HER Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in Her Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir William Oldes, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from Her Majesty to the House of Commons, requiring their Attendance in the House of Peers, the Commons being come thither accordingly, Her Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to the Publick Bills following,

An Act for Enlarging, Amending and Maintaining the Road betwixt Northfleet, Gravesend and Rochester, in the County of Kent.

An Act for Repairing the Highway between Highgate Gatehouse, in the County of Middlesex and Barnet Blackhouse, in the County of Hertford.

An Act for making effectual such Agreement as shall be made between the Royal African Company and their Creditors.

And to Six Private Bills.

After which Her Majesty made the following most Gracious Speech to both Houses.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE making Peace and War is the undoubted Prerogative of the Crown, yet such is the just Confidence I place in You, that at the Opening of this Session, I acquainted You that a Negotiation for a General Peace was begun, and afterwards by Messengers, I promised to communicate to You the Terms of Peace, before the same should be concluded.

In pursuance of that Promise, I now come to let You know upon what Terms a General Peace may be made.

I need not mention the Difficulties which arise from the very Nature of this Affair; and it is but too apparent that these Difficulties have been increased by other Obstructions, artfully contrived to hinder this great and good Work.

Nothing however has moved me from steadily pursuing, in the first Place, the true Interest of my own Kingdoms, and I have not omitted any thing which might procure to our Allies what is due to them by Treaties; and what is necessary for their Security.

The assuring of the Protestant Succession, as by Law Established, in the House of Hanover to these Kingdoms, being what I have nearest at Heart, particular Care is taken not only to have that acknowledged in the strongest Terms, but to have an additional Security by the removal of that Person out of the Dominions of France, who has pretended to disturb this Settlement.

The Apprehension that Spain and the West-Indies might be united to France was the chief Inducement to begin this War; and the effectual preventing of such an Union, was the Principle I laid down at the Commencement of this Treaty.

Former Examples, and the late Negotiations, sufficiently shew how difficult it is to find Means to accomplish this Work; I would not consent my self with such as are Speculative, or depend on Treaties only, I insisted on what is solid, and to have at Hand the Power of executing what should be agreed.

I can therefore now tell you that France at last is brought to offer, that the Duke of Anjou shall for himself and his Descendants, renounce for ever, all Claim to the Crown of France: And that this important Article may be exposed to no Hazard, the Performance is to accompany the Promise.

At the same time, the Succession to the Crown of France, is to be declared after the Death of the present Dauphin and his Sons, to be in the Duke of Burgundy and his Sons; in the Duke of Orleans and his Sons; and so on, to the rest of the House of Bourbon.

As to Spain and the Indies, the Succession to those Dominions, after the Duke of Anjou and his Children, is to descend to such Prince as shall be agreed upon at the Treaty, for ever excluding the rest of the House of Bourbon.

For confirming the Renuciations and Settlements before-mentioned, it is further offered, that they shall be Ratified in the most strong and solemn Manner both in France and Spain; and that those Kingdoms, as well as all the other Powers engaged in the present War, shall be Guaranties to the same.

The Nature of this Proposal is such, that it executes it self. The Interest of Spain is to support it; and in France the Persons to whom that Succession is to belong, will be ready and powerful enough to vindicate their own Right.

France and Spain are now more effectually divided than ever. And thus, by the Blessing of God, will a real Balance of Power be fixed in Europe, and remain liable to as few Accidents as humane Affairs can be exempted from.

A Treaty of Commerce between these Kingdoms and France has been entered upon; but the excessive Duties laid on some Goods, and the Prohibitions of others, make it impossible to finish this Work so soon as were to be desired. Care is however taken to establish a Method of settling this Matter, and in the mean time Provision is made, that the same Privileges and Advantages as shall be granted to any other Nation by France, shall be granted in like manner to us.

The Division of the Island of St. Christopher between Us and the French, having been the Cause of great Inconveniency and Damage to my Subjects, I have demanded to have an absolute Cession made to me of that whole Island, and France agrees to this Demand.

Our Interest is so deeply concerned in the Trade of North America, that I have used my utmost Endeavours to adjust that Article in the most beneficial manner. France consents to restore to Us the whole Bay and Streights of Hudson, to deliver up the Island of Newfoundland with Placentia, and to make an absolute Cession of Annapolis, with the rest of Nova Scotia or Acadie.

The safety of our Home-Trade will be better provided for by the demolition of Dunkirk.

Our Mediterranean Trade and the British Interest and Influence in those Parts will be secur'd. by the Possession of Gibraltar and Port Mahon, with the whole Island of Minorca, which are offered to remain in my Hands.

The Trade to Spain and to the West Indies may be generally be settled, as it was in the Time of the late King of Spain, Charles the Second, and a particular Provision be made, that all Advantages, Rights or Priviledges which have been granted, or which may hereafter be granted by Spain to any other Nation, shall be in like manner granted to the Subjects of Great Britain.

But the Point which we have born in the prosecution of this War, entitling us to some Distinction in the Terms of Peace, I have insisted and obtained, that the Assiento or Contract for furnishing the Spanish West-Indies with Negroes, shall be made with us for the Term of Thirty Years, in the same manner as it has been enjoyed by the French for Ten Years past.

I have not taken upon me to determine the Interests of our Confederates, these must be adjusted in the Congress at Utrecht, where my best Endeavours shall be employ'd, as they have hitherto constantly been, to procure to every one of them all just and reasonable Satisfaction: In the mean time I think it proper to acquaint You, that France offers to make the Rhine the Barrier of the Empire, to yield Brisack, the Fort of Kehl and Landau, and to raze all the Fortresses both on the other side of the Rhine and in that River.

As to the Protestant Interests in Germany, there will be on the part of France, no Objections to the re-settling thereof, on the Foot of the Treaty of Westphalia.

The Spanish Low-Countries may go to his Imperial Majesty; the Kingdoms of Naples and Sardinia, the Dutchy of Milan, and the Places belonging to Spain on the Coast of Tuscany, may likewise be yielded by the Treaty of Peace to the Emperor.

As to the Kingdom of Sicily, though there remains no Dispute concerning the Cession of it by the Duke of Anjou, yet the Disposition thereof is not yet Determined.

The Interests of the States-General, with respect to Commerce, are agreed to, as they have been Demanded by their own Ministers, with the Exception only of some very few Species of Merchandize, and the entire Barrier as Demanded by the States in One thousand seven hundred and nine from France, except two or three Places at most.

As to these Exceptions several Expedients are proposed, and I make no Doubt but this Barrier may be so Settled, as to render that Republick perfectly Secure against any Enterprize on the Part of France, which is the Foundation of all My Engagements upon this Head with the States.

The Demands of Portugal depending on the Disposition of Spain, and that Article having been long in Dispute, it has not been yet possible to make any considerable Progress therein; but My Plenipotentiaries will now have an Opportunity to assist that King in his Pretensions.

Those of the King of Prussia are such as, I hope, will admit of little Difficulty on the Part of France; and my utmost Endeavours shall not be wanting to procure all I am able to so good an Ally,

The Difference between the Barrier demanded for the Duke of Savoy in Seventeen hundred and nine, and the Offers now made by France, is very inconsiderable: But that Prince having so signally Distinguished himself in the Service of the Common Cause, I am Endeavouring to Procure for him still farther Advantages.

France has consented, That the Elektor Palatine shall continue his present Rank among the Elektors, and remain in Possession of the Upper Palatinate.

The Elektoral Dignity is likewise Acknowledged in the House of Hanover, according to the Article inserted, at that Prince's Desire, in My Demands.

And as to the rest of the Allies, I make no Doubt of being able to Secure their several Interests.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I have now Communicated to you, not only the Terms of Peace, which may, by the future Treaty, be Obtained for My Own Subjects, but likewise the Proposals of France for Satisfying Our Allies.

The former are such as I have reason to expect, to make My People some Amends for that Great and Unequal Burden which they have lain under through the whole Course of this War; and I am willing to hope, That none of Our Confederates, and especially those to whom so great Accessions of Dominion and Power are to Accrue by this Peace, will Envy Britain Her Share in the Glory and Advantage of it.

The latter are not yet so perfectly Adjusted, as a little more Time might have rendered them, but the Season of the Year making it Necessary to put an End to this Session, I Resolved no longer to defer Communicating these Matters to you.

I can make no doubt but you are all fully Perswaded, That nothing will be Neglected on my Part, in the Progress of this Negotiation, to bring the Peace to an Happy and Speedy Issue, and I Depend on your Entire Confidence in Me, and your Cheerful Concurrence with Me.

Hague, June 7. N. S. On Friday last in the Evening the Deputies of the States-General had a Conference with such of their Plenipotentiaries as were arrived here from Utrecht, and it lasted till Eleven a Clock at Night. Yesterday being the ordinary Day for the Conference of the Foreign Ministers, they met in the Chamber of Treves, where the Count de Tarouca assisted, and the same Day sent away an Express for London. Monsieur Van Welderen and Monsieur the Treasurer General Hop, who have been named by the States-General to go with a Commission to the Army, will set forwards thither to Morrow. The States of Holland still continue their Sessions, and Yesterday disposed of several Military Employments.

From the Camp at Chateau Cambresis, June 8. N. S. On Monday the Sixth Instant, Prince Eugene Review'd the Foot of the first Line of the Army under his Command, consisting of the Imperialists, Helians and Dutch, which appeared in very good Order. Yesterday the two Armies made a Movement over the Selle, and encamp'd with the Right of Prince Eugene's Army at Hapre, and the left at St. Pithone, and the Right of that Commanded by his Grace the Duke of Ormond at St. Pithone, and the left at Chateau Cambresis. The Siege of Quefnoy being resolv'd upon, a Detachment, is made from the Two Armies for that Service, consisting of Thirty Battalions, and as many Squadrons, Commanded by General Fagel, and this Day the Place is invested. The heavy Artillery to be employed in the Siege which has been for some time at Marchiennes, is now all disembarked, and part of it already arriv'd at Denain, where the Earl of Albemarle continues with his Detachment; and Three hundred and fifty Waggon's are Summoned from Flanders and Brabant, to transport the Ammunition. The French Army continues still in its former Situation.

Brussels, June 9. N. S. Yesterday arrived here an Express from Prince Eugene with Letters for the Council of State, acquainting them that the Siege of Quefnoy was resolv'd upon, and requiring them to dispatch Orders for Three hundred and fifteen Waggon's to be furnished by the Spanish Netherlands on the fifteenth Instant at Marchiennes, to be employed in Transporting the Ammunition necessary for this Operation, and Circular Letters to that purpose have been written accordingly. The Army under his Grace the Duke of Ormond marched Yesterday in order to cover the Siege. The Regiment of the Great Master of the Teutonic Order, consisting of three Battalions of Eight hundred Men each, arrived here on the seventh Instant; two of them will proceed to Morrow Morning to the Camp, and the other will march towards Mons, where it is to remain in Garrison. Three Days ago Monsieur du Moulin, the famous Partisan, was brought hither Prisoner from an Estate he has in this Province. He thought himself in Safety there by a Passport granted to him by General Tilly, but the Commandant of this Place maintains that the Terms of it do not permit him to come into Brabant.

Utrecht, June 10. N. S. Several of the Ministers of the Allies, who went lately to the Hague, being not yet returned from thence, no Conference was held Yesterday at the Town-House among those residing at this Place. The Counts Sinzendorff and Conbruck, Plenipotentiaries on the part of his Imperial Majesty, are expected back to Morrow or the Day following, as is also Baron Bothmar and several others.

Dartmouth, June 3. Her Majesty's Ships the Ruby and Bedford having been some Days in Torbay, waiting for a fair Wind to fail to the Westward with several Merchant Ships under their Convoy, are this Afternoon sailed thence for Plymouth. The Pope Galley of this Place is sailed this Day for Guernsey.

Tarmouth, June 4. Yesterday came into this Road Her Majesty's Ships the Deptford and Maidstone from the Southward, bound for Humber, who sailed hence this Day; as did likewise a Fleet of eight Colliers to the Northward.

Deale, June 5. Here are Her Majesty's Ship the York; as also the Abington, bound for the East-Indies, the Moon Galley and the Willing-Mind for Newfoundland, the Union for Leghorn, the Samuel and John, and the John for Ireland; and several Coasters.
