.

NOTE.—The hours which female workers and young persons are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART V.

For the purpose of this Notice the following definitions shall apply:—

SECTION I.—A learner is a worker who—

(1) (a) As respects a Male person, is employed during the whole or a substantial part of his time in learning (a) Cutting or (b) Nailing or (c) Cutting and Nailing in the Furriers' Section of the trade, by an em-

ployer who provides the learner with reasonable facilities for such learning;

(b) As respects a Female person, is employed during the whole or a substantial part of her time in learning (a) Machining or (b) Lining or (c) Finishing or more than one of these operations in the Furriers' Section of the trade by an employer who provides the learner with reasonable facilities for such learning; and

(2) Has received a certificate or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board or has made an application for such certificate or registration which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or registration of a learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

SECTION II.—A Homeworker is a worker who works in his or her own home or in any other place not under the control or management of the employer.

PART VI.

The above minimum rates of wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts and of this Notice, to all workers (including homeworkers) in Great Britain who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Fur) Order, 1919, that is to say:—The dressing, dyeing and making-up of Furs or of Skins for furriers' purposes; including the dressing or dyeing or general preparation of furs or skins; the manufacture of furs or skins into garments, rugs or other articles; the re-making, repairing or cleaning of articles made from furs or skins where carried on by fur dressers or fur manufacturers; the lining with fur of coats, cloaks, mantles, capes, gloves or similar articles where carried out by fur manufacturers; bundling, packing, warehousing and other operations carried on by fur skin merchants, fur dressers, fur dyers or fur manufacturers, *but excluding* the making-up of fur toys, purses, boots, shoes or slippers, the making of fur hats when carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making or trimming of men's, women's or children's headgear from other materials; warehousing, packing and other similar operations carried on in shops wholly, mainly, or substantially engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made on the premises.

Provided that the above minimum rates of wages shall *not apply* to workers employed in the dressing, or dyeing, or general preparation of skins, or in the manufacture of skins into garments, rugs or other articles *except* where such dressing, dyeing, general preparation or manufacture is carried on by fur dressers, fur dyers or fur manufacturers, or otherwise for furriers' purposes.

PART VII.

SECTION I.—The above minimum rates of wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of

contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above minimum rates of wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

PROPOSAL TO VARY MINIMUM RATES FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, in Great Britain, for the branches of Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Boot and Shoe Repairing) Order, 1919, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to vary (the Minister of Labour having given his consent to such Notice being given) the General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates at present fixed and set out in the Schedule to their Notice dated 15th November, 1919, and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour dated 12th November, 1919, in respect of certain classes of workers, as shown in the Schedule set out below.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

Proposed Variation of General Minimum Time-Rates for Male Workers employed on Power Sole-Stitching, Blake or Richardson Machines, or as Pressmen.

SECTION I.—For Male Workers of 21 years of age and over who are employed on:—

(a) Power Sole Stitchers and Blake (or Richardson) Machines, 80s. per week of 48 hours.

(b) Power Sole-Stitchers, 80s. per week of 48 hours.

(c) Blake or Richardson Machines, 75s. per week of 48 hours.

Provided that such workers have had at least three months' experience in working one or other of such machines.

SECTION II.—For Male Workers ordinarily employed on Piece-work, when temporarily employed on a Power Sole-Stitcher or Blake or Richardson Machine, 1s. 8d. per hour.

SECTION III.—For Male Workers who are employed as Pressmen and who are responsible for Cutting and Costing, 75s. per week of 48 hours.

PART II.

Proposed Variation of Overtime Rates for certain Classes of Male Workers employed on Power Sole-Stitchers, Blake or Richardson Machines, or as Pressmen, as specified in Part I. of this Schedule.

Overtime Rates, calculated on the General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Part I. of this

Schedule in the manner set out in the Schedule of the Notice issued by the Trade Board and dated 15th November, 1919, shall apply, in substitution for the rates set out in Part I. of this Schedule, in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in the Schedule of the Notice dated 15th November, 1919, to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

PART III.

Proposed Variation of Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers employed on Piece-Work on Work to which General Minimum Piece-Rates are Applicable.

The Trade Board propose to Vary the Overtime Rates at present fixed and set out in their Notice dated 15th November, 1919, and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour dated 12th November, 1919, so that in lieu of the Overtime Rates at present fixed, the Overtime Rates for Workers employed on piece-work for which General Minimum Piece-Rates have been fixed in respect of hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in the Notice above referred to, to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows, that is to say:—

I. For Workers employed on a particular piece of work commenced prior to the beginning of an Overtime period—

(a) For the first two hours' Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be a rate which is equivalent to the General Minimum Piece-Rate otherwise applicable, as fixed by the Trade Board and set out in their Notice dated 12th April, 1920, and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour dated 8th April, 1920, with an addition of 4½d. per hour.

(b) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be a rate, which is equivalent to the General Minimum Piece-Rate otherwise applicable, as fixed by the Trade Board and set out in their Notice dated 12th April, 1920, and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour dated 8th April, 1920, with an addition of 9d. per hour.

(c) For all time worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be a rate which is equivalent to the General Minimum Piece-Rate otherwise applicable, as fixed by the Trade Board and set out in their Notice dated 12th April, 1920, and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour dated 8th April, 1920, with an addition of 1s. 6d. per hour.

II. For workers employed on a particular piece of work commenced after the beginning of an Overtime period—

(a) For the first two hours' Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be a rate which is one-and-a-quarter times the General Minimum Piece-Rate otherwise applicable, as fixed by the Trade Board and set out in their Notice dated 12th April, 1920, and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour dated 8th April, 1920.

(b) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be a rate which is one-and-a-half times the General Minimum Piece Rate otherwise applicable, as fixed by the Trade Board and set out in their Notice dated 12th April, 1920, and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour dated 8th April, 1920.

(c) For all time worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be a Rate which is twice the General Minimum Piece Rate otherwise applicable, as fixed by the Trade Board and set out in their Notice dated 12th April, 1920, and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour dated 8th April, 1920.

PART IV.

General.

SECTION I.—The weekly minimum rates set out in Part I. of this Schedule are based on a week of 48 hours, but they shall be subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours actually spent in the factory or workshop in any week is less than 48.

SECTION II.—The respective minimum rates set out in this Schedule shall apply subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts and of this Notice to all workers in Great Britain who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Boot and Shoe Repairing) Order, 1919, that is to say, the repairing, wherever carried on, of boots, shoes, slippers, and all kinds of leather footwear, including the making of bespoke hand-sewn, riveted or pegged leather footwear, but excluding the manufacture of leather footwear on a large scale, the repairing of saddlery and leather goods other than leather footwear, and the retailing of leather footwear.

SECTION III.—The minimum rates set out in this Schedule are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to their Proposals which may be lodged with them within two months from the 13th April, 1920. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Boot and Shoe Repairing Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

PROPOSAL TO VARY MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with the Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for those Branches of the trade in Great Britain as specified in the Trade Boards (Tobacco) Order, 1919, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to vary the General Minimum Time-rates and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers at present fixed and set out in the Schedule to their Notice dated 5th August, 1919; and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour, dated 1st August, 1919, the variations proposed being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

Proposed Variation of General Minimum Time-rates.

SECTION I.—*Male Workers.*

Workers under 14½ years of age, from 15s. 6d. per week to 17s. 6d. per week.

Workers of 14½ and under 15 years of age, from 17s. per week to 19s. per week.

Workers of 15 and under 15½ years of age, from 18s. 6d. per week to 20s. 6d. per week.

Workers of 15½ and under 16 years of age, from 21s. per week to 23s. 6d. per week.

Workers of 16½ and under 17 years of age, from 25s. 6d. per week to 28s. 6d. per week.

Workers of 17½ and under 18 years of age, from 30s. 6d. per week to 34s. per week.

Workers of 18 and under 18½ years of age, from 35s. per week to 39s. per week.

Workers of 18½ and under 19 years of age, from 37s. 6d. per week to 42s. per week.

Workers of 19 and under 19½ years of age, from 41s. per week to 46s. per week.

Workers under 14½ years of age, from 12s. 6d. per week to 14s. per week.

Workers of 15 and under 15½ years of age, from 14s. 6d. per week to 16s. per week.

Workers of 15½ and under 16 years of age, from 15s. 6d. per week to 17s. per week.

Workers of 19½ and under 20 years of age, from 30s. 6d. per week to 33s. 6d. per week.

Workers of 20 and under 20½ years of age, from 31s. 6d. per week to 34s. 6d. per week.

Workers of 20½ and under 21 years of age, from 32s. 6d. per week to 36s. per week.

Workers of 21 years of age and upwards, from 35s. per week to 38s. 6d. per week.

Provided that learners in the manufacture of cigarettes by hand, of the age of 16 years and over, who enter the Hand Cigarette Making Branch of the trade for the first time, and who are employed on time work may be employed for a period of three months at a general minimum time-rate 20 per cent. below the general minimum time-rate applicable, as set out above.

Provided also that the above general minimum time-rates shall not apply during the first 12 months of their learnership to Learners to Hand or Mould Cigar-making as defined in the Notice issued by the Trade Board and dated 6th December, 1919.

SECTION III.—(a) The above minimum rates are for a week of 48 hours, and, except as set out below, are subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours of employment is less than 48.

(b) Provided that in the case of whole-time workers employed by the week or longer period, where the number of hours customarily worked per week in the establishment agreed between the employer and worker is less than 48;

(i) the weekly wage payable and applicable shall be not less than that set out above;

(ii) the weekly wage payable and applicable shall be subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours of employment is less than the number customarily worked in the establishment;

(iii) the weekly wage payable and applicable shall be subject to a proportionate increase according as the number of hours of employment up to 48 (excluding hours to which overtime rates are applicable as set out in Part II. below) is greater than the number customarily worked in the establishment.

NOTE.—Proviso (b) shall not apply in cases where the number of hours customarily worked per week in the establishment is less than 48 by reason of systematic short time being worked.

SECTION IV.—For the purpose of the application of the above rates to workers employed on piece-work, in accordance with the provisions of Section 6 (1) (b) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, each piece-rate paid must be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case to an Ordinary Worker not less than the weekly wage, as set out in Sections I. and II. above, or, in cases where the number of hours customarily worked is less

than 48, the rate applicable as provided by Section III. (b) above.

PART II.

Proposed Variation of Overtime Rates.

Overtime Rates, calculated on the General Minimum Time Rates set out above in the manner set out in the Schedule of the Notice issued by the Trade Board and dated 5th August, 1919, shall apply in substitution for the above General Minimum Time Rates, in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours therein declared by the Trade Board to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

PART III.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Great Britain who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Tobacco) Order, 1919, that is to say, the manufacture of Tobacco, Cigars, Cigarettes, Cigarette Tubes and Snuff, including all preparatory processes, and including also the operations of storing and store-keeping, boxing, packeting, labelling, parcelling and despatching, and all other warehousing and packing operations incidental to the manufacture of any of the above-mentioned articles.

Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, the above rates shall not apply to Apprentices to Cigar-Making who are working under Indentures of Apprenticeship.

PART IV.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposals to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from 14th April, 1920. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Tobacco Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

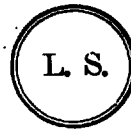

Dockyard Port of Rosyth—Regulations.

I. LIMITS OF THE DOCKYARD PORT
OF ROSYTH.

The Dockyard Port of Rosyth shall be:—
All the waters, bays, creeks and rivers so far as the tide flows, excepting the harbours of Charlestown, South Queensferry, Port Edgar and Inverkeithing, lying between the lines drawn as follows:—

On the East by a line drawn South (true) through the South point of Carron harbour in the County of Fife to the South shore of the Forth.

On the West by a line drawn North (true) through Carriden House to the North shore of the Forth.

II. GENERAL.

If at any time the anchor of any merchant or other private vessel hooks any Government moorings, or any electric cables, or moorings of buoys, the master or other person having the command or charge of such vessel shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice thereof to the Admiral Superintendent or the King's Harbour Master, in order that aid may be given for clearing such moorings or cables without doing damage to the same.

2. No merchant or other private vessel shall make fast to, or lie at, any of the buoys marking the channels or shoals in the Dockyard Port.

3. No merchant or other private vessel shall, without licence in writing from the Port Admiral, Admiral Superintendent or King's Harbour Master, be moored or fastened to any Government moorings, buoys or piles, or remain at anchor in the Dockyard Port.

4. All merchant or other private vessels shall be subject to the direction of the King's Harbour Master.

III. OBSERVANCE OF "REGULATIONS
FOR PREVENTING COLLISIONS AT
SEA."

All sea-going vessels when within the limits of the Dockyard Port of Rosyth shall carry such lights as are prescribed by the "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea," made from time to time under the Merchant Shipping Act, and all vessels of every description shall also observe the steering and sailing rules set forth in such regulations, except in so far as they are affected by the regulations herein after contained.

IV. VESSELS TO KEEP CLEAR OF HIS
MAJESTY'S SHIPS.

When one of His Majesty's vessels or other vessel in charge of His Majesty's officers intends to pass into, through or out of the Dockyard Port of Rosyth, she will hoist the Red Ensign over "M" flag (International Code—Alphabetical) by day, or a red light by night at the foremast head, and all others of His Majesty's vessels present in the port will hoist the Pilot Jack by day, or show position lights (two white lights vertical, 8 feet apart, hoisted at the peak, or, if no gaff, hoisted abreast the maintop in the middle line of the ship, or on the Ensign Staff) by night, as a general warn-

ing: The Pilot Jack will also be hoisted by day, or position lights at night, at the Signal Stations, North Queensferry, Rosyth Dockyard, and Inchkeith for the same purpose, and all other vessels under way in the Dockyard Port of Rosyth shall keep out of the way of the said vessel flying the Red Ensign over "M" flag, or showing a red light at the foremast head, provided always that the said vessel shall be navigated with due care and at a moderate speed, and that she shall, so far as is practicable, be kept on the side of the fairway which lies on her own starboard hand. Vessels are not to pass each other under the bridge. The inward-bound vessel is always to give way to the outward-bound vessel.

V. REGULATIONS FOR SAILING AND SMALL CRAFT TO KEEP CLEAR OF STEAMERS.

When any sea-going steamship; steam vessel towing, steam dredger or steam hopper, within the limits of the Dockyard Port shall, by reason of the crowded nature of the channel or anchorage, or from other cause, find it unsafe or impracticable to keep out of the way of a sailing vessel, or of a boat under oars or sail, or steam or other mechanical power, she shall signify the same to the sailing vessel or boat by four or more blasts of steam whistle blown in rapid succession, when the sailing vessel or boat shall keep out of the way of the sea-going steamship, provided always that the steam vessel shall be navigated with due care and at a moderate speed.

VI. SPEED OF VESSELS.

No merchant or other private vessel when navigating to the westward of Inchcolm and within the Dockyard Port limits shall proceed at a greater speed than 10 knots.

The King's Harbour Master shall from time to time issue such regulations as he deems necessary respecting the speed of vessels navigating the port, or any specified part of the port.

Such regulations shall be made known to mariners by Notice issued by the Admiralty, and published in the London Gazette at least 21 days before the regulations come into operation.

VII. PENALTIES.

The master of every merchant or other private vessel, or person in charge of any boat, to which this Order relates, shall observe and cause to be observed the provisions of this Order, as far as it relates to his vessel or boat, and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the provisions of this Order, or fails to observe or cause to be observed in any respect any of these provisions, he shall be deemed to be guilty of a misdemeanour.

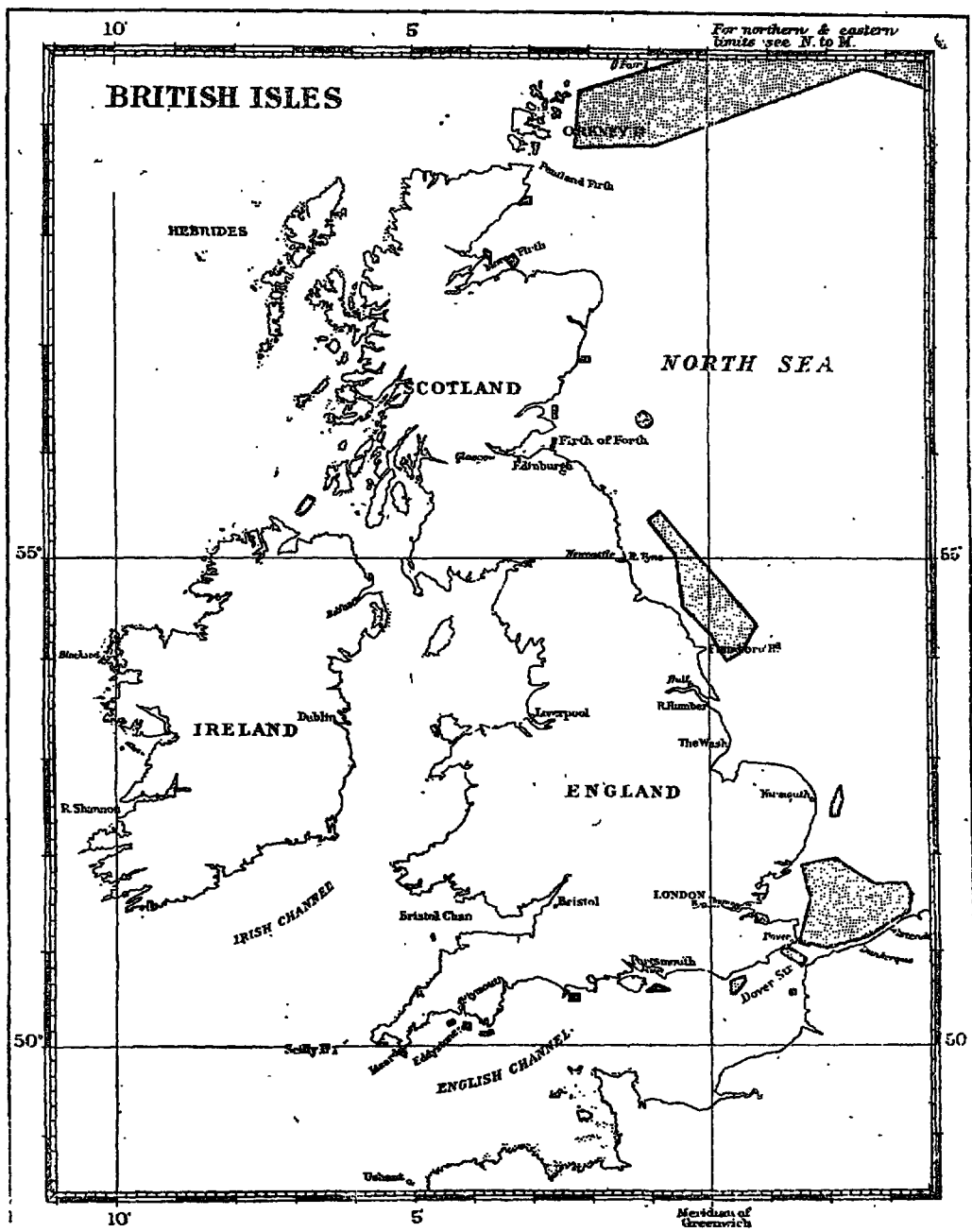
II. GENERAL INFORMATION REGARDING MINES.

When vessels have to anchor in areas where drifting mines may be found it is necessary that all obstructions should as far as possible be removed and gangways triced up before dark in order to minimise risk.



the bottom may still be dangerous. Surface vessels navigating these areas should therefore, whenever possible, have a clear depth of at least six feet between their keels and the bottom when in the vicinity of shoal water or in the approaches to ports and harbours which were subjected to mining operations during the war.

2. Mariners are notified that a small percentage of drifting mines are known to exist in a waterlogged condition, a fraction of which may be dangerous. This type of mine is hard to see, and special precautions are therefore necessary to ensure that a good lookout is kept.
