Hamburg, April 1. N. S. The Count de Vellingk has caused several Batteries furnished with large Cannon to be raised along the Entrenchment he has made upon the Elbe, and has Fir'd upon several Danish Vessels that have passed by them, as the Danes do likewise upon the Suedish Vessels from the other side of the River. The Reason why these Hostilities were begun by the Danes, was, because a Suedish Privateer last Year took two Danish Ships at the Mouth of the Elbe, and notwithstanding Complaint had been made to his Suedish Majesty, the Count de Vellingk had not taken care to give any Satisfaction. Forage is so scarce in Pomerania, that the Horses of both Armies Perish for want of it in great Numbers.

Hanover, April 8. N. S. An Express dispatch'd by Monsieur Fabricius, Envoy from the Duke Administrator of Holstein to the King of Sweden, passed through this Place in his way to Gottorp, with Letters from Bender, dated the Twenty sixth of February, which bring Advice that several Esfendis, and a great number of the Janizaries, since the Restitution of Asoph, and the Demolishing of

Taganrock, were for the maintaining of the Peace between the Czar and the Ottoman Port, but that the Sultan had declared, that he would put himself at the Head of a more numerous Army than had appear'd in the Field the last Campagne under the Grand Vizit, unless the Czar would execute every particular Article that had been agreed on when the Peace was concluded.

Brussels, April 11. N. S. On the Ninth Instant in the Evening, Baron Heems, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the States-General, arriv'd here from Holland, to help forward the granting of the extraordinary Subsidies, demanded from the Spanish Netherlands, towards finding the Bread and Forage for the Body of Imperialists, which are to serve in those Provinces. The States of Brabant being met to Day, they have desired the Baron to appear at their Assembly, and inform them of his Imperial Majesty's Pleasure upon this Occasion. The States of Flanders who adjourn'd themselves till the Eighteenth, have likewise desired that Minister to repair to their Assembly at Gand, to the same Purpose. The States of Hainault have granted Ninety thousand of the Hundred thousand Florins demanded of them for this Service, and proper Measures are already taken for delivering the Bread and Forage to those Troops from Maestricht, when they shall be on their Passage towards the Army. Messieurs Hopp and Slingerland, Deputies of Holland for reviewing the Forces in the Pay of that Province, which are now Quarter'd in Brabant, having executed their Commission here, will set out to Morrow for Mons. The Confederate Troops from the Meuse, are actually upon their March through this City towards the Place of the General Rendezvous of the Army, and part of this Garrison will March with them this Day, and the Remainder, together with the Troops of Hanover, that have been Quarter'd on the Demer. Upon these Motions of the Confederate Forces, those of the Enemies in the Garrisons upon the Sambre, march'd out about two Days since, and the Troops of the Household, with others who had their Winter Quarters in the remote Parts of France, are in full March towards Peronne. The Duke of Betty has been Seiz'd with two Fits of an Intermitting Fever, but is perfectly Recovered.

Utrecht, April 12. N. S. On Saturday the Ninth Instant the Count Werteren, one of the Plenipotentiaries from King Augustus, came hither, but has not yet notify'd his Arrival to the several Ministers residing at this Place. The Count Sinzendorff and the Count Tarouca, Plenipotentiaries of the Emperor and the King of Portugal, together with Messieurs Buys, de Moermont, de Reniwoode, and the Count de Rechteren, four of the Plenipotentiaries of the States-General, who went to the Hague, are expected back this Evening, to be present at the General Conference to be held to Morrow; in which it will appear, whether the French Ministers have as yet receiv'd any fresh Instructions from their Court: In the mean time, the Ministers of the

the Allies had their Meeting Yesterday, as usual, in the Town-House. Prince Eugene is suddenly expected in this Place from the Hague; but since he has not receiv'd an Answer to the Express he sent to Vienna, it is not known, whether he will be oblig'd to go first to the Imperial Court, or proceed directly to the Army in Flanders; but considering that the Season is so far advanc'd, the latter is thought most probable.

Hague, April 12. N.S. Several of the Plenipotentiaries of the Allies are arriv'd here, and among them some of the Plenipotentiaries of the States-General, who have for two Days successively been in Conference with the Deputies of the States, and are return'd to Utrecht, to assist at the next General Conference to be held there. Sir James Wihart on Saturday last Confer'd, both with the Deputies of the States-General, and those of the Admiralty, concerning the Regulation and Settlement (pursuant to Treaties) of the Marine Quota's between Her Majesty and the States-General of the United Provinces, for the Service of the ensuing Year. Monsieur Hymen, Envoy from the King of Prussia, was the same Day in Conference with the Deputies of the States, concerning the Affair of the Town of Meurs, and receiv'd an Answer to the Memorial he had deliver'd in upon that Subject. The States of Holland have appointed the Twentieth of this Month to be Solemniz'd as a Day of Fasting and Prayer, as well upon the Occasion of the Negotiations of Peace, as upon the opening of the Campaign.

Deale, April 6. Here are Her Majesty's Ships the August, Lichfield, Centurion, South-Sea-Castle and Swallow; as also the Churchil-Gally for Barcelona, Queen Anne and Susanna for New-England, Neptune for Leghorne, Mary and Catherine for Jamaica, John-Gally for Nevis, Hope-Gally for Ireland, and the Edward and Mary and Laffels for Barbadoes. Just now came in Her Majesty's Ships the Dreadnought and Dunkirk, and under their Convoy about a hundred Sail of Homeward-bound and Coasters, all last from Portsmouth.
