

upon the north, upon the north east and upon the east, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said Parish of Edgware from the said New Parish of Saint Paul, Mill Hill, crosses the middle of the viaduct which carries the main line of the Midland Section of the London, Midland and Scottish Railway across Dean's Brook, and extending thence south eastward in a straight line (thereby crossing the Barnet Bye Pass Road) for a distance of 36 chains or thereabouts to the junction of Hankins Lane, Selvage Lane and Marsh Lane, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Marsh Lane for a distance of 21 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath leading past the western side of the house and premises known as Sonnie's Field to Lawrence Street, and extending thence southward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of 26½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Lawrence Street, and extending thence south westward along the middle of Lawrence Street for a distance of 9 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath leading into Birbeck Road near its junction with Milton Road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last mentioned footpath for a distance of 17½ chains or thereabouts to the point where such footpath reaches the western side of Birbeck Road, and extending thence first north eastward to the junction of Birbeck Road and Milton Road and then eastward along the middle of Milton Road for a distance in all of 12 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Hammers Lane, and extending thence southward along the middle of Hammers Lane for a distance of 14 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Daws Lane and Wise Lane, and extending thence first southward and then south eastward along the middle of Wise Lane for a distance of 32½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Page Street, and extending thence southward along the middle of Page Street for a distance of 30 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Paul, Mill Hill, from the said Parish of Hendon."
