**T**HIS day, the Right Honourable Kenneth Augustus, Lord Muir-Mackenzie, G.C.B., Lieutenant-Colonel the Honourable Walter Edward Guinness, D.S.O., T.D., M.P., Captain the Honourable Edward Algernon FitzRoy, M.P., Sir George Ambrose Lloyd, G.C.S.I., G.C.I.E., D.S.O., Sir James Tynte Agg-Gardner, M.P., Sir Herbert Nield, K.C., M.P., and Lieutenant-Colonel Wilfrid William Ashley, M.P., were, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took their places at the Board accordingly.

**W**HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 30th day of January, 1924 (G.H.), in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas by Section 20 of the Greenwich Hospital Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that the Admiralty shall, from time to time,

continue or appoint such Officers, Clerks and Servants for the purposes of the Hospital and Schools as seem fit, and may (subject to the approval of Your Majesty in Council) fix the salaries of such Officers and Clerks :

"And whereas by Section 8 of the Greenwich Hospital Act of 1872, it is enacted that the provisions of Section 20 of the Greenwich Hospital Act, 1865, so far as the same relate to salaries, shall extend to pecuniary benefits of any kind :

"And whereas by an Order in Council of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, bearing date the 20th April, 1880, it is provided, *inter alia*, that the Officers of the Royal Hospital School, Greenwich, shall include a Medical Officer, with residence :

"And whereas by Your Majesty's Order in Council dated the 11th June, 1920, it is provided, *inter alia*, that the Naval Officer who conducts the Cash and Store duties of the Royal Hospital School, Greenwich, shall receive the full pay and allowances of his rank :

"And whereas we are of opinion that the appointments of Medical Officer and Cashier and Store Officer of the Royal Hospital School, Greenwich, should be held by Naval Officers selected from amongst those on the Retired List :

"And whereas by Your Majesty's Order in Council dated the 13th October, 1922, it is authorized, *inter alia*, that the scale of salary of the Receiver and Agent for the Greenwich Estate shall be fixed at the rate of £300 to £400 per annum :

"And whereas we are of opinion that a temporary allowance, in addition to the scale of

salary authorized, should be paid to the Receiver and Agent for the Greenwich Estate in consideration of the extra duty imposed on him in connection with the removal of the Royal Hospital School from Greenwich to Holbrook, near Ipswich:

"And whereas Mr. William H. Evans, a former Master in the Royal Hospital School, Greenwich, retired from the service of Greenwich Hospital on the 31st March, 1923, on account of age:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction:—

"1. The appointment of Medical Officer of the Royal Hospital School, Greenwich, being held by a Retired Naval Medical Officer at a salary at the rate of Four hundred and fifty pounds (£450) per annum, payable out of Greenwich Hospital funds, and an official residence, or an allowance in lieu, with effect as from the 18th January, 1923.

"2. The appointment of Cashier and Store Officer of the Royal Hospital School, Greenwich, being held by a Retired Naval Accountant Officer at a salary at the rate of Four hundred and fifty pounds (£450) per annum, payable out of Greenwich Hospital funds, and an official residence, or an allowance in lieu, with effect as from the 29th August, 1923.

"3. An allowance at the rate of One hundred and twenty-five pounds (£125) per annum, from Greenwich Hospital funds, being paid to the Receiver and Agent for the Greenwich Estate, as from the 19th October, 1923, during the time over which the extra duty extends.

"4. The grant from the funds of Greenwich Hospital to Mr. William H. Evans of a pension at the rate of Sixty-three pounds, nineteen shillings and eight pence (£63 19s. 8d.) per annum as from the date of his retirement, and a gratuity of One hundred and seventy pounds twelve shillings and six pence (£170 12s. 6d.)."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**WHEREAS** by the Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, from time to time, by Order in Council, to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of that Act, and to make regulations in relation to any Dockyard Port for all or any of the purposes in the said Act particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary with a view to the proper protection of His Majesty's vessels, dockyards, or property, or to the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service:

And whereas by the same Act it is also enacted that in relation to any Dockyard Port, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, from time to time, by Order in Council, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, to make rules concerning the Lights or Signals to be carried or used, and the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by His Majesty's vessels, and other vessels, navigating the waters of the Port and of the approaches thereto:

And whereas in pursuance of the said Act certain Regulations and Rules were made by Orders in Council dated the 16th day of December, 1912, the 9th day of February, 1914, the 4th day of September, 1918, the 21st day of December, 1920, and the 13th day of October, 1922, with reference to the Dockyard Port of Portsmouth:

And whereas it appears expedient to amend such Rules as hereinafter provided:

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Him vested, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order shall take effect from one calendar month from the date hereof.

2. Clauses 17 and 20 of the Second Schedule to the said Order in Council dated the 16th day of December, 1912, as amended by the said Order in Council dated the 13th day of October, 1922, are hereby repealed.

3. The following Rules shall have effect in relation to the Dockyard Port of Portsmouth, and shall be read and construed as though inserted in the Second Schedule of the said Order in Council dated the 16th day of December, 1912, in the position indicated by the numbers prefixed thereto:—

17. When one of His Majesty's vessels or other vessel being either in charge of His Majesty's Officers or over 2,500 tons gross register intends to pass in or out of the Harbour she shall hoist the Red Ensign over "M" flag (International Code—alphabetical) by day, or a red light by night at the foremast head, and all other of His Majesty's vessels present in the port shall hoist the Pilot Jack by day, or show position lights (two white lights vertical 8 feet apart, hoisted at the peak, or if no gaff, hoisted abreast of the maintop in the middle line of the ship or on the Ensign Staff) by night, as a general warning. The Pilot Jack shall be hoisted by day, or position lights by night at the sub-signal station, King's Stairs, at Fort Blockhouse, and at "Vernon" Shore Establishment, and position lights shall also be shewn at the Horse Fort by night, for the same purpose, and all other vessels under way in the harbour shall keep out of the way of the said vessel flying the Red Ensign over "M" flag by day, or showing the red light by night, at the foremast head; provided always that the said vessel shall be navigated with due care and at a moderate speed.

20. When it is specially necessary to keep the harbour channel clear owing to a very large vessel or royal yacht entering or leav-

ing harbour, a red oblong flag with a white diagonal bar from the outer upper corner will be hoisted by day, or three green lights vertical by night, at the sub-signal station, King's Stairs, Fort Blockhouse, "Vernon" Shore Establishment, and Horse Fort, and while this flag is flying or those green lights are being shewn, no vessel is to enter the harbour from either end.

WHEREAS by Section 91 of the Patents and Designs Acts, 1907, (7 Edw. 7, c. 29), as amended by the Patents and Designs Act, 1914, (4 and 5 Geo. 5, c. 18), and the Patents and Designs Act, 1919, (9 and 10 Geo. 5, c. 80), it is enacted as follows:—

"91.—(1) If His Majesty is pleased to make any arrangement with the Government of any Foreign State for mutual protection of inventions, or designs, or trade marks, then any person who has applied for protection for any invention design or trade mark in that State, or his legal representative or assignee, shall be entitled to a patent for his invention or to registration of his design or trade mark under this Act or the Trade Marks Act, 1905, in priority to other applicants; and the patent or registration shall have the same date as the date of the application in the Foreign State.

"Provided that—

"(a) The application is made in the case of a patent within 12 months and in the case of a design or trade mark within 4 months, from the application for protection in the Foreign State; and

"(b) Nothing in this Section shall entitle the patentee or proprietor of the design or trade mark to recover damages for infringements happening prior to the actual date of which his complete specification is accepted, or his design or trade mark is registered, in this country.

"(2) The patent granted for the invention or the registration of a design or trade mark shall not be invalidated:—

"(a) In the case of a patent, by reason only of the publication of a description of, or use of, the invention; or

"(b) In the case of a design, by reason only of the exhibition or use of, or the publication of a description or representation of, the design; or

"(c) In the case of a trade mark, by reason only of the use of the trade mark,

in the United Kingdom or the Isle of Man during the period specified in this Section as that within which the application may be made.

"(3) The application for the grant of a patent, or the registration of a design, or the registration of a trade mark under this Section, must be made in the same manner

as an ordinary application under this Act or the Trade Marks Act, 1905:—

"Provided that—

"(a) In the case of patents the application shall be accompanied by a complete specification, which, if it is not accepted within the 12 months from the application for protection in the Foreign State, shall with the drawings (if any) be open to public inspection at the expiration of that period; and

"(b) In the case of trade marks, any trade mark the registration of which has been duly applied for in the country of origin may be registered under the Trade Marks Act, 1905.

"(4) The provisions of this Section shall apply only in the case of those Foreign States with respect to which His Majesty by Order in Council declares them to be applicable, and so long only in the case of each State as the Order in Council continues in force with respect to that State.

"(5) Where it is made to appear to His Majesty that the Legislature of any British Possession has made satisfactory provision for the protection of inventions, designs or trade marks, patented or registered in this country, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to apply the provision of this Section to that Possession, with such variations or additions, if any, as may be stated in the Order":

And whereas by Section 103 of the Patents, Designs and Trade Marks Act, 1883, as amended by Section 6 of the Patents, Designs and Trade Marks Act (Amendment) Act, 1885, and by Section 1 of the Patents Act, 1901, and since repealed by Section 98 of the said Patents and Designs Act, 1907, provisions were made to the same or like effect as those above set forth as contained in Section 91 of the last-mentioned Act and by the said Section 98 it was provided that "this repeal shall not affect any Convention, Order in Council, Rule, or Table of Fees having effect under any enactment so repealed, but any such Convention, Order in Council, Rules, or Table of Fees in force at the commencement of this Act shall continue in force and may be repealed, altered or amended, as if it had been made under this Act":

And whereas it pleased Her late Majesty Queen Victoria to make an arrangement of the nature contemplated by the said Section 103 and in virtue of a declaration signed and sealed by Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, on the 17th March, 1884, duly conveying the accession of Great Britain and Ireland to the International Convention and Protocol for the protection of Industrial Property, signed by Representatives of certain Powers on the 20th March, 1883, and duly ratified on the 6th June, 1884, power being reserved to Her Majesty to accede thereafter to the provisions of the said Convention and Protocol on behalf of the Isle of Man, the Channel Islands, and any of Her Majesty's Possessions, which Declaration of Accession was duly accepted by the French Government on behalf of the Signatory Powers by and in virtue of a Declaration dated the 2nd April, 1884:

And whereas on the 14th December, 1900, at Brussels, an Additional Act was agreed upon between Her late Majesty Queen

Victoria and the Heads of the Foreign Countries parties thereto for the purpose of modifying certain of the provisions of the said International Convention and the Protocol annexed thereto, the ratification of which Additional Act was duly effected:

And whereas by a Convention signed at Washington on the 2nd June, 1911, His Majesty and the Heads of the Foreign States named therein agreed to make certain modifications in and additions to the said Convention dated 20th March, 1883, as revised at Brussels on the 14th December, 1900, the ratification of which Convention was duly effected by Great Britain and certain other States:

And whereas by various Orders in Council Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and His late Majesty King Edward VII and His present Majesty have been pleased to declare that the hereinbefore mentioned provisions of the said Patents, Designs and Trade Marks Act, 1883 (as amended), should apply to the several Foreign Countries named in the said Orders parties to the said Convention and Protocols:

And whereas the Republic of Esthonia has acceded to the said International Convention Protocol and Additional Act as revised at Washington on 2nd June, 1911:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of the powers in Him vested by the above-recited provisions, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth declare, and it is hereby declared, as follows:—

1. The provisions of Section 91 of the Patents and Designs Act, 1907, as amended by the Patents and Designs Act, 1914, and the Patents and Designs Act, 1919, shall apply to the Republic of Esthonia.

2. This Order shall take effect as from the 12th February, 1924.

3. This Order may be cited as the Industrial Property Convention (Accession of Esthonia) Order, 1924.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property situate in the City of London now vested in us:

"Whereas the property, particulars whereof are set forth in the Schedule hereunder written, is now vested in us not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but in possession, and we are desirous of selling the

same or some portion thereof for the improvement of our Common Fund:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty that we may be authorized and empowered to sell or dispose of and duly to transfer or convey from time to time all or part of the said property described in the said Schedule for such consideration as shall appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"Freehold premises known as No. 11, King Street, in the City of London."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of London.

**WHEREAS** the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, and of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1921, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 24th day of January, 1924, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, and of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1921, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the union of two neighbouring Benefices, that is to say, the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Lutton with Washingley situate partly in the County of Northampton and partly in the County of Huntingdon, and the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Polebrooke, situate wholly in the said County of Northampton, and both in the Diocese of Peterborough:

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Frank Theodore, Bishop of Peterborough, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said two Benefices of Lutton with Washingley and Polebrooke duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Peterborough and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices and the terms for effecting the union, and the said Bishop of Peterborough signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the union of the said two Benefices



based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

"And whereas both of the said Benefices of Lutton with Washingley and Polebrooke are now full, the Reverend Matthew Charles Whitelaw being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Lutton with Washingley and the Reverend Leonard Seymour Clark being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Polebrooke:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Frank Theodore, Bishop of Peterborough (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Lutton with Washingley and the said Benefice of Polebrooke shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Polebrooke with Lutton' but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

"2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said two Benefices shall be vacant, the union of the same two Benefices shall take effect forthwith; and if the said Benefice of Lutton with Washingley only shall be then vacant the said union shall also take effect forthwith if the Incumbent of the other of the said two Benefices shall consent to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, but if he shall not so consent, then the said union shall take effect upon the then next avoidance of the said Benefice of Polebrooke and the then Incumbent of Lutton with Washingley shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice; and if the said Benefice of Polebrooke only shall be then vacant the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of the said Benefice of Lutton with Washingley; and if neither of the said two Benefices be then vacant, then the said union shall take effect on the next avoidance of the said Benefice of Lutton with Washingley if the Incumbent at that time of the said Benefice of Polebrooke shall have been instituted to Polebrooke subsequently to the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or if instituted before that date shall consent to become the Incumbent of the United Benefice; but if he shall have been instituted to Polebrooke before that date and shall not so consent, then the said union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacancy of the Benefice of Polebrooke following such avoidance of the Benefice of Lutton with Washingley and the then Incumbent of Lutton with Washingley shall become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice.

"3. That upon the said union taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Polebrooke shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice.

"4. That after the said union has taken effect the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present or nominate to the United Benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as

follows, that is to say, the right of presentation shall be exercised by the Patrons of the said two Benefices alternately, the Patron of the said Benefice of Lutton with Washingley having the right upon the first presentation to the United Benefice to be made after the union and every alternate right of presentation and the Patron of the said Benefice of Polebrooke having the right of presentation upon the second presentation to the United Benefice to be made after the union and every alternate turn thereafter.

"Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been published locally in the manner prescribed in the Statutory Rules made under the said Act and also transmitted in the manner so prescribed to the Patrons affected, together with a Notice in each case requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas the prescribed time has elapsed and no such objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Peterborough has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas neither of the two Benefices affected by the said Scheme is situate in a City or Municipal Borough:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the two Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme, and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Peterborough.

of January, 1924, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Act, 1919, and of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1921, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the union of two neighbouring Benefices, that is to say the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Huish and the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Oare, Holy Trinity, both of which Benefices are situate in the County of Wilts and in the Diocese of Salisbury:

“ Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend St. Clair George Alfred, Bishop of Salisbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said two Benefices of Huish and Oare, Holy Trinity, duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Salisbury and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices and the terms for effecting the union, and the said Bishop of Salisbury signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

“ And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the union of the said two Benefices based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

“ And whereas both of the said Benefices of Huish and Oare, Holy Trinity, are now full, the Reverend Benjamin Bodycombe being the present Incumbent thereof:

“ And whereas the said Benjamin Bodycombe has consented to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, if and when the union which is hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect:

“ Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said St. Clair George Alfred, Bishop of Salisbury (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

“ 1. That the said Benefice of Huish and the said Benefice of Oare, Holy Trinity, shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of ‘ The United Benefice of Huish with Oare ’ but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects:

“ 2. That upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect, and the said Benjamin Bodycombe if he is then Incumbent of the said Benefices of Huish and Oare, Holy Trinity, shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice.

“ 3. That upon the said union taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Huish shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice.

“ 4. That after the said union has taken effect the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present or nominate to the United Benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the right of presentation shall be exercised by the Patrons of the said two Benefices alternately, the Patron of

the said Benefice of Oare, Holy Trinity, having the right upon the first presentation to the United Benefice to be made after the union and every alternate right of presentation and the Patron of the said Benefice of Huish having the right upon the second presentation to the United Benefice to be made after the union and every alternate turn thereafter.

“ Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, and with the consent of the said Frank Theodore, Bishop of Peterborough (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say :—

“ 1. That the said Benefice of Countesthorpe and the said Benefice of Foston shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of ‘ The United Benefice of Countesthorpe with Foston ’ but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

“ 2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said two Benefices shall be vacant the union of the same two Benefices shall take effect forthwith; and if one only of the said two Benefices shall be then vacant the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of the other of the said two Benefices; and if neither of the said two Benefices be then vacant the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of that one of the said two Benefices which shall last be avoided after the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme.

“ 3. That upon the said union taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Countesthorpe shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice, and that so soon as conveniently may be the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Foston and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall be sold and disposed of by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient and that the net proceeds from such sale shall constitute and form part of the fund created by the thirteenth Section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1919.

“ 4. That after the said union has taken effect the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present or nominate to the United Benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the right of presentation shall be exercised by the Patrons of the said two Benefices alternately, and that the first turn of presentation or nomination shall belong to the Patron or Patrons of that one of the said two Benefices the Incumbent of which does not become the first Incumbent of



the United Benefice under any of the provisions of Clause 2 of this Scheme.

“ Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been published locally in the manner prescribed in the Statutory Rules made under the said Act, and also transmitted in the manner so prescribed to the Patrons affected, together with a Notice in each case requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules :

And whereas the prescribed time has elapsed and no such objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners :

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Peterborough has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid :

And whereas neither of the two Benefices affected by the said Scheme is situate in a City or Municipal Borough :

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the two Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme, and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Peterborough.

“ Whereas at certain extremities of the said Parish of Knaresborough, of the Parish of Farnham, of the Parish of Goldsborough, of the Parish of Allerton Mauleverer and of the Parish of Marton cum Grafton, all in the said County and Diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several Churches of such Parishes :

“ And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said Parish of Knaresborough, of the said Parish of Farnham, of the said Parish of Goldsborough, of the said Parish of Allerton Mauleverer and of the said Parish of Marton cum Grafton should be formed into a Consolidated Chapelry for all Ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Bartholomew, Arkendale, situate as aforesaid :

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Banks, Bishop of Ripon, as such Bishop, and also as the Patron, in right of his See, of the Vicarage of the said Parish of Knaresborough, with the consents of Colonel William Fellowes Collins, D.S.O., of Cundall Manor, Pilmoor, in the said County of York, George Shann, of Number 10, Brompton Square, London, S.W., Esquire, and Frederick Shann, of Farnham, Esquire, as the Patrons of the Vicarage of the said Parish of Farnham, with the consent of the Right Honourable Henry Ulick, Earl of Harewood, as the Patron of the Rectory of the said Parish of Goldsborough, with the consent of the Right Honourable Charles Botolph Joseph, Baron Mowbray, Segrave and Stourton, as the Patron of the Vicarage of the said Parish of Allerton Mauleverer (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this Representation), and with the consents of the Master, Fellows and Scholars of the College of Saint John the Evangelist in the University of Cambridge, as the Patrons of the Vicarage of the said Parish of Marton cum Grafton (in testimony whereof they have caused their Common or Corporate Seal to be affixed to this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said Parish of Knaresborough, of the said Parish of Farnham, of the said Parish of Goldsborough, of the said Parish of Allerton Mauleverer and of the said Parish of Marton cum Grafton, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one Consolidated Chapelry for the said Church of Saint Bartholomew, Arkendale, situate as aforesaid, and

that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Arkendale.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet.

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Arkendale, comprising:—

"All those contiguous portions of the Parish of Knaresborough, of the Parish of Farnham, of the Parish of Goldsborough, of the Parish of Allerton Mauleverer, and of the Parish of Marton cum Grafton, all in the County of York and in the Diocese of Ripon, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of Wincup Lane where it meets the western side of the road leading from Wetherby to Boroughbridge and where the boundaries of the said Parish of Marton cum Grafton, of an isolated portion of the Parish of Aldborough, in the said County and Diocese, and of the said Parish of Knaresborough all meet, and extending thence first south-westward and then in various directions along the boundary which divides the said isolated portion of the Parish of Aldborough and the Parish of Staveley, in the said County and Diocese, from the said Parish of Knaresborough and also from two detached portions of the said Parish of Farnham and from the main portion of that Parish for a distance in all of 2 miles and 7 furlongs or thereabouts to the point where the boundary which divides the said Parish of Staveley from the main portion of the said Parish of Farnham meets the boundary which divides the Civil Parish of Farnham from the Civil Parish of Ferrensby, and extending thence first southward and then in various directions along the said Civil Parish boundary for a distance of 55 chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the middle of the Boroughbridge Branch line of the London and North Eastern Railway, and extending thence southward along the middle of the said line of railway (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said Parish of Farnham from the said Parish of Knaresborough) for a distance of 60 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the western end of the fence forming the southern boundary of the close numbered 42 upon the Ordnance Survey Map of the Civil Parish of Ferrensby published in the year 1909 upon the scale of 25 inches to a mile and also upon the map or plan annexed to this Representation, and extending thence north-eastward to and along the said fence and along the fences forming the southern boundaries of the closes numbered 55 and 57 upon the said maps for a distance of 36 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said Civil Parish of Ferrensby from the Civil Parish of Knaresborough Outer, and extending thence southward along such Civil Parish boundary for a distance of 3½ chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the fence forming the southern boundary of the close numbered 518 upon the Ordnance Survey Map of the said Civil Parish of Knaresborough Outer published in the year 1909 upon the scale of 25 inches to a

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said New Parish of Christ Church, Broad Green (Croydon), is a Cure wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said New Parish of Christ Church, Broad Green (Croydon), which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a

separate District in the manner which is hereinafter set forth:

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate District any consecrated Church or Chapel in use for the purposes of Divine Worship:

this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said New Parish of Christ Church, Broad Green (Croydon), which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme as aforesaid become and be constituted a separate District for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Jude, Thornton Heath.'

And whereas neither of the two Benefices affected by the said Scheme is situate in a City or Municipal Borough:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the two Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme, and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Norwich.

" I, Lisle, by Divine Permission Bishop of Coventry, do, in pursuance of the 26th section of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 106, hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

" 1. There is in the County of Warwick and my Diocese of Coventry the Vicarage of Wyken the Parish whereof lies adjacent to the Parish of Stoke and contains according to the Census of 1911 a population of 132 and the net annual value thereof is Three hundred and forty pounds.

" 2. In the same County and Diocese is the Rectory of Stoke the Parish whereof contains according to the Census of 1911 a population of 8298 and the net annual value thereof is Four hundred and fifty pounds.

" 3. The present boundaries between the said respective Parishes of Wyken and Stoke are most irregular and it appears to me that the following alterations in the boundaries of the said respective Parishes may be made with advantage to the interests of religion, viz.:— the north-west corner of the Parish of Stoke be united to the Parish of Wyken.

" 4. I, Lisle, by Divine Permission Bishop of Coventry, am by virtue of my Bishopric Patron of the Benefice of Wyken.

" 5. The Right Honourable George, Viscount Cave, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, is the Patron in right of the Crown of the said Benefice of Stoke.

" 6. The Reverend Charles Whitworth Phillips is the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Wyken.

" 7. The Reverend Charles Churton Potts is the present Incumbent of the Benefice of Stoke.

" 8. Pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th Section of the said Act, I, the said Bishop, have drawn up a Scheme in writing appended to this Representation describing the said District of the said Parish of Stoke proposed to be annexed to the said Parish of Wyken and the mode in which it appears to me the alteration may be effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe lands, Tithes, Dues, Rates and Payments and in respect of Patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and I do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the said respective Patrons and Incumbents of the said respective Parishes and in case you shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied therewith I request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and the consents of the said respective Patrons and Incumbents thereto to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

" THE SCHEME referred to in the foregoing REPRESENTATION.

" 1. It is proposed to separate the following District from the Parish of Stoke in the County of Warwick and Diocese of Coventry and unite the same for Ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining Parish of Wyken in the same County and Diocese."

" Such District shall consist of all that portion of the said Parish of Stoke which lies to the north of an imaginary line commencing at a point in the western boundary of the said Parish in the centre of Clay Lane immediately opposite the centre of the road called Stoke Row from which point the said imaginary line proceeds in an easterly and northerly direction along the centre of Stoke Row aforesaid until it reaches a point immediately opposite the southern boundary wall or fence of the houses situate on the southern side of Stratford Street whence the said imaginary line proceeds in an easterly direction along the said boundary wall or fence and also along the southern boundary of the southernmost house on the east side of Shakespeare Street until it reaches the eastern boundary of the garden attached to the last mentioned house whence it proceeds in a northerly direction along the eastern boundary wall or fence of the gardens attached to the houses situate on the south side of Avon Street from whence the said imaginary line proceeds in an easterly direction along such last mentioned boundary wall or fence until it reaches the northern or north-eastern boundary of the said Parish.

" Such District is coloured pink on the said plan annexed hereto and thereon indicated by the letter 'A.'

" 2. The inhabitants of the said District shall not in future be entitled to any accommodation in the Church of the said Parish of Stoke (except nevertheless any person or persons possessing a legal right by Faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting within the said Church) but shall be entitled to accommodation in the Church of the Parish of Wyken and shall be liable subject to the provisions of the Compulsory Church Rates (Abolition) Act, 1868, to the repair of such last mentioned Church.

" 3. The Incumbent of the Parish of Wyken shall have sole and exclusive cure of souls within the above mentioned District so united to the said Parish of Wyken.

" 4. No alteration shall be made in the Patronage or Endowment of the said Benefices.

" CONSENTS.

" I, Lisle, by Divine Permission Bishop of Coventry, being the Patron or person in right of my said Bishopric entitled to present to the Benefice of Wyken in the County of Warwick and Diocese of Coventry in case the same were now vacant and The Reverend Charles Whitworth Phillips, the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Wyken, The Right Honourable George, Viscount Cave, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and as such Lord High Chancellor and in right of the Crown being the Patron or person entitled to present to the Benefice of Stoke in the said County

of Warwick and Diocese of Coventry in case the same were now vacant and the Reverend Charles Churton Potts, the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Stoke, do hereby respectively signify to your Grace our several consents to the Scheme above proposed and set forth and to every matter therein contained.

**REGULATIONS FOR THE APPOINTMENT BY COMPETITIVE SELECTION OF ASSISTANT LIVE STOCK OFFICERS (NON - ESTABLISHED) AND LIVE STOCK OFFICERS (ESTABLISHED) UNDER THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.**

*N.B.—These Regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.*

1. Vacancies in the (non-established) grade of Assistant Live Stock Officer will be filled in accordance with the procedure laid down in these Regulations. Vacancies in the (established) grade of Live Stock Officer will be normally filled by the promotion of Assistant Live Stock Officers, but in the event of officers of that grade not being suitable for promotion, such vacancies will similarly be filled in accordance with these Regulations.

2. Application for appointment shall be made in the first instance to the Secretary, Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Ministry. When a vacancy occurs the Ministry will cause notice to be given by advertisement in the Press, which will include a statement of the last day fixed for the receipt of applications.

3. A candidate for the post of Assistant Live Stock Officer must have attained the age of 22, and must not have attained the age of 35 on the last day fixed for the receipt of applications; provided that in reckoning age for this purpose a candidate who served in the Army, Navy or Air Force between the 4th August, 1914, and the 11th November, 1918, may deduct from his actual age any period of service between the 4th August, 1914, and the 31st December, 1919. For the post of Live Stock Officer (when filled otherwise than by the promotion of an Assistant Live Stock Officer), the limits of age are 25 and 40.

4. ## FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (CHESHIRE DISTRICT) ORDER OF 1924.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1922, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

*Meaning of Terms.*

1. In this Order:—

“ The Prohibited Area ” means the Area described in the First Schedule hereto, in which the movement of animals is hereby prohibited;

If any farm (excluding any detached part) is partly within and partly outside the Prohibited Area, the whole shall be deemed to be within that Area.

“ Animals ” means cattle, sheep, goats and pigs;

“ Slaughterhouse ” means premises used habitually and solely for the purpose of slaughtering animals, but does not include a slaughterhouse which forms part of a farm.

*Restrictions in Force in the Prohibited Area.*

2.—(a) No animals shall be moved into or out of the Prohibited Area, except as hereinafter provided;

(b) No animals shall be moved along or across any road or other highway, or by water, within the Prohibited Area, or be permitted by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon any such road or highway;

(c) No market, sale or exhibition of animals shall be held in the Prohibited Area;

(d) No slaughterhouse manure, refuse or offals, or other parts of a carcass intended for feeding animals shall be moved out of the Prohibited Area or be brought into contact with animals in the Prohibited Area.

(e) The landing of animals at the approved Landing Place at the port of Liverpool (Birkenhead and Wallasey) is hereby prohibited except for animals intended for slaughter.

Animals shall only be removed from the Landing Place direct to a slaughterhouse within the Prohibited Area, or an Infected Area to which the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas) Order of 1924 (No. 22) applies. Animals so moved shall be subject to the provisions of the respective Orders applying to the areas in which the places of destination are situated.

*Control of Dogs in Prohibited Area.*

3.—(a) Dogs in the Prohibited Area shall at all times, except whilst in a dwelling-house, be kept by the owner thereof under control by being:—

(i) confined in a kennel or other enclosure from which the dog cannot escape; or

(ii) secured to some premises by a collar and chain; or

(iii) accompanied by the owner or some person deputed by him and under effectual control.

(b) Any dog which is not kept under control as prescribed by this Order may be seized by the Local Authority, or by the Police, and any dog so seized shall be dealt with in the same manner as a stray dog seized under the powers conferred by section three of the Dogs Act, 1906, is thereby authorised to be dealt with. No dog so seized shall be given or sold for the purpose of vivisection.

*Provision for Movement into the Prohibited Area of Animals for Immediate Slaughter.*

4. Animals may be moved from premises outside the Prohibited Area to a slaughterhouse in any borough or urban district in the Prohibited Area, subject to the following conditions:—

(i) A licence authorising the movement must be obtained from an Inspector of the Local Authority of the destination before the movement commences. This licence must accompany the animals throughout the whole movement.

(ii) The animals must be put on rail at a station outside the Prohibited Area and be moved by railway without being untrucked within the Prohibited Area until arrival at the railway station nearest to the place of destination: Provided that where the distance from the railway station in the Prohibited Area to the place of destination is greater than the distance to be covered within the Area, if the movement were to take place by road, the Inspector granting the licence may specify therein any other route if he thinks it desirable, and may require the animals to be moved by float.

*Conditions of Licences.*

5.—(a) Licences must be delivered up at or sent by post to the nearest Police Station, or to an Officer of the Local Authority, immediately after completion of the movement;

(b) Licences shall only be available for four days, including the day of issue, and shall accompany the animals throughout the movement;

(c) Animals while being moved with a licence under this Order shall be moved as far as practicable by the nearest available route and without avoidable delay to the place of destination specified in the licence, and not elsewhere,

and shall be kept separate, as far as practicable, from all other animals;

(d) Licences shall be produced by the person in charge of the animals moved therewith on demand to an Inspector or to a Constable, and such person shall, if required by such officer, give his name and address.

*Movement through Prohibited Area by Railway Permitted.*

6. This Order shall not prevent the movement of animals direct by railway through the Prohibited Area, if the animals are not untrucked within such Area.

*Time Limit for Slaughter of Animals.*

7. Where any animals are moved with a licence under this Order to a slaughterhouse they shall be slaughtered within 96 hours of the time of arrival at the slaughterhouse, provided that the Local Authority of the district in which the slaughterhouse is situate may, if they think fit, require any such animals to be slaughtered within a less period than 96 hours.

*Animals for Slaughter to be Marked.*

8. Animals moved to a slaughterhouse with a licence under this Order shall before such movement commences be marked as follows:—

*Cattle.*—A broad arrow six inches long clipped on the left hind-quarter and the hair clipped off the end of the tail.

*Sheep.*—A letter M six inches long painted or stamped with red or blue adhesive composition on both sides of each sheep.

*Pigs.*—Letter M painted or stamped on both sides of the pig with red or blue adhesive composition.

*Closing of Footpaths and Premises.*

9.—(1) An Inspector of the Ministry or of the Local Authority may (notwithstanding the existence of any footpath or right of way) prohibit the entry of any person into any field, shed or other place in the Prohibited Area by giving notice in writing to that effect to the occupier. In such cases the owner of the animals in such places, or his agents, or servants, may enter for the sole purpose of feeding or tending the animals, but no other persons shall enter any such place until such notice has been withdrawn by a further notice from an Inspector, unless he has obtained a licence to do so from an Inspector of the Ministry or of the Local Authority;

(2) Copies of such notices shall be affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he may think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed;

(3) Copies of such notices, when served, shall be sent to the Ministry.

*General Power to Control Dogs and Poultry.*

10.—(1) An Inspector of the Ministry or of the Local Authority may, by a written notice served upon the occupier of any premises in the Prohibited Area on which dogs or poultry are kept, require such occupier to keep such dogs or poultry under such control as may be prescribed in the notice, or to confine them to any specified part of the premises;

(2) Copies of such notices, when served, shall be sent to the Ministry.



*Local Authority to Enforce Order.*

11. This Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

*Offences.*

12. Any contravention of this Order, or of any notice served thereunder, shall be deemed to be an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

*Revocation of Order.*

13. The North Midlands (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1924 is hereby revoked.

*Commencement.*

14. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-fifth day of February, nineteen hundred and twenty-four.

LANARKSHIRE (FOOT-AND-MOUTH  
DISEASE) ORDER OF 1924.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1922, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

*Meaning of Terms.*

1. In this Order:—

“ The Controlled Area ” means the Area in which the movement of animals is hereby controlled.

The Controlled Area is described in the Schedule hereto. If any farm (excluding any detached part) is partly within and partly outside the Controlled Area, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Controlled Area.

“ Animals ” means cattle, sheep, goats and pigs.

“ Slaughterhouse ” means premises used habitually and solely for the purpose of slaughtering animals, but does not include a slaughterhouse which forms part of a farm.

*Restrictions in force in the Controlled Area.*

2.—(a) No animal shall be moved out of the Controlled Area.

(b) No animal shall be moved without a licence under Article 3 of this Order—

(i) into the Controlled Area; or

(ii) along or across any road or other highway or by water within the Controlled Area.

(c) No animal shall be permitted by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon any road or other highway in the Controlled Area.

(d) No market, sale or exhibition of animals shall be held in the Controlled Area, except a market or sale for fat animals intended for immediate slaughter, or a sale of animals on farm premises. A licence must be obtained from the Local Authority to hold any such market or sale, and a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority shall attend and examine the animals exposed thereat. No licence shall be granted for the holding of any such sale on any premises within a radius of five miles from any place infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease.

(e) No slaughterhouse manure, refuse or offals, or other parts of a carcass intended for feeding animals shall be moved out of the Controlled Area or be brought into contact with animals in such Area.

*Movement of Animals by Licence into or within the Controlled Area.*

3. Licences may be granted by an Inspector of a Local Authority for the following movement of animals only:—

(a) From premises outside the Controlled Area to a slaughterhouse in the Controlled

Area; animals so moved must be slaughtered within 96 hours of the time of arrival at the slaughterhouse.

(b) From a farm in the Controlled Area to a licensed fat stock market or fat stock sale in such Area.

(c) From a licensed fat stock market or sale in the Controlled Area or from a farm or other premises in the Controlled Area, to a slaughterhouse in such Area; animals so moved must be slaughtered within 96 hours of the time of arrival at the slaughterhouse.

(d) From one farm to another in the Controlled Area or between different parts of the same farm in such Area, if the Inspector considers the movement to be necessary or expedient. These licences may be made available for movement as often as required if the Inspector endorses the licences “ Occupation Licence.”

(e) In the case of animals, the movement of which is necessary for breeding or wintering only, for movement from premises outside the Controlled Area to premises in the Controlled Area.

Provided that no licence shall be granted under this Article for (i) the movement of any animal on a road within a radius of two miles from any place infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease, or (ii) the movement of animals from any premises to any farm for the purpose of sale at a licensed farm sale.

*Declaration for Issue of Licences.*

4. No licence shall be issued under this Order for the movement of any animals from any premises within the Controlled Area unless and until the owner of the animals has made and produced to the Inspector granting the licence a Declaration in writing stating that to the best of his knowledge and belief no animal on the premises from which the animals are proposed to be moved is affected with any disease.

*Conditions of Licences.*

5.—(a) Licences may be granted only by an Inspector of the Local Authority in whose district the movement commences, except in the case of (i) the movement from premises outside the Controlled Area, in which case the licence shall be granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the district in which the place of destination is situate; (ii) movement of animals from premises within the Controlled Area to a slaughterhouse in the Controlled Area in which case the licence shall be granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the district in which the slaughterhouse is situate and shall not be available for the movement of the animals unless and until it is countersigned by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the district from which the animals are to be moved.

(b) Licences shall not permit movement on any road within a radius of two miles of a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place, or movement out of the Controlled Area, in order to reach a destination in that Area.

(c) Occupation Licences may be withdrawn at any time by a notice served by an Inspector of the Local Authority on the person to whom such Licence was granted.

(d) Licences, other than Occupation Licences, must be delivered up at or sent by post to the nearest Police Station, or to an Officer of the Local Authority, immediately after completion of the movement.

(e) Licences, other than Occupation Licences, shall only be available for four days, including the day of issue, and shall accompany the animals throughout the movement.

(f) Animals, while being moved with a licence under this Order, shall be moved as far as practicable by the nearest available route, and without avoidable delay, to the place of destination specified in the licence, and not elsewhere, and shall be kept separate, as far as practicable, from all other animals.

(g) Copies of licences authorising movement into the district of another Local Authority shall be sent by the Inspector issuing such licences to such other Local Authority.

(h) Licences shall be produced by the person in charge of the animals moved therewith on demand to an Inspector or to a Constable, and such person shall, if required by such Officer, give his name and address.

#### *Movement through Controlled Area by Railway Permitted.*

6. This Order shall not prevent the movement of animals direct by railway through the Controlled Area if the animals are not untrucked within such Area.

#### *Animals for Slaughter.*

7.—(a) Animals moved to a slaughterhouse in accordance with a licence under this Order shall be detained at such slaughterhouse until they are slaughtered.

(b) Before movement commences all such animals shall be marked as follows:—

*Cattle.*—A broad arrow six inches long clipped on the left hind-quarter, and the hair clipped off the end of the tail.

*Sheep.*—A letter M six inches long painted or stamped with red or blue adhesive composition on both sides of each sheep.

*Pigs.*—Letter M painted or stamped on both sides of the pig with red or blue adhesive composition.

(c) Where any animals are moved with a licence to a slaughterhouse in the Controlled Area, the Local Authority of the district in which the slaughterhouse is situate may, if they think fit, require the animals to be slaughtered within a less period than 96 hours from the time of their arrival at the slaughterhouse.

#### *Closing of Footpaths and Premises.*

8.—(1) An Inspector of the Ministry or of the Local Authority may (notwithstanding the existence of any footpath or right of way) prohibit the entry of any person into any field, shed or other place in the Controlled Area by giving notice in writing to that effect to the occupier. In such cases the owner of the animals in such places, or his agents, or servants, may enter for the sole purpose of feeding or tending the animals, but no other persons shall enter any such place until such notice has been withdrawn by a further notice from an Inspector, unless he has obtained a

licence to do so from an Inspector of the Ministry or of the Local Authority.

(2) Copies of such notices shall be affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he may think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed.

(3) Copies of such notices, when served, shall be sent to the Ministry.

#### *Control of Dogs and Poultry.*

9.—(1) An Inspector of the Ministry or of the Local Authority may, by a written notice served upon the occupier of any premises in the Controlled Area on which dogs or poultry are kept, require such occupier to keep such dogs or poultry under such control as may be prescribed in the notice, or to confine them to any specified part of the premises.

(2) Copies of such notices, when served, shall be sent to the Ministry.

#### *Local Authority to enforce Order.*

10. This Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

#### *Offences.*

11. Any contravention of this Order, or of any notice served thereunder, shall be deemed to be an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, and renders the offender liable to prosecution.

#### *Revocation of previous Orders.*

12. The Renfrewshire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1924, and the Renfrewshire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1924 (No. 3), are hereby revoked.

#### *Commencement.*

6. To provide that any fittings let for hire by the Council under the provisions of Section 24 of the Act of 1901 shall remain the property of the Council notwithstanding that they shall be fixed to the premises, and to empower the Council to enter premises and remove fittings belonging to them.

7. To make further provision in regard to the supply of gas and in particular to provide for the following, amongst other matters:— To prescribe a minimum charge for gas supplied to premises having a supply of electricity or power gas or gas from sources other than the Council, to make provision as to mode of cutting off supplies by the Council and expenses of re-connecting any discontinued supply; to provide for the removal of fittings
