This Order shall come into force as from the first day of August, 1920, and may be cited as the Profiteering Acts, 1919 and 1920, Order (No. 15).

MERCHANT SHIPPING.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY.

THE MERCHANT SHIPPING (WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY) RULES, 1920, DATED JULY 10TH, 1920, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER THE MERCHANT SHIPPING (WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY) ACT, 1919 (9 & 10 GEO. 5, c. 38).

The Board of Trade hereby make the following rules under the provisions of the Merchant Shipping (Wireless Telegraphy) Act, 1919.

Interpretation.

1. In these Rules—

The expression "coasting trade" means

trade exclusively carried on between ports in the British Islands.

The number of hours occupied in a voyage from port to port means the normal number of hours occupied in a voyage between one port of call and the next.

Classification of Ships.

2. For the purposes of these Rules ships shall be classified as follows:—

Class I. Ships carrying 200 persons or more which are not engaged in the coasting trade.

Class II. Ships not engaged in the coasting trade carrying 50 but less than 200 persons and ships engaged in the coasting trade carrying 50 persons or more.

Class III. Ships carrying less than 50 persons.

In reckoning the number of persons carried by a ship there shall be included the normal crew of the ship and the maximum number of passengers permitted to be carried by the passenger certificate of the ship.

Nature of Installation.

3. The installation shall comply with the requirements of the International Radiotelegraph Convention, 1912, as modified by any other international agreement (and in particular the International Convention of Safety of Life at Sea, 1914), or of any international agreement by which the said Convention of 1912 may be superseded.

4. The installation shall be of the spark or interrupted continuous wave type.

5. (1) The installation shall include a normal installation and an emergency installation, except that where the normal installation complies with the requirements of this rule as to emergency installations as well as those as to normal installations a normal installation alone shall suffice.

(2) A normal installation must be capable of transmitting clearly perceptible signals from ship to ship over a range of at least 100 nautical miles by day under normal conditions and circumstances.

(3) An emergency installation must include an independent source of energy capable of being put into operation rapidly and of working for at least six continuous hours with a minimum range from ship to ship of 80 nautical miles for ships of Class I., and 50 nautical miles for ships of Classes II. and III., and such independent source of energy must be capable of being worked for at least six continuous hours independently from the source of propelling power for the ship, the steam supply system and the main electricity supply system.

(4) For the purposes of this rule an installation shall be deemed to comply with the above requirements as to range if it is able to maintain communication on a 600 metre wave at a range of one and a half times the number of nautical miles hereinbefore respectively prescribed over sea by day with a Post Office Standard Station when employing a receiver without amplification devices.

6. There shall be provided between the bridge and the wireless telegraph room means of communication by voice pipe, telephone or other means and an operator or watcher when on duty shall not leave the wireless telegraph room to deliver messages or to call his relief.

Ships not fitted with approved automatic apparatus.

7. If not fitted with an approved automatic apparatus for registering the signal of distress—

(i) A ship of Class I. shall carry certificated operators in accordance with the following table, and while at sea a certificated operator shall be always on watch:—

NATURE OF VOYAGE.	NUMBER AND GRADE OF OPERATORS.
(a) Voyage exceeding 48 hours from port to port.	Three operators, of whom one shall hold a First Grade Certificate, and not more than one a Third Grade Certificate.
(b) Voyage exceeding 8 hours but not exceeding 48 hours from port to port.	Two operators of whom one shall hold a First or a Second Grade certificate.
(c) Voyage not exceeding 8 hours from port to port.	One operator who shall hold a First or a Second Grade certificate.

(ii) A ship of Class II. shall carry certificated operators and certificated watchers in accordance with the following table, and while at sea a certificated operator shall always be on watch at the times specified in the Schedule to these Rules, and either a certificated operator or a certificated watcher shall always be on watch at other times.

NATURE OF VOYAGE.	NUMBER AND GRADE OF OPERATORS AND WATCHERS.
(a) Voyage exceeding 48 hours from port to port.	One operator who shall hold a First or a Second Grade certificate, and two watchers.
(b) Voyage exceeding 8 hours but not exceeding 48 hours from port to port.	One operator who shall hold a First or a Second Grade certificate, and one watcher.
(c) Voyage not exceeding 8 hours from port to port.	One operator who shall hold a First or a Second Grade certificate.

(iii) A ship of Class III. shall carry one operator who shall hold a First or a Second Grade certificate, and while at sea the operator shall always be on watch at the times specified in the Schedule to these Rules.

Ships fitted with approved automatic apparatus.

8. In the event of an automatic apparatus for registering the signal of distress being approved by the Board of Trade and the Postmaster-General a ship of Class III. shall be fitted with such apparatus unless the duration of the voyage on which it is employed does not exceed eight hours from port to port, but in such a case the operator shall be on watch during the whole time of the voyage.

9. If fitted with automatic apparatus for registering the signal of distress approved as aforesaid:—

(i) A ship of Class I. shall carry certificated operators in accordance with the following table and while at sea a certificated operator shall always be on watch during the times specified in the Schedule to these

Rules, and a watch shall be maintained at all other times either by a certificated operator, or by a watcher, or by means of the approved automatic apparatus:—

NATURE OF VOYAGE.	NUMBER AND GRADE OF OPERATORS.
(a) Voyage exceeding 48 hours from port to port.	Two operators, one of whom shall hold a First Grade certificate.
(b) Voyage not exceeding 48 hours from port to port.	One operator who shall hold a First or a Second Grade certificate.

(ii) A ship of Class II. shall carry one operator who shall hold a First or a Second Grade certificate, and while at sea the operator shall be on watch during the times specified in the Schedule to these Rules, and a watch shall be maintained at all other times either by an operator, or by a watcher, or by means of the approved automatic apparatus.

(iii) A ship of Class III. shall carry one operator who shall hold a First or a Second Grade certificate, and while at sea the operator shall be on watch during the times specified in the Schedule to these Rules, and a watch shall be maintained at all other times either by an operator, or by a watcher, or by means of the approved automatic apparatus.

Provided that if a ship of Class III. is fitted with an automatic apparatus for registering the signal of distress and with an automatic apparatus for registering the ship's own distinguishing signal, both of which have been approved by the Board of Trade and the Postmaster-General, the operator shall not, while the ship is more than 150 nautical miles from any coast station, be required to be on watch at the times specified in the Schedule to these Rules.

Qualifications of Operators.

10. (1) Operators shall be graded into three grades in accordance with Rules to be made by the Postmaster-General with the concurrence of the Board of Trade and watchers shall be certificated by the Postmaster-General.

(2) Until graded in accordance with such Rules as aforesaid:—

(i) An operator who holds the Postmaster-General's First Class Certificate of Proficiency and who has had three years' experience as an operator may be employed as if he held a First Grade certificate, but if an operator holding a First Grade certificate is available an operator holding a First Class certificate shall not be so employed on a ship of Class I. which is required by these Rules to carry three operators.

(ii) An operator who holds the Postmaster-General's First or Second Class certificate of Proficiency and who has had one year's experience as an operator may be employed as if he held a Second Grade certificate.

(iii) An operator who holds the Postmaster-General's First or Second Class certificate of Proficiency and who has had less than one year's experience as an operator may be employed as if he held a Third Grade certificate.

11. The Postmaster-General may accept cer-

tificates granted to operators by the Government of any part of His Majesty's Dominions or of a foreign country in pursuance of the regulations annexed to any International

Radiotelegraph Convention for the time being in force.

12. These Rules shall come into operation on the 1st day of September, 1920.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES (AS VARIED) FOR FEMALE AND MALE WORKERS.

EFFECTIVE AS FROM 2ND AUGUST, 1920.*

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by

the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under that Act and the Trade Boards Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1913, for the Hollow-ware Trade, as defined in the Regulations made by the Board of Trade and dated the 6th July, 1914, having given due notice on 11th March, 1920, of Proposal to Vary, as therein shown, the General Minimum Time-rates and Overtime Rates for Female Workers then in opera-

tion and set out in the Schedule to their Notice dated 24th January, 1920, and having given due Notice on 17th April, 1920, of Proposal to Vary as therein shown, the General Minimum Time-rates and Overtime Rates for Male Workers then in operation and set out in the Schedule of their Notice dated 10th April, 1920, hereby give notice that they have varied the aforesaid Minimum Rates of Wages for Female and Male Workers, and that the Minimum Rates of Wages as varied are shown in the Schedule set out below, which is incorporated herewith.

And the Trade Board further give notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order dated 29th July, 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the rates as varied by the Trade Board, and specifying 2nd August, 1920,* as the date from which such minimum rates shall become effective.

* NOTE.—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in no case later than 8th August, 1920.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

General Minimum Time-Rates.

SECTION I.—Female Workers.

1. Female learners of under 15 years of age, 13s. 9d. per week of 47 hours.
2. Female learners of 15 and under 16 years of age, 16s. 9d. per week of 47 hours.
3. Female learners of 16 and under 17 years of age, 21s. 3d. per week of 47 hours.
4. Female learners of 17 and under 18 years of age, 25s. 3d. per week of 47 hours.

Provided that a female learner who is over 16 years of age at the time of entering the trade may serve a period of one year as a learner at the following general minimum time-rates:—

First six months, 18s. 3d. per week of 47 hours.

Second six months, 19s. 6d. per week of 47 hours.

Thereafter the minimum rate shall be that applicable to the worker's age as set out herein.

5. Female Workers other than Learners, 34s. 3d. per week of 47 hours.

SECTION II.—Male Workers.

1. Male learners of under 14 years of age, 15s. per week of 47 hours.
2. Male learners of 14 and under 15 years of age, 16s. per week of 47 hours.
3. Male learners of 15 and under 16 years of age, 20s. per week of 47 hours.
4. Male learners of 16 and under 17 years of age, 26s. per week of 47 hours.
5. Male learners of 17 and under 18 years of age, 30s. per week of 47 hours.*
6. Male learners of 18 and under 19 years of age, 37s. 9d. per week of 47 hours.*
7. Male learners of 19 and under 20 years of age, 41s. 9d. per week of 47 hours.*
8. Male learners of 20 and under 21 years of age, 45s. 9d. per week of 47 hours.*
9. Male Workers other than Learners, 58s. 6d. per week of 47 hours.

* Provided that a male learner entering the trade between 17 and 21 years of age may serve a period of one year at a general minimum time-rate, which during the first six months is

5s. per week of 47 hours less and during the second six months is 2s. 6d. per week of 47 hours less than the general minimum time-rate otherwise applicable as set out herein.

SECTION III.—The weekly rates set out in this Part of this Schedule are based on a week of 47 hours and are subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours during which the worker is employed in any week is less than 47.

PART II.

SECTION I.

Overtime Rates for Female and Male Workers.

In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board hereby declare the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week	47
On Saturday	4½

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime.

SECTION II.

The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker, whether engaged on time-work or on piece-work, in excess of the normal number of hours shall be as follows:—

(a) In respect of all hours worked in excess of 4½ on Saturday the Overtime Rate shall be one and a half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable—i.e., time-and-a-half.

(b) In respect of all time worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable—i.e., double-time.

(c) In respect of all hours worked in excess of 47 in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be one and a quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable—i.e., time-and-a-quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (a) and (b) of this Section.

SECTION III.

The Overtime Rates are not applicable to Watchmen or to men employed solely as Firemen or Stokers.

NOTE.—The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Act.

PART III.

For the purpose of this notice a "learner" is any person, other than a male person of over 21 years of age, who is employed under conditions which, in the circumstances of the case, afford a reasonable prospect of advancement to the general minimum time-rate for workers other than learners.

PART IV.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Great Britain specified in Part I. above in respect of all time during which they are employed in those branches of the hollow-ware trade which are engaged in the making of hollow-ware from sheet iron or sheet steel, including the processes of galvanising, tinning, enamelling, painting, japanning, lacquering and varnishing.

PART V.

SECTION I.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deduc-

tions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES AS VARIED FOR
MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

EFFECTIVE AS FROM 9TH AUGUST, 1920.*

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under that Act and the Trade Boards Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1913, for certain branches of the Sugar Confectionery and Food Preserving Trade in Great Britain, as defined in the Regulations made by the Board of Trade and dated 23rd December, 1913, having given due notice on the 21st April, 1920, of Proposal to Vary the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-rates, and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers, hereby give notice that they have varied the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates, and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers set out in the Schedule of their Notice dated 20th February, 1920, the Minimum Rates of Wages as varied and the number of hours declared by the Trade Board to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

And the Trade Board further give notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order dated 28th July, 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the Minimum Rates of Wages as varied by the Trade Board and specifying 9th August, 1920,* as the date from which such Minimum Rates of Wages shall become effective.

*Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in no case later than 15th August, 1920.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

General Minimum Time-Rates for Male and
Female Workers.

SECTION I.—(a) All Male Workers; and

(b) Certain classes of Female Workers, viz.,
Female Workers who are employed during the

whole or any part of their time in any of the following occupations:—

Cocoa making.

Boiling sugar for boiled sweets, other than the boiling of sugar in vacuum pans.

Brogueing of hermetically sealed receptacles containing meat, poultry, fish or soup, during the process of cooking.

Hand-soldering of hermetically sealed receptacles containing meat, poultry, fish or soup.

Tongue pumping.

Butchers' or pork-butchers' work in preparing meat for sausages or "smalls."

Brining vegetables for pickling.

Making Extract of Meat.

Workers under 15 years of age, 3½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 13s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 4½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 17s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 5½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 22s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 6½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 27s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age, 8½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 34s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age, 9½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 38s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age, 10½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 42s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 21 and under 22 years of age, 11½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 46s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 22 and under 23 years of age, 1s. 0½d., *i.e.*, 50s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 23 and under 24 years of age, 1s. 1½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 54s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 24 years of age and upwards, 1s. 2½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 58s. per week of 48 hours.

The General Minimum Time-Rates set out in this Section are payable in the case of a worker under 24 years of age subject to the proviso that such a worker is employed under conditions which in the circumstances of the case afford a reasonable prospect of advancement to the General Minimum Time-Rate of 58s. per week of 48 hours. Otherwise the General Minimum Time-Rate payable shall be 58s. per week of 48 hours irrespective of age.

SECTION II.—Female Workers, other than those specified in Section I. (b) of this part of this Schedule:—

Workers under 15 years of age, 3½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 13s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 4½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 17s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 5½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 22s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 6½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 27s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 18 years of age and upwards, 8½d. per hour, *i.e.*, 34s. per week of 48 hours.

The General Minimum Time-Rates set out in this Section are payable in the case of a worker under 18 years of age, subject to the proviso that such a worker is employed under conditions which in the circumstances of the case afford a reasonable prospect of advancement to the General Minimum Time-Rate of 34s. per week of 48 hours. Otherwise the General Minimum Time-Rate payable shall be 34s. per week of 48 hours, irrespective of age.

In the case of a worker who enters the trade for the first time at the age of 15 years or over, and cannot suitably be employed on Piece-Work, the General Minimum Time-Rate payable during her first three months' employment

in the trade shall be 3s. per week less than the General Minimum Time-Rate which would otherwise be applicable according to her age, and during her second three months' employment in the trade shall be 1s. 6d. per week less than the General Minimum Time-Rate which would otherwise be applicable according to her age.

PART II.

Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for Male and Female Workers.

SECTION I.—(a) All Male Workers; and
(b) Those classes of Female Workers, specified in Section I. (b) of Part I. of this Schedule, 1s. 5d. per hour.

In the case of workers employed on Piece-Work each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 1s. 5d. per hour to an ordinary worker, *i.e.*, a worker of ordinary skill and experience in the classes of work in question.

SECTION II.—All Female Workers (other than those specified in Section I. (b) of Part I. of this Schedule); 10d. per hour.

In the case of workers employed on Piece-Work each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 10d. per hour to an ordinary worker, *i.e.*, a worker of ordinary skill and experience in the classes of work in question.

PART III.

Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers—All Ages.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—
—In any week, 48.

On any day (other than Saturday), 9.

On Saturday, 5.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on the days allowed as holidays under Section 35 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of all hours worked by Male and Female Workers in excess of such normal number of hours, shall be as follows:—

(a) For Male and Female Workers employed on Time-work:—

(1) For the first two hours of Overtime on any day, except Sundays and the holidays specified above, the Overtime Rate shall be one-and-a-quarter times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable; *i.e.*, time-and-a-quarter.

(2) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day, except Sundays and the holidays specified above, the Overtime Rate shall be one-and-a-half times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, time-and-a-half.

(3) For all time worked on Sundays and the days allowed as holidays under Section 35 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, the Overtime Rate shall be twice the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, double time.

(4) All hours worked in any week in excess of 48 shall be paid for as Overtime, and the Overtime Rate shall also be payable where on any day the number of hours worked exceeds 9 (or, in the case of

Saturday, exceeds 5), notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(b) For Male and Female Workers employed on Piece-work:—

I.—(1) Male Workers of 24 years of age and over;

(2) Female Workers of 24 years of age and over, in the classes specified in Section I (b) of Part I of the Schedule of this Notice; and

(3) All other Female Workers of 18 years of age and over—

Who are employed on Piece-work, shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to payment at Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker not less than the Piece-work Basis Time-Rate applicable, a sum equivalent to the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate, to one-half of the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate, or to one-quarter of the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate, which would have been payable under the provisions of paragraph (a) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-work were Double Time, Time-and-a-half or Time-and-a-quarter respectively.

II.—(1) Male Workers under 24 years of age:

(2) Female Workers under 24 years of age in the classes specified in Section I (b) of Part I of the Schedule of this Notice; and

(3) All other Female Workers under 18 years of age—

Who are employed on Piece-work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to payment at Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker not less than the Piece-work Basis Time-Rate applicable, a sum equivalent to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, to one-half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, or to one-quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of paragraph (a) of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time-work were Double Time, Time-and-a-half or Time-and-a-quarter respectively.

SECTION III.

Notwithstanding anything contained in Sections I. and II. of this part of this notice:—

(1) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on 5 days a week, the Overtime Rate shall only be payable where on any day the number of hours worked exceeds 9½.

(2) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the normal number of hours for the week in which attendance on Saturday is required shall be deemed to be 50.

NOTE.—The hours which Female Workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART IV.

SECTION I.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Great Britain specified in Part I. of this Schedule, in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Sugar Confectionery and Food Preserving) Order, 1913 (that is to say:—the making of Sugar Confectionery, Cocoa, Chocolate, Jam, Marmalade, Preserved Fruits, Fruit and Table Jellies, Meat Extracts, Meat Essences, Sauces and Pickles, the preparation of Meat, Poultry, Game, Fish, Vegetables and Fruit for sale in a preserved state in tins, pots, bottles and similar receptacles; the processes of wrapping, filling, packing and labelling in respect of articles so made or prepared), excluding the covering and filling of biscuits, wafers and cakes with chocolate or sugar confectionery, as varied by the Trade Boards (Grocery and Provisions) Order, 1920, by virtue of which certain operations are excluded from the scope of the Trade Boards (Sugar Confectionery and Food Preserving) Order, 1913, when carried on in conjunction with the retail or wholesale sale of the articles specified in the schedules to the Trade Boards (Grocery and Provisions) Order, 1920. Provided that, notwithstanding anything contained in this Section, the above Minimum Rates shall not apply to Clerks, Salesmen, Saleswomen, Travellers, Engineers, Carpenters, Vanmen, Watchmen, Outside Messengers, Cleaners of Premises, Timekeepers, or to any other workers whose work stands in a relationship to the trade similar to that of the foregoing excluded classes.

SECTION II.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION III.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

PROPOSAL TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS (OTHER THAN HOME-WORKERS).

In accordance with Regulations made under section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Pin, Hook and Eye and Snap Fastener trade as specified in the Trade Boards (Pin, Hook and Eye and Snap Fastener) Order, 1919, hereby give notice as required

by section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to fix general minimum time-rates and overtime rates for male and female workers (other than home-workers), and also piece-work basis time-rates for female workers (other than home-workers), and to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade for the purpose of the application of the overtime rates, as follows:—

PART I.

Proposed General Minimum Time-Rates for Male and Female Workers (other than Home-workers).

SECTION 1.—Male Workers—

Workers of 21 years of age and over,
1s. 3½d. per hour.

Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age,
1s. 2d. per hour.

Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age,
11½d. per hour.

Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age,
9d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age,
8d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age,
7d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age,
6d. per hour.

Workers under 15 years of age, 4½d. per hour.

SECTION 2.—Female Workers—

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 9d per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age,
7½d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age,
6½d. per hour.

Workers of 15½ and under 16 years of age,
5½d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 15½ years of age,
5d. per hour.

Workers of 14½ and under 15 years of age,
4d. per hour.

Workers of 14 and under 14½ years of age,
3½d. per hour.

Provided that in the case of female workers entering the trade for the first time at or over the age of 18 years the general minimum time-rate applicable during the first two months of employment shall be 8d. per hour.

PART II.

Proposed Piece-work Basis Time-Rates for Female Workers (other than Home-workers).

SECTION I.—For all female workers other than those employed in carding, 10d. per hour.

In the case of all female workers to whom this section is applicable each piece-rate paid shall be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than 10d. per hour to an ordinary worker (that is, a female worker of ordinary skill and experience in the circumstances in question).

SECTION II.—For female workers employed in carding:—

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 10d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age,
8½d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age,
7½d. per hour.

Workers of 15½ and under 16 years of age,
6d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 15½ years of age, 5½d. per hour.

Workers of 14½ and under 15 years of age, 4½d. per hour.

Workers of 14 and under 14½ years of age, 3½d. per hour.

In the case of female workers employed on piece-work in carding, each piece-rate paid shall be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, at least the equivalent of the appropriate piece-work basis time-rate to an ordinary worker (that is, a female worker of ordinary skill and experience in the circumstances in question).

PART III.

Proposed Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers (all ages).

SECTION I.—In accordance with section 3 (i) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board propose to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week, 47.

On Saturday, 4½.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on statutory holidays shall be regarded as overtime, to which the overtime rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Trade Board propose to fix minimum rates for overtime for all male and female workers (other than home-workers), in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade, as follows, that is to say:—

A.—Male and female workers employed on time-work—

(a) For all hours worked on Sundays and statutory holidays, the overtime rate shall be twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable, i.e., double time.

(b) For all hours worked in excess of 4½ on Saturday, the overtime rate shall be one-and-a-half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, i.e., time-and-a-half, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 47.

(c) For all hours worked in excess of 47 in any week, the overtime rate shall be one-and-a-quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, i.e., time-and-a-quarter for the first ten hours, and one-and-a-half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, i.e., time-and-a-half thereafter, except in so far as higher overtime rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (a) and (b) of this subsection.

B.—Female workers employed on piece-work—

A female worker employed on piece-work shall be entitled to receive in respect of each hour of overtime worked in addition to piece-rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker, not less than the respective appropriate piece-work basis time-rate, as set out in Part II. of this notice, a sum equivalent to the appropriate general minimum time-rate, to one-half of the appropriate general minimum

time-rate, or to one-quarter of the appropriate general minimum time-rate, according as the overtime rate, which would be payable under the provisions of Part A. of this section, if the worker were employed on time-work, were double time, or time-and-a-half, or time-and-a-quarter respectively.

C.—Male Workers employed on piece-work—

A male worker employed on piece-work shall be entitled to receive in respect of each hour of overtime worked, in addition to piece-rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker, not less than the respective appropriate general minimum time-rate as set out in Section I of Part I of this notice, a sum equivalent to the appropriate general minimum time-rate, to one-half the appropriate general minimum time-rate, or to one-quarter of the appropriate general minimum time-rate, according as the overtime rate payable under the provisions of Part A. of this section, if the worker had been employed on time-work, were double-time, or time-and-a-half, or time-and-a-quarter respectively.

NOTE.—The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART IV.

The above proposed minimum rates of wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers except home-workers in respect of any time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Pin, Hook and Eye and Snap Fastener) Order, 1919, that is to say:—

The manufacture of pins, hairpins, hooks and eyes, haircurlers, snap fasteners, or safety pins, from the following metals in wire or sheet form—

Aluminium, copper, iron, lead, steel, tin, zinc or alloys of any two or more of the above metals;

Including—(a) The capping of safety pins;

(b) The operation of pin sticking;

(c) Packeting, boxing or carding of any of the above articles wherever carried on;

(d) Packing, despatching, warehousing or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of any of the above articles;

but excluding—(e) The manufacture of steel hatpins or shanks for steel toilet pins, wherever carried on.

The above proposed minimum rates of wages shall not apply to home-workers.

PART V.

SECTION I.—The above proposed minimum rates of wages shall be paid clear of all deductions, other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by subsequent enactments, or deductions authorized by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above minimum rates of wages are without prejudice to workers who are

earning higher rates of wages, or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these minimum rates of wages.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above proposals which may be lodged with them within two months from the 3rd August, 1920. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Pin, Hook and Eye and Snap Fastener Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery-lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

APPENDIX.

The Sack and Bag Trade, that is to say:—

The making from woven fabrics of corn sacks, flour sacks, coal sacks, sugar sacks, cement bags, sand bags, nail bags, potato bags, seed bags and similar sacks or bags, or the repairing thereof,

including:—

- (a) the following and similar operations (whether performed by hand or machine), known in the trade as:—
 - (i.) folding (or hooking), cutting, machining, turning;

- (ii.) brushing, selecting, mending;

- (iii.) branding, tarring, bundling;

- (b) the warehousing of, the packing of, and similar operations in regard to sacks or bags of the kind mentioned above when carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making or repairing thereof;

- (c) the warehousing of, the packing of, and similar operations in regard to any other articles when carried on in or in association with or in conjunction with any business, establishment, branch or department mainly engaged in any of the operations mentioned in paragraph (b) above;

but excluding:—

1. Any of the operations mentioned above when carried on in association with or in conjunction with the weaving of jute, flax or hemp, or the dyeing, bleaching or finishing of jute, flax or hemp yarn or cloth;

2. Any of the operations mentioned above when carried on in or in association with or in conjunction with any business, establishment, branch or department mainly engaged in a business in which the sacks or bags are used as containers for other articles the production or sale of which forms part of the business;

3. The making of rope-bound coal or coke sacks when carried on in association with or in conjunction with any business, establishment, branch or department engaged in the making of made-up textile articles other than sacks or bags, whether rope-bound or not, of the kind mentioned in this Order;

4. Any of the operations mentioned in paragraph (b) above when carried on in or in association with or in conjunction with any business, establishment, branch or department mainly engaged in the warehousing of, the packing of, and similar operations in regard to other made-up textile articles other than sacks or bags, whether rope-bound or not, of the kind mentioned in this Order;

5. Operations included in the Trade Boards (Waste Materials Reclamation) Order, 1920.

(a) the designing, making or renovating of wigs, whiskers, beards, moustaches, fringes, toupées, switches, pads, frames, pin-curls, partings, transformations or similar articles for human use or adornment;

(b) the making of hair-lace or hair-net for use as a foundation for any of the articles mentioned in sub-paragraph (a) above.

3. Any of the following or similar operations, preparatory to the making or renovating of the articles mentioned in paragraph 2 above, when performed in or in connection with any business, establishment, branch or department in which any of the operations specified in this paragraph or in paragraph 2 above are the main or principal business of the business, establishment, branch or department, viz.:— operations known in the trade as—

Measuring, cleaning, drying, sorting, carding, drawing, mounting, mixing, weaving, sewing, knotting, dressing, craping, tinting, dyeing, matching, curling, plaiting.

Including:—

(a) The making or designing of wigs for dolls when carried on in or in association with, or in conjunction with any business, establishment, branch or department engaged in any of the operations included in paragraphs 1, 2, or 3 above, by workers who are also engaged in any of the operations included in the said paragraphs;

(b) Razor setting, hand or vibro massage, perfuming, electric treatment, depilatory operations, chiropody or manicure, when carried on in association with or in conjunction with any of the operations included in paragraph 1 above;

(c) The retail sale of any articles when transacted in association with or in conjunction with any of the operations included in paragraphs 1 or 2 above, by workers also

engaged in any of the operations specified above;

(d) The following or similar operations when incidental to the sales or operations specified above, viz.:—operations known in the trade as:—

(i) bottling, boxing, parcelling, bagging, packeting, labelling, packing, checking, unpacking;

(ii) weighing, measuring, mixing;

(iii) polishing, cutting, grinding, crushing;

(iv) collecting, delivering, despatching;

(v) time-keeping, storing, stock-keeping, warehousing, portering, lift or hoist operating, cleaning premises;

(vi) cleaning or adjusting implements, cleaning utensils or receptacles;

(e) The washing, ironing, or drying of towels, hair cutting cloths or similar articles when incidental to and performed by workers also engaged in any of the operations specified above;

(i) The transport of goods by common carriers;

They show lights and fog signals, buoys and beacons, sites of wrecks, and the direction of the flood and ebb streams; soundings are given in fathoms; conspicuous objects on land are also shown for navigational purposes.

TRAMWAY BYE-LAWS.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the following Bye-laws were, on the 8th day of July, 1920, made and sealed by the Tees-side Railless Traction Board, viz. :—

BYE-LAWS MADE BY THE TEES-SIDE RAILLESS TRACTION BOARD UNDER AND BY VIRTUE OF THE POWERS CONFERRED ON THE BOARD BY THE TRAMWAYS ACT, 1870, THE MIDDLESBROUGH CORPORATION ACT, 1919, AND THE ACT INCORPORATED THEREWITH.

Interpretation.

1. Throughout these Bye-laws the word "Board" means the Tees-side Railless Traction Board; the word "Car" means any Trolley, Vehicle, Carriage or Car run by the Board for the conveyance of Passengers; the word "Conductor" means any Officer or Employee of the Board having charge of or helping in the charge of a Car, and the word "Driver" means any Officer or Employee of the Board driving or helping to drive a Car.

Entering and Leaving Cars.

2. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a Car by the hindermost or Conductor's platform, and not otherwise. When a Car stops no person shall board the car until all passengers desiring to alight therefrom shall have done so.

Alighting at a Terminus.

3. No person other than a servant of the Board acting in the performance of his duty shall remain in or on any Car after its arrival at a terminus, and no person shall enter in or on any Car until it has turned the loop and stands ready to load for the return journey.

Smoking.

4. No person shall smoke or carry a lighted pipe or cigar or cigarette inside any Car.

Musical Instruments.

5. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any Car, play or perform upon any musical instrument.

Intoxicated Persons.

6. No person in a state of intoxication, or affected with any dangerous, contagious or infectious disorder, shall enter or mount upon any Car, and any such person found in or upon any Car shall be immediately removed from the Car by, or under the direction of, the Conductor.

Obscene or Offensive Language, &c.

7. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language in or upon any Car, or spit or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any Car, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

Damage to Car.

8. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice in or on any Car, or break, or scratch any window of or otherwise wilfully damage any Car.

Any person acting in contravention of this Bye-law shall, in addition to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws, be liable to pay the amount of any damage so done.

Objectionable Persons.

9. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the Conductor, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the Car, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or who, in the opinion of the Conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not mount, enter or remain on or in any Car, and may be prevented from so doing, and, if found on or in any Car, shall, on request of the Conductor, leave the same upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned; Provided that on Cars specially run for artisans, mechanics and daily labourers, no persons shall be prevented from entering or remaining in or on a Car under the provisions of this Bye-law, on the ground of the condition of his dress or clothing, if such condition is solely due to the nature of his employment.

Payment of Fares.

10. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the Conductor or other servant of the Board acting in the performance of his duty, the fare legally demandable for the journey, or for the stage thereof for which it be demanded.

Payment into Box.

11. Each passenger when tickets are not issued shall, during each stage of the journey for which a fare is payable, pay into the box provided for the purpose the fare so payable.

Tickets.

12. Each passenger when tickets are issued shall, before leaving the Car, or immediately upon demand by the Conductor, if such demand be first made, pay to the Conductor the fare legally payable for his journey and accept a ticket therefor; and shall also when requested so to do by the Conductor or other servant of the Board acting in the performance of his duty, produce his ticket for inspection, and deliver up the same on leaving the Car.

Luggage.

13. No person shall bring on to any Car any luggage other than his own personal luggage, and shall be placed by the passenger in such position on the Car as shall be directed by the Conductor.

Travelling on Steps, &c.

14. No passenger or other person, not being an authorised officer of the Board, shall be permitted to travel on the steps of any Car, or to travel on the platform of any Car where suitable fixed seats are not provided on such platform, or to travel on any platform occupied by the Driver of any Car, whether seats shall or shall not be provided on such last-mentioned platform, and any passenger or other person so travelling, standing or sitting, shall cease to do so immediately on request by the Conductor.

No person except a passenger or intending passenger, or an authorised officer, shall enter or mount any Car, and no person shall hold or hang on by, or to any part of any Car.

Full Number of Passengers.

15. When any Car contains the full number of passengers for which seating accommodation is provided, no person beyond such number shall enter, mount or remain thereon, except in the interior thereof, by the express permission of the Conductor first obtained.

Entering or Leaving Car in Motion.

16. No person shall enter, mount or leave, or attempt to enter, mount or leave any Car in motion.

Dogs.

17. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any Car, except by the permission of the Conductor, nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or an annoyance to passengers. No person shall take a dog or other animal into any Car after being requested not to do so by the Conductor. Any dog or other animal taken into or on any Car in breach of this Bye-law shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the Car immediately upon request by the Conductor, and in default of compliance with such request may be removed by or under the direction of the Conductor.

Firearms, &c.

18. No person shall travel in or on any Car with loaded firearms, or with any article, instrument or implement, or any material or substance which may be dangerous or offensive to the passengers.

Interference with Driver or Conductor.

19. No person other than the Conductor or Driver, or other servant of the Board acting in the performance of his duty, shall change or remove the route indicators, or destination boards, or interfere with the controller, brakes, lights, ventilators, trolley cord, or any part of a Car or its equipment, and no person other than the Conductor, or other servant of the Board acting in the performance of his duty, shall signal a Car to start.

Obstruction.

20. No person shall wilfully obstruct or impede any Conductor, Driver, or other servant of the Board acting in the performance of his duty upon or in connection with any Car.

Disabled Car.

21. If at any time a Car becomes disabled, or in any way damaged, or from any cause unable to proceed, the passengers shall, upon request of the Conductor, leave the same, and if such passengers have paid their fares they shall not be entitled to demand back the amount of their fares so paid, but, on production of their tickets, shall be allowed to travel by the next available Car the remainder of the distance in respect of which they have paid their fares. No person shall, except with the leave of the Conductor, enter a disabled or damaged Car.

Breach of Bye-laws.

22. Any person who shall commit, whilst in or on any Car, any breach of these Bye-laws and Regulations; shall, if the offence is continued, be liable, in addition to incurring the penalty hereinafter provided, to be immediately removed from the Car by, or under the direction of the Conductor, and if such person shall have paid his fare, he shall not be entitled to claim its return.

Conductors and Drivers to Enforce Bye-laws.

23. Every Conductor and Driver of a Car shall, to the best of his ability, enforce these Bye-laws, and prevent the breach thereof.

Penalty.

24. Any person offending against, or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Forty Shillings.

25. There shall be placed and kept in a conspicuous position inside of each Car in use, a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations.

Operation.

26. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the 1st day of October, 1920.
