THE two Courts of Prussia and Be-vern came hither Yesterday in the Evening from Potzdam.

Hambourg, March 1. N. S. Here is a Report, that his Danish Majesty is dangerously ill of the Small Pox. M. Befstuchef, who resided formerly in this Town, and is now appointed by the Czarina to succeed M. Brackett at the Court of Denmark, arrived here on the 27th past from Petersbourg, and will set out in a Week or ten Days for Copenhagen.

Hague, March 4, N. S. The Assembly of the States of Holland remains fixed for the 18th Instant, unless some extraordinary Affairs should require their meeting sooner. M. Van Borselen, one of the Deputies of Zealand to the States General, and formerly Envoy Extraordinary at the Court of Great Britain, is dangerously ill of a Fever. Yesterday the Ambassadour from Spain paid his first Visit to his most Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, which his Highness returned his Excellency this Morning. Couriers have been dispatched to their several Courts by the Ministers of the Powers that are engaged in the present War, with the Plan of Accommodation, which has been communicated to them.
