THE Repairs and the fitting up of the Apartments of Versailles, requiring more Time than was at first supposed, it is now said the King will not go thither till about the Middle of next Month. We have Advice from Madrid, that the Count de Aguilar having fallen under the Displeasure of the King of Spain, had an Order sent to him to retire from Court within twenty four Hours, to his Government, which he not obeying readily, his Catholick Majesty ordered a Detachment of Guards to carry him to Corunna, where he is to be confined in Fort St. Antonio. The following Advices received by the Court relating to the Plague, have been communicated to the foreign Ministers.

The Duke de Roquelaure in his Letter of the 20th of April writes that all the Gevaudan continues in a good State of Health: He had Advices the 10th, that since the 1st none had died or fallen sick in any of the Places formerly infected: Nor had any been newly taken ill in the Sevenes or the Vivarais, except one Woman in a House of the Parish of Jonas; but that House standing separate from others, and all necessary Precautions being taken, it was hoped there would be no ill Consequences. At Alais the Quarantain was continued with good Effect; from the 2d to the 18th none had died or fallen sick, there remained in the Suburbs three Persons who had recovered, and they were to be put forthwith under Quarantain: All Diligence was used in Perfuming and Airing the Houses, and it was believed the Plague had wholly ceased there. None had newly fallen sick in the Comtat; and it was judged that if the Disinfection or Perfuming was performed there with proper Care and Regularity, any Relapse might be prevented. The Bishop of Alais writes the 17th, that no Accident had interrupted the Quarantain, and that the Disinfection of the Infirmary would be finished in a Fortnight. M. de Bernage in his of the 17th, 19th and 20th of April gives the same Account: Several Letters from Officers confirmed, that the Distemper was ceasing every where. The Marquess de Brancas writes, that the Accident which happened at Marseilles had not had ill Consequences. M. le Bret in his of the 15th of April relates, that the Father of the three Children who died at Marseilles, was also dead himself in the Lazaretto; but a Physician and Surgeon had made their Report, that it was of a Quinsy, and that having viewed and opened his Body, they had not discovered any Mark of Contagion. The Precaution that was taken to remove him out of the City into a separate House, was very proper however in all Events, having prevented Communication had the Distemper happened to be infectious.

Whitehall, April 16, 1722.

This is to signify in His Majesty's Name, that if any Person or Persons shall hereafter apprehend any one or more Highwaymen, who from and after the Date hereof shall have robbed any of the Mails, or shall have been concerned as Accomplices in the robbing of any of them, such Person or Persons shall have a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for each Offender, who shall be convicted thereof, to be paid by the Receiver General of the Post-Office, over and above the Reward directed by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person hereafter concerned in robbing any of the Mails shall make a Discovery of the same, so that his Accomplice or Accomplices shall be convicted thereof, such Person shall have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon, and also receive the Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for each Offender so convicted, to be paid as aforesaid.
