Berne, June 8. N. S. We have Letters from Genoa of the 29th past which say, Two Couriers arriv'd there that Morning in Eight Days from Barcelona, with Letters to the Emperor and the Duke of Savoy from the King of Spain: Our Letters of the 4th from Milan say, the Detachment for Naples continu'd its March, and would by this time, as was suppos'd, enter that Kingdom, where the Vice-Roy had rais'd a Tumultuary Body of Forces to oppose them, which, according to some Letters, amount to 20000 Men. We hear from Turin of the first Instant, That the Duke of Savoy's Infantry was to rendezvous at Orlesan on the 11th; that his Cavalry was already encamp'd at Rivoli; and that the German Troops were to arrive there the 6th.

Oranienberg, June 13. At the first Arrival of the Princess Royal, with the Prince her Husband, this little Town was adorn'd in all the Parts that lie in view of the Castle with curious Illuminations, Fire-works, and Triumphal Arches. The King designs to reside here for some time, the late Improvements that have been made in the Apartments and Gardens rendering this House more agreeable to His Majesty than any other of his Palaces. The Margrave Albert, the King's Second Brother, has receiv'd an Account that his Eldest Son is dead of the Small-pox, which at present rages very much in this Country. The Court is already gone into a Mourning of Six Weeks on this Occasion; and the Margrave Philip, the King's First Brother, is advis'd that his Eldest Son is taken ill of the same Distemper. Monsieur Printze is arriv'd from Saxony, after a very favourable Reception at the Swedish Court. It was generally believ'd when he took his Leave that the King would march very suddenly. That Prince is highly satisfied with the Instance which the King of Prussia gave him of his Friendship in confining Colonel Schlundt, for Correspondence with the Muscovite; but at the same time generously interposes for his Enlargement. King Augustus persist'd in refusing the Credentials of Monsieur Printze, which were not address'd to him in his Regal Title. The Imperial Minister having receiv'd an Express from Vienna, has deliver'd a Letter to His Prussian Majesty from the Emperor, wherein the King is complimented as the most Powerful Elector, and congratulated upon the Opportunity of advancing his own Glory, and obliging the whole Alliance. The Emperor rejoices with him in his peculiar Happiness of being free from intestine Commotions, which hinder His Imperial Majesty from turning his whole Force upon the common Enemy; and acquaints him, that even in those Circumstances he has sent several of his Troops to reinforce the German Army, and cover the Empire from further Influxes. The King is now in a Council of War upon the Contents of this Letter. General Heister is dispatched to the Army, in Hopes that his Example, and Experience in Military Affairs, may have a good Effect upon the Troops in their present Confusion. It is thought, when they are join'd by the Forces which are now on their March, they will be superior to the Enemy by 12000 Men. Upon a groundless Report that the Emperor has been entering into a separate Treaty, His Imperial Majesty has expressed himself with great Indignation upon that Subject, and directed his Ministers not only to assure his Allies of the contrary, but to offer new Engagements, to make no Peace with France till King Charles is establish'd in the entire Possession of the Spanish Monarchy. His Prussian Majesty, at the Request of the Imperial Court, has written to his Kinsman the Margrave of Barceith, advising him to lay down his Command, and not expose his old Age, wherein Quiet and Repose are so necessary, to the Hardships and Fatigues of a Military Life.

Paris,

Lord Galway has got together 6000 Horse and 8000 Foot, and furnish'd Lorida with all things necessary for its Defence. He has likewise made himself Master of some Parties, to prevent the Conjunction of the Dukes of Orleans and Berwick, and by that means given an unexpected Interruption to the Course of our Successes. The same Advices tell us, the Duke of Orleans very narrowly escap'd being taken by that General, who with a Detachment of 3000 Horse was within less than half an Hour of surprizing him. We have lost above 2000 Men before the Town of Xativa, and have since had great Numbers kill'd in our Attack upon the Castle, which is reduced to the utmost Extremity, after having made a very obstinate Resistance. We are inform'd by Letters from Dauphiné, That the Duke of Savoy assembles his Forces near Sufa, where Monsieur de Chambrante commands, who has in the Town a Garrison of 6000 Men, with 100 Miners, and as many pieces of Cannon. Monsieur de Telle is strongly intrench'd about three Leagues from Pignerol, and sends daily Expresses to sollicite for fresh Reinforcements; on which Occasion the King is in frequent Conference with Marshal Catinat, who is best acquainted with the Plan of that Country, and the proper Methods of carrying on the War in it. We hear from Monaco, That 34 large Men of War, suppos'd to be the Squadron commanded by Admiral Shovell, were seen off that Place, which has given the Court much Uneasiness, not knowing whither so great a Naval Force is directed. The Prince of Conti, who is the Chief Competitor with the King of Prussia for the Principality of Neuchâtel, is set out on his Journey thither; but we fear the Inhabitants of that Place, being Protestants, will not depend upon his Protection, who could not shelter those of the same Religion in the Principality of Orange, which he possess'd by the same Title, and was prevail'd upon to resign to the King for a Sum of Money.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Meldert, June 23. N.S.
The Horse of the Second Line of the Right Wing was review'd by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough on Tuesday, as was this Day the Cavalry of the First Line of the Left Wing. His Grace was very much surpris'd with the Condition in which they appear'd. This Day the Right Wing of Horse forag'd on the other side the Dyle, near the Wood of Soignies, where a considerable Body of Foot was posted the Day before to cover the Foragers. It is reported the Enemy design to send Troops into Germany; but there is, as yet, no Detachment made. Deserters come in to us in so great Numbers, that their Battalions must be very much impair'd. Yesterday our Parties brought in about 80 Men of the Guards which were posted at a Distance from their Front to prevent Desertion. Both Armies continue in their former Camps; and the Detachment which the Enemy sent to Genap is return'd to the Army, without having attempted any thing.

Chesler, June 16. His Excellency the Earl of Pembroke came to this City on the 14th Instant in the Afternoon, about Two-a-Clock, and was received by the Mayor, Aldermen, and City-Companies, in their Formalities and Liveries, the Recorder making a Speech. The Guns from the Castle were fired, and the Lieutenant-Governor, with several Gentlemen, met his Lordship on Horseback. In the Evening the Dean and Chapter waited on his Excellency: And Yesterday, after Divine Service was over, he was entertained at a sumptuous Banquet by the City. This Morning his Excellency proceeded on his Journey towards Hollyhead, where he designs to be on the 18th, and embark there for Dublin; the Yacht and Men of War that attended here being ordered to Hollyhead.

Whitehall, June 18. Her Majesty has been pleas'd to confer the Dignity of a Baronet of Great Britain upon Sir Henry Furnese, in Consideration of his many good and faithful Services.

Colonel Richard Sutton is made Lieutenant-Governor of Hull, in the place of Colonel Gylby, deceased.
